

This issue of the New Hampton Town Report is dedicated to the memory of Ruth Sanborn Joyce.

For 20 years, serving as an educator at the New Hampton Community School, she shaped the lives of many in the community; and now despite the many physical changes the school has seen, it remains indelibly stamped by her presence.

Her contributions to the community extended beyond the school to the library and recreation department. After her retirement, a scholarship fund was established in her name to provide financial aid to New Hampton's boys.

Ruth's generosity of spirit and willingness to go beyond has been an inspiration to us all. She will not be forgotten.

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### "STATE OF THE COMMUNITY"

In 1986, we received and processed a total of 57 building permits. This year we expect to receive more than double this amount and will be interviewing for a part time building inspector to handle the additional work load. There have been driveway and building permit fees placed into effect to absorb the additional costs for these services.

We have also requested that the Town of New Hampton's Planning Board raise their subdivision fees considerably to offset the rising legal costs that the Town has accrued pertaining to these matters. These increases will take effect very shortly.

As we all are aware, the Town continues to grow at a very rapid pace and more and more demands are placed on our services. In spite of this we have managed to hold our proposed budget to last year's spending levels. Without too sharp an increase in the school budget, and an estimated 1 million dollar increase in our property values, there should be little or no tax increase in 1987.

Two of the most significant issues facing our Town continue to be rapid growth and the Town landfill. This year both are addressed in the Town Warrant. (1) We are asking to establish a Capital Improvement Program which will enable us to plan and control the direction of our future growth, and (2) we are asking that money be placed in a Capital Reserve Fund for the eventual close-out of the Town landfill.

This year, for the first time to our knowledge, we asked Town residents to take an active part and supply input to our proposed budget before it's actual final form. Many good ideas were gleaned from this meeting and a similar meeting will be held next year if the situation warrants.

### **New Hampton Town Meeting**

March 11, 1986

Moderator T. Holmes Moore opened our Town Meeting at 10:00 O'clock AM to have the warrant read through article #3 pertaining to election of Town Officers, Zoning, Mobile Home ordinance and exempt legally blind on property tax to the value of \$15,000.

The remainder of the warrant will be voted upon at the New Hampton Town House, Saturday, March 15, 1986 at 10:00 AM.

At 2:20 PM the moderator accepted our absentee ballots. 57 Ballots received and moderator closed this part of the meeting at 2:40 PM. All ballots were accepted.

The Moderator closed the Town Meeting at 6:00 PM and Mrs. Barbara Chase as supper organizer had tables set up for the Corn Chowder. Bread and biscuits and cream puffs by Katherine Seavey, apple pies and pineapple cheese cake by June Smith.

List of ballot clerks are as follows: Hope Clement, Patricia Torsey, Barbara Chase, Doug Salmon, Bill Clement, Dana Torsey, June Smith, Ralph Huckins, Ralph Ness, Sandy Price, Bill Price and Horace Boynton.

Dana Torsey had been sworn in as ballot clerk, taking the place of Leon Torsey who passed away October 31, 1985.

The Ruth Joyce scholarship fund sold \$255.00 in their annual food sale.

At voting time there were 877 voters in Town; we had 57 absentee votes and 331 regular votes, a total of 388 cast ballots.

Article #1 which read: Are you in favor of the adoption of the Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board? Vote was 212 Yes, 173 No.

Article #2 which read: Are you in favor of the adoption of the Mobile Home Park ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board? Vote was 232 Yes, 145 No.

Article #3 which read: Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:37 for the exemption for the blind from property tax? This statute provides that every inhabitant who is legally blind shall be exempt each year from the property tax on a residence to the value of \$15,000.00. Vote was 289 Yes, 86 No.

### March 15, 1986

Moderator T. Holmes Moore opened our recessed Town Meeting at 10:00 A.M. to have the articles of the Town Warrant voted upon. The Moderator led us in the Salute to the Flag. We sang America the Beautiful without music, done very well. Then Mrs. Edith Youst gave a very nice prayer.

Moderator read Article #4 as follows:

To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

Many questions were asked and questions on amounts of some parts of the budget were questioned. A move to table article till later in the meeting was defeated; a total of \$116,175.00 was agreed upon. The moderator reread article with this total and it was accepted with a unanimous aye vote. Article #4 for \$116,175.00 was accepted.

