THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF PEMBROKE IN THE COUNTY OF MERRIMACK IN SAID STATE, QUALIFIED TO VOTE IN TOWN AFFAIRS:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Elementary School Auditorium in said Pembroke, on Tuesday the 10th day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To choose Delegates to the Constitutional Convention.
3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
4. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

5. To see if the Town will vote to charge twenty (20) cents on and after December 1, 1964, on all unpaid poll taxes.

6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to sell any real estate which the Town may have acquired by deed as a result of non-payment of taxes, and to authorize the Selectmen to give a deed in the name of the Town to the purchaser of such land.

7. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 287 of the Revised Statutes Annotated relative to playing games of Beano in this Town.

8. To see if the Town will vote to continue its existing municipal Court so long as its present judge shall remain in office, as provided in RSA 502-A: 35.

9. To see what action the Town will take on the following question "Shall sweepstake tickets be sold in this Town", as provided in RSA 284: 21-M.

10. To see if the Town will vote to accept and maintain the 1956 Ford Tanker, Serial HF 556 H 58386 donated by the Fire Department.

11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase a new rubbish packer for the Town for a sum of money not to exceed Fifteen thousand (\$15,000.00) Dollars, and to authorize the Selectmen to expend from the Towns capital Reserve Fund the sum of Five thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars in part payment thereof; and further to authorize the Selectmen to borrow on the credit of the Town, the balance of the cost of said vehicle, not to exceed Ten thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars, by the issue of serial notes, and to determine the time and place of payment and the rate of interest thereon and to provide for the sale thereof.
(This Article is approved by the Budget Committee.)

12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Board of Selectmen to take the following action with respect to the recommendations made by Morgenroth and Associates in their "Report of Proposed Interceptors, Sewer Extensions and Sewage Treatment Facilities for the Town of Pembroke, New Hampshire."

a. In the event the Town of Allentown shall vote at its 1964 annual meeting to join with the Town of Pembroke in the joint use of a sewage treatment plant for the two towns, to proceed with plans for sewerage facilities for the Town on the basis of such joint sewage treatment plant, as contained in Alternate #3 in the said Morgenroth Report; and to conduct such negotiations, make such agreements with the Town of Allentown and procure such options on land as shall be necessary for this purpose.

b. In the event the Town of Allentown shall vote NOT to join with the Town of Pembroke as provided in (A) above, to proceed with plans for sewerage facilities for the Town on the basis of a conventional sewage treatment plant for this Town alone, as contained in Alternate #1 in the said Morgenroth Report; and to procure such options on land as shall be necessary for this purpose.

13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Board of Selectmen to file, on behalf of the Town, an application in form and manner required by the United States, and in conformity with Public Law 560, 83rd Congress, as amended and to enter into such negotiations and do whatever else shall be required for an advance, in an amount not to exceed Forty-six thousand eight hundred (\$46,800.00) Dollars, to be made by the United States to the Town of Pembroke to finance the cost of engineering, surveying, design and plans

for construction drawings and specifications for sewers, interceptors, sewage disposal facilities and appurtenant works, as laid out in the "Report of the Proposed Interceptors, Sewer Extensions and sewage Treatment Facilities for the Town of Pembroke, New Hampshire," and to furnish the United States with such other documents and information and to take such other action as may be required for this purpose.

(This Article is approved by the Budget Committee.)

14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Water Commissioners to make necessary repairs and improvements to its well field and pumping equipment and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow on the credit of the Town a sum of money, not to exceed Sixty thousand (\$60,000.00) Dollars for this purpose, by the issue of bonds or serial notes as provided in RSA 33 and to determine the time and place of payment and the rate of interest thereon and to provide for the sale thereof.

(This Article is approved by the Budget Committee.)

15. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue that section of the old 8th Range Road extending from its intersection with the present 8th Range Road to the center of the old Suncook River Bridge which is no longer in use, due to the construction of the Whittemore Bridge just south thereof.

16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selection of the Road Agent by appointment of the Board of Selectmen, rather than by election at the annual Town Meeting, effective at the expiration of the one year term of the Road Agent elected at this meeting; and to rescind any prior vote of the Town which is in conflict with this method of selection of the Road Agent.

