TOWN WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Lyme in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Laura Barnes School Auditorium in said Lyme on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers, including a Sexton, all Police Officers and one Constable.
- ARTICLE 2. To see what action the Town will take upon the budget submitted by the Budget Committee.
- ARTICLE 3. To see what compensation the Town will allow its officers and what price will be paid for work on the highways for the year ensuing.
- ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount on all taxes paid before November 1, 1969 at the same rate that the Town pays for money borrowed in anticipation of taxes and to authorize the Collector of Taxes to accept advance payment of property taxes on or after April 1, 1969
- ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes the ensuing year.
- ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) for rebuilding part of the Bailey Road. (Recommended by the Budget Committee)
- ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to join the Upper Valley Development Council, Inc., a corporation duly established under the laws of the State of New Hampshire, for the purpose of the promotion of economic development in the area. (Without recommendation of Budget Committee)
- ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to become a member of a regional planning commission under the provisions of New Hampshire Revised Statutes Chapter 36:38, as amended. (Without recommendation of Budget Committee)
- ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will grant permission to the Lyme Historians, permanent use of the North Room in the Academy Building unless rescinded for just cause.

TOWN WARRANT - 2

- ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the New Hampshire State Tax Commission to conduct a complete appraisal of the Town of Lyme, with a view to eliminating inequities and establishing assessments fair to all. (By petition)
- ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen, School Board, Planning Committee, and Budget Committee acting jointly, but voting as individuals, to appoint a citizen's advisory tax committee consisting of five representative members of the Lyme community. The duties of this committee would be to advise and help the Selectmen in all matters relating to tax assessments. (By petition)

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to add the following section to the Mobile Home Park and Trailer Park Regulations of the Town of Lyme:

"8. A violation of these regulations may be punished by a fine for each offense corresponding to the sum fixed by the New Hampshire state law for violation of town regulations and each day of violation shall be considered a separate offense. In the alternative, the Selectmen may apply to the Superior Court for an injunction to restrain the commencement or continuance of a violation hereof."

(Recommended by the Planning Board)

- ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to negotiate a purchase or exchange of property for the purpose of straightening Trout Brook to prevent erosion at Chase Beach, any necessary expenditures to come from the Recreation Committee reserve fund. (Recommended by the Recreation Committee)
- ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to execute and deliver on behalf of the Town deeds to all tracts of land acquired through non-payment of taxes which may have previous to January 1, 1968 been conveyed by the Town by deeds executed by the Selectmen without the specific authority of the Town Meeting, or by deeds in which there exists some technical defects, in order that the present owners of such tracts may have their titles ratified and confirmed to the extent of the interest which the Town once held in such tracts

ARTICLE 14. (Continued)

including but not limited to Quit Claim Deed of the Town of Lyme to Sam H. Richardson & Harold S. Stone dated June 2, 1955, recorded Book 880, Page 386.

- ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any Real Estate acquired through Tax Collector's Deeds.
- ARTICLE 16. Shall the non-partisan ballot system for the election of town officials be adopted by this Town, to be in effect for the 1970 annual town meeting and for all meetings thereafter until its use is rescinded?
- ARTICLE 17. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF POLICE DEPARTMENT

Early during this term of office we realized that the \$1,000.00 allocated the Police Department for its 1968 operation was inadequate to handle both the expense of answering requests for duty and what we felt to be a minimum of patrol and surveillance work. Because we could not in good conscience eliminate this last item, we chose to overspend the budget in order to provide what we felt to be minimal coverage. As it turned out approximately \$930.00 was spent just on requested duties (we received between 160 and 200 separate requests) and approximately \$400.00 was spent on patrol work from March 12 to December 31, 1968, a period of 9 1/2 months. There were additional expenses in time, mileage and equipment connected with (and these figures are approximate) administration: \$140.00, court appearances: \$115, equipment: \$70.00, funerals: \$35.00 and additional personal services: \$220.00.

Since we do not intend to operate beyond our budget again we have requested an increased allotment of \$2,500.00 for operating expenses. This figure is based upon both our level of activity in 1968 and what we feel should be provided in services in 1969. An attempt to operate the Police Department with a lesser amount of money would be a failure of responsibility on the part of the Town toward its citizens.