Moderator read article #5:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sume of \$20,030.00 for the support of the Fire Department.

Bill Clement Moved the article and Michael Drake seconded it.

Moderator reread article and it was accepted with an aye vote.

Moderator read article #6:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,720.00 for equipment for the Fire Department: \$7,020.00 for Pagers and \$1,700.00 for coats, helmets and boots.

Article on motion amended to \$7,475; \$5,775. for pagers and \$1,700. coats, etc., by Bill Clement and Seconded by Hope Clement.

Several questions were answered and Moderator reread article as amended.

Article #6 was accepted with an Aye vote.

Moderator read Article #7:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sume of \$6,000.00 for a new water tank for the 1974 Fire Truck.

Article was moved by Bill Clement and seconded by Barbara Chase.

Bill explained reason. Ken Torsey wanted to know why with a million dollars worth of equipment so many of the firemen were not informed of all the water supplies in the Town. Michael Drake gave a reason for same which will be corrected in the future.

Moderator reread article and it was accepted with an Aye vote.

Article #7 was accepted.

Moderator read article #8:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and approriate the sum of \$78,646.00 for the support of the Police Department.

Article #8 was moved by Chief Salmon and seconded by Dick Hallberg.

Ken Torsey and Bill Ober questioned article. They were answered by Salmon with a motion by Bill Clement and seconded by June Smith to make sum \$77,646.00 which was accepted. Article was reread by Moderator and accepted with an Aye vote.

Article #8 was accepted.

Moderator read article #9:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$13,250.00 to purchase a 1986 Police Cruiser, plus an additional \$750.00 to purchase a used mobile radio to install in this vehicle. The total amount would be \$14,000.00 (By Request, and by Petition)

Article was moved by Chief Salmon and seconded by Pat Schlesinger.

They explained reason for this and answered question on cruisers should be the same, not cut down for expense reasons.

After Salmon had spoken and Pat agreed, Moderator reread article and it was accepted with an Aye vote.

Article #9 for \$14,000.00 was accepted.

Moderator read article #10:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$199,493.73 for the support of the Highway Department; this figure includes \$42,753.73 Highway Block Grant aid.

Joe Powers Jr. Moved the question and Dick Hallberg seconded it.

Joe explained budget and after a long discussion the Moderator reread article and it was accepted.

Article #10 was accepted \$199,493.73.

Moderator read article #11:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$38,860.00 to purchase a new Highway dump truck and spreader.

Dick Hallberg moved question and Horace Boynton seconded it.

Joe Powers Jr. explained and answered questions from June Smith, Ken Torsey, and Dana Torsey. Moderator reread article and article was accepted by an Aye vote.

Moderator read article #12:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$23,000.00 for the principal, plus interest at a variable rate of 60% of prime on the Highway Loader Note.

Horace Boynton moved the question and Joe Powers Jr. seconded it. Joe explained, with his charts, questions given to him.

Moderator reread article and it was accepted by an Aye vote.

Article #12 was accepted. \$23,000.00 plus interest.

Moderator read Article #13:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$17,500.00 for shimming of Town Roads.

Joe Powers Jr. moved question and Dick Hallberg seconded it.

Joe explained what shimming of roads was.

He told what roads in Town needed it.

Moderator reread article and it was accepted \$17,500.00.

Moderator read article #14:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$17,500.00 for oiling of Town Roads.

Moved by Joe Powers Jr. and seconded by Pat Schlesinger.

Joe explained what oiling of roads does.

Moderator reread article and it was accepted by an Aye vote \$17,500.00. Recessed meeting from 12:20 P.M. to 12:50 P.M.

Moderator read article #15.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for the repair of Town Bridges.

Dick Hallberg moved and seconded by Horace Boynton.

Moderator reread article and it was accepted by an Aye vote \$5,000.00.

Kenneth Torsey and Hope Swain presented a Book on the Torsey Clan to the Historical Society.

Moderator read Article #16:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for the repair of Main St.; the State to contribute \$10,000.00 for a total of \$15,000.00.

Bill Clement moved the question and Dick Hallberg seconded it.

Dick explained the situation.

Moderator reread article and it was accepted by an Aye vote.

Moderator read article #17:

Article was moved by Joe Powers, Jr. and seconded by Horace Boynton.

Joe explained what was wrong and the reason for this amount.

