# WARRANT FOR THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

#### State of New Hampshire

(L.S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Canterbury in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet for the 1977 annual meeting of the Town of Canterbury to be held in two sessions, as follows:

#### FIRST SESSION

The FIRST SESSION shall be held at the Town Hall, in said Canterbury on Tuesday, the 8th day of March next, between the hours of 10:00 A.M. o'clock and 7:00 P.M. o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing, by ballot.

#### SECOND SESSION

The SECOND SESSION shall be held at the CANTERBURY ELEMENTARY SCHOOL on Saturday the 12th day of March next at 1:00 o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following Articles in the Warrant:

- 2. To raise such money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow money, in anticipation of the collection of taxes, for the current municipal year, and to issue, in the name of and on the credit of the Town, negotiable notes therefor, said notes to be repaid during the current municipal year.

- 4. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$1,850 for new equipment for the Canterbury Volunteer Fire Department and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to increase the appropriation from \$2,000 to \$4,000 to be put in the Capital Reserve Fund toward the purchase of a new fire truck, or act in relation thereto.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$500 to repair the 1951 Chevrolet forestry truck and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to adopt an Official Town Seal based on the Canterbury Volunteer Fire Department Seal as painted by Sister Helena Sarle and adapted to provide ease of reproduction. (By Petition)
- 8. To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to establish an incineration facility pursuant to the laws and regulations relating to solid waste disposal at the "existing Canterbury dump site" and to raise and appropriate not more than \$40,500 for closing of the existing dump: site acquisition; site preparation; building; and engineering, design and related expenses, and authorize the withdrawal of \$6,000 of these monies from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.
- 9. To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to establish an incineration facility pursuant to the laws and regulations relating to solid waste disposal at the "Canterbury Industrial Site" and to raise and appropriate \$43,000 for closing of the "existing dump site": site preparation; building; and engineering,

design and related expenses to increase the annual "Town Dump" operating budget \$870.00 (not included in the \$43,000 total for this warrant), and authorize the withdrawal of \$6,000 of these monies from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

- 10. To allow the Selectmen to enter an agreement with any other town(s) to use the Canterbury dump facilities. An agreement shall not increase the expenses of the Town Dump to Canterbury or increase development costs to the town. All costs will be on a per capita basis with the town(s) involved. Any surplus monies will become the sole funds of the Town of Canterbury and will become general fund monies.
- 11. To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to establish a committee to study the possibility of a change in Police protection for Canterbury.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50,000 for the purchase of the Frank Kimball Pond Land consisting of 97 acres, more or less, with the sum of \$3,200 to be raised by taxation, \$3,500 to be transferred from the Conservation Fund, and to authorize the Selectmen to issue serial notes for the remainder over a four year term at an interest rate not to exceed five percent. And further to see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply, negotiate and do all other things necessary to obtain such Federal Assistance as may be available to the Town for the purchase of said Kimball property.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,300 for the purchase of a new sander body for the Highway Department.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 to share in the support of the services of the Penacook Rescue Squad.

- 15. To see if the Town would agree to change the second session of the Town Meeting from Saturday to Friday evening.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$650 for renovating and repairing Town owned buildings and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for these purposes from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to accept any available Federal or State Funds and Grants the Town may be eligible to receive.
- 18. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

The meeting was called to order at 10:00 A.M. by William Colburn who was Appointed Moderator Pro Tem until George Kopperl arrived, he having been delayed because of the storm. After reading of the Warrant the polls were opened at 10:10 and the voting begun. The results of the balloting is as follows:

Incidently there were a large number of write-ins for the various offices where no one had signed up. About every one in town got a vote.

The balloting part of the meeting was adjourned at 9:55 P.M.

The second part of the meeting, to act upon the rest of the Warrant was taken up at this time.

#### Mr. Moderator:

I move that the Selectmen appoint a committee of not less than five (5) citizens of the Town of Canterbury, to study the feasibility and desirability of appointing a Town Manager as provided in Chapter 37, RSA-NH, the committee to report its findings and recommendation(s) not later than 31 December, 1976, in order that such recommendations might be presented to the Town Meeting of March, 1977 for such action as the Town Meeting shall deem appropriate.

