To the Inhabitants of the Town of Boscawen in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Boscawen on Tuesday, the Fourteenth day of March, next at Ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To see what action the Town will take with respect to the proposed amendments to the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows:
  1. Add to the list of permitted uses in Table 1 of Section 4.01, District Regulations, Article IV, "Thirteen to Sixteen unit family dwelling" by special exception in R2 and C zoning districts.
  2. Add the words "non-home based" to the retail establishments paragraph shown in Table 1, Section 4.01, District Regulations, Article IV. New use would read "Non-home based retail establishments not requiring outdoor storage of goods including but not limited to groceries, pharmaceuticals, general merchandise, furniture, apparel and specialty goods, tobacco, newspapers, books, gifts, flowers and similar items" allowable in Commercial and Industrial Zoning Districts.

A copy of the above is on file at the Town Clerk's office and will be on display at the Town Hall on March 14, 1995. (Ballot Vote). Recommended by Planning Board and Board of Selectmen.

You are further notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Boscawen on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March, next at 7:30 P.M. to act upon the following subjects:

3. To see if the municipality will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,322,135 which represents the operating budget. Said sum does not include special articles addressed.
4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$24,000 for the purchase of a four wheel drive pick up truck with a plow for the Highway Department. Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 to be added to the Highway Dump Truck Capital Reserve Fund previously established. Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$35,000 for a 38' x 40' addition to the Highway Garage. This addition replaces a 38' x 30' area to be removed. Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$9,500 for the development and production of new computerized (digital) tax maps, to include a Town-wide parcel composite map with insert map for the Town center area, a Town-wide tax map index, and individual tax maps equivalent in scale to existing tax maps. Targeted Block Grant for \$2,500 to be applied for. Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$5,000 for improvements to the Historical Society building. Selectmen and a majority of the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

9. To see if the town will vote on the following question: "Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:1-c which authorizes any town or city to elect not to assess, levy and collect a resident tax?"

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$19,500 to help support the Penacook Rescue Squad for its emergency medical services and rescue operations for the Town. Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$6,489 for the services of Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association. Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$3,976 for services to low-income residents of Boscawen through the Concord Area Center Community Action Program, Belknap-Merrimack Counties, Inc. Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$3,000 toward the operating expenses of the Penacook Community Center. Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept, on behalf of the town, gifts, legacies, and devises made to the Town intrust for any public purpose, as permitted by RSA 31:19.

15. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

## SELECTMEN'S REPORT

We were pleased to see a modest increase of commercial development in Boscawen in 1994. Elektrisola completed an expansion of their manufacturing and office space with jobs added as a result. The J. & S. Leasing buildings along High St. owned by the Steenbeke family now house four new tenants: KSD Custom Woodworking, Prototek Sheetmetal Fabricating, Certified Metal Processing and Arrow Fire Protection. More than a dozen jobs are involved in these small businesses.

As authorized by Warrant Article #12 last March, town property values were equalized to better reflect present market values. The first 25% of town properties were revalued as part of a four year cycle. No additional monies will be appropriated to complete the next three years.

Further improvements were made in our recycling set-up. The Public Works crew built a roll-off box for collecting cans and foil with a materials cost of only \$700. This much larger box means less delivery trips to Concord. They also installed a larger, donated, used oil tank which allowed us to deal with a NH certified oil recycler. The used roll-off truck we purchased in 1993 made 230 trips in 1994 taking trash to the incinerator, scrap metal to Concord, paper to West Hopkinton and glass (2 trips) to Nashua. Charles Westgate, who retired from full-time work, has been retained on a part-time basis primarily to operate this truck.

We urge more of you to recycle paper, cans and glass. There is no sense at all in sending unburnable glass and cans to the incinerator. In 1994, we did collect and ship 83 tons of these three items which saved us \$3,360 in tipping fees. We sold those items plus the scrap metal for more than \$4,600. Cooperation from those of you who are not recycling could help us to reduce the solid waste budget further in 1995.

Last winter's heavy snow plowing and a major unplanned engineer repair threatened to wreck our highway budget. However, the budget remained in the black for the year by cutbacks on some street improvements. Nevertheless, Park, Oak, Prospect, Lincoln and Johnson Streets received a high quality hot-topping job. Lower Queen Street was oiled and sanded.

A state veteran's cemetery was approved during the year to be built in 1995. It will be located in part of the Merrimack River State Forest along the Daniel Webster Highway and will serve the needs of all NH veterans. We believe it will be a facility the Town will be proud of for many years to come.

Also approved in 1994 was the removal of the Depot Street Bridge over the abandoned railroad tracks. A hump, dangerous for both cars and pedestrians will be replaced by a grade crossing and sidewalk up to King Street. This project will be done in the fall of 1995.

Monitoring wells at the closed landfill on Corn Hill Road were tested again in spring, summer and fall. Although there was a spike in some chemicals during the summer test, we had some of the lowest readings ever in the fall test.



We still have not heard anymore from the NH Department of Environmental Services.

As had been stated before, the success of the Town is due to the continued dedication of the employees of the Town of Boscawen and the continued support and efforts put forth by volunteer members of various boards and committees. We are continually in need of replacements and alternates. If you feel you have something to offer and can give some time (even a dissenting opinion can spark new thoughts) come forth — let one of the Selectmen know, contact a Board/Committee or come in to the Town Office. As in the past, but still true, "BOSCAWEN NEEDS YOU!"

