SANDERS MAINTAINS NH LEAD, CLINTON SEEN AS WINNER, MOST VOTERS NOT CONVINCED YET

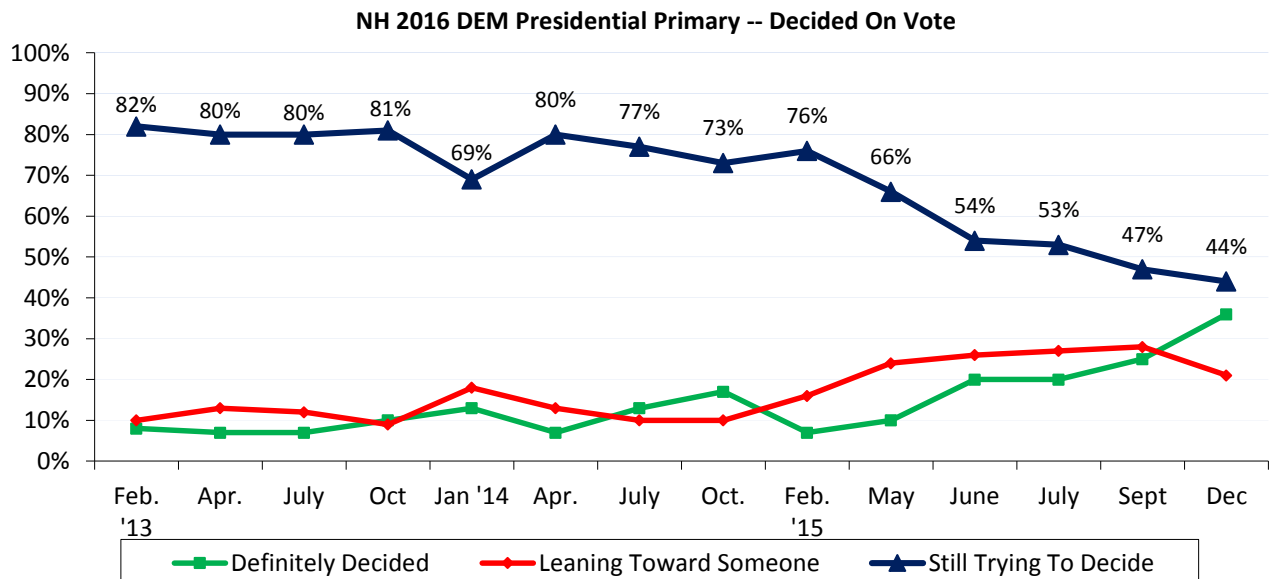
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DURHAM, NH –Vermont senator Bernie Sanders has maintained his lead over former Secretary of State Hillary Clinton in New Hampshire, but Clinton is seen as the eventual New Hampshire winner. Just over one-third of Democratic Primary voters say they have definitely decided who they will support.

These findings are based on the latest **CNN/WMUR New Hampshire Primary Poll**,* conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Nine hundred fifty-four (954) randomly selected New Hampshire adults were interviewed by landline and cellular telephone between November 30 and December 7, 2015. The margin of sampling error is +/- 3.1 percent for the entire sample. Included were four hundred two (402) likely 2016 Republican Primary voters (MSE = +/-4.9 percentage points), and three hundred seventy (370) likely 2016 Democratic Primary voters (MSE = +/-5.1 percentage points).

NH Voters Still Not Decided

Despite being two months away from the New Hampshire primary, expected to be held February 9, a large segment of Democratic primary voters still have not decided on who they will eventually support. New Hampshire voters typically decide who they will vote for in the last weeks, or days of the campaign and it is no surprise that few voters have firmly decided who they will support in 2016. Currently, 36% of likely Democratic primary voters say they have definitely decided who they will support, 21% are leaning toward a candidate, and almost half (44%) are still trying to decide who to support.

Currently, 48% of likely Democratic primary voters say they are extremely interested in the election, 30% are very interested, 17% are somewhat interested and 5% are not very interested. Interest is actually greater than at this point in the 2008 primary cycle when 41% of Democrats said they were extremely interested in the election, 46% were very interested and 14% were somewhat or not very interested.

However, one indication that there is less interest in the Democratic primary than the Republican Primary is that undeclared voters, often erroneously referred to as “independents”, are less likely to say they plan to vote in the Democratic primary. Currently, 48% of undeclared voters say they plan to vote in the Republican primary, 38% plan to vote in the Democratic primary, and 14% are unsure which primary they would vote in.