17. To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of RSA 80-52-a authorizing pre-payment of taxes by payments in sums of not less than Ten Dollars (\$10.00) or in any sum divisible by Ten Dollars (\$10.00)

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight hundred seventy-five (\$875.00) Dollars to be donated to the Concord Hospital to help defray the anticipated deficit of that institution.
(Submitted by the Budget Committee without recommendation).

19. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to have the Financial Books and Records of the Selectmen, Town Clerk, Tax Collector, Library Trustees, Trustees of Trust Funds, Fire Department and Treasurer audited by the auditors of the New Hampshire State Tax Commission instead of our local auditors, at a cost of the Town of Two hundred fifty (\$250.00) Dollars and appropriate the same. This Article to take effect upon passage and remain in force until rescinded.

(This Article approved by the Budget Committee)

20. To hear the reports of auditors, agents and committees or of officers heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

21. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The polls will be open until six o'clock in the afternoon.

ABSTRACT OF ACTION ON ARTICLES IN WARRANT
MARCH 12, 1963

Meeting called to order by Moderator, Gedeon N. Pett, Jr. at seven o'clock in the evening.

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. Voted to raise such sum of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. Voted to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
4. Voted to charge Twenty (20) cents on and after December 1, 1963 on all unpaid Poll Taxes.
5. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to sell any real estate which the Town may have acquired by Deed as a result of non-payment of taxes, and to authorize the Selectmen to give a deed in the name of the Town to the purchaser of said land.
6. Shall the playing of Beano in Pembroke (Voted on the Ballot) Yes - 553; No - 198.
7. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to deed to E.D. Swett the portion of the Towns' right of way over his land which extends westerly from the end of the present roadway.
8. Voted to authorize its selectmen to transfer the sum of Two Hundred and Ten (\$210.00) Dollars to the Town Capital Reserve Fund, said sum being the proceeds of the sale of the Bombay Bridge.
- 8A. Voted and authorized the selectmen to purchase the lot of land west of the Fire Station on Union St. from Mrs. Elizabeth Lea, and voted the sum of Eight Hundred (\$800.00) Dollars for same.
9. Voted and authorized its selectmen to serve as a committee to meet with the selectmen of the Town of Allentown to investigate the feasibility of combining the operation of some phases of the government of the both towns, in order to provide better services on a more economical basis, and to report their findings and recommendation at the next Town Meeting.

10. Voted and accepted the following Ordinance.

Mobile Home Park Licenses.

1. Amended to read: No Mobile Home Park, whether newly constructed or presently existing shall be operated after March 31, 1963, until it shall first have been licensed to operate by the board of Selectmen.

11. This article was approved by the Budget Committee and funds therefor are included in the Budget, the sum of Two Hundred (\$200.00) dollars as annual rental of the space in which the clock is located to defray the cost of repairs and maintenance of the clock tower. Said rental to continue as long as the clock is maintained in its present location.

12. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to install and maintain a hydrant on Fairview Avenue, at a location to be determined by the Board of Water Commissioners and to raise and appropriate the funds therefor. It was approved by the Budget Committee and the funds were included in the Budget.

13. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to install and maintain a street light at intersection of Fairview and High Streets extension. This article was disapproved by the Budget Committee, the article was not accepted.

14. Reports of Auditors, Agents and committee, and officers heretofore chosen were accepted as given.

15. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

1. It was proposed by Mr. Read Parmenter to observe a moment of silence in memory of Gedeon N. Petit, Sr. for many years of service to the Town of Pembroke.

2. It was resolved by Mr. Henry W. Munroe that the Selectmen do hereby petition the General court of New Hampshire for relief from our oppressive property taxes necessitated by the rising cost of education, by the leveling of a Broad base tax, and that any and all revenue realized from such tax, excepting that portion necessary for administering the same, be returned to the several cities and towns of the state for the support of education. That copies of said petition be forwarded to His Excellency the Governor, the Speaker of the House, the President of the Senate, our representative and our District Senator.

