



1991-92 PROPOSED TOWN BUDGET


YOUR 1990 LOCAL TAX DOLLAR

Materials Collected at the Hanover Recycling Center in 1990

Recycling Facts:

- The Hanover Recycling Center collected an estimated 2,270 tons of recyclables during its nine years of operation.
- Over the nine years of its operation 1,178 tons of newsprint was collected. This paper is the equivalent of 20,026 pulp trees.
- On average, residents put out 19 lbs. of recyclables in their Hanover Recycles box per week.
- The energy saved from recycling 24 tons of aluminum cans at the Hanover Recycling Center over the past nine years is equivalent to the electricity needed to heat 80 New Hampshire homes for an entire year.
- The Hanover Recycles Curbside Recycling program collects 250% more recyclables per week from Hanover residents than did the Hanover Recycling Center.
- Northeast Waste Services recorded accepting 124 tons of newsprint from the Town of Hanover in 1990. Dan Bailey, farmer on Lyme Road in Lyme estimates that he collected 2-3 tons of newsprint per week from Hanover starting in March, 1990.



HAZARDOUS WASTE

The 1989 Annual Collection served 280 households. In May 1990 over 340 households were served with the help of a 20% increase in budget. When funds were exhausted, the hauler had to close down and about 100 cars were turned away. This increase in community participation shows that citizens are aware of the importance of keeping toxic materials out of landfills and are willing to support such a program with their own efforts.

The Committee receives the major portion of its financial support from regional landfills in the Upper Valley. In addition, contributions from local businesses and organizations, grants from the states of New Hampshire and Vermont, and on-site donations have made it possible for us to conduct seven successful annual Collection Days.





HOWE LIBRARY

In 1900 Emily Howe Hitchcock established the Howe Library Corporation "for the purpose of maintaining a public library for the town of Hanover," and her childhood home became the Howe Library. In 1975 the library left that original building (built in 1773 by Eleazar Wheelock, and now known as Wheelock House) and moved to its present location.

The new building was designed by the Boston architectural firm of Shepley Bulfinch Richardson and Abbot. Although the basic annual operating budget of the library is now funded by Hanover taxpayers, the building itself was financed by a very successful fund-raising campaign and a loan, which is being repaid almost entirely with income from the Corporation's endowment. Contributions or memorial gifts to the Corporation are gratefully received and are used to enrich the library's collections and services.

The library endowment funds buy special titles which could not be obtained through the regular town budget. In addition, books on tape, music tapes, compact discs, and videos are all purchased with endowment and gift monies.

The trustees and staff welcome your interest in the library and your participation in its activities.

ETNA LIBRARY

The Hanover Town Library has been the official library for the Town of Hanover since it was established as the "Hanover Free Library" in 1899. The present building was completed in 1905. At the dedication Mr. Edward P. Storrs, chairman of the Town Selectmen, said "...and here will be found a fitting close to the chain of Libraries of which Hanover can be proud."

The library budget is financed by the Hanover Town budget, with supplements drawn from book sales, donations, and the annual "Love My Library" campaign in February.

The Hanover Town Library, locally known as the Etna Library, basically serves the Etna community, but it is open to all taxpayers of Hanover. Patricia M. Hardenberg is the librarian. She is the only staff person at the library. Volunteers open the library Thursday evenings and a weekly volunteer helps Thursday mornings.

Winter Snow Storms



HANOVER HISTORICAL SOCIETY

The Hanover Historical Society was organized in 1961, the bicentennial year of the Town's founding.

CONSERVATION COUNCIL

The Hanover Conservation Commission and the Hanover Conservation Council joined forces to protect the last open fields along the Connecticut River in Hanover—the Wilson and Haslett Fullington farm lands.

The cost of the conservation easement on the Wilson Fullington farm is \$150,000. The state of New Hampshire allocated \$115,000 toward its purchase. The Town of Hanover and the Hanover Conservation Council each allocated \$10,000 toward its purchase. And we have raised the \$15,000 needed to complete this project!

The cost of the conservation easement on the Haslett Fullington farm is \$204,000. However, Dartmouth College, who owns the farm, lowered the easement price giving us a bargain sale of \$154,000. We have succeeded in raising the \$104,000 needed to apply for a matching grant from the State for the additional \$50,000.

IMPROVEMENT SOCIETY

The Hanover Improvement Society was incorporated in 1922 to manage the Nugget Theatre and throughout the many years since its inception the Society has used the funds from the Theatre for the Benefit of the Town of Hanover.

Numerous contributions of well over one million dollars have been made to the Town for the purchase of fire and highway equipment, the improve-

ment of streets and sidewalks, the planting of trees, contributions have been made to the schools, the conservation council and the garden club to preserve and maintain the natural beauty of the community.

One of the Society's most ambitious programs was the rehabilitation of South Main Street with the creation of the Nugget Arcade, the purchase of the old Tavern block and the land later sold to the Dartmouth National Bank to enhance the tax base of the Town as well as to create needed parking facilities.

The Hanover Improvement Society created and maintains the beautiful Storrs Pond Recreation Area providing excellent swimming, camping and picnic facilities as well as tennis courts supervised by a professional who is available for instruction.

The James Campion Rink is managed and maintained by the Society, with the help of many dedicated area residents, providing a wonderful ice skating facility for Lebanon and Hanover schools as well as the general public.