## BUDGET COMMITTEE REPORT

The 1995 budget season commenced with the first budget committee meeting on February 1, 1995. A thorough analysis of actual budget line item expenditures for the past five (5) years, in comparison to the proposed budget figures, showed a continued and consistent effort by town officials to maintain our best financial interests.

All in all, last year's budget shows actual expenditures of over \$100,000 less than what was budgeted. A true indication that our town officials are committed to controlling any unnecessary spending. This past year we did experience over expenditures in certain line items which reflect an increase in phone costs; the purchase of uniforms and equipment for our police department; repairs to equipment in our fire department, highways and streets department and solid waste disposal.

Also to our benefit, revenues were more favorable than in past years. Lower interest rates were paid on money borrowed and less money was borrowed due to a better collection rate from taxpayers.

Some discussion this year focused on an issue that your Budget Committee and town officials believe to be an important part in the overall budget picture. The anticipation and identification of long range needs and goals for the town of Boscawen. We must start working today for what is going to matter to Boscawen over the next several years, what will be affecting our citizens and what we, as a town, can and should be doing to address those needs.

The 1995 budget reflects an increase of less than 1% without warrant article spending and is supported unanimously by the Budget Committee.

## BOSCAWEN TOWN MEETING

### March 8, 1994

The Annual Town Meeting was called to order at 10:00 A.M. by Moderator Rick Trombly, who read the warrant and declared the pools would stay open until 7:00 P.M.

A motion was made by Selectman Douglas Supry to hold action on Articles 3 through 21 until the ballots were counted in the evening.

Ballot Clerks were Mary Weeks, Harriet Bowen, Nancy Moody and Earl Houston.

Polls closed at 7:00 P.M. The votes were counted and the results were:

The evening meeting was called to order at 8:00 P.M. by Moderator Rick Trombly who gave the results of the balloting.

The Moderator announced the rules for the meeting. He noted that Roberts Rules of Order would be followed. He reported the Town Meeting was subject to reconsideration under RSA 40:10 and explained the provisions of RSA 40:10. He also reported he had been asked whether non-residents would be allowed to speak on warrant articles. He ruled that non-residents would be recognized to speak but not to vote.

Dorothy Sanborn objected to non-residents speaking at Town Meeting. Kenneth Marshall felt non-resident property owners should be identified as non-residents and allowed to speak. By a show of hands, 103 residents voted in favor of allowing non-residents to speak on warrant articles and 45 residents voted in opposition.

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

*Officials Weighers.* Claire Clarke moved to case one ballot for the incumbents as listed in the Annual Report with the exception of Charles Scheys who no longer lived in town. Dorothy Sanborn seconded. Motion passed.

*Surveyors of Wood and Lumber.* Denise Pearl moved to re-elect the incumbents as listed in the Annual Report. Tim Welch seconded. Motion passed.

*Fence Viewers.* Thomas Danko moved to re-elect the incumbents as listed in the Annual Report. Douglas Supry seconded. Motion passed.

Dorothy Sanborn moved to proceed directly to Article 15. The motion was duly seconded and passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the town will vote to support designation of the upper Merrimack River as a Scenic and Recreational River under the National Wild and Scenic Rivers Act with the following conditions:

— That there be no loss of local government authority as pertains to the management of lands adjacent to the river, and there will be no federal land management as a result of the designation;

— That management of the river will be based on the locally developed Management and Implementation Plan;

— That there will be no condemnation of lands by the federal government as a result of the designation;

— That there will be no new federal permits required as a result of the designation;

— That the Upper Merrimack River Local Advisory Committee will review and approve any eventual legislation to designate the river as a component of the Wild and Scenic Rivers System.

Michele Tremblay moved to accept the Article as read. Edward Brodeur seconded.

David Morrill, a non-resident who owns property in Boscawen, explained he represented the city of Concord as a member of the Merrimack River Coordinating Committee. He had heard much testimony both for and against this designation and felt the designation was not needed. He felt most of the river frontage was owned by farmers who were successfully meeting local and state regulations.

Edward Maloof, Boscawen resident for eight years, explained he felt some people were voting for the wrong reasons. He reported he had been involved



with the federal government for 25 years and he felt the only way to stop the federal government from taking land was to use the federal government's rules. Right now the federal government's rules were the Wild and Scenic Rivers designation. The only thing residents were voting on this evening was whether to support the Congressional delegation in their decision to ask for the designation. He felt voters could protect the land by using federal protections.

Wayne Hardy expressed his concern about this designation. He felt once the federal government got its fingers in something, they would not stop regulating it.

Charles Niebling read a letter from Walter Silver in favor of the designation. He then commented that the Conservation Commission had voted in favor of the designation as presented in the warrant article. He himself had wavered on the issue and had decided to vote in favor of the designation. He did not see this as a negative step.