After many questions and answers the Moderator reread the article and it was accepted by an Aye vote.

To see if Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,500.00 for the repair of the Highway Department building roof.

Article #17 was accepted.

Moderator read article #18:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,000.00 for the replacement of Ames Brook Bridge on Oxbow Road; the State to contribute \$24,000.00 for a total of \$36,000.00 (By Request).

Article #18 was moved by Kenneth Torsey and seconded by Gordon Huckins.

After article was questioned and answers given the Moderator reread article and it was accepted by an Aye vote.

Moderator read article #19:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,000.00 to improve access to Rte. 104 from the east end of Town House Road. (By Request).

Bernard Smith moved article and Dick Hallberg seconded it. Smith explained the danger of this access and Hallberg said State will approve the situation. After Willis Ober, Dick Masur, Joe Powers talked on subject, Moderator reread article and it was defeated by a No vote.

Moderator read article #20:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$40,300.00, and authorize the withdrawal of \$15,000.00 from the Revenue Sharing Fund to be applied to this amount: \$25,300.00 for test wells and a closure plan for the Town landfill, \$15,000.00 to remove solid waste adjacent to and over the Bank

Article moved by Dick Hallberg, seconded by Horace Boynton. Dick explained about test wells according to the State. Dick Masur, Pat Torsey, Alden Hofling, Joe Powers Jr. and Dick Hallberg all spoke on this situation.

Moderator reread article and it was accepted by an Aye vote.

Article #21 was read by Moderator:

To see if Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,262.78 for the support of Regional Associations: Community Action Program \$2,798.00; Bristol Community Center \$1,304.00; Lakes Region Planning Commission \$1,125.00; Newfound Area Nursing Association \$4,480.00; Inter-Lakes Day Care Center \$555.78.

Article was moved by Mike Coleman, seconded by Horace Boynton.

Mike Coleman tried to clarify article and ran into many problems. June Smith made a motion to delete \$555.78 for Inter-Lakes Day Care Center from the total; the motion was seconded by Dana Torsey. The Moderator put it to a hand vote and the motion was accepted 31 Ayes and 21 Nos. Then the amount of \$4,480.00 for Newfound Area Nursing Ass'n was changed to \$4,840.00, a typographical error.

After discussion the Moderator reread article to read \$10,067.00 total; the vote was in the affirmative.

So article #21 was accepted to total \$10,067.00.

The Moderator read article #22:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 to be placed in the Property Reappraisal Capital Reserve Fund for the revaluation of the Town by the Appraisal Division of the Department of Revenue Administration.

Horace Boynton moved article and Dick Hallberg seconded it.

Boynton explained the article and after questions the Moderator reread article and it was accepted with an aye vote.

Moderator read article #23:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for repairs to the Town House.

Dick Hallberg moved article and Bernard Smith seconded it.

Dick explained the reason. The Moderator reread article and it was voted and accepted with an aye vote.

Moderator read article #24:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,730.00 as our share of the cost of operating the Newfound Ambulance Service for one year.

Horace Boynton moved article and Bill Clement seconded it.

Pat Torsey, June Smith, and Bill Clement discussed article.

Moderator reread article and it was accepted by an aye vote.

Moderator read article #25:

To see if the Town will vote to raise \$1,000.00 to fund the Zoning Board of Adjustment if the Zoning Ordinance is passed.

Chet Butcher moved article and Bill Clement seconded it.

Dick Masur, Pat Schlesinger, Pat Torsey, Dana Torsey, Chet Butcher spoke. They asked for a show of hands. The Moderator reread article and the shown hands were 42 ayes and 18 nays.

Article #25 was accepted.

The Moderator read article #26:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the care of cemeteries.

Bill Clement moved article and Horace Boynton seconded it.

A yearly article, reread by the Moderator and a full aye vote was accepted.

Moderator read article #27:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the support of the New Hampton Community Kindergarten. June Smith moved article and Eileen Kondrad seconded it.

Pat Torsey and Dick Masur spoke on article.

After discussion the Moderator reread article and it was accepted with an aye vote.

The Moderator read article #28:

Article was moved by Bill Clement and seconded by Hope Clement.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$900.00 for Patriotic purposes.

Edith Youst explained this will reactivate the old programs which we used to have. June Smith spoke; then Moderator reread article and it was accepted with an aye vote.

