The growth of the town over the last years has prompted the Planning Board to establish a moratorium on large subdivisions so that much needed revision of the zoning ordinance and the Capital Improvement Plan can be devised.

The Selectmen processed 71 building permits in 1987. We found the extra work less tedious because of a new building permit and fee system we developed, therefore finding no need to hire a building inspector.

As we work closely with the budgets of the different departments in town and the school district, we see the rise in property taxes as a major issue facing our taxpayers. The town office received word that the State Property Tax Appraisers will be unable to work in New Hampton until 1992. We feel it would be in the best interest of all taxpayers to have a private appraisal done in order to have a more equalized assessment.

# New Hampton Town Meeting

March 10, 1987

Moderator Protem Laurence A. Blood opened the New Hampton Town Meeting at 10:00 AM at the Town House Tuesday, March 10, 1987 on a cold but sunny day. The Moderator read the Warrant to article #3 which ended "The remainder of the warrant will be acted upon at the New Hampton Town House, Saturday, March 14, 1987 at 10:00 AM."

New Hampton had 72 absentee ballots which were opened at the discretion of the Moderator. At 2:00 PM they were opened and at 2:30 we were all done. The Moderator did a fine job of deciphering the names. All were OK'd by the ballot clerks.

Hope Clement and Patricia Torsey were on the IN List, and Dana Torsey and William Clement were on the OUT List.

The ballot clerks who counted the Ballots were Doug Salmon, Pat Torsey, Hope Clement and Barbara Chase, Team #1.

Katherine Seavey, June Smith, Ralph Ness and Gordon Huckins were on team #2.

William Clement, Dana Torsey, Brent Clement and Linda Morgan were on team #3.

The Moderator closed the meeting at 6:00 PM, and the Townspeople who worked were treated to a Supper of Lasagna, Chicken with Rice, Casserole, Chili, Spanish Rice, Macaroni and Cheese, YUM YUM, Hot Dogs, Fruit Salad, Cole Slaw, Rolls, 2 kinds of Cake and Coffee. Talk about the spice of life, we had plenty. If anyone reads this report a hundred years from now, I wonder what they are having?

Total voters in New Hampton on March 10, 1987 were 924. Republicans 408, Democrats 207, and Independent 309.

399 voted at this election which was about 43%.

March 14, 1987

Moderator Protem Laurence Blood opened the New Hampton Town Meeting at 10:00 AM. The Cub Scouts of Troop #518 color guard trooped the colors. We saluted the Flag then sang two stanzas of America the Beautiful led by Moderator Laurence Blood. The members of the Color guard were Willie Harris, Keith Lockwood and Chris Layford.

Reverend Mary Potter gave the invocation.

Moderator Protem Laurence Blood read Article #4 the continuing of March 10th Town Meeting:

Article #4: To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. Horace Boynton moved the question and Gordon Huckins seconded it. It was moved to raise \$217,050.00.

The Comparative Statement on page 31 was explained and broken down by list for clarification.

After discussion the Moderator reread motion and it was accepted by an aye vote.

The Moderator read Article #5:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,300.00 for the support of the Fire Department.

Moved by Bill Clement and seconded by Hope Clement.

Bill explained why the article was asked.

The Moderator reread article and it was accepted by a unanimous aye vote. Article was accepted.

The Moderator read Article #6:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$81,431.00 for the support of the Police Department.

Article was moved by Merritt Salmon and seconded by Bill Clement.

Chief Salmon spoke on bringing the Town Standards up to equal of other Towns.

The Moderator reread article and it was a unanimous aye vote. Article #6 was accepted.

The Moderator read Article #7:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$185,306.72 for the support of the Highway department; this figure includes \$47,306.72 Highway Block Grant Aid.

Joe Powers Jr. moved the question and Bill Ober seconded it.

Joe explained the Highway department Statement.

Chester Butcher brought up the high cost of Salt Pollution and asked could less salt be used.

Declined and equalized by Joe Powers.

June Smith spoke on Bushes cut back etc.

Joe said not enough man power; changes in help caused problems.

Mr. Zaikowski brought up salaries by hour not weekly.

Bernard Smith spoke on cleaning back to stone walls, a standard procedure for many years.

Kenneth Torsey wanted to know the hours Road Agent worked and was told around 45 hours a week, Per Gordon Huckins Selectman.

Bernard Smith asked for a motion to amend article on class V roads. Mrs. Pat Provencher seconded it but motion was killed.

