Thoughtful consideration has given way to impatience, demands are replacing requests and, perhaps as a result, public service, once freely given, now seems to be losing its appeal.

Perhaps it is time for all of us to give some serious thought to improving the bonds of citizenship which tie us to each other and to the town.

TOWN WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hancock in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the TOWN HALL in said Hancock on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March next at 10 of the clock in the forenoon for ballot voting of Town Officers and all other matters requiring ballot vote; and, to meet at said FIRE STATION in said Hancock on Saturday, the sixteenth day of March next at one of the clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1, as proposed by the Planning Board for the town zoning ordinance as follows? To give the Board of Adjustment the authority to allow special exceptions to frontage requirements for subdivisions of land having less than the required frontage. (Existing ordinance permits such exceptions for land with no frontage.) BALLOT
4. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2, as proposed by the Planning Board for the town zoning ordinance as follows? To require that if more than one right of way is proposed for a given lot, such rights of way meet specified criteria pertaining to spacing and configuration. BALLOT
5. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 3, as proposed by the Planning Board for the town zoning ordinance as follows? To add the definition of two family residences and give the Board of Adjustment the authority to permit guest cottages under specified conditions and limitations. BALLOT
6. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 4, as proposed by the Planning Board for the town zoning ordinance as follows? To give the authority to the Board of Adjustment to permit private and commercial kennels by special exception if the proposed use meets specified conditions and limitations. BALLOT
7. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of ninety-five thousand dollars (\$95,000) for the purchase and outfitting of a new fire truck, This money to be raised by borrowing; or take any other action relating thereto.
8. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of seven thousand dollars (\$7,000) to widen and repair the Moose Brook bridge as the first step in the Depot Road Improvement project; or take any other action relating thereto.
9. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300) for the support of the Monadnock Community Day Care Center, a non-profit agency; or take any other action relating thereto. (By Petition)

10. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of three thousand seven hundred eleven dollars and thirty-three cents (\$3,711.33) for the Monadnock Community Visiting Nurse Association to support the continuance of health services now being provided through an agreement with Home Health Care and Community Services. This request for local financial support is based on \$3.01 per capita and 1981 census figures; or take any other action relating thereto.

11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize withdrawal from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund for use as a setoff against the following debt service:

12. To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to appoint a committee of citizens to seek and encourage submittal of proposals by private citizens, or the town itself, to provide suitable accommodations for the Hancock Post Office in the central area of town; or take any other action relating thereto.

13. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of eight hundred ninety-one dollars and seventy-five cents (891.75) to support the Mental Health Program of the Monadnock Family and Mental Health Service; or take any other action relating thereto.

14. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate six thousand three hundred dollars (\$6,300) to re-open and repair the highway bridge described as follows: the bridge on Mill Road over Moose Brook; or take any other action relating thereto. (By Petition)

15. To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to appoint a Norway Pond Study Committee to report their recommendations to the next town meeting; or take any other action relating thereto.

16. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand one hundred forty-seven dollars (\$2,147) for painting the front wall and tower and refurbishing the weathervane on the Meeting House; or take any other action relating thereto.

17. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200) for the support of the Grand Monadnock Arts Council; or take any other action relating thereto.

18. To see if the Town will vote to sell to the Town of Greenfield the highway bridge described as follows: the iron bridge on Cavender Road, over the Contocook River, which goes from Hancock to Greenfield, for the sum of one dollar (\$1), subject to the execution of a legal document absolving the Town of Hancock from all future liability for or stemming from the repair or maintenance of the bridge or its supports; or take any other action relating thereto.

19. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) for the Library Improvement Reserve and Building Fund. This sum to be allowed to accumulate from year to year, or to be expended by the Library Trustees, or to be added to by gifts of money; or take any other action relating thereto.

20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the prepayment of property taxes in accordance with RSA 80:52-a which stipulates that prepayments may be made after April 1 and before the tax bills are issued; or take any other action relating thereto.

21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the prepayment of resident taxes in accordance with RSA 80:1-a which stipulates that prepayment may be made after April 1 and before the tax bills are received; or take any other action relating thereto.

22. To see if the Town will vote to open to Class V status Old Hancock Road, from Map R-7, Lot 56-2, to a turn-around across from the driveway of Wayne and Margaret Crockett, Map R-7, Lot 56-3; or take any other action relating thereto.

23. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to transfer tax liens and convey property acquired by the Town by tax collector's deed by public auction (or advertised sealed bid) or in such other manner as determined by the selectmen as justice may require; or take any other action relating thereto.

24. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes; or take any other action relating thereto.

25. To see if the Town will accept gifts and legacies left in trust for the Town; or take any other action relating thereto.

