#### IMPORTANT RESOLUTIONS AND ORDERS

#### Passed by the City Council - 1975

#### RESOLUTION TO CONCLUDE NECESSARY AGREEMENT WITH COUNTRY GAS CORP.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HONORABLE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROCHESTER

THAT the Legal Affairs Committee of the City Council be and is hereby authorized to conclude necessary Agreement with Country Gas Corporation, a foreign corporation registered and licensed to do business in the State of New Hampshire, for the privilege of utilizing an existing Railroad siding in the Gonic section of the City of Rochester for bulk gas tank storage; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that said Committee in its discretion and in consultation with the Mayor shall protect the City by requiring said Country Gas on behalf of itself, its agents, successors and assigns to provide the necessary safeguards to the City of Rochester for such gas storage by requiring adequate insurance and protection to said City to be paid for by said Country Gas, its agents, successors and assigns.

#### RESOLUTION TO RESTORE TWO WAY TRAFFIC ON WAKEFIELD STREET

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HONORABLE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROCHESTER

THAT the one way traffic program as it exists on Wakefield Street as provided for by Resolution passed by this Honorable Council on December 1, 1970, and continued by Resolution passed by this Honorable Council on December 7, 1971, be amended by restoring two way traffic on Wakefield Street only between Central Square and Union Street on said Wakefield Street in order to minimize the possibility of damage to property and injury to persons and to avoid municipal liability by reason of the elimination of Government immunity for municipalities; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Traffic Committee of the City Council be and is empowered and authorized to take necessary measures to implement the contents of this Resolution for thirty (30) days on a temporary basis after May 1, 1975.

#### **RESOLUTION PERTAINING TO TANNERIES**

BE IT RESOLVED by the Honorable Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester as follows:

WHEREAS the 1947 Ordinances of the City of Rochester prohibited Tanneries in Industrial Areas; and

WHEREAS the 1952 Ordinances of the City of Rochester inadvertently failed to include tanneries in prohibited uses.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Honorable Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester that tanneries be prohibited in both Industry 1 Zones and in Industry 2 Zones.

Be It Ordained by Honorable Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester as follows:

That the Filing Fee to cover the costs of legal notice and other charges for an Application to the Board of Adjustment for a variance shall be the sum of fifteen (\$15.) Dollars payable in advance.

#### FILING FEE FOR REVISION OF ORDINANCE

Be It Ordained by the Honorable Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester as follows:

That the Filing Fee to cover the costs of legal notice and other charges for an Application to the Board of Adjustment for a Revision of the Ordinances shall be the sum of thirty (\$30.) dollars payable in advance.

#### **OBJECTION IN FLOOD CONTROL ACT**

The following Amendment was passed by Ten (10) Councilmen present.

The Council objects wholly and completely to the duress and penalties that would be imposed and contained in the Flood Control Act in such areas as those dealing with Federal Financial Institutions.

#### AMENDMENT TO CITY ORDINANCE RE: PRIMARY ELECTIONS

We the members of the Committee on Bills in their Second Reading of the Rochester City Council do hereby find and declare within the limits of our layman's capability

THAT the Amendment to city ordinances relating to primary elections is in accordance with and not repugnant to the Ordinances and Charter of the City of Rochester and the Statutes of the State of New Hampshire.

Passed June 3, 1975

BE IT ORDAINED by the Honorable Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester as follows:

WHEREAS, the voters of the City of Rochester voted by Referendum to adopt a City Primary on November 7, 1967, pursuant to RSA C 59, Sections 12, 12A, 13, 14 and 60 and New Hampshire Constitution Part 1, Article 1, Article 7, Article 8 and Article 11; and

WHEREAS, the City of Rochester has followed said Referendum since 1967; and

WHEREAS, such procudure has been approved by the New Hampshire Supreme Court in the Rochester case of <u>Brennan v Herman</u> 109 N.H. 541 (1969)

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that C. XXVI of the City of Rochester Ordinances entitled "Election of City Officers" be amended by adding thereto the following new sections:

SECTION 8:	Filing Fees	Mayor \$50.00 City Council \$10.00 School Board \$2.00 Police Commission \$25.00
SECTION 9:	Primary Hours:	Shall be from 10:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M.
SECTION 10:	Primary Date:	The date for the <u>Primary Election</u> shall be the Second Tuesday of September to become effective Sep- tember 9. 1975.

