We have found many things that we could cut and not miss. Other actions included rescinding pay raises from some very dedicated people. Although we saved money for the tax payers, ethics are in question.

In difficult times, people show their best and their worst. We want to focus upon the best. This year, Brenda Bryer offered her professional assistants to the Town when we desperately needed help. On a volunteer basis, she solved our computer problems and streamlined the process of sending tax bills.

The Selectmen hereby name Brenda Bryer as our Citizen of the Year for her extensive volunteerism.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Stoddard in the said County of Cheshire in the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Stoddard on Tuesday, the Ninth (9th) day of March, next at One (1:00 PM) of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- 2. To see if you are in favor of adopting the Proposed amendment and additions to the Community Planning (Zoning) Ordinance as Proposed by the Stoddard Planning Board. (No discussion on the Article).

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Stoddard on Tuesday the Sixteenth (16th) day of March, next at Seven (7:00 PM) of the clock in the evening, to act upon the following articles 3 through 34:

- ${f 3}$. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of taxes if necessary.
- **4**. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,580 for the purchase and installation of a baler and glass crusher to be used for recycling purposes at the towns Transfer Station.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$41,000 for the operational expenses of the Stoddard Recycling and Transfer Station.
- **6**. To See if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$627 as its share for the support of the Monadnock Family and Mental Health Services.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,800 as its share for the support of the Home Health Care and Community Services.
- **8.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,200 for the operation and maintenance of the Davis Library.
- **9**. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$120,500 to defray Town charges for the ensuing year.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500 as operating budget for the Stoddard Planning Board for the ensuing year.

- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$615 for membership to the Southwest Region Planning Commission for the coming year.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,090 for the operating budget of the Stoddard Zoning Board of Adjustment.
- ${\bf 13}$. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200 for the operation of the Stoddard Conservation Commission.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,015 for the Lay Monitoring Program.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for and accept gifts and /or State or Federal Aid in the name of the Town of Stoddard for the operation and legitimate expenditures of any appropriate Stoddard agency.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell by auction or by advertised sealed bid, properties acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds in accordance with RSA 80:42.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 to add to a Capital Reserve fund created in 1992 for the purchase of land and or buildings for future Town use.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote by ballot to dissolve the Ashuelot Valley Refuse Disposal District organized under RSA Chapter 53-B (the "District"), pursuant to the provisions of Article VI, Section 7 of the district agreement for the District and the provisions of the plan of dissolution approved by the district committee of the District, a copy of which plan of dissolution has been submitted by the District of the Town. A 2/3rds majority vote is required to approve this article.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$14,450 for the operating budget of the Stoddard Fire & Rescue Department for the ensuing year.
- **20**. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000 for ambulance service for the ensuing year.
- 21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$65,000 for the purchase of a 4-wheel drive rescue vehicle and to authorize the withdrawal of \$20,000 and all additional interest earned from the capital reserve fund created in 1992 for that purpose. The balance of \$45,000 to be raised from general taxation.
- **22**. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$20,000 to be placed in the capital reserve fund established in 1992 for the purchase of a 4-wheel drive rescue vehicle.

- **23**. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$3,000 for the purchase of two sets of breathing apparatus for the Stoddard Fire and Rescue Department.
- **24**. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,250 for the operating budget of the Stoddard Fire Warden, to include the purchase of equipment, meeting and training.
- 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$13,029 for the operating budget of the Stoddard Police Department.
- **26**. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$84,000 for winter and summer maintenance, emergencies & repair of Town roads and bridges.
- 27. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell by auction or advertised sealed bid, the old army surplus tanker, the funds to be placed in the general fund.
- **28**. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,200 for the purchase & installation of a new oil furnace for the Town Hall.
- **29**. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,400 for the purchase & installation of twelve (12) storm windows for the Town Hall.
- **30**. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4300 for the purchase & installation of new front entrance doors for the Town Hall.
- **31.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,500 for building maintenance & repairs to the New Fire Station.
- **32**. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500 to restore & microfilm three (3) volumes of old town records.
- **33**. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,300 for the purchase & installation of a new high speed printer, transportable disk back-up system, and software for Town Hall computer.

AUDITORS REPORT

We have audited the financial statements of the Town of Stoddard, New Hampshire for the year ended December 31, 1991, and have issued our report thereon dated February 20, 1992.

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements of the Town of Stoddard, New Hampshire for the year ended December 31, 1991, we considered its internal control structure in order to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements and not to provide assurance on the internal control structure.

