

RECORD OF TOWN MEETING March 10, 1998

The Annual Town Meeting of the Town of Madbury, County of Strafford, and State of New Hampshire, was called to order at 11:00 a.m. by Moderator Donald W. McIvin. The Polls were declared open and the following Ballot Clerks were sworn in by the Moderator:

Moderator Melvin called the evening session of the Meeting to order at 7:30 p.m. The assembled citizens (approximately one hundred and fifty) stood for a moment of silence for those Madbury residents who died during 1997. They included:

ARTICLE 2. Voted by ballot on Amendment No. 1 to the Zoning Ordinance regarding the definition of UNDEVELOPABLE LAND as proposed by

the Madbury Planning Board.

- ARTICLE 3. Voted by ballot on Amendment No. 2 to the Zoning Ordinance regarding YARD SALES as proposed by the Madbury Planning Board.

 YES 277 NO 153 PASSED
- ARTICLE 4. Voted by ballot on Amendment No. 3 to the Zoning Ordinance regarding changes to Article VIII, SAND AND GRAVEL REGULATIONS, as proposed by the Madbury Planning Board.

 YES 303 NO 119 PASSED
- ARTICLE 5. Voted by ballot on Amendment No. 4 to the Zoning Ordinance regarding the addition of Article XI, TELECOMMUNICATIONS FACILITIES OVERLAY DISTRICT as proposed by the Madbury Planning Board.

 YES 341 NO 86 PASSED
- ARTICLE 6. Voted by ballot on Amendment No. 5 to the Zoning Ordinance regarding the regulation of BIOSOLIDS as presented by citizen petition.

 YES 205 NO 225 DID NOT PASS

- ARTICLE 7. Richard Burkholder moved and Robert Wilson seconded a motion to authorize the Selectmen to choose all other Town Officials.

 PASSED
- ARTICLE 8. Richard Houghton moved and Jim Davis seconded a motion to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of the construction of a Safety Complex and to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000.00) to be placed in this fund and to further authorize the Selectmen to act as agents to withdraw and expend from this Capital Reserve Fund. This appropriation is recommended by the Board of Selectmen and is included in the posted budget. Selectman Houghton spoke to this article. He explained that we need to plan ahead for growth. Madbury has had a Master Plan since 1988. Capital Improvement Plans have followed. Town Boards have been following these guidelines and continuing to maintain a stable tax rate. As of 1998 the Town of Madbury is DEBT FREE. Now is the appropriate time to begin putting aside monies for a future project, namely a Safety Complex, which has always been in the Master Plan. Houghton recommended approval of this article. There being no further discussion, a vote was taken.

PASSED

- ARTICLE 9. Richard Houghton moved and Tom Perley seconded a motion to raise and appropriate and authorize the Selectmen to spend the sum of Ninety Thousand Dollars (\$90,000.00) for the purchase from the Elliott Rose Co. of Madbury/Richard Colprit of:
 - a. Ten (10+/-) acres of land located on the south side of Route 155, at or near the intersection of Madbury Road, having approximately 1,437 feet of frontage on said Route 155; and
 - b. Approximately one (1+/-) acre of land abutting the Bellamy River (Tax Map 7 Lot 3A) from which water is drawn for use by the Elliott Rose Co. of Madbury; together with
 - c. All easements and easement rights, including any and all riparian water rights in amounts, quantity and quality historically used by the Elliott Rose Co. of Madbury, and/or its predecessors, appurtenant to said parcels, relating to the delivery, storage, supply, and use of water through pipelines from said river parcel to the "Greenhouse" land of said Elliott Rose Co. of Madbury, and from said land and the storage reservoir on land of Ralph and Betsy Booth; including all rights in and to said pipeline reservoir and access thereto.

This appropriation is recommended by the Board of Selectmen and is included in the posted budget.

Selectman Houghton explained how the Town became involved in the purchase and sales agreement on this property. All taxes (current and back) must be paid to the Town at the closing. There is no definite plan for the future use of this land and water rights by the Town. Houghton invited questions from the citizens. After a question and answer period a vote was taken.

PASSED

ARTICLE 10. David Penniman moved and Jim Davis seconded a motion to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) for the existing Capital Reserve Fund created in Article 8 at the 1994 Town Meeting for the purchase of a Fire Truck and further to authorize the Selectmen to act as agents to withdraw and expend from this Capital Reserve Fund. This appropriation is recommended by the Board of Se-

lectmen and is included in the posted budget.

