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

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Tuftonboro in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Tuftonboro Town House in said Tuftonboro on Tuesday, the Eighth day of March next, at 10:00 o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Articles 1, 2, 3 will be voted on by Ballot on March 8th.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Tuftonboro Central School on Wednesday, the Ninth day of March next, at 7:30 P.M. in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

- 1 To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2 Are you in favor of adoption of Amendment No. 1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Tuftonboro Zoning Ordinance regarding the Wetlands Conservation as follows: YES _____ NO _____

Section 2 (Definition) Zoning Ordinance

Recreational Vehicle: A Vehicle which is (a) built on a single chassis; (b) 400 square feet or less when measured at the largest horizontal projection; (c) designed to be self-propelled or permanently towable by a light duty truck; and (d) designed primarily not for use as a permanent dwelling but as temporary living quarters for recreational, camping, travel, or seasonal use.

3. Are you in favor of adoption of Amendment No. 2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Tuftonboro Zoning Ordinance as follows: YES _____ NO _____

Section 10 Zoning Ordinance

Recreation Vehicles placed on sites within Zone A1-30, AH and AE (National Flood Insurance Regulations) shall either (i) be on site for fewer than 180 consecutive days, (ii) be fully licensed and ready for highway use or, (iii) meet all standards of section 60.3(b) of the National Flood Insurance Program Regulations and the elevation and anchoring requirements for "manufactured homes" in paragraph (c) (6) of Section 60.3.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) for the purchase of a lot on Route 109A adjacent to the State Highway Facility from Reginald C. Colby for the use of the Town Highway Department for storage of sand, salt, etc. Eight thousand Dollars (\$8,000.00) for the purchase of the land and Two Thousand Dollars for the survey. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Sixty-six Thousand Dollars (\$66,000.00) for the purchase of land from Fred and Elaine Sargent on Route 171 to be used as a Solid Waste Facility. Sixty Thousand Dollars (\$60,000.00) to be used to purchase the land and Six Thousand Dollars (\$6,000.00) for survey work.
The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) to engage an engineering firm to design a Transfer Station/Recycling Center and to prepare a final landfill Closure Plan.
The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eighteen Thousand Eight Hundred Seventy-five Dollars (\$18,875.00) to dredge and construct a launch ramp and docking facility at Nineteen Mile Bay at the present Town owned site.
The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.
8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty-five Thousand Dollars (\$55,000.00) for the Special for Tar Account.
The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.
9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) to be placed in the Piper House Renovation Capital Reserve Fund, previously established.
The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.
10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty-five Thousand Dollars (\$35,000.00) for the Dump Closure Capital Reserve Fund, previously established.
The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.
11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-five Thousand Dollars ((\$25,000.00) for the Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund, previously established.
The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.
12. Shall the Town accept the provisions of RSA 33:7; providing that any town at an annual meeting may adopt an article authorizing indefinitely, until specific rescission of such authority, the Selectmen to issue tax anticipation notes.
13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from the State, Federal, other Governmental Unit or private source in accordance with the procedure set forth in New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated 31:95-B. This authorization to remain in effect until rescinded by a vote of Town Meeting. The Selectmen shall, before accepting funds from the above list of sources, hold a public hearing to obtain the feeling of the Town.
Recommended by the Selectmen.