26. To hear the reports of auditors and committees heretofore chosen; or take any other action relating thereto.

27. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SUMMARY OF 1984 TOWN MEETING MINUTES

Article 1: Harry Casler and Parker Starratt were elected auditors for the ensuing year. Donald Lancey was elected sexton for the ensuing year.

Article 2: The Town voted to accept the amended budget in the amount of \$447,109 for estimated town expenses and necessary sums for County tax, deduct revenues and credits and raise balance by taxation.

Article 3: Ballot vote: yes - 246; no - 34

Article 4: The Town voted to accept and appropriate \$1,082.31 as the balance in the Town Road Aid funds, to be expended as part of the Road Rehabilitation Program.

Article 5: The Town voted to authorize withdrawal of \$9,458.23 from Revenue Sharing Fund, to be used against the interest on the Fire Station Note and the Highway Department Building Note.

Article 6: The Town voted to discontinue the iron highway bridge on Cavender Road, over the Contoocook River, which goes from Hancock to Greenfield.

Article 7: The Town voted to discontinue the Class VI road running from Longview Road to Depot Street, as shown on Tax Map R-15.

Article 8: The Town voted \$7,000 for the purchase of a new sander.

Article 9: The Town voted \$1,000 for the Library Improvement Reserve and Building Fund.

Article 10: The Town voted \$300 for the Monadnock Community Day Care Center.

Article 11: The Town voted \$3,551.04 for the Monadnock Community Visiting Nurse Association.

Article 12: The Town voted \$891.75 for the Mental Health Program of the Monadnock Family and Mental Health Service.

Article 13: The Town voted against raising funds for St. Joseph Community Services, Inc.

Article 14: The Town voted \$200 for the Grand Monadnock Arts Council.

Article 15: The Town voted up to \$4,000 for repairs to the Town Clock and Steeple and to withdraw \$589.12 from the Town Clock Repair fund as a partial set-off.

Article 16: The Town voted to raise and appropriate \$3,000 to plow and sand Depot Street from Kassarjian's to Bleicken's driveway for the ensuing year and directed the selectmen to appoint a study committee to report to the next Town Meeting.

Article 17: The Town voted to have the selectmen notify the proper State officials to convene the Legislature for the purpose of preventing electric rate increases resulting from Seabrook Nuclear Power Plant.

Article 18: The Town authorized the selectmen to transfer tax liens and convey property acquired by Tax Collector's deeds.

Article 19: The Town authorized the selectmen to borrow in anticipation of taxes.

Article 20: The Town voted to accept \$15,248.50 for the Harry E.D. Pollock Fund, \$20 for the Richard Eustis Fund - both at the Library - and \$800 in cemetery trust funds.

Article 21: The Town voted to accept the reports of the auditors and committees as printed in the Town Report.

Article 22: No further business. The meeting was adjourned at 5:30 pm.

We have examined the combined financial statements and the combining fund and account group financial statements of the Town of Hancock, New Hampshire as of and for the year ended December 31, 1984, as listed in the table of contents. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and, accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As described in Note 1B, the combined financial statements referred to above do not include financial statements of the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, except that omission of the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts results in an incomplete presentation as explained in the above paragraph, the combined financial statements and the combining fund and account group financial statements referred to above, present fairly the financial position of the Town of Hancock, New Hampshire at December 31, 1984, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

Our examination was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the combined financial statements taken as a whole and on the combining fund and account group financial statements. The accompanying financial information listed as supporting schedules in the table of contents is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the combined financial statements of the Town of Hancock, New Hampshire. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the examination of the combined, combining fund and account group financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the combined financial statements taken as a whole.

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following is a summary of significant accounting policies employed in the preparation of these financial statements.

A. Fund Accounting

The accounts of the Town are organized on the basis of funds or account groups, each of which is considered a separate accounting entity. The operations of each fund are accounted for with a separate set of self-balancing accounts that comprise its assets, liabilities, fund equity, revenues, and expenditures, as appropriate. Government resources are allocated to and accounted for in individual funds based upon the purposes for which they are to be spent and the means by which spending activities are controlled. The various funds are grouped by type in the financial statements. The following fund types and account groups are used by the Town.

GOVERNMENTAL FUNDS

General Fund - The General Fund is the general operating fund of the Town. All general tax revenues and other receipts that are not allocated by law or contractual agreement to another fund are accounted for in this fund. From the fund are paid the general operating expenditures, the fixed charges, and the capital improvement costs that are not paid through other funds.