The New Hampshire State Police is now in the process of installing a radio network which will tie the town police departments with each other as well as with the State Police. The cost of each radio unit is estimated at \$750.00 and under the Highway Safety Act of 1966 Lyme will probably be able to receive 50% matching funds for such a unit. For this reason we wish to establish an Equipment Reserve Fund this year. If, due to lack of Federal funding or other problems, we should be unable to purchase a mobile radio this year as planned this money will be available in future years to be used for radio or other capital purchases.

The State Police and the Hanover Police Department have been unstinting in their cooperation and have worked with us closely this past year, yet we are often unable to make use of their records and their resources in equipment, manpower, and experience only because we are now unable to communicate with them except by telephone which is frequently cumbersome and inefficient and many times is not available when needed. Lyme is in the exceptionally fortunate position of having a neighboring Department which maintains a radio dispatcher whose services would be available to us 24 hours a day. This offers the Town a communications capability far in excess of what otherwise might be expected for a small, part-time Department with a single radio. It would be irresponsible of us not to take advantage of the unique opportunity offered to us at this time.

LYME HOME HEALTH COMMITTEE Annual Report - 1968

The Lyme Home Health Committee was appointed at Town Meeting last year to form a Lyme Home Health Agency for the town.

After a good deal of study, many consultations with all the federal, state, regional and nearby agencies involved in this kind of work, and making reams of by-laws, policies and job descriptions, the Agency began to function on the first of June, and was accepted by Medicare on July 23rd.

The Agency is set up as a function of the town government, with one selectman sitting on the committee. He is the only member empowered to sign contractual obligations. The other nine members are appointed by the selectmen to serve a term of three years on a rotating basis. They elect their own officers, standing committees, and run the business of the Agency. The committee met as a whole nine times during 1968.

The office, in the basement of the Library, open Tuesday and Thursday mornings from ten to twelve, is equipped with donated file cabinet, typewriter, desk and curtains, and shares a telephone with the Library and the Selectmen.

The Agency provides to all residents of Lyme, home nursing and physical therapy services under orders of the patient's physician. It also provides instruction in maternal and infant care and family health guidance. It is in no way an emergency agency. The nurse made 387 calls on 22 patients in the first seven months of operation.

Service may be obtained by calling 5-2661 during office hours, or the nurse, Mrs. Roger Jenks, 5-2176, early any morning. No service, except under special circumstances, is provided on Saturdays or Sundays.

LYME RECREATION COMMITTEE Annual Report for 1968

Over all, the Recreation Committee reports a successful year in performing its three main functions: 1) organizing and operating the Ford Sayre ski instruction program in Lyme; 2) operating and maintaining the Chase Beach swimming area and providing a program of swimming instruction; and 3) organizing the summer evening band concerts. Thanks to the work of William Pushee, there was a muchused skating rink on the Common, as well.

The number of participants in the ski program showed an increase again this year, with 79 children and 18 instructors. The ski-touring class continued to be popular.

At Chase Beach, 87 children were registered in the swimming program under the competent direction of George Orton and Connie Snow. The popularity of the beach has become such that the Committee is considering ways to restrict the attendance of non-residents. Any suggestions from townspeople concerning this will be appreciated.

Although donations collected at band concerts have remained nearly constant over the last three years, an examination of our financial reports over this period will reveal a large increase in the cost of the bands. We have therefore decided to ask the Town to vote as to whether money should be appropriated to continue this summer evening tradition, and no item for this purpose appears in our 1969 budget. A dance on the Common, organized and operated by several junior high and high school students, was highly successful.

In 1967, the Committee made preliminary application for funds and technical assistance for flooding and erosion control along lower Trout Brook, under the Resources Conservation and Development Project of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. This work was not done last year, as the federal funds were not available. Engineering studies are still being done, and it is hoped that the work can be done in 1969. Under this program, the Federal Government will pay the full engineering and construction costs, while the Town will purchase necessary land or easements and will be responsible for maintenance. We hope that any land purchases can be made out of our reserve fund, without special appropriation.

One of the most urgent needs at Chase Beach is for safe, permanent docks which can be easily installed and removed. The Committee is currently investigating types and prices of docking, and hopes to begin replacing the existing docks on a section-by-section basis over the next several years.

The Committee again appreciates many donations of time and money by townspeople and out-of-towners. We hope interested people will continue to make their criticisms and suggestions known to us.

LYME PLANNING BOARD Annual Report for 1968

At the last Town Meeting a mobile-home park ordinance was passed and a Planning Board formed with instructions to submit subdivision regulations for consideration by the Town.

