

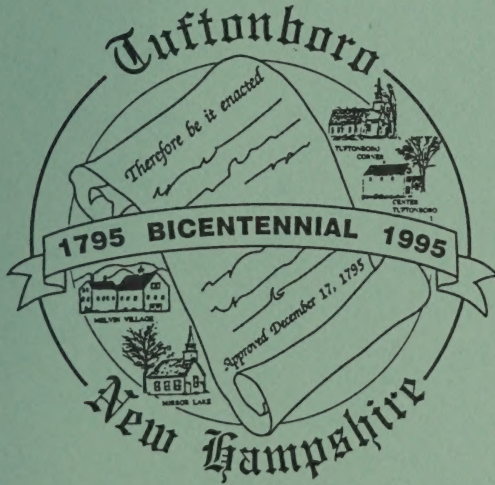

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Tuftonboro in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Tuftonboro Town House in said Tuftonboro on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at 10:00 o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Articles 1, 2, and 3 will be voted on by Ballot on March 14th.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Tuftonboro Central School on Wednesday, the fifteenth day of March next, at 7:30 P.M. in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Tuftonboro Zoning Ordinance?

**PROPOSED ZONING CHANGE:**

3.2 Delete Last Sentence.

Add: The Official Zoning Map shall be reviewed and updated annually to reflect changes in zoning boundaries resulting in Boundary Line Changes.

3. Are you in favor of the adoption of the Floodplain Development Ordinance, as proposed by the Planning Board?  
Yes  No

This ordinance, adopted pursuant to the authority of RSA 674:16, shall be known as the Town of Tuftonboro Floodplain Development Ordinance. The regulations in this ordinance shall overlay and supplement the regulations in the Town of Tuftonboro Zoning Ordinance, and shall be considered part of the Zoning Ordinance for purposes of administration and appeals under state law. If any provision of this ordinance differs or appears to conflict with any provision of the Zoning Ordinance or other ordinance or regulation, the provision imposing the greater restriction or more stringent standard shall be controlling.

The following regulations in this ordinance shall apply to all lands designated as special flood hazard areas by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) in its "Flood Insurance Study for the Town of Tuftonboro, N.H." together with the associated Flood Insurance Rate Maps dated May 4, 1989 which are declared to be a part of this ordinance and are hereby incorporated by reference.

4. Shall the Town of Tuftonboro vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 508:12-b Liability Limited; Fire Department, Emergency Service, and Rescue Squad Members.

I. No person who is a volunteer, "part paid" or "call" member of any non-profit fire department, emergency service or rescue squad operating in any political subdivision shall be held personally liable in any action to recover for personal injury or property damage arising out of any act performed or occurring in the furtherance of his official duties. Nothing in this section shall affect the liability of the political subdivision, department, service or squad served by such person. Nothing in this section shall affect the liability of such person for damages arising out of willful misconduct, gross negligence, or operation under the influence of drugs or alcohol.

II. In this section:

(a) "Call" member means any member other than a full-time paid employee who received payment for each emergency response.

(b) "Official Duties: mean emergency duties only.

(c) "Part Paid" member means any member other than a full-time paid employee who received an annual retainer or stipend of less than \$5,000 for his services as a member.

5. To see if the Town will vote to rescind the actions of the January 18, 1960 Special Town Meeting establishing fire wards and a fire chief, and act pursuant to the revised RSA 154:1, Organization [of Fire Departments] effective January 1, 1994 and organize the fire department, as a municipal department, pursuant to RSA 154:1,I(b) so that the fire chief will be appointed by the local governing body (the Selectmen), with firefighters appointed by the local governing body (the Selectmen), upon recommendation of the fire chief, and Section II, which allows firefighters to recommend the appointment of any firefighter, fire officer or fire chief to the appointing authority. This action is necessary to establish the Town's liability for the fire department. Any guidelines to be considered will take effect one year from the date of this meeting, as per statute.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) for the Piper House Renovation Capital Reserve Fund, previously established. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eighteen Thousand Six Hundred Eighty-three Dollars (\$18,683.00) for the purchase of a new Police Cruiser. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee Recommend this appropriation.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Sixty-six Thousand Two Hundred Eighty-nine Dollars (\$66,289.00) for the