(Submitted by Sabin W. Guertin)

The adjourned Town Meeting was opened at 1:00 P.M. on Saturday, March 6, 1976, by the Moderator, George Kopperl. He then read the warrant.

4. To raise such money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.

Robert Hill moved its adoption as printed. Seconded by Sabin Guertin.

Philip Rollins moved to amend by increasing the budget for the Fire Department by \$1,650.00 to replace the tank on the fire truck at Sherwood Forest. Seconded by Robert Lee. After discussion the question was moved and duly seconded. A two-thirds vote was obtained to stop debate.

Motion passed unanimously.

Thomas Geno moved to delete \$2,000.00 from Damages and Legal Expense. Seconded by Andrew Fowler. Motion defeated.

Samuel Dooley made a motion to amend the budget by restoring \$1,225.00 for the Visiting Nurse Association. Seconded by Sue Dooley. This motion was then withdrawn and Samuel Dooley moved to amend the budget to include \$156.00 for the Visiting Nurse Association. Seconded by Linwood Rogers. The motion was passed by a vote of 49 Yes - 36 No.

Lucien Hildreth moved to delete \$6,589.99 from the Highway Department budget. Seconded by Ellen Hildreth. After debate the question was moved and duly seconded. A two-thirds vote was obtained to stop debate. Motion defeated.

Ellen Hildreth recommended that everyone keep an eye on the budget and make sure that it is not over-expended.

Ray Cushman moved to restore the balance of \$495.00 to the Solid Waste Study Costs to make a total of \$1,000.00 Seconded by Thomas Geno.

Lucien Hildreth moved to increase the amendment to \$990.00. Seconded by Ellen Hildreth. Motion defeated.

The original motion was passed unanimously.

Doug Richards moved to donate the sum of \$1,500.00 to the Penacook Rescue Squad. Seconded by Jean Richards. After discussion of this motion, both the motion and the second were withdrawn.

Robert Lockwood asked why the special town meeting and the Patsfield hearings were not mentioned in the town report. Robert Hill questioned why the town officers' salaries are going up.

The question was moved on the adoption of the budget and duly seconded. A two-thirds vote was obtained to stop further discussion.

The budget as amended by adding \$2,301.00 was passed unanimously.

5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of the collection of taxes, for the current municipal year, and to issue, in the name of and on the credit of the Town, negotiable notes therefor, said notes to be repaid during the current municipal year.

Hamden Moody moved its adoption. Seconded by Harvey McGranahan. Passed unanimously.

6. To rescind the power of appointment by the Selectmen, of persons to serve on the Town Planning Board. On the next regularly scheduled Town Meeting date, the present Planning Board shall cease to exist and any remaining terms of members of the Board shall be null and void. (By Petition)

Thomas Geno moved its adoption. Duly seconded. After much discussion Linda Kelso moved the question. Seconded by Linwood Rogers. A two-thirds vote was obtained to stop debate.

Article 6 was passed by a vote of 75 Yes - 52 No.

7. To have the Planning Board elected by secret ballot of the people at the next regularly scheduled Town Meeting and at every regularly scheduled Town Meeting hence. The Board members to be elected as established by RSA 36:411 sec. b. A seven (7) member Board shall be established as follows: Elect 2 members for a one (1) year term, 2 members for a two (2) year term, and two members for a three (3) year term. The seventh member shall be a Selectman, appointed by the Board of Selectmen, to serve as an ex-officio member. His term as a member of the Board to run concurrent with his term as a Selectmen. After the initial election, two members are to be elected each year for a three (3) year term, with the seventh member remaining a Selectman as an ex-officio member. (By petition)

Thomas Geno moved its adoption. Seconded by Ted Gladu.

Becky Fowler moved to amend the article by inserting the words "of March 1977". Seconded by Hamden Moody. The motion and the second were then withdrawn.

Ray Cushman moved to substitute the word "annual" for the word "regular" wherever it occurs in the article; also to change the reference in the article to read RSA 36:4:II(b). Seconded by Stuart Martin.

Amendment passed.

