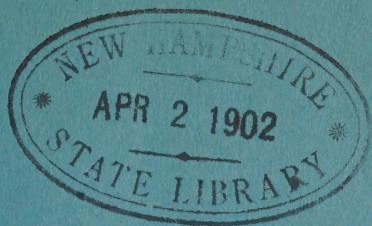

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the inhabitants of the town of Laconia qualified to vote in town affairs, you are hereby notified to meet at Folsom hall in said Laconia, on the second Tuesday of March next, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- ARTICLE 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- ART. 2. To choose three selectmen, town clerk, town treasurer, overseer of the poor, health officer, fish and game warden, for the ensuing year.
- ART. 3. To choose two trustees for the Public Library to serve for the term of three years.
- ART. 4. To choose all other necessary town officers and agents for the year ensuing.
- ART. 5. To take the sense of the qualified voters, whether the alterations and amendments of the Constitution proposed by the Constitutional Convention shall be approved.
- ART. 6. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the support and increase of the Public Library.
- ART. 7. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the support of the poor for the year ensuing.
- ART. 8. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the support of schools for the year ensuing.
- ART. 9. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the laying out, building and repairing highways and bridges for the year ensuing.
- ART. 10. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for current expenses for the year ensuing.
- ART. 11. To see how much money the town will vote to raise to defray the current expenses of the fire department for the year ensuing.
- ART. 12. To see how much money the town will vote to raise to pay the Firemen for the year ensuing.
- ART. 13. To see how much money the town will vote to raise to defray the expenses of decorating the graves of the soldiers who lost their lives in the war of the Rebellion.
- ART. 14. To see if the town will vote to make the highway tax payable in money and if so, how the same shall be collected and expended.
- ART. 15. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for paving and concreting for the year ensuing.
- ART. 16. To see what amount of money the town will vote to raise to build sidewalks and improve existing highway at The Weirs.

LAONIA TOWN REPORT.

ART. 17. To see if the town will vote to increase the number of Hydrants, and if so, how many?
By request.

ART. 18. To hear the report of the committee appointed at the last annual meeting, in regard to building a police station, and see what action the town will take thereon.

ART. 19. To see if the town will vote to increase the number of Electric Street Lights; if so how many?

ART. 20. To see what the town will vote to pay for the same privileges in the year 1889 they had in the year 1888, on and around Dixon's Point (so called), at the outlet of Winnipiseogee River and the shores of Winnisquam Lake; on conditions if the property changes ownership the money is to be refunded to the town, and the town gains no rights thereby.

ART. 21. To see if the town will vote to exempt the Belknap Agricultural Fair Grounds from taxation for a term of five years.
By request.

ART. 22. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to raise The Weirs bridge (3 feet) or to build a drawbridge in the place of the one now spanning the channel, for better accommodation of steamboats.
By request.

ART. 23. To see what action the town will take in regard to the refunding the taxes paid on the building owned by the Catholic society and occupied by the Sisters of Mercy, as a residence and for school purposes; the same being claimed, with interest, from each date of payment.

Pursuant to a vote passed at the last annual meeting to raise \$4000. and authorizing the selectmen to expend the same in paving or concreting, we have paved a section of Main street, covering a space of 1244 square yards, at an expense of \$2,635.49, having on hand stone to the amount of \$172, or enough to pave 107 square yards. We also expended the sum of \$1,179.18 in concreting sidewalks and crossings, connecting with the concrete on South Main street and extending the same to Bowman street, and across Bowman to Academy street; also on Pleasant street from the railroad to School, and across School to Main street, thus connecting our

SCHOOL REPORT.

TO THE SCHOOL COMMITTEE OF THE TOWN OF LACONIA :

The board of education of school district number one herewith submits its fourteenth annual report.

The policy of employing the principal of the high school as superintendent has been continued and has resulted, as we believe, in greatly increasing the efficiency and discipline of our schools. His report is herewith submitted and contains matters of interest and importance not necessary for us to repeat but to which we ask your serious attention.

The matter of grading and of passing pupils upon examination from a lower to a higher grade has received much consideration. Our practice has been hitherto perhaps too lenient, inasmuch as we have been apt to give the benefit of the doubt to the pupil. As our schools increase in efficiency, we feel the necessity of enforcing a more rigid rule and allowing none to pass who do not come fully up to the requirements. In no other way can we maintain a high character in our schools and make it an object worthy of the highest ambition of our boys and girls to graduate from our high school. We ask the aid of parents in giving our children a thorough rather than a superficial education.

