SELECTMEN'S REPORT FOR 1955

The "Selectmen's Narrative" in last year's Town Report was apparently well received and we again offer this summary of the activities of Town Officers for the year 1955. In general this has been a year of great activity for your officers who have endeavored to keep abreast of the innumerable problems that constantly arise and to fulfill the objectives as directed by the Town Meeting of March 1955.

Fire Department.

A gift of major importance was made to the Fire Department through the generosity of Mr. Eliot B. Foot. He purchased and gave out-right to the Town a four-wheel drive Dodge Power Wagon, to be equipped and used as a fire truck. The Fire Department has spent a part of the appropriation for equipment in fitting this truck for service and it is now in use and located in the new fire house at South Sutton. The ninety-nine year lease with the South Sutton Community Club was signed by the Selectmen, thus clearing the way for the construction of the fire house adjacent to the Community Hall; this building is now in use. Although there is an overdraft in the appropriation for the fire house the Board of Fire Captains made an agreement with the Selectmen to stay within the appropriations made for *all* fire purposes and there is a balance of \$81.25 in these appropriations.

Roads.

The "Duncan Fund" was applied to "oiling" village roads as was voted. The material used for the so-called "oiling" is asphalt which prevents surface cracking. All of the black surfaced roads were treated except in Sutton Mills Village. A total distance of six miles was re-surfaced.

The T.R.A. money was expended on extension of the road from Sutton Village at the corner of King Brook bridge toward Nelson Hill to a point west of the corner of the Brown Road. A three inch treated gravel surface was applied to a road eighteen feet wide and seventeen hundred feet in length from the King Brook bridge to the residence of Mr. George Arland, thus completing the work started in 1954. Then southerly the road was widened to twenty-two feet, drained, and covered with gravel to a depth of twelve inches, and to a width of eighteen feet; this section is 1.2 miles long, and is ready to be surfaced in 1956. The curve at the junction with the Brown Road was re-located over land donated by Mr. Clifford W. Ayer.

The problem of a power shovel was with us again this year and it was found to be impossible to obtain a suitable one on a rental basis and at the time when needed. In past years the town has paid out considerable sums for rent of a shovel and had no equipment to show for the money. Another factor in our problem was that we had no authority from the voters to buy a shovel. We therefore entered into a lease and rental agreement with the Fisk-Alden Co. of Cambridge, Massachusetts by which the rental payments may be applied to the purchase price of the power shovel if the voters decide to buy the equipment. This is a new Model 850 Ford Tractor, equipped with a Wagner Down Pressure Loader, with a 1/3 yard material bucket. The total purchase price is \$3,000.00 which includes a charge of \$100.00 covering interest and cost of insurance. Rental payments made to date total \$1,575.00, and if the town votes to make the purchase the balance of \$1,425.00 may be paid in one lump or in monthly installments. We therefore submit these three alternatives for the consideration of the voters:

- 1. To obtain possession by paying the balance of \$1,425.00.
- 2. To obtain possession by continuing to pay rental at \$175.00 per month until the balance is paid.
- 3. To return the equipment at the expiration of the agreement, March 28, 1956, with no further payments.

Wadleigh State Park.

Early in the spring the State Forestry and Recreation Department made a ruling that an admission charge was to be made to everyone using Wadleigh Park. The State officials held that the verbal agreement existing at the time of the transfer of Wadleigh Park to the State was not binding on the State and therefore an admission charge would be made to the residents of Sutton. Your Selectmen believed that this ruling was unfair and we immediately took action to get this order revoked. A lengthy meeting was held at the office of the Forestry and Re-

creation Department at Concord, and later we asked for and were granted a hearing before the State Recreation Commission. This hearing was held at Mount Sunapee State Park where our case was again presented in detail. Three days later we were advised that all our original rights had been restored. The decision of the Recreation Commission is confirmed in a letter to the Selectmen from Mr. Tobey of the Recreation Department, dated July 14, 1955, quoted in part:

"This is to confirm the conclusions of our Commission after their meeting with you, concerning the references you brought to them with respect to a trust agreement prior to state acquisition of Wadleigh State Park. Such, in their minds was sufficient basis on which to continue to provide that tax payers and residents of Sutton would be admitted without the usual service charge."