Selectman Moriarty spoke to this article. He said that we now have \$48,334.26 in this Capital Reserve Fund. We will be needing approximately \$120,000.00 for a new fire truck in the next very few years. He commented that even if we vote yes on all the "money articles" this year we still will not raise the town portion of the tax rate. There being no further discussion a vote was taken.

PASSED

ARTICLE 11. Janet Wall moved and Eileen Corrow seconded a motion to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) for the existing Capital Reserve Fund created in Article 6 at the 1997 Town Meeting for the purpose of Transfer Station Improvements and further authorize the Selectmen to act as agents to withdraw and expend from this Capital Reserve Fund. This appropriation is recommended by the Board of Selectmen and is included in the posted budget.

Selectman Moriarty explained that we now have approximately

Selectman Moriarty explained that we now have approximately \$11,000.00 in this Capital Reserve Fund and that by adding \$5,000.00 more this year we should have enough to complete this project. There were no questions or discussion. A vote was taken.

PASSED

ARTICLE 12. Kitty Cornwell moved and Robert Houston seconded a motion to raise and appropriate the salary increases recommended by the Salary Survey Committee appointed by the Moderator as a result of action taken on Article 14 at the 1997 Town Meeting. This appropriation is included in the posted budget and is recommended by the Board of Selectmen. Kitty Cornwell read the Committee's report which was printed on pages 24 and 25 of this year's Town Report. Recommended salaries for 1998 are as follows:

- ARTICLE 13. Bruce Hodsdon moved and Joan Sundberg seconded a motion to pass the proposed budget of \$687,326.00 for the current year. There being absolutely no discussion, a vote was taken. PASSED
- ARTICLE 14. Craig Seaver moved and Joan Valentine seconded a motion to retain the unexpended portion of the 1998 Conservation Commission appropriation, said monies to be placed in the Madbury Conservation Fund. There were no questions or discussion. A vote was taken. PASSED

ARTICLE 15. There were no reports given this year.

ARTICLE 16. Joan Valentine wished to recognize Richard Houghton for his many years of service to the Town of Madbury as Selectman. Joan Schreiber announced the Annual Spring Town Road Cleanup would be in April. More details will be announced at the Town Pot Luck Supper to be held Sunday, April 19 at the Moharimet School at 5:30 p.m. Ken Wolcott will have a Madbury Day planning session at the fire station on Tuesday, March 24, at 7:00 p.m. Anyone who would like to help – please come!

Bruce Hodsdon thanked Dick Houghton for his eighteen years of service as Selectman for the Town. He presented Dick, on behalf of the Town, a lovely, antique "throne", a cane and shawl (all donated by Lorraine Morong) for his "retirement days". He also bestowed upon him a beautiful fabric art pillow of the Town Hall created by Eileen Corrow and a gift certificate for dinner for two at the Three Chimneys Inn in Durham.

Dick Houghton accepted everything gratefully and gracefully. He especially thanked all the volunteers, Board Members and other Town Officials who make this a great Town to live in. He received a standing ovation.

This portion of the meeting concluded at 8:35 p.m. Moderator Melvin reminded everyone that the polls were still open for voting on Town and Oyster River Cooperative School District ballots until 9:00 p.m. Melvin adjourned the Meeting at 9:05 p.m. to count the 447 ballots cast on ARTICLES 1 through 6. The meeting was officially adjourned at 10:20 p.m.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Madbury on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, A.D. 1999 at 11:00 in the morning for the purpose of voting on Article 1 and at 7:00 o'clock in the evening for action on Articles 2 through 9. The polls which open at 11:00 a.m. for the purpose of voting on Article 1 will close at 8:00 p.m. unless extended by vote of the meeting.

ARTICLE 1: To choose the following Town Officers: (Majority vote)

A Selectmen for the ensuing three years.

A Treasurer for the ensuing year.

Two auditors for the ensuing year.

A Trustee of Trust Funds for the ensuing three years.

A Cemetery Trustee for the ensuing three years.