reconstruction of New Road. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee Recommend this appropriation.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty-four Thousand Dollars (\$54,000.00) for the continued reconstruction of Brown Road. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee Recommend this appropriation.
10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty-four Thousand Six Hundred Eighty-six Dollars (\$54,686.00) for the construction of a building at the Tuftonboro Town Lot on Sodom Road for the storage of Winter sand. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee Recommend this appropriation.
11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$50,500.00) for the Special for Tar Account. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee Recommend this appropriation.
12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) for work to be done at the Town Beach Area at 19 Mile Bay and to authorize the withdrawal of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) from the 19 Mile Bay Construction Capital Reserve Fund created for that purpose. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee Recommend this appropriation. (Majority Vote Required.)
13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ninety-seven Thousand Eight Hundred Twenty-five Dollars (\$97,825.00) as requested by the Tuftonboro Solid Waste Committee for Phase I, 1995; Preparatory Work for the Transfer Station/Recycling Center and Construction of a Recycling Building. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee Recommend this appropriation.
14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer Tax Liens, to sell and convey by Quitclaim Deed following notice of sale by advertisement any and all properties acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's Deed by Public Auction (or advertised sealed bid) or in such manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require. The law allows this authority to extend indefinitely until rescinded by a vote of Town Meeting. This article recommended by the Selectmen.
15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Conservation Commission to retain the unexpended portion of its 1995 appropriation. Such funds to be placed in a Special Conservation Fund in accordance with RSA 36A-5.
16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) to be used to publish a book on all cemeteries and old graveyards in Tuftonboro. The Town will be reimbursed with the proceeds from the sale of this book.

This article was submitted by Petition; has the approval of the Selectmen and is recommended by the Budget Committee.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same, the sum of Seven Hundred Eighty-five Thousand Eight Hundred Seventy-nine Dollars (\$785,879.00) as recommended by the Selectmen and approved by the Budget Committee and such sums as may be required to cover the cost of any additional items voted at the meeting and in accordance with RSA 32:8.
18. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

# INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

## 1994

To the Board of Selectmen, Town of Tuftonboro, New Hampshire:

We have audited the accompanying general-purpose financial statements of the Town of Tuftonboro as of and for the year ended December 31, 1993, as listed in the table of contents. These general-purpose financial statements are the responsibility of the Town of Tuftonboro's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these general-purpose financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the general-purpose financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the general-purpose financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall general-purpose financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

The general-purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the General Fixed Assets Account Group, which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. The amounts that should be recorded in the General Fixes Assets Account Group are not known.

In our opinion, except for the effect on the general-purpose financial statements of the omission described in the preceding paragraph, the general-purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Town of Tuftonboro as of December 31, 1993, and the results of its operations and cash flows of its nonexpendable trust funds for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

Our audit was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole. The individual and combining fund financial statements and schedules listed in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the general-purpose financial statements of the Town of Tuftonboro. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the general-purpose financial statements and, in or opinion, is fairly presented in all material respects in relation to the general-purpose financial statements taken as a whole.

The polls to remain open until 6 P.M. or until all present who wish to vote have voted.

The second portion of the 1994 Annual Town Meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Roger Wingate, at 7:30 P.M. Meeting was opened with Salute to the Flag, followed with prayer offered by Rev. Russell Petrie. The Moderator announced the balloting of Article 1, 2, and 3 and declared the following elected to office:

**Moderator Roger H. Wingate; Supervisor of the Check List Barbara W. Hull; Selectmen William Antonucci; Treasurer Sandra Libby; Budget Committee Daniel C. Buttrick and J. Wm. Dawson; Library Trustee Ann Robinson; Trustee of Trust Funds Barbara McClure.**

**2. Article 2 was declared passed by the Moderator.**

**3. Article 3 was declared passed by the Moderator.**

The results of the School Ballot was read for reference only. All elected officers were called to the stage and took the oath of office as prescribed and administered by the Town Clerk. Absent was Ann Robinson, Library Trustee, who will take the oath of office at a later time.

At this time the Moderator acknowledged the resignation of Florence Ham as Ballot Clerk. The records show that Florence Ham has served the Town of Tuftonboro in this position for 23 years; and her faithful service has been appreciated by all who have worked with her and passed through the polls on election day.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) for the purchase of a lot on Route 109A adjacent to the State Highway Facility from Reginald C. Colby for the use of the Town Highway Department for storage of sand, salt, etc. Eight Thousand Dollars (\$8,000.00) for the purchase of the land and Two Thousand Dollars for the

survey. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

Motion was made by Bill Rollins and seconded by Ken Craigue to adopt article four as read. Steve Hunter requested to speak on the article. "The Town owns a lot of land and therefore, why should there be a need to purchase more?" "There is land at the center of Town next to the Library, why not locate there?" He questioned if the Town had to meet wetland and set-back as required by the Planning Board.