Ex-United States Senator Robert W. Upton of Concord and several interested towns-people gave us valuable assistance in preparing and presenting our case. We are very grateful to Mr. Upton for his generosity in speaking on our behalf at the hearing before the Recreation Commission. Much time and travel was used by the Selectmen in securing this decision and we trust that this action will meet with full approval of our towns-people.

Town Line Signs.

Mr. Eliot B. Foot, Mr. William Bradford and Mr. George Salo were appointed a committee in regard to the "Entering" and "Leaving" signs. This committee decided on a simple and dignified wording: "Enter here to be and find a friend." These signs have been completed by the State Highway Department Signs Division and will be installed before another summer at locations where the Town Line crosses highways.

Town Line Perambulations.

As the law requires every seventh year, your Selectmen and the Selectmen of the towns of Newbury. Warner and Wilmot have walked the respective town lines. These perambulations took five days to complete. We were assisted in these peregrinations in search for the bounds by Mr. William Connor and Mr. Arthur Davis. A pictorial record of the perambulation of the Wilmot line appears elsewhere in this Town Report.

Social Security.

The necessary agreement for Social Security coverage between the Town and the Department of Public Welfare was not negotiated on the basis of the vote taken at the 1955 Town Meeting because of changes made in the law by the 1955 Legislature. New articles are in the Warrant in 1956 as under the new law there are two classes of workers that may be excluded: (1) services in any class or classes of positions performed by elected officials, and (2) services in any class or classes of positions the compensation for which is on a fee basis. It should be pointed out that if either or both of the above classes of workers are included under Social Security coverage in the agreement between the Town and the Department of Public Welfare they can not be excluded in the future. But if either or both is excluded by vote of the town now they may be included at some future time. Unless these two types of services are specifically excluded by the voters, these services must be included in the coverage.

After deductions had been made from the pay checks of Town employees we ran into this legal snarl, and we found that payment of the Social Security Tax to the Department of Public Welfare should not be made until a new vote was taken. However, what has been withheld is not lost to the employee as when the agreement can be negotiated it may be made retroactive to a date not earlier than January 1, 1955.

Timber Tax.

A determined effort is being made by your Tax Collector and Selectmen to see that the provisions of this law are enforced. We are following a policy of asking for a deposit or security on the anticipated tax from nearly every operator; consequently there should be only a negligible amount of unpaid Yield Taxes. The Tax Collector has conducted a successful drive to collect old, unpaid Severance Taxes.

Unused Appropriations.

There are a few small unused 1955 appropriations. This is due to the fact that it was found impossible to complete these various projects with the help available and with the amounts appropriated. However, these matters will have our attention this coming year.

Other Articles in the 1956 Warrant.

Two petitions have been presented to date to insert articles in the Warrant: (1)to "black-top" the surface of the road from where it now ends near the entrance to Wadleigh Park, to the black surface on the curve near the Symond's cottages, and (2) for some street lights on Andrews Ave. at Blaisdell Lake.

The article in regard to returning ownership of a piece of land situated in South Sutton on the south-westerly side of Route 114 to the donor, Mrs. Maude T. Clark is inserted on the motion of the Selectmen. We believe that since the construction of the fire house at the Community Hall this piece of land is no longer needed by the Town for the purpose for which it was given, and we suggest that it should be returned to Mrs. Clark.

The Pie Graph.

The accompanying "pie" graph represents the total amount of money allocated for all purposes. This does *not* represent the total amount of money raised by property and poll taxes, because we receive other revenue, as for example the Interest and Dividents Tax, the Duncan Fund, reimbursement a/c exemption of growing wood and timber. This is a graphic representation of the allocation of all funds and shows the relative importance (in total amount of moneys available) of one department with another. We request that all tax-payers give this graph a thorough study.