ARTICLE 2: To choose all other Town Officers (Majority vote required)

ARTICLE 3: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Sixty Thousand Dollars (\$60,000.00) for the existing Capital Reserve Fund created in Article 8 at the 1998 Town Meeting for the purpose of the Construction of a Safety Complex and further authorize the Selectmen to act as agents to withdraw and expend for this Capital Reserve Fund. This appropriation is recommended by the Board of Selectmen and is included in the posted budget. (Majority vote required)

- ARTICLE 4: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000.00) for the existing Capital Reserve Fund created in Article 8 at the 1994 Town Meeting for the purchase of a Fire Truck and further authorize the Selectmen to act as agents to withdraw and expend from this Capital Reserve Fund. MADBURY PLANNING BOARD 1998 ANNUAL REPORT

In a word, the Planning Board this year was <u>busy</u>. The Board scheduled eighteen preliminary discussions, with an additional 25 agenda items required to complete the discussions and applications carried forward. Nine subdivisions were approved, equaling the number of subdivisions approved in the four previous years combined. Of the subdivisions approved, two were "lot line adjustments" and did not create new building lots, another created four small parcels with the building sites in Dover, a third created two conservation parcels. In all ten new building lots were created in Madbury, one of which was purchased by the Town.

Under the newly adopted guidelines for Telecommunications Facilities the Planning Board approved a height waiver for the Piscataqua Cellular Telephone Company; further plans for a telecommunications tower on Beech Hill are anticipated. Also approved was a Level II Home Occupation Permit for dog training classes. A non-residential site review for a special exception for commercial use in the Residential & Agricultural zone was denied.

The Board also devoted considerable energy to long-range planning topics. The Civic District Planning Committee prepared a report summarizing past activities and listing a set of "guiding principles" gathered from community input. The Committee will continue to work interactively with the Board in this effort to stimulate a creative approach to community development. On another front, the Board has signed an agreement with the Strafford Regional Planning Commission to perform a build-out analysis in consultation with the NH Coastal Program. If approved at the State level, a grant will match \$2,000.00 of the Town's funds to project a picture of potential growth allowed under our current zoning. Preliminary planning for the Wagon Trail Bike path in cooperation with Durham continues. The path would be linked to a network of bike paths that traverse much of the seacoast. Support for the project will be voted on at Town meeting. Results from these efforts will feed into next year's project of revising sections of the Master Plan, last updated in 1990. The update will be funded and implemented in partnership with Strafford Regional Planning. The Master Plan serves as a guide for future community development, sets policies for protecting natural resources and community character, and is the foundation for our zoning ordinances and regulations.

In May, Steven Burns of the Strafford Regional Planning Commission addressed representatives from all of Madbury's Boards. At this meeting the Commission's regional plan was reviewed, and members worked to identify Madbury's cultural and natural resources. The inventory will be used to help draft new regional resource protection policies.

Because of the activity required of the Planning Board this year, I would like to thank all of the Planning Board members for their contribution, and for being the best of what a volunteer board strives to be.

MADBURY CONSERVATION COMMISSION ANNUAL REPORT 1998

1998 opened with debate on the biosolid-spreading issue. While the commission did not support the ban proposed at the '98 town meeting, we believe that the most conservative levels should be set for contaminants within biosolids to be applied to agricultural land.

Trail work for the year consisted of a new trail branch created by volunteers Adam Melvin and Dan Jenkins. A map has been added to the sign at the trailhead behind the town hall, with many details courtesy of Diana DeValk.

The nature trail developed by Joel Burdett, a UNH grad student working under John McLean, has been complete for most of the year. A complete booklet describing the station points is in limited supply, but a digest of the booklet, in pamphlet form, is available in the town office for those interested in a casual tour. The stations are marked with white numbered stakes.

Other commission work involved: 1. consideration and approval of two applications for work in wetlands, minimum impact, 2. attendance and comment at a hearing on the Wagon Track Trail proposal for the old Jenkins Road, we consider this an excellent recreational and practical asset which Madbury should support and encourage.

The commission notes with gratitude the addition of conservation land donated by Tom and Lorie Chase on Nute Road. The parcels constitute a link in an envisioned greenway/protection zone along the Bellamy River and Reservoir.

Townspeople may feel free to bring their concerns and comments to the commission, either by letter or by attending the meetings on the fourth Monday at 7:00.

MADBURY FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT

On behalf of the members of the Madbury Fire Department, I would like to thank the residents of the Town for their continued support this past year. Arthur Anderson stepped down as Chief in December after serving in that capacity for the past three years. We would like to thank him for his past and continued participation in the Department. As the newly appointed Chief, I look forward to leading the Madbury Fire Department with the continued goal of providing the best service possible to the residents of this community. Currently we have 22 members and are always looking for residents, both male and female, interested in participating with the Fire Department or FAST squad.

