WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEET-ING, 1915

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Haverhill qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on the second Tuesday of March next at ten of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following matters:

ARTICLE 1. To choose a town clerk.

ART. 2. To choose three selectmen.

ART. 3. To choose a town treasurer.

ART. 4. To choose one or more highway agents.

ART. 5. To choose one or more auditors.

ART. 6. To choose one library trustee for the term of three years.

ART. 7. To choose one member of the board of cemetery commissioners for the term of five years.

ART. 8. To choose all other necessary town officers.

ART. 9. To hear the reports of the selectmen, treasurer, cemetery commissioners, and other town officers heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

ART. 10. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow on the credit of the town such sums of money as may be needed to defray town expenses until the taxes shall be collected, and to issue the notes of the town for all sums so borrowed.

ART. 11. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance of the poor.

ART. 12. To raise and appropriate such sum of money as may be necessary to retire three thousand dollars of town bonds and to pay interest on bonds outstanding.

ART. 13. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for laying out, building and repairing highways, and for building and repairing bridges.

ART. 14. To see what action the town will take in regard to securing state aid for highways in this town under the provisions of an act approved February 24, 1903, entitled "An act to provide for state aid and for the expenditures of other public moneys in the permanent improvement of main highways throughout the state," and acts in amendment thereof; to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be deemed advisable for expenditure under the provisions of said act and amendments; and to pass any other vote relating thereto.

ART. 15. To determine what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for the town libraries.

ART. 16. To determine what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for the North Haverhill Public Library in addition to that required by law.

ART. 17. To determine what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for Decoration Day.

ART. 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not exceeding three hundred dollars for a free hospital bed at Cottage Hospital in Haverhill, for the period of one year; and if so, to elect an agent or agents to expend the sum so raised; and to pass any other vote relating thereto.

ART. 19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not exceeding five hundred dollars to be expended by the cemetery commissioners for the improvement of the different cemeteries of the town.

ART. 20. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to purchase or procure a portable stone crusher for the town, and if so, to raise and appropriate such sum of money as may be necessary for that purpose.

ART. 21. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the highway leading from a point near the Lane place, socalled, on the road from Center Haverhill to Briar Hill to a point near the buildings owned by Carl M. Meader on the road from the Josiah Wilson place, so-called, to the Connecticut river road.

ART. 22. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for other town charges.

REPORT OF THE SELECTMEN

To the Citizens and Taxpayers of Haverhill:

The selectmen submit herewith their report for the year ending February 15, 1915.

Following the course of previous years the selectmen desire to give a brief statement of town affairs as contained in the following pages.

In accordance with a vote passed at the last March meeting the selectmen have made substantial improvements in the town hall, replacing the old stoves with a new furnace, building a new chimney, laying a new floor, repairing and furnishing the ante-rooms, painting the basement walls, thoroughly cleaning and painting the whole inside of the building, etc. This has been done at a cost of about \$1,000, no money for which was appropriated.

The case of Dr. De Gross of Bath against the town of Haverhill for damages sustained on highway was settled, upon advice of counsel, by the payment of \$2,487.50. This was paid out of money in the treasury, as well as attorneys' fees for this and other cases, amounting to over \$400, no money having been appropriated therefor.

Quarantine and board of health expenses have been about the same as last year, approximately \$400, and for this expense no appropriation was made.

The expense for aid to county and town poor was about the same as for several years past.

It will be noticed that this report does not contain the usual police court report for the reason that all local police courts were abolished by act of the legislature of 1913 and district courts substituted, fees from which now go to the counties.

The West Side Trunk Line (State Highway, so called) has now been completed, extending from the Piermont town

line to the Bath town line. Two pieces of State Aid road, so called, have been constructed, one leading from the West Side Trunk Line to the new Haverhill-Newbury bridge, and the other, about a mile in length, leading easterly from the West Side Trunk Line along the Oliverian Brook. the other highways in town an unusually large amount has been expended, the increase being in the southern part of the town. For several years very little has been expended on bridges, culverts and railings, and after a thorough inspection of the roads in Mr. Pike's district it was decided that it was for the best interest of the town, in view of existing conditions, to no longer delay necessary work. In this district were found 228 bridges and culverts, nearly all of which needed attention. In a number of cases small log and stone culverts have been replaced by larger culverts of concrete and iron construction. It has also been necessary to use a large amount of plank for bridges and culverts, and for repairing and building new railings. On the West Side Trunk Line a very strong railing has been constructed about a half-mile south of Cottage Hospital, adding much to the safety of travel at this point.