Conclusion.

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Sutton in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Pillsbury Memorial Hall in said Sutton on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing. The polls to be open for this purpose from ten of the clock in the forenoon and to be closed no earlier than six-thirty of the clock in the afternoon.
- 2. To bring in your votes for the election of delegates-atlarge, alternate delegates-at-large, district delegates, and alternate district delegates to the National Convention of the Democratic and Republican parties to be held for the purpose of nominating candidates for President and Vice-President of the United States.
- 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation for the same.
- 4. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the payment of aid to persons on public welfare.
- 5. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair of highways and bridges.

- 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$1,040.43 for Town Road Aid; and the State to contribute \$6,936.18.
- 7. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for street lighting.
- 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region.
- 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money beyond that required by law for the maintenance of the Sutton Free Library.
- 10. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day observance.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the New London Hospital.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.
- 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purchase of a truck, or for repairs of highway equipment.
- 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,425.00 to complete the purchase of the tractor shovel.
- 15. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the expenses of the fire department, the purchase of new equipment, and for forest fire fighting.
- 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to complete the construction of the South Sutton Fire House.
- 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to install a Red Network Alarm System.

- 18. To see if the town will vote to adopt a plan for extending to the employees of the town the benefits of title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Old Age and Survivor's Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 101 of the Revised Statutes Annotated Amended by Chapters 301 and 332 of the Laws of 1955, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 to defray the town's share of the cost thereof.
- 19. To see if the town wishes to exclude from the plan services in any class or classes of positions the compensation for which is on a fee basis.
- 20. To see if the town wishes to exclude from the plan services in any class or classes of positions filled by popular election.
- 21. If a plan for Social Security coverage is adopted, to see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to execute on behalf of the town the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to see if the town will designate the Chairman of the Board of Selectmen as the officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan.
- 22. To see if the town will vote to install two street lights on Andrews Avenue at Blaisdell Lake. To vote to raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 23. To see if the town will vote to accept a trust fund of \$150.00 for the maintenance and care of the Carlington G. Wells lot in the Millswood Cemetery and the lot of Sarah Cheney Wells in the Sutton Mills Cemetery.
- 24. To see if the town will vote to accept a trust fund of \$300.00 for the care and maintenance of the Elder Frank Nelson lot, the Truman Putney lot, and the James M. Nelson lot in the Sutton Mills Cemetery, the income from said fund to be divided equally between said lots.
- 25. To see if the town will vote to accept a trust fund of \$100.00 for the care and maintenance of the Lucia Nolan lot in the Millswood Cemetery.

- 26. To see if the town will vote to return the ownership of a piece of land situated in South Sutton on the south-westerly side of Route No. 114 to Mrs. Maude T. Clark.
- 27. To see if the town will vote to accept a lot of land known as the Grist Mill lot, given to the Town of Sutton under a provision of the will of the late James M. Nelson of Sutton, N. H.
- 28. To see if the town will vote to "blacktop" the road from where it now ends at the entrance to the Wadleigh Park Superintendent's cottage to join the "blacktop" at Symonds' property on Kezar Lake.
- 29. To see if the town will vote to close, subject to gates and bars, the road that runs westerly from the North Road to the road leading from the North Road to Potash Corner.
- **30.** To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 31. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Be A Good Citizen - Cooperate

Smoking and debris burning caused more than 50 percent of the forest fires occurring in the state of New Hampshire in 1955 -235 fires out of a total of 463 originated from these two sources. Lighted smoking material and matches thrown from moving vehicles along the highway or dropped by fishermen, hunters, hikers, berry and flower pickers accounted for 26 percent; debris burning in the wrong place or at the wrong time by those who failed to heed all pleas for safety or refused to recognize the logical, sensible rules and regulations set up under legislative authority governing the use of fire in or near woodlands accounted for more than 24 percent. This is inexcusable.