During the past year the Planning Board met monthly. The mobile home park regulations and permits were reviewed by legal counsel and were found by him to be valid and enforceable. He suggested addition of a section calling for specific penalties, and an article to this effect is included in the 1969 Warrant. Application forms and permits for mobile home parks were drawn up and turned over to the Selectmen. A number of maps of the Town were obtained with much material for future use by the Board. The Board has not completed its review of subdivision regulations. This is on our 1969 agenda. Copies of health and water pollution laws have been obtained by the Board and placed on file.

Members of the Planning Board, in an unofficial capacity as observers, have attended meetings of various groups such as the Upper Valley Development Council, The Connecticut Valley Federal Recreation Development Commission and other groups which may directly or indirectly affect the Town of Lyme.

The Board has requested a budget of \$100 for 1969, to defray necessary expenses.

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REPORT OF THE LYME SCHOOL BOARD

During this time of agitation and ferment in education, Lyme has been blessed with teachers, citizens, and students who are all devoted to the common cause of education. Your school board has worked hard, with the help of many interested citizens, to recommend for Lyme a good school program that we can all be proud of. Lyme does provide the education our children need in an age which makes increasing demands upon all people. At the same time we have omitted any programs, materials, and improvements that are not absolutely necessary so that our school costs will not rise any more rapidly. Great financial strains have been placed upon all of us by the rapid rise in school costs. Much of this has resulted from increases in salaries, which have long lagged behind other pay scales. Also, school programs change more quickly now, as educators need to replace less effective books and programs with more up-to-date materials. One has only to read our local papers to learn that ten-year-old geography books or science programs may be hopelessly outdated. Until some new sources of revenue are found to support our schools, we will try to maintain the excellent education in Lyme with the greatest economy possible.

PROGRAM

One of the most significant developments at the Lyme School during the last year has been the great expansion of the teacher aide program. Although many citizens have helped our teachers in previous years, this year marks the first time that townspeople have participated on a regularly scheduled basis. There are now twenty-five volunteers at the Lyme Schools. Some areas receiving the benefits of our teacher aides are special reading, the kindergarten, and the library and science programs. Help provided by our citizens in this way is allowing the Lyme school to keep pace with developments occurring at schools elsewhere in our area without additional expense. In addition, it has given people the opportunity to find out how our school functions. Individuals wishing to volunteer as teacher aides should contact the principal.

The efforts of many townspeople led to the establishment of a private kindergarten in 1967. With the success of these efforts the town voted to support a public kindergarten last year. This program is now fully integrated with the school, and it is quite clear that children are now entering the first grade better prepared to begin "reading, writing, and arithmetic."

REPORT OF THE COOPERATIVE SCHOOL DISTRICT PLANNING COMMITTEE

Your Cooperative School District Planning Committee has been meeting for the last three years to determine whether a single school district serving children in kindergarten through grade twelve should be formed in this area. Representatives of the existing Dresden, Norwich, Lyme, and Hanover School Districts, plus observers from neighboring communities, have studied such factors as state aid, transportation, administrative supervision, population changes, and school building needs.

Members of the planning committee agree that if no schools existed in the Upper Valley, a newly created school district might include Norwich, Lyme, Hanover and several of the neighboring communities. Such a school district would represent a geographical area in which people work, trade, and benefit from other community services. Within it there would be enough taxable property to support an educational program. The number of students might be neither too large nor too small and residents of the district might be in general agreement upon what kind of education they desire for their children.

However, separate school districts do exist. Local communities take pride in "their" schools and make great efforts to support these to the best of their ability. School building needs have been solved for the moment although this may change shortly because of new state minimum standards and projected population growth.

The curriculum and staff in the Dresden, Norwich, Lyme, and Hanover School Districts are well coordinated through the Supervisory Union staff. Thus, the major advantages to a cooperative school district would, for the moment, be limited to greater administrative efficiency and some expectation of increased state aid for construction. In the opinion of the members of the planning committee, these advantages do not outweigh the disadvantages associated with asking residents of Norwich, Lyme, and Hanover to abandon their local school districts.

The Cooperative School District Planning Committee believes that, although a cooperative school district is desirable and soon may become necessary, no further action should be taken to form such a district at this time. The planning committee recommends that the respective school boards should implement further studies under the new interstate legislation at such time as local needs and conditions may change.