14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer Tax Liens, to sell and convey by Quitclaim Deed following notice of sale by advertisement any and all properties acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's Deed by Public Auction (or by advertised sealed bid) or in such manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require.
Recommended by the Selectmen.
15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Conservation Commission to retain the unexpended portion of its 1994 appropriation. Such funds to be placed in a Special Conservation Fund in accordance with RSA 36A-5.
16. To see if the Town will vote to adopt New Hampshire RSA 154:24; Outside Service by Local Fire Department. To authorize the Town of Tuftonboro Fire Department to go to the aid of another city, town or fire district within or without the state, for the purpose of extinguishing a fire, rendering other emergency assistance, or performing any detail as requested.
17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell the 1982 Chevrolet/Emergency One Mini-Pumper Fire Engine, by advertised sealed bid.
18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate an amount equal to the amount received from the sale of the 1982 Chevrolet/Emergency One Mini-Pumper be placed in the Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund, previously established, for purchase of fire apparatus.
This article recommended by the Selectmen.
19. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 154.1. The Organization of Town/City Fire Departments.
This article is to reaffirm the vote taken at a Special Town Meeting, Jan. 18, 1960 at which the Town voted to re-organize the Fire Department and to appoint Fire Wards. This action is necessary to establish the Town's liability for the Fire Department. Any guidelines to be considered will take effect one year from the date of this meeting.
20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a boundary line agreement with and to transfer to the Governor Wentworth Regional School District a strip of land sufficient to provide access around the proposed addition to the Tuftonboro School on Route 109A and to lease to, or grant an easement to, the Governor Wentworth Regional School District additional land area adjacent to said access way for approximately 23 passenger car parking spaces, as determined by the Selectmen.
21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) for the Drug Abuse Resistance Education Program (DARE) to be made available for the students at the Tuftonboro School. This article submitted by Petition.
The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) to be used to help support the Tuftonboro Cooperative Nursery School, Inc. This article submitted by Petition. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend the appropriation of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) for this article.
23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate monies for the purpose of dredging the channel from the mouth of the Melvin River to 300 feet into Melvin Bay. 50% of the cost to be paid for by the Town (not more than \$7,500.00). The balance will be paid by the members of the River Reach Boat Club and other interested parties.
This article submitted by Petition.
The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this article.
24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty-five Hundred Dollars (\$5,500.00) to be paid to the Back Bay Hockey Association towards the addition to the hockey building. This money to be used to reduce the loan balance at First NH Bank, Wolfeboro.
The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.
25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same, the sum of Seven Hundred Twenty-seven Thousand Seven Hundred Twelve Dollars (\$727,712.00) as recommended by the Selectmen and approved by the Budget Committee and such sums as may be required to cover the cost of any additional items voted at the meeting and in accordance with RSA 32:8.
26. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

The second portion of the Annual Town Meeting was called to order by the Moderator Roger Wingate at 7:30 PM. A salute to the flag was followed by prayer offered by the Reverend Russell Petrie. The Moderator announced the results of the Balloting on articles 1, 2, 3, 4 and declared the following elected to office.

Selectmen Three Years Norman E. Vittum; Town Clerk Three Years Mary B. Craigue; Tax Collector Three Years Jacquelyn H. Rollins; Treasurer Three Years Lawrence Russ; Road Agent Three Years Reginald C. Colby; Budget Committee Three Years Susan H. Weeks and Kenneth Greenwood; Library Trustee Three

Years Christie Sarles; Trustee of the Trust Funds Nat Crane. All elected officers except Treasurer, Road Agent and Library were given the oath of office by the Moderator.

The Moderator announced that all the zoning articles numbers 2, 3, 4 passed and he so declared.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty-five Thousand dollars (\$55,000.00) for the Special for Tar Account. This article has the approval of the Budget Committee.

Motion was made by Norman Vittum and seconded by Bill Rollins to adopt article 5 as read. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and article declared passed by the Moderator.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Forty Thousand Dollars (\$40,000.00) to be added to the Dump Closure Capital Reserve Fund, previously established. This article has the approval of the Budget Committee.

Motion made by Potter Campbell and seconded by Jack Widmer to adopt article 6 as read. Selectmen Vittum spoke on article and gave amount that had been raised in previous years. Town has not received mandate to close and cost to close is unknown at this time. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and article declared passed by the Moderator.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand dollars (\$20,000.00) to be added to the Nineteen Mile Bay Beach Construction Capital Reserve Fund, previously established. This article has the approval of the Budget Committee.

Motion was made by Gordon Hunt and seconded by Lisa Greenwood to adopt article 7 as read. Selectmen Rollins explained situation as it now stands. Surveys, land purchases have been made. The Wetland Board has problems with the plan and has requested a Public Hearing. Town and DOT need to prove safety, need, access and address the Wetland problem. Urged all residents if possible to attend hearing in Concord on March 30. Announcement will be made after Selectmen meet with DOT March 17. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and article declared passed by the Moderator.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) to be added to the Piper House Renovation Capital Reserve Fund, previously established. This article has the approval of the Budget Committee.