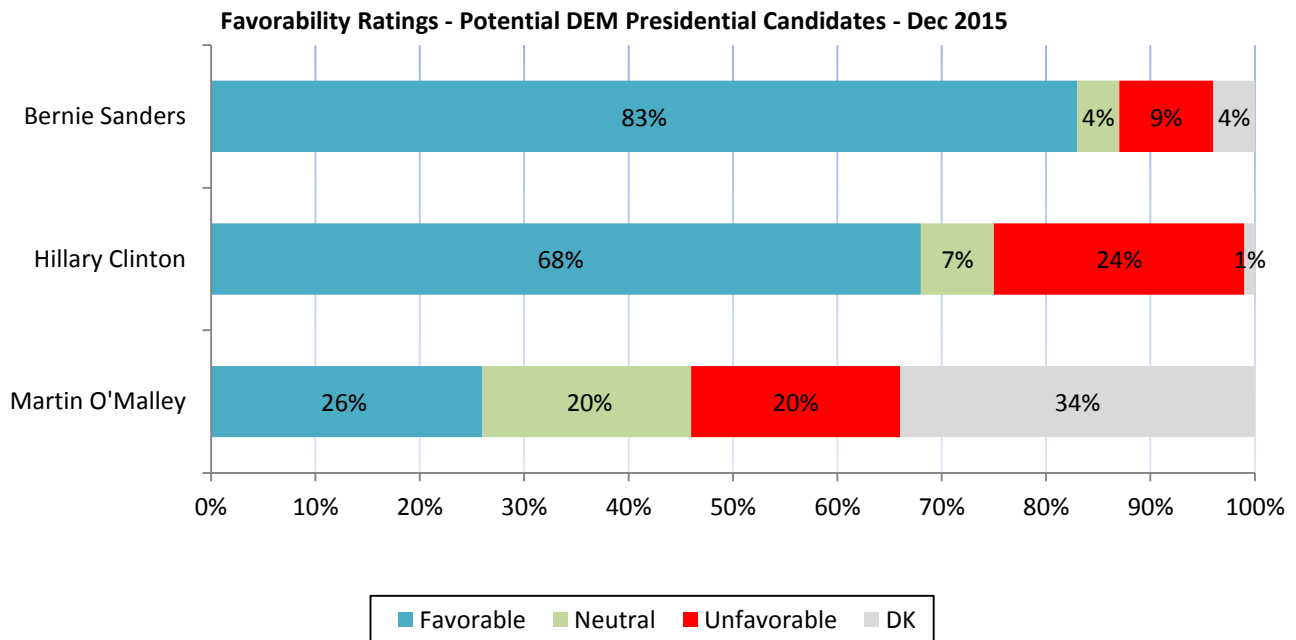
Democratic Favorability Ratings

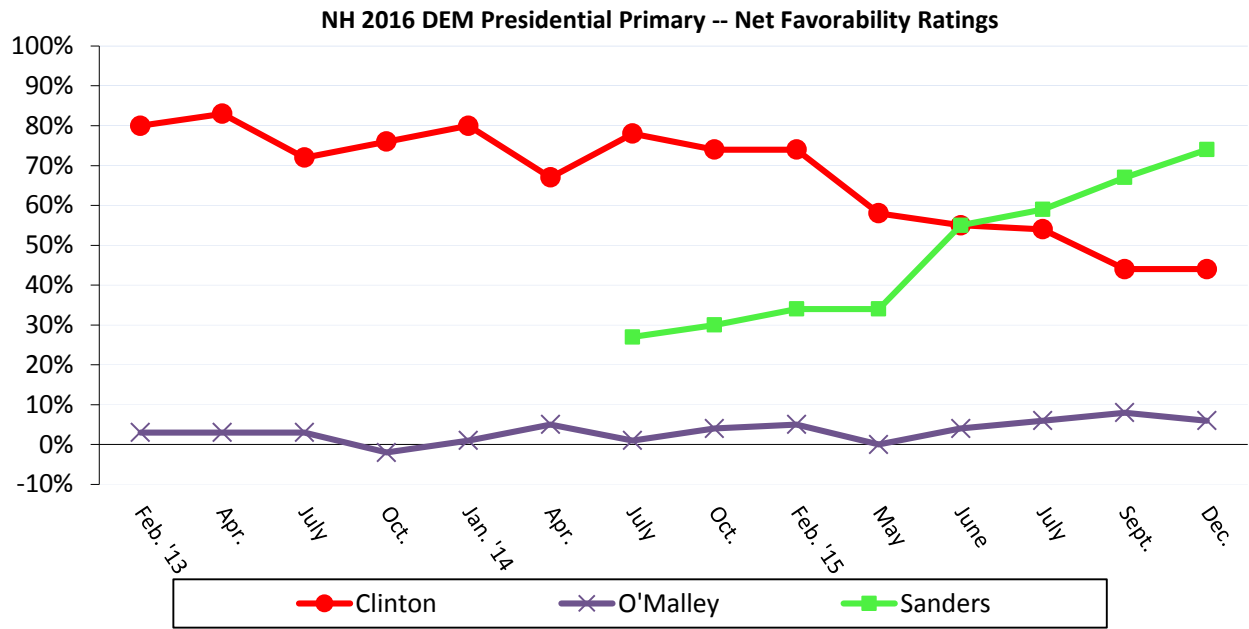
Vermont senator Bernie Sanders remains the most popular Democratic candidate in New Hampshire. More than four in five (83%) likely Democratic Primary voters have a favorable opinion of Sanders, only 9% have an unfavorable opinion of him, 4% are neutral, and 4% don't know enough about him to say. Sanders' net favorability rating is an extremely high +74%.