Kenneth Marshall explained he worked for the New Hampshire Farm Bureau Federation, which took a position against the designation. He was speaking this evening on his own behalf and not for the Farm Bureau. He explained one of his jobs with the Farm Bureau was to represent the best interests of the farmers to the Legislature. He explained the Merrimack River was a protected river and agriculture was protected as well. There was no credible evidence to vote for Scenic. The upper Merrimack was a protected river, the Local Advisory Committee would continue with or without Scenic, and there was an implementation plan that the Committee must present to the Town Meeting at some point in the future. All the good things the Park Service said and the Local Advisory Committee said were true, but it got that way without the Park Service and could stay that way without the Park Service. The Army Corps of Engineers had permitting authority. Particularly disturbing to Mr. Marshall was the fact that in the Plan it said the Park Service would have review. That could mean veto power over the Corps of Engineers permits. He felt this was just another layer of regulatory red tape. Also disturbing was the fact that the Park Service review authority would extend to the entire Merrimack River watershed. He felt that would include most of the county. The Park Service could not and would not accept in the legislation any lateral boundaries. Federal government just got larger and larger.

Larry Thomas asked which kept the federal government out of Boscawen, a vote for the designation or a vote against?

Roger Sanborn discussed the Sewalls Falls dam application of about ten years ago. That was his first involvement with the Wild and Scenic designation. He explained RSA 483 protected the river and you could not ask for anything better. But there was one commission that could still overrule. That was FERC. The only way to control FERC was through the Wild and Scenic Rivers designation. He felt the best way to preserve the river was through this designation.

Diane Griffith, a Franklin, New Hampshire resident, spoke against the designation because she felt the river restricted itself.

Steve Maveglio, non-resident, explained he had written the protection law. There were four or five federal agencies that already controlled the river. Designation was the key to control. A vote of yes was a vote for local control.

Lori Seog moved to end debate. Dorothy Sanborn seconded. Motion passed on a voice vote.

The Moderator explained he had received a request by Michelle Tremblay, Edward Maloof, Roger Sanborn, William R. Bevans, and John Porter for a paper ballot vote on Article 15.

There was a recess while residents cast their paper ballots relative to Article 15.

While ballots were being counted, the Moderator continued with Town Meeting and reported he had received a request from Kenneth Marshall to speak as a matter of personal privilege. Mr. Marshall reported he objected to personal remarks made about Mr. Marshall by Mr. Maveglio during his comments.

ARTICLE 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

Thomas Danko moved to raise and appropriate \$1,314,214 to defray town charges for the ensuing year. Douglas Supry seconded. Mr. Danko explained last year's operating budget, including warrant articles, totaled \$1,343,903. This year's appropriation included a 5% increase for town employees since they had not received an increase last year. Mr. Danko explained the budget relative to solid waste disposal.

Claire Clarke asked for explanation of the difference in the salary for the Public Works Director this year as compared with previous years. Selectman Houston explained that in the previous years the Director was also a part-time employee of the Water Precinct, but this year he would be a full time employee of the town. The salary reflected the full time status.

Motion to approve Article 3 passed.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$17,000 for the purchase of a police cruiser.

Claire Clarke moved to accept Article 4 as read; seconded by Theodore Houston. There being no discussion, the Article was adopted.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 to be added to the Highway Dump Truck Capital Reserve Fund previously established.

Thomas Danko moved to accept Article 5 as read. Theodore Houston seconded. There being no discussion, the Article was adopted.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$19,500 to help support the Penacook Rescue Squad for its emergency medical services and rescue operations for the Town.

Claire Clarke moved to accept Article 6 as read. Sandra Hardy seconded. There being no discussion, the Article was adopted.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$6,489 for the services of Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association.

Denise DeStefano moved to accept Article 7 as read. Sherlene Fisher seconded. There being no discussion, the Article was adopted.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$3,615 for services to low-income residents of Boscawen through the Concord Area Center Community Action Program.

Thomas Danko moved to accept Article 8 as read. Douglas Supry seconded. There being no discussion, the Article was adopted.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$3,000 toward the operating expenses of the Penacook Community Center.

Joel White moved to accept Article 9 as read. Florence Danko seconded. There being no discussion, the Article was adopted.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$20,000 to repair and recondition the 1974 Loader.

Robert Knowlton moved to accept Article 10 as read. William Urbach seconded. There being no discussion, the Article was adopted.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$13,000 for an Exhaust Extraction System for the Fire Station.

Brenda Bartlett moved to accept Article 11 as read. Douglas Supry seconded. Michele Tremblay asked what an extraction system was and Ray Fisher explained. There being no further discussion, the Article was adopted.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$33,000 for an equalization of town property values to be done in 1994 and a revaluation of town properties to be done on a four year cycle. This will be a special non-lapsing article per RSA 32:3 VI and will not lapse until the revaluation is completed in four years.

Douglas Supry moved to accept Article 12 as read. Theodore Houston seconded. Dorothy Sanborn asked if \$33,000 was the total cost or if that was a present year charge. She was told that was the total cost for the contract. Sandra Hardy asked whether the work would be done by a New Hampshire firm. Selectman Supry answered it would be done by the same New Hampshire firm that handled the town's appeals at this time. Michele Tremblay felt this \$33,000 was not going to change anything. Everyone had depressed property values right now. Mr. Supry explained that right now the town was at 137% valuation rate; last year it was 120%. The rate should be going down. Taxes were based on a

fair market value but this would bring assessments back into the fair market. Sandra Brodeur explained reevaluations were required by the Revenue Administration periodically and usually cost \$80,000 in one year. This would satisfy the State requirement at a better price.