Special Revenue Funds - Special Revenue Funds are used to account for the proceeds of specific revenue sources (other than expendable trust or major capital projects) requiring separate accounting because of legal or regulatory provisions or administrative action. Included in this fund type are Federal Revenue Sharing, Conservation Commission, Water Department, Town Common Committee, Highway Equipment, Police Equipment, Town History, Recreation, Steeple and Town Clock, Payloader, Town Library and the Tennis Courts funds.

FIDUCIARY FUNDS

Trust Funds - Trust Funds are used to account for the assets held in trust by the Town.

B. Account Groups (Fixed Assets and Long-Term Liabilities)

All governmental funds and expendable trust funds are accounted for on a spending or "financial flow" measurement focus. This means that only current assets and current liabilities are generally included on their balance sheets. Their reported fund balance (net current assets) is considered a measure of "available spendable resources". Governmental fund operating statements present increases (revenues and

other financing sources) and decreases (expenditures and other uses) in net current assets. Accordingly, they are said to present a summary of sources and uses of available spendable resources during a period.

General fixed assets have been acquired for general governmental purposes and have been recorded as expenditures in the fund making the expenditure. These expenditures are required to be capitalized at historical cost in a General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts for accountability purposes. In accordance with the practices followed by other municipal entities in the State, the Town does not maintain a record of its general fixed assets and accordingly, a statement of general fixed assets, required by generally accepted accounting principles, is not included in this financial report.

Long-term liabilities expected to be financed from governmental funds are accounted for in the General Long-Term Debt Account Group. This account group is not a fund. It is concerned only with the measurement of financial position and not results of operations. Since they do not affect net current assets, such long-term liabilities are not recognized as governmental fund type liabilities. They are instead reported as liabilities in the General Long-Term Debt Account Group.

C. Basis of Accounting

The accounts of the General, Special Revenue, and Expendable Trust Funds are maintained and reported on the modified accrual basis of accounting. Under the modified accrual basis of accounting, sources of financial resources and assets are recognized when measurable and available to finance operations during the year. Uses of financial resources and liabilities are recognized when obligations are incurred from receipt of goods and services, when assessments are made by the State or in the case of judgments and claims against the Town, when there is a probability that such judgments and claims will result in liabilities, the amounts of which can be reasonably estimated. Exceptions to this general rule include: principal and interest on general long-term debt which is recognized when due. All Nonexpendable Trust funds are accounted for using the accrual basis of accounting.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTSDecember 31, 1984D. Budgetary Accounting

General governmental revenues and expenditures accounted for in budgetary funds are controlled by a formal integrated budgetary accounting system in accordance with various legal requirements which govern the Town's operations. However, contrary to generally accepted accounting principles, it has not been the practice of the Town to adopt an annual budget for all Special Revenue funds.

The Town budget represents departmental appropriations as authorized by annual or special town meetings. The Selectmen may transfer funds between operating categories as they deem necessary. State Statutes require balanced budgets but provide for the use of beginning fund balance to achieve that end. In 1984, the beginning fund balance was applied as follows:

E. Encumbrances

Encumbrance accounting, under which purchase orders, contracts, and continuing appropriations (certain projects and specific items not fully expended at year-end) are recognized, is employed in the governmental funds. Encumbrances are not the equivalent of expenditures; and are therefore reported as part of the fund balance at December 31 and are carried forward to supplement appropriations of the subsequent year. F. Reserve For Elderly Liens

The Town provides monetary assistance to elderly residents for which it is allowed to record a lien against the residents property in accordance with R.S.A 72:38A. The Town is entitled to recover these amounts from the sale proceeds of the residents' property or from the residents' estate. Since the timing of either event is indeterminable the entire balance of elderly liens receivable at December 31, 1984 is reserved as part of fund balance. Likewise no revenues or expenditures have been recognized relative to these transactions. During the year the Town provided \$3,277 in assistance under these arrangements, which is outstanding at December 31, 1984.

G. Investments

Investments in all instances are stated at cost, or in the case of donated investments, at market value at the time of bequest or receipt.

H. Inventories

Inventory in the General and Special Revenue funds consists of expendable supplies held for consumption. The cost thereof has been recorded as an expenditure at the time individual inventory items were purchased.

I. Vacation and Sick Pay

The Town does not have a formal sick leave policy. Employees are allowed vaction leave of 1 week after 1 year of service and 2 weeks thereafter. The Town's policy is to recognize cost of sick and vacation leave only at the time payments are make. Any accumulated vacation leave is immaterial.

J. Taxes Collected For Others

The property taxes collected by the Town include taxes levied for the Contoocook Valley School District and Hillsborough County which are remitted to these governmental units as required by law. The ultimate responsibility for the collection of taxes rests with the Town. The payments are recorded as intergovernmental transfers.