Selectman Vittum explained that they wanted to be near the State Facility; being adjacent would make use of the equipment easier. Town proposed to purchase the necessary amount of land to be assured of at least two good acres. This would be central location to get to all areas of the Town. The Town property adjacent to the Library and School would not be a good location. Bill Stockman presented figures about the salt and sodium content in the water near his property located next to the pond, which has tested high. There was much discussion about additional expense in the future re: sheds or buildings; amount of land and whether it was wetland. Ken Craigue made motion to move question. Seconded.

The article was defeated by a show of hands in the negative and so declared by the Moderator.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Sixty-six Thousand Dollars (\$66,000.00) for the purchase of land from Fred and Elaine Sargent on Route 171 to be used as a Solid Waste Facility. Sixty Thousand Dollars (\$60,000.) to be used to purchase the land and Six Thousand Dollars (\$6,000.00) for survey work. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

Motion was made by Bill Antonucci and seconded by Potter Campbell to adopt this article as read. Bill Antonucci explained the article. Plan to purchase 15 acres, this would be the most feasible site as it has been used as a landfill for nearly 20 years. All State permits are for 15 acres at this site. There was a lot of discussion on the need for a survey; as a survey was done prior to the opening of the Landfill in 1975. Most of the money requested for the survey work is for work that is necessary to prepare the site. Some of the debris is not on the permitted site; some of the monitoring wells are outside the proposed site and will need easements. This prompted the question why not buy additional acreage. At this time it was suggested by the Moderator to also discuss article 6, which pertains to the same issue. Selectman Vittum explained that all permits were issued for 15 acres and they do not want to confuse the issue by purchasing more than the 15 acres at this time. All former plans will be updated to completely close the landfill and make preparation for a transfer/recycling station. Town already has a pollution problem at this site, why go somewhere else? Town cannot proceed on any closure plan until the 15 acres is purchased.

Vote on article 5 was by a show of hands in the affirmative and the article declared passed by the Moderator.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) to engage an engineering firm to design a Transfer Station/Recycling Center and to prepare a final Landfill Closure Plan. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

Motion was made by Bill Antonucci and seconded by Paul Appleton to adopt

**article 6 as read. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and article declared passed by the Moderator.**

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eighteen Thousand Eight Hundred Seventy-five Dollars (\$18,875.00) to dredge and construct a launch ramp and docking facility at Nineteen Mile Bay at the present Town-owned site. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.  
**Motion was made by Bill Antonucci and seconded by Potter Campbell to adopt article 7 as read. Selectmen were asked to explain scope of work to be done. The area is a Town launching ramp in serious need of repair and dredging. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and article declared passed by the Moderator.**
8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty-five Thousand Dollars (\$55,000.00) for the Special for Tar Account. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.  
**Motion was made by Bill Antonucci and seconded to adopt article 8 as read. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and article declared passed by the Moderator.**
9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) to be placed in the Piper House Renovation Capital Reserve Fund, previously established. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.  
**Motion was made by Bill Rollins and seconded by Bill Stockman to adopt article 9 as read. Bill Antonucci explained that drawings displayed were done by an architectural student through the efforts of Potter Campbell and the Tuftonboro Association. There are no cost figures available at this time. Money that is being set aside will probably be spent in 1996 when the Selectmen will have more definite plans and costs. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and the article declared passed by the Moderator.**
10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty-five Thousand Dollars (\$35,000.00) for the Dump Closure Capital Reserve Fund, previously established. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.  
**Motion was made by Bill Antonucci and seconded by Jack Widmer to adopt article 10 as read. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and article declared passed by the Moderator.**
11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) for the Fire Truck Capital Reserve fund, previously established. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.  
**Motion was made by Bill Rollins and seconded by Barbara Hull to adopt article 11 as read. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and article declared passed by Moderator.**
12. Shall the Town accept the provisions of RSA 33:7; providing that any town at an annual meeting may adopt an article authorizing indefinitely, until specific rescission of such authority, the Selectmen to issue tax anticipation notes.  
**Motion was made by Bill Antonucci and seconded by Gordon Hunt to adopt article 12 as read. It was explained that this is a "housekeeping article" suggested by State DRA. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and article declared passed by the Moderator.**