Robert Scarponi moved to amend the article to read "In the event of death or resignation of any Planning Board member, the Selectmen shall be empowered to appoint an individual on an interim basis until the next election of the town officials." Duly seconded.

After considerable debate the question was moved and duly seconded. A two-thirds vote was obtained to stop further debate.

Amendment passed.

Article 7 as amended was passed.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$421.32 for the continuation of services to low income residents of Canterbury through the Concord Area Center of the Community Action Program, Belknap-Merrimack Counties, Inc. (By Petition)

Paulette Gladu moved its adoption. Seconded by Ted Gladu. Article passed.

Article 9. To see if the Town of Canterbury will vote to adopt the current National Fire Protection Association's Life Safety Code 101. This code deals with life safety from fire and like emergencies. It covers construction, petroleum, and occupancy features to minimize danger to life from fire, smoke, fumes, or panic before the buildings are vacated. It specifies the number, size, and arrangement of exit facilities sufficient to permit prompt escape of occupants from buildings or structures in case of fire or other conditions dangerous to life. However, private homes are excluded. This code gives the local authority the jurisdiction. (By Petition)

Robert Lee moved its adoption. Ludger Flamand seconded. Article defeated. Sabin Guertin moved to indefinitely postpone action on this article. Duly seconded. Article 9 is indefinitely postponed.

Article 10. To see if the Town will authorize the transfer of those funds and the interest earned to date from the so-called Perpetual Care General Fund to a Capital Reserve Fund for the Improvement and Enlargement of Cemetery facilities. Money realized from

the sale of Cemetery lots will be added to the Capital Reserve Fund. (By Petition)

Robert Lee moved its adoption. Seconded by Hugh Fifield.

Robert Lee moved to amend the article so that the word Canterbury as it appears in the warrant be changed to read "cemetery" wherever it appears in the warrant. Duly seconded. Amendment passed.

Article 10 adopted as amended.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to close all unmaintained roads to wheeled vehicles during the months of December thru March if and when there is snow cover. This ordinance shall not deny abutting land owners, their agents or leasees the right of access for the harvest of forest products or other business pursuits. (By Petition)

Ted Gladu moved that this article be indefinitely postponed. Seconded by Bill Kelso. Motion passed and article 11 was indefinitely postponed.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$1,630.00 for new equipment for the Canterbury Volunteer Fire Department and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

Everand Young moved its adoption. Seconded by Ludger Flamand. Ray Cushman moved the question after discussion. Duly seconded. A two-thirds vote was obtained to stop debate.

Article passed unanimously.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) to be put in the Capital Reserve Fund toward the purchase of a new fire truck, or act in relation thereto.

Rebecca Fowler moved its adoption. Seconded by Andrew Fowler. Article passed unanimously.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate eight thousand dollars (8,000.00) for renovating and repairing Town owned buildings and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for these purposes from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

Charlie Dean moved its adoption. Hamden Moody seconded. Article passed unanin ously.

Article 15. To see if the town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to establish a sanitary landfill facility, pursuant to the Laws and regulations relating to solid waste disposal, on approximately five acres of the Town's industrial site, (Said purpose having been approved on November 7, 1974, by the Governor and Council as a variance in the use of the industrial site), and to construct the necessary housing facility, provide for needed equipment and take any other necessary action to make the sanitary landfill program operational and, further, to raise and appropriate not more than \$16,250.00 for this purpose, with \$4,250.00 coming from Revenue Sharing Funds and the balance to be raised by taxes.

Robert Lockwood moved that this article be laid on the table pending a report from the Solid Waste Disposal Committee. Charles Smith seconded. The motion and second were then withdrawn.

Charles Smith moved to adopt Article 15. Seconded by Rebecca Fowler. The motion and second were then withdrawn.

Ray Cushman made a motion to lay Article 15 on the table and that we take up Article 19. Duly seconded. Motion passed.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to contract for the purchase of an incinerator and related waste recycling items, and to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$35,000.00 for this purpose by issuance of serial notes to be repaid over a period of ten years.

It was moved and seconded that Article 19 be adopted as read.