Maxwell Millard asked about equalization over the four year period and Theodore Houston explained the process. James Colby added to the explanation.

Mr. Danko reported the Selectmen expected the first year portion of the cost would be about \$13,000.

There being no further discussion, Article 12 was adopted.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$1,000 toward the restoration and preservation of the Boscawen Historical Society's museum and artifact collection, which is maintained for the benefit of the town.

Michele Tremblay moved to accept Article 13 as read. Sandra Hardy seconded. There being no discussion, Article 13 was adopted.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to support efforts to secure public acquisition of the 970 acre Tamposi property (currently owned by EK Associates), including the 77 acre Patenaude Pond in Boscawen to ensure that this land remain forever available for public access including outdoor recreation for boating, fishing, hunting, hiking, swimming, skiing and snowmobiling; wildlife and waterfowl habitat, forest management and production of timber; and the enjoyment of present and further generations of Boscawen residents, New Hampshire citizens and visitors alike.

Charles Niebling moved to accept Article 14 as read. Michele Tremblay seconded.

Bea Nohe moved to amend the motion to include dog sledding and horseback riding in the Article. Michele Tremblay seconded. Motion to amend passed.

Charles Niebling offered to answer questions in respect to the property and the current effort in the legislature to get funding. Ray Fisher asked how long it would be before we would be in another Town Meeting talking about federal protection of this property. Mr. Niebling explained that the State had designated the Fish and Game Department as the lead agency in this acquisition. He also was not optimistic about legislature appropriating funds for this property. He did not see any federal involvement in this property.

There being no further discussion, Article 14 was adopted as amended.

ARTICLE 15. The Moderator announced the results of the paper ballot relative to Article 15. There were 99 No votes and 70 votes in favor with one blank ballot. Article 15 failed to be adopted.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the town will vote to accept Weir Road and Fairbanks Drive as Class V Town Roads.

Douglas Supry moved to accept Article 16 as read. Theodore Houston seconded.

James Colby asked if these roads had been looked into by an engineer. Mr. Danko explained that Fairbanks Drive had not been reviewed by an engineer. That had been a town project to rebuild. Weir Road had been rebuilt to town specifications by an engineer who developed abutting property. He reported an outside engineer had not been hired.

There being no further discussion, Article 16 was adopted.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept the dedication of any street shown on a subdivision plat approved by the Planning Board, provided that such street has been constructed to applicable town specifications as determined by the Board of Selectmen or their agent.

Dorothy Sanborn moved to table. Michele Tremblay seconded. Motion failed on a voice vote.

Theodore Houston moved to accept Article 17 as read. Douglas Supry seconded.

Dorothy Sanborn asked what dedication of a street meant. Mr. Supry explained the process of accepting a street within a subdivision approved by the Planning Board. She then spoke against this Article because any street layout would be an expense to the Town.

James Colby discussed the expense of upkeep of any new streets. Michele Tremblay discussed this Article as it related to Fairbanks Drive. Ron Butler mentioned that there was only one house on Weir Road and the Town was plowing it. Mr. Supry explained that it was being plowed for better access to the Town Forest at the end of Weir Road. Dorothy Sanborn felt this Article was meaningless and should not be passed. Michele Tremblay asked if there was any type of impact fee in any road such as this to cover repairs five years from now. Douglas Supry answered that it was an option the Selectman had. The Town held a bond on Weir Road for several years until it was completed and inspected.

Sherlene Fisher moved to amend the motion to remove the words "the dedication of". Robert Norton seconded. Motion to amend passed.

Michele Tremblay asked, if the EK Associates development had gotten further along with construction of roads before going bankrupt, would adoption of this Article have given Selectmen the authority to accept the roads from the bankrupt contractor? Douglas Supry indicated it did not mandate that Selectmen accept the roads, but made provision for that to happen.

There being no further discussion, Article 17 was adopted as amended.

Kenneth Marshall moved to adopt the provisions of RSA 40:10 regarding Article 15. William Heinz seconded.

Edward Maloof asked if this should have been voted on at the time of consideration of Article 15 and the Moderator responded that it could be done at any time during the meeting. Peter Kenney asked for clarification of the process. The Moderator explained RSA 40:10 and what it meant.

Motion to adopt RSA 40:10 for Article 15 passed.

ARTICLE 18. Shall the Town accept the provisions of RSA 202-A:4-c providing that any town at an annual meeting may adopt an article authorizing indefinitely, until specific rescission of such authority, the public Library Trustees to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the town meeting, anticipated money from a state, federal or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the fiscal year?

Claire Clarke moved to accept Article 18 as read. Sandra Hardy seconded. There being no discussion, Article 18 was adopted.

ARTICLE 19. Shall the Town accept the provisions of RSA 33:7 providing that any town at an annual meeting may adopt an article authorizing indefinitely, until specific rescission of such authority, the selectmen to issue tax anticipation notes?

Douglas Supry moved to accept Article 19 as read. Sherlene Fisher seconded. There being no discussion, Article 19 was adopted.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept, on behalf of the town, gifts, legacies, and devises made to the town in trust for any public purpose, as permitted by RSA 31:19.