13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from the State, Federal, other Governmental Unit or private source in accordance with the procedure set forth in New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated 31:95-B. This authorization to remain in effect until rescinded by a vote of Town Meeting. The Selectmen shall, before accepting funds from the above sources, hold a public hearing to obtain the feeling of the Town. Recommended by the Selectmen.  
**Motion was made by Bill Antonucci and seconded by Gordon Hunt to adopt article 13 as read. This is another suggested "housekeeping article." Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and article declared passed by the Moderator.**
14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer Tax Liens, and sell and convey by Quitclaim Deed following notice of sale by advertisement any and all properties acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's Deed by Public Auction (or by advertised sealed bid) or in such manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require. Recommended by the Selectmen.  
**Motion was made by Bill Antonucci and seconded by Jack Widmer to adopt article 14 as read. This is a general article allowing Selectmen to sell properties if the need arises. Selectmen stated that the only properties considered for sale are some lots at Hidden Valley. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and the article declared passed by the Moderator.**
15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Conservation Commission to retain the unexpended portion of its 1994 appropriation. Such funds to be placed in a Special Conservation Fund in accordance with RSA 36A-5.  
**Motion was made by Bill Antonucci and seconded by Gordon Hunt to adopt article 15 as read. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and article declared passed by the Moderator.**
16. To see if the Town will vote to adopt New Hampshire RSA 154:24; Outside Service by Local Fire Department. To authorize the Town of Tuftonboro Fire Department to go to the aid of another city, town or fire district within or without the state, for the purpose of extinguishing a fire, rendering other emergency assistance, or performing any detail as requested.  
**Motion was made by Bill Antonucci and seconded by John Scott to adopt article 167 as read. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and article declared passed by the Moderator.**
17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell the 1982 Chevrolet/Emergency One Mini-Pumper Fire Engine, by advertised sealed bid.  
**Motion was made by Bill Antonucci and seconded by Paul Appleton to adopt article 17 as read. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and article declared passed by the Moderator.**
18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate an amount equal to the amount received from the sale of the 1982 Chevrolet/Emergency One Mini-Pumper to be placed in the Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund, previously established, for purchase of fire apparatus. This article recommended by the Selectmen.  
**Motion was made by Bill Antonucci and seconded by Joe Ewing to adopt article 18 as read. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and article declared passed by the Moderator.**

19. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 154.1. The Organization of Town/City Fire Departments. This article is to reaffirm the vote taken at a Special Town Meeting, Jan. 18, 1960, at which the Town voted to re-organize the Fire Department and to appoint Firewards. This action is necessary to establish the Town's liability for the Fire Department. Any guidelines to be considered will take effect one year from the date of this meeting.

**Motion was made by Bill Antonucci to indefinitely postpone article on article 19. Seconded by Bill Rollins. Bill Antonucci explained that the article as written to adopt RSA 154.1 was not specific and will need to be rewritten and brought to the voters next year> This is necessary to comply with state mandate. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and the article was declared by the Moderator to be indefinitely postponed.**

20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a boundary line adjustment with and to transfer to the Governor Wentworth Regional School District a strip of land sufficient to provide access around the proposed addition to the Tuftonboro School on Route 109A and to lease to, or grant an easement to, the Governor Wentworth Regional School District additional land area adjacent to said access way for approximately 23 passenger car parking spaces, as determined by the Selectmen.

**Motion was made by Bill Antonucci and seconded by Gordon Hunt to adopt article 20 as read. Selectman Vittum explained the area that was being considered to be added to school property and the area for the easement.**

**Selectman Vittum recognized School Board Member Maureen Borowski as being a great asset to the Town for all she has accomplished for the School. She was given a thankful applause.**

**Bill Williams was concerned for the Memorial Field; as it no longer is a regulation size ballfield. Selectmen explained the Memorial Ballfield will be retained. All expense for moving the ballfield, basketball, soccer areas is included in the school addition figures. The ballfield will not be moved until after Little League season is over in July. All activities will be moved back closer to the Library. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and article declared passed by the Moderator.**

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) for the Drug Abuse Resistance Education Program (DARE) to be made available for the students at the Tuftonboro School. This article submitted by Petition. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

**Motion was made by Bill Antonucci and seconded by Barbara Hull to adopt article 21 as read. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and article declared passed by the Moderator.**

22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) to be used to help support the Tuftonboro Cooperative Nursery School, Inc. This article submitted by Petition. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend the appropriation of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) for this article.