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	Biennial Date:	The date for the biennial City Election shall be on the first Tues- day of November and shall be by ballot and the terms of the respect- ive officers for City Ward and Town Officers as are elected by the people, shall commence on the first week day after January first next follow- ing said general Biennial Election, Rochester City Charter, Section 12.
SECTION 11:	Filing	(a) Deadline shall be 5:00 P.M. thirty (30) days prior to the primary.
		(b) If a candidate has not filed by the deadline, Ward Chairman and Committee will name a candi- date, and the deadline will be ex- tended 10 days.
		(c) Deadline for filing as an inde- pendent candidate shall be 5:00 PM the third Tuesday in September.

THAT a sum not to exceed \$4,100.00 be and it hereby is appropriated for the payment of a new 1975 Police Cruiser, said sum to be raised by the Finance Committee at terms deemed in the best interest of the City of Rochester.

#### **RESOLUTION FOR FINANCING FACILITIES PLAN ENGINEERING STUDY**

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROCHESTER:

THAT for the purpose of financing a Facilities Plan engineering study for wastewater treatment in the City of Rochester there be and hereby is appropriated the sum of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000.00).

That to meet said appropriation there be and hereby is authorized under and pursuant to the Municipal Finance Act and any other authority thereto enabling, the City of Rochester aggregating not to exceed thirty-thousand dollars (\$30,000.) in principal amount, to be raised by the Finance Committee at terms deemed in the best interest of the City of Rochester.

#### **RESOLUTION RELATING TO FACILITIES PLANNING FOR WATER**

#### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROCHESTER:

WHEREAS, City of Rochester, New Hampshire, Legal Name of Applicant, herein called the "Applicant", after thorough consideration of the various aspects of the problem and study of available data, has hereby determined that the construction of certain works, required for the treatment of sewerage, generally described as Facilities Planning for Water which is the Description of the project to be used in Section 1 of application and Pollution Control Facilities, herein called the "Project", is desirable and in the public interest, and to that end it is necessary that action preliminary to the construction of said Project be taken immediately; and

WHEREAS, under Section 466e, Title 33, of the <u>United States Code</u>, the United States of America has authorized the making of grants to aid in financing the cost of construction of necessary treatment works to prevent other discharge of untreated or inadequately treated sewage or other waste into any waters and for the purpose of reports, plans and specifications in connection therewith; and

WHEREAS, the Applicant has examined and duly considered said section of the <u>United States Code</u>, and related sections, and the Applicant deems it to be in the public interest and to the public benefit to file an application under said section of the United States Code and to authorize other action in connection therewith;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY The Rochester City Council the governing body of said Applicant, as follows:

1. That the construction of said Project is essential to and is in the best interests of the Applicant, and to the end that said project may be constructed as promptly as practicable it is desirable that action preliminary to the construction thereof be under taken immediately; 2. That John Shaw be hereby authorized to file in behalf of the Applicant an application (in the form required by the United States in conformity with 33 U.S.C. 466e) for a grant to be made by the United States to the applicant to aid in defraying the cost of construction of the sewerage treatment works described above;

3. That if such grant be made, the Applicant agrees to pay all the remaining costs of the approved Project, over and above the amount of the grant;

4. That if such grant be made, the Applicant agrees to make provision satisfactory to the Commissioner of the Federal Water Pollution Control Administration for assuring proper and efficient operation and maintenance of the treatment works after completion of the construction thereof;

5. That the said John Shaw is hereby authorized to furnish such information and to take such other action as may be necessary to enable the Applicant to qualify for the grant;

6. That the said John Shaw is hereby designated as the authorized representative of the Applicant for the purpose of furnishing to the United States such information, data, and documents pertaining to the application for a grant as may be required; and otherwise to act as the authorized representative of the Applicant in connection with this application;

7. That certified copies of this resolution be included as part of the application to be submitted to the United States, for a grant.

#### "POLICE OFFENSES" AMENDMENT AMENDED

That Chapter XV of the 1952 City of Rochester Ordinances, as amended, entitled "Police Offenses" be further amended by striking out Section 10 thereto and substituting the following new sections thereof. Pursuant to the authority vested in the Mayor and Council of the City of Rochester by RSA47:17 (XV)

Section 10. Trespassing on School Property

No person shall enter upon, park, travel, or otherwise trespass on any City property either occupied by or otherwise used for any school purposes at any time when such properties are not being utilized for any school purposes without first having received the written permission of proper school authorities of the City of Rochester.

