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

# Warrant for the One Hundred and Forty-fifth Annual Town Meeting

# STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L.S)

To the inhabitants of the Town of Northfield, N. H., in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Nortfield on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for same.
- 3. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repairing of highways and bridges, oiling streets, and repairing sidewalks.
- 4. To see if the town will vote to accept state aid and appropriate money for the same.
- 5. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for highway maintenance.
- 6. To see how much money the town will vote to raise to defray the expense of Memorial Day.
- 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 for District Nurse. (By request.)

8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to grade, macadamize, and oil Howard Avenue. (By request.)

9. To see of the town will vote to raise \$200.00 to defray the expenses of a number of Band Concerts (10 at least) to be given during the summer months of 1925. (By request.)

10. To choose a Trust Fund Trustee for three years.

11. To see if the Town will vote to accept and adopt the reports of Town Officers as printed.

12. To transact any other business that may come before said meeting.

13. To see if the Town will vote to repair the inside of the Town Hall, redecorate, put in a furnace, and a new toilet, and make other necessary repairs, and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$2,000.00 for same. (By petition.)

#### Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the School Boards and Citizens of Northfield and Tilton:

I herewith submit my tenth annual report as superintendent of schools. Ten years is a long period to serve a community in such a capacity and this extended service has been possible only by the continued forbearance of school boards and citizens. It may be of interest to you to learn that only three other superintendents in the state have had as long a period of service in the communities which they are now serving.

Tilton School is entering upon a campaign to secure funds for the erection of a modern administration and recitation building and a central heating plant, and for making other much needed improvements. The need of a recitation building is imperative. The present recitation rooms are poorly lighted and ill adapted to the use to which they are put. They compare most unfavorably with the recitation rooms at our Union School building.

Although Tilton School is a private institution from the standpoint of general control and management, yet, under the law "it is deemed a high school" for this community. It is one of the small group of schools which are generally called semi-public high schools.

Under the law any school district may make a contract with an academy or high school located in the state and raise and appropriate money to carry the contract into effect, and the school with which such a contract is made "shall be deemed a high school maintained by the district." About six years ago the Tilton Union and Tilton Town school districts made contracts with Tilton School; and a year later the Northfield school district made a similar contract.

Tilton School agreed to furnish all secondary school privileges to the children of these districts, such privileges to include not merely instruction but the use of textbooks and supplies. No fees were to be charged for any of the regular courses. In other words Tilton School agreed to give to the boys and girls everything which a public high school would be expected to give. The several districts agreed to pay Tilton School sixty dollars per pupil per year.

These contracts have been renewed from time to time and now the districts are paying to the School one hundred dollars per year per pupil. The enrolment from these districts in the fall were as follows: From Tilton Union, 41 boys, 47 girls; from Tilton Town, 10 boys, 13 girls; from Northfield, 2 boys, 6 girls; the total being 53 boys and 66 girls, 199 pupils in all. This was something more than one-third of the total enrolment of the School. Pupils from our 8th grades pass naturally on to Tilton School, precisely in the same way as they would to an ordinary high school. From a legal standpoint and from an educational standpoint this is our high school and we should so think of it.

We should understand that in case our local districts had no contracts with the school the districts would legally pay only \$70 of the amount of tuition for each of the pupils attending. This means that the balance of the tuition would have to be met by the individual parent. Since the regular tuition rate for day pupils is \$150, it would appear that the individual parent would be called upon to pay \$80.

The advantage of these contracts to parents having children attending school is very apparent. Since these contracts were made there has been a steady increase in the number of local pupils enrolled. We have now as many pupils enrolled as there were enrolled 25 years ago in the entire school.

Tilton School occupies a position as near that of a regular publicly maintained high school as it is perhaps possible for a private institution to assume.

If there were no Tilton School there is no question but what this community would have a public high school. I am quite sure there is no other community in the state, with two or three exceptions, where the population is at least 1,500 which does not have such a school, and in these communities which are the exception, we find precisely the same situation which we have here in Tilton—a private institution under contract to furnish high school education to the children.