**The Moderator recognized Lisa Greenwood who amended the amount to \$1,500.00. She explained that they had had some very successful fundraisers and now did not need \$3,000.00. There was concern as to why they needed funds; as the Nursery when started was a cooperative, where mothers**

helped to cut costs. Also, they had enough equipment at the school to equip two nursery schools. Lisa explained that State regulations required that they have a certified teacher and aide, which is most of their costs. It was further stated when questioned that there is only one child attending who does not live in Tufftonboro. It was also questioned if this was going to be a yearly request. **Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and article declared passed by the Moderator.**

23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate monies for the purpose of dredging the channel from the mouth of the Melvin River to 300 feet into Melvin Bay. 50% of the cost to be paid for by the Town (not more than \$7,500.00). The balance will be paid by the members of the River Reach Boat Club and other interested parties. This article submitted by Petition. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this article.

**Motion was made by Gordon Hunt and seconded by Jeff Hunter to adopt article 23 as read. Jeff Hunter spoke on the article. This is a public launching area as well as serving the River Reach Docks. The water is very shallow and it is hard to navigate to get to the open lake. Ivan Phelps stated that is more of a safety issue for the Town than a convenience to boaters to have this area dredged. The Boat Club would like the Town to apply for the permit. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and article declared passed by the Moderator.**

24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty-five Hundred Dollars (\$5,500.00) to be paid to the Back Bay Hockey Association towards the addition to the hockey building. This money to be used to reduce the loan balance at First NH Bank, Wolfeboro. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

**Motion was made by Bill Antonucci and seconded by Ann Hackl to adopt article 24 as read. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and article declared passed by the Moderator.**

25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same, the sum of Seven Hundred Twenty-seven Thousand Seven Hundred Twelve Dollars (\$727,712.00) as recommended by the Selectmen and approved by the Budget Committee and such sums as may be required to cover the cost of any additional items voted at the meeting and in accordance with RSA 32:8.

**Motion was made by Bill Rollins and seconded by Ken Craigue to adopt article 25 as read. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and article declared passed by Moderator. Total budget figure with all articles included as voted is \$983,087.00.**

25. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

**Under article for discussion:**

**1. Bill Donovan was concerned about the placement of light poles at the 19 Mile Bay area and when area would be available. Work is scheduled to be completed by June 27, 1994. After completion, there will be a process to go through, whereby the State will turn the present road area/beach area to the Town. The Town will have to approve this by vote of Town Meeting. It is anticipated that work on the beach will be done in 1995.**

**2. Ivan Phelps would like to see the Planning Board Agenda printed in the local paper. A vote taken in the affirmative showed that other persons would**



like this information available.

Motion was made to close meeting. Seconded. Meeting closed at 10:00 P.M. with an attendance of approximately 100 persons.

**REPORT OF THE TUFTONBORO HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT  
1994**

The '94 winter season saw a lot of snow through March 27th and considerable ice and lesser amounts of snow toward the end of December. The first plowable snow was November 28th, but thereafter warmer than usual temperatures made many days seem more like spring than winter.

The usual road maintenance program was again carried out. Dirt road grading, roadside mowing, patching, crack sealing on Ledge Hill Road and ditching were all done. The relocation of the Phineas Graves and Stillings Road junction was started in June. Bridge rails were added to sections of Sodom and Dame roads. The intersection at New Road and Sodom Road was rebuilt, and about 3,200 feet was reclaimed, graveled, and paved. The ever-present beaver problems were addressed, and in November the drainage project was initiated on Brown Road with the addition of underdrain and catch basins. The town-owned lot on Sodom Road was cleared, and the Highway Department sand pile is located there.

Once again, THANK you, everyone, for your help. I appreciate the assistance I've received during the long hours and less-than-perfect outdoor weather conditions.

## TUFTONBORO POLICE DEPARTMENT

Officer Thompson left the department after four years of service. I wish to thank him for his dedicated service and wish him well in his endeavors.

Melvin Village is on the map. To the best of my knowledge, it is a first. That is, the Bank Robbery in Melvin Village. It was only through the cooperation of the State, County and Local police that we were able to bring the individuals to justice. One hour and thirty minutes from the time the robbery occurred, we had the names of suspects. A description of the suspect vehicle was given to us by a local citizen. A broadcast was put out on the suspect vehicle and was monitored by a resident of Alton who took down the license number of the possible getaway car and spotted the vehicle in Alton.

