To the inhabitants of the Town of Langdon, County of Sullivan, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Langdon on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, at twelve of the clock noon until six p.m.. Regular business meeting will be held at seven p.m.

Article 1. To choose all necessary officers for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To see if the Town will appropriate and authorize the Selectmen to use the income, estimated to be \$111,939 from:

a. Filing Fees and Permits	500
b. Interest on Taxes and Deposits	7,000
c. Motor Vehicle Permits	38,500
d. State of NH Shared Revenue	17,789
e. Refunds and Adjustments	3,000
f. Sale of Municipal Property	45,150

To defray Town Charges estimated to be \$118,900.00. Town Charges to include, but not limited to:

a. Town Officer's Salaries	4,000
b. Town Officer's Expenses	8,500
c. Election and Registration	500
d. Police Department	8,500
e. Dog Control	1,000
f. Legal Services	3,800
g. Ambulance	4,400
h. Fire Department	7,000

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100,000.00 for the maintenance of highways and bridges. The State of New Hampshire to furnish approximately \$38,500 in State Aid. The Town will raise the balance. (Approximately \$61,500).

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3500.00 for the Capital Expense of the Fire Department. This article has the approval of the Selectmen.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2500.00 for installation of a new incinerating toilet at the Town Hall. This article has the approval of the Selectmen.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1500.00 for the Capital Expense of the Police Department. This article has the approval of the Selectmen.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$60,000 for the reconstruction of Crane Brook Road (phase I). Funds to be raised by bank notes or municipal bond, and paid over a three year period. This special article has the unanimous approval of the Selectmen, and requires a 2/3 vote for acceptance.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following; \$150 per cemenary lot for a resident and or a former resident, each lot to consist of a 4'x 12' plot. Nonresidents not to be accepted for burial.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to accept Trust Funds for the perpetual care of the Cemetary Lots.

Article 10. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 to be placed in a Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of replacing the picket fence at the Lower Cemetary. This article has the approval of the Selectmen.

Article 11. To see if the Town will appropriate \$1,000 to be used for upkeep of the Cemetary. This article has the approval of the Selectmen.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to indefinitely authorize the Selectmen, until specific rescission of such authority, to issue tax anticipation notes.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to indefinitely authorize the Selectmen, until specific rescission of such authority, to convey any real estate acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's Deed; such conveyance shall be by deed following a public auction or the property may be sold by advertised sealed bids or may be otherwise disposed of as justice may require as determined by the Board of Selectmen pursuant to RSA 80:80.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to sell Town property.

Article 16. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Article 17. To allow accounts.

LIST OF APPROPRIATIONS -- TOWN MEETING 1993

The meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Don Malcolm at 7:00 p.m. The Pledge of Allegiance was said and the moderator led the Lord's Prayer. A moment of silence was held in memory of Rodney Campbell Sr., Veronica Pelton, and Elroy Rock. Residents were asked to sign a get well letter for Alice and Ben Porter.

Article 1: To choose all necessary officers for the ensuing year. This was completed during the voting during the day. The moderator made a motion to dispense with reading the warrant. This was seconded and voted in the affirmative. The moderator introduced town officials. Attention was drawn to an exhibit depicting the town and created by the Sarah Porter third grade.

Article 2: To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following: "That the bottom line budget, less revenues, and any other warrant article in excess of \$50,000 of the Fall Mountain Regional School District be voted on by referendum on the officail printed town/school district ballot." (By petition) The moderator consulted the Department of Revenue Administration on the legality of this article. It was determined that the action is beyond the authority of town meeting but there is concern about the legality of placing the petition on a ballot. The petitioner presented his argument and the meeting was asked for an expression of opinion. There was a nonbinding vote. Article 2 was moved and seconded for voting as read. A count of hands showed 54 yes, 5 no.

Article 3: To see if the Town will appropriate and authorize the Selectmen to use the income, estimated to be \$46,600.00 from:

a. Filing Fees and Permits	600
b. Interest on Taxes and Deposits	5,000
c. Motor Vehicle Permits	35,000
e. State of NH Grant	6,000

To defray Town Charges estimated to be \$123,133.00. Town Charges to include, but not limited to:

a. Town Officer's Salaries	4,000
b. Town Officer's Expenses	8,500
c. Election and Registration	500
d. Police Department	8,500
e. Damage by Dogs	500
f. Legal Services	3,000

A motion was made that \$500 be added to item l, Cemeteries, bringing the total for item l to \$1,000. Seconded. Pertaining to item d, a question was asked about whether Fall Mountain School District would pay for police alarms at the high school. The Police Chief will check on that. A question was directed to the trustees of the trust fund regarding item l. Families are encouraged to contribute to the trust fund for the maintenance of the cemeteries but there is no required contribution. As there is no charge for the plot there was concern expressed about nonresidents being buried inexpensively in Langdon. Vote call on amendment to item l. Article 3 was amended to read \$123,633.00. (Article 3 motion/second/vote: yes)

Article 4: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100,000.00 for the maintenance of highways and bridges. The State of New Hampshire to furnish approximately \$43,800.00 in State Aid. The Town will raise the balance. (Approximately \$56,200.00) There was no discussion. (Article 4 motion/second/vote: yes)

