"New Boston Has Done Bravely"

On May 11, 1887 a spark from the kit head mill of Abram Wason wafted its wicked way into an old barn nearby, setting it on fire. The wind was strong and blew the flames from one building to another until, notwithstanding heroic efforts of New Boston and Goffstown firemen, a large store building, town house, two churches, chapel, parsonage, school house, six dwellings and several barns were burned; every structure being destroyed in less than two hours from the outbreak of the fiery flames.

The total loss was over \$40,000.00. This, together with the eating up of the heart of the village, naturally had a depressing effect on the townspeople. But, the work of rebuilding has gone bravely on until now the good old town rises phoenix-like from its ashes and has become one of

the handsomest villages in the state.

Several special town meetings were held, the first on May 16, 1887, and it was voted to build a new Town house on the site of the original hall at a cost of \$61,100.00. \$1,000.00 of this amount was a gift from J. R. Whipple.

The architect was George W. Stevens of Manchester. George W. Colby of Goffstown was contractor for the building. The foundation was constructed by local labor.

In 1912 an addition of about twenty feet was completed at a cost of \$6,307.52. The weather vane was donated by Mr. Charles Adams.

The new Town house was given a rousing dedication by the townspeople, old and young. A free dinner was served about noon followed by dedicatory exercises. That same evening the Constitution Engine Company had charge of the program which was followed by a dance.

The new Town Hall was completed and in use January

1888.

RECORD OF TOWN MEETING 1960

Articles in 1960 Town Warrant and Proceedings of the

Town Meeting, March 8, 1960

The annual Town Meeting was opened at 10:00 A. M. by the Moderator, Roland Sallada. It was moved to dispense with reading the Warrant at this time.

A motion was made by Robert Colburn and seconded by Henry Friedrich that the polls open to take care of Articles 1 and 2 and to close at 7:00 P. M., at which time the business meeting will take care of the remaining articles. It was so voted.

Article 1. To choose all necessary officers for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To vote on the following subject: Shall the provisions of Chapter 171A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of Beano be adopted in the town?

When the business meeting opened at 7:00 P. M., a motion was made by Fred Cann, seconded by Philip Harvell, that the warrant not be read but to accept it as printed in the Town Report Book. It was so

voted.

Article 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

A motion was made by Harry Smith, seconded by Robert Colburn, that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,452.72, the State to contribute \$9,684.81 for Town Road Aid. It was so voted in the affirmative.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00, this year and each year until 1963, this money to be placed in the Trust Fund and be used to finance the Bi-Centennial in 1963, or act in relation thereto.

A motion was made by Laurier Michaud, seconded by Charles French, that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to be placed in the Trust Fund and be used to finance the Bi-Centennial in 1963. It was so voted in the affirmative.

A motion was made by Charles French, seconded by Howard Prince, that a committee of five be appointed by the Selectmen and Planning Board to study the question of the Bi-Centennial and report at the next Town Meeting. The motion carried.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be put in the Capital Reserve Fund toward the purchase of a new fire truck in the near future, or act in relation thereto.

A motion was made by John Colburn, seconded by Paul Barss, that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be put in the Capital Reserve Fund toward the purchase of a new fire truck in the near future. It was so voted in the affirmative.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be put in the Capital Reserve Fund toward the purchase of new road equipment in the near future, or act in relation thereto.

After a discussion on the future needs for new road equipment, Reginald Hayes made the motion, seconded by Henry Friedrich, that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to be put in the Capital Reserve Fund toward the purchase of new road equipment in the near future. It was so voted in the affirmative.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 to put a new roof on the Town Shed located on Molly Stark Lane, or act in relation thereto.

A motion was made by Donald Byam, seconded by Paul Barss, that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 to put a new roof on the Town Shed located on Molly Stark Lane. It was so voted in the affirmative.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to purchase new chairs for the Town Hall, or act in relation thereto.

A motion was made by Robert Colburn, seconded by James MacPhail, that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to purchase new chairs for the Town Hall. It was so voted in the affirmative.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 to resurface tarred roads in town, or act in relation thereto.