There being no further business to come before said meeting, upon motion duly made to the moderator said Town Meeting of March 12, 1963 was declared adjourned at 8:45 P.M.

ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1963

During the past year, the Planning Board has been concerned mostly with the first phase of the planning program. This phase consists of six major elements: - Population Study; Land Use Survey; Land Use Plan; Community Facilities Study; Street Plan and Maps. These six elements, contained in the Planning Consultants' Report constitute the Master Plan.

It should be realized that this first phase will remain nothing more than a guide plan until the necessary tools are provided for its implementation. The second phase should provide these tools which are threefold, namely:

- (a) A Capital Improvement Program
- (b) Subdivision Regulations
- (c) Zoning

A Capital Improvement Program is a means by which the Planning Board can influence Public development.

Subdivision Regulations together with Zoning are means by which it can influence Private development.

A Master Plan without Zoning to help effectuate it is practically worthless. The subject of zoning has been widely discussed in the past. It should again be discussed with a professionally prepared Zoning Ordinance for the whole Town as a basis for discussion. In particular, this zoning ordinance should carefully spell out the area of authority of the zoning, so as to prevent the excess in administration that has allegedly occurred in the present District Zoning. The townspeople might well consider the fact that a good zoning ordinance provides them with a form of Insurance that they could not buy.

These then are the tools with which this Master Plan can be made a reality, and they form the second phase of the Program.

Even upon completion of these studies the Town will not be assured of having Planning. Planning is a process, not a document. Planning will be effectively done only when the Planning Board is given greater responsibility than that for a five year sidewalk program. Planning, as an effective process, requires a Board with enough knowledge and prestige that its recommendation is sought, not scorned. It requires a continual program of reexamination of the Master Plan; the plans of the various Departments and the tools available for carrying out plans. It requires a careful definition of what appropriate community goals would be and what means are available to meet them. Only when a process such as that is carried out, will the Town have Planning, whether or not it has a Plan.

To the Board of Selectmen and Citizens of Pembroke:

I am pleased to report that your Fire Department continues to make progress. Once again, through prompt notification and quick response, fire losses in Pembroke have been held to a minimum. The citizens of Pembroke are to be congratulated on their co-operation with the Fire Department.

Much stress has been placed on fire prevention and during Fire Prevention Week a demonstration was held at the departments training field at Memorial Field. Through the co-operation of the merchants, the Pembroke School District and the Junior Fire Department, fire prevention booklets and materials were given out and a poster contest was held in the schools.

A new 800 gallon combination tank truck was completed and placed in service by the members of the Fire Department at no cost to the town.

The firemen also toured several business establishments to acquaint themselves with the buildings and grounds, in order that they would be familiar with them in case of fire or other emergency.

Ten fire department members completed the Standard Red Cross First Aid course.

Under the direction of Deputy Henry Munroe, a twenty-two week training program was carried out. The course was completed as follows:

5 men completed the basic 25 hour course.

8 men completed the 55 hour course.

18 men participated in some part of the course.

15 hours were spent in preparation for the demonstration.

The subjects covered in the training program were:

Hose work.

Ladder work.

Air masks.

Rope work.

Dragging operations.

Also, ten men spent two weekends with certain units of the Boston Fire Department observing fire fighting techniques.

Once again, I must bring to your attention the condition of the present fire alarm system. The modernization and extension of the system is necessary to meet the needs of an expanding community. This problem needs your immediate consideration.

I wish to thank all of you again for your co-operation.

Pembroke continues to show steady growth. At the present rate we have enough classrooms for a few more years. However, as roads improve and industrial areas become closer in time, we may expect almost anything. One sure thing today is the fluidity of labor; it can almost be said that labor may live where it wishes and work where there is a demand. A shift in labor can affect a school system quickly.

The tuition rate at the Academy will be \$465.00 for 1964-65. The state average is expected to be \$467.00. As teachers' salaries increase and new buildings with improved facilities become necessary the tuition rates must increase here as elsewhere. In the long run, the consumer pays the cost whether buying education or any product.