K. Property Taxes

The National Council on Governmental Accounting, Interpretation 3, referring to property tax revenue recognition, requires disclosure if property taxes receivable, which are to be collected beyond a period of 60 days subsequent to December 31, 1984, are recognized on the

balance sheet and not reserved. In accordance with the practice followed by other municipal entities in the State of New Hampshire, the Town of Hancock annually recognizes, without reserve, all tax receivables at the end of the fiscal year. The Town feels this practice of accrual is justified as it more appropriately matches the liability to the school district entity at December 31, with collections which are intended to finance these payments through June 30 of the following year.

Annually, the Town establishes and raises through taxation an amount for abatements and refunds of property and resident taxes, known as overlay. All abatements and refunds are charged to this account. The amount raised in 1984 was \$1,504 and expenditures amounted to \$2,471.

As prescribed by law, the Tax Collector sells at tax sale all uncollected property taxes in the following year after taxes are due. The purchaser at tax sale has a priority tax lien on these properties and accrues interest at 18% per annum. Delinquent taxpayers must redeem property from tax sale purchasers.

Property is sold to the party who will accept a lien for the least undivided interest in the property for payment of taxes and related costs due. If property is not redeemed within the two year redemption period, the property is tax-deeded to the lien holder.

L. Interfund Transactions

During the course of normal operations, the Town has numerous transactions between funds. The accompanying governmental and fiduciary fund financial statements reflect such transactions as transfers.

NOTE 3 - PENSION PLAN

The Chief of Police is covered under the State of New Hampshire Retirement System. Contributions are deducted at rates according to employment compensation. The Town's contribution for normal cost of the plan is based upon an actuarial valuation of the entire State plan, which was 14.11% during 1984. Since the actuarial valuation is performed on the entire State plan the amount, if any, of the excess of vested benefits over pension fund assets for the Town of Hancock is not available. The Town does not have an accrued liability for past service costs. The cost to the Town for 1984 was \$3,400.

NOTE 4 - TRUST FUNDS

The principal amount of all nonexpendable trust funds is restricted either by law or by terms of individual bequests in that only income earned may be expended. The Town's nonexpendable and expendable trust funds at December 31, 1984, are detailed as follows:

Yet our lives are in process every moment, which means change is ever-present. Only time can assure us if these changes are beneficial.

1984 was a year of many changes for Hancock and its people. Some were small; others were far-reaching. All were important.

At a lengthy town meeting voters closed the Cavender Road bridge, sent the question of maintenance of Depot Road to study committee and knocked \$7,000 off the proposed town budget.

Water rents were doubled to help pay for the costs of engineering studies and to begin the process of upgrading the town's water supply system at Juggernaut Pond.

A recycling trailer was installed at the landfill for the collecting of glass, papers and aluminum cans. Committee member Bill Eva indicated the town will probably break even with the recycling, excepting the trailer investment.

Postal authorities notified Selectmen they will be seeking additional post office space in Hancock, perhaps in a newly constructed building.

Townpeople honored rural mail carrier Foster Avery at a community retirement party held at the fire station and planned by a volunteer committee.

Retiring head librarian Doris Rogers was honored at an open house at the library. She is succeeded by Pat Briggs.

The town's last remaining dairy herd of 68 Ayershires, owned by Fred Farnham, was auctioned at the Valley Farm.

Traveling was tough in May when torrential rains caused brooks and rivers to overflow onto some town roads. And in July a sudden tornado splintered pine trees, damaging several buildings and canoes at Sargent Camp.

A car crusher spent two days at Chuck Willard's Cross St. property, crushing cars ordered removed from the junk yard by Selectmen, upon petition from some residents.

In late summer the Hancock Elementary School received a face-lift--vinyl siding, newly painted shutters and repairs to the cupola. Later, flower bulbs were planted by students and dedicated to the memory of Arthur Daniels. Students were assisted by parent Tammy Garre and landscaper George Lohmiller. Parents and faculty also organized a committee to look at some needs of the school in determining the expenditure of funds left by the Arthur Daniels Trust.

David Ingraham, VMD, opened a small animal veterinary clinic at his home on Old Antrim Road.

The town clock was silent for about three months while a new striker hammer was cast. The hammer was broken when the bell, rung on the hour, snapped. The 1,100 pound Revere bell, set up with a sixty pound hammer on the outside, cannot be rung on the hour, said Clockkeeper Bob Fogg.

Wayne Green Enterprises, Inc. purchased the former tool and die plant off Rte. 202, on the Forest Road.

