TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Lee, in the County of
Strafford in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:
(L. S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said
Lee on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, next at eleven
of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following sub-
jects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year
ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to
defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appro-
priations of the same.

ARTICLES TWO (2) THROUGH TWENTY (20) ON APPRO-
PRIATIONS WILL BE TAKEN UP AT MAST WAY SCHOOL ON
WEDNESDAY, THE FOURTEENTH DAY OF MARCH AT EIGHT
O'CLOCK IN THE EVENING.

3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as
may be necessary for the maintenance of highways.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate
the sum of twelve hundred dollars (\$1,200.) for old age
assistance and town relief.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate

the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200.) for fire protection.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four hundred ninety-seven dollars and thirty-one cents (\$497.31) for the construction of Class V highways under the provisions of the T.R.A., so called. The State will contribute the sum of three thousand three hundred fifteen dollars and thirty-seven cents (\$3,315.37).

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.) to be deposited with the Town Trustees of the Trust Funds as a capital reserve for equipment for the Fire Department.

8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Fire Department.

9. To raise and appropriate for the economic advancement of the Town through publicity and promotional service of the Seacoast Regional Development Association, in cooperation with other regional communities a sum not exceeding one one-hundredth of one per cent of assessed valuation, namely one hundred dollars (\$100.).

10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of the Town Dump.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of approximately five thousand dollars (\$5,000.), to defray the cost of its share of the Strafford County Government.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.) to mow cemetery lots not having perpetual care.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.) to construct roadways in the new part of the cemetery.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three thousand five hundred dollars (\$3,500.) to repair the bridge over Little River. (Thompson Bridge).

15. To see if the Town will vote to have the Town revalued and make appropriation for same.

16. To see if the Town will adopt a Zoning Ordinance recommended by the Planning Board.

17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and empower the Planning Board to approve or disapprove, in its discretion, plans showing new streets or widening thereof, or parks, and upon adoption of this article it shall be the duty of the Town Clerk to file with the Registry of Deeds of the County of Strafford, a certificate or note showing said Planning Board has been so authorized, giving the date of authorization, as provided in Sections 19-29 inclusive, Chapter 36 of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955.

18. To see if the Town will vote to accept a new piece

of road leading off Rte. 125 at the Barrington and Lee town line.

19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

20. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

LEE FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT—1961

The Lee Fire Department answered 12 calls in 1961 with an estimated loss of \$1,000 from the ten in town. The other two calls were to Newmarket and Barrington. The Madbury Fire Department took care of one car fire on Route 4 in Lee.

Three woods fires were reported by the look-out towers with less than $\frac{1}{4}$ acre burned over.

There were fourteen violations of the fire permit law during 1961. Residents are reminded that no outside fire can be kindled without a permit (this includes incinerators, outdoor fireplaces and any kind of charcoal grilles) unless the ground is covered with snow. Permits may be obtained, free of charge, from the fire warden.

The Department purchased 600 ft. of forestry hose and 400 ft. of municipal hose all of which has been put into service.

The interior of the fire house was finished and painted and a sink put in as well as other gadgets to make things more convenient.

Many thanks are extended to the firemen for their time and talents.

We appreciate the cooperation of townspeople for their good fire prevention practices. Don't hesitate to call the fire department if needed. The new telephone number is Oldfield 9-3900; to be used for emergency calls only. The fire warden may be reached at Oldfield 9-3447.

AN APPEAL FROM YOUR FOREST FIRE WARDEN

In these days of constantly rising taxes and wages, any unnecessary expense is an added burden on everyone's pocketbook — yours and mine. Forest fires cost money and

damage our valuable woodlands. Lightning sets some forest fires, but we have no control of lightning. Children cause many fires. Ninety-eight percent of our forest fires result from human carelessness — our carelessness. This, we — you — and I can do something about.

When we require you to obtain a permit for out-of-doors burning or forbid you to burn on days of high fire danger or set up regulations — hours, etc., governing the use of the town dump we are simply protecting yours and the town's interests.

The ever present threat of forest fires is the concern of all of us; the responsibility for preventing them is ours and the costs of extinguishing are ours. We can do something about this problem, by being aware of and alert to the danger and by cooperating with your warden.