A class of nine young ladies graduated this year, who, during their course and in their graduating exercises did credit to themselves and to the district. We are glad to note an increased interest on the part of parents and friends, and hope it may continue, and that ere long we may have graduating classes that in numbers as well as in scholarship may show an appreciation of the privileges now afforded.

We have been obliged to fit up a new schoolroom during the year, and establish a new school. It seems clear that at least one more school will be required during the coming year, and if the town should continue growing at its present rate still another may be required. It seems therefore to be necessary to raise a larger amount of money for the support of schools than has been customary in this town, or else to have the schools suffer from overcrowding and other evils.

The whole number of scholars attending the public schools of the district two weeks or more during the year has been 560, of whom 297 were boys and 263 were girls. Of those reported, 32 were under six years of age and 30 were over sixteen. The whole number of children in the dis-

trict between five and fifteen years of age, as enumerated by the selectmen, was 798, of whom 397 were boys and 401 were girls.

In table A it will be seen that the greatest increase was in the years '84-'85, '87-'88, '88-'89, the increase during the past year having been enough to require another teacher.

Some pupils, on account of removal from town, or other reasons, do not complete the term for which they are registered; others enter after the beginning of the term. For this reason, section b of table B, which shows the per cent. of the attendance of the whole number registered for every day of the year, does not indicate the regularity of attendance of those who attend during the whole term.

If the number of polls be any indication of population, table C shows how the number of registered pupils has kept pace with the population.

This increase has resulted in crowding some of our schools, especially the Grammar schools. It is a recognized fact in the educational world that the number of pupils in a Grammar grade should not exceed forty for each teacher. Thirty-five is a preferable number. These are the approximate numbers in most well regulated schools.

In our Upper Grammar school the attendance has increased to fifty six, in the Lower Grammar to fifty five, while indications point to seventy as the probable number for the next year in the Lower Grammar. This condition does not result from an added year to the Grammar course as we have kept back no class. It seems evident that an additional teacher must be employed in these schools. The schools have suffered from too frequent changes of instructors. On the present basis twelve teachers are required in the schools of the district, yet during the year nineteen have been employed, while more changes are at hand. The highest success cannot be attained under these conditions. But in spite of crowded schools and changes of teachers, much good work has been done in all grades. A strong spirit of study has prevailed in most of the schools. Some work has been done in music and some in drawing. At the beginning of the school year, on account of the inability of the publishers to furnish the books, we were delayed in the latter work until near the end of the term. Then too, we have been unable, through lack of funds, to put in the necessary models. Hence the work in drawing has, of necessity, been wholly unsatisfactory. The required models should at once be put in the schools.

A room has been provided in the basement of the High school building for a chemical laboratory. The chemical tables are now in position and the necessary chemicals and apparatus will be secured at once. The laboratory will offer facilities for individual work for a class of fifteen, each one of whom will have a special table as well as a supply of the common apparatus and chemicals for his individual use. This is a most valuable addition. A small amount of physical apparatus has also been obtained.

The advance in the High school during the coming year should be along the line of books of reference. A small but select library should be provided as soon as possible. I would emphasize my recommendation of last year, that the English course be made four instead of three years. At present the time that can be given to some of the studies is wholly inadequate. Physics and Chemistry now share the time that should be given to each. If it be feared that an added year would deter some from entering upon the course, some plan might be devised by which pupils who had pursued the required studies a certain number of years might be granted a certificate to that effect. Surely there are many parents who would wish their children to take another year.

THE UPTOWN DISTRICTS.

The undersigned, members of the school board for Districts No. 3, 4 and 5; herewith submit their annual report, effecting the respective terms of school in the above districts for the past year, ending March 1, 1889, as will be seen by consulting the statements and statistics appended herewith.