Section 11. Other Trespasses

No person shall enter upon, park, travel or otherwise trespass on any other City property at any time when such property is not being utilized for public purposes.

No City property shall be utilized for any public purposes by any person without first having received the written permission of the Licensing Board of the City of Rochester.

#### Section 12. Littering

No person shall dump, deposit, throw or leave, or cause or permit to be dumped, deposited, placed, thrown or leaving of any litter on any public property in this City.

The word "litter" shall mean all rubbish, refuse, garbage, trash, debris, dead animals or any other discarded materials of any kind or description.

The term "public property" shall include but not be restricted to any school properties, Hanson Pines, any park, street, common or other property owned by the City of Rochester.

#### Section 13. Loitering

No person shall appear in any public place or on any public property owned by the City of Rochester at any time when the safety of persons or property in the area may cause alarm.

All persons shall immediately leave any public property of the City of Rochester when requested to do so by any police officer, fireman, school official or Mayor.

#### Section 14. Vandalism

No person shall purposely or recklessly damage any property of the City of Rochester, including but not restricted to all real estate owned by the City of Rochester and all personal properties of the City of Rochester.

No person shall interrupt or impair any public communication, public transportation, water supply or other public service.

#### Section 15. Penalties

Any person who shall violate any of the terms or provisions of this Chapter XV shall be fined not more than One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars for each offense.

#### EFFECTIVE UPON PASSAGE - JULY 1, 1975

#### RESOLUTION TO APPROPRIATE MONEY FOR GAS CONTRACT FOR NEW HIGH SCHOOL

### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROCHESTER:

THAT a sum not to exceed Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) be and it hereby is appropriated for advance deposit for natural gas service to the New Rochester High School, said sum to be raised by the Finance Committee at terms deemed in the best interest of the City of Rochester and in accordance with the New Hampshire Municipal Finance Act.

#### AMENDMENT TO ORDINANCE RELATING TO ELECTION OF BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE PUBLIC LIBRARY

BE IT ORDAINED by the Honorable Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester that by Chapter XXIII entitled "Free Public Library" of the "General Ordinances of the City of Rochester," as revised and amended on May 6, 1952, but further amended by deleting Section 1 thereof and substituting the following therefor: SECTION 1. The Board of Trustees of the Public Library shall consist of the Mayor and six members to be nominated by the Mayor and elected by the City Council, two members to be elected at large for a term of three years and their election so arranged that one-third of the members of the Board shall be elected each year.

#### **Re: FUNDS TO BE RECEIVED FROM REVENUE SHARING ACT**

#### May 6, 1975

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

The funds to be received from the Revenue Sharing Act of the Federal Government, allocated to the City of Rochester, in the sum of \$239,251.50 (Two Hundred Thirty Nine Thousand, Two Hundred Fifty One Dollars and Fifty Cents), and also any other funds received for this yearly period shall be allotted and expended under the same rules and regulations; said sums to be placed on the Estimated Revenues portion of the 1975 budget, to be used in compliance with the requirements of the Revenue Sharing Act in the same manner as the year 1974.

The 1975 allocation of Revenue Sharing was adopted on passage of the 1975 Municipal Budget on May 6, 1975.

Further, all of these funds shall be used to conform to the requirements of the Revenue Sharing Act and will not be used by any of the excluded categories of any of the municipal departments.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROCHESTER:

THAT a sum not to exceed \$16,000.00 (Sixteen Thousand Dollars) be and is hereby appropriated for the purchase of house and land on Wakefield Street abutting the Railroad property of the Farmington Line.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That said sum of money shall be raised by the issuance of Notes under the Municipal Finance Act of the State of New Hampshire by the Finance Committee at terms deemed by it to be in the best interest of the City of Rochester.

#### RESOLUTION FOR INCREASE IN PAYMENT OF SALARIES TO FULL-TIME CITY EMPLOYEES

WHEREAS, so many full-time City employees have sacrificed their own personal needs in favor of the taxpayers of the City of Rochester; and

WHEREAS, said employees by their said actions did signify their wishes to wait for a raise in pay; and

WHEREAS, said employees should receive recognition for their patience and diligence;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Honorable Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester as follows:

1. That those full-time employees of the City of Rochester, who have exercised diligence and patience be rewarded by a grant of merit wages to said employees of the City of Rochester; and

2. That said raises be effective with the payroll dated December 1, 1975; and

3. That such raises be retroactive to July 1, 1975, based upon the actual working weeks worked by said full-time City employees; and

4. That the merit raise be in the amount of \$6.00 per week based upon a forty hour work week to be pro-rated as may be necessary.

