A Public Hearing was held, Saturday, March 23, 1974, at the Strafford County Court House at 10:00 a.m. on Increased Amounts in the Budget.

Chairman Ineson opened the Hearing at 10:00 a.m.

Present were: Dawson, Colby, Rowell, Tirrell, Bouchard, Maloomian, Chasse, Tibbetts, Ineson, Thompson, Ruel, Winkley, Preston, Tripp, Leighton, Bernard, Donnelly, Kincaid, O'Connor, Parnagian, Lessard and Pray.

Chairman Ineson said only the items affected by the increase in the 1974 Budget would be discussed at this time.

**#253 O.E.O. Program. \$20,000.00.**

Many spoke in favor of keeping the \$20,000.00 in the Budget, which is matched 3 to 1 by the Federal Government. The money will be used for the Somersworth Food Co-op and the Minibus for the elderly.

C.A.P. Director Dick Hayes agreed to submit a detailed breakdown of the Program before Friday to the Delegation.

**#258 Homemaker's Program. \$25,000.00.**

John King spoke in favor of the Program and then introduced Ms. Bea Bamford, Director. Ms. Bamford proceeded to explain that the \$25,000.00 would be matched by \$75,000.00 in Federal Funds. A long discussion ensued between the Delegates and spectators. Dr. Cusack spoke in favor. Ms. Bamford said, those who are able to pay, would be asked to do so. Upon request of Rep. Parnagian, Ms. Bamford agreed to have copies of the Homemaker's Budget for all the Delegation, April 1, 1974

Sandy Baloomenos said the \$25,000.00 would be used for a training of personnel.

Ms. Bamford agreed it would take a good part of the money to get the Program started.

**Strafford County Delegation Meeting  
Riverside Rest Home  
March 29, 1974  
Adoption of 1974 County Budget**

Chairman Ineson opened the meeting at 2:30 p.m. with a prayer and salute to the flag by the Delegation.

Present were: Dawson, Harvey, Colby, Rowell, Beckett, Dudley, Plummer, Tirrell, Joncas, Bouchard, Maloomian, Chasse, Meserve, Tibbetts, Ineson, Thompson, Ruel, Winkley, LaRoche, Gagnon, Preston, Tripp, Boisse, Leighton, Bernard, Donnelly, Kincaid, O'Connor, Parnagian, Lessard and Pray.

Bouchard moved that if business is not completed by 6 p.m., the Delegation recess and return at 9 a.m. Monday, April 1st. to continue work on the Budget, and was seconded by O'Connor. So voted.

Discussion on the Budget followed.

Rep. Pray showed the Delegation a copy of the new seal proposed for Strafford County. A motion by Parnagian and seconded by Pray that the seal be adopted as the official seal for Strafford County. So voted.

**#101 *Salaries***

At this point, Rep. Beckett presented a resolution to the Delegation in regards to auditing the financial affairs of the County. He said there should be an audit once a year. Cost approximately \$2,000.00. A motion made by Beckett, records be audited annually, seconded by Leighton. Unanimous vote.

Rep. LaRoche asked about a C.P.A. being hired and Beckett said it could be done by a C.P.A. Commissioner Robinson endorsed it and said it hadn't been done for 6 years.

Commissioner Dumont and Commissioner Young agreed.

The County Auditors are Joseph E. Grimes and Raymond V. Jones, Jr., who audit the books every 3 months.

Rep. Beckett said the cost would be approximately \$2,000.00 which is inadequate. Beckett moved records be audited annually, seconded by Leighton. Discussion ensued.

A motion by Donnelly, amount be increased from \$2,000.00 to \$6,000.00 and seconded by Kincaid. In favor 12; against 7; so voted.



A motion by Leighton and seconded by Winkley, auditing be done every 2 years. In favor 23; opposed 2; so voted. \$4,000.00 will be added to the County Budget.

Full resolution presented by Beckett to the Delegation.

Resolved:

That the Chairman of the Delegation shall upon election, appoint three members, including a Chairman, to serve for two years as members of an Auditing Committee, whose duties shall be to engage a certified public accountant to conduct bi-annual audits of the financial affairs of the County to specify the scope and oversee the performance of such audits.

To authorize the compensation of such auditors for payment by the Commissioners.

To prepare and submit to the Delegation timely annual reports of the results of such audits, together with such recommendations with respect to the conduct of the County's fiscal affairs as appear to the members thereof to be appropriate.