In 1998, we were pleased to help bring the NFPA's <u>Learn Not To Burn</u> Program into the Moharimet Elementary School, to instruct the students on fire safety and burn prevention. This program was made possible by a grant from the Liberty Mutual Insurance Company, which provided the materials and Teacher orientation for the Oyster River School District, as well as, schools in Rochester and Somersworth. The Madbury Fire Department joined both Lee and Durham Fire Departments to provide support for this program within the Oyster River Schools. In April, we sponsored a class on Forest Fire control, using the State of NH's new curriculum. This two day class was attended by most of our members, as well as, several members of neighboring departments. For Madbury Day we were able to prove that chicken can indeed be cooked outdoors in the pouring rain, a first that most members can recall. In December we recognized Dave Raynes for 15 years of service, Jennifer Perley for 10 years of service and Ted Keith was named Madbury Firefighter of the Year. On a more solemn note, in March, we were saddened by the loss of Don Begley, a Life Member of our Department.

For the year of 1998 the Madbury Fire Department and FAST Squad responded to a total of 103 calls for service. They consisted of the following:

- 4 Structural Fire Calls
- 2 Vehicle Fires
- 36 Medical Aid calls (including motor vehicle accidents)
- 14 Brush Fires
- 15 Power line and Utility related calls
- 11 Fire Alarm activations (including trouble signals)
- 5 Station Coverages
- 16 Miscellaneous

Of these calls, 13 were mutual aid to other communities, and we received mutual aid assistance 9 times.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

To aid your Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department and State Forest Ranger, contact your local Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required before doing ANY outside burning. Violations of RSA 227-L:17, the fire permit law and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

There are ten Forest Rangers who work for the New Hampshire Division of Forests and Lands, Forest Protection Bureau. State Forest Rangers are available to assist communities with forest fire suppression, prevention and training programs as well as the enforcement of forest fire and timber harvest laws. If you have any questions regarding forest fire or timber harvest laws, please call our Office at 271-2217.

There are 2400 Forest Fire Wardens and Deputy Forest Fire Wardens throughout the State. Each Town has a Forest Fire Warden and several Deputy Wardens who assist the Forest Rangers with forest fire suppression, prevention, and law enforcement. Early in 1998 we experienced an ice storm, which caused severe damage to forests of New Hampshire. This damage created a greater potential fire hazard as well as safety hazards to many areas of the State. Your local fire warden and Forest Rangers need your assistance in preventing wildfires in these hard hit areas and throughout the State. If you need assistance or information dealing with ice damaged woodlands, please call 1-800-444-8978.

The State of New Hampshire operates 15 fire towers, 2 mobile patrols and 3 contract aircraft patrols. This early detection and reports from citizens aid in the quick response from local fire departments. This is a critical factor in controlling the size of wild land fires and keeping the loss of property and suppression costs as low as possible.

ANNUAL SUMMARY OF MADBURY WATER BOARD ACTIVITIES 1998

The analysis of Madbury water rights on the Bellamy River was very fruitful. The Water Board received a draft report at the end of 1997. This report was commented upon and finalized over the past year. This study assisted the Town in deciding to reinforce their stake in the water from the Bellamy River.

The Board oversaw the sampling and analysis of well water samples for volatile organic chemicals (VOC's). 38 wells were sampled and 27% had detections of the VOC's. Since no VOC's were anticipated prior to the Study, these results were surprising. The Board submitted a proposal to NH DES requesting funds for a follow-up study intended to look for causes for the contamination. This proposal is still pending.

Other matters upon which the Board deliberated and commented included: gravel pits, land application of sludge, ground water quality at Madbury Metals, and effects of subdivisions when they were proposed.

MADBURY HISTORICAL SOCIETY ANNUAL REPORT OCTOBER 1997 - OCTOBER 1998

The Madbury Historical Society continues to offer individuals from the Town and surrounding areas with a variety of opportunities to become acquainted with events from the past that have helped shape this region and its people.

Foremost among our activities are the meetings held in October, November, January and April. This past year began with Ed Leslie presenting a very colorful program on his life as a milk delivery man. He brought to mind, in a very humorous fashion, many of his experiences delivering milk door to door. This home delivery, once taken for granted, is virtually unknown to the present generation.

Another meeting dealt with early forms of Christmas decoration. Most were surprised to learn how much our decorating habits have changed over the years. Others found it a little disconcerting to find that many of the "early decorations" shown were once remembered as a child.

Ones of the most fun programs during the past year was one in which members brought in samples of various things they collected and were given the opportunity to make a few comments on the why, where and how of the collection. A surprisingly wide variety of things are collected by people for some very interesting reasons.