The Police Department handled 338 more calls than they did in 1993. Thefts were down from last year by 10 and motor vehicle accidents were down by 9. Domestic complaints were up by 6. Again this year, I eradicated approximately 10 marijuana plants. This was a result of a report by a citizen of finding a suspect plant but wasn't quite sure what it was. These plants were still potted, and we were able to confiscate them before they reached maturity.

## TUFTONBORO FREE LIBRARY ANNUAL REPORT

1994 was a busy year for the library. The major focus was on preparing for automation of circulation and the card catalog. In spite of growing pains and the confusion of going on-line, our goal was achieved and the new system is working well. I would like to thank the many volunteers who contributed to the conversion and, of course, all the other, too numerous to mention, who have helped with the day-to-day working of the library. The Friends of the Library continue to support the Books for Newborns and programing with the proceeds of the Book and Bake Sale in July. Circulation was brisk last year and patronage reached a new high with 9,924 people coming through the door. The library continues to grow, with a total collection count approaching 14,000. In 1995 we look forward to using some generous gifts received last year. As he has in previous years, Dan Bazikas of Dan's Garage has foregone sending Christmas cards to his customers. He thinks the money is better spent on something the whole town can use. This year we will add a substantial number of titles to the Audiocassette collection thanks to Dan. A generous gift from the Hamel Foundation will go towards offering expanded programs for both children and adults. Last year's programs included a children's concert in August that was well attended, and a record crowd of 135 came for the haunted house and storytellers in October. Also in October, the Friends presented a popular speaker on "Haunted New Hampshire." Public support for the library continues to be very strong, and I regret not having the space here to mention all who contribute to the library in so many ways.

In the calendar year 1994, our three (3) leading causes of fires were No Permit, Children, and Rekindles of fires where the fire was not properly extinguished.

Violations of RSA 224:27 II, the fire permit law, and other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

To aid your Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department and State Fire Officials, contact your local Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required. This also helps to prevent unnecessary response to a controlled burn.

## VNA-HOSPICE ANNUAL REPORT, 1994

The former VNA of Wolfeboro and Vicinity, Inc. and Hospice of Southern Carroll County and Vicinity, Inc. merged on January 1, 1994, to become the VNA-Hospice of Southern Carroll County and Vicinity, Inc. On February 1, 1994, the Agency became State Licensed, and on March 11, 1994 the Agency was granted its Hospice Medicare Certified Status.

The following services were provided to residents of Tuftonboro between 10/01/93 and 09/30/94:

The agency now has a Home Health Program, Maternal Child Health Program, and Hospice Program. The VNA-Hospice also offers Adult Health Clinics, with related tests such as blood pressure, anemia, and blood sugar levels as well as services related to adult health care. Flu immunization clinics are also held as well as educational programs on a wide variety of health care topics

The Agency staff made 23.3% more home visits in FY 1994; Tuftonboro's increase was 73%.

Funding for the above services is received from Medicare, Medicaid, and other insurances, fees collected, and grants from the NH Bureau of Maternal and Child Health. Gifts, donations and town appropriated funds enable us to continue to provide needed services to those who need them without regard for their ability to pay.

The staff is comprised of not only administrative and secretarial staff but registered nurses, licensed practical nurses certified nurses aides, occupational, speech and physical therapists and medical social workers. Nursing visits and home health aide care are available twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week, utilizing an on-call system.

The Board of Directors, staff, and I thank you for your continued support.

## 1994 REPORT

Significant strides were made in 1994 toward the goal of replacing the landfill with a transfer station/recycling center. During the year the Committee heard presentations from Nelson, Ward Associates of Contoocook, Provan & Lorber of Contoocook, Rust Engineering of Concord, H. Edmund Bergeron of North Conway, and CMA Engineers of Portsmouth.

The committee also undertook an analysis of the costs of monitoring three times a year the four wells and leachate seep which surround the landfill. The Committee recommended staying with Eastern Analytical Labs but suggested cost saving measures which were implemented.

Having proceeded as far as they could without knowing if the Town would purchase the landfill, the Committee did not meet during May, June, July, and August, only resuming their meetings in September after the Selectmen finalized the contract with Fred Sargent. The landfill purchase required a boundary survey, and at the request of the Selectmen the Committee obtained quotes from six firms to do this boundary survey as well as a topographic survey which will be needed for the design of the transfer station/recycling center and the final landfill closure plan. The Committee recommended Paul Darbyshire for the work.