Moderator read article #29:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$625.00 as our share for the Pemi-Baker Solid Waste Planning District.

Horace Boynton moved article and Dick Hallberg seconded it.

Boynton explained the monies was our share of the cost.

Moderator reread article and it was accepted with an aye vote.

Moderator read article #30:

The Moderator recessed from 5 minutes of 3:00 P.M. to 5 minutes past 3:00 P.M. Article reread by Moderator and Pat Schlesinger moved article and Gordon Huckins seconded it.

Pat, Gordon Huckins, Fran Wendleboe spoke on article.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the New Hampton Conservation Commission.

Moderator reread article and it was accepted with an aye vote.

Moderator read article #31:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the support of the Hospitals: Mary Hitchcock Memorial, Franklin Regional General, Lakes Region General Hospital, Sceva Speare Memorial Hospital.

Horace Boynton moved article and Pat Schlesinger seconded it.

Horace explained the article. After discussion the Moderator reread article and an ave vote was accepted.

Moderator read article #32:

To see if the Town will vote to accept from Alfred Jenness a gift of a tract of land (6.3 acres) which contains the Cold Spring on Carter Mountain Road.

Dick Hallberg moved article and Mr. Ober seconded it.

After a short discussion the Moderator reread article and received and aye vote in acceptance.

Moderator read article #33:

To see if the Town will vote to employ computers for the purpose of printing Tax Bills, Ledgers, Voters checklists and any other uses which may be necessary.

Elaine Seaver moved article and Dick Hallberg seconded it.

Elaine explained article. Edwin Huckins said we were in violation of laws in effect without this vote by the Town.

Moderator reread article and it was accepted with an aye vote.

Moderator read article #34:

To see if the Town will vote to have Pinnacle Hill Road from Route 132 in New Hampton Village to the Meredith Town Line, and Meredith Ridge Road from Pinnacle Hill Road to the Meredith Town Line designated as Scenic Roads, Pursuant to RSA 231: 157, 231: 158 (By Petition).

Moved by Cynthia Lathrop and seconded by Larry Blood.

A long discussion by Pat Schlesinger, Larry Blood, June Smith, Gordon Huckins, Hope Swain, Bernard Smith, Dick Masur, Dana Torsey, Norma Jean Moore, Dick Hallberg and others.

An amendment was defeated.

The Moderator reread article and asked for a paper ballot.

Aye 49 and 13 No. Article was accepted.

Moderator read article #35:

To see if the Town will vote to create a buffer zone of 300 feet back from the highwater mark on the Pemigewasset River to be dedicated for use of Conservation and Recreation (By Petition).

Lillian McCrelis moved article and Pat Schlesinger seconded it.

After many speaking pro and con June Smith asked for a ballot vote, seconded by Larry Blood. Yes 10 No 52. Article was defeated.

Moderator read article #36:

To see if the Town will vote to prohibit and oppose the burial, storage, transportation and production of high level radioactive waste in the Town and State, and further, to call on the legislature and Governor to pass law that any New Hampshire radioactive waste agreements will be subject to approval by the state-wide referendum, and further, to call on Congress to investigate the prudence of the Department of Energy's present plan for nuclear waste disposal (By Petition).

Moved and seconded. Moderator reread article and it was accepted by an aye vote.

Moderator read article #37:

To see if the Town will vote to rescind the action of Town Meeting March 17, 1979, Article 17, and to transfer the accrued account into a Capital Reserve Fund for Conservation and Recreation Department: the Conservation Commission to be designated agent for the Fund.

Pat Schlesinger moved to amend article to read: To see if the Town will vote to rescind the action of Town Meeting March 17, 1979 article #16 to transfer the accrued account to the Conservation Commission Fund under RSA 36:A5, as noted in Article 17 same meeting. Seconded by Dick Hallberg. Moderator had an aye vote to accept this amendment. The Moderator read article as amended and received an aye vote of Acceptance.

Moderator read article #38 which was dropped from the warrant by acceptance of Zoning ordinance.

Moderator read article #39:

To see if the Town will vote to amend the building Regulations for Flood Hazard Areas to read:

Add Preamble: The Following regulations shall apply to all lands designated flood hazard areas by the Federal Emergency Management Agency in its Flood Hazard Boundary Map for the Town of New Hampton, dated April 2, 1986, which is declared to be part of this ordinance.