Henry Friedrich moved, seconded by Joseph Holland, that the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 to resurface tarred roads in town. It was so voted in the affirmative.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to replace old bridges permanently, or act in relation thereto.

Robert Colburn made a motion, seconded by Laurier Michaud, that the Town raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 to replace old bridges permanently. This was amended by Robert Colburn, seconded by Harry Smith, to be \$2,000.00. The amendment carried, as did the motion.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to cut brush on Town roads, or act in relation thereto.

A motion was made by Harold Strong, seconded by Henry Friedrich, that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to cut brush on Town roads. This was amended by Fred Cann, seconded by Reginald Hayes, to read "destroy" instead of "cut". The amendment carried and it was so voted in the affirmative to raise and appropriate \$500.00 to destroy brush on Town roads.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to close permanently Road 100, from the Francestown Town Line to George Daniels Road, or act in relation thereto.

A motion was made by Elliott Hersey, seconded by John Sandford, that Road 100, from Francestown Town Line to George Daniels Road, be closed permanently. It was so voted in the affirmative.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to purchase advertising space in the 1961 Guide of the Merrimack Valley Region, or act in relation thereto.

A motion was made by Charles French, seconded by Milton Elliott, that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to purchase advertising space in the 1961 Guide of the Merrimack Valley Region. It was so voted in the affirmative.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 to spray the trees around the Town Common and to cut any already diseased trees that have been condemned, or act in relation thereto.

A motion was made by Henry Friedrich, seconded by Robert Colburn, that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 to spray trees around the Town Common and to cut any already diseased trees that have been condemned. An amendment was made by Fred Cann, seconded by Charles French, that, in the judgment of the Selectmen, the trees be replaced with other trees. The motion and amendment were so voted in the affirmative.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell or administer property of the Town acquired by tax deed or gift.

A motion was made by Donald Byam, seconded by Laurier Michaud, to authorize the Selectmen to sell or administer property of the Town acquired by tax deed or gift. It was so voted in the affirmative.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money to meet the necessary expenses of the Town.

It was moved by Charles French, seconded by Laurier Michaud, that the Town authorize the Selectmen to hire money to meet the necessary expenses of the town. It was so voted in the affirmative.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to deliver inventory blanks at the time inventory is taken.

It was moved by Charles French, seconded by Laurier Michaud, that the Town authorize the Selectmen to deliver inventory blanks at the time inventory is taken. It was so voted in the affirmative.

Article 19. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Reginald Hayes made a motion, seconded by Philip Harvell, to reactivate the Road Machine Committee and make a new study, work with the Selectmen, and submit recommendations at the next Town Meeting. It was so voted in the affirmative.

When Henry Friedrich presented the gold-headed cane to Mrs. Lilla Cochrane, she gave him, for the Town, a set of bound Town Reports, 1864-1930. He made the motion to send a note of thanks to Mrs. Cochrane. It was so voted in the affirmative and a rising vote of thanks was also given at that time.

A rising vote of thanks was given to Mr. Gunnar Isacson for the fine work on the Town Report.

A rising vote of thanks was given to James Quinn for his excellent photography for the front cover of the 1960 Town Report.

Fred Cann moved that this portion of the meeting end and, after the ballots are counted, the meeting stands adjourned. The motion carried.

The meeting adjourned 1:15 A. M., March 15, 1960.

Forestry Project Report

In accordance with an agreement with the Selectmen, and the Forestry Committee, of the Town of New Boston, the Piscataquog Chapter of F.F.A. herewith submits a report of accomplishment for the year 1960:

A two-acre area along the Old Coach Road was completely weeded out to provide more space for the young pine trees. Approximately four cords of cord wood were sold from this area. Additional thinning was done on the east side of the road running through the woodlot, yielding seven cords of wood. All wood was sold for \$18.00 per cord delivered.

300 Red Pine seedlings were planted in the open field. Some of these were replacements. The field was enlarged this year by the removal of many undesirable species. It will provide space for more planting

in 1961.

We are now in the process of placing stakes by each seedling that has been planted. This will help us to locate them when releasing becomes necessary. A four-acre area in the woodlot was pruned this year. We did not attempt to prune all trees, but only those which had been selected for crop trees.