Theodore Houston moved to accept Article 20 as read. Douglas Supry seconded. There being no discussion, Article 20 was adopted.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize indefinitely, until specific rescission of such authority, the Selectmen to convey any real estate acquired by the town by tax collector's deed. Such conveyance shall be by deed following a public auction, or the property may be sold by advertised bids, or may be otherwise disposed of as justice may require, pursuant to RSA 80:80.

Douglas Supry moved to accept Article 21 as read. Claire Clarke seconded. There being no discussion, Article 21 was adopted.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from the state, federal or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year. This authorization in accordance with RSA 31:95-b shall remain in effect until rescinded by a vote of the town meeting.

Theodore Houston moved to accept Article 22 as read. Thomas Danko seconded. There being no discussion, Article 22 was adopted.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept gifts of personal property, other than cash, to the town for any public purposes. This authorization in accordance with RSA 31:95-e shall remain in effect until rescinded by a vote of the town meeting.

Ray Fisher moved to accept Article 23 as read. Theodore Houston seconded. There being no discussion, Article 23 was adopted.

ARTICLE 24. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

Dorothy Sanborn mentioned that in the Boscawen Academy Trustees Report there was a reference to a Paul Revere bell. She felt this was erroneous. She also noticed the Trustees of Trust Funds report was not in the Annual Report and asked that this be properly distributed within two weeks.

Theodore Houston mentioned Old Home Day would die without additional volunteers. He asked for volunteers to work on one of the committees.

Thomas Danko asked for a sense of the Meeting as to whether residents would be interested in continuing Town Meeting on a Saturday instead of at the time of voting. Residents overwhelmingly indicated they preferred the current arrangement.

Dorothy Sanborn moved to adjourn the meeting. Ray Fisher seconded. The meeting was adjourned at 10:20 P.M., Tuesday, March 8, 1994.

## INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT OF FINANCIAL PRESENTATION

To the Members of the Board of Selectmen

We have audited the accompanying general purpose financial statements of the Town of Boscawen as of and for the year ended December 31, 1993, as listed in the table of contents. These general purpose financial statements are the responsibility of the Town's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these general purpose financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the general purpose financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the general purpose financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall general purpose financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As described in Note 1B, the general purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the General Fixed Assets Account Group, which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. The amount that should be recorded in the General Fixed Assets Account Group is not known.

In our opinion, except for the effect on the financial statements of the omission described in the preceding paragraph, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Town of Boscawen as of December 31, 1993, and the results of its operations and cash flows of its nonexpendable trust funds for the year then ended in conformity with general accepted accounting principles.

Our audit was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole. The combining and individual fund financial statements listed in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Boscawen. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the general purpose financial statement and, in our opinion, is fairly presented in all material respects in relation to the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole.

1994 marked our fifth complete year of successful operations. Some items which may be of interest follow:

The tonnage delivered to the plant by the Cooperative this year was 116,510. This was an increase of 9,621 tons over 1993, or a 9% increase. 1994 was the second straight year that the Cooperative went over GAT. Our GAT for 1994 was 105,634 tons and 116,510 tons were actually delivered. A total of 67,765 tons of ash were delivered to the landfill for disposal. The landfill continues to operate well.

The 1995 budget reflects a decrease in the tipping fee of \$.50 per ton. This is the first time that the Co-op has been able to reduce the tipping fee for the communities.

The ash paving demonstration project in Laconia continues to be monitored by UNH. The final report and permitting are to be completed early this spring. All is going well with the project.

The maintenance building which was budgeted in 1994 was completed in March of 1994. The project cost was on budget and is providing the maintenance and storage space we had hope for.



## BOSCAWEN FIRE DEPARTMENT

The Boscawen Fire Department responded to 136 calls a 22.5% increase from 1993. The average response time was 4.9 minutes. One of our calls this year involved a double fatal; two adults overcome by smoke inhalation.

Firefighters continue in training programs at Fitzwilliams, Lakes region, Capital area N.H. Fire Academy and the fire station. There were 4 firefighters that satisfactorily completed the Firefighter One Course.

The Fire Prevention Program is going very well at the local schools, as well as senior citizens organizations in town. Lt. Tim Kenney heads the Fire Prevention Program and does an excellent job.

I would like to extend a hearty thanks to all the Department Officers, Firefighters and the Ladies Auxiliary for their cooperation, time, understanding and effort in the past year. I know it was hectic at times.

The addition to the station is just about completed. A very special "THANKS" to the many very dedicated people.

On behalf of the Building Committee, I would like to thank all the firefighters, individuals, organizations and town businesses for their support and donations of equipment, materials, time, expertise and monies.

If you have any fire related problems, do not hesitate to contact the Fire Department. Practice fire prevention 365 days a year, be fire safe every day. Install and maintain smoke detectors; they could save your life!

## TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER REPORT

In calendar year 1994, our three (3) leading causes of fires were No Permit, Children and Rekindles of fires where the fire was not properly extinguished.

Violations of RSA 224:27 II, the fire permit law, and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

To aid your Forest fire Warden, Fire Department and State Forest Fire Officials, contact your local Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required. This also helps to prevent unnecessary response to a controlled burn.

## 1994 HEALTH OFFICER REPORT

In 1994, there were very few complaints from the Town residents, 25 telephone calls and only 20 health complaints. The Town's people should be aware that garbage can lead to long term damage to our environment. Please keep your property neat and clean.