Amend Section II: Add "The Building Inspector shall review proposed developments to assure that all necessary permits have been applied for and received from those governmental agencies for which approval is required

by Federal or State Law, including Section 404 of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act Amendments of 1972, 33 U.S.C. 1334. It shall be the responsibility of the Applicant to certify these assurances to the building inspector."

Amend Section IV: Add "Mobile homes shall be achored to resist floatation, collapse or lateral movement by providing over-the-top frame ties to ground anchors. Specific requirements shall be that (A) over-the-top ties be provided at each of the four corners with two additional ties per side at intermediate locations and mobile homes less than 50 feet long shall require one additional ties per side; (B) frame ties be provided at each corner with five additional ties per side at intermediate points and mobile homes less than 50 feet long shall require four additional ties per side; (C) all components of the anchoring system shall be capable of carrying a force of 4800 pounds and (D) any additions to the mobile home shall be similarly anchored."

Amend Section V: Add "The Term substantial improvements" does not include either: (A) any project for improvement of a structure in order to comply with existing State or local health, sanitary, or safety code specifications which are solely necessary to assure safe living conditions, or (B) any alteration of a structure listed on the National Register of Historic Places or a State Inventory of Historic Places."

Amend Section VI to read Section VII.

Amend Section VII to read Section VIII.

Add New Section VI: 1.) "The Building Inspector shall maintain for public inspection and furnish upon request, any certification of flood-proofing and information on the elevation (in relation to mean sea level) of the level of the lowest floor (including basement) of all new or substantially improved structures and include whether or not such structures contain a basement. and if the structure has been flood proofed, the elevation (in relation to mean sea level) to which the structure was flood proofed. This information must be furnished by the applicant. 2.) "The Building Inspector shall obtain, review, and reasonably utilize any 100 year flood elevation data available from a Federal. State or other source, until such other data has been provided by the Administrator, as criteria for requiring that (A) all new construction and substantial improvements of residential structures have the lowest floor (including basement) elevation to or above the 100 year level, and (B) that all new construction and substantial improvements of non-residential structures have the lowest floor (including basement) elevated or flood-proofed to or above the 100 year flood level."

Bill Clement moved and Horace Boynton seconded this article. After a discussion by Pat Torsey, Dana Torsey, Dick Masur, Fran Wendlboe, Wallace Orvis, the Moderator received an aye vote.

Article #39 was accepted.

Moderator read article #40:

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept on behalf of the Town any Federal or State funds which may be made available during 1986. Further to see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to make application for said funds and then expend the same for the purpose designated with applicable Federal and State regulations.

Dick Hallberg moved article, Horace Boynton seconded it.

No discussion, Moderator received an aye vote after rereading the article.

Moderator read article #41:

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes.

Moved by Dick Hallberg, seconded by Horace Boynton.

No discussion. Moderator reread article and received an aye vote of acceptance.

Moderator read article #42:

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Tax Collector to accept prepayment of Taxes.

Dick Hallberg moved article and several people seconded it.

The Moderator received no discussion and had an aye acceptance vote.

The Moderator read article #44:

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to trade off or sell any unusable equipment or materials.

Dick Hallberg moved article and Horace Boynton seconded it.

Ken Torsey asked one question and then the Moderator received an aye vote of acceptance.

Moderator read article #43:

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of property acquired by Tax Collectors deeds.

Moved by Dick Hallberg and seconded by Horace Boynton.

Ken Torsey gave a short discussion then Moderator received an aye vote of acceptance.

Moderator read article #45:

To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Willis Ober wanted to know why the back of the Town Hall was not finished last year. Person who was doing it had no Insurance so had to be stopped.

Dick Masur wanted to have all meetings in paper so that all Townsfolk can know about them.

Pat Torsey reminded the Townspeople of the School meeting 7:30 P.M. next Wednesday.

Joseph Powers Jr. made a motion that the Selectmen for 1987 compensate themselves with a rate comparable to current area standards. Seconded and passed.

After a little small talk, the meeting was adjourned at 5:30 P.M.