Former Secretary of State and 2008 New Hampshire Primary winner Hillary Clinton also continues to be popular in the state – 68% of likely Democratic Primary voters have a favorable opinion of Clinton, 24% have an unfavorable opinion of her, 7% are neutral, and 1% don't know enough about her to say. Clinton's net favorability rating is +44%.

Sanders' net favorability rating has steadily increased over 2015 from +34% in February to +67% in September to +74% in the most recent poll. Clinton's has eroded through the same period, from +74% in February to +44% in September, and remaining at +44% in the latest CNN/WMUR poll.

Former Maryland governor Martin O'Malley (+6% net favorability rating), continues to be not as well known or well liked as Sanders or Clinton.



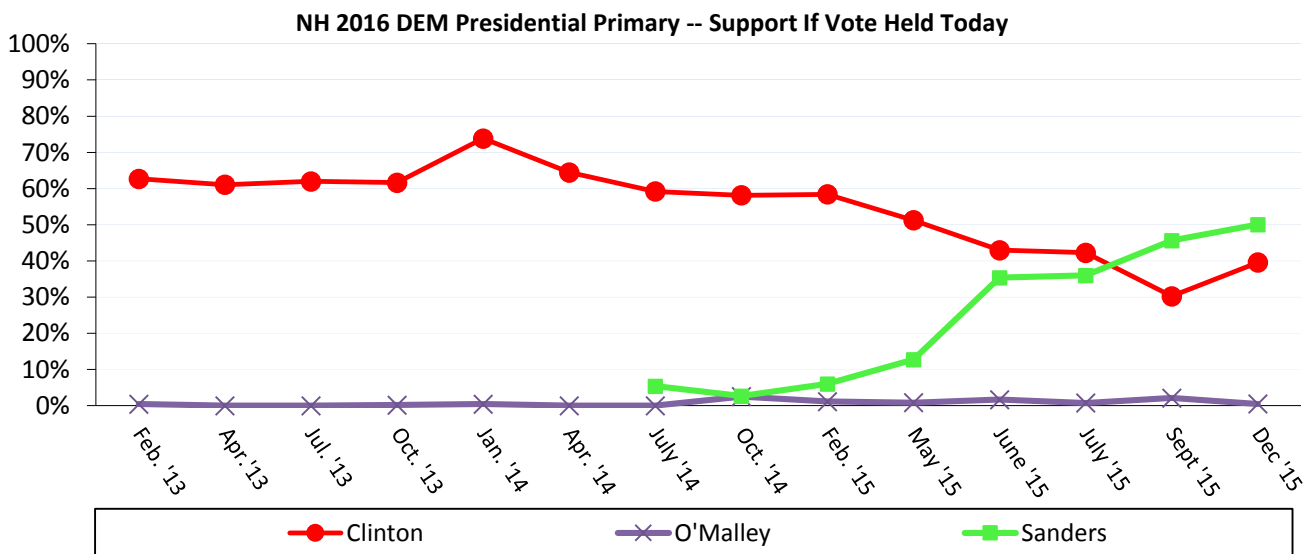


2016 NH Democratic Primary Trial Heat

If the Democratic Primary were held today, 50% of likely Democratic Primary voters say they would vote for Sanders, 40% say they would vote for Clinton, 1% prefer O'Malley, 3% favor some other candidate, and 6% are undecided. Support for Clinton and Sanders has risen since Vice President Biden decided not to run earlier this fall.