Ray Cushman moved to amend the article by reducing the amount of \$35,000.00 by \$4,250.00 in Revenue Sharing Funds as may be available. Seconded by Tom Geno.

Ray Cushman further moved to amend the article by adding "The location of the incinerator shall be at the Town Industrial Site." Duly seconded.

Thomas Geno moved to amend the amendment by adding "At the furthest southwesterly corner as practical." Duly seconded.

The question was moved and duly seconded after considerable discussion. A two-thirds vote was obtained to stop debate. The amendment as amended was passed.

Ellen Hildreth moved to amend the article so as to read that if the Industrial Site is not used for recycling, then it cannot be used for sanitary landfill without authorization of a further rehearing. Duly seconded by Dick Stevens.

After discussion the question was moved and duly seconded. A two-thirds vote was obtained to stop debate.

The amendment was lost.

The question was moved by Ray Cushman. Seconded by Ted Gladu. A two-thirds vote was obtained to stop debate.

Article 19 as amended was passed by a written ballot vote of Yes 77 - No 18.

Charles Smith moved that we take Article 15 from the table. Seconded by Gil Smith.

Charles Smith moved to indefinitely postpone action on this article. Duly seconded and motion passed. Article 15 is indefinitely postponed.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$3,500.00 for operating expenses of a sanitary landfill at the industrial site, pursuant to an affirmative vote by the Town to authorize such landfill site (Article 15), and to add this amount to the annual operating expense of "Town Dump".

Ray Cushman moved that we amend Article 16 by substituting the following in its place:

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum not to exceed \$3,500.00 for capital expenses of the incinerator and related sanitary land fill at the Industrial Site, pursuant to an affirmative vote by the Town to authorize such landfill site (Article 19) and to add this amount to the operating expense of the Town Dump.

Seconded by Phil Cochrane.

Amendment passed.

Robert Scarponi moved to pass the article as amended. Seconded by Ray Cushman. The article as amended was passed.

Article 17. To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to establish a sanitary land fill facility, pursuant to the Laws and regulations relating to solid waste disposal on land presently known as the Hildreth Site, and to raise and appropriate not more than \$36,250.00 for site acquisition, construction of the necessary housing facility, provision of needed equipment and to take any other necessary action to make this landfill program operational; and to raise this sum by the issuance of serial notes to be repaid over a period of ten years.

Dick Stevens moved that we indefinitely postpone this article. Seconded by Robert Scarponi. Passed unanimously.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$3,500.00 for yearly operating expenses of a sanitary landfill at the Hildreth Site, pursuant to an affirmative vote by the Town to authorize such landfill site, (Article 17), and to add this amount to the annual operating expense of "Town Dump".

Kay Cushman moved that this article be indefinitely postponed. Duly seconded by Ted Gladu. Passed unanimously.

Article 20. To see if the Town shall join the Concord Sanitary Landfill at an annual cost not to exceed \$2,500.00. To raise and appropriate the maximum amount of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000.00) for the purchase of a truck with 40 cu. yd. dempster Dumpster compacter type body for the purpose of hauling waste to the Concord Sanitary Land fill site, and to raise and appropriate other necessary funds for operating of a receiving site to be located at the present dump site. (By Petition)

Tom Geno moved to indefinitely postpone this article. Seconded by Charles Smith. Passed unanimously.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to release \$6,000.00 from the Capital Reserve Fund established for Highway Equipment and \$4,000.00 from Revenue Sharing Funds and vote to raise and appropriate an additional sum not to exceed \$22,000.00 by issuance of serial notes to be repaid over a period of not more than 8 years, to be used for the purchase of a loader for the Highway Department. If the Town also votes to establish a sanitary landfill facility, this loader will be used for this facility in addition to highway work.

Ludger Flamand moved its adoption. Duly seconded by Everand Young. A two-thirds vote was required to pass this article. Such vote was obtained and the article was passed.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to accept any available Federal or State Funds and Grants the Town may be eligible to receive.

Wilbur Thompson moved its adoption. Duly seconded. Article passed unanimously.

Article 23. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Robert Lockwood again mentioned that no mention had been made in the town report of the special town meeting held in October. He would like to have it included in next year's town report. He also mentioned that it reads School Report in the front of the Town Report and this is no longer included, and this should be stricken.