# **Annual Police Report for 1986**

The demand for the services on the Police Department has increased more than I had anticipated. I had hired the third full-time Officer in June of this past year, this took some of the work load off of myself and Doug Smith. Unfortunately, this person did not work out and has resigned from the Department. His resignation was handed in on January 26, 1987. Since that time I have not filled the full time position. I have hired a part-time man to help keep the overtime down. This part-time man is Kenneth Hamel, he lives in the Town.

During this past year, Belknap County Sheriff's Office, our dispatch, recorded 3,446 calls for our Department. In 1985 there were only 2,696 calls. We covered 68 motor vehicle accidents in 1986: 1 fatal, 20 with personal injury, and 47 with property damage over \$500.00.

During this past year the Department went to the New Hampton Community School and fingerprinted the children and gave the Child Registry Handbooks to the parents to hold onto. I hope the day never comes that I will have to ask for one of those books back. If there is anyone else in the Town whose child or children have not been fingerprinted and who would like to have this done please call the Police Department on Tuesday, Wednesday, or Thursday 9:00 am - 3:00 pm for an appointment. However I only have approximately 50 books left; if there is enough demand I will reorder them.

The 1986 Plymouth Gran Fury is running very well and it will have approximately 20,000 miles on it by Town Meeting. The 1985 Plymouth Gran Fury is fair and it will have 95,000 miles on it at Town Meeting. I feel that we can make it one more year on the 1985 cruiser. I have allowed some money for a larger than normal problem due to the high mileage on the 1985. The Low-Profile 1986 cruiser is working out very well. I have only heard a couple complaints on the fact that people could not see the lights on the bumper in the front. I will be putting in a new type of bulb and changing them to strobe. There will be the same lights left in the rear window.

As you can see, I am not asking for any main line items such as a new cruiser, radios or major expense items. I kept the budget as low as possible. I have however increased the amounts of pay for the employees. The reason for that is in hopes to keep up to or close to the area Towns' pay scale. The only way that this Town is going to be able to keep its help is to be competitive in the areas of pay, benefits, and working conditions.

Last item - there will be once again this year a Dog Clinic. The details will be in three area newspapers once the time gets closer and we have a definite date and time.

# New Hampton Fire Department 1986 Report

1986 was not a good year all in all, as we had one complete loss of a mobile home, and one frame house. Fires in old mobile homes are very fast travelling and do not afford much time to alert, get out, and extinguish. We had 74 fire related calls of which 11 were structure calls — 4 intown; 17 chimney; 11 vehicle fires; 11 forestry, and several other minor categories such as dryer fires, smoke investigations, additional response to other towns and 61 medical calls

The water tank was replaced in the 1974 International and the 1985 Ford was returned for 1 day to have its tank repaired under warranty. As of now all units have non-leaking tanks.

In the forthcoming years, the Fire Department must look at a replacement schedule of vehicles that will continue to give the town the best possible equipment. Our 1961 International should be considered to be replaced in 1988 at the latest, and ten years from then we should replace the 1974 International. This give each unit a life time of nearly 30 years. In terms of the 1961, it will soon be difficult and expensive to find replacement parts to keep the unit operational. Also in the next few years, we should be replacing the rescue van with a larger unit.

Buy and install smoke detectors. Public buildings and rental apartments must have them and private homes should.

# Report Of Town Forest Fire Warden And State Forest Ranger

Between July 1985 and June 1986, we experienced fewer fires than normal. The two leading causes of forest fires were again children and fires kindled without written permission of a Forest Fire Warden. Both causes are preventable, but only with your help.

Please help our town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. Contact your Forest Fire Warden for more information.

Enforcement of a state timber harvest regulation is the responsibility of State Forestry officials. Our state has excellent timber harvest regulations; however, your assistance is needed.

If you know of a logging operation and suspect a state timber harvest law may be violated, call your Forest Fire Warden.

If you own forest land, you will become responsible for the timber tax payment starting April 1, 1986. This is a change in the Timber Tax Law that will impact all forest landowners. Contact your Board of Selectmen for timber tax forms.

In order to be better prepared for emergencies we have purchased two cold water rescue suits and a heavy duty suction unit. With the increase in population and the opening up of more river and pond recreation we have directed our goals to being prepared for water rescue. One of our great needs is a boat and motor. If someone in the community has one for sale or would like to donate one to the department it would be greatly appreciated. We have three certified divers on the squad and have used them once this year for an underwater search.

Again, it should be pointed out that if you need emergency first aid or help you should call Lakes Region Dispatch at 524-1545 as this will be the quickest way to get help.