Motion made by Bill Antonucci and seconded by Ken Craigue to adopt article 8 as read. Selectmen Antonucci explained what funds are being raised for—future renovation and building of town office, need more space for Town Officers in building at present time, plan to move police department to this location and increase area for meetings. Next year at this time plans and figures should be available. He thanked Potter Campbell and the Tufonboro Association for their dedication to the Town by taking over this project. A plan is being done by an architect at no cost to the Town. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and article declared passed by the Moderator.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Fifty-one Thousand One Hundred Dollars (\$151,100.00) for a Revaluation of the Town by the Appraisal Division of the Department of Revenue to be completed for the tax year 1994. To authorize the withdrawal of Sixty-three Thousand Two Hundred Ninety-nine Dollars (\$63,299.00) plus any accrued interest from the Capital Reserve Fund created for that purpose. The balance of Eighty-seven Thousand Eight Hundred One Dollars (\$87,801.00) to come from general taxation. This article has the approval of the Budget Committee.

Motion was made by Ken Craigie and seconded by Jack Widmer to adopt article 9 as read. One resident commented that he was pleased that State Appraisal Division was going to do the revaluation. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and article declared passed by the Moderator.

10. To see if the Town will allow the Selectmen to dispose of Lot 74, Hidden Valley, Tax Map #69-2-74 acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's Deed in 1987; either by a public auction, or by advertised sealed bids, pursuant to RSA 80:80. The Selectmen shall have the power to establish a minimum amount for which the property is to be sold and the terms and conditions of the sale.

Motion was made by Bill Rollins and seconded by Jackie Rollins to adopt article 10 as read. It was explained that this is a very small lot at Hidden Valley and an abutter wishes to purchase so that he can expand his building. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and article declared passed by the Moderator.

11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, receive and expend federal and state grants which may become available during the course of the year, in accordance with RSA 31:95-b and also to accept and expend money from any other unit or private source to be used for purposes for which the Town may legally appropriate money.

Motion was made by Helen Whall and seconded by Betty Campbell to adopt article 11 as read. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and article declared passed by the Moderator.

12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Library Trustees to apply for, accept or expend, without further action by the town meeting, money from state, federal or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the fiscal year, in accordance with RSA 202-A:4-c.

Motion was made by Ivan Phelps and seconded by Maureen Borowski to adopt article 12 as read. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and article declared passed by Moderator.

13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Conservation Commission to retain the unexpended portion of its 1993 appropriation. Such funds to be placed in a Special Conservation Fund in accordance with RSA 36A-5.

Motion was made by Gordon Hunt and seconded by Jack Widmer to adopt article 13 as read. Selectmen Vittum answered questions as to what this article means. Any funds not used at end of year are transferred to a savings account for future projects of Commission. Vote by show of hands in affirmative and article declared passed by the Moderator.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) as approved by the Budget Committee and to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes for the current year and issue notes therefor, said notes to be repaid from taxes.

Motion was made by Norman Vittum and seconded by Bob Ramsbotham to adopt article 14 as read. Selectmen Vittum explained need for article, in case of emergency and the Selectmen need to borrow money, this article gives them permission to do so. However, it was discussed that the article needed to be amended to read "for interest charges." Motion was made by Bill Antonucci and seconded by Richard Clarke to amend article 14 to include the words "for interest charges" after dollar amount. Vote by show of hands in affirmative on amendment and Moderator declared amendment passed. A further vote by show of hands on the amended article in the affirmative and the amended article declared passed by the Moderator.

15. To see if the Town will vote to take over the care and maintenance of the roads of Shirley Way, Abenaki Hill Estates. this article was submitted by Petition and does not have the approval of the board of Selectmen.

Motion was made by Ken Craigue and seconded by Wm. Whall for indefinite postponement of article 15. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and article declared indefinitely postponed.