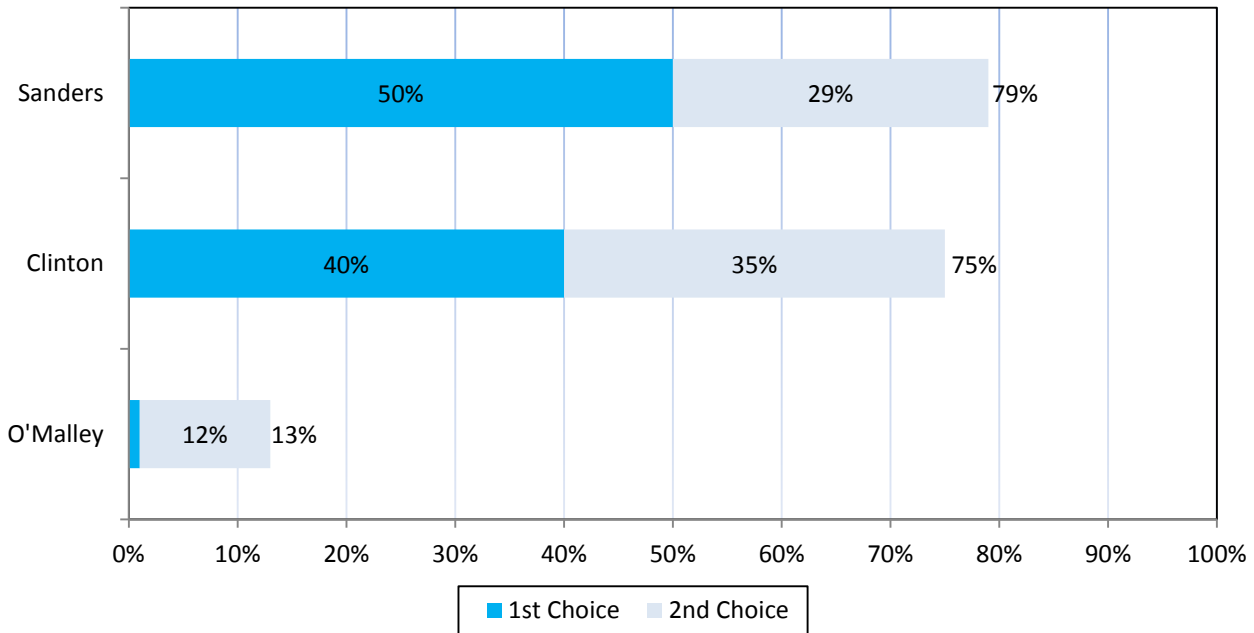
Sanders strongest support comes from voters under 35 (74%), voters who have not previously voted in a primary (69%), voters with a high school education or less (60%), and residents of the New Hampshire Seacoast (59%). Clinton's strongest support comes from voters who are 50 and older (50%).

There is a pronounced gender gap with Sanders leading among men by a 17 percentage points (53% to 36%). Sanders also currently has a 6 percentage point advantage among women (48% to 42%).



2016 NH Democratic Primary with Second Choice

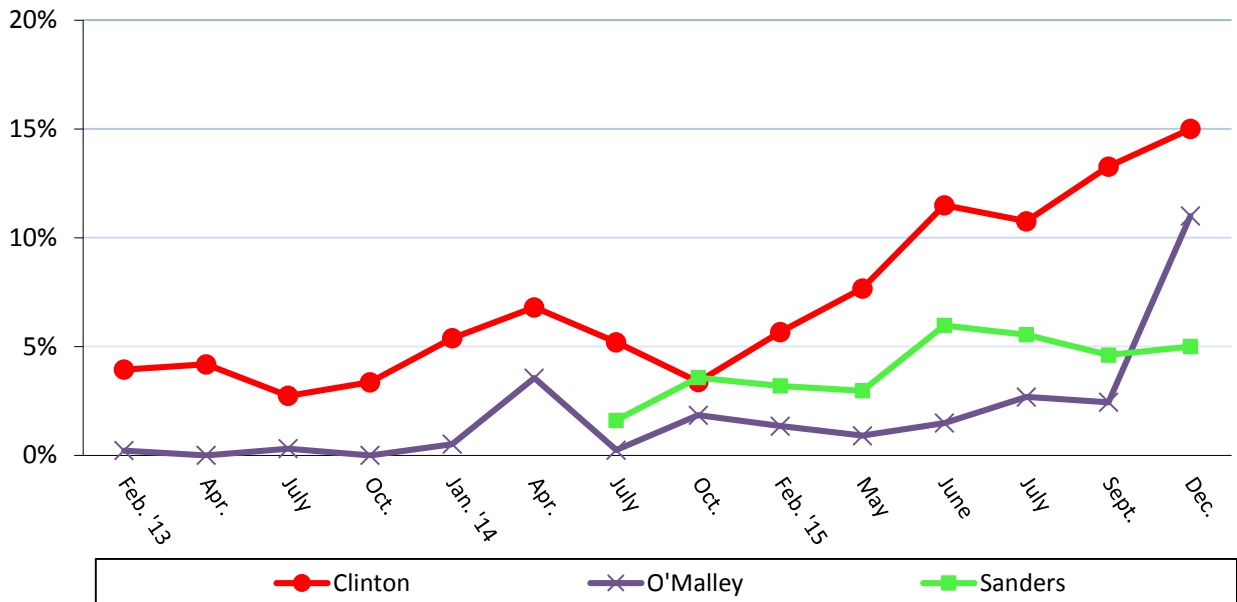
Likely Democratic primary voters see both Hillary Clinton and Bernie Sanders as viable options -- when the top two choices are combined, 79% of likely primary voters favor Sanders and 75% favor Clinton.