5. That the call men of the Fire Department receive \$50.00 increase per year beginning July 1, 1975 for one half of years increase.

6. That the Mayor and Finance Committee be empowered to settle and adjust all questions as to eligibility and fitness for the above raises.

#### **RESOLUTION TO BORROW MONEY FOR PAYMENT OF MERIT RAISES**

FURTHER RESOLVED, That said sum of money shall be raised by the issuance of Notes under the Municipal Finance Act of the State of New Hampshire by the Finance Committee at terms deemed by it to be in the best interest of the City of Rochester.

#### RESOLUTION TO BORROW MONEY FOR THE PURCHASE OF A TRUCK FOR PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT:

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROCHESTER: THAT a sum not to exceed \$1,000.00 (One Thousand Dollars) be and is hereby appropriated for the purchase of a truck for the Public Works Department.

Further Resolved, that said sum of money shall be raised by the issuance of Notes under the Municipal Finance Act of the State of New Hampshire by the Finance Committee at terms deemed by it to be in the best interest of the City of Rochester.

#### **RESOLUTION TO BORROW MONEY IN ANTICIPATION OF TAXES**

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROCHESTER:

That the Finance Committee be and it hereby is authorized to borrow in anticipation of taxes, for the calendar year 1976, a sum not exceeding Two Million Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000.00), said sum to be borrowed on notes of the City, which may be refunded, in such amounts and at such times as it deems the best interest of the City requires.

#### RESOLUTION TO BORROW MONEY FOR PAYMENT OF WATER PUMP FOR THE WATER DEPARTMENT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROCHESTER:

THAT a sum not to exceed \$90,000.00 (Ninety Thousand Dollars) be and is hereby appropriated for the payment of the Pressure Water Pump for the City of Rochester Water Department.

FURTHER RESOLVED, that said sum of money shall be raised by the issuance of Notes under the Municipal Finance Act of the State of New Hampshire by the Finance Committee at terms deemed by it to be in the best interest of the City of Rochester.

#### **RESOLUTION TO BORROW MONEY FOR SCHOOL REPAIRS & EQUIPMEN1**

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROCHESTER:

THAT a sum not to exceed \$39,500.00 (Thirty-Nine Thousand Five Hundred Dollars) be and is hereby appropriated for the repair of school property and purchase of additional equipment;

FURTHER RESOLVED, that said sum of money shall be raised by the issuance of Notes under the Municipal Finance Act of the State of New Hampshire by the Finance Committee at terms deemed by it to be in the best interest of the City of Rochester.

#### **RESOLUTION RE: JOHN SHAW PARK**

WHEREAS, John Shaw has faithfully served his Nation, State and City for more than a half century; and

WHEREAS, his continuing leadership has been an inspiration to all people from all walks of life; and

WHEREAS, his frugality has set an example for all to follow;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Honorable Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester as follows:

1. That the new park surrounding City Hall on the West, the new Police Station and District Court Buildings on the South and the new Fire Station on the East be designated as John Shaw Park in appreciation for his services to all mankind; and

#### **ROCHESTER FIRE DEPARTMENT**

### TO THE HONORABLE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROCHESTER, NEW HAMPSHIRE

#### Gentlemen:

I herewith submit my annual report for the year ending December 31, 1975. There were a total of 877 alarms in the City of Rochester in 1975, which consisted of the following: 278 box alarms and 599 still alarms. These include 37 car or truck fires, 45 engineer's calls (6-6), 56 brush fires, 58 false alarms, (56 in Rochester, 1 in East Rochester, 1 in Gonic). There were 34 chimney fires, 26 grass fires, 18 oil burner fires and 67 building fires. 218 miscellaneous calls, 62 smoke scares or honest mistakes, 117 first aid, accident or emergency calls and 45 second alarms or calls for more assistance. We had 40 permanent men's calls, 54 bomb scares. There were no school cancellation alarms this year.