### Lyme Disease

This spring you can avoid tick bites outdoors in the woods or around tall grass and bushes, by tucking your pant legs into boots or socks and bringing insect repellent with you. When you leave the woods and return home, be sure to look for ticks. If you find any, remove ticks with tweezers and call your doctor if disease symptoms occur.

### Animal Control Officer

#### Rabies

Rabies in humans is an acute viral disease which is almost always fatal. Skunks, bats, foxes, coyotes, raccoons, bobcats and other wild carnivores as well as woodchucks, are high risk wild animals and constitute the chief reservoir of rabies in the United States.

We are expecting domestic cats and dogs to be at an increasing risk for this disease as wildlife rabies increases.

Leave all stray, unfamiliar and abnormally acting domestic animals and wild animals alone. Do not touch or feed them.

As the above figures show, most of the applications were for rent and utilities (electricity and fuel for heating and cooking). Last year we reported 281 applications (116 families) for a total spent of \$32,000.72 so this year with 141 applications (76 families) for a total spent of \$18,476.54 has been somewhat easier on our town. We were fortunate again to receive the Stewart B. McKinney Emergency shelter Grant Program money \$4,000 this year. Looking over the past six years, we find we have applied for and received \$17,750 which has been a tremendous help to our town. Some of our clients are trying to repay the town for assistance given them and this figure is \$2,350.97 this year. We appreciate this very much as it gives us more funds to help someone else.

We continue to get outstanding assistance from the Community Action Program. According to their 1994 report, the Town of Boscawen people received the following:

The Community Action Program provides outreach to those homebound and direct assistance and services to income eligible, low income, handicapped and elderly people. If you are interested in any of these programs, you may call their

office at 44 Warren Street in Concord — 225-6880 — to make an appointment to talk with them. There are many State and Federal Programs available, and our office has information on them if anyone is interested. In our office, too, is a listing of food pantries in our area. Through the Capital Region Food Program, we have been able to get food for our own pantry at the Selectmen's office at no cost to our town. The Boscawen Congregational Church has clothing as well as food in their pantry. Some of our people help at the soup kitchen at the United Church of Penacook where on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday evenings from 4:30 to 5:30 a delicious supper is served. This supper is free to any needy family in this area. Please continue to let us know if you hear of anyone needing help, but who is reluctant to ask for help. We don't want anyone to be without shelter, heat, food or medical attention.

The Town of Boscawen is fortunate in having so many organizations who are willing and eager to help needy families especially at Holiday Time. There were many bountiful baskets of food at Thanksgiving and many volunteers delivering the baskets. The Windmill Restaurant was open all day to give free Thanksgiving dinners to needy families — this they have done for several years. At Christmas time, we were so proud of all those who volunteered to help at the Capital Region Food Program by packaging and delivering the many food baskets in time for Christmas dinners. The Toys for Tots Program by the Boscawen Police Auxiliary and the Giving Tree sponsored by the Concord Hospital Auxiliary were outstanding again this year. Many children received lovely clothing, gifts and toys who otherwise may not have received any gifts at all this year. Some of our families were remembered at Christmas by the Salvation Army who remembers needy families all year long.

Our sincere thank you to all of you who made the Holiday Season so much brighter for so many of our Boscawen people — especially to: the Boscawen Congregational Church and Ladies Aid, Boscawen Police Department and Women's Auxiliary, the Immaculate Conception Church, the United Church of Penacook, the Ezekiel Webster Grange, the Boy Scouts and Cub Scouts, the Tri-Amity Guild, Merrimack County Ox Bows, 4-H Club, Town Line Trail Dusters, Steenbeke & Sons, Visiting Nurse Association, Elektrisola, Concord Electric, — and, of course, our Selectmen and office staff.

The Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission (CNHRPC) is a voluntary association of 20 towns and the City of Concord in Merrimack and Hillsboro Counties. The Town of Boscawen is a member in good standing of the Commission.

Our two part mission is to help our communities prepare and implement local plans and to plan for the effective and appropriate development and utilization of the resources of the region.

Our accomplishments over the last year include:

- Adopting the transportation element of the regional master plan;
- preparing a transportation improvement program (TIP), the capital improvement plan for transportation in the region;
- updating the Merrimack County overall economic development plan;
- preparing a management plan for the Contoocook River;
- supporting community representatives planning for the Soucook River;
- preparing the update to the affordable housing assessment to provide support and guidance to local planning efforts;
- preparing a transit information report;
- providing a wealth of information for use by local planners;
- providing high quality and timely technical assistance to member municipalities;

Specific activities in Boscawen included: providing information on procedures for accepting revised plans at a public hearing; reviewing zoning ordinances and subdivision regulations; providing copies from Federal Emergency Management Administration Flood Insurance Program regulations; providing draft flood plain ordinance amendments and explanations to the planning board; consulting on development standards including length and use of common driveways and private roads; consulting on procedures for changing conditions of approval on special exceptions and variances; consulting on the authority of the planning board to approve a subdivision with insufficient frontage to meet zoning requirements; providing information on the procedure to merge a non-conforming lot with a conforming lot; consulting on the allowed locations for home occupations; providing a sample warrant article for use in adopting an amendment to the flood plain ordinance; consulting with planning board on proposed subdivision for the school property; consulting with the planning board on who must sign subdivision plats; consulting with the planning board on the subdivision of land in an industrial zone; participating in the Allied Leather Tannery Reuse Committee; consulting on zoning administration and

interpretation; consulting on the replacement of non conforming structures; attending planning board meetings to assist in the review of subdivisions and site plans; consulting on requirements for subdivision plats; providing town-wide zoning and base maps using the CNHRPC GIS mapping system; providing assistance to the Contoocook and North Branch Rivers Local Advisory Committee in the preparation of a River Corridor Management Plan (including GIS maps) and providing detailed analysis on the effects of the US Supreme Court case ruling, Dolan vs. Tigard, on local zoning.