Regardless of new trends in education, various mechanical devices, the resurrection of old techniques and the invention of new ones, or new names for old ideas, there is no substitute for the classroom teacher. The surest way to improve education is to improve the classroom teacher and the quality of teaching. Massachusetts has a minimum salary of \$4500 which is exceeded by

some along the border. As one approaches metropolitan New York, this minimum figure increases. The modern college graduate is alert, well trained, and mobile. Like it or not, we are in a highly competitive market for a quality product. We must offer competitive salaries. It is a truism to state that the school districts in the area are in a "nut-cracker" between Concord and Manchester, with Bow and Goffstown offering stiff competition, too. We lose teachers each year to these districts.

State Foundation Aid has increased from \$10,153 in 1960-61 to \$53,222 in 1963-64. Since this aid is based on the inter-relationship of equalized valuations and the number of pupils, Pembroke will gain whenever more state money is available. Pembroke needs, and will continue to need, much more state aid.

In addition to Foundation Aid Pembroke receives Building Aid, which is 30% of the annual principal payment, or \$6,000 for 1963-64. This, too, is most welcome.

The sprinkler system has been installed in the old building. We feel much better about the safety of the pupils. There are other relatively minor changes which we can do to improve the safety of our buildings. We hope to do these from time to time.

Your cooperation is appreciated.

We began the year with 457 and have had a net loss of 5 to date.

In the elementary schools that supply us there were 227 eighth graders last year and we received 133 or about 60%.

This year there are 199 eighth graders and on the same basis we should receive about 120. Drop outs and transfers account for about 10% loss in Freshman and Sophomore years.

The 199 Total is the last small class. Each of the next three are about 20 above and then 50 above. The large group should reach us in 1968. Our present facilities seem adequate for the time being except for Shop and Home Economics.

IMPROVEMENTS

The new East Wing and Four Girls Memorial Library has been a joy this past year. The classrooms are well equipped but we still have a great need for books for our library. We have spent nearly \$5,000 for books but there is still plenty of room for more.

Our new athletic fields should be ready this year. Certainly the soccer field will be ready. These fields are a wonderful and very essential addition to our school.

The additional cafeteria space is filled to capacity every noon hour. Some days band rehearsal takes place there.

There is a need for more space for Home Economics classes and Industrial Arts classes. Plans are being discussed as to ways and means of improving this situation.

GUIDANCE

This is our second year with a full time guidance counsellor. Students are finding Mr. Guyette a real source of help in getting advice and direction for educational and vocational planning. He helps plan their four year programs and counsels them when they are failing subjects.

He plans and administers most of our testing program, assembling the results and using them in student counseling and in consultations with teachers and parents.

Two 'Open-House' evenings have been held this year at which time parents are invited to meet the teachers and discuss the progress of their children. A much better understanding of the work of the school should result from these meetings.

SCHOLARSHIP

The main purpose of our school is to educate individuals. This means that we provide for the very fast as well as the very slow. Those who are going on to college must be stimulated and encouraged to achieve at a high level so that they will be prepared for the extremely arduous task ahead. Those who are not going on to college must be prepared to go on to other post secondary schools or take their places in the world of industry.

If students have the ability and the desire to learn we can prepare them for any college.

Our students who have gone directly into offices have also done very well and our graduates are being accepted readily.

We group our classes so that we can teach with these aims in mind.

Students who come to us quite unprepared for high school work are put into a 'Special' class until they prove their ability and are then moved into regular status. If this change doesn't take place, they are graduated with a certificate instead of a Diploma.

GRADUATES

Pembroke Academy graduated 33 girls, 32 boys in June 1963 (32% are continuing their formal education). Thirteen or 20% are attending the following colleges: Berkshire Christian College, North Central College, University of Maine, Dartmouth, Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Mount Saint Marys, Babson Institute, and the University of New Hampshire. Eight are attending Wentworth Institute, New Hampshire College of Accounting, Hesses Business College and Westbrook Junior College. One student is in nurses' training; two are in hair-dressing schools; eight are in the Armed Services; six are married and twenty-eight are employed in various businesses.

DROP OUTS

We had a total of 441 different students last year. Thirteen of this number (6 girls and 5 boys) dropped out with apparently an intent of ending their formal education. Their reasons were many and often we had no opportunity to even talk with them about it. Most of them would send word that they had quit and had gone to work.