There were 39 alarms in East Rochester and 58 alarms in Gonic in 1975. 15 alarms were transmitted for out-of-town assistance from Rochester to other communities. These alarms are all included in the total alarms above.

We answered a total of 750 ambulance calls in 1975. These consisted of 128 accident calls, 476 home emergency calls, 19 transfer or convalescent cases, 86 calls to which the ambulance responded, but was not needed. 33 miscellaneous calls and 8 false calls were answered. 54 of the above calls were for out-of-town calls.

The total number of ambulance calls and alarms answered by the Rochester Fire Department in 1975 was 1,627. There were 877 fire alarms and 750 ambulance calls. This is a total of 130 more calls than in 1974, in which there was a total of 1,497.

#### REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

To the Honorable Mayor and Members of the City Council:

I submit herewith my report of the activities of the Department of Public Works for the year ending December 31, 1975.

Snow removal, sanding and salting required most of our attention; for the first three months of the year. However, we did considerable patching to streets and roads; when the weather permitted; and started our regular patching program around the first of April.

Toward the end of the year we purchased one new 1975 Ford truck to aid in snow removal, plowing, salting and sanding our streets and roads in the city. Also purchased was a new 1975 Ford pick-up truck.

Around the end of March we were able to start our street sweeping program and continued this until the first of December, when cold weather set in.

Bridges and culverts were repaired, due to the weather, on the England Road, Lowell Street, Winter Street, Main Street Gonic, Salmon Falls Road, Franklin Street, Little Falls Bridge Road, and Whitehall Road.

In the spring and fall of the year our surface drains were cleaned, using our hydraulic Catch Basin Cleaning Machine. The drains which did not take water were cleaned with the aid of rods.

We hot-topped some streets and roads in the City during the summer months such as Hope Drive, Forest Park Drive, Thomas Street, Howe Street, part of Birch Street, Claire Street Caldersack, part of Brock Street, Evergreen Lane, Hickory Lane, Yvonne Street, Vinewood Lane, Susan Lane, Tingley Street, Hobart Street, the Old Milton Road.

Gravel was hauled to repair washed out roads and to improve our unsurfaced roads. Roads to which gravel was hauled were the Sheepboro Road, Sampson Road, Old Milton Road, Estes Road, Hussey Road, Chesley Hill Road, and Lowell Street.

Oil was applied to control dust on streets and roads in the City; such as England Road, Gilbert Hill Road, Lowell Street Ext., Oak Street in Gonic, Dump Road, Sheepboro Road and part of Forest Park Drive.

Sidewalks were repaired on many streets in the City which included Union Street, North Main Street, South Main Street, Wakefield Street, Charles Street, Pine Street, Maple Street, Bridge Street, Chestnut Street, Hanson Street, and Washington Street.

Water main extentions have been completed on the Old Gonic Road, Birchwood Grove, Forest Avenue, Street to the New High School, Salmon Falls Road; using 2,768 feet of 6" amd 1,719 feet of 8" cement lined cast iron pipe.

Six new hydrants were installed, making 517 in the City Water system.

Fifty-nine new water services were installed and five water services were relaid.

Twenty-five new sewer connections were installed, bringing the total to 3,578 services in the system.

Water samples were sent to the State Laboratory regularly for testing, and they reported the continued high quality of our water.

I take this opportunity to extend my thanks to the Honorable Mayor John Shaw and gentlemen of the City Council for the help you have given, for the patience with which you have examined our problems and your assistance in solving them. Also, I wish to express my appreciation to the employees of the Department for their loyalty and willingness in assisting us in meeting our problems. Together, we are advancing the objective of making our City a better place for ourselves, our children and for generations to come.

#### REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

#### TO THE SCHOOL BOARD AND CITIZENS OF ROCHESTER:

The City of Rochester has one of the lowest per pupil costs in the state. In looking at national studies, it is generally assumed that there is a direct relationship to the quality of education and per pupil costs. However, in Rochester's instance the quality of education is not low. It is, in fact, better than a number of school districts in the state. Although I would not classify it at this time as outstanding, the kind of education your children are receiving will allow them to be competitive.