The Depot Restoration Committee sponsored another travel raffle and hosted a Springfest at the railroad depot, featuring the works of Hancock artists and craftspeople.

The Guild marked its forty-fifth birthday.

A black and white photographic essay of Manchester, portrayed by Eleanor Briggs, was presented to the NH Vocational Technical College at Manchester by the NH Commission on the Arts.

Laura Clayton, a contemporary composer, was one of 200 applicants in her field of music to receive a prestigious Guggenheim award.

Brig. Gen. S. Kenric Lessey, Jr. retired after forty-one years of active and reserve service and received the Legion of Merit Award.

"My Three Countries", a book by Joan Kunhardt, was released in October.

The Barn of Hancock Village, formerly The Ivy Shop, reopened under the management of Ray and Helen Pierce.

The Hancock Hoofers, a 4-H horsemanship group, began meeting regularly under the leadership of Cindy Dechert.

A committee to explore cable TV coming to Hancock was set up by the Selectmen.

A committee appointed by the Selectmen set up guidelines and priorities for the accessibility of town buildings to the handicapped.

The Old Home Day Committee offered raffle tickets for two winners to ride in a hot air balloon.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN
AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Our first forest fire prevention law was enacted by our State Legislature 90 years ago. This early law set in place a cooperative forest fire prevention and suppression effort between city and town governments and State government. It simply stated that no open fire could be kindled, when the ground is free of snow, without the written permission of the town/city Forest Fire Warden. This law also stated that anyone kindling a fire without written permission shall be liable for the damage caused and subject to a \$1000 fine.

During the past 90 years, this law has worked so well that it has remained unchanged. All open fires when the ground is not covered with snow must be authorized by the local Forest Fire Warden. Persons kindling a fire without a permit when one is required are liable for damages caused, fire suppression costs and subject to a \$1000 fine.

This cooperative fire prevention law has contributed significantly to our nationally recognized annual forest fire loss record.

HANCOCK FIRE DEPARTMENT

In 1984 we responded to 92 alarms, this was up from 72 in 1983. They were for 37 rescue calls, 17 chimney fires, 26 mutual aid calls, 2 car fires, 2 dump fires, and 8 miscellaneous calls. 1985 looks like it may well be busy too, as we have had as of January 16, 1 partition fire, 1 house fire, 1 chimney fire, and 2 mutual aid calls.

For the past year we have put a lot of time into the research for what we feel would be the best fire truck for the town to have to meet the needs of the town. Various members of the department have either been to visit manufacturers, or have been to the New York Fire Chiefs Show or to the Baltimore Fire Chiefs Show to see as many different brands of fire trucks as possible.

We sent inquiries to approximately 50 different companies for information. After analyzing the information that we had gathered, and carefully writing a set of specifications, we asked 29 companies to submit bids.

At our bid opening in the first week of January we received 14 replies, 10 of these were actual bids, the other 4 could not meet the specifications that were printed. We are now in the process of visiting the three finalists. By visiting the factories we will be able to see what their finished product is like. At town meeting we will propose the truck that we feel is the best suited to meet the needs of the town.

REPORT OF THE HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

The year began with winter storms which often left their coats of ice on town roads, making a heavy demand on our sand supply. One of our sanders was leased for the first months of the year, but Town Meeting voted to buy it, so we were never short a truck. This was followed by a fairly early spring which was used to get the dirt roads graded.

However, that work was ruined by exceptionally heavy rains on May 28-30, which caused extensive flooding and washouts. The crew spent many hours placing flares and barricades and in constant checking of culverts to prevent them from plugging up. When the water went down, the spring grading had to be repeated and bridges checked for washing around headers.

Normal summer work includes cleaning culverts, ditching, patching, and mowing. Ideally, every roadside would be mowed every year, but when time runs out, that's where the job begins the next year. We also try to get some roadside brush cut each year as time allows. Additionally, throughout the summer most dirt roads get at least one more grading. Rainy days are often spent on maintaining or repairing equipment, which we do ourselves to a very large extent.

In addition to the usual summer work (and sometimes instead of it) the highway crew continue the Road Rehabilitation Program intended to bring all of our tar roads up to a minimum condition where they can be maintained on a reasonable schedule rather than going from one emergency to the next. Some stretches can be completed in one year, but many require ditching, grading, and shimming one year with sweeping and tarring the next. This year residents on Old Antrim and Old Dublin Roads must have thought we were crazy, because it took not one, but several sweepings before we got the weather, the condition of the road and the tarrers all to work together.

Now, after two years of the rehabilitation program (which was originally estimated to take six to seven years) we have completed 9.7 miles, plan to do 6.3 miles in 1985, and think we can finish the last 5.2 miles in 1986.