Our work has been under supervision of Robert Breck, Hillsboro County Forester. We will soon receive some reimbursement from the Agricultural Conservation Program for improvement work and have

signed for more improvements next year.

Twenty hours of class time were spent in the woodlot, which included, instruction in the use of tools, pruning, cutting and felling trees, and techniques of marking trees. 67 free hours of labor in out-of-school time were used as each member is required to work five free hours each year, and \$71.00 was paid out for labor and machine hire.

By using good forestry practices and making many mistakes, the boys who worked in the woodlot have learned much. We hope to

continue the forestry work with as much success as in the past.

The F.F.A. members are grateful to the citizens of New Boston for their interest and help in this project and cordially invite them to visit the woodlot. The project is open for inspection at any time.

RECORD OF SCHOOL MEETING, MARCH 26, 1960

School District of New Boston, New Hampshire

The meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Roland Sallada, at 7:30 P.M., March 26, 1960.

A motion was made by Mrs. Rheba Locke, seconded by Mr. Philip Harvell, to dispense with the reading of the warrant and take up voting under Articles 1, 2, 3, 4 and 7. It was so voted and the polls were opened for ballot voting.

It was moved by Mrs. Rheba Locke, seconded by Mr. Philip Harvell, to pass over Article 5 which was to determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of

any other officers or agent of the district. It was so voted.

Article 6. A motion was made by Mrs. Rheba Locke, seconded by Mr. James Dane, to hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto. It was so voted.

Mrs. Rheba Locke, chairman of the School Board, presented the following: District Superintendent, Charles H. Minnich; Assistant Teacher, Spiro A. Anastos; Principal of the High School, Edward H. Currier, and Study Committee: Fred L. Moss, chairman; Leon Daniels, Milton Elliott, Yvonne Gomes, Natalie Allan, Linda Hersey and Polly Harvell and the School Board: James Dane and Philip Harvell.

Mrs. Polly Harvell gave a report of the Study Committee.

Mr. Fred Moss gave a report on tuition. He spoke of towns or cities where we could send the children and the cost of tuition and facilities they had to offer.

Mrs. Rheba Locke made the motion, seconded by Mr. James Dane,

that the reports be accepted as read. It was so moved.

Mrs. Rheba Locke made the motion, seconded by Mr. James Dane, to take up Article 10 at this time. It was so voted.

Article 10. The following motion was made by Mr. James Dane,

seconded by Mr. Fred Cann:

Be it resolved that the School District of New Boston hereby approves of the action of its School Board in petitioning the Superior Court for the discontinuance of the New Boston High School effective June 30, 1961 and

Furthermore: that the School Board is hereby authorized in accordance with RSA Ch. 194, Section 27, to pay the tuition of the high school students to an approved public high school at such time as the New Boston High School is discontinued and

Furthermore: that the School Board is hereby authorized to pay for the transportation of high school students to the Milford, N. H. High

School upon such discontinuance.

The following members of the Study Committee gave reports: Mr. Fred Moss on Finances, Mrs. Linda Hersey on Curricula and Mr. Leon Daniels on Transportation.

There was much discussion and debating.

Mr. Fred Cann moved the question, seconded by a number of people. The motion carried.

The Moderator announced the voting would be by ballot vote. There were 208 ballots, necessary to carry 105, 89 "Yeas" and 119 "Nos".

The motion did not carry.

Article 8. A motion was made by Mr. Philip Harvell, seconded by Mr. James Dane, that the District raise and appropriate the total sum of \$106,911.28 for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

Mr. Fred Cann moved, seconded by Mr. Donald Byam, to amend the budget by \$7,500.00, making a total figure for the school budget

\$99,411.28. The amendment did not carry.

Mr. Charles Gould moved, seconded by Mr. Fred Moss, to amend the budget by \$2,650.00, the total figure for the school budget to be \$104,261.28. The amendment carried.

Article 8 amended to read \$104,261.28 was so voted.

Article 9. A motion was made by Mr. Donald Byam, seconded by Mr. Philip Harvell, to authorize the School Board at its discretion to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the district, any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the State of New Hampshire and/or United States, providing it does not obligate the Town. The motion carried.