16. To see if the town of Tuftonboro will vote to specifically direct the Selectmen to actively seek withdrawal of the town of Tuftonboro from the Governor Wentworth Regional School District. This article submitted by Petition.

Kathy Mendenhall made motion, seconded by Jackie Rollins for indefinite postponement of article 16. Discussion followed on those opposed to postponement, those that wanted the postponement. After a lengthy discussion period, Wm. Rollins asked to move the question. Second by Ken Craigue. Moderator explained that a 2/3 vote was necessary to move question. This vote was taken by a show of hands. This was voted down by an overwhelming 2/3 show of hands. Jim Clark made motion and seconded by Fenton Varney to adopt article 16 as read. Another discussion followed. Pros and con of withdrawal were discussed. This article if passed would direct the Selectmen to call a Special Meeting to bring the matter before the Townspeople. A motion was made by Bill Antonucci and seconded by Bill Rollins to move the question. Moderator explained that a 2/3 vote would be needed. A 2/3 vote by show of hands in the affirmative and so declared by the Moderator. Jim Clark moved for a secret ballot on the article. His motion was supported by the required four citizens. Voting by paper ballot proceeded until all present who wished to vote had voted.

YES 84 NO 51 Moderator declared article 16 passed.

17. to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Hundred Seventy-six Dollars (\$676.00) to assist the Family Health Centre. This article submitted by Petition. The request received was not approved by the Budget Committee.

Motion was made by Kathy Mendenhall and seconded by Russell Petrie to adopt article 17 as read. Discussion followed. J. Ewing requested that question be moved. Seconded by Helen Whall. Moderator advised of 2/3 majority vote needed. This vote taken by a show of hands in the affirmative

and so declared by the Moderator. Article 17 passed by a show of hands in the affirmative and so declared by the Moderator. The Moderator suggested that the petitioners present their petitions in time for consideration by the Budget Committee.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) to be used to support the Tuftonboro Cooperative Nursery School. This article submitted by Petition. This article has not been considered for approval by the Budget Committee.

Wm. Donovan made the motion and Betty Campbell seconded to adopt article 18 as read. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and article declared passed by the Moderator. Moderator again admonished petitioners to present their petitions in time for consideration by the Budget Committee.

19. To see if the Town will vote to affirm, alter or annul the following Ordinance enacted by the Selectmen on August 31, 1992.

Ordinance Regulating Commercial Picking of Rubbish and Removal of rubbish from the Tuftonboro Landfill.

Motion was made by Betty Campbell and seconded by Sue Weeks to adopt article 19 as read. After a discussion on the pro and con of "dump picking;" among them one statement that it is unconstitutional not to allow; Motion was made by Richard Clarke and seconded to amend article 19 by inserting in Section 1 to add "except by authorization of the Selectmen." The amendment was voted by a show of hands in the affirmative and amendment declared passed by the Moderator. Vote on the amended article by show of hands in the affirmative and article declared passed by the Moderator.

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same, the sum of Seven Hundred Nineteen Thousand Sixty-nine Dollars (\$719,069.00) as recommended by the Budget Committee and such sums as may be required to cover costs of any additional items voted at the meeting and in accordance with RSA 32:8.

Motion was made by Bill Rollins and seconded by Ken Craigue to adopt this article as read. The total bottom line of budget is now \$997,845.00; which includes all money warrant articles and the figure of \$719,069. vote in the affirmative by a show of hands and the Moderator declared the article passed.

21. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting. Under this article Fred Bauer reminded the Townspeople that the Town was incorporated in 1795 and due for a Bi-Centennial in a couple of years.

Motion was made by Robt. Ramsbotham and seconded by Ken Craigue to adjourn the meeting.

Meeting adjourned at 9:50 with approximately 140 persons in attendance.

1993 REPORT OF THE TUFTONBORO HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

Four catch basins and approximately 800' of underdrain were used on the High Street and County Road project. A number of very large rocks were removed from just underneath the road surface. The area was then reclaimed, 8" of crushed gravel added and it was paved. On Sodom Road 3200' were widened, reclaimed, 6" of crushed gravel added and it was also paved. The intersection at Sodom Road and Route 171 was changed to meet State specifications. Roadside mowing and dirt road grading were completed as scheduled. Approximately 500 yards of crushed gravel were added to the dirt road surfaces. The entrance to the Eastwood Road was also rebuilt and improved. 12+ loads of brush and rubbish were picked up from the roadsides in the spring. At the intersection of Stillings road and Phineas Graves Road the area was cleared to get ready for the rebuilding project there.