Robert Lockwood made a resolution that the Selectmen of the Town of Canterbury appoint a seven-member committee which shall be known as the Social and Recreational Activities Study Committee. The Committee shall, during the ensuing year, in an organized manner, solicit facts, opinions and other information from individual residents, Town agencies and bodies and private civic and social organizations of Canterbury relative to the needs, desires and recommendations of the citizens regarding development of policies and ordinances pertaining to social and recreational activities of the Town.

That the Committee report its findings and recommendations to the townspeople of Canterbury in public meeting.

That the Committee be authorized to seek out and utilize the services and resources of state, federal and

local agencies and/or private organizations including financial assistance which may be available for such a study from other than local tax funds.

That the Committee be comprised of a broad cross section of people of the Town of Canterbury and be authorized to elect their own appropriate officers.

Robert Fife seconded the adoption of the resolution. The resolution was adopted.

Dick Stevens said he would like to have the proper authorities here notify the proper people regarding the signal at the railroad crossing as it is not working properly.

Tom Geno made a resolution to instruct the Board of Selectmen, the Planning Board and the Board of Adjustment to try to get a clean industry to locate at the town's industrial site. Duly seconded and resolution passed.

Rebecca Fowler suggested that the name of the Town Librarian should be included in the Town Report.

The special town meeting was held on October 14, 1975 and was opened at 7:00 P.M. by Moderator Robert Lee. The Moderator read the Warrant and then explained the meeting was illegal because the meeting was not properly advertised in a paper of local circulation within one week of posting.

William Colburn spoke on the interpretation of the laws according to Town Council.

Raymond Cushman moved for adjournment, Ludger Flamand seconded, meeting adjourned at 7:15 P.M.

Robert Scarponi asked how to call another special meeting. Mr. Lee replied to check town council for answer.

#### CANTERBURY HISTORICAL SOCIETY

The Canterbury Historical Society, using the funds provided by the 1976 Town Meeting appropriation and Society funds from the sale of Town Histories and dues, instituted a restoration program that has received many favorable comments.

Peter Fife, Dick Bowler and James Guertin have worked at reduced wages to enable us to accomplish a part of our goal. Projects completed to date are:

Removal of partitions installed in the 1930's Restoration of original interior design

Rebuilding of front door; salvaging most of the original

Installing new latch and lock

Scraped, sanded and patched plastered walls

Made and installed security screens on East windows

Removed small windows (where rest rooms were) and rebricked the openings.

Prior to the 1976 Fair the Ruesswick family assisted by Hugh Fifield and Fred Mudge and John Fife installed wide stone steps from the garage level to the Museum grounds; a much needed improvement and most appreciated.

If our requested appropriation for 1977 is approved by the voters we hope to have the chimney lined and retopped. At the same time we would have the mason repoint the mortar joints on the exterior brick walls.

## 1976 ANNUAL REPORT OF CANTERBURY POLICE DEPARTMENT

This year, as always, the Canterbury Police Department has operated as an active agency of law enforcement in our community.

Only with the help of those devoted part-time police officers, who are townspeople just like you and me, giving time and support to their community could such a report be made possible. Every part-time police officer's time is given in sacrifice, even though the officer is reimbursed for his time. The job is very demanding on the officer and his family because of his role as a fair and impartial person. When confronted with neighborhood disputes that could well affect his relationship with friends, he has to rely on his good judgement and stand by that descision.

An important thing for each of us to remember is that this is a PART-TIME POLICE DEPARTMENT. This means we rely on the services provided by the Merrimack County Sheriffs Department. Canterbury Police called the Sheriffs Department 14 times in 1976 for aid in investigations. This also includes calls they took direct when no part-time Canterbury officer could be located.

The State Police continue to offer assistance when they are available, mostly in traffic safety work. We do on occasion provide service on the Interstate highway when they call for us, but we believe this is basically the state's responsibility.

