THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Sullivan in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Sullivan on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.
3. To see what sums of money the town will raise in addition to that required by law for building and repairing highways and bridges, or take any action relating thereto.
4. To see if the town will vote to pay for digging graves and going with the town hearse.
5. To see what sums of money the town will raise in addition to that required by law for the support of the public library.
6. To see if the town will vote to raise money for Memorial Day or take any action thereon.
7. To see if the town will vote to raise money to pay for breaking roads or take any action relating thereto.

8. To see if town will authorize the selectmen to borrow money on the credit of the town.

9. To see if the town will vote to help stamp out the white pine blister disease and raise money for the same, or take any action relating thereto.

10. To see if the town will vote to accept a trust fund of one hundred dollars (\$100) from Will H. Harris, the income to be used annually in the care, maintenance and improvement of the cemetery lot in the cemetery in East Sullivan or the road from East Sullivan to Sullivan in which his wife, Lizzie M. Harris is buried.

11. To hear the reports of agents, auditors or committees heretofore chosen, or take any action thereon.

12. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Sullivan:

It is with pleasure that I herein submit my fourth annual report as superintendent of schools.

Our great problem is to maintain our schools in creditable condition and at the same time keep within the limits of our appropriations.

America's greatest problem to-day is to train the rising generation of boys and girls into useful citizenship. **This implies** a thorough preparation in the fundamentals of mental, moral and religious life. No generation of boys and girls ever faced so many temptations and pitfalls of society as modern life presents to-day.

It is the duty of the home, the school and the church to train and guide the emotions of children to a greater degree than ever before.

Promotions in June were based on results of the following standard tests: Ayres' scale in writing and spelling; Charters' diagnostic language test; Stanford's achievement test. These were supplemented by frequent tests given by the teacher and a few by the superintendent. With these results were taken into consideration the ranks of individual pupils throughout the year.

In view of the fact that you have no school nurse to do follow up work, the greater responsibility rests with the parents to see to the corrective work, if you are to realize the real value of the medical examination. The report suggests the desirability of a dental clinic also a tonsil and adnoid clinic.

Whatever support morally or financially the district may give to all efforts to correct all defects of eye, ear, teeth, tonsils, and other physical defects of every child, so far you will give that child not only a better chance of normal health but also will make him more alert in mental activities and better able to function in the citizenship of your town.

All the schools closed a successful year in June. The regular teachers were conscientious and did faithful and effective work.

At the East, Miss Flagg, a teacher of several years experience, maintained excellent discipline and accomplished a good year's work. At the close of the year, the following pupils

completed the eighth grade: Andrew O. Ball, Aubrey McMahon, and Helen M. Knight.

At the Center, Miss Phillips, a graduate of the Keene Normal, did effective work along modern methods of teaching.

At the Fifield, we were fortunate in the type of cadet teachers that were sent to this school. All were eager to put across their best efforts and under the able direction of their critic teacher, Miss Farnum, accomplished good results.

At the beginning of the present year, Miss Flagg having resigned in order to take up extended study of teaching, Mrs. Freda Hastings, a former teacher of this school, was elected to this position.

Miss Phillips was retained in her position at the Center. The feeling at the Fifield being in favor of a regular teacher, Miss Bruna Farinoli, a graduate of Keene Normal, was engaged. Miss Farinoli is maintaining a model small school.

In all our schools we have tried to keep the instruction in line with modern psychological and pedagogical methods.

All the teachers have placed emphasis on the fundamentals: viz., reading, writing and arithmetic, the use of good english, both oral and written and a more extended knowledge in geography and history. Creditable work has been done in drawing and nature study. In number work your teachers have followed standard laws; viz., proceeding from the concrete to the abstract, from the known to the unknown, from particular to general, from problem to rule.

As far as possible, we keep the work practical and confined to principles that enter into the needs of the ordinary citizen.

In writing, Houghton's system has been followed and we have aimed at neatness, legibility and a fair amount of speed.

In reading, which is the foundation for all other studies, during the first three years, much attention has been placed on word drills and phonics, thereby giving the pupil not only a stock of words but also the tools by which he may decipher other words. After the third year, attention has been turned more particularly to (1) the getting of the thought from the

printed page, (2) the giving of that thought to another with clear enunciation and proper expression, (3) a desire for good literature.

In conclusion, I wish to acknowledge the cordial co-operation of teachers, the assistance and help of the school board and the hearty support of parents and citizens.