The valuation and inventory of the town show favorable increases.

Your attention is called to an extract from the report of the Tax Commission which is printed in this report.

The town is owing no notes and has no outstanding orders. Town bonds to the amount of \$3,000 have been retired during the year, leaving the amount now outstanding \$9,000. The town has been called upon to pay, for what might be called extraordinary expenses, about \$5,000, for which no money was appropriated, and yet a decrease has been made in our debt. The financial statement as printed shows a decrease in net debt during the year of \$673.72 and a cash balance in the treasury of \$593.27. It will thus be seen that the town's finances are in excellent condition.

The poll tax is now a fixed sum throughout the state, namely, \$2.00.

REPORT STATE TAX COMMISSION 1914

INCREASE IN PUBLIC EXPENDITURES

No power has constituted the members of the tax commission guardians of the public in respect to expenditures for the support of government, and they have no disposition to assume that rôle. Nevertheless, "economy being a most essential virtue in all states," and it being "the duty of legislators and magistrates . . . to countenance and inculcate the principles of . . . economy," all as set forth in the constitution of this state, the commissioners believe themselves to be amply justified in urging, as they have so often urged before, the importance of this subject upon the voters of the state. The public revenue, state and municipal, is the voters' business and they are responsible, directly or indirectly, for every extravagance affecting it from the inception to the termination of the fund.

Every compulsory contribution levied by public authority upon people or property is in the broad sense of the term a tax, nor is it made less obnoxious or burdensome if called a fee or a fine. In the figures that follow therefore, all fees, fines, and other exactions, if any, are included with the taxes upon polls and estates. To illustrate the comparative importance of the two classes, it may be said that the taxes upon polls and estates represent about 95 per cent. and all other income about 5 per cent. of the total revenue of the state, and of the counties, cities, towns, districts and precincts therein.

Taxes as defined above have increased by leaps and bounds in recent years. In 1903 the sum of all the taxes assessed by and within the state of New Hampshire was \$5,373,420.22; in 1913 it was \$8,765,039.07, an increase of \$3,391,618.85, or 63 per cent., in ten years. But these figures do not adequately represent the velocity the upward movement has now attained. To show that, it is necessary to divide the ten-year period: The levy in 1908 was \$924,-388.79, or 17 per cent. greater than in 1903, while that in 1913 was \$2,467,230.06, or 39 per cent. greater than in 1908. By so much did the advance in the last half of said period exceed that in the first half. These figures will be the more alarming if it is remembered that while taxes already sufficiently heavy were advancing 63 per cent., the population of the state increased only about 4½ per cent:, and while the one was advancing 39 per cent., the other increased only about $2\frac{1}{4}$ per cent.

It is instructive to study the subject from another angle. In the ten years from 1904 to 1914, both inclusive, the annual increase in all taxes defined and limited as above was as follows:

The average yearly increase for the whole period was \$336,561.85. The upward trend is more plainly shown, however, by dividing, as before, the ten-year period in the middle and considering the halves separately. For the first five years the average annual increase was \$184,877.76; for the last five years it was \$493,446.01. It is surely pertinent to consider how long the little state of New Hampshire, almost stationary in wealth, can sustain a tax already burdensome and increasing at the rate of practically half a million dollars a year without crippling her industries and impoverishing her people. Plainly it is a condition not calculated to attract capital from without the state or to encourage business within the same.

From the per capita standpoint the situation is not less disturbing. In 1903 there were assessed \$12.88 in taxes for each man, woman and child in the state. Five years later there were assessed \$14.75 for each individual, and in five years more \$20.09. If in 1913 taxes had been equally distributed among all the people it would have meant a burden of \$100 for each family of five members. Though in reality there was little such equality in the assessment there was much in the payment. The fact is that those who occupy, use or consume property, no matter who owns it, are those who in the last analysis pay most, if not all, of the taxes If the wage earner or the man of limited means thereon. understood he was in reality paying something like \$100 a vear in state and municipal and half as much more in federal taxes for the government of himself, his wife and three children his influence and his vote would more frequently make for economy in appropriations and expenditures than heretofore.

No statistics for the year 1914 appear in the above paragraphs for the reason that they are not yet at hand except in part.