A motion by LaRoche and seconded by Kincaid, resolution accepted. So voted.

Commissioner Robinson said he would like to have the audit done April 1, 1975.

A motion by Leighton and seconded by LaRoche auditing be done every two years and Chairman of the Delegation appoint an auditing committee consisting of three members, Chairman and 2 members of the Delegation. Unanimous vote.

Rep. Parnagian suggested increasing the pay for Representatives from \$3.00 plus mileage to \$10.00 plus mileage. He said it would be the first fee hike in 90 years.

A letter from B.R.L. Matchett was then read by Chairman Ineson, in regards to the sale of the old County Court House, Second St., Dover, N.H. The bid (sealed) for Twenty five thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00).

Rep. Bernard's motion:

I, Mary Bernard, move that the Strafford County Delegation vote to instruct the County Commissioners to negotiate with B.R.L. Matchett, for sale of the old County Court House building at his price Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00).

Seconded by Rep. Parnagian and Rep. Donnelly.

Dr. Matchett said he had made the offer in good faith because he needed more room for his medical practice and had been looking for five years for an appropriate, ground level office. Discussion ensued.

Rep. Ruel asked if he would sign a statement pledging not to sell the building for five years and promising to use it as a medical building. "Gladly" said Dr. Matchett.

Mr. Koutrelakos protested the sale and offered a bid from the floor of Twenty-six Thousand Five Hundred Dollars, (\$26,500.00).

Rep. McManus then asked for another appraisal of the



building saying, "It's not right to accept Dr. Matchett's bid or any other bid in this way."

At this time, Leo Cormier, County Treasurer, offered the information that it would cost from Five Hundred (\$500.00) to Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) for an appraisal.

Rep. Donnelly insisted the appraisal be done in 10 days so that the Delegation could dispose of the Court House before going out of office December 31, 1974.

Commissioner Dumont and Rep. McManus said it could not be done so rapidly.

Rep. Beckett suggested it be laid over until February 1975.

Chairman Ineson spoke of the Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) to keep the building going.

Rep. Beckett withdrew his suggestion.

The Delegation then asked for Rep. Bernard's original motion, (on the floor at this time), to sell the Court House to Dr. Matchett.

Rep. Parnagian's final report of the new County Court House Committee was read and accepted by the Delegation.

Rep. Thompson then gave a report of the Strafford Guidance Center Study Committee.

Funds were recommended, Twenty-four Thousand Five Hundred Dollars, (\$24,500.00) for a study of the Expansion of Riverside Rest Home.

Chairman Ineson asked where the money should come from.

Rep. Beckett said money could be used from the 1975 Budget. Chairman Ineson said, "It can't be done by this Delegation."

Motion by Rep. O'Connor, seconded by Rep. McManus and Rep. Ruel.

I move that the Strafford County Convention direct the County Commissioners to enter into a contract with Space Utilization Associates Inc. and the University of N.H. Center for Institutionals and Industrial Development for a sum not to exceed Twenty-four Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$24,500.00) for a study of the needs for an expansion of Riverside Rest Home. Discussion ensued. Delegation voted against.

A motion by Rep. Beckett and seconded by Rep. McManus, funds for the study shall be paid from the 1974 surplus in the Budget. Commissioner Dumont said he expected about Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) over in the 1974 Budget, but this is just an estimation.

Rep. Beckett withdrew his motion.

Rep. Beckett then read a report of the Audit Committee by Martin J. Hegarty, C.P.A. The Audit included the accounts, records and activities of the County Commissioners Office, Riverside Rest Home, Register of Deeds, Clerk of Superior Court and the Extension Service.

It is over six years since there has been an Audit.

Chairman Ineson said the Clerk of the Works was not an employee and was under Professional Contract. Commissioner Dumont said the Clerk of the Works did work under contract. Discussion ensued.

Rep. Beckett offered two resolutions:

I—Resolved:

That the consulting services of a qualified practicing certified public accountant shall be engaged to design, recommend and oversee the installation of a double-entry accounting system that will assure the maintenance of adequate records to provide for appropriate internal control and the preparation of prompt and reliable reports of County financial operations.

That such consultant shall be engaged by the County Commissioners and shall report to the County Commissioners.

That the County Commissioners shall report to the County Delegation Executive Committee no less frequently than the end of each calendar quarter during the fiscal year 1975 with respect to the progress of such a project.