Mrs. Noakes and Willis Ober asked questions which were answered by Joe Powers.

Moderator reread article and an unanimous aye vote was given. Article #7 was accepted.

Moderator read Article #8:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$40,000.00 for the equipment replacement schedule: \$20,000.00 to purchase a new 1 ton Highway dump truck, and \$20,000.00 to be placed in Capital Reserve for Highway Equipment.

Joe Powers moved question and Horace Boynton seconded it.

Joe explained Equipment replacement schedule and answered questions by Kenneth Torsey.

Chester Butcher made a motion to have all bids sealed.

Per: To purchase a new 1 ton dump truck by sealed bid with specifications to be determined by Board of Selectmen.

Seconded by Wallace Orvis. Moderator read amendment and it was not accepted by a nay vote.

Joe Powers read an amendment which read: after to purchase a new 1 ton Dump Truck to insert "Equipment to include Dump Body, Plow and Salt Spreader." Moderator read amendment and it was accepted with a unanimous aye vote (accepted).

Moderator reread article as amended and a unanimous aye vote was accepted.

At Noon the Moderator recessed the meeting till 1:00 PM.

At 1:00 PM the Moderator opened the recessed meeting and read Article #9:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$35,000.00 for oiling and shimming of Town Roads.

Joe Powers made the motion and Horace Boynton seconded it.

Joe Powers explained article. Horace Boynton told us that the roads all need repair and that the Town is getting behind schedule.

June Smith wanted to know how much to do. Answer approx. 4 miles.

After answering other questions the Moderator reread article and it was accepted with an aye vote.

Moderator read Article #10:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for the repair of Main St.; the State to contribute \$10,000.00 for a total of \$15,000.00.

Joe Powers made motion and Gordon Huckins seconded it.

Joe explained about drains on Main St. and answered questions by Kenneth Torsey and Dana Torsey.

The Moderator reread article and it was accepted with an aye vote.

The Moderator read Article #11:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$23,333.00 to replace the Blake Hill Bridge to be paid over a two year period, \$12,000.00 to be paid the first year and \$11,000.00 to be paid the second year; the State to contribute \$46,667.00 for a total of \$70,000.00.

Joe Powers moved question and Gordon Huckins seconded it.

Joe explained article and answered questions by Bernard Smith and Dana Torsey. Dr. Dow asked if this was the correct amount and it was answered by Horace Boynton, Selectman, yes.

The Moderator reread article and it was accepted by an aye vote.

The Moderator read Article #12:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000.00 to improve the junction of Town House Road and Dana Hill Road. (By request)

The motion was moved by Willis Ober and seconded by Joe Powers.

Bernard Smith, Joe Powers, Pat Torsey, June Smith all made statements pertaining to it.

After discussion Moderator reread article. The vote was so close that the Moderator put article to a written ballot. Yes 21, No 26. Article was not accepted.

Moderator read Article #13:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 to improve the Shingle Camp Hill Road with a substantial and permanent base. (By petition and request)

Mr. Simpson moved question and Joe Powers seconded it.

Simpson explained the question.

Bernard Smith's question was answered by Joe Powers

After a quick answer and question period the Moderator reread article and it passed with an aye vote.

Moderator read Article #14:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$40,000.00 and to place same in a Landfill Closure Capital Reserve Fund, and authorize the withdrawal of \$5,000.00 plus interest from the Revenue Sharing Fund to be applied to this amount.

Moved by Linda Morgan and seconded by Horace Boynton.

Linda explained motion.

After questions by Bernard Smith the Moderator reread article and it was accepted with a unanimous aye vote.

Article #15 read by Moderator:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$14,487.00 for the support of Regional Associations; Community Action Program \$3,021.00; Bristol Community Center \$1,573.00; Lakes Region Planning Commission \$1,307.00; Newfound Area Nursing Association \$5,368.00; Newfound Ambulance Service \$3,218.00.

Motion made by Mrs. Torsey seconded by Horace Boynton.

Pat Torsey explained article and the Moderator reread it and it was passed and accepted by an unanimous aye vote.

The Moderator read Article #16:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 to be placed in the Property Reappraisal Capital Reserve Fund for the revaluation of the Town by the Appraisal Division of the Department of Revenue Administration.

Article moved by Horace Boynton and seconded by Gordon Huckins.

Boynton explained article and the Moderator reread article and it was accepted with a unanimous aye vote.