The first plowable snow was October 30th. The ice and snow from that point on and in January, February and March reminded us of the good old days. A lot of people have made long hours and difficult conditions a lot easier for the highway department. Special thanks to Ron and Walter, Bill, Dwight, Dick, Del, Lenny, Angela, Fred, Randy, Gerry, DOT Division 3 and everyone else who was there. In October we were saddened at the passing of a very dear friend and dedicated worker. Bud Greenwood is greatly missed.

It is becoming more and more difficult to find Special Officers willing to be on call for a 24 hour period. We have been fortunate, however, to replace Officer Perkins with a young man by the name of Jeffery Hiltner who brings with him a bachelor's degree in criminal justice and resides in Tuftonboro.

In 1993 the Department covered 46 motor vehicle accidents. Most of those were due to storm related conditions. To avoid accidents, we all need to SLOW DOWN and drive only when necessary.

Domestic violence appears to be on the increase. There were 24 reported incidents in 1993, 19 reported in 1992, and 12 incidents reported in 1991. If you are a victim of domestic violence do not hesitate to call. There is help out there for all.

I want to remind all of you that there is a new law in effect dealing with Driving While Under the Influence of Alcohol. The new blood alcohol content is .08. Two of the arrests that were made in 1993 had a BAC of .25 or higher.

I reported last year that numerous break-ins had occurred in December of 1992. Through the efforts of the New Hampshire State Police and several Departments within Carroll County, arrests were made. It was only through the cooperation of all these Departments that we were able to put a package together which led to the apprehension of the suspects.

I would like to take the opportunity to remind those who hold a pistol permit to get them renewed.

I would like to thank the New Hampshire State Police, Troop E, and Carroll County Sheriff's Department for their assistance throughout the year.

1993 LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

In 1993 the Tuftonboro Free Library had its busiest day ever. On August 5th 107 patrons came in and borrowed 214 books, videos, and other materials. Business is booming with circulation up 6% and patronage up 22%. The higher numbers for patronage reflect the increased use of the Hamel Meeting Room, which was twice last year's total. Some of the groups using the meeting room were: The Tuftonboro Pre-school, local home-schooled families, the Tuftonboro Reading Group, the Cub Scouts, the Friends of the Library, the Hikers and a group of artists from the Mountainview Nursing Home, who celebrated their own show with a luncheon at the Library. Also responsible for increased activity was the addition of 6 open hours per week beginning in June. After conducting a survey it was decided to expand the hours on Tuesdays and Fridays. This was achieved without adding extra staff hours and has been working out well.

The highlight in library programming came in April when Brownie Macintosh and Julie Thompson presented a children's concert to 53 local music lovers. The show was made possible by support from the Friends of the Tuftonboro Library and the Governor Wentworth Arts Council. Pre-school Story Hours and the annual Summer Reading Program remain popular.

Thanks to a grant from the Reader's Digest Foundation, the project to automate the library's circulation system has grown to include online searching of the entire collection. The new system should be ready by mid-summer and is expected to make for a versatile and efficient operation.

Volunteers have been a great help to the library. Thanks to Peg Bashe, Veronica Leipert, Evan Lawrence-Hurt, Maggie and Hannah Croteau, Sue Harubin, Debbo Hedden, Jeremy Hodgdon, and Barbara McClure.

I would like to thank everyone who has contributed to making 1993 another successful year for the library.

REPORT OF THE TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

December 14, 1993

During Calendar Year 1993, the State of New Hampshire experienced an average number of wildfires. The three leading causes of these wildfires were campfires left unattended, unsupervised children and debris fires that escaped control. All of these fires are preventable, but ONLY with your help!