And that the County Commissioners are instructed to undertake such project immediately and to provide from contingency funds of 1974, amounts appropriate for the financing of such a project.

II—Resolved:

That the financial affairs of Strafford County shall be audited for the year 1974 by a practicing certified public accountant who is engaged by the County Commissioners, that the auditor's report thereon shall be submitted to the County Delegation by July 1, 1975, and that, to finance such an undertaking the County Commissioners are hereby instructed to include in the proposed budget for 1975 such an amount of money as will provide for such an audit.

Rep. Beckett said he wanted the Audit paid for in 1975, there being no funds at this time. Commissioner Dumont said he would like to hire a C.P.A. immediately and that three thousand dollars (\$3,000.00) be taken out of the contingency fund, to set up a double-entry system and to be hired on a consulting basis in 1974.

Discussion ensued.

Moved by Rep. McManus and seconded by Rep. Winkley report and resolutions be accepted, report to be made to the County Commissioners and Strafford County Delegation.

Commissioners instructed to fund the Project immediately and it be financed from the Contingency fund. Vote unanimous.

County Delegation meeting adjourned by Chairman Ineson at 11:15 p.m.

Our Catholic and Protestant Chaplains have brought consolation and solace throughout the year and always in time of need.

To all Social and Fraternal organizations who show their concern for our elderly by their participation, I say thank you.

Our Physicians continued to visit our patients on a seven-day basis thereby maintaining a high level of medical care.

A sincere thank you to my entire Staff. Much was demanded of them and they did not fail me.

Lastly, I would like to express my sincere appreciation to our County Commissioners, the Executive Board, and the



County Delegation for their interest and support.

COUNTY ATTORNEY**

The County Attorney processed all criminal cases brought to his attention during 1974. This office was greatly assisted by Stephen M. Morrison, Assistant County Attorney, who is, for the most part, paid by funds of the New Hampshire Crime Commission.

The volume of criminal work continues to increase and it appears that an assistant must henceforth be provided by the County or the alternative which is inescapable is that the office must be made a full time position.

This office over the year assisted a great many times in prosecution in the various District Courts at the request of the respective Chiefs of Police.

## 1974 SHERIFF'S REPORT

1974 was a year of accomplishment and change in the Strafford County Sheriff's Department. Through Crime Commission Grants, we were able to secure the valuable services of a Criminal Investigator and send him to a Forensic Medicine Seminar at Colby College in Waterville, Maine. In addition, we used funds available through grants to modernize and update the Communications Department and also to acquire a van type vehicle to transport prisoners and/or jurors.

We participated in more than 200 criminal investigations and collected in excess of \$15,000.00 in bail money on mittimus' and capias'. We transported an all time high of 1,367 subjects in 1974, 568 more than in 1973. Extraditions were made from Florida, New York, Massachusetts, Vermont and Maine. Four civil deputies served, or attempted to serve, 2,589 writs but, as of this writing, I do not have the total fees and mileage figures as one of our deputies is still convalescing from a broken leg. However, in accordance with RSA 30:5, by April 1, 1975, all deputies will file with the Secretary of State an annual report of individual income for 1974.

In the Dispatch Center, we have acquired at no cost to us a Telecopier capable of sending clear pictures and printed matter to and from other Telecopier stations within the state. Communications traffic for 1974 amounted to 108,360 radio transmissions, 33,150 telephone calls and 7,084 Incident Reports.

Bailiffs are now attired in green blazer type suits and carry weapons when on duty as ordered by the Superior Court.

Like every other department in the old court house, the day after Thanksgiving was moving day and it wasn't nearly as bad as we had originally anticipated. Our spacious new quarters are more than adequate and we all enjoy the many new conveniences we now have.

I would like to extend my thanks and sincere appreciation to the County Commissioners, the Delegation and to my Staff for a good year.

**INTRODUCTION**

The Cooperative Extension Service is an informal educational system that today operates in every county and territory throughout the United States. It is commonly referred to as the "off-campus" educational arm of the land grant university; and, as the name implies, is a unique cooperative arrangement between the United States Department of Agriculture, the university and the Cooperative Extension Service Council.

The Council is the governing board for the Extension Service. It has thirteen members, three from each line of work — agriculture, forestry, home economics, and 4-H — and the last member is an appointed representative of the County Legislative Delegation. Meetings are held at least four times a year, with the finance committee members meeting each month for the disbursement of funds.