At the year end the Committee reviewed the engineers' proposals they had received for the design of the transfer station/recycling center and final landfill closure plan, re-interviewing Nelson, Ward Associates and Provan & Lorber as close contenders. When Greg Ward of Nelson, Ward Associates joined Provan & Lorber the decision was obvious, and Provan & Lorber was recommended to the Selectmen.

Immediately on the 1995 agenda of the Committee will be visiting various transfer station/recycling centers around the State to determine what design will work best for Tuftonboro before we head into the final design process for our facility. The Committee is also in the process of exploring possible silt sources for the landfill closure cap, as a silt cap will be much less expensive than a synthetic cap provided proper material can be located close by.

As before, the Committee meets the second Monday of the month at 7:00 p.m. at the Town Offices, and we welcome interest and input.

## REPORT OF E911 COMMITTEE

The E911 Committee has been meeting regularly for nearly three years, and while we have accomplished a great deal, there is still much to do.

After a public hearing held in July 1993, the Selectmen approved road names. The committee was then able to begin numbering all properties with buildings. All roads have been named and all the households numbered. Road signs have been ordered, and they will be installed in the spring.

The committee prepared and proposed an E911 Ordinance, and in December 1994 a public hearing was held. The ordinance was adopted by the Selectmen.

Members have attended meetings with the State E911 Chairman, Bruce Cheney, as well as representatives of Nynex and Contoocook Valley Telephone Company. We are working with them to coordinate road names and numbers with telephone numbers.

We are also in the process of coordinating the new addresses with various post offices. All households will be notified of road names and number assignments.

Up until his death, John Stockman served as Chairman and had been very knowledgeable and helpful with the process due to his involvement with the Wolfeboro E911 project.

July 1995 is the target date for the emergency system being in place.

## TUFTONBORO BICENTENNIAL COMMITTEE 1994 REPORT

Tuftonboro was chartered as a town on December 17, 1795, making 1995 the 200th anniversary of this historic event. The Tuftonboro Historical Society held a public meeting on November 10, 1994 for the purpose of organizing a Bicentennial celebration honoring our town's 200th anniversary. A steering committee of approximately fourteen people was established and has been meeting regularly to develop a plan, organize the necessary committees and carry out the scheduled events during the bicentennial year which will run from March 1995 to March 1996.

The first activity was a contest to create a logo representing the town and the bicentennial celebration, to be used throughout the year in a variety of ways. The contest has been completed and a design selected by the steering committee. Pewter medallions are being struck to be sold as mementos of the town's 200th anniversary. First sales are scheduled for the annual Town Meeting in March 1995.

Numerous activities are planned throughout the bicentennial year, including parades, church events, civic and patriotic events, school activities, social events and updating of a number of historic records for future generations. Details of these activities and dates will be published in calendar form in March and throughout the year in local papers prior to each event.

## LAKE WINNIPESAUKEE ASSOCIATION

The Lake Winnepesaukee Association, in cooperation with UNH, is continuing to monitor the water quality of Melvin Bay, Moultonboro Bay, Twenty Mile Bay, and an area near Little Bear Island. The support of Tuftonboro enabled us to expand the program, and we are asking that you continue that support again this year. While the water quality remains high (and will hopefully remain so with the implementation of the Comprehensive Shoreland Protection Act), the monitoring serves as an early warning system of potential problems and creates a long-term database to distinguish short-term variations from long-term trends. We are seeing increased blooms of a nuisance "cotton candy" filamentous green alga called *Mougeotia*, and areas of rapid growth of other submerged aquatic plants, but the significance of these findings is not yet clear. Since the state monitors the lake only every ten years or so, the Lakes Lay Monitoring Program is "insurance" to protect the town tax base dependent on water quality.

The monitoring results are now part of a Geographic Information Systems (GIS) map and database accessible at the Lakes Region Planning Commission and elsewhere, and the program continues to expand in scope and usefulness.

Unfortunately, the state contributes very little to our efforts. The monitoring has been supported by private and town contributions for the last few years, and the Lake Winnepesaukee Association has raised from its members only about half of what is needed to continue the program. The contributions of Tuftonboro and the other participating towns are vital. Most towns on the lake are contributing to the program through various organizations cooperating with UNH; the Lake Winnepesaukee Association is also receiving funding from Alton for monitoring in Alton Bay.