If we can foresee a potential dropout we try to adjust his program or change his classes so as to keep him in school. This is not always successful. Our drop out rate last year was 3%.

STUDENT ACTIVITIES

Our Student Council is in charge of student activities and assigns dates for dances, conducts the Winter Carnival and acts as clearing house for student suggestions and requests. Mr. Norman Birch is the advisor.

ATHLETICS

Soccer Coach Francis Davis and Basketball Coach Peter Kaligian have had their most disappointing seasons this year. We won no soccer games, tied 5 and lost 6. In basketball we have won 1 and lost 14. Nevertheless both the boys and the coaches maintained their high standard of participation by fighting every game to its finish, never giving up. It is easy to do that when winning but it takes real stamina and courage to do it when you're losing.

The girls basketball team are not in a league this year and have been playing after school games. They have won 5 and lost 3 under Coach Joan Tunnell.

We are again grateful to Mr. Nat Cling for the use of his field for our athletic program.

FINANCIAL PROBLEMS

Inflation plagues the teaching profession as it does all others. Ordinarily teachers are on a schedule which grants regular increments until a maximum is reached. A common increment is \$200.

The United States average salary in 1957-1959 (base 100) was \$4680. Today the average salary is \$5837. Twenty and one-half percent of this rise is needed to match the inflationary rise during this period. Therefore with a rise of \$24.7% in salaries nationally they are left with a 'real' increase of 3.2% over the five year period. While it seems to be teachers' salaries that are increasing rapidly the teachers are barely holding their own against the increased cost of living.

Then again beginning teachers just out of college are getting higher starting salaries each year which puts our older teachers at a great disadvantage unless these increases are passed along all up the line.

"Every honest educator knows that it is teachers, not building, principals, equipment or anything else, that makes for a good or bad school". This quotation is from the magazine School Management for January 1964.

The percentage of the Net Current Expenditures which is used for teachers salaries nationally for schools like ours is 60.86%. While ours is also approximately 61%, the overall national average is 65%.

It seems then that we are holding our own but there can be no let-up. Competition for good teachers is very keen. To hold good teachers we will have to raise our sights and extend the top salary teachers can expect to attain if we wish to keep them.

CONCLUSION

It has been a most satisfying year because of the challenges and the wonderful cooperation received from pupils, parents, teachers and Trustees.

Annual Report of the Water Works

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF WATER COMMISSIONERS

The year 1963 will be long remembered by the residents of the Town of Pembroke, especially the individuals connected with the Water Works.

We saw the passing of Gedeon Petit Sr., one of the founders of the Pembroke Water Department, and as if this was not enough, his son, Frank Petit also passed on.

The water department had its busiest year. During February, March and April a complete census of all the water consumers was taken. In conjunction with the census a new accounts receivable system was installed. This was done to eliminate the possibilities of defalcations, and also to conform with generally accepted accounting practices. Incidentally all valuable department records are now in a fireproof safe file.

An office was built in the old water works building and a heating system was installed. Currently, the Superintendent, Mr. William LeClair and his assistant are now insulating the walls of the building.

During the year the Department's Ford tractor was retired from service and traded in towards the purchase of a new Wain Roy tractor, which is considerably bigger than the old machine. This capital expenditure has already started to pay dividends.

SUMMARY OF WORK DONE

The following new mains were layed or relayed during the year.

284 linear feet of 2" cement lined pipe was layed on old route 28 to Albert Duhaime premises.

252 linear feet of 6" main was layed on Ridge Road in Allenstown.

262.5 linear feet of 6" main was layed on Simpson Ave., to elementary school.

218 linear feet of 6" main relayed on Ferry St. and 6 old services were relayed.

448 linear feet of 14" main layed on Notre Dame Ave.

90 linear feet of 6" main layed on Notre Dame Ave. 3 services were relayed.

108 linear feet of 6" main layed on Rowe Ave. for the new elementary school.

1000 linear feet of 8" main layed to replace old 4" main which was causing a hazard on Broadway.

2662.5 linear feet of pipe layed or relayed during 1963.