The management of the Town of Stoddard, New Hampshire is responsible for establishing and maintaining an internal control structure. In fulfilling this responsibility, estimates and judgments by management are required to assess the expected benefits and related costs of internal control structure policies and procedures. The objectives of an internal control structure are to provide management with reasonable, but not absolute, assurance that assets are safequarded against loss from unauthorized use or disposition, and that transactions are executed in accordance with management's authorization and recorded properly to permit the preparation of financial statements in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. Because of inherent limitations in any internal control structure, errors or irregularities may nevertheless occur and not be detected. Also, projection of any evaluation of the structure to future periods is subject to the risk that procedures may become inadequate because of changes in conditions or that the effectiveness of the design and operation of policies and procedures may deteriorate.

For the purpose of this report, we have classified the significant internal control structure policies and procedures in the following categories:

Budget
Cash and investments
Revenue and receivables
Expenditures of goods and serving and accounts payable
Payroll and related liabilities

For all of the control categories listed above, we obtained an understanding of the design of relevant policies and procedures and whether they have been placed in operation, and we assessed control risk.

A material weakness is a condition in which the design or operation of one or more of the specific internal control structure elements does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that errors or irregularities in amounts that would be material to the financial statements may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions.

Our consideration of the internal control structure would not necessarily disclose all conditions that are considered to be material weaknesses as defined above. However, our study and evaluation disclosed no condition that we believe constitutes a material weakness.

This report is intended for the information of management, and the Board of Selectmen. This restriction is not intended to limit the distribution of this report, which is a matter of public record.

REPORT OF THE STODDARD FIRE & RESCUE DEPARTMENT 1992

The activities of the Department increased by 20% during the year 1992. There was a total of 149 actions taken by the Fire & Rescue Department with the following breakdown:

- * 26 fire calls
- * 19 medical assists
- * 14 motor vehicle accidents
- * 22 drills
- * 18 meetings
- * 50 radio checks

We were fortunate this year to have the availability of a building with which we conducted 3 realistic training sessions. The use of an actively burning building greatly enhanced our training efforts.

Due to the increase in the number of medical and vehicle rescue calls, we believe that now is the time to purchase a more reliable and useful rescue truck. We need to be able to respond to emergencies safely and quickly with a 4 wheel drive vehicle that can contain our growing inventory of necessary rescue and aid equipment.

During 1992, we were happy to see an increase in the number of rescue personnel. With more qualified Department members, we can offer both better service as well as distribute the work more evenly.

In compliance with state law, all rescue personnel have received the necessary hepatitis vaccinations.

1992 brought a renewed interest in the muster team. The successful results of this group are shown in its enthusiasm and spirit. We hope that the team continues to provide good training and fun for its members.

We appreciate the support of the townspeople over the past year. It is our goal to provide increasingly better service through comprehensive training according to state standards and fast, effective response to fire and rescue calls.

Anyone interested in joining the Stoddard Fire & Rescue Department is welcome to stop by the station on Sunday mornings. We also offer car wash service, on Sundays, from 10:00 - 11:00 am.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

1992 was below average for wildfires reported in our state. Our largest fire was in May in Rumney where a suspicious origin fire burned approximately 150 acres with a total cost of approximately \$30,000. The N.H. Division of Forests and Lands assisted many other communities in wildland fire suppression as well.

Our fire lookout towers reported 289 fires, burning a total of 136 acres. Our major causes of fires were fires kindled without a permit, unknown causes and children.

Please help your town and state forest fire officials with fire prevention. New Hampshire State Law (RSA 224:27) requires that, "No person, firm or corporation shall kindle or cause to be kindled any fire or burn or cause to be burned any material in the open, except when the ground is covered with snow, without first obtaining a written fire permit from the Forest Fire Warden of the town where the burning is to be done." Violation of this statute is a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of up to \$1,000 and/or a year in jail and you are liable for all fire suppression costs.

Local fire departments are responsible for suppressing fires. The small average fire size of .47 acre/fire is a tribute to early detection by the public or our fire tower system and the quick response of our trained local fire departments. Please help your Warden and fire department by requesting and obtaining a fire permit before kindling an open fire.

The N.H. Division of Forests and Lands assisted 28 towns with a total of \$20,000 in 50/50 cost share grants for fire fighter safety items and wildland suppression equipment in 1992.

I would like to express my appreciation to Donald Fleming for his dedication and fine job he has done for the past year. Also, to Joan Zelasny for her support, donations, and clerical work.

We have tried to give the best service possible with a high degree of professionalism. I have tried to be honest, impartial, and fair: and to keep your affairs confidential, and to serve the people of Stoddard to the best of my ability.

STODDARD CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT

The Stoddard Conservation Commission (CC) continues to investigate Dredge & Fill applications, when we receive them. All applications received this year were on Granite Lake. However, I have learned that beach replenishment and other activities of the sort requiring a permit have been noticed by people on other lakes. It would seem we need to be about some education of lakefront owners of the need to apply for and receive a N.H. Wetlands Board permit before such activity. This process starts with the Town Clerk.