Extension agents, as teachers, staff the many county offices throughout the United States. Each is a qualified, experienced college graduate, further supported by a battery of specialists in many fields, who are stationed at the state university.

Using a philosophy of helping people help themselves. Extension agents have earned recognition as a dedicated, useful, and needed segment of the educational process.

Following are resumes of the agents' annual reports. These



reports are available for examination at the Extension Service Office, Federal Office Building, Rochester.

## **REPORT OF THE AGRICULTURAL AND COMMUNITY RESOURCE DEVELOPMENT AGENT**

In 1974 the Strafford County Extension Service was presented many unique problems and challenges such as the energy crisis early in the year, especially as it related to the heating of homes. This problem was followed in the spring by a sharp increase in food prices, which had wide range economic impact on the residents of Strafford County.

The approach to helping the people of the county meet these problems was manifold. Educational programs and literature were prepared and presented through individual visits and group meetings, as well as through the use of mass media — television, radio, and newspapers. Fact sheets were devised, which enabled the rapid dissemination of information to as many people as possible in as short a period as possible.

Because of rising food prices, home gardening gained in popularity. This agent worked on an individual basis with many county residents, and conducted group meetings on the subject for various organizations. Both of these problem areas cut across subject lines so that the entire Extension Service Staff became involved in helping the people cope with their problems.

In the areas of community development, solid waste management seemed to be the No. 1 problem in the county. This was due to the legislative mandate that outlaws open burning at dump sites. Educational programs regarding various alternatives to solid waste management were presented in a number of towns. This agent also participated in a solid waste management trade show, held at the University of New Hampshire in the fall. This was a very successful way of acquainting the citizenry of Strafford County with the various alternatives.

The town of Farmington applied for and received Federal Title Five funding through the efforts of the community development staff. This will give Farmington a unique opportunity to work on some of its specific problems, as well as providing a laboratory experience for solving problems that are common to all towns in Strafford County.

The agricultural program continued to assist the commercial agricultural enterprises in our cities and towns. This was important to the dairy industry, because of the extremely high cost of feed input, together with a poor crop season brought about by drought conditions.

The Extension Agricultural and Community Resource Development programs, as well as all other Extension programs, are supported and maintained for the benefit of all the citizens of Strafford County. If anyone has questions regarding these programs or subjects on which they would like information, they should contact the Strafford County Cooperative Extension Service.

### **REPORT OF THE STRAFFORD COUNTY HOME ECONOMIST**

Educational programs in Home Economics are dispersed through leader training, personal visits, telephone, direct mail, newsletters, newspapers, workshops, area programs, and do-it-yourself program kits.

Six hundred families take part in regular Home Economics Extension programs, taught by the home economist or by local leaders. Subjects covered in 1974 included *Auto Mechanics, Landscaping, Vegetable Gardens, Main Dishes from the Freezer, Norwegian Foods and Customs, Housewares, Lampshades, and Care of Carpets*. Two hundred thirty-six leaders were trained in these subjects by staff members and gave instruction at local meetings.

Educational programs were presented on *Food Prices, Furniture Selection, Art Appreciation, Clothing, Buying and Selling Homes, Estates and Wills*. These programs were conducted by Extension staff members, commercial representatives, and University of New Hampshire specialists. Programs in health, safety, cultural arts, and citizenship are developed by members of the Home Economics Extension Council. An upholstery workshop was also conducted at Dover, Somersworth, and Rochester.

Requests for information on all phases of Home Economics are constantly being received from Strafford County citizens by telephone or through the mails. These requests average about 15 a day in the winter and ten in the summer. Canning, freezing, and vegetable storage requests have increased greatly in the past two years. To further assist Strafford County citizens with keeping food costs down and, at the same time guard against food spoilage or poisoning, canning clinics were held and about 50 gauges for pressure canners were tested by Extension Service personnel.

A monthly newsletter, available to all without cost, is sent to more than 1000 families. This newsletter includes a calendar of educational activities and timely information relating to consumer problems.

In an effort to reach more people, non-Extension groups are invited to send representatives to leader training programs; and special programs have been made available to senior citizens, low income and civic groups. Extension groups and the Home Economics Executive Board work together to determine the needs of Strafford County families, set goals, and specific areas of emphasis. These determinations are reached with the approval and guidance of the University of New Hampshire and the Strafford County Extension Service Council. When programs are formulated, they are listed in a calendar prepared and published at the County Extension Office. This calendar is available to everyone.