There are a variety of reasons for this that I will discuss in greater detail, but to list a few would include our Wednesday afternoons for curriculum development and teacher workshops, the overall organization and operation of the educational system, the quality of the staff at every level, and the fact that the teachers sincerely desire to provide their best to educate the youth. To discuss curriculum first, I would like to say that we are continuing to improve and revise various education programs and try to improve and upgrade those already in existence. Our Math, Reading, Social Studies, Spelling and Language Arts programs are examples of this. We in Rochester continue to stress the need for Reading as the most primary part of the whole educational process. Through our Right to Read grant, Reading is now stressed at the junior and senior high school level as well as the elementary level.

One might question what measurements are used to determine the quality of our curriculum. One measure would be to judge how well our students are doing who are attending college. They are doing at least as well as students from other parts of the state and country.We also have our merit scholar winners and finalists. Another measure is what scores our students are achieving on scholastic aptitude tests. Where much has been written nationally about these scores, our students are not doing as poorly as the rest of the country. I believe this is a reflection on our stress of the basic fundamentals. Another measure is the achievement test scores. Each year we administer a nationally standardized achievement test. While these test scores among the nation as a whole have declined, our elementary students have improved a significant degree. Still another measure is that for a number of years now the New Hampshire Council for Better Schools has singled out an aspect of our educational program for state recognition. All these things would not come about if we didn't have good educational programs and a staff sincerely interested in providing quality education.

One of the milestones achieved this year has been the opening of our new high school. As Mayor Shaw recently said, this building was provided by taxpayers' money and you are to be congratulated on your willingness to provide these facilities for your students. The school opened successfully this year without any serious problems and the students' attitude toward receiving education has noticeably changed in that not only do they appear to be academically more serious, but their personal attitudes reflect a change. Before I leave this particular item, I would like to stress to the public that the quality of this educational institution is significant. This was achieved through the cooperative working of many different groups such as the Mayor and city officials, the school board, the building committee, the administration and teaching staff. You the people of Rochester should feel fortunate that so many people gave so much time to make this a reality.

During the recent recession, our six to eight percent growth rate stopped; in fact, last year's attendance dropped slightly. However, attendance is now on the increase again and I would expect that in the future we will see a return to growth in this city as anticipated in the professional studies made earlier. There are a variety of miscellaneous items that occupied much time and attention during the year. Some of these were the school prayer issue, the problem of bomb scares, new laws passed by the federal government requiring additional information, expansion of our lunch program to include the junior and senior high schools, planning for the move and others. All these were handled successfully and although not all were successful, the energy provided by a variety of people enabled them to be treated with proper attention and dispatch. It should be noted that our elementary law program that is teaching our elementary students responsibilities and privileges and respect for the law, is now fully operational. This is the first in the state and many other systems are requesting materials and assistance to start a similar program.

Staff Development, instituted in July 1975, has functioned very well. This is where the local school system is now responsible for the staff's professional development and recertification. Out of our total staff of 232 teachers, there are only four that are on a provisional certificate. All teachers have been active in pursuing their own goals for recertification. These also tie in with the system's curriculum development and objectives.

Although I have attempted to provide leadership throughout this past year, credit for our system must go to a number of different groups of people. Any organization is only as good as those working in it. I am pleased and proud to be part of this school organization and look forward to another successful year.

### REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN OF THE ROCHESTER PUBLIC LIBRARY March 1976

#### TO THE HONORABLE MAYOR, CITY COUNCIL AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE ROCHESTER PUBLIC LIBRARY:

It is a pleasure to report to the Rochester Community at the completion of 1975, four months of which I have had the privilege of serving as your librarian, following the move of former librarian, Sheldon Kaye, to Marshfield, Wisconsin, where he accepted a position as library director.

### December 31, 1975

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester:

Gentlemen:

I submit herewith my report as City Solicitor for the year 1975.

The case of Bradbury v. Mayor's Industrial Committee, et al, involving the New Hampshire Right to Know Law was tried before the Strafford County Superior Court. The decision affirmed the right of the Mayor's Industrial Committee to hold private meetings without being subject to the Right to Know Law while also providing that this Committee was under the Right to Know Law. It is expected that this decision will be appealed to the New Hampshire Supreme Court.

The case of Barcomb v. Herman is still pending before the New Hampshire Supreme Court having been argued and decision still pending.

The same is true with regard to the suit of Green, Hussey et al v. Shaw.

The case of Fisher and Fazekas v. City has been settled.

Under Mayor Shaw's leadership, the past year has been indeed a pleasant experience for the undersigned as City Solicitor and a year of marked progress for the City of Rochester.