The CC has been asked to take over the Lake Testing Program. We have not discussed this, but I believe it should be doable! This is a highly technical program under the guidance of the State Biology Bureau of DES.

I attended a workshop on "Comparative Evaluation of Non-Tidal Wetlands in N.H." This is a technical step-by-step process for rating up to 14 functions of a wetland, and is one way to really become acquainted with one's town's wetlands and what they do for us – everything from wildlife habitat to flood water and sediment trapping to recreation and education. The CC has a copy of the manual.

The keynote address at the annual meeting of NHACC was given by an arc Patricia Sherman. To take a leaf from 1992 National Teacher of the Year, West

Virginia elementary teacher Rae Ellen McKee, the question posed could be stated, "How do you want your town to be when it grows up?" and how to write regs. to accomplish this. The speaker suggested that it should be from the roots up not from the top down as too often has been the case. Different people and interests need to talk together and see, and see of each other, how their concerns may fit together into the larger picture.

The other speaker was Jeff Taylor of OSP. He spoke of how efforts at "Guiding Growth" going back to the 1970's had often not worked as intended, as zoning ordinance acreage and frontage minimums led too often to rural sprawl and loss of rural character to grid and strip development. So often too many people involved are largely unaware of a town's natural resources and the functions they fill. There is a need for technical information, and community education on all sides. This is where CC's should play a role.

We expect soon to welcome Jo-Ann Carr to our membership.

REPORT OF THE VOLUNTEER LAKE ASSESSMENT PROGRAM

My sincere thanks goes to all of the volunteers who helped with this program. Again, I also extend my gratitude to the selectmen for their continued support.

This year I obtained copies of reports on trophic classifications, made by the N.H. Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission, back in the 70's and early 80's.

Please refer to "Test Descriptions" for the definitions of the following biological and chemical factors.

My concern about the conductivity data is twofold. Number one, is that there has been a steady increase in the conductivity levels in both Granite Lake and Island Pond; and a very significant increase in Robb Reservoir. Number two, is that the state has set standards for each factor, for each lake type. The conductivity level in Granite Lake (Oligotrophic) is far greater than in both Robb Reservoir and Island Pond (Mesotrophic); and barely falls within the standards for its classification. The transparency of Robb Reservoir has decreased by one meter in the last ten years, and by almost one meter in both Island and Center Ponds. (1 meter = 3 feet, 4 inches). The Chlorophyll-a level has doubled in Robb Reservoir and increased significantly in Island Pond.

In last years town report I outlined some do's and don'ts to protect our lakes. This year I would like to address sand dumping and the use of pressure treated timber in the construction of docks and decks.

Lakes have extremely fragile ecosystems; and the filling in with sand, may result in serious water quality degradations. The following conditions have been documented, and associated with the practice of sand dumping, by the N.H. Department of Environmental services.

- 1. Accelerates the lake sedimentation rate. The sand erodes into the waterbody and collects at the lake bottom.
- 2 .Decreases clarity as it gets churned by activity.
- 3. Particulate matter clogs fish gills, makes breathing impossible and results in fish kills.
- 4. The chemical make-up of sand is variable. The dumping of sand influences the natural chemistry of the waterbody.
- 5. The drift of fill material may ruin fish spawning grounds or resting areas.
- 6. Fill material may create toxic problems to even the lowest food web representatives.

I would like to remind all lakeshore residents that a state permit is required from the N.H. Wetlands Board and a special exception is required from Stoddard's Zoning Board of Adjustment before "any dredging, filling or construction of any permanent structure, such as docks, (or decks) in or on the borders of all surface waters," may take place.

Though the use of pressure treated timber is not outlawed, the N.H. Department of Environmental Services, strongly advises against using it in any waters of the state. Though there is no evidence that sufficient amounts of pesticides leach from docks, to cause aquatic toxicity, the potential nevertheless exists. Some alternatives include, the use of wolmanized wood, or stainless steel. If neither of those are acceptable, please contact the N.H. Department of Environmental Services for other alternatives.

If you have any questions concerning these or any other issues concerning water quality, or would like to be a part of the lay monitoring program, please contact the Stoddard Conservation Commission.

TEST DESCRIPTIONS:

pH A measurement of acidity. A pH of 7 is neutral. Lower pH values ndicate acidic conditions. High pH values indicate basic (salt) conditions. Little or no fish life remains when pH falls

much below 5. NH average is 6.6.

Transparency A measure of water clarity, affected by the amount of

phytoplankton, color (dissolved organic compounds), and particlate matter in the lake. Measured by lowering a Secchi disk into the water and observing depth for disappearance. Standard: >13.1 ft. is Oligotrophic, 6.6 to 13.1 ft. is Mesotrophic, and <6.6 ft. is Eutrophic. NH average is 12.8.