Article 11. The article was moved as printed in the School Warrant by Mr. Leon Daniels. The Moderator would not accept the motion as printed because of a ruling from the School District Attorney, which he read. The following resolution proposed by Mr. Fred Moss, seconded

by Mr. Howard Gagnon, was accepted:

I move the following resolution: That this meeting recommend that the School Board adopt and follow the rules and regulations set by

the New Hampshire Interscholastic Athletic Association.

Article 12. A motion was made by Mr. Fred Moss, seconded by Mr. Elliott Hersey, that the reports of the School Study Committee be printed in the Town Report and the committee be discharged. It was so moved.

It was moved by Mrs. Linda Hersey, seconded by Mr. Fred Cann, that a vote of thanks be given Mrs. Rheba Locke for her excellent work on the School Study Committee. It was so done.

Mrs. Rheba Locke thanked the Study Committee for their fine work. Mr. Fred Cann made a motion, seconded by many to adjourn. It was so voted. The meeting was adjourned at 11:40 P.M.

To see if the New Boston School District will vote to discontinue New Boston High School as provided in RSA Ch. 194:35 and to have the School Board petition the Superior Court to that effect, and to have the School District pay the tuition of all high school pupils to any approved public high school as provided in RSA Ch. 194:27.

- 10. To see if the New Boston School District will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding \$8,000.00 to provide transportation to one approved high school as determined by the School Board.
- 11. To see if the district will vote to authorize the School Board at its discretion to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the district, any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the State of New Hampshire and/or United States, providing it does not obligate the town.

STATE LAW RELATIVE TO SCHOOL FINANCIAL AID

Revised Statutes Annotated

194:23-d-State Financial Aid. A high school or a comprehensive high school must be approved by the state board of education in order to qualify the district or cooperative school district maintaining such school to receive any form of financial state aid to education for high schools or pupils in attendance thereat which are now or which may hereafter be provided by the general court of this state. A school district or a cooperative school district maintaining an approved high school shall also, in order to qualify for such state financial aid, appropriate sufficient funds to meet the cost of tuition for such high school pupils as reside in its school district as desire to attend an approved comprehensive high school due to the fact such approved comprehensive high school offers courses better suited to the needs and capabilities of said pupils. Any person having the custody of a high school student desiring to attend an approved comprehensive high school may apply to the state board of education for relief if such person is dissatisfied with the action of the school board and the state board after notice to the school board may order such pupil to attend an approved comprehensive high school and the school district of residence of such pupil shall be liable for the cost of tuition.

SCHOOL BOARD REPORT

To the Citizens of New Boston:

Your School Board is making this report to give you a brief summary of the school system in New Boston.

ELEMENTARY

The elementary school has made real progress under the guidance and supervision of the Superintendent, Mr. Minnich; Helping Teacher, Mr. Anastos; and Principal, Mr. James Currier. Among the improvements we have been able to accomplish in the elementary buildings are:

1. Very attractive drapes for two classrooms, teachers' room and the office. These we found more desirable than venetian blinds from

the aspect of economy both in installation and maintenance.

2. The outside grounds have been very much improved with tarred surfaces on the driveways and a good distance all around the new

building.

3. The play area has been greatly extended by cooperating with the Town for sand and gravel for highway construction being used from the sand pit. This project, under the able direction of Mr. Tower, is to be completed with the removal of necessary materials next spring when the slopes will be left in an attractive and safe condition.

4. Shrubs and bulbs have been planted at each end of the new

building to add color both in summer and winter.

5. In September, 1960, Mrs. Elliott Hersey, Mrs. Philip Harvell, and Mrs. John Silva incorporated a Kindergarten with Mrs. Charles Woolley as teacher. Inasmuch as Unit No. 2 was not being used this year, the Board allowed this group to use this building, with all expenses paid by interested parents of the Kindergarten. Our praise goes to this much needed and successful venture.

Your School Board feels that the "split-grade" situation is the only "weak link" in an otherwise top-flight elementary school. Results have shown this condition to be detrimental not only to the actual "split-grade" pupils, but also to the youngsters in the other two grades. Therefore, in order to provide single grades, and a better education for our children, the School Board is recommending the hiring of an additional teacher for the elementary school.