Most Unpopular Democrat Candidate

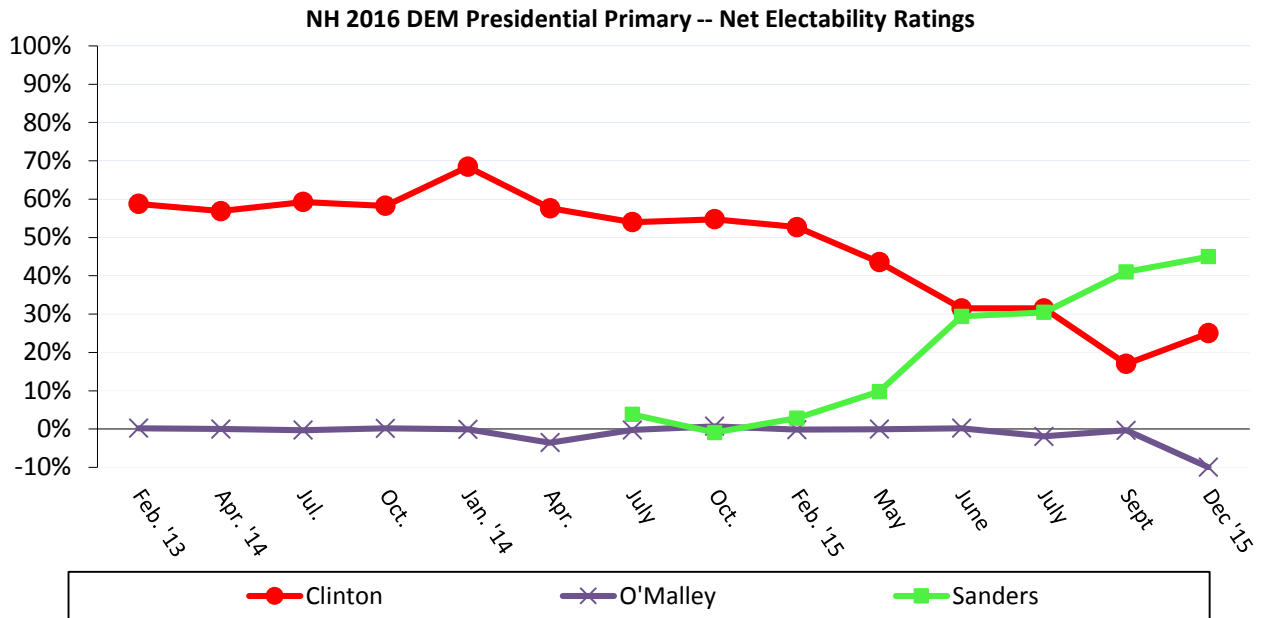
Nominations typically go to candidates who are acceptable to most members of their party and are less polarizing and none of the Democratic candidates are seen as particularly unacceptable. When asked which potential candidate they would NOT vote for under any circumstance, 15% of likely Democratic primary voters would not vote for Clinton, 11% would not vote for O'Malley, 5% would not vote for Sanders, 50% think that all of the prospective candidates are acceptable, and 19% name someone else or are unsure.