The town has also taken on a Bridge Rehabilitation Program. There are eleven bridges in town and we had hoped to do two each year, but we ran out of time this year and only got to the bridge on Tannery Hill Road. Fortunately, both the stone abutments and the I-beams were in pretty good condition, but there was no bracing between beams and the planks had come loose from the beams and were badly worn. The I-beams were removed and coated with a marine rust preventer and re-set with reinforcement rods and anchor plates which we made ourselves. We also re-planked the deck and pointed up the stone headers and replaced the guard rails. The Bridge Rehabilitation Program is very expensive per mile, but it has to be done.

During late summer and fall we started hauling sand from our leased pit in Greenfield, stockpiling it for winter storms and the landfill. Old Antrim Road on the back side of Norway Hill was widened and got a new culvert, and other dirt roads got their fall grading. What storms there were required lots of sand.

In December we bought a State Fish and Game Department surplus 4-wheel drive truck (1978 GMC 1/2 ton) which replaced the old Dodge (1954 Army 3/4 ton). It needed some repairs (which we did ourselves) and we would have liked it to be larger, but it has proved to be a good bargain for the town, working out very well in the small storms we've had.

TOWN LIBRARY TRUSTEES REPORT

There were three major developments for the Library during 1984.

First, after five years of continuous service as Treasurer and Chairman of the Trustees, Lewis Tuttle resigned on June 30. The Town and Library have been very fortunate to have had the benefit of Mr. Tuttle's financial and management expertise given so generously and unselfishly for so many years. The Selectmen appointed Edmond Lapine as a third Trustee and at a subsequent meeting the Trustees elected Howard Mitchell Chairman and Mr. Lapine Treasurer. Jean Eisenbeis continued as Secretary.

The second development concerned Doris Rogers who notified the Trustees she would retire as Head Librarian as of December 31 but would continue to work as Librarian. The Library is fortunate to have benefitted by the faithful services of Mrs. Rogers who served as Librarian from 1967 to 1980 and as Head Librarian from 1980 to 1984. To replace Mrs. Rogers, the Trustees appointed Pat Briggs. Mrs. Briggs has worked as Librarian since 1984 and previously as a volunteer. She also had served for several years as librarian in the New Jersey School System.

As a third development, two factors emerged to make it necessary for the Trustees to begin a reevaluation of the need for an addition to the Library building. In a letter dated October 29, 1984, the Selectmen called the Trustees' attention to a recommendation #2 in a report submitted by a Committee on Handicapped Discrimination. This Committee had been appointed by the Selectmen to conduct an evaluation of Town buildings in accordance with the Federal Revenue Sharing Handicapped Requirements. In a report dated October 17, 1984, the Committee's recommendation #2 stated, "Library facilities need to be reviewed more specifically and any plans to build a library addition should include the needs of individuals with handicapping conditions. Of all of the buildings reviewed, the Library was seen as the one area where structural changes should be considered.

As a second factor, the Trustees received several requests and recommendations to proceed immediately with the building of the addition that has been under consideration for some time. These recommendations were based on the Library's need for more space for a children's reading room, a meeting room for adults and the growth of the Library Building and Improvement Fund to more than \$50,000 as a result of Town appropriations and individual donations.

As a result of these considerations, the Trustees began a review of the entire matter. A review of past discussions and plans was held with Ted Wells and Lew Tuttle who as past Trustees had devoted much time and study to this subject. In addition, the Trustees reviewed with the Head Librarian of the Peterborough Town Library the experiences that culminated in the highly successful efforts in planning, raising funds and building the addition to the Peterborough Town Library in 1979. Further exploratory discussions are planned with the State Library Department, the Hancock Town Selectmen and others to determine whether the Library should build an addition and can raise the necessary funds to do so at the present time. The Trustees plan to review this subject and present their recommendations to the Town meeting in March 1985.

REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN - 1984

Nineteen Eighty-Four has been an eventful year at your library. Statistics published by the New Hampshire State Library show that Hancock ranks third in circulation among seventy-four towns of comparable population.

As always our staff and volunteers have maintained an attractive friendly atmosphere.

Lack of space for meetings and film programs is a handicap. Despite this, with Martha Mason in charge, a series of art films were shown early in the year. Also, the members of the Ladies' Guild usually manage to fit in for at least one meeting annually.