The Moderator read Article #17:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the support of the hospitals: Mary Hitchcock Memorial, Franklin Regional Hospital, Lakes Region General Hospital, Sceva Speare Memorial Hospital.

Moved by Gordon Huckins seconded by Horace Boynton.

No questions so Moderator reread article and it was accepted with a unanimous aye vote.

Moderator read Article #18:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the support of the New Hampton Community Kindergarten.

Moved by Hope Clement and seconded by June Smith.

No questions, the moderator reread article and it was accepted with a unanimous aye vote.

The Moderator read Article #19:

To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Provisions of the Municipal Budget Law (Petition).

Bernard Lowell moved the question seconded by Hope Clement.

June Smith wanted an opinion of the Selectmen. No answers at this time. After discussion Moderator reread article and it was not accepted by a large nay vote.

The Moderator read Article #20:

To see if the Town will vote to form a budget committee of six (6) elected members-at-large, pursuant to RSA 32:2 and to elect said members by non-partisan ballot, pursuant to RSA 32:3 (By Petition).

Bill Clement moved article and Hope Clement seconded it.

No questions so Moderator reread article and it was not accepted by a nay vote.

Moderator read Article #21:

To see if the Town will vote to accept the recommendation of the Pemi-Baker Regional Refuse Disposal Planning Committee and to raise \$2,244.00 for the study of same.

Linda Morgan moved article and seconded by Horace Boynton.

Linda explained article.

She tried to explain and answer Bill Ober's question but after discussion Moderator reread article and it was accepted by an aye vote.

Moderator read Article #22:

Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:1-C which authorizes any Town or city to elect not to access, levy and collect a resident tax?

Motion to change access to assess which was accepted by motion.

Boynton moved question and seconded by Linda Morgan.

After discussion Edwin Huckins read Law and gave a rough idea of how much we made. The Moderator reread the article and it was accepted with an aye vote.

Moderator read Article #23:

To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Town's Representative to the General Court to take all necessary measures to insure that no low level radioactive waste from the Seabrook nuclear plant shall be stored or disposed of within this Town of New Hampton unless and until the proposed site of the proposed storage of disposal has been approved by the voters of the Town at the annual Town Meeting by written ballot. (By Petition)

Moved by Linda Morgan and seconded by Gordon Huckins.

No discussion and the Moderator reread article and it was accepted by an unanimous aye vote.

Moderator read Article #24:

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Planning Board to prepare a Capital Improvement Program under RSA 674:7.

Linda Morgan moved motion and Gordon Huckins seconded it.

Linda explained article.

After discussion with Bill Clement, Horace Boynton, the Moderator reread article and it was accepted with an aye vote.

The Moderator read Article #25:

To see if the Town will vote to create a Parks and Recreation Department in accordance with RSA 35B:4-7.



Moved by Hope Clement and seconded by Barbara Chase.

It's a State Law, by the Selectmen.

Moderator reread article and it was accepted with an aye vote.

Moderator read Article #26:

To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept on behalf of the Town any Federal or State Funds which may be made available during 1987. Further to see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to make application for said funds and then expend the same for the purpose designated with applicable Federal and State regulations.

Moved by Gordon Huckins, seconded by Horace Boynton.

No discussion, Moderator reread article and it was accepted with an aye vote.

Moderator read Article #27:

To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the lower portion of the "Mill Road" so-called, which used to lie across the Church lawn down to the Fish Hatchery Brook. (By request)

Moved by Charlene Joyce Willingham seconded by Mr. Willingham.

Charlene explained the reason; no questions; the Moderator reread article and it was accepted with an aye vote.

The Moderator read Article #28:

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes.

Moved by Horace Boynton and seconded by Linda Morgan.

Horace explained article; no discussion.

Moderator reread article and it was accepted with an aye vote.

Moderator read Article #29:

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Tax Collector to accept prepayment of taxes.

Moved by Gordon Huckins, seconded by Horace Boynton.

No discussion. Moderator reread article and it was accepted with an aye vote.

The Moderator read Article #30:

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of property acquired by Tax Collectors deeds.

Moved by Gordon Huckins, seconded by Linda Morgan.

Gordon explained article. No discussion.

Moderator reread article and it was accepted by an aye vote.

Moderator read Article #31:

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to trade or sell any unusable equipment or materials.

Moved by Gordon Huckins, seconded by Horace Boynton.

No discussion. Moderator reread article and it was accepted with an aye vote.