NH 2016 DEM Presidential Primary -- Would Not Vote For



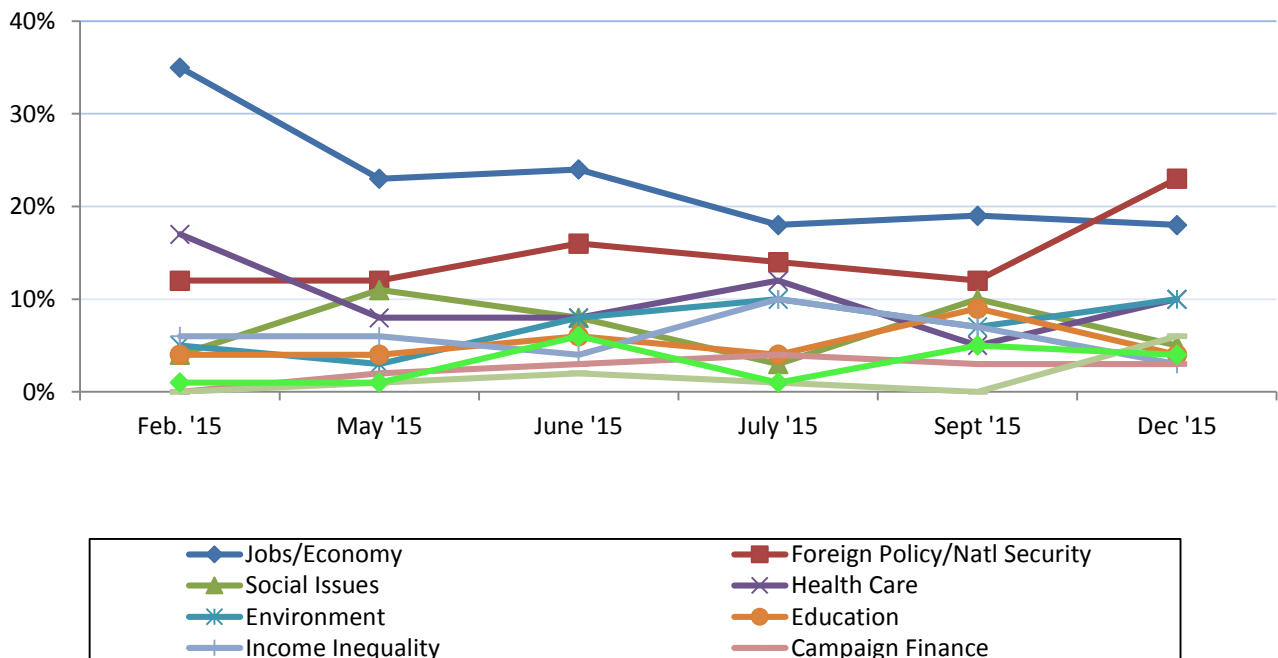
Democrat Net Electability

Sanders is the most electable Democrat as measured by net electability, the percentage who support a candidate minus the percentage who would not vote for that candidate under any circumstances. Sanders net electability score is +45%, while Clinton's net electability score is +25%, and O'Malley's -10%.



Most Important Issues to Primary Vote

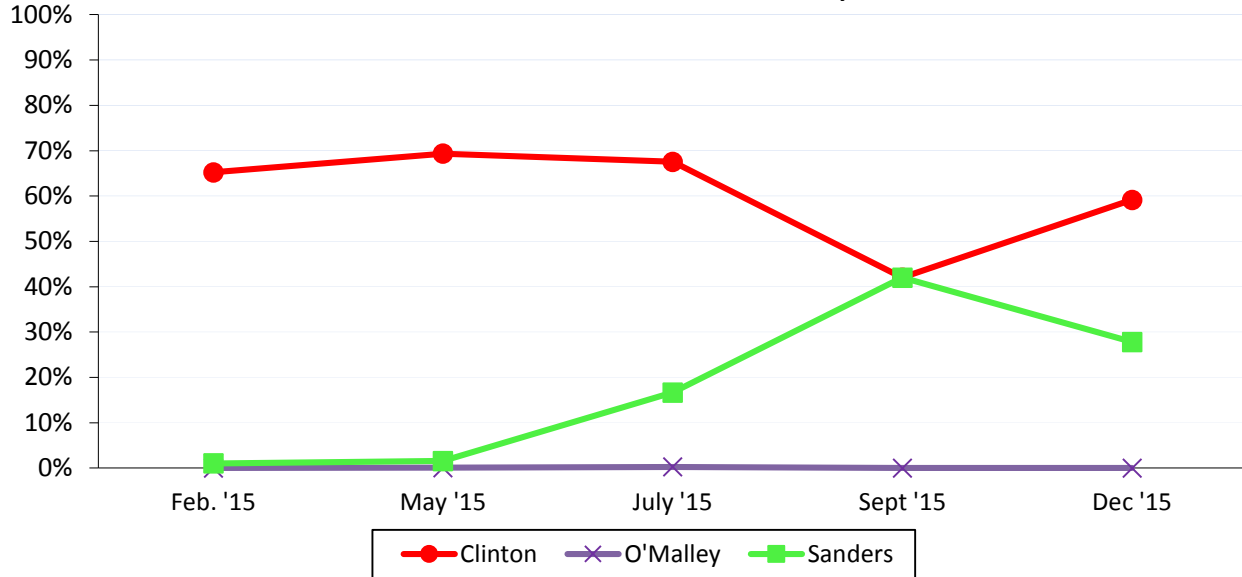
The recent terrorist attacks in Paris and San Bernardino have changed the focus of this election. Prior to the most recent poll, jobs and the economy were the most important issues for Democratic voters but national security issues, including terrorism, is now the most frequently named issue, cited by 23% of likely Democratic Primary voters, doubling since September when it was mentioned by 12% of voters. Jobs or the economy follows with 18%, 10% cite the environment or climate change, 10% cite healthcare, 6% mention gun control, 5% cite social issues, 3% mention immigration, 3% cite education, 3% cite income inequality, and 3% mention campaign finance reform.