There are in the state about 80 full four year public high schools. The cost of maintaining these schools varies from \$72.15 to \$267.50 per pupil, and the average throughout the state is \$133.67 per pupil. This cost includes instruction, general supplies, maintenance and operation of building and cost of administration, but does not include any extraordinary repairs on building. As stated above we are paying to Tilton School \$100 per pupil per year. It is quite possible that we might be able to run a high school at no greater expenditure per pupil but there is a serious question whether the general character of the instruction would be as satisfactory as that which the pupils are now receiving. Furthermore, before such a school could be possible there would be necessary an initial outlay

of at least \$75,000—and probably this is much too low an estimate—for a school building. Looking at the matter from a purely financial standpoint, it is evident that the present arrangement is to the advantage of the school districts.

I called attention a year ago to the decreased registration at the Union school. The average membership for last year was only two hundred and eighty-three. This was a decrease of twenty-eight from the previous year. Our enrollment this year shows no further decrease. During the last year the superintendent made 149 visits to schools and attended seven meetings of the school board.

Forty-one pupils were graduated from the eighth grade last June. The operetta, Yanki San, was given by the school in a pleasing manner. The certificates of graduation were presented by Mr. Dixon F. Vancore, chairman of the school board. Thirty-two of the graduates entered high school in the fall.

Four new teachers began work in September. Miss Theda Melvin, a graduate of Keene Normal School, succeeded Miss Ethel Colby in the third grade. Miss Colby was one of our tried and faithful teachers and we very much regretted her resignation. Miss Helen Gilmore, a graduate of Plymouth, succeeded Miss Rose McCormick in grade five. Miss McCormick resigned to accept a better position in Concord. The position in the upper grades made vacant by the resignation of Miss Helen Thompson Randall was filled by the appointment of Miss Anita Aldrich, a graduate in the three year course at Keene. We were fortunate in securing Miss Gertrude M. Burnham to succeed Miss Greaves as principal of the school. Miss Burnham is a graduate of Fitchburg Normal School and

has done summer work at Plymouth and at New Hampshire State University. Last year she was assistant principal of the Plymouth Training School. Miss Burnham's fine spirit, her excellent judgment and her tactful ways have won for her the confidence and respect of teachers and pupils. With a fine corps of teachers we are having a successful year of school.

The work in grades seven and eight is entirely departmental. These two grades are organized practically as a junior high school. Miss Burnham teaches the History and Geography; Miss Aldrich, the English and Science; Mrs. Meserve, the Mathematics and Sewing; Miss Josephine Emery the Drawing and Manual Training, and Mrs. Worthen the Music.

Miss Mary E. Davis, our school nurse, who is on leave of absence, is missed by the boys and girls of the school to whom she has always been a real friend.

The school board deemed it wise to increase the insurance on the school property, so that now there is \$55,000.00 on the building and \$5,000.00 on the furnishings. Additional fire extinguishers have been placed in the building. All the outside doors have been equipped with emergency exit release bars. It is impossible to lock these doors so but that they can always be opened on the inside by a simple pressure on the release bar. There has been no other outlay for improvements or repairs on the building during the year. I would recommend that if possible before another year the window shades which are expensive to maintain and very unsatisfactory be replaced with a shade better adapted to a schoolroom.

The budget of the school board calls for an appropriation a little in excess of last year's. This increase is in part due

to the need of more money for high school tuition.

TILTON TOWN DISTRICT

The school year which ended last June was a reasonably successful one. The total number of different pupils in the schools was ninety-nine, the average membership was eighty-five, and the per cent of attendance was ninety-four. The superintendent made seventy-two visits to schools and attended five meetings of the school board. The year at Lochmere was somewhat broken. Miss Bullis, who substituted during the winter term, resigned and Mrs. Frances Morrison completed the year in a successful manner.

Of the teachers who were with us last June, Mrs. Abbott at Sanborn Road was the only one to return in September. I am glad to testify to the fine work which Mrs. Abbott continues to do in this school. It is always a pleasure to visit here. Miss Mina Pike who taught so long at Lochmere succeeded Miss Cushing at No. Four. Miss Beth Swett of Andover succeeded Mrs. Morrison at Lochmere. Miss Swett is proving herself an interested, conscientious teacher. Miss Elsie Elliott of Contoocook, a graduate of Plymouth, succeeded Miss Grieve at Tin Corner. This school continues small. These children would be much better off in a larger school. The reasonable place for them is at the Union school in the village, but this is impossible under the present conditions.