Several other social events were sponsored. There was an Open House in honor of retiring Trustee Chairman Lewis Tuttle whose resignation had been accepted with regret. Later an Open House, planned and hosted by volunteer Deece Lambert, honored Joan Kunhardt and gave the public a chance to congratulate the author on her charming autobiography MY THREE COUNTRIES. Copies of this and WEATHERVANE SECRETS by Mabel Reaveley may still be purchased at the library. Unfortunately Mrs. Reaveley, who was over ninety years of age when her completed manuscript went to the publisher, did not live to see her book in print. One or more of the librarians has been present at the meetings of the Nubanusit Cooperative and the Southwestern Library Forum whenever possible. Pat Briggs and Doris Rogers attended the fall meeting of the New Hampshire Library Association held in Manchester.

REPORT OF THE ADVISORY COMMITTEE

In 1984 the Advisory Committee carefully studied the articles in the Town Warrant and presented their recommendations at Town Meeting. The committee recommended that the appropriation for the line item budget be reduced by \$7,000. The amendment was voted on and passed by the voters.

During the past year the Advisory Committee has met regularly. The Fire Department met with the committee to review the extensive study undertaken by the department in their search for a new fire truck. It was recommended by the Long Range Planning Committee appointed in 1977 that a new vehicle be purchased in 1985. Advisory Committee members met with the Selectmen to review department budgets and attended budget presentations for the Fire, Police and Recreation Departments.

It is the opinion of the Advisory Committee, based on input from taxpayers, that greater efforts must be made to restrict further increases in the tax rate.

The warrant articles for 1985 have been studied in detail and will be presented at Town Meeting with the recommendations of the Advisory Committee.

REPORT OF THE DEPOT ROAD STUDY COMMITTEE

The following is the report of the committee, commissioned by the 1984 Town Meeting to study the Depot Road situation and submit a report at the next town meeting.

The Situation:

Depot Road is a Class 5 road from its beginning at Stoddard Road (Rt.123) out to the southern boundary of Lot 6, Map R-15 (Elliott's). The portion of this road out to the northern boundary of Lot 12, Map U-8 (Kassarjian's) has been fully maintained year round for many years. The road beyond that point had been maintained seasonally (summers only) until 1977 when the Bleickens constructed a home on Lot 13D, Map R-10. Since that time the road has been kept open during winter months out to the Bleicken's driveway by various agreements between the Bleickens and the selectmen. During the winter of 1983-84 the selectmen were requested by the Bleickens to provide the same level of winter maintenance provided on other town roads; namely, to keep the road plowed and sanded as necessary to allow safe access to their home. The deteriorated condition of this section of road does not allow the normal level of winter maintenance using town equipment. The winter maintenance is currently being contracted out.

The Study:

The committee looked at various possibilities to determine what course of action might best resolve the problem. The possibilities studied were:

- A. Rebuild the roadway to the minimum extent necessary to permit year round maintenance by the Town Highway Department.
- B. Leave the situation as is and continue winter maintenance on a contract basis.
- C. Declassify the road to Class 6, and provide some agreed on level of maintenance.
- D. Declassify the road to Class 6 with no services.

The Study Results:

The State Statutes are clear on the town's obligation to provide year round maintenance on any Class 5 road, with one exception: towns may provide seasonal maintenance on Class 5 roads serving summer cottages providing the road is posted.

In looking at option A, upgrading the roadway, the committee examined the existing road carefully, specifically identifying trees and rocks that must be removed to allow passage of maintenance equipment and still preserve the rural nature of the roadway. A set of specifications and sketches was prepared and submitted to contractors for estimates. Based on the estimates received, it appears the necessary work on the section studied could be accomplished by outside contractors for approximately \$30,000.00. The end result would be a roadway 14 feet wide including ditches, which would compare with many other fully maintained Class 5 roads in town. The subsequent yearly maintenance on this new roadway is estimated to be the same as other gravel surfaced roads in town.

Option B did not require extensive study work by the committee because it represents the status quo. However, to continue in this manner requires annual expenditure of funds with no improvement in the overall situation.

In options C and D the possibility of declassifying the road to Class 6, which removes the town's obligation for maintenance, was looked at. There are two ways in which a Class 5 town road can become Class 6. One, by five consecutive years of no town maintenance on the road, and two, by vote of the town. The section of road in question has been seasonally maintained to some degree as far back as any living road agent can remember. State Statutes allow Class 5 roads to be made Class 6 by town vote. The statutes also provide for appeal by any persons adversely affected by the vote. If the vote is upheld they have the right to petition for assessment of damages.

It should be noted that the committee's charter was to study the 7/10 mile out to the Bleicken property. There is an additional 3/10 mile of Class 5 road in similar condition that should be considered in any decision reached. There is another year round family residence at the end of this road. The estimated cost to upgrade this last section of the road is \$11,000.00.