There are still a number of families in Madbury whose roots go way back in Town history. Hearing about some of these families provides many fascinating tales and contributes to a better appreciation of our current surroundings. Such was the topic of our final meeting of the year.

A variety of activities at the Madbury Day celebration as well as several mosey's capped the year.

The society continued to receive a variety of historical artifacts throughout the year for which it is very grateful.

In the coming year, we plan meetings on various topics of interest to the membership. We also plan a few mosey's and to be active participants in various Madbury Day activities. We will also have an opportunity in the months ahead to be participants in the revision of Madbury's Master Plan.

In closing, we remind our friends and neighbors that ours is an organization oriented toward enjoying and sharing reverence for the past, while at the same time being con-

cerned with both the present and our Town's future. We invite all like minded individuals to come and join us.

STRAFFORD REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION

In its 30th year, Strafford Regional Planning Commission (SRPC) worked at full strength with seventeen member communities.

Regionally, the commission worked on improvement of land development patterns. Geographic Information System (GIS) maps of the region showing large unfragmented lands, managed forest land, infrastructure patterns, and zoning served as focal points for discussion. A regional survey of natural, historical and cultural resources was submitted in a statewide project. Discussions of sprawl and its effect on the region are well underway.

The Commission served Madbury with local planning support as well as regional planning. Preparation was made for a buildout study, which when completed will show the potential for full development of the Town with present zoning and environmental constraints. The staff fielded questions regarding the subdivision and site review process and applied for N.H. Coastal Program Funds for an update of the Madbury Master Plan next year.

SRPC commissioners also served on the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) which is responsible for regional transportation planning. In their role in facilitating implementation of projects in the state transportation plan, MPO staff led discussions between Madbury and Durham of the Wagon Track Trail application submitted by Durham. The MPO is working with NH Department of Transportation to ensure that Madbury's concerns about the overpass on Route 155 and nearby Pudding Hill Road intersection are addressed early in the design process. MPO staff are also preparing for passenger rail service which will pass through Madbury.

The Town dues rate hasn't changed in the last six years. SRPC dues are still the lowest of the nine planning regions in the State by thirty percent.

DURHAM AMBULANCE CORPS Town Report 1998

In 1998 the Durham Ambulance Corps celebrated its 30th Anniversary of providing 24-hour emergency ambulance service to Durham, Lee, Madbury and the University of New Hampshire in memory of Dr. George G. McGregor. The Corps is a private, non-profit, volunteer service funded by patient billing, appropriations from the communities, and donations.

1998 was another record breaking year for the DAC with 966 responses to emergency medical calls. There were 373 calls in Durham (38.61%), 292 calls to the UNH campus (30.22%), 186 calls in Lee (19.25%), 38 calls in Madbury (3.93%) and 77 mutual aid calls to other communities (7.97%)

ACHIEVEMENTS IN 1998

Several DAC members completed Emergency Medical Technician - Intermediate (EMT-I) training. This 110+ hour program trains EMTs to perform advanced patient assessments, administer intravenous fluids and medication, and insert endotracheal airways. Corps volunteers now include 4 paramedics, I paramedic student, 14 EMT-Is, and several EMT-I students.

We have continued to explore community needs and plan for the future by working with representatives of the communities we serve to determine how the Corps can best serve the communities in the future.

We have recruited many new members and are continuing to offer scholarship funding for EMT training to permanent area residents.

GOALS FOR 1999

Public education and Corps member training programs will be expanded by increasing paid personnel time dedicated to educational tasks.

We will begin the process of purchasing a new ambulance, including exploring various options, meeting with vendors, and writing specifications.

Once again, we will conduct our biennial fund drive to raise money for the McGregor Memorial and Building Funds.

Formalize the Quality Improvement process, including revision of the patient satisfaction survey that is sent to all patients, so that the survey results may be used to numerically track patient satisfaction.

We owe a great deal of thanks to the communities and citizens of Durham, Lee Madbury and UNH for their continued support and especially for their generous response to our fund raising efforts. We would also like to thank the Durham, Lee and Madbury Fire Departments the Durham-UNH communications Center and the Durham, UNH, Lee and Madbury Police Departments for their support. Most of all, we would like to thank all the DAC volunteers for their many hours of dedicated service that have enabled us to provide state of the art emergency medical care to the communities for over 30 years. We look forward to serving our communities for many more years.