Chlorophyl a A green pigment in plants required for photosynthesis. A good

indicator of abundance of microscopic plants and algea. Units are mg. per cubic meter. Standard: <4 is Oligotrophic, 4 to 10 is Mesotrophic, and >10 is Eutrophic. NH average is 6.6.

Total Phosphorus Limiting nutrient that promotes plant and algea growth

in lakes. Increased TP encourages excessive weed growth and algea blooms. Comes from decaying matter, soils, leachfields,

land clearing, and agriculture runoff. Units are ug/L. Standard: <10 is Oligotrophic, and >20 is Eutrophic. NH

average is 10.

Color A measure of dissolved metals (iron and manganese), dissolved

organic compounds, and suspended matter in water. Standard: 0 to 20 is crystal clear, 20 to 35 is slightly tea-colored, and 35 to 100 is tea colored to highly colored. NH average is 25.

Conductivity Ability of water to carry an electrical current. High

conductivity may indicate pollution from road salting, faulty septic systems or agriculture runoff. Units are umhos/cm. Standard: 0 to 50 is Oligotrophic, 50 to 100 is Mesotrophic,

and >100 is Eutrophic. NH average is 56.4.

REPORT OF THE STODDARD PLANNING BOARD

The Planning Board met twolve times during 1992. Three minor subdivisions were approved and one subdivision plan was withdrawn after being submitted. This low activity has helped us keep our expenses to a minimum. We are currently rewriting our subdivision regulations to conform with new state laws and a general update. The process is time consuming and public input is always welcome.

The rejection of the Capital Improvements Program at Town Meeting last year was very disheartening to some members of the Board. It sent a message to us, your planners, that you are not interested in planning town expenses more than one year ahead. The town's general apathy towards planning issues will cost us all more in the long run.

It is only through public input that we can guide Stoddard's future to where we want it. I urge the citizens of Stoddard to become more active in Planning activities for our future benefit.

The Robb Reservoir subdivision application was submitted over three years ago. The proposed 81 lot plan has obtained most of the Federal and State approvals needed for our consideration. I feel the application will become active in 1993. Our 1993 budget does not reflect expenses that could be incurred as a result of this large project. If necessary, we will have to deficit spend.

Finally, I would like to thank, Pat Putnam, our secretary, for a job well done this past year. Her efforts are greatly appreciated.

REPORT OF ANIMAL CONTROL OFFICER

The past year has been a very pleasing one for Animal Control in that only 88 calls were handled in entirety. Of these calls, 16 were handled by telephone as they involved lost animals from surrounding towns. The number of calls actually handled in this town indicates a dramatic decrease from the year 1992 when over 130 calls were actually handled by Animal control. This is a direct result of the police assistance received making citizens aware that animal control regulations are going to be enforced. David Valllancourt and Don Fleming have been an invaluable asset during this past year. Their constant assistance, in most instances unrequested, have resulted in a great reduction in the amount of tax dollars expended for Animal Control and their enforcement of existing regulations have actually further reduced the costs from the receipt of penalties. We should all be grateful for both David and Don's efforts on our behalf.

The largest expense for Animal Control in 1992 was as the result probably of the current weak economy. Several stray dogs were "dropped" in Stoddard and as statutes dictate, the Town became liable for costs related in these cases. Also, sadly, two dogs in Town "disappeared" during the year but in both instances could have been avoided had the dogs been confined in some manner. The town ordinance exists for the well-being of animals and should not be regarded as infringement of our "rights".

I am extremely pleased with the cooperative spirit of this community in their observance of these ordinances. Thank you all very much.

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Agency History:

Monadnock Family Services was organized in 1959 following a joint study by the Cheshire County Community Services Council and the League of Women Voters (Keene and Peterborough). Originally named Monadnock Area Family Service, the agency was organized through a merger of the Bureau of Public Service and the Keene Mental Hygiene Association. The service operated in this form through 1966, expanding in a five year period to a staff of two full time social workers with psychiatric and psychological consulting support.

In 1967, following a study during the previous two years, a community mental health clinic service was organized providing direct psychiatric and psychological services. This program added two psychiatric consultants, a clinical psychologist and one social worker to the agency staff.

