TOWN WARRANT.

(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Londonderry in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Londonderry on Tuesday, the ninth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects.

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same. For the repairs of roads and bridges, for Memorial Day, and for any other article embraced in this warrant.

3. To see if the Town will vote to accept in trust the sum of one hundred dollars from Dean K. Webster, executor, the income of same to be expended for perpetual care the cemetery lot of Josephine L. Chase in Glenwood Cemetery in Londonderry.

4. To see if the Town will vote to accept in trust the sum of two hundred dollars from Elizabeth Morrison, the income of same to be expended for perpetual care of two lots in Glenwood Cemetery known as the Morrison and Boynton lots.

5. To see if the Town will vote to accept in trust the sum of one hundred dollars from Lucilia Gage the income of same to be expended for perpetual care the

cemetery lot of Persis G. Boyce in Sunnyside Cemetery in Londonderry.

6. To see if the Town will vote to accept in trust the sum of one hundred dollars from Eliza Barker the income of same to be expended for perpetual care the cemetery lot of Eliza Barker in Pleasant View Cemetery. in Londonderry.

7. To see if the Town will vote to accept in trust the sum of two hundred dollars from George H. Hardy the income of same to be expended for perpetual care the cemetery lot of Aaron P. Hardy in Valley Cemetery in Londonderry.

8. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to purchase a Stone Crusher, Elevator, Screen, Bin and Engine and raise money for same.

9. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue a short piece of highway from Myron Evans' place leading towards Wilson's Crossing.

10. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the salary of the Town Clerk twenty five dollars a year and raise money for same.

11. To see if the Town will vote to increase the salary of the Town Treasurer twenty five dollars a year and raise money for same.

12. To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of Chapter 117, Laws of 1917, on a section of the Hudson-Derry Road so-called, and appropriate, or set aside from the amount raised for highway work the sum of \$500.00 for this purpose.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,513.50 for Trunk Line Construction, the State will furnish \$1,513.50 making a total of \$3,027.00.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum

of \$1,500.00 for State Aid Maintenance, the State will furnish \$378.25 making a total of \$1,891.75.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,513.50 for Trunk Line Constructon, the State will furnish \$1,750.00 making a total of \$3,500.00.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,513.50 for State Aid Construction, the State will furnish \$1,500.00 making a total of \$3,000.00.

17. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of Two Hundred dollars in trust, the income to be used for the perpetual care of the lot of John W. and Eugene O. Greeley in Glenwood Cemetery. In addition to the usual care of the lot, the monument and headstones are to be cleaned once annually with brush and water. After the interest not expended has accumulated to the sum of twenty five dollars, any interest over that sum not needed for the care of the lot, may be used for repairing driveways, walks or any neglected lot in said cemetery.

18. To see if the Town will vote to exempt from taxation for the period of ten years at least the Derry Electric Light Company, if they extend their lines for lighting purposes through the Town of Londonderry.

19. To select one trustee who shall have charge of the Trust funds of the Town.

20.,To see if the Town will vote to accept in trust the sum of one hundred dollars from the estate of Henry H. Annis, the income of same to be used in giving perpetual care to the burial lot of the said Henry H. Annis in Pleasant View Cemetery in Londonderry.

21. To see if the Town will vote to instruct its Board of Selectmen to buy one or more Gravel Banks in said town with the advice of the State Highway

Department, and raise and appropriate money for the same, and pass any vote relating thereto.

22. To see if the Town will vote to instruct its Board of Selectmen to use their influence with the State Highway Department, to the effect that the bad curves in the Hudson-Derry road may be straightened as much as possible.

