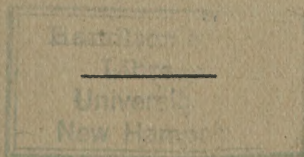

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

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To the Inhabitants of the Town of Sullivan in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Sullivan on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.
3. To see what sums of money the town will raise in addition to that required by law for building and repairing highways and bridges, or take any action relating thereto.
4. To see if the town will vote to pay for digging graves and going with the town hearse.
5. To see what sums of money the town will raise in addition to that required by law for the support of the public library.
6. To see if the town will vote to raise money for Memorial Day or take any action thereon.
7. To see if the town will vote to raise money to pay for breaking roads or take any action relating thereto.



8. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to borrow money on the credit of the town.

9. To see if the town will vote to help stamp out the white pine blister disease and raise money for the same, or take any action relating thereto.

10. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the road leading from the old Stoddard road, near the place formerly owned by the late George Holt, to or past the Kingsbury Mill site.

11. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the road leading from the Cheshire Highway to the house site formerly owned by Mitchell Beauregard.

12. To hear the reports of agents, auditors or committees heretofore chosen, or take any action thereon.

13. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

#### CHANGE IN HIGH SCHOOL TUITION LAW

The last legislature made a radical change in high school tuition. That all may become familiar with its basic principles I herein insert an excerpt of the law: Chapter 120, section 26. "Any district not maintaining a high school or school of corresponding grade shall pay for the tuition of any child who with parents or guardian resides in said district and who attends high school or academy in another district in this state, and the parent or guardian of such child shall notify the school board of the district in which he resides of the high school or academy which he has determined to attend; provided, however, except as in section 21, that no district shall be liable for tuition of a child in any school, in excess of the average cost per child of instruction for the regularly employed teachers of that school, or of all the public schools of the state, and the cost of text books, supplies and apparatus during the school year preceding and in senior high school work only."

In conclusion, I wish to express my thanks to the School Board, teachers and citizens of Sullivan for their hearty cooperation. I feel that your teachers are working along approved lines and are securing good results.