Our schools for the past year have been productive of much good, showing improvement and the general enhancement of the interests for which public schools are designed, and looking to that end, parents as well as those also who are interested in the cause of education, have every reason to feel proud. One of the necessary requisites to the success of the public school is the hearty coöperation of parents with the efforts put forth by the teacher, and the sooner this matter is thoroughly understood on the part of the parents the sooner the desired results will be obtained. Too frequently the teachers are left to themselves entirely and thrown upon their own individual responsibility and resources in the education of children placed under their care. Parents should and naturally do take an interest in the education and welfare of their children at home, and why shouldn't they to the same extent and perhaps more so when they are away from them in the public school. Too often it is the case that the duty in this respect is neglected and the children are left to take care of themselves, regardless of consequences. It is the duty of parents to have a watchful eye over their children at all times when such a condition is possible. Parents should visit the school room often, consult with the teacher and invite them to their homes, in order to bring about the best of feeling and foster a condition of amicable fraternity for the good of all. They should also see that the school-room be put in such condition that it shall appear attractive and home-like, with proper conveniences, warmth, light, etc., and wholly devoid of any repulsive features tending to breed discontent or dissatisfaction on the part of the pupil. This is as much the duty of the parent as the teacher, and this tendency of coöperation will help lighten the burdens that daily weigh down upon the shoulders of the teachers in the very responsible position which they hold in the education of the young. Few people are aware of the many duties and perplexing situations devolving upon the teachers in the successful management of the schoolroom. Oftentimes they are compelled to encounter the extremes of emergencies, when the exacting situation calls forth their greatest energy, force of character and exercise of good judgment to help them out. Then if ever they are in need of assistance, and a great deal in that line can be supplied by the wisdom and counsel of those of maturer years and the heads of families. In this connection we earnestly desire to impress upon the minds of parents the importance of their hearty coöperation with teachers, in order to secure the greatest amount of good as the result of their labors in the schoolroom.

The following is a brief summary of comments and statistics relative to the respective districts under our supervision :

DISTRICT NO. 3. (CROCKETT'S.)

Summer term, Idella M. Drew teacher. Length of term 9 weeks; number pupils attending, boys 8, girls 8; average attendance 15; number visits of

committee 3; wages \$30.00 per month; number of pupils in reading 16; spelling 16; arithmetic 15; history 3; grammar 6; geography 7; algebra 3; penmanship 16; number of visitors, 21.

Fall term, Idella M. Drew, teacher. Length of term 12 weeks; number of pupils attending, boys 8; girls 8; average attendance 13; number visits of committee, 3; wages \$30.00 per month; number of pupils in reading 16; spelling 16; arithmetic 16; history 2; grammar 5; geography 7; algebra 2; penmanship 16; number of visitors 25.

Winter term, Idella M. Drew, teacher. Length of term 12 weeks; number of pupils attending, boys 6; girls 6; average attendance 9; average number belonging 11; number visits by committee 3; wages \$30.00 per month; number pupils in reading 10; spelling 10; arithmetic 10; history 1; grammar 3; geography 5; algebra 2; penmanship 16; number of visitors 20.

Miss Drew is a teacher of considerable experience, the effects of which is made apparent at once on visiting this school. She is a fine scholar, good disciplinarian, and has had the satisfaction of seeing her labors in this instance, well rewarded by more than the average measure of general improvement in the pupils under her care. The attendance has been rather above the average. The interest on the part of the parents has been noticable during the year, which is a most commendable feature in connection with the school.

DISTRICT No. 4. (THE WEIRS.)

Summer term, Mertie E. Glidden teacher. Length of term 10 weeks; number of pupils attending, boys 10; girls 9; average attendance 18; average number belonging 19; number of visits by committee 3; wages \$30.00 per month; number of pupils in reading 19; spelling 19; arithmetic 16; history 8; grammar 10; physiology 6; algebra 5; geography 4; penmanship 10; number of visitors 48.

Fall term, Mertie E. Glidden, teacher. Length of term, 12 weeks; number of pupils attending, boys 11; girls 8; average number belonging 19; average attendance 18; number of visits by committee 1; wages \$30.00 per month; number of pupils in reading 19; spelling 19; arithmetic 16; history 7; grammar 8; geography 8; algebra 5; physiology 6; penmanship 7; number of visitors 40.

Winter term, Mertie E. Glidden, teacher. Length of term, 12 weeks; number of pupils attending, boys 14; girls 9; average attendance 20; average number belonging 22; number of visits of committee 2; wages \$30.00 per month; number of pupils in reading 23; spelling 23; arithmetic 18; grammar 8; geography 9; algebra 5; physiology 6; penmanship 22; number of visitors 25.

Miss Glidden is one of our best teachers. This is the result chiefly of her own exertions in the direct line of a duty for which she seems to be eminently well qualified to perform. She is a thorough disciplinarian, never hesitating to adopt sterner methods in governing, whenever moral suasion fails to accomplish its object. The pupils have made good progress and have been seemingly as much interested in their own welfare as their teacher. In this connection it may be proper to suggest that Miss

Glidden's labors for the past year have been confined to a locality for which she most appropriately fills the bill.