Who Will Win NH Primary?

Despite Sanders continuing to lead in New Hampshire, likely Democratic Primary voters believe Hillary Clinton will win the New Hampshire Primary – 59% of likely Democratic Primary voters think Hillary Clinton will win the New Hampshire primary, 28% think Sanders will win, 0% think O’Malley will win and 12% were unsure. This represents a significant change since September when voters were divided on this measure.

Who Will Win NH 2016 DEM Presidential Primary?

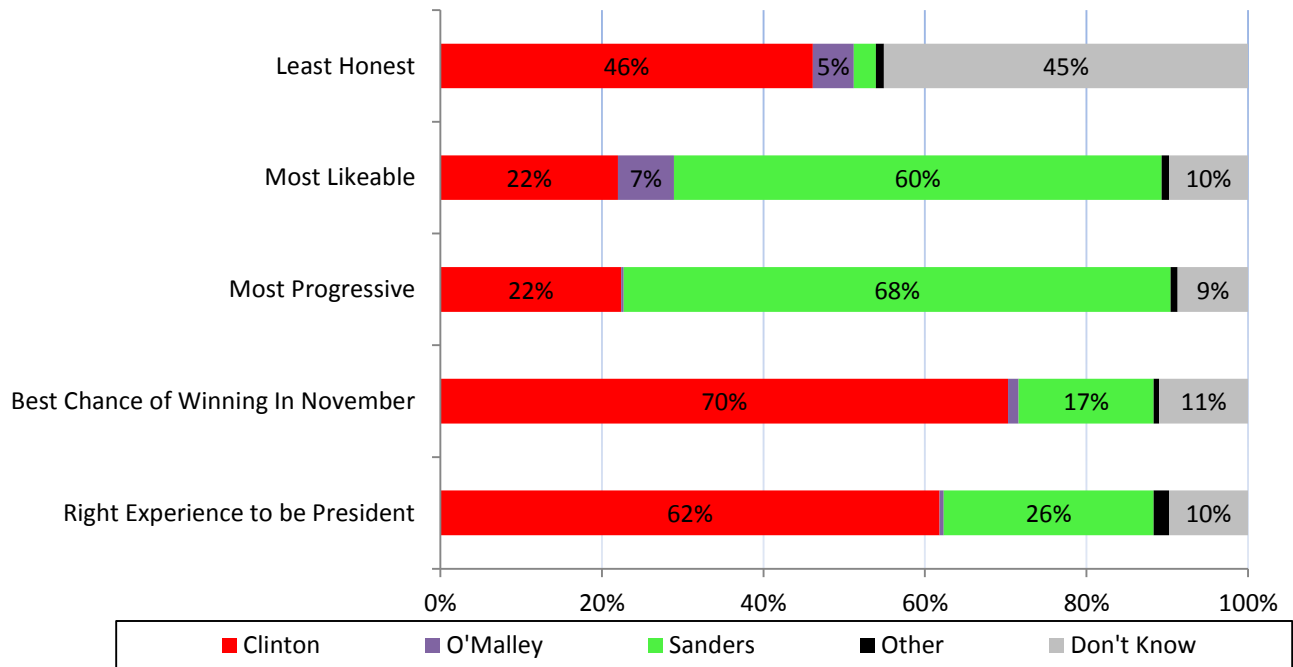


Candidate Qualities

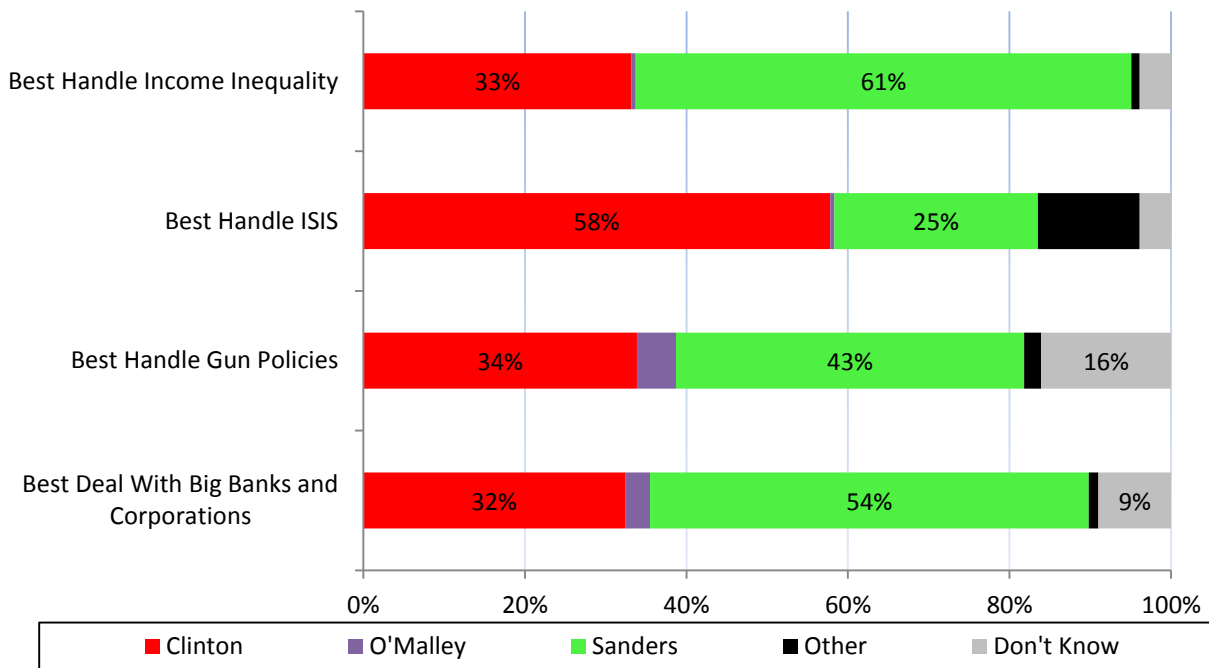
Voters were asked which candidate most exhibits several candidate qualities. Sanders gets the highest ratings among prospective candidates for being the most progressive and most likeable while Clinton is seen as having the right experience to be president and as the most electable Democrat.

Two-thirds of likely Democratic primary voters (68%) think Sanders is the most progressive candidate while only 22% think Clinton is the most progressive. Sixty percent (60%) chose Sanders as the most likeable, 22% chose Clinton, 7% chose O'Malley and 10% were unsure.

Seven in ten (70%) likely voters chose Clinton as having the best chance of winning the general election in next November, 17% chose Sanders and 11% were unsure. Three in five (62%) likely voters chose Clinton as having the right experience to be President, 26% chose Sanders and 10% were unsure. However, 46% say Clinton is the least honest and 45% were unsure.



A majority of likely voters view Bernie Sanders as the best candidate to handle income inequality (61%) and to best deal with big banks and corporations (54%), yet over half of likely voters (58%) view Clinton as the best candidate to handle ISIS. Likely voters are divided on who would best handle gun policies as 43% chose Sanders and 34% chose Clinton.