## REPORT OF THE CANTERBURY VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

The incidents that the Canterbury Volunteer Fire Department responded to in 1976 was a 42% increase over 1975, with 88 calls — 5 structurals, 5 automobile fires, 10 automobile accidents, 10 chimney fires, 8 mutual aid calls, 25 medical emergencies, 6 investigations, 8 calls involving electrical wires down, 7 brush and grass, 2 ice rescues and 2 propane gas leaks.

In conjunction with the medical emergency calls, the Penacook Rescue Squad transported 28 people to

Concord Hospital.

The Canterbury Volunteer Fire Department was very active in 1976, not only on calls, but with regularly scheduled and special training sessions, the volunteers spent over 110 hours in firefighting tactics, advanced first aid, rescue techniques and also had several sessions with the Penacook Rescue Squad.

The Penacook Rescue Squad gives Canterbury citizens excellent service. On an average run to Canterbury for the Penacook Rescue Squad, it takes between 15 - 18 minutes to arrive, thus making it very important that the Canterbury Fire Department learn advanced first aid and how to cope with all types of Medical Emergencies. The training the Fire Department has had on these situations has proven very effective.

The citizens of Canterbury should feel very proud of the work that the Volunteer Fire Department has been doing and should feel very secure. I feel we have one of the best Volunteer Fire Departments in the area.

## REPORT OF THE DISTRICT CHIEF AND FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Since its beginning in 1893, the State Forestry Department has recognized the fact that forest fire prevention and suppression is a joint state and town or city responsibility. Local authorities recommend names of persons to the State Forester, who appoints one person as town or city fire warden and several other persons as town or city deputy fire wardens to a three year term.

The local forest fire warden controls the kindling of all outside fires, when the ground is not covered with snow, by issuing a written permit for kindling a fire. Permits are only issued at such times and in such places

as the fire warden deems as safe.

The State Forest Fire Service trains the local forest fire organization in modern forest fire prevention and suppression tactics. The State also provides backup personnel and equipment for suppression and prevention activities.

The combination of State and local forces has resulted in one of the smallest acreage loss due to forest fires in the United States for the past 20 years.

## REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD FOR THE YEAR 1976

Applications for sub-division approval during the past year continued at a relatively low level despite a modest increase in building construction and land conveyances. All of the applications received were for minor sub-divisions, many exempt from prior approval under Par. 2:09 of the regulations.

During the latter part of the year, pre-application discussions were held with a prospective major sub-division developer involving eight lots. Aside from the roughing out of a short stretch of access road, no activity was evident in the proposed cluster development.

Three resignations and one expiration of term brought about the appointment of four new members. Since the Town voted in March 1976 to elect the Board members, commencing in March 1977, these individuals were appointed to serve only until that time.

In addition to the regular monthly meetings held on the third Tuesday, the Board held two extra meetings and conducted two field trips for site examinations.

## REPORT OF THE CENTRAL NEW HAMPSHIRE REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION

It is generally agreed that planning is a needed part of growing. Canterbury is certainly growing. Its population has increased nearly 50% in the past fifteen years.

As a charter member of the Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission, the town has benefited repeatedly. The local planning board was assisted while amending our zoning and building ordinance in 1973. Maps, reports, and so forth are always available.

The Commission endeavors to guide planning as a region by helping local boards realize that actions in one town affect actions in nearby towns. A coming thing is the closing of local dumps and the operation of a

regional site.

Professional assistance is available to member towns in a number of fields. Canterbury, in recent years, has changed from a rural farming town to one of the so-called bedroom towns surrounding Concord. As a result, increased services will likely be needed, and in this field the Commission will be of assistance.

The Commission is grateful for support of the towns in the region and looks forward to an active program in the future.

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

In all cases conditions are attached to each permit in order to assure compliance with the intent of the ordinance.

## REPORT OF CANTERBURY RECREATION AND SOCIAL ACTIVITIES STUDY COMMITTEE

#### December — 1976

The Canterbury Recreation and Social Activities Study Committee was formed according to the terms of a resolution passed at the 1976 Canterbury Town Meeting.

The committee members were appointed by the Board of Selectmen who made their selections from a list of persons who volunteered to serve on such a committee. The committee consisted of: Ann Fifield, Thomas Geno, Doreen Kimball, Richard Lakin, Robert Lockwood, Virginia Plisko and Barbara Raymond.