## CEMETERY TRUSTEES REPORT

Appropriately much of the attention of the Cemetery Trustees is directed to care and maintenance of public cemeteries and to a significant extent family and private cemeteries within town limits.

New cemetery laws went into effect August 7, 1994. Following are pertinent quotes from RSA 289 — as revised.

Article 4 of Chapter 289, House Bill 1228 states that municipalities shall provide for suitable care and maintenance. Further, municipalities may raise sufficient funds for the care and maintenance of deserted burial grounds in accordance with RSA 19-21 Chapter 289-9 indicates that income from funds held in trust may be used by Trustees for care, preservation or embellishment of established lots. Chapter 289-18 (paragraphs 1 and 2) deal with forfeiture procedures regarding abandoned burial space. When a burial ground has been neglected for a period of 20 years or more the municipality may declare it abandoned for purposes of preservation, maintenance and restoration, and shall be managed by the Trustees. Those Boscawen cemeteries affected are Call, Eliot, McClure, Marden and Flanders. Where possible estates or descendents of those families have been notified by public notice as required by law.

The Trustees have held to the premise that all cemeteries within town limits should be mowed at least once a year and heavy brush be removed. Such care has been carried out during 1994. Stones have been repaired with the \$2,000.00 appropriation, work being done by Mark Sampson of Boscawen. A large tree whose roots were damaging graves was removed by Bill Cook for \$350.00 at Maplewood. Pine Grove has been surveyed for future lots giving information how much expansion there can be.

We feel a great deal of progress has been made in 1994.

## BOSCAWEN ACADEMY TRUSTEES REPORT

The Trustees of the Boscawen Academy held their 1994 annual meeting on April 7th at the Selectmen's Office.

The four thousand dollar (\$4,000) trust fund was invested in the New Dartmouth Bank at 3.94%, with a maturity date of May 1994. The Trustees voted to pay the accrued interest to the Boscawen Historical Society when the certificate matured and to re-invest the principle in a one year certificate of deposit. In May, a check of \$158.79 was presented to the Boscawen Historical Society for maintenance to the Academy building and the principle was re-invested as voted.

The Trustees determined there was minimal marketable timber on the "academy lot" (six to seven acre parcel on the back side of Choate Hill) and voted to retain the property.

The original Academy trustees record book, covering the period of July 27, 1826 to January 1, 1931, was given to the Boscawen Historical Society per unanimous vote of the Trustees. This early record of Academy trustee proceedings had been missing, but thanks to Harold and Rhoda Hardy, was returned to the Academy Trustees when found amongst Harold's father's (Harold Hardy, Sr.) estate. Harold Sr. as an Academy Trustee for many years and served until his passing in 1990.

This summarizes the business conducted by the Academy Trustees in 1994.

This report is presented to the Selectmen of the Town of Boscawen, February 8, 1995, by the Boscawen Academy Trustees in accordance to New Hampshire House Bill number 21 (approved March 29, 1971).

## CONCORD REGIONAL VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION

The Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association continues to offer three major health services to the residents of Boscawen: Home Care, Hospice and Primary care.

*Home Care Services* respond to the health care needs of those patients with acute or chronic illnesses that require skilled professional and para-professional care so they may return to or remain in their homes. Emphasis is on promoting independence and maximum functioning of the patient within the least restrictive setting.

*Hospice Services* provide professional and para-professional services to the terminally ill patient with a limited life expectancy. The goal is to enhance the quality of the patient's remaining life by helping he/she remain at home in comfort and dignity. Emphasis is on pain and symptom management and skilled intervention to meet the patient's special physical, emotional and spiritual needs.

In April of 1994 Hospice expanded its services to provide residential care with the opening of New Hampshire's first Hospice House. To date, this house has provided a home to approximately 30 terminally ill residents.

*Primary Care and Preventive Services* will expand throughout FY 95 from a health promotion and prevention focus to a more comprehensive 24 hours/day, 7 days/week service including physician care, hospital admitting privileges, and other care generally offered through a medical office setting. This expansion requires the consolidation of many of the agency programs into a family health center, eliminating the current categorical service delivery. In August of 1994, Primary Care physicians (from Concord's Hospital new Family Practice Residence Program) joined the CRVNA team. The addition of the physicians has expanded prenatal care to the full term of pregnancy including delivery, as well as, primary care to adults. Primary care and preventive services include but are not limited to Child Health, Family Planning & Women's Health, Prenatal services and Health Promotion.