Everything possible is being done officially to remedy the situation. Since 1909 there has been a statute on our law books which requires everyone to secure written permission from the local forest fire warden before starting a fire in or near woodlands or where fire can be communicated to woodlands, unless the ground is covered with snow. A never ending program of educational work is being carried on by your local warden and state officials to inform the general public both of the value and necessity of securing the required permit for such burning. Much progress has been made, but there are still many who fail or refuse to cooperate. The value of our permit system was definitely proven in this district during the 1955 calendar year. Local wardens issued 3,864 permits for debris burning fires. That's a lot of permits. The records show only 2 permit fires got out of control. This proves several things - while wardens were liberal in the issuance of fire permits, accommodating every applicant so far as possible, they were cautious, following closely directives outlining overall policy governing the issuance of burning permits and thoroughly instructing permit users. The latter, too, fully appreciating their responsibility in using their permits, governed themselves accordingly. Result? Much burning done legally and safe.

But what of the smokers? Despite all the efforts of those officially charged with the responsibility of preventing fires, too many were careless or thoughtless in disposing of smoking material and matches. Why? It is difficult to say. Autos are now equipped with ash trays. Why not use them. The crushing out of a cigar, cigarette and the complete extinguishment of matches before being discarded is an easy chore.

If the costly habits of the careless and indifferent smoker and debris burner could be overcome, more than half of our annual forest fires would be eliminated. *Will You do Your share to bring this about?*

REMEMBER

- 1. Get a written permit from your local warden before starting your debris burning or camp fire. THE LAW REQUIRES IT.
- 2. Make certain they are dead out before leaving them.
- 3. Become a safe smoker by extinguishing smoking material and matches before discarding them.

ANNUAL REPORT

During the first year of operation as an established town department, the Volunteer Fire Department was blessed with a dearth of fires. There were just five actual fire calls and one false alarm. In every case the cause was negligence and the damage was small or non-existent, except in the case of the Maxcy fire where it was felt that the extensive smoke and water damage necessitated rebuilding.

The new firehouse in South Sutton is complete as a shelter although it will be necessary to pour a cement floor and install windows and interior trim during the coming year. The new truck is in service, although the body work is not yet complete. The greatest step forward is the new co-operation that has developed between the companies from both villages.

During the coming year the Department hopes for the full co-operation of all residents in mapping all available sources of water supply, in checking and removing fire hazards, and in installing a more practical alarm system. It is our sincere purpose to protect your life and property from the ravages of fire and we can only do so with your whole-hearted assistance.

SCHOOL WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Sutton qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 10th day of March 1956, at 8:00 o'clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
- 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

- **9.** To see if the district will vote to authorize the School Board to use the town check list as the official check list in School District Meetings.
- 10. To see if the school district will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the school district the benefits of title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Old Age and Survivor's Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 101 of the Revised Statutes Annotated Amended by Chapters 301 and 332 of the Laws of 1955 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to defray the school district's share of the cost thereof.
- 11. To see if the school district wishes to exclude from the plan services in any class or classes of positions filled by popular election.
- 12. To see if the school district wishes to exclude from the plan services in any class or classes of positions the compensation for which is on a fee basis.
- 13. If a plan for Social Security coverage is adopted, to see if the school district will authorize the School Board to execute on behalf of the school district the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to see if the school district will designate the School Treasurer as the officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan.
- 14. To see if the district will vote to accept a lot of land given to the Sutton School District under the provisions of the will of the late James M. Nelson of Sutton, N. H.

This year, Mrs. Robinson has the third grade again and Mrs. Cadoo has the fourth and fifth grade and is doing special work with some of the slower p spils.

It is always a pleasure to come to Sutton and I appreciate the cooperative spirit of the town people, teachers and school board.