### **REPORT OF THE 4-H YOUTH DEVELOPMENT AGENTS**

What is 4-H? 4-H is a Cooperative Extension Service program for all youth; and is a part of the University of New Hampshire and the United States Department of Agriculture.

In 1974 there were 49 organized 4-H clubs in Strafford County, with 1035 boys and girls participating. There were 3518 other youth involved in special interest projects such as

bicycle safety, entomology, embryology, special food and nutrition projects, and International 4-H Youth Exchange programs.

The most important aspect of any youth program is that young people are offered the opportunity to make choices, set goals, learn new subject matter, and work and play with others. Thereby, they gain confidence in themselves and learn to appreciate the rights of others.

Two 4-H youth development agents worked with 230 adult leaders and 155 junior leaders. These leaders taught all the youth mentioned above. It is with this excellent volunteer leadership that we manage to reach so many young people with new and vital information.

Because the quality of volunteer leadership is so high in Strafford County and the members are so interested in *learning and doing*, there were eight state winners in the County this year. Six of these members were among the thirty delegates from New Hampshire sent to the National 4-H Congress at Chicago. One of these was also a regional winner in bike safety; and one, a national winner in horsemanship. Strafford County also had one delegate to the National 4-H Conference at Washington, D.C., and one delegate to the Canadian National Conference at Toronto. Only eight young people from the United States are invited to attend the Canadian Conference.

The total number of projects studied by Strafford County youth during 1974 is 8902.

# REPORT OF THE STRAFFORD COUNTY FORESTRY PROGRAM 1974

**Donald C. Black, County Forester**

The County Forestry Program is a cooperative program financed by county, state, and federal funds; and is administered by the Cooperative Extension Service through agreements with the State Division of Resources Development and the United States Forest Service. It is an adult educational program, aimed at helping private and municipal woodland owners in Strafford County with forest land-use problems. In addition, it offers assistance to wood-using industries in locating, processing, and marketing forest projects. Besides helping people realize monetary returns from their woodlands and its products, the forestry program is charged with protecting our forest resources for future generations. It is entirely voluntary on the part of the woodland owners and timber operators.

## **COMMENTARY**

### *General*

The year 1974 was highlighted, from a forester's point of view, by two factors: high stumpage values in the spring, followed by a decline in the fall; and a heavy concentration of federal cost-share forest improvement funds that were available in Strafford County.

### *University Students*

Again forestry students, working with the County Forester and University professors, provided management planning assistance to seven forest landowners in the Lee-Durham area. This is an educational process for the students and landowners.

### *Industry*

A special group of marketing and utilization foresters from the Cooperative Extension Service System provided an efficiency check for a local sawmill.

### *Inter-Agency*

Since most Extension agents have varied outside interests,

they cooperate across program disciplines. This year the County Forester assisted the Home Economics Program with carpentry workshop classes; and the 4-H Program with forestry-oriented projects for the Rochester Fair, as well as a fuelwood class.

#### *Demonstrations*

Three major county and inter-county demonstrations included *Fuelwood Gathering Methods*; *Fuelwood Improvement Cutting and Wildlife Enhancement Practices*; and a *Christmas Tree Shearing Program*.

#### *Timberland Owners' Association*

A Strafford County chapter of the State Timberland Owners' Association was formed this year.

#### *Tree Farm Program*

Three new tree farmers were certified — one at Durham; two at Milton.

#### *Rockingham-Strafford Community Action Program*

This program was designed to train unemployed men to do woods work. The County Forestry Program gave these men their head start here in Strafford County.

#### *Soil Conservation District*

Cooperative efforts continued as usual, highlighted by a forest practices tour in the fall.

#### *Communications*

The County Forester participated in two television shows — one on home repairs; the other, on fuelwood management and home heating.

#### *Schools*

A timber marking demonstration for a Dover High School Vocational Class, a nature trail for the Barrington Elementary School, and nature trail work for the Strafford School was accomplished.

#### *Conservation Commissions*

The Strafford Conservation Commission was very active this year, carrying out a sanitation tree harvest, opening a field for wildlife enhancement, and establishing a self-guiding nature trail. Two guided tours were also conducted.

The Commission hired the Rockingham-Strafford Community Action Program personnel to clear a portion of a field,

as part of the wildlife enhancement program.

The Somersworth Conservation Commission also cooperated with the Rockingham-Strafford Community Action Program by hiring trainees to develop more open space by clearing land in Parsons Park.