23. To act on any other business that may legally come before this meeting and appropriate money for the same.

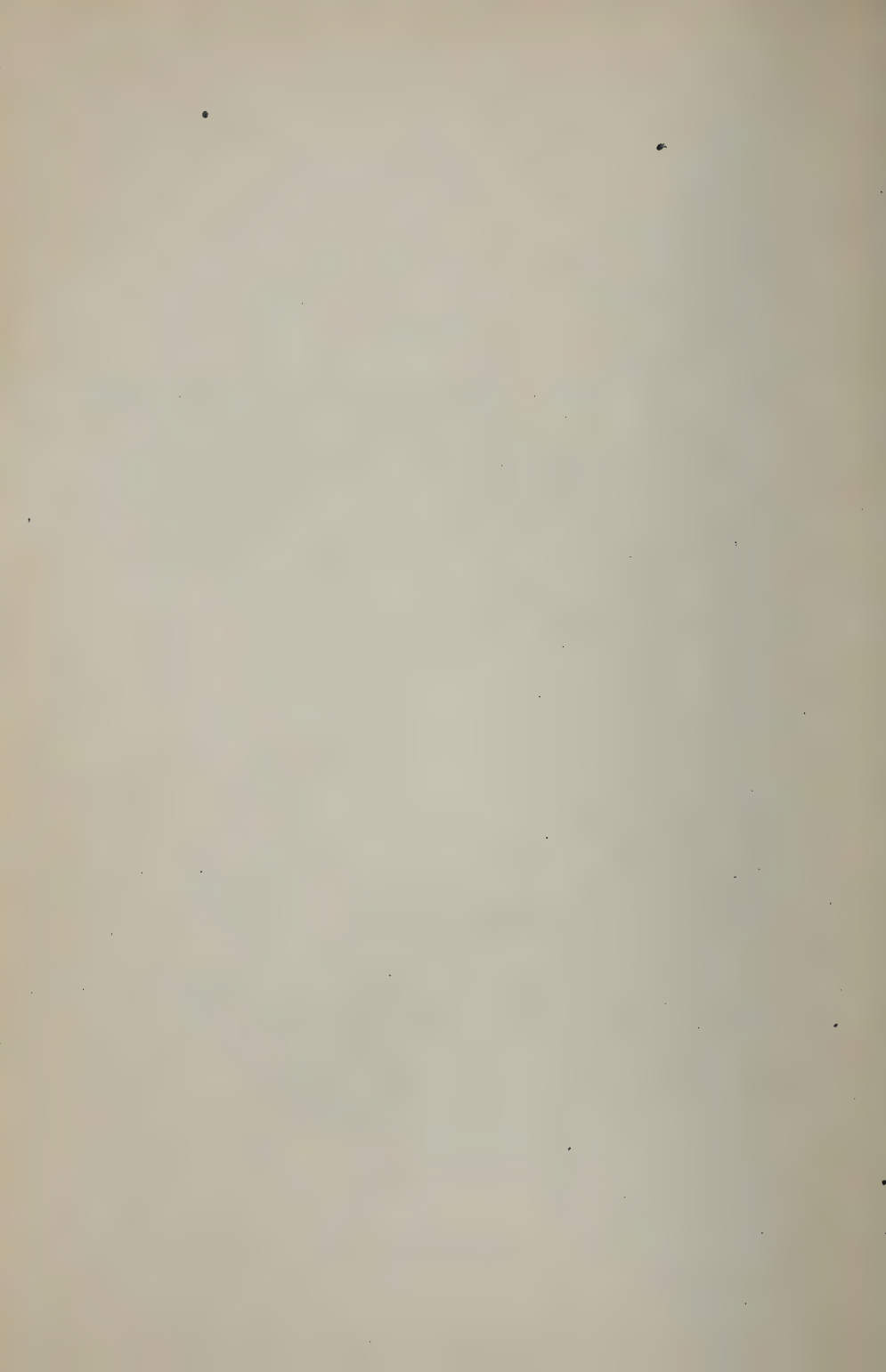

To the Board of Education of Londonderry:

I herewith submit my annual report on the condition and progress of the schools.

Beginning with the present school year we entered upon an entirely new system of state control. The new law makes the local superintendent a state official, and consequently brings the State Department into more intimate relation to the local situation, and must necessarily tend to unify the system of the state and strengthen every part of it. It will, of course, require time to realize the full value of the arrangement. The putting into effect the new order has involved a large amount of entirely new work, and has made it impossible to give the usual amount of time to the supervision of instruction. This matter will become adjusted in time, and the ultimate results must be beneficial.