DISTRICT No. 5. (UNION.)

Summer term. H. Bertha Flanders, teacher. Length of term, 9 weeks; number of pupils attending, boys 4; girls 2; average attendance 6; number visits by committee 2; wages \$30.00 per month; number of pupils in reading 6; spelling 6; penmanship 4; arithmetic 5; geography 3; grammar 2.

Fall term. H. Bartha Flanders, teacher. 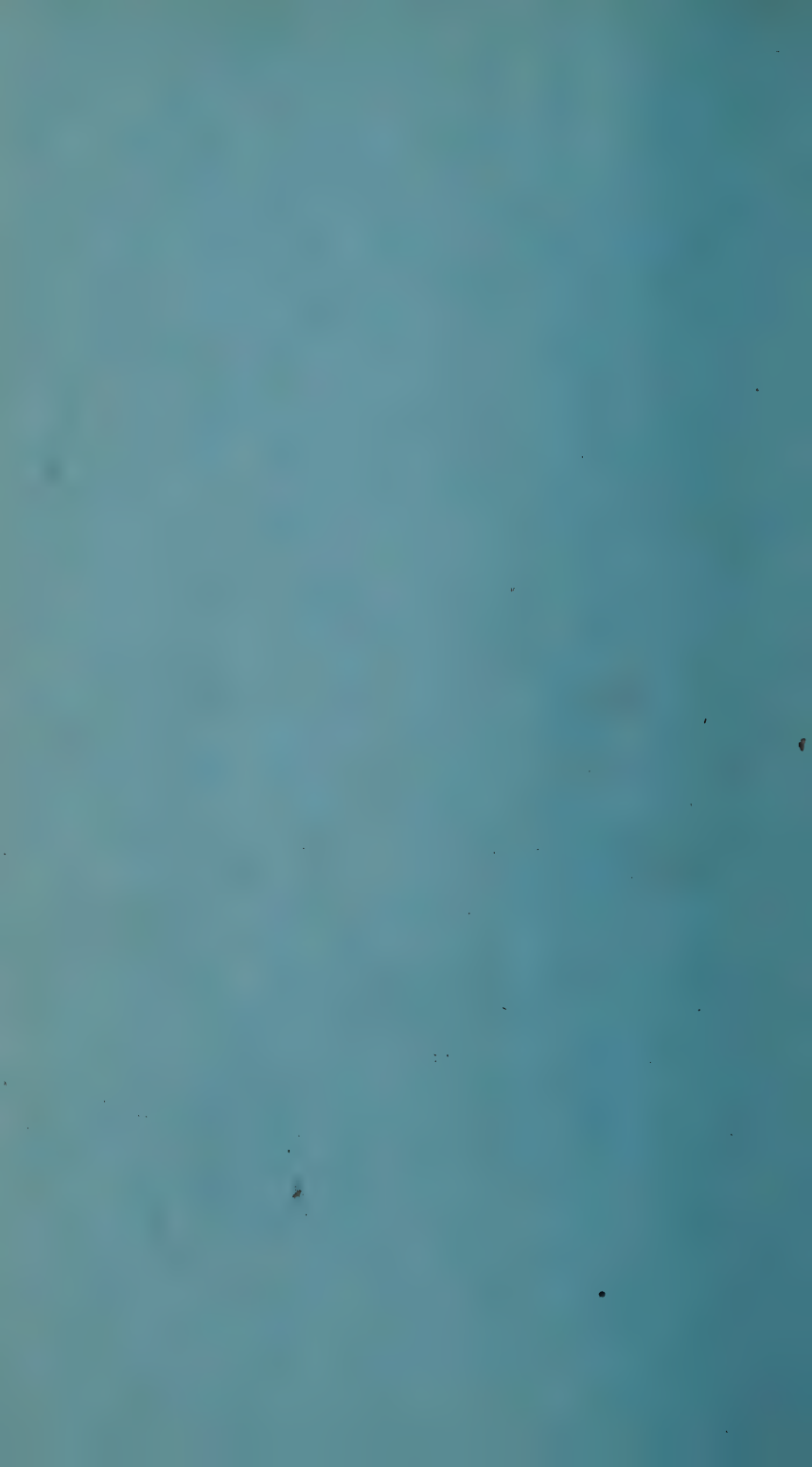