Do the things that are required of you —

1. Follow the warden's directions.
2. Secure the required burning permit.
3. Keep your fires under control.
4. Completely extinguish your fires before leaving them.
5. See that your children are properly cautioned.

Everyone will benefit by it.

**PROPOSED ZONING ORDINANCE
for the
TOWN OF LEE, NEW HAMPSHIRE**

**ARTICLE I
Preamble**

Pursuant to authority conferred by Chapter 31, Sections 60-89, N.H. Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, and for the purpose of promoting the health, safety, and welfare of the inhabitants, and preserving the values and charm of the town, the following ordinance is hereby adopted by the Town of Lee, New Hampshire, in official town meeting convened.

**ARTICLE II
Districts**

For the purpose of this ordinance the Town of Lee is divided into the following districts as shown on the official zoning map filed with the Town Clerk and dated March 14, 1962: Residential District; Commercial and Industrial District; Civic Center District; Agricultural District.

**ARTICLE III
General Provisions**

The following provisions shall apply to all districts:

- A. Any use that may be obnoxious or injurious by reason of the production or emission of odor, dust, smoke, refuse matter, fumes, noise, vibration or similar conditions; or any use that is dangerous to the comfort, peace, enjoyment, health or safety of the community or lending to its disturbance or annoyance, is prohibited, with the exception of normal agricultural practices.
- B. The removal of clay, sod, loam, sand, or gravel is permitted—either for private use or for sale—provided that all excavating, handling, processing, and

storage facilities shall be removed and the area shall be re-graded or otherwise covered to assure that the premises are left in a safe and sightly condition and protected against erosion.

- C. No owner or occupant of land shall permit fire or other ruins to be left, but within one year shall remove or refill the same to ground level or shall repair, rebuild, or replace the structure.
- D. Sanitary Protection.
 - 1. No cesspool, septic tank, or sewage disposal area shall be constructed or maintained less than 75 feet from the edge of a public water body; from a well; or from a dwelling other than that to which it is appurtenant.
 - 2. No waste waters or sewage shall be permitted to run free into a public water body or be discharged in any way that may be offensive or detrimental to the health of others. All such waste shall be conveyed away underground through use of an accepted sanitary system or in such a way that it will not be offensive or detrimental to health.
 - 3. All dwellings and sanitary systems shall be constructed and maintained in accordance with standards set and enforced by the N.H. State Department of Health and the N.H. Water Pollution Commission.

ARTICLE IV

Residential District

A building may be erected, altered, or used, and a lot may be used or occupied only for the following purposes and in accordance with the following provisions:

- A. **USES PERMITTED**
 - 1. Single-family and multi-family dwellings (up to

four-family) with private garages and accessory buildings.

2. Churches and religious institutions; hospitals; municipal buildings; parks and playgrounds; private and public schools.
3. Residences may be used to house such customary uses by the owner or tenant as offices for doctor, engineer, architect, lawyer, real estate and insurance or other recognized profession; or such home occupations as hairdressing or dressmaking, except that the number of persons employed at any one location shall not number more than four (4) persons full-time or equivalent, in addition to the owner or tenant.
4. Food and garden produce may be exposed for sale.
5. Property owners of enterprises shall be allowed two advertising signs for products sold on the premises, such signs not to total over fifteen square feet in area; also two signs, not exceeding five square feet each, pertaining to the lease, sale, or use of a lot or building on which placed.
6. Trailers and mobile homes are prohibited.

B. LOT AREA REQUIRED

1. The lot area shall not be less than 40,000 square feet, with a minimum frontage of not less than 200 feet provided, however, that any permitted use may be constructed on a record lot at the time this ordinance becomes effective regardless of the area or width of such lot if the yard and other requirements prescribed are complied with. Vacant lots in the same ownership having in the aggregate a continuous frontage of 100 feet or more shall NOT be subject to this exception.

2. There shall be a front yard on each lot which shall not be less than 25 feet in depth from the front yard lines. Rear and side yards shall not be less than 10 feet from rear and side lot lines, or 25 feet if such line is along a right of way.

