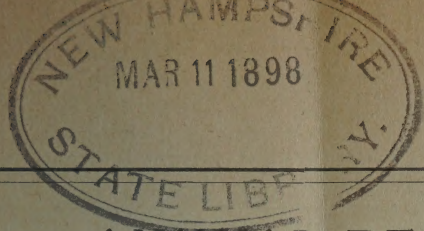

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

The financial statistics concerning the schools are given with the town accounts.

BAYSIDE SCHOOL.

Miss Gertrude Chapman has been teacher of this school for eleven years, and the good order and evident progress of the scholars are a witness of her ability and good success as a teacher. On account of ill health, she has been obliged to give up her work for a while, but has an excellent substitute in her sister, Miss Abbie Chapman. The number of scholars is 27.

NORTH SCHOOL.

Miss Lillian Chapman has been teacher for two years. She has been patient, persevering and faithful in her duties, and the school has made very good progress. It numbers 33 scholars. For many years it has been indebted to the generosity of Miss Ann Peirce for the use of a fine organ, which has been helpful in the musical exercises of the school.

SOUTH SCHOOL.

Miss Lois D. Beck has been teacher for two years. Miss Beck has high ideals of what a school should be, and has endeavored to realize them. The results of her work are worthy of commendation. The number of scholars is 26.

All these teachers of the primary schools are from Green-

land. Some have thought that it would be better to employ teachers from out of town, and, if possible, such as have had a normal school training; but the low rate of wages paid, and the high price charged for board, would make it difficult to secure competent teachers from out of town. We do not want cheap teachers. We want the best we can get, and we believe the teachers employed have done as well as any we could have obtained.

HIGH SCHOOL.

The principal of the high school is Miss Mary A. Lyon. With mind well trained and well stored, strict without being severe, she has for nearly four years conducted the school admirably well. The number of scholars at present is 28. There needs to be a higher standard of qualification required for admission. About one-third of the scholars are pursuing studies which they ought to have completed before entering the school. This takes away from the teacher time and strength which should be given to the more advanced studies. The children in the primary schools are ambitious to enter the high school, and their parents desire them to do so. In this matter the board have sought to do what would be for the greatest advantage of the greatest number. Last year we had an intermediate school with 20 scholars. This was a good arrangement, but the funds would not allow us to continue it. The town has done well for thirteen years in voting a liberal appropriation for the high school, and we trust the citizens will maintain their good name and character in this respect. We believe the high school is worth to the town all that it costs, and more too.

The town holds a lease of Brackett academy, on condition of keeping the schoolroom in good repair. It seems reasonable

that in case of heavy snows the officers of the town who have charge of the roads should make the schoolroom accessible by clearing the path to the door, and not leave it to the school board or janitor to do this.

Complaints of the most opposite kind have been made concerning the schools. Some have said that their children were not pushed forward fast enough, and others have said that their children were overdriven. These complaints come from the modern methods of classifying the scholars. In old times, for the most part, each scholar had his or her own lesson and recitation, and there were as many classes as scholars. Now the same lesson is given to many different scholars. It may be too hard for some, and not hard enough for others. Our teachers have endeavored to use a wise discretion in this matter.

Complaint also has been made that scholars in the high school cannot take the studies they or their parents would choose, but must follow a prescribed course. The teacher has endeavored to accommodate such as well as she could with her limited time, and with due regard to those who are following the regular prescribed course. The present plan of study in the high school, including French and Latin, occupies four years; and as a general rule it is well for each scholar to take the entire course as it is. Possibly also it might be well to arrange for a purely English course.

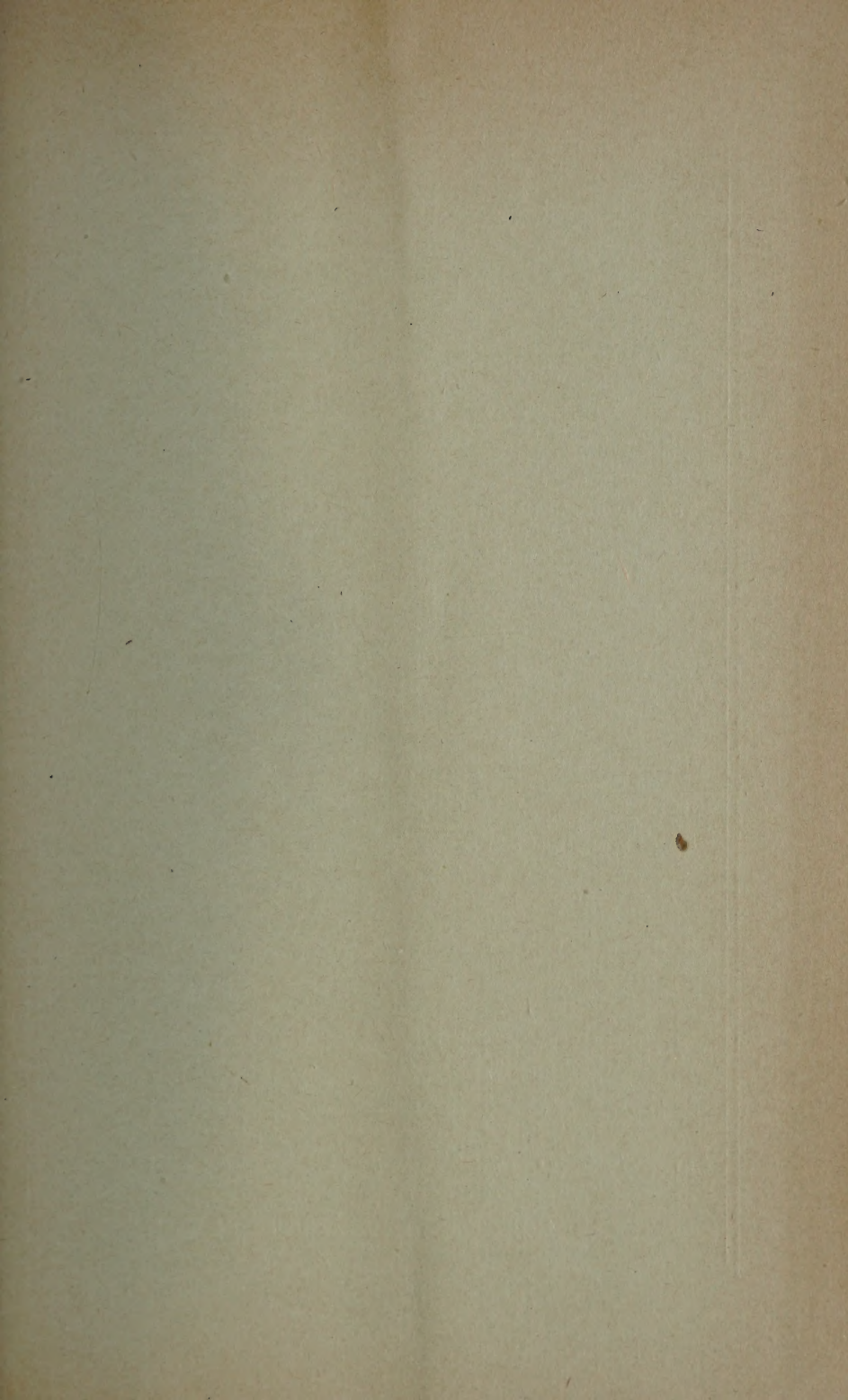