We began the year with new teachers at No. 1, 2, 7, and 8. Mrs. Gilcreast, who taught a part of the last year at No. 2 consented to take No. 1, Miss Giff, who had previously taught at No. 5, returned to take No. 2 Mrs. Reekie was engaged to teach No.7 for the Fall term. She was unable to continue, and Mrs. Rebecca G. Blodgett of Michfield succeeded her. Mrs. Muzzey, who has taught at different times in town, was engaged for No. 9. In view of the serious shortage of teachers, we are very fortunate to have our schools so well cared for.

The State Board of Education, in order to secure greater permanency of the teaching force, requires all teachers to be hired if possible by the year and with written contract. All teachers must have state approval.

The arrangement to transport the children from district No.3 to the school at No. 2 seems to be satis-

factory. The schools at No. 5, 6, and 9 are small, while those of Nos. 1, 7, and 8 are altogether too large. The situation at No. 7 is relieved somewhat by having an assistant teacher, but two teachers working in the same room is not wholly satisfactory.

There is the same need of an assistant in the schools of No. 1 and No. 8. In the case of No. 1, however, on account of the smallness of the room, it would be impossible for two teachers to work successfully. But something must be done to relieve these situations. At No. 1, the children of several families could be sent to Derry, and thus relieve the overcrowded condition somewhat. In case of No. 8, the room could be divided into two rooms, and two teachers could then take care of the situation very nicely.

These situations should be carefully thought out before taking plans for changing the buildings to make them conform to the regulations of the State Board. Before any permanent changes are made, however, I would suggest that careful consideration be given to the plan of erecting two new buildings of four rooms each, one to care for all the schools in the southern part of the town, and one to care for those of the northern end of the town. Six class rooms would accomodate all the children, and six teachers would do the work. This concentration would insure much better working conditions, and produce vastly better results. The cost of teaching and fuel would be a very considerable increase in the cost of transportation. I submit this suggestion for your consideration. and, if the plan is found to be feassible, I would recommend its adoption. It would probably cost more than our present school system, but it would be worth a great deal more, and I am sure, when once well es-

established, would be generally much more satisfactory.

One of the most important innovations is the requirement of the State Board that a school nurse be employed. The Red Cross Society of the state offered to assist in this matter by providing a nurse to demonstrate the value of the work. Miss Elizabeth McCauley has begun the work in this supervisory union under this arrangement. She has already accomplished a good deal in Derry, but has been handicapped somewhat in Londonderry by the inconvenience of transportation and the difficulty in getting the assistance of physicians to make the necessary physical examinations. Dr. Bennett has generously given time for the work at No. 8, and the rest of the schools will be given attention now just as soon as the nurse can get to them.

The severity of the winter is causing some interruptions in the work, but otherwise the year's work is progressing well. The teachers are earnest and working faithfully. The children are responding in good spirit. I anticipate a successful year's work.

In conclusion, I wish to thank the members of the Board for their constant interest and generous support in all matters pertaining to the schools.

REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD.

Your School Board organized with Norman F. Watts as chairman; Rose L. Condon, as secretary; and Hattie T. Colburn, committee on supplies.

"The passing of "The Educational Bill" in the legislature last Spring has made the work of the Board especially hard the past year in its attempt to adjust itself to the new regime. The appropriations last Spring were not sufficient to cover our expenses for the year and to make up the remaining portion of the four months additional expense caused by the changing of the fiscal year. We have increased the teachers salaries quite a little in order to hold them and the expense of running the schools has increased in every way since the war. Consequently, we will be obliged to close our accounts this year with a deficit. That means that more money will have to be appropriated next year. Massachusetts is now paying her teachers more money than we are, so we must rise to the occasion or she is going to get the teachers and we will have to go without.

We have put new slate black-boards into No. 7 school where they have been needed badly for some time, but otherwise the repairs have been confined to the most necessary details.

Our small schools seem to be growing and our large ones are getting so large that they present a very difficult proposition.