There are eleven pupils from this district attending the Union school in grades seven and eight. Five of these are from Lochmere, five from No. four, and one from Tin Corner. For this pupil from Tin Corner the tuition charge is paid by the parent. I would again recommend that the seventh as well as the eighth grade from Lochmere be sent to the Union school. The annual tuition rate which we pay

for each pupil is \$45.00. The cost per pupil of average membership for maintaining the Union school is \$63.33 per pupil. It will be seen that this tuition charge is not excessive. The increased advantages which this school offers should be considered and appreciated.

The cost per pupil of average membership for maintaining our schools is \$72.92. The state average is about \$70.00. The cost varies from \$41.80 to \$176.33. There are 252 school districts in the state. In but twenty of these districts is the current cost of public education per \$1,000 of equalization valuation less than it is in this district.

No extensive repairs have been made on school buildings during the year. There is need of considerable outlay on the Tin Corner building. It would be poor economy to let this go longer. I have referred before to the need of new fences at Sanborn Road and No. Four. I am in hopes that it may be possible to care for these needs before another year.

I have repeatedly mentioned the unfortunate and dangerous location of the Lochmere school. This matter was brought before the last school meeting and discussed at some length. A committee was appointed to study the conditions and to make a report at the coming school meeting. I think we are all agreed that some solution of the problem must be found, and I feel confident that the district will be prepared to act at the proper time.

In the budget the school board has stated in detail the needs for the next fiscal year. An increased amount is asked for to meet the transportation costs. It has been found advisable to transport one way small children from the Plains to the No. Four school. There are ample funds on hand to meet all necessary expenses for the remainder of

the school year and there should be a balance in the treasury at the close of the year of at least \$300.00.

#### NORTHFIELD DISTRICT

For the year ending last June the total enrollment in all schools was seventy-seven, the average membership was seventy-five, and the per cent of attendance was ninety-five. I refer you to the roll of honor for the names of the nine pupils whose good health and determination made it possible for them to have a perfect record in attendance. The superintendent made seventy-three visits to schools and attended eight meetings of the school board.

This present year the enrollment is but sixty-one. The Tibbetts, Rand, and Hodgdon schools are small. Unless conditions change I would recommend that the Rand and Tibbetts schools be united another year. We should then have a school of reasonable size. Such an arrangement would work no great hardship to anyone. There is certainly an inspiration in numbers and this applies to school children as well as to us who are older.

The only change in our teaching force this year was at the Rand school. Miss Alta Thayer of North Haverhill succeeded Miss Gile in this position. Miss Thayer came to us without experience and with but six weeks' training at the summer school. She has proved to be an enthusiastic, determined teacher, with great interest in her school. No one could be more conscientious.

The scarcity of teachers which has prevailed for several years seems to have disappeared. There was a considerable number of normal school graduates who were without positions at the opening of schools last September. At the present time there are 750 in training at our two New Hampshire normal schools. The time is evidently near at hand when there will be a trained teacher in every school room in the state

In my report of one year ago I called attention to the advisability of remodeling the Oak Hill building that it might more adequately meet the needs of this school. A special appropriation of \$1,000.00 was made at the school meeting for this purpose. During the summer the necessary alterations were made and we now have here a very attractive schoolroom, properly lighted, with a jacketed stove, and a good supply of blackboard space. Chemical toilets were installed which are so arranged as to be entered directly from the school room. This school building is a credit to the district. I do not know of a remodeled rural school building where a better or more satisfactory job has been done. The school board kept well within the appropriation in making these alterations.

The general condition of all our school buildings is excellent. The jacketing of the stove at the Tibbets and the screening of the windows at the Center school have been much appreciated. There is need of repainting at the Tibbetts building this coming summer.

The budget of the school board calls for no increased appropriation for the support of schools for the next fiscal year, and for no special appropriation. The treasury should show a balance of about \$300.00 at the end of the school

year in June.

Your superintendent is planning to attend the national meeting of school superintendents which will be held in Cincinnati the last week of February.

He wishes to thank the school boards and citizens for their unfailing courtesy, and the teachers and school children for their cooperation and helpfulness.