Now in 1992, Monadnock Family Services has grown from providing only outpatient services in its early years to providing a much broader range of services in response to community needs. MFS operates out of five district offices: Keene, Peterborough, Winchester, Jaffrey and Walpole. We serve the 38 towns of the Monadnock Region. Our services now include the following:

Keene and Walpole District Office

The Keene and Walpole District Offices of Monadnock Family Services provides outpatient services for children and adults living in the towns of Keene, Alstead, Chesterfield, Fitzwilliam, Gilsum, Marlborough, Marlow, Nelson, Roxbury, Stoddard, Sullivan, Surry, Swanzey, Troy, Walpole and Westmoreland. Included among these services are individual, group, family and marital psychotherapy, as well as twenty-four hour crisis intervention. In addition, the Keene District Office provides special services for the Elderly, Vietnam Veterans, Adventure-Based Programs for Youth, Sexual Abuse victims, Sexual Offenders and pregnant teenagers and adolescent parents.

Monadnock Family Services is also continuing the alcohol and drug abuse prevention project in the Fall Mountain School District, Keene Junior High School and Keene High School. This project provides consultation to teachers, administrators, parents and students around ways to address the problems of substance abuse and chemical dependency.

The staff of the Keene and Walpole District Offices are all trained professionals who are committed to meeting the mental health needs of the communities they serve.

Moved by Joe Sarcione, seconded by John Halter. Joe Sarcione speaks for the need of this unit in extinguishing fires with the foam mixture. Discussion follows. On a voice vote the Moderator is in doubt and asks for a standing vote. The article passes on a standing vote.

ART: 25 To see If the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$14,844.00 for the operating budget of the Stoddard Police Department. Constable David Vaillancourt makes the motion to read: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$13,250.00 for the operating budget of the Stoddard Police Department. Seconded by Frances Rumrill. Discussion follows. Moderator Daniel Eaton and former Police Constable, steps down to continue discussion with Gerald Bernier on Eaton's former bills and budget. Art. 25 passes unanimously.

ART: 26 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for the purpose of establishing a Capital Reserve Fund for the future purchase of a Police cruiser. David Vaillancourt moves that Art. 26 be indefinitely postponed. Seconded. Art. 26 passes to indefinitely postpone.

ART: 27 To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance: Chapter 1992-1 ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES

1992-1.1 Definitions.

As used in this Chapter, the meaning of terms ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE AND LIQUOR shall be as defined in RSA 175:1 Definitions, of the laws of the State of New Hampshire.

A. No driver shall transport, carry, possess or have any liquor or alcoholic beverage within the passenger area of any motor vehicle upon any way in this Town or in an area principally used for public parking except in the original container and with the seal unbroken. Securely capped partially filled containers of liquor or alcoholic beverage shall be stored and transported in the trunk of the motor vehicle. If the motor vehicle does not have a trunk, such containers shall be stored or transported in that compartment or area of the vehicle which is least acceptable to the driver.

B. No passenger shall carry, possess or have any liquor or alcoholic beverage within any passenger area of any motor vehicle upon any way in this Town or in an area principally used for public parking except in the original container and with the seal unbroken. Securely capped partially filled containers of liquor or alcoholic beverage may be stored and transported in that compartment or area of the vehicle which is least accessible to the driver. 1992-1-3. Consumption in Public.

The consumption of any alcoholic beverage or liquor upon any public property within the Town of Stoddard or within any Town-owned building shall be unlawful, unless authorized by the Board of Selectmen prior to the consumption.

1992-1-4. Penalties

The penalty for the violation of this chapter shall be a fine of up to One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00)

1992-1-5. Severability

If any provision of this Ordinance or the application thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the invalidity shall not affect the other provisions or applications of this Ordinance which can be given effect without the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this Ordinance are severable. Moved and Seconded.

Discussion follows. A standing vote called for by Frances Rumrill. Art. 27 passes. 30 YES 15 NO

ART: 28 To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Ordinance: Chapter 1992-2 ANIMAL CONTROL

No person shall permit his or her dog to run at large at any time within the Town of Stoddard. A dog is "at large" within the meaning of this Chapter if it is not controlled by a leash or is not at heel beside a competent person or is not in obedience to that person's command or is not within a vehicle or is not on the property of its owner or keeper. This section shall not apply to dogs in use with their owners or keepers during lawful hunting activities.

1992-2.2 Bathing Playground Areas

It shall be unlawful for any animal or reptile to be on land owned and/or used by the Town of Stoddard or any of its departments for bathing or playground purposes. Exceptions may be granted by the Board of Selectmen.

1992-2.3 Nuisances

No dog shall be permitted, whether or not leased or restrained, to be a nuisance, a menace or vicious to persons or property or to other animals. A dog shall be considered a nuisance if it:

- A. Barks continuously for sustained periods of time;
- B. Barks during the night so as to disturb the peace and quiet of a neighborhood or area;
- C. Turns over garbage cans or waste containers or otherwise causes waste or garbage to be scattered on property other than its owner's.
- D. Runs after or chases bicycles, motor vehicles, motorcycles or other vehicles being driven, pulled or pushed on streets, highways or public ways;
- E. Barks, growls, snaps at, bites or chases any person or persons;
- F. Runs in a pack with other dogs;
- G. Runs after, chases or preys on game animals, domestic animals, or fowl;
- H. Digs, scratches or leaves excrement in gardens or around cultivated areas so as to uproot, damage or destroy the growing plants, shrubs or trees on any property other than its owner's;
- I. Is unconfined while in heat (confinement shall mean within an enclosed building not accessible to any other dog).