Please help your town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. New Hampshire State Law (RSA 224:27 II) requires that, "No person, firm or corporation shall kindle or cause to be kindled any fire or burn or cause to be burned any material in the open, except when the ground is covered with snow, without first obtaining a written fire permit from the Forest Fire Warden of the town where the burning is to be done."

Violations of RSA 224:27 II and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$1,000 and/or a year in jail and you are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

The State of New Hampshire, Division of Forests and Lands assisted many towns in wildland fire suppression during 1993 and participated in many fire prevention programs. This year, the nation is celebrating Smokey Bear's 50th anniversary. The State of New Hampshire Forest Protection Bureau will be working with many communities to spread the fire prevention message—:Remember . . . Only YOU can prevent forest fires. Fire prevention is the most cost effective fire suppression tool. Please be careful around fires and help us and our communities have a fire safe year.

VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION ANNUAL REPORT 1993

The VNA of Wolfeboro and Vicinity, Inc. continues to provide both home health care and clinic services to Tuftonboro residents.

The Agency continues to provide Nursing, Physical, Occupational, and Speech Therapy services: Home Health Aide and Medical Social Services. Nursing visits are available 24 hours a day utilizing an on call system.

The Agency staff made 60.2% more home visits in FY 1993; Tuftonboro's increase was 11%.

Funding for these services is received from Medicare, Medicaid, and other insurances, fees collected, and a grant from the NH Bureau of Maternal and Child Health. Gifts, donations, and town appropriated funds enable us to continue to provide needed services to those who need them without regard for their ability to pay.

In the Spring of 1993, the Agency moved from its rental space on the corner of Clark Road and South Main Street to the front, town side building of Huggins Hospital. Interestingly enough, the whole Agency many years ago occupied the present secretary's office. The additional space at Huggins was badly needed to accommodate our increased staff, and home care services.

The VNA of Wolfeboro & Vicinity Inc. and Hospice of Southern Carroll County Inc. will merge January 1, 1994 to become Visiting Nurse Association - Hospice of Southern Carroll County and Vicinity Inc. The merger will enable the Agency to provide total care to terminally ill patients.

Christmas week, the VNA suffered a tragic loss with the death of our former Administrator and friend, Davena R. DeWolf. I had the pleasure of working with Davena as a staff nurse for 4¹/₂ years and as her Supervisor and Assistant for 2¹/₂ years. It is with her philosophy and spirit, I now lead the Agency forward.

The Board of Directors, staff, and I thank you all for your continued support and assistance.

TUFTONBORO SOLID WASTE COMMITTEE 1993 REPORT

This is the first report published by the Tuftonboro Solid Waste Committee, although we have been active for some time. Because of this it might be appropriate to include some brief background. The Committee's origins date back to 1990 when the Tuftonboro Association started a Landfill Task Force to address the question of recycling. In the spring of 1992 this group became the official town Recycling Committee. As the Committee looked into what was needed for a successful recycling program, it became apparent that a proper facility was important, that such a facility cost money, and that we could not spend town money to improve land we did not own. Recycling was totally tied to the question of what was going to happen to our landfill. With this realization, in the fall of 1992, the Recycling Committee became the Solid Waste Committee.

The first step in evaluating our solid waste future was to prepare a Solid Waste Management Plan (required by the State as of January 1990). The Committee spent the first half of 1993 interviewing engineers to write this plan, and in August unanimously recommended to the Selectmen the firm of Nelson, Ward, Associates. The second half of 1993 was spent assisting engineer Charles Nelson gather data for the Plan, which included conducting a phone survey of all town businesses and monitoring car/truck activity at the Landfill from October 1st to October 12th 1993. As a result the Solid Waste Management Plan, completed at year end and filed with the State, contains concrete Tuftonboro information which will be a solid basis for our future planning.

We welcome interest and input. Our regular meetings are held the second Monday of the month, with work sessions often in between. Our minutes and the Solid Waste Management Plan are available at the Town Offices and the Plan is also at the library. In the year ahead, 1994, we anticipate the purchase of a transfer station site, as well as completion of a Transfer Station/Recycling Center design and a Final Closure design, both plans being closely interrelated if the chosen site is the current landfill.