Article 5: To see if the Town will vote to support the continued leasing of the Caterpillar Motorgrader (the lease cost to come from the monies voted in Article 4). Discussion: The lease is for 6 years at roughly \$15,000 per year, the town was able to use the grader free until the 1992 town meeting when the lease would be voted on. According to Doug Beach, the former road agent, the old grader would have been inoperable in Spring of 1993. The estimate to bring it to operating condition was \$32,000. The town received \$15,000 in trade in on old grader. Cost for leasing grader over 6 years will be about \$93,000. A seven-year maintenance plan was included in that price. The town will then own the grader. Discussion centered on advantages of new vs. used vs. lease. (Article 5 motion/second/vote: yes)

Article 6: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3500.00 for the Capital Expense of the Fire Department. No discussion.
(Article 6 motion/seconded/vote: yes)

Article 7: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2000.00 for the installation of a new incinerating toilet at the Town Hall. Discussion concerned purchase and installation. Selectmen felt there was no other option than an incinerating toilet. The selectmen were asked by a show of hands to explore the long range possibility of adding water and a septic system to the Town Hall. (Article 7 motion/seconded/vote: yes)

Article 8: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$13,500 for the purchase of the new police vehicle. Discussion centered on necessity. The police chief said the old vehicle is worth \$1,000-\$1,500 that repairs this year have already totaled \$1,000 and it needs \$600 more in repairs. The car has low mileage but it has many hours on it because of idling during accidents and fires. The cruiser was unavailable for seven weeks while being repaired and officers had to use their private vehicles for police work. Lights, radio and equipment on existing vehicle will be fitted to the new one by police officers. Article 8 motion/seconded/vote: yes)

Article 9: To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1500.00 for the Capital Expense of the Police Department. (To be passed over if article 8 passes.)
(Passed over.)

Article 10: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50,000 for a salt shed and highway garage. (By petition) Petitioner presented a plan for construction that was estimated at \$58,000. Volunteer labor would be requested to make up the difference in costs. Concerns were expressed about a committee formed three years ago to design plans, about the condition of lumber purchased in the past for the garage, about the lack of shelter and facilities for the road agent, and about vehicle repairs having to be made outside in inclement weather. Discussion turned to the town needing to create a financial plan for the coming years and to establish priorities for the next five years. According to Lucien Beam, the five largest issues are the replacement of Crane Brook Road at \$124,000, the town garage, the costs of solid waste disposal, insurance costs, and school district costs. It was suggested that half the cost of the garage be funded through surplus town funds. A motion was made to amend article 10 to read "To see if the town will appropriate the sum of \$60,000 for construction of a highway garage. \$30,000 to come from surplus town funds, \$30,000 to be raised by taxes. It was moved and seconded. Discussion centered on whether surplus actually existed, selectmen stated it was in unpaid taxes and departments not spending all funds. The selectmen were asked to appoint a committee. Amendment to Article 10 was voted: yes.
(Article 10 with amendment: motion/seconded/vote: yes)

Article 11: To see if the Town will vote to establish a capital reserve fund under the provision of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of building a salt shed and highway garage and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 to be placed in this fund. (By petition) (Motion was made that this article be passed over, second/vote: yes)

Article 12: To see if the Town will vote to accept Trust Funds for the perpetual care of the Cemetary Lots. No discussion. (Article 12 motion/seconded/vote: yes)

Article 13: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes. No discussion. (Article 12 motion/seconded/vote: yes)

Article 14: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell property acquired by Tax Collector's Deed. There is no property being considered. (Article 14 motion/seconded/vote: yes)

Article 15: To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to sell Town property. Property was identified as the police cruiser. (Article 15 motion/seconded/vote: yes)

Article 16: To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting. School bond issue and possible closing of the Sarah Porter school was mentioned. Robert Cunniff was commended for fifteen years of service as selectman. Douglas Beach was commended for his work on the roads during his tern as road agent. The new road agent had not yet been hired. (Article 16 motion/seconded/vote: yes)

Article 17: To allow accounts. No discussion (Article 17 motion/seconded/vote: yes)

The quilt raffle was won by Lyndle Chandler.

Motion was made to adjourn/seconded/vote: yes. Meeting adjourned at 9 p.m.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN
AND
STATE FOREST RANGER

Again I want to thank all of you for a quiet year. We had one brush fire on May 1st due to the permit holder not following state law. You might want to know that the minimum cost of having the Fire Department put out a brush/grass fire is well over \$100 and you are also subject to legal action. The warden and deputy wardens' class was held on May 18th in Marlow and we reviewed and executed the procedure of locating fire in remote areas.

Following is the State Forest Fire report:

During Calendar Year 1993, the State of New Hampshire experienced an average number of wildfires. The three leading causes of these wildfires were campfires left unattended, unsupervised children and debris fires that escaped control. All of these fires are preventable, but ONLY with your help!

Please help your town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. New Hampshire State Law (RSA 224:27II) requires that "no person, firm or corporation shall kindle or cause to be kindled any fire or burn or cause to be burned any material in the open, except when the ground is covered with snow, without first obtaining a written fire permit from the Forest Fire Warden of the town where the burning is to be done."

Violations of RSA 224:27 II and other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$1,000 and/or a year in jail and you are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

The State of New Hampshire, Division of Forests and Lands assisted many towns in wildland fire suppression during 1993 and participated in many fire prevention programs. This year, the nation is celebrating Smokey Bear's 50th anniversary. The State of New Hampshire Forest Protection Bureau will be working with many communities to spread the fire prevention message - "Remember...Only YOU can prevent forest fires. Fire prevention is the most cost effective fire suppression tool. Please be careful around fires and help us and our communities have a fire safe year.

"REMEMBER...SMOKEY HAS FOR FIFTY YEARS!"