HIGH SCHOOL

Your School Board, along with the Superintendent, Helping Teacher and High School Principal have strived very hard to provide the best possible educational program in the high school building, which this year houses grades 7-12. However, there are limitations as to the range of educational opportunities we are able to offer in a very small high school, due to the number of students enrolled and the high operating costs per pupil. We are grateful to our staff of teachers and administration for all they are trying to accomplish under the given circumstances.

New Boston, like other small New Hampshire communities, is faced with the decision of continuing as in the past, with ever-increasing budgets and taxes each year, or closing its high school and sending its students out on tuition to approved comprehensive high schools. The Board is of the opinion that every high school student in New Boston should be given an equal opportunity with those attending larger comprehensive high schools in New Hampshire. These broader opportunities would include vocational training, business, fine arts, music, athletics, physical training, and college preparatory courses — to mention a few. Qualified, experienced teachers are attracted to these areas with modern, efficient school plants and higher pay scales, rather than to smaller high schools with limited facilities and resources.

Therefore, your School Board unanimously recommends sending high school students on tuition to comprehensive high schools, because of the all-important reason of giving each student an equal opportunity for as good an education as other New Hampshire high school students, and secondly, we feel the school district will save money by so doing. The need for better education throughout the country is greater now than perhaps any other time in our history. The communities which meet their obligations in this regard are the ones who are then in a position to attract the more healthy economic as well as population growth.

OTHER

Upon the resignation of Louis Champney as janitor, the Board was very fortunate to hire Howard Woodbury. He has taken up all duties with an interest that is most gratifying.

Many repairs are needed both inside and outside the school buildings. Most needed which we hope to be able to make in the near future are painting classrooms, painting the outside of the Units, and an additional drinking fountain in the new building. There is the brook to be piped and surrounding landscaping to be done.

We, the New Boston School Board, would like to take this opportunity to thank the citizens of New Boston, Superintendent Charles Minnich, Helping Teacher Spiro Anastos, and our principals and teachers for the many hours and wonderful spirit of cooperation they have given us, for the education of our students.

SCHOOL STUDY COMMITTEE REPORT

Three years ago last February, a committee was formed at a P. T. A. meeting to study our school problems. We found a future facing us with many problems of housing, and a need for a better curriculum at the secondary level, with ever-increasing tax problems facing us in order to keep our schools operating. Two years ago that committee was made official plus the addition of school board members and a few others. We were to study consolidation, tuition, and staying at home. A consultant was recommended and voted for at the last year's district meeting. At a special meeting with an overwhelming majority you voted the consultant's recommendation for consolidation. His next recommendation was tuition.

Tonight you can vote for tuition knowing a better curriculum will be offered to the students or staying here with our minimum standard offerings, high budget and the possibility of a few students wishing for a subject we do not offer, and their parents may apply for tuition to another school under the new house bill, regarding approved comprehensive high school, and that tuition must be paid by our taxes.

In view of these facts, the majority of the study committee recommends

tuition.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of New Boston:

Public education is considered by many as the most important single function of government.

All considerations have been always with the welfare of our children first in mind. The School Board has and does subscribe to equal opportunities for all of our children.

ENROLLMENT

New Boston, like many other communities, is faced with the challenge of providing adequate accommodations for its school age children. This challenge is one of quality not quantity.

The greatest factor influencing schools and their costs, is the number

of children in the public schools of the town.

Statistical reports made at the time of the proposed formation of the Cooperative High School, and the Engelhardt report in particular, indicated that the total enrollment will rise slightly for the next few years, and will then decrease to fewer pupils than are enrolled now in the local schools.

Recent changes in the economy of the region and particularly the

Tracking Station might alter these predictions considerably.

However, at present, it is quite certain that the town of New Boston is not faced with new school construction, but that the emphasis must be placed upon the best manner of educating our high school pupils and the elimination of double grades in the elementary school.