We very much appreciate your continued support in keeping this service going.

## Newfound Ambulance Rescue

#### 1986 REPORT

The second year of Newfound Ambulance Rescue's service to Bristol and the surrounding Newfound Area including the Towns of Alexandria, Bridgewater, Danbury, Hebron and New Hampton, saw an increase of 32 in number of calls from the previous year for a 1986 total of 365. A breakdown of number of calls per town is shown below.

It was also a busy year in several other significant ways. The fund drive. started the year before, was brought to a successful conclusion, having raised over \$36,000,00 for the purchase and equipping of a new ambulance. In the early months of the year an order was placed for a Wheeled Coach Type II Ambulance. The new Ford vehicle arrived in Bristol in the spring and was phased into service during the summer. The Town's original 1973 ambulance went to the Hebron Fire Department where it is being converted to Rescue/Utility use and hopefully will continue to serve the Newfound Lake area several more years in that capacity.

The ambulances moved into a "new" station in April. With the move of Bristol's Water and Sewer Departments to new quarters, the lower level garage area of Bristol's old Fire Station became available. The two ambulances now share these quarters with the Bristol Police Department, Repair and improvements to the garage doors, especially the addition of an electric opener on the ambulance door has improved response time. The ambulances had previously been housed in private garage and barn space.

A major step in continuing efforts to upgrade the level of pre-hospital care. made available to residents of the service area, was the delivery of a Defibrillator in late December. Ambulance attendants will be receiving training and certification in the use of this very valuable life saving machine in early months of 1987.

With the co-operation of the State E.M.S. Office arrangements were concluded to hold an Emergency Medical Technician (E.M.T.) course in Bristol during the first quarter of 1987.

### **New Hampton Highway Department**

1986 was a busy and productive year for the Highway Department. The implementation of our shimming and resurfacing programs were an important part of the department's accomplishments. We plan to continue these in an effort to improve our paved roadways.

The replacement of the 1975 L-800 with a new 1986 L-8000 has substantially improved our capacity to clear and treat the roadways and we are very pleased with its performance. This year's equipment replacement schedule will include replacement of the 1981 Chevy one ton and setting aside dollars for the replacement of the 1975 Clark grader in 1988.

When the anticipated growth within the community becomes a reality we will see several miles of roadway added to our system. I feel we can effectively meet these demands as long as we continue to live up to our present equipment replacement schedule. Our greatest concern and shortcoming is our limited capacity to treat back roadways when storms and poor weather conditions make these roads unsafe and the public demands continuous access from these outer areas.

I am concerned with the growth on many of our so called "back roads", when you consider the fact that we have only added about 600 feet of paved roadway to our system in the last twelve years. I believe we are rapidly losing ground in that area and it is of critical importance that we begin to address this situation.

### Report of New Hampton Landfill and Pemi-Baker Solid Waste Planning Board - 1986

Directives from the New Hampshire Bureau of Solid Waste Management have moved the Town in several directions: 1. Hiring Dubois & King to dig test pits for water contamination results. 2. The acquiring of closure plans. 3. Removing scrap metal in June. 4. Monitoring the landfill with attendant. 5. Removing the debris from the eastern slope (per order of State of New Hampshire).

The Selectmen have been studying results of new inspections and the hydrogeologic study from Dubois & King and have plans to put new dump regulations into effect on April 1, 1987. Signs are being made to assist with the new regulations.

Selectmen Horace Boynton or Linda Morgan, Arthur Seavey, and Patricia Schlesinger attend monthly meetings of the Pemi-Baker Solid Waste Planning Board. Each of twelve towns has one vote on this Board. The purpose of the Board is to plan the future of solid wastes for these twelve towns. During 1986 the planning board discussed several options but in late December voted unanimously to buy the Plymouth solid waste facility, buy a new state-of-theart incinerator and an ash landfill in Rumney.

The next step for the Pemi-Baker Solid Waste Planning Board is to appropriate funds to draw up engineers plans, financial analysis and legal contracts. Each town has been assessed according to the percentage of their waste production. 6.6% is New Hampton's share.

The Selectmen and Pemi-Baker Solid Waste Planning Board are now waiting for the vote of the twelve towns as well as Plymouth's okay from voters to sell.