The committee held its first meeting on August 12 and elected Mr. Lockwood as acting chairman and Mrs. Raymond as clerk. The committee held nine other meetings through December of 1976. One was a public hearing on November 19, 1976, to offer a committee report on its progress and plans. One Selectman, Mrs. Fifield, attended that meeting in addition to the committee members. The meeting had been advertised in Peterson's Store, in three newspapers via publicity released by the committee, and on area radio stations through notices sent to them by the committee.

During the late summer and early fall months, the committee viewed the following sites to determine if any had possibilities as future locations for recreation or social activities: Merrimack River shores beside the Gold Star Sod Farm off Intervale Road and a few hundred feet north of the closed Canterbury-Boscawen bridge; the Canterbury Industrial site; the so-called Kimball Pond property; the Sam Lake property; and the Shaker Regional Canterbury School property.

The committee also developed a questionnaire about recreation organization, financing and location. About 500 survey sheets were distributed and about 15% (74) were returned.

Based on the survey returns, which included suggestions for funding a recreation program, the committee approached the directors of the Canterbury Fair and requested that proceeds normally distributed to the Canterbury Fund for emergency family services be withheld pending development of an organization that could run a recreation program. It was pointed out that the Canterbury Fair Fund was approaching \$25,000 and was drawing interest each year.

The Fair Directors unanimously approved the request to withhold the funds and at the end of the year, the Recreation Study Committee was developing for the Fair Directors' approval, legal documents and bylaws for a private, non-profit community organization that could accept funds from the Fair Committee and be in charge of an on-going recreation program. The Trustees of the Canterbury Fund have also agreed to review its bylaws to allow for different uses of Fund monies.

The Recreation and Social Activities Study Committee determined three main points from the survey: (1) That a significant number of persons in town believe it is time to take an organized approach and plan for Canterbury's recreational-social activities needs; (2) That the program should be appropriate to the size of the town, and; (3) A good deal of voluntary effort should go into any program, although many respondents indicated a willingness to support an approved program with tax dollars. The study committee believes the approach being taken satisfies each of these points to a large degree. An organization funded primarily by Canterbury Fair proceeds could plan for the immediate and distant future. Its programs would reflect the desires and needs of the community because the organization would be made up of people from the community who could control the funding and activities. The Canterbury Fair is a strictly voluntary effort, run by the people of Canterbury for the people of Canterbury.

The committee strongly believes that putting the proceeds of the Fair to such a use would accomplish two major purposes: a recreation program, and wider, stronger participation in the Canterbury Fair.

Pending final approval of the Fair Directorship, such activities would be financed primarily by the portion of Fair proceeds that have, since 1966, been placed in the Canterbury Fund. It is assumed, that the Fair Directors would continue allocating a substantial portion of the Fair proceeds to the Canterbury United Community Church, which was the original beneficiary of the Fair.

The Recreation and Social Activities Study Committee is calling for no action by the Town, other than acceptance of this report.

The committee will make the following recommendations for consideration by the proposed recreation association, and by appropriate town bodies:

-The people of Canterbury should begin now in active planning for the recreational and social needs of the community.

—Short-range considerations should be given to a community swimming location, a community skating location and an adequate area for adult and youth baseball and other athletic events.

-Medium or long-range consideration be given to development of facilities and/or programs indicated in the survey results, in the order of ranking.

-Further consideration be given to use of the so-called Fire Pond on the Sam Lake property, the Kimball Pond property and the school property for planned recreational use.

—The people of Canterbury, their elected and appointed officials, officials of the Canterbury Fair and Canterbury United Community Church, and representatives of other civic, social and recreational organizations continue to work together and with such new nonprofit, private recreation association as may be formed, to provide the Town with an appropriate, on-going recreation program.

The Canterbury Recreation and Social Activities Study Committee expresses its appreciation to town officials, members of the Conservation Commission, the Canterbury United Community Church and the Canterbury Fair Directors, for their assistance and cooperation during this study.