1992-2.4 Restaurants or Food Stores

No person shall bring any animal into any restaurant or any store that sells food; and no person shall allow any animal to enter or remain in any restaurant or in any store that sells food, except for guide dogs leading blind persons, and the hearing ear dog and the service dog as provided in New Hampshire RSA 167 -D.

1992-2.5 Penalties

The penalty for the violation of this chapter shall be a fine of up to One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00).

1992-2.6 Severability

If any provision of this Ordinance or the application thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the invalidity shall not affect the other provisions or applications of this ordinance which can be given effect without the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this Ordinance are severable.

This Chapter shall in no way supersede the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated or any other laws or ordinances relating to dogs, other animals or reptiles. In the event of conflict, the more stringent restriction shall prevail. Moved by John Halter, seconded by Joe Sarcione.

After much discussion Art. 28 fails unanimously.

ART: 29 To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Ordinance:

Chapter 1992-3 ALARMS

1992-3.1 Installation of Alarm Systems

Every single-family dwelling and multi-family dwelling in the Town of Stoddard which contains an alarm system designed to directly inform the police and/or fire department of any emergencies, must contain a system which is well made and has been properly installed. The owners of any such property shall be responsible for installation and for adequate maintenance of the system.

1992-3.2 Permits

No automatic or other alarm system may be installed in the Town of Stoddard until the owner or his designee obtains a permit for such installation from the Police Chief of the Town of Stoddard. No permit shall be issued for the installation of any alarm system which has not been approved by both the Police Chief and the Fire Chief.

1992-3.3 Penalties

If Police or the Fire Department of the Town of Stoddard, or any employee or agent thereof, responds to a false alarm which is generated by an alarm system for which the owner of the dwelling (or his designee) did not obtain a permit under this Chapter, or by an alarm system for which a permit was issued, but which was not properly installed or maintained, then the owner of the dwelling shall be in violation of this Chapter. For the first violation of the Chapter, the owner shall receive a warning; for the second violation, a fine of \$25.00 shall be imposed; for the third violation, a fine of \$50.00 shall be imposed; and for the fourth and successive violations a fine of \$100.00 shall be imposed.

1992-3.4 Severability

If any provision of this Ordinance or the application thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the invalidity shall not affect the other provisions or applications of this Ordinance which can be given effect without the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this Ordinance are severable.

Moved and seconded. Discussion follows. Art. 29 is defeated.

ART: 30 To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance: 1992–4.1 TRANSFER PERMITS REQUIRED

Every vehicle entering the Stoddard Trash Transfer Station for the purpose of disposing of waste, shall display a permit.

1992-4.2 Permits

Transfer Station permits shall be designed and distributed to Stoddard property owners in the manner set forth by the Stoddard Board of Selectmen. 1992-4.3 Disposal

No person shall dispose of waste at the Trash Transfer Station at any time other than the regular hours for use, as prescribed by the Board of Selectmen. 1992-4.4 Town Property Forbidden

No person shall dispose or cause to be disposed any waste on any property belonging to the Town of Stoddard without the express written permission of the Board of Selectmen.

1992-4.5 Penalties

The penalty for the violation of this Chapter shall be a fine of up to One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00)

Motion to indefinitely postpone Article 30 by Marleen Leotta.

Seconded by Gordon Garnett. Discussion follows.

On a standing vote 10 YES and 21 NO motion to indefinitely postpone fails. Art. 30 is adopted on a voice vote unanimously.

HEAD TEACHER'S REPORT

Last spring the James Faulkner Elementary School had a special program called "Lend an Ear." This program involved visits by at least nine different musicians, who each brought their instruments. The musicians showed how their instrument worked, played students' requests, and even gave students a chance to conduct the musicians as they played a piece of music.

After having studied the many different habitats and life styles of animals, the Primary class made a visit to the Friendly Farm in Dublin. Studies continued with a visitor from the Harris Center in Hancock, as students got to visit and study ponds in the area. Water samples were taken back to the classroom so the living creatures could be discovered, as the group learned more about pond life.

The Intermediate class had a great time studying about Egypt and mummies. One of the highlights was a trip to the Boston Fine Arts Museum, where students got to see actual mummies and a tomb, along with many other Egyptian artifacts. This group also studied space, which covered topics from the solar system to constellations. Trips were made to the Christa McAuliffe Planetarium, where students got to see the planets and constellations in action, and to the Mountshire Science Museum, where students took part in the many hands-on displays and a workshop in which they made sundials.