## New Hampton Conservation Commission

The concept of a Pemigewasset River management plan, initiated by the Conservation Commission last January, has taken hold in many towns of the valley. Selectmen, planning board and conservation commission members from nine towns met through this year to draw an overlay zoning plan to be submitted to each town's Planning Board and a Master Plan insert, calling for a Pemigewasset River corridor protection plan. The plan requires building setback and lot frontage of 200 feet, and septic setback of 125 from the river. Excavations requiring permits would be prohibited in the 500-foot protected corridor (1000' in flood plain).

Plymouth included the Baker River for their voters at town meeting. Ashland enthusiastically approved the plan and overlay zoning in their November election. Five other towns and the New Hampton Planning Board, as of this writing, are working on their participation. The first Pemigewasset River Day in June, hosted by New Hampton, had participants from Londonderry. We plan another this June. Active New Hampton members of the Pemigewasset River Council are Dave Erler, Lil McCrelis, Nancy Park, Bob Fischer and I which represents the Conservation Commission, Planning Board and river-owner participation. The ad-hoc committee meeting this year became incorporated as a nonprofit organization with the Secretary of State's office on December 1, 1986.

The commission was encouraged by support received from the townspeople, Selectmen and NH Wetlands Board this year. The Board denied a permit for road construction in the Magoon Brook wetland at the Pemi River in March and recently issued a \$2,000 fine to a resident at Lake Winona for dumping debris into the lake. Other wetlands permits were reviewed, some approved and granted as submitted; two others discussed changes with the commission and were then granted.

The Army Reserve unit has cranes and other large equipment at the Conservation Area and Captain Peter Hall reports they will attempt work in January along the shorefront, if they can successfully break through the ice. Highwater at the frontage inhibited work at the site for the past months. The condition is being resolved. The commission met in Manchester some months ago with the unit's commanding officer to clarify plans.

Dave Erler led two walks at the area, one on wetlands and the other on ferns. Both well attended and everyone looking forward to more of Dave's walks this year.

Young and old enjoyed Kite Day in May at the Conservation Area. Guests came from Rumney, Holderness and Meredith.

Shawn Makris and his Boy Scout troop cleared brush and trees at the farmsite; a very welcome improvement. Shawn, working on his Eagle Scout badge, organized construction of an outhouse at the Conservation Area but we were distressed to find it deliberately torn apart and dismantled after a few weeks.

Bill Huckins reactivated the old family spring and by gravity feed we now have water at the farmhouse site again. Bill always responds to such requests. It's a joy. The water has Water Supply and Pollution Control approval.

With great disappointment, we accepted the resignation of Josette Hofling this year. Mrs. Hofling serving since 1978 gave many hours to wetlands and logging inspections and decisions. Her interest in horses and wildlife added a special dimension to commission work. Dr. William C. Walsh also asked to be relieved of his commitment. He has been serving since the first Conservation Commission appointments in 1970. Two large concerns of the first members, Lester Youst, Tom Urie and Bill Walsh, were the cleanup of the river and tree planting on Main Street. Jobs completed and well done. Bill has been through the thick of property acquisitions and logging computations. We'll miss you, Bill and Josette, but will call on you for special tasks!

Stewart Rand carved a wonderful sign for the Alfred Jenness Natural Area, Cold Spring and it was unveiled by Randy Marshall, Stewart's sister and Gordon Huckins, Selectman, December 14, with Alfred joined by his daughter, Barbara Wood, and many of his friends from town.

We received expertise from Rick DeMark, Soil Conservation Service and David Lorch, Belknap County Conservation District again this year. Dave is so enthusiastic with the Pemigewasset River Council, he volunteered to be secretary.

### **Zoning Board Of Adjustment**

After the vote in the affirmative to have zoning, the Selectmen appointed the following members: Dana Torsey, Robert Moulton, Michael Coleman and William Clement, with Gordon Huckins as Selectman representative. We feel that these standards are minimum and that with respect to life safety, all units entering New Hampton should meet these requirements.

We, as a Board, feel that zoning is a necessary part of the controlled growth of New Hampton and urge all citizens to consider the pros and cons and its effects on the Town.

The health care delivery system will recognize home care as a vital component as the need for home care increases in the future. A strong community based not-for-profit home health agency such as N.A.N.A. will therefore continue to be an important and valued asset.