#### CONSERVATION COMMISSION ANNUAL REPORT, 1976

Your Conservation Commission has been studying the natural resources of the town and has made a preliminary list of areas which may have noteworthy features. We intend to revise and publish this for your information. We have studied the town tax maps and have listed town and state lands, and lots for which there is no recorded owner.

This spring we planted three maple trees in the green at the Center to provide for future shade trees. We also sprayed the poison ivy around the edge of the

playground at the Elementary School.

Since the establishment of the Commission, we have been interested in acquiring land for conservation education purposes. The Kimball Pond area offers the most advantages for this purpose. Dr. Elsa Kimball and Mr. Frank Kimball had been contacted about the possibility of a memorial gift or easement for the pond area. This spring Mr. Kimball decided to sell this section including the pond. We began negotiations with him for the purchase of the area.

We had informational meetings with representatives of the Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests, and the Division of Resource and Economic Development who represent the Federal Bureau of Outdoor Recreation. Also with representatives of the Selectmen, the Planning Board, and the Recreation Committee. Required appraisals of the proposed area

were made by professional appraisers.

A field tour was held to acquaint fellow townspeople with the area. A public meeting was held to explain and discuss the proposal to purchase the Kimball Pond land.

#### VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION REPORT

The second year as a member of the Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association was marked by a 900% increase in the number of patient visits to Canterbury residents. From March 11th to Dec. 31st 1975 a total of 18 visits were made for an average of 2.25 per month. From Jan. 1st thru Dec. 31st 1976 a total of 224 visits were made for an average of 18 visits per month. Patients are asked to pay for each visit according to income; no one is denied because of inability to pay. The deficit is made up thru budgetary contributions, State and Federal Funds and contributions from the United Fund. Private and/or Memorial Contributions are most appreciated.

The CRVNA was charged with the responsibility of clinic management for the Swine Flu Vaccination Program. In spite of bureaucratic red tape and unfavorable publicity 117 local residents were innoculated without unwarranted after affects. The assistance of the many volunteers who made the clinic a success is most appreciated.

#### SANITARY LANDFILL COMMITTEE

#### 1976 Annual Report

Since the March 6, 1976 Town Meeting in which the people of Canterbury voted for incineration with recycling, the Canterbury Sanitary Landfill Committee has met nine (9) times.

#### During 1976 the Committee:

- 1. requested and was granted an extension of time to use the existing dump until July 1, 1977;
- 2. entered into a contract through the selectmen with Kelley-Hoskinson for a Model 780 incinerator;
- 3. surveyed, tested and are seeking approval from the State of NH Solid Waste Division to use the existing dump site for incineration;
- 4. continued development toward an operational dump site for Canterbury.

By vote of this March Meeting the Committee should be able to have a dump site operational by July 1, 1977.

#### **Drake Home**

The early 1900 picture is of Mr. and Mrs. George Drake and friend taken in front of their West Road home by Luther Cody. The timbers used in the framing are reportedly from the old Canterbury Fort. They are of white oak and are twelve inches square and 50 feet long. Built by John Randall in the early 1800's it has been the home of the Bill Wheeler family for many years. Now owned by Ralph and Shirley (Wheeler) McMecham.



#### The Vestry

The building that once stood on the Common near the Stokes residence was a building of many functions. Built prior to 1826 it served as a store & post office, liquor was sold there, several families made their home in the small apartment on the Hackleboro side of the building. Republican Hall upstairs and Sunday School facilities down occupied the west end. The building was torn down to make room for the Parish House and a land swap was arranged between Town and Church by popular request; resulting in a large open Common. Residents of the building were Greenoughs, Fellows, James and Lucia Maria Elkins, Valerie Sargent and Sarah Hutchins who willed the building to the Church. Tenants under Church ownership were Rancours and Fowlers. The Sunday School room served as store facilities twice in recent years. April 8th, 1943, Mr. Giles opened for business while the rest of the center was still burning. Shortly after Mr. Hubbard took possession of the General Store another fire forced the vestry into the business once again. Beyond the west end of the Vestry can be seen the front of the original Congregational Church and the front of the store run by Alfred Brown when the picture was taken by Luther Cody.