One of the best programs was a drama production of the novel The Indian in the Cupboard. This is a wonderful book which is part of the intermediate class' reading program. Four of our own students were actually in the production, which did a great job of bringing the book to life!

This fall, 1993 started with three new members. Elana Ben-Kerem is our new French teacher for the fifth grade class. Elana lives in Keene with her husband and son.

Pat Strickland is our new librarian. She has been very busy organizing the library and its books, along with the help of some parent volunteers. Pat has been the Chapter I instructor for the past two years, and will now be doing both jobs.

Another person who has been with us for one year, Ray Lagasse, as our custodian, has also taken on another job. Ray is now the teachers' aide as well. He is also teaching the gym program for grades one through five.

And finally, our last, new addition, Janice Dialessi is the new special ed. teacher. Janice has received her Bachelor of Science in Education from Muskengium College in New Concord, Ohio, majoring in Elementary Education. She received her Masters in Education from Keene State College, majoring in Learning Disabilities and Mental Retardation. Her experience includes two years teaching as a classroom teacher in an ungraded primary class in Emerson, New Jersey, two years teaching first grade in Oxford, Massachusetts, and two years as a resource room teacher in Walpole, NH. Related experiences have been at Cedarcrest, a home for handicapped children, where she worked as a teacher's aide, and at Keene Junior High School, where she worked as an Instructional Associate for two resource rooms.

Since the fall we have been busy studying New Hampshire History. If anyone has knowledge of local history or antique tools and items, please contact me. The students would love to hear and see what you have to share!

The primary class has been busy with dinosaurs. They have even created their own classroom dinosaur, and got to visit some animated dinos at a local show.

Thanks to all of you who do the many different things which help make the school successful! You know what it takes to bring it all together. If you have not seen how the school operates and all of the ongoing projects and activities, please do yourself and the children of your town a favor, stop by and pay us a visit. We would like to hear from you!

School Board Report

The Stoddard School Board meets the third Tuesday of each month at the James Faulkner Elementary School. The public is invited to attend. Anyone wishing to appear before the board should contact a board member to be placed on the agenda.

This past year has brought a number of changes to the school. We worked within the SAU #24 to hire a new Superintendent of Schools, F. Donald Jones, who replaces Dr. Suzanne Bryant Armstrong. Our Business Administrator is James K. Crane, the Special Education Director Joseph Denning, and our Chapter I Coordinator Kathy McKenna. The SAU #24 administration and all of its staff are well organized and all work very well together as a team.

Many changes have been made at the James Faulkner Elementary School: Our head teacher remains the same, Mr. Mark LaFleur, who teaches our intermediate grades which are third, fourth, and fifth.

Our primary grades teacher, Carla Larson, remains the same, teaching grades first and second.

We have a new teachers' aide. Mr. Raymond Lagasse has replaced Abigail Faulkner. Ray is also our custodian, gym teacher, and served the Breakfast Program, which has now been changed to the Lunch Program.

Kindergarten has been changed from afternoon to morning sessions. Children are picked up with all the other children in the morning and parents pick up kindergarten children at 11:30 each day. Mrs. Trish Murphy still remains our kindergarten teacher.

Our speech therapist, Jeanne Daniels, teaches part-time. Music is taught weekly by Karen Desrosiers. We have replaced our special education teacher, Nancy Siekierski with Janice Dialessi, who is part-time. The art teacher, Eve Kenyon, comes sixteen times per year. Chapter I teacher is Patricia Strickland and our school nurse is Linda Roukey, part-time as needed.

The Spanish class has switched to French; and we have a new teacher. Her name is Mrs. Elana Ben-Kerem and is working out very well.

As far as replacing major equipment, we had to replace our heat Circulator because of a power surge costing \$1692, which insurance didn't cover. Power surge equipment was not installed with the new building. There is now one in place.

After a lot of hard work and many meetings, Hopkinton has withdrawn from our SAU #24. This year has had far less meetings for the board to attend in Henniker. There has been some talk from SAU #29 in Keene, to have Stoddard join their SAU. The Stoddard School Board will have to discuss this in future meetings to see if this would be a good move for the Town of Stoddard.

1992 School Warrant

The 1992 School Warrant Meeting opened at the Stoddard Town Hall on March 5,1992 at 7:15 p.m. by Moderator Dan Eaton. Present from the SAU #24 Superintendent's Office were: Asst. Supt. John Sokul, Business Administrator James Crane, Special Services Coordinator Joseph Denning, and Asst. Superintendent F. Donald Jones. Present from the Stoddard School Board were: Chairman Joanne Monty, Mary Lou Eaton, and Helen Bouchard. The Moderator welcomed the townspeople to the meeting and introduced the members of the Superintendent's Office and the members of the School Board. He read the first article.