FACULTY

Teachers comprise one of the two most essential ingredients of any school system. A school's strength or weakness is dependent upon the caliber of teachers it employs. Most communities strive to keep their good teachers by providing a better educational environment for their pupils, a community appreciation and desire for good education, higher teacher salaries, etc.

Some teacher turnover each year is to be expected, but beyond a certain point it becomes a large factor in limiting the efficiency of a school system. During the past five years, there have been about

thirty-four staff changes.

Your School Board and Superintendent are definitely more interested and concerned as to the reasons for this turnover rather than the mere numbers. As accurately as may be determined, the principal reasons for this local teacher turnover were low salaries, split or divided grades, insufficient and inadequate instructional tools and a lack of appreciation of education by some parents.

RECENT ACHIEVEMENTS

Definite progress has been made during the past year. Very little could have been accomplished without the excellent cooperation of our faculty, many understanding parents, and a School Board sympathetic to the needs of the school, yet aware of the financial status of the town.

This is the report of the third year of the school under the present Superintendent. Due to your appropriations for the past three years we

have been able to achieve some success in the following:

The deficiency appropriation, of some years duration, was finally cleared up during the past fiscal school year.

Improvement of teacher salaries.

Systemized purchases of reference and supplemental books.

Establishment of a standardized, objective type testing program; consisting of an intelligence test given in grades one, three, five, and seven every year, and an achievement test given annually in grades three through eight.

The acquisition of a Helping Teacher upon a Supervisory Union basis.

A gradual development of our supply of maps and globes.

A gradual introduction of regularly scheduled intra-mural athletic contests.

Participation in the National Defense Education Act enabling us to have more instructional aids in the teaching of Mathematics and Science.

Drapes, landscaping, tarring of roads, etc. as mentioned in the

School Board Report.

The utilization of well-informed citizens as aids to our instructional program discussing their particular professional or specality areas, their

travels or special hobbies with our students.

Teacher committees have been formed and utilized in order to study and evaluate books and to make specific recommendations to the Superintendent for their purchases. The present school curriculum has been studied and some very definite recommendations and evaluations have been made. This year the teachers of arithmetic have met several times a month and are preparing study guides, upon a Supervisory School Union basis, grade by grade.

The curriculum has been strengthened through the emphasis of work adapted to the individual child, in light of his strengths and

weaknesses - particularly in grades seven and eight this year.

OUR NEEDS

There are two main problems which have seriously affected our school's efficiency for a number of years. One is the high school and the other is the split grades in the elementary school. As both situations and the proposed solutions are mentioned in the School Board's Report, it will not be repeated here.

The instruction in and appreciation of music and art should be en-

couraged to the fullest.

Our music supervisor works with each class once a week and the majority of time is spent in vocal music. We offer no formal or established art program, but expect each individual teacher to do the best she or he can in this subject.

To correct these situations, we would have to budget both time and money, probably upon the Supervisory Union basis. The school union has seriously considered these proposals for the past year and it is hoped that next year both situations may be corrected by the addition of full time music and art supervisors.

One of the characteristics of an outstanding school is the attention given to adapting the level and caliber of teaching to the individual child, in order to make that teaching more meaningful and effective for each pupil. We have made a start in this direction and it is hoped we might add more curriculum enrichment for the majority and definite acceleration for the gifted. Our school union is now considering the feasibility of establishing a special class for the mentally retarded. This addition will provide for these children and satisfy their educational and personal needs and will also provide us with the opportunity of allowing us to better realize our teaching and curriculum objectives in their former classrooms.

FOR YOUR INFORMATION

1. In 1958-59, the average expenditure per pupil in New Hampshire for current expense purposes in the public high schools having an enrollment of less than 100 was \$115 higher than the corresponding average for high schools which had an enrollment of more than 300 pupils.

2. Twenty per cent of the instructional staff personnel employed by New Hampshire school districts and public academies in 1959-60 were not employed by the same school district or academy in 1958-59. Nine per cent of all instructional staff personnel employed for the school year 1959-60 had had no previous teaching experience.

I wish to again take this opportunity to express my sincere appreciation to the New Boston School Board, for their continued guidance, kindness, and support to all school personnel and those thoughtful and cooperative citizens for their continued cooperation and support of our

public schools.