ARTICLE V

Commercial and Industrial District

A building may be erected, altered or used, and a lot may be used or occupied only for the following purposes and in accordance with the following provisions:

A. USES PERMITTED

1. Any use permitted in the Residential District under the same provisions as apply to residences in that district.
2. Lodging houses, apartment houses, hotels, motels, tourist courts or cabins, including such retail businesses within these permitted buildings as are conducted for the convenience of the residents or guests.
3. Shops, restaurants, and other retail businesses.
4. Garages, parking lots, and gasoline stations.
5. Outdoor theatres, and golf courses.
6. Business offices and banks.
7. Theatres, halls, and clubs.
8. Trailers, mobile homes; trailer and mobilehome parks.
9. All general farming and forestry activities.

B. LAND REQUIREMENTS

1. There shall be between the edge of the right of way and the extreme front of any building a yard having a minimum depth of 30 feet. No building shall be located within 10 feet of the side property lines.

C. PARKING

1. If any proposed use is such as to attract vehicles, ample spaces shall be provided on the property to accommodate such vehicles attracted by the business or industry.

D. SIGNS

1. Property owners and tenants shall be allowed two advertising signs relating only to the use or uses conducted in the building or on the immediate premises thereof.

ARTICLE VI

Agricultural District

A building may be erected, altered, or used, and a lot may be used or occupied only for the following purposes and in accordance with the following provisions:

A. USES PERMITTED

1. Any use permitted in the RESIDENTIAL DISTRICT under the same provisions as apply to residences in that district except that lot areas shall be governed by Article VI, B1, and yard requirements by Article VI, B2.
2. All general farming and forest activities.

B. LAND REQUIREMENTS

1. No lot shall be less than one acre, and every building lot shall have a minimum lot frontage of 200 feet provided that where lots are located on the exterior of a curving street, a shorter front dimension shall be permitted provided the average width of the lot measured across its center shall be 200 feet.
2. There shall be a front yard on each lot which shall not be less than 25 feet in depth from the front yard line; rear and side yards shall not be less than 10 feet from rear and side lot lines.

C. SIGNS

Directional signs relating to a business operated in the Town of Lee shall be permitted provided that said directional signs for any one enterprise do not exceed one in any two-mile length of road, not including those to indicate change of direction; also that said directional signs cannot be placed within 50 feet of any other sign. Such signs not to total over 15 square feet in area.

D. TRAILERS AND MOBILEHOMES

1. Single trailers and mobilehomes may be located anywhere in this district provided that they meet all land and sanitary protection requirements.

ARTICLE VII

Civic Center District

The Civic Center District shall be restricted to structures and areas for public use only, such as museums, town buildings, churches, parsonages, public schools.

Where buildings are of historic or other significance, but are residential in character, such buildings may be used to house such people as may be necessary.

ARTICLE VIII

Nonconforming Uses

- A. Any nonconforming use may continue in its present use except that any nonconforming use or building may not be:
 1. Changed to another nonconforming use;
 2. Re-established after discontinuance for one year except to a use conforming to the district in which it is located;
 3. Extended in area.

ARTICLE IX

Enforcement

- A. It shall be the duty of the Board of Selectmen, and

- the Board is hereby given power and authority, to enforce the provisions of this ordinance.
- B. The Building Inspector shall issue any and all permits requested when such permit is in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance. Application for a permit shall be made on forms provided by the Building Inspector.
 - C. After passage of this ordinance, it shall be unlawful to erect any building or alter the bulk of any building or relocate any building or change the use of any land or building without first obtaining a permit from the Building Inspector except that no permit shall be required for alterations involving less than \$200.00.
 - D. Upon any well-founded information that this ordinance is being violated, the Selectmen shall take immediate steps to enforce the provisions of this ordinance by seeking injunction in the Superior Court or by any other legal action.