Joanne Monty moved that the polls be open until 9:00 p.m. or the close of the meeting, whichever shall occur last. Motion seconded by Frances Rumrill, motion carried.

- Art. 1. That the District choose by nonpartisan ballot the following School District Officials:
 - One School Board Member 3 year term.

 - One Moderator 1 year term. One Treasurer 1 year term.
 - One Clerk 1 year term.
 - One Auditor 1 year term.

Voting then began and the meeting reconvened at 7:35 p.m.

- Art. 2. I move that the District set the salaries and compensation of the School Board and other agents of the District as printed in the 1992/93 budget. Mary Lou made the motion, Frances Rumrill seconded; motion was adopted after a voice vote.
- Art. 3. I move that the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$576,353 for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries of School District Officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District. Motion made by Helen, seconded by Mary Lou. Carol Clark moved that the motion be tabled until after Article 6; seconded by Fran Rumrill. After a standing vote; 27 For and 10 Against, Article 3 was tabled.
- Art. 4. I move that the District accept the reports of agents, Auditors, committees, and officers as printed in the Annual Report. Motion read by Joanne, seconded by Mary Lou; motion adopted.
- Art. 5. I move that the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,028 as a deficit for the 1991/92 school year to cover unanticipated costs of special education. Mary Lou read the motion, Helen seconded. Questions were raised as to what the monies are for. Joe Denning explained that 2 students have moved into Town, and more funds are needed to cover the costs through this year. After more discussion, the Moderator called for a vote. Motion carried.
- Art. 6. I move that the District vote to authorize the School Board to apply for, accept and expend without further action of the School District meeting, money from any source which becomes available during the fiscal year upon the following conditions:

- a. The money must be used for the legal purposes for which the School District can appropriate money.
- b. The School Board must hold a public hearing on the action taken.
- c. It shall not require the expenditure of additional School District funds.
 Helen read the article, Lou Grandpre seconded; motion was adopted.

Brenda Bryer made a motion to return to Article 3; motion seconded by Reed DeRosior; motion carried. Helen repeated the article, Fran Rumrill seconded. Discussion followed re the audit amount increase. It was explained that the State has requested a thorough audit, and the Selectmen are using the same company as the Board. Question raised as to the number of special education students being served by the budgeted amount. Joe Denning replied there were now 9. Don Jones explained that if the number of students in the special education program declined, the salary would also decline. Further discussion was on the foreign language program. John Sokul and Don Jones responded that Keene strongly recommends it and all the surrounding towns that send their students to Keene have the program. It better prepares the students when they go to Keene Jr. High. Question raised on the Kindergarten program. The Board responded that it was great. Questions raised on how the salary raises were arrived at. Mary Lou responded that the Board tried to keep the budget down because of the economy and therefore raises were kept down. Nancy Cressy proposed a 3% increase for the teachers salaries, which would add \$2,630 plus benefits to the budgeted amount. Discussion followed. Motion made by Reed DeRosier to change Article 3 dollar amount to \$578,133. Robert Loundsberry seconded. After a close voice vote, the Moderator asked for a ballot vote. Yes 30; No 32. The Moderator repeated the article. Carol Clark moved to reduce the budget amount by \$10,000 in the special education amount. Fran Rumrill seconded. After some discussion, Dan asked for a voice vote. The Nos have it. Nancy Cressy moved that Article 3 be amended to allow for teacher A for health insurance; John Secco seconded. By a voice vote that too, was defeated. After a voice vote to end discussion, Article 3 was read again, moved by Fran Rumrill and seconded by Joe Sarcione. This time the article overwhelmingly passed.

Art. 7. To transact any other business that may come before said meeting. Mary Lou spoke to those in attendance asking for a volunteer committee to make the James A. Faulkner School, a private school, separate from the SAU #24. Don Jones elaborated on the proposal and answered questions. After discussion, a voice vote was called for. The proposal was favored. Nancy Cressy spoke of the late Joseph Coughlin and his volunteer work in Town and at the school. He will be missed by all those at the school. Dan called for one minute of silence in memory of Joe. Mary Lou moved to adjourn the meeting, Joanne seconded. The meeting was adjourned at 9:10 p.m.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the School Board Stoddard, New Hampshire School District

We have audited the accompanying general purpose financial statements of the Stoddard, New Hampshire School District as of June 30, 1992 and for the year then ended. These general purpose financial statements are the responsibility of the Stoddard, New Hampshire School District management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these general purpose financial statements based on our audit.