*Health Promotion Services* focus on the low and marginal income families and individuals to prevent illness by professional assessment and screening for health risks and needs, by early intervention to prevent, eliminate, or minimize the impact of illness and/or disability, and by anticipatory guidance and health teaching. Emphasis is on promoting healthy children, families and individuals through early intervention and health teaching. Services rendered in the clinic setting are: child health, prenatal, family planning, sexually transmitted disease, adult screening, immunizations, and HIV (AIDS) testing and counseling. Home visits are made in crisis situations or when needed health care cannot be given in the clinic. Senior health services are provided at congregate housing sites. Professional and para-professional hourly home services are provided on a private fee-for-service basis. Health education and instruction are part of each home visit or clinic visit.

Anyone in Boscawen may request service; patient, doctor, health facility, pastor, friend or neighbor. All requests are answered, but continuing home care will only be provided with a physician's order.

A call to Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association (224-4093) is all that is necessary to start services or make inquiries. The CRVNA office is open Monday through Friday from 7:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. A nurse is on call for hospice and home care patients; (224-4093) 4:30 p.m.-7:30 a.m. daily.

Federal regulations specify a charge is applicable to all visits. Fees are scaled for the individual without health insurance and/or who is unable to pay the full charge. However, to fee scale, federal regulations require a financial statement be completed by the patient or responsible person. Town monies subsidize those visits that are scaled or that no fee is collectible.

This agency is certified as a Medicare/Medicaid Provider, licensed by the State of New Hampshire, accredited by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations (JCAHO) and is a member agency of the United Way of Merrimack County.

## REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION 1994

The Boscawen Conservation Commission saw many of its projects come to fruition this year. There was much progress in the Boscawen Town Forest. In September a timber harvest and sale was conducted by James Emerson of Danbury under the management of forester John Conde of Northfield. The purpose for this cut was wildlife habitat improvement as designed by NH Fish & Game as part of our cooperative management agreement with them. This harvest will diversify the forest to benefit various types of wildlife, notably deer, grouse, wild turkey, and other species who feed on acorn producing oak and need young forest for browse and cover. The Town Forest Committee will be reblazing trails due to logging access roads obscuring some of these areas. A trailhead with an enlargement of a map of the trails is being erected. With the assistance of New Hampshire Audubon member Bob Quinn, a bird identification walk was held in May. Over 36 species were identified by a combination of sighting and hearing. Duck boxes were also installed and have been colonized by the birds. A policy statement and brochure for the forest was printed. Copies are available at the Town offices or through any of the BCC members. Special thanks go to Lorenzo Pouliot. He has been attending meetings and working in the Town Forest, re-filling the brochure box at the trailhead and generally improving the appearance of our forest.

Commission members were actively involved in the proposed acquisition by the state or other agency of all or part of the Patenaude's Pond property on Queen Street. Part of this land would have given clear access from one part of the town forest to another. A bill was passed in the legislature that would have opened the door for the project. Unfortunately, state funding for the land was not available and our efforts to protect this land were unsuccessful.

Each commission members writes a monthly *Boscawen Newsvine* column focusing on different activities of the BCC. Members continue to investigate NH Wetlands Board permit applications and monitor conservation easements on the Jones (formerly Emery), the Cummings (formerly Sahlin), and Cabot properties, as well as offer assistance to these landowners in the conservation management of their lands. The Commission has been working with the Merrimack Valley School District in their construction of the new elementary school on North Main Street and has consulted on the veteran's cemetery project proposed in the Merrimack River State Forest.

In April Adrian Pouliot, age fifteen, became a full member of the Commission. He is the youngest person ever to have been appointed to a town board in Boscawen. This year we bid farewell to Douglas Hartford and William Bevans, alternate members. Bill was the BCC representative to the Merrimack

Valley committee working on the new school. Douglas has been a dedicated regular member for over ten years and an alternate these last two years.

The Boscawen Conservation Commission meets the fourth Thursday of each month at 7:00 PM in the Planning and Zoning Building behind the church. The meetings are open to the public, all are welcome.

## UPPER MERRIMACK RIVER LOCAL ADVISORY COMMITTEE

The early part of 1994 was busy for the Upper Merrimack River Local Advisory Committee. Representatives from the communities of Boscawen, Bow, Canterbury, Concord, Franklin, and Northfield completed the editing of the *Management and Implementation Plan*. It was formally adopted by committee vote on February 22. The plan has been presented to the local planning and zoning boards as well as city councils, boards of selectmen and conservation commissions.

At the March town meeting, a warrant article was presented to residents of Boscawen, Canterbury, and Northfield asking them to consider Scenic & Recreational designation for the upper Merrimack River. A resolution was presented to the Franklin City Council. The article was defeated in these communities and the resolution was not adopted by the Franklin City Council. The measure is still under consideration in Concord by a study committee. A decision by the Concord City Council is expected in the spring.

The committee is currently engaged in forming a draft work plan based on key action items outlined in the *Management and Implementation Plan*. Highlights of these projects include initiating a citizen water quality monitoring program, education and public outreach on river-related issues and gaining formal recognition of the Management and Implementation Plan by local planning boards in their master plans and by its adoption in each of the communities.

The UMLAC meetings are held on a rotating basis in the six represented communities. The committee meets the 2nd Monday of each month at 7:30 PM. For more information please contact your local representatives or the chairperson.