Committee Recommendation:

After examining the alternatives the committee recommends that the town proceed toward upgrading the roadway the full length of the Class 5 section so that year round residents can be served by town maintenance crews and emergency vehicles. In doing so the following points should be considered.

1. Because there is no time limit on this upgrading (providing current maintenance levels are continued), contracting the entire project does not appear to be the most cost effective means of accomplishing the work. The selectmen, in conjunction with the road agent, should carefully determine what portions of the work can be done with town crews to minimize the costs. This project can be phased.

2. Depot Road is a "Scenic Road" requiring a public hearing before trees can be cut.

3. Available funds from State, Federal, or other sources should be utilized to the maximum extent.

4. Upon completion of any section of road, access depreciation allowances for abutting properties should be reviewed and adjusted.

Finally, the committee suggests that action be initiated by the selectmen to evaluate all other seasonally maintained Class 5 roads in town and develop a plan to deal with each situation, including possible declassification, upgrading, and posting as required by statutes.

SANITARY LANDFILL COMMITTEE

During 1984 the recycling effort in Hancock made a successful transition from a system of pick-ups by an outside firm (Queen City Recycling) to one of delivery by Hancock to Peterborough. To accomplish this an 8 foot by 16 foot trailer was purchased by the town. This trailer with 55-gallon drums and cardboard boxes is being used to store glass (three colors), aluminum, cardboard, and newspaper prior to transporting to the Peterborough landfill.

The recycling effort has been excellent, with significant participation by the townspeople. It has been estimated that approximately 500 cubic yards of space was saved by this effort. Besides the space saved, the town also receives some income for the recycled materials. One individual who has made a significant contribution to make this work is William Eva, a member of the committee.

Other activities that the committee participated in include attendance at New Hampshire Resource Recovery Association and the Contocook Valley Solid Waste District meetings. Hancock's recycling trailer was exhibited at a recent NHRAA meeting where representatives from surrounding towns asked many questions regarding its use as an inexpensive method for recycling.

During the year the committee also prepared a sign depicting the landfill areas and the appropriate places for various types of materials. Hopefully this has helped those less familiar with the landfill.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT

During 1984 the Conservation Commission conducted an extremely successful clean-up day on May 5. The actual clean-up was attended by sixty adults and children with the ice cream refreshment supplied by Mike and Lesley Cass. Additionally, many people took care of their own roads on an individual basis.

WATERSCAN, the commission's two-year project for gathering data about the water quality in six of our local lakes and ponds, is at the halfway mark. We have been monitoring thermal profiles, acidity, alkalinity, transparency depths, coloration, and chlorophyll concentrations at each location on a weekly basis. A report of our 1984 WATERSCAN activities including data is available for review at the Selectmen's Office, the Hancock Town Library, and the Harris Center for Conservation Education; we hope it will encourage some volunteers to donate six hours once a month beginning in mid-May so that we can complete this project by October 1985. This project was much assisted by the Harris Center permitting the use of their expertise, equipment, and facilities.

This year Sarah Tillinghast and Cindy Koziell were sponsored to the annual Youth Conservation Camp.

1984 REPORT OF THE HANCOCK PLANNING BOARD

The Planning Board in 1984 held twelve regular meetings and one public hearing concerning proposed amendments to the Zoning and Building Ordinances.

For ballot vote at the March 1985 Town Meeting the Board has proposed several amendments to the Zoning Ordinance. One would restrict two family residences in the Residential District to single residential buildings rather than two interconnected residential buildings. The other proposed amendments specify conditions whereby the Board of Adjustment may permit guest cottages, private or commercial kennels, rights of way and exceptions to lot frontage requirements.

WATER COMMISSIONERS REPORT

1984 was the year that work began on upgrading the municipal water system to improve the quality of water, and to bring the system closer to compliance with regulations of the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission. The basis for work currently being accomplished and future planning is contained in a comprehensive water study prepared by Dufresne-Henry, Inc. A copy of this study is available in the town library.

User rates were increased in July to bring revenues in line with anticipated expenditures for the gradual upgrading process. User rates alone will not provide the total funds needed to complete the project, but will pay for some high priority items on the distribution lines and future study work.

This year work was started on the following items:

1. Leak detection survey on 8" transmission main from the Chlorinator to the edge of town.
2. Installation of a sequestering feed system to reduce discoloration of the water.
3. Drain beaver ponds flooding the water main.
4. Monthly tests on Juggernaut water to determine the potential for Trihalomethane (THM) formation.

The upgrading of the municipal water system is a fairly complex and costly project which will take several years to complete. At the appropriate time a public hearing will be held on the subject. In the meantime the commissioners encourage all residents to take the time to review the engineering study in the library.