ARTICLE X

Board of Adjustment

Within thirty days after the adoption of this ordinance and thereafter as terms expire or vacancies occur, the Board of Selectmen shall make appointments to a Board of Adjustment of five members conforming in duties to the provisions of Chapter 31 of the N.H. Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955. Thereafter as terms expire or vacancies occur, the appointing authority shall be responsible for filling vacancies and maintaining full membership of the Board of Adjustment. The Board of Adjustment shall conform in membership and term of office to the provisions of Chapter 31, Sections 67-76, N.H. Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955. In addition to the general powers granted said Board by

said Chapter 31, it may, in harmony with and subject to its provisions:

- A. Permit in the Agricultural District an industry which, at public hearing, proves it will meet the following requirements:
 - 1. Be located at least 60 feet from the edge of any right of way, and not less than 20 feet from each side and rear boundary line.
 - 2. Provide adequate parking facilities for:
 - a. Freight and delivery trucks and
 - b. Employee parking
 - 3. Will not offend by reason of the emission of smoke, dust, gas, noise, odor or fumes.

ARTICLE XI

Amendments

This ordinance may be amended by a majority vote of any legal town meeting after such amendment has received a final public hearing by the legislative body, which hearing has been advertised and given a legal fifteen-day notice; or when such amendment has been published in its entirety in the warrant calling for the town meeting.

ARTICLE XII

Penalty

Every person, persons, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined not more than \$10 upon conviction for each day such violation exists.

ARTICLE XIII

Saving Clause

The invalidity of any provision of this ordinance shall not affect the validity of any other provisions.

ARTICLE XIV
When Effective

This ordinance shall take effect upon passage.

ARTICLE XV
Definitions

ACCESSORY BUILDING means a building subordinate to the main building on a lot used for purposes customarily incidental to those of the main building.

FRONTAGE means the length of the lot bordering on the right of way.

FRONT YARD means a space extending for a full width of a lot between the extreme front line of a building and the nearest edge of the right of way.

HOME PRODUCE AND PRODUCTS means and includes everything of an agricultural nature grown, produced, conditioned or otherwise carried on the property of the resident, also such articles as are manufactured or altered by members of the household of the bona fide resident of any property.

HOTEL OR INN means any building or portion thereof where lodging is offered to transient guests for compensation and in which there are more than five sleeping rooms with no cooking facilities in an individual room or apartment.

INDUSTRY is the gainful activity involved in producing, distributing and changing the form of raw materials, or of assembling components and parts, packaging, warehousing, and transporting furnished products. Such production involves the employment of management, labor, machinery and real estate to create tangible products or utility services having value.

JUNK means any old metals, bottles, cotton or woolen mill waste, unfinished cloth, unfinished cotton or woolen mill

yarns, old paper products, two or more unregistered vehicles which are unfit for use on highways, used parts and material, or motor vehicles and other second hand articles, the accumulation of which is detrimental or injurious to the neighborhood.

NONCONFORMING BUILDING OR STRUCTURE. A nonconforming building or structure, the use of which in whole or in part does not conform to the use regulations of the ordinance.

NONCONFORMING USE is a use in any building or structure which does not conform to the use regulations of the District in which such use exists.

RECORD LOT. Land designated as a separate and distinct parcel in a legally recorded deed filed in the Registry of Deeds, Strafford County, New Hampshire.

RIGHT OF WAY means and includes all town, state and federal highways and the land on either side of same as covered by statutes to determine the widths of the rights of way.

SIGN. Any advertisement, announcement, direction or communication produced in whole or in part by the construction, erection, affixing, or placing of a structure on any land or on any other structure, or produced by painting on or posting or placing any printed, lettered, pictured, figured or colored material on any building, structure or surface; provided, however, that signs placed or erected by the Town, State, or Federal Government for the purpose of showing highway or street names or traffic directions or regulations or for other municipal or governmental purposes shall not be included herein, nor shall this include signs which are part of the architectural design of the building.

TOURIST COURT, CABINS, MOTEL mean one or more detached or semi-detached buildings containing guest rooms or apartments with automobile storage space serving such

rooms or apartments provided in connection therewith, which group is designed or used primarily for the accommodation of automobile travelers, including groups designated as tourist courts, cabins, and motel developments.

TOURIST HOME means any place consisting of a room or group of rooms located on one premises where transient accommodations for sleeping or living purposes are provided for a price.

TRAILER PARK OR MOBILEHOME PARK means a land area occupied or designed for occupancy by two or more trailers in use for living purposes.