CNN/WMUR New Hampshire Primary Poll Methodology

These findings are based on the latest CNN/WMUR New Hampshire Primary Poll, conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center and funded by CNN and WMUR-TV, Manchester, NH. Nine hundred and fifty-four (954) randomly selected New Hampshire adults were interviewed by landline and cellular telephone between November 30 and December 7, 2015. If a household included more than one adult, the adult who had the most recent birthday was selected to be interviewed.

The margin of sampling error is +/- 3.1 percent for the entire sample. Included were four hundred two (402) likely 2016 Republican Primary voters (MSE = +/-4.9), and three hundred seventy (370) likely 2016 Democratic Primary voters (MSE = +/-5.1). These MSE's have not been adjusted for design effect. The design effect for the survey is 1.1%.

The random sample used in the CNN/WMUR New Hampshire Primary Poll was purchased from Marketing Systems Group (MSG), Horsham, PA. STS screens each selected telephone number to eliminate non-working numbers, disconnected numbers, and business numbers to improve the efficiency of the sample, reducing the amount of time interviewers spend calling non-usable numbers.

The data have been weighted to adjust for numbers of adults and telephone lines within households. Additionally, data were weighted by respondent sex, age, and region of the state to targets from the most recent American Community Survey (ACS) conducted by the U.S. Census Bureau. In addition to potential sampling error, all surveys have other potential sources of non-sampling error including question order effects, question wording effects, and non-response. Due to rounding, percentages may not sum to 100%. The number of respondents in each demographic below may not equal the number reported in cross-tabulation tables as some respondents choose not to answer some questions.