The Moderator read Article #32:

To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Willis Ober would hope the Town will put signs on the corner of Dana Hill Road and Town House Road for safety sake.

Hope Clement wanted a sign of appreciation from the Townspeople for the efficient way the meeting was handled. (Standing ovation.)

After words by Kenneth Torsey and Pat Torsey, Bill Clement moved to adjourn, seconded by Dorothy Noakes. An aye vote was accepted. Meeting closed at 3:00 PM.

# Special Town Meeting

November 5, 1987

The New Hampton Special Town Meeting was held November 5, 1987 at the New Hampton Town House at 7:30 PM. It was well attended for a Special meeting sponsored by the Planning Board.

Our Moderator T.H. Moore opened the meeting and read the article to be voted upon.

The Moderator introduced Chester Butcher as Chairman of the Committee who explained why and gave concise and honest reasons for this meeting.

He told the townspeople that the Committee was getting more and more sub-divisions applications on larger and larger tracts of land.

The Planning Board under increasing pressures did not have the time to review all these applications and accomplish planning for the Town's benefit.

At the 1987 Town Meeting the Town authorized the Planning Board to develop a capital improvement plan.

Because of the extra pressure from developers, the Board had little opportunity to make progress on that capital improvement plan. It is still not completed.

Because of the relative lack of regulations in the Town, developers are pressuring the regulations and the relative inexperienced members to make decisions. Especially not to the best interest of the Town. This is taking advantage of the Town's lack of regulations and inexperience of Committee members.

Also the Board has a very limited budget.

The Town has at present no site plan review regulations. So far the beneficial interest of the Town Planning Board must work on the development and adoption of those regulations.

The Town has no building code so it is important for the safety and well being of the Town's residents that the Planning Board work on the building code.

There are at present a large number of building lots already for sale in the Town, so there is no shortage of supply.

To protect the health, safety and welfare of the citizens of New Hampton we need a limited period of time to complete the Capital Improvement Plan, which will guide the Board in future decisions. This will also give the Board more experience and expertise for these very important decisions.

All of these circumstances require prompt attention by the Town to meet these challenges and goals.

The Condos built by Landers Restaurant in Hanover have a very pronounced sewage atmosphere.

From 7:30 PM till 9:30 the Moderator let anyone talk on the subject. Over 25 people talked and explained and questioned, even one developer tried to scare with his explanation.

After this long question and answer period Bob Fischer moved question and Kenneth Torsey seconded it with a unanimous aye vote.

The Moderator reread the article and read it as follows:

To see if the Town will vote to enact the interim Growth Management Ordinance as proposed by the New Hampton Planning Board.

135 voted which made 68 the mean. There were 93 yes votes and 40 no votes. The subject was accepted.

The Meeting was closed at 9:45 PM.

# 1988 Town Warrant

## The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of New Hampton, New Hampshire in the County of Belknap, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the New Hampton Town House on Tuesday, the 8th day of March next at ten of the clock in the forenoon to cast your ballots for Town Officers and for questions required by law to be on the ballots. Polls to close not later than 6:00 P.M.

The remainder of the Warrant will be acted upon at the New Hampton Town House, Saturday, March 12, 1988 at 10:00 A.M.

1. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$125,000.00 for the purchase of a new fire truck, and to authorize the issuance of not more than \$125,000.00 of notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA chapter 33) and to authorize the Town officials to issue and negotiate such notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$17,000.00 for the support of the Fire Department.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$198,222.46 for the support of the Highway Department; this figure includes \$48,972.46 Highway Block Grant Aid.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$99,500.00 for the purchase of a new Highway Department Grader, and to authorize the issuance of not more than \$79,500.00 of notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA chapter 33) and to authorize the Town officials to issue and negotiate such notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon; furthermore, to authorize the withdrawal of \$20,000.00 from the Highway Equipment Capital Reserve Fund created for this purpose.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50,000.00 for resurfacing of Town roads.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$35,000.00 for its share of the cost for the repair of the Central Street Bridge with the provision that the Town of Bristol raises the same amount for this purpose at its annual 1988 Town meeting; and furthermore to vote to change the purpose of Article 11 of the 1987 Town warrant in the amount of \$23,333.00 plus interest and vote to apply this amount to the Central Street Bridge project.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for the repair of Main Street; the state to contribute \$10,000.00 for a total of \$15,000.00.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$40,000.00 and to place same in the Landfill Closure Capital Reserve Fund.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$95,040.00 for the support of the Police Department.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$18,200.00 for the purchase of a new 1988 Police Cruiser, fully equipped.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the purchase of a new Motorola Base Station Radio for the Police Station.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,500.00 for expansion to the existing Town Office Building.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,962.00 for the support of Regional Associations; Community Action Program \$3,021.00; Bristol Community Center \$2,166.00; Lakes Region Planning Commission \$1,369.00; Newfound Area Nursing Association \$5,368.00; Newfound Ambulance Service \$4,038.00.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 to be placed in the Property Reappraisal Capital Reserve Fund for the revaluation of the Town by the Appraisal Division of the Department of Revenue Administration.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the support of the hospitals: Mary Hitchcock Memorial Hospital, Franklin Regional Hospital, Lakes Region General Hospital, Sceva Speare Memorial Hospital.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$3,564.00 for the development costs associated with the Pemi-Baker Solid Waste District purchase of the Plymouth Incinerator/Recycling Facility and Rumney landfill site.

18. Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 80:58-86 for a real estate tax lien procedure? These statutes provide that tax sales to private individuals for nonpayment of property taxes on real estate are replaced with a real estate tax lien procedure under which only a municipality or county where the property is located or the state may acquire a tax lien against land and buildings for unpaid taxes.

19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to accept private donations of land, interest in land, or money, to be deposited into the conservation fund in accordance with RSA 36 A-5, for the purpose of contributing to the local matching portion required for NH Land Conservation Investment Program (RSA 221-A). And further to accept the state matching funds under the NHLICIP for the purpose of acquisition/easements. Said donated/state matching funds to be expended by majority vote of the Conservation Commission. (BY REQUEST)

20. To see if the Town will vote to retain the Egan property on Old Bristol Road in the Town's inventory for Forestry/Conservation/Recreation purposes at this time. (BY REQUEST)

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,037.40 to participate in a June 11, Household Hazardous Waste Collection. (BY REQUEST)

22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the support of the New Hampton Community Kindergarten.

23. To see if the Town will vote to change the position of Town Clerk from a one year elected term to a three year elected term.

24. To see if the Town will vote to give up that section of old Route 104 that abutts Vranorse property (formerly Romano).

25. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept on behalf of the Town any Federal or State Funds which may be made available during 1988. Further to see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to make application for said funds and then expend the same for the purpose designated with applicable Federal and State regulations.

26. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

27. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Tax Collector to accept prepayment of taxes.

28. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of property acquired by Tax Collector's deeds.

29. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to trade or sell any unusable equipment or materials.

30. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

# 1987 Annual Police Report

This year was a very hard year. We have had many major crimes in Town this past year. We have not had the time to give for the proper investigation of all the incidents and also do the every day patrol of the Town. The Town of New Hampton has grown and is going to continue to grow. We have more commuter traffic than we have had in the past and that is going to increase. This means that there will be even more of a demand on the services of this Department. Right now there is a small Mini Mall going in next to L'Italien's Mini Mart. Across the highway is a new business Satelite Communications and next to them is going a Furniture factory outlet store. This will bring in a lot of people and vehicles in an area that is presently busy with cross traffic. We also have at least four (4) large housing developments going in right now, and they are in different areas of Town. We also have four (4) new roads in Town. I don't know how many of you are totally aware of this but from the extreme eastern end of Town to the extreme western most part of Town it is over 20 miles one way and there is no direct route of travel. So if you have wondered why it has taken the Officer so long to get to you please think of that.

This Department is getting to the point that it will be a 24 hour Department within the next few years (2-3 years). It was my idea to suggest to the Town that it hire one Officer per year for the 3 year period so that it would be the most cost efficient. This would be the best for both my needs and also it would not put the Town in the position where it would have to hire 2 or 3 men/women in a year to be able to give the 24 hour service. To be able to give the Town 24 hour service I would need 5 full-time men/women not including myself. This allows for vacation time, sick time, and days off.

I was going back through the past years Town Reports and I came across something very interesting. Back in 1971 the national average for the suburban areas for the number of Police Officers was 2.2 per 1,000 inhabitants. However this Town has changed since then and even if we were to go by that average we should have 4.4 full-time Police Officers now. You have to also take into consideration that this Town's population just about doubles in the summer time due to the added businesses, restaurants, campgrounds and summer or vacation homes in Town, also the amount of traffic that travels over Routes 104 and 132. Not to even mention I-93. Thus with this in mind it does nothing but put even more of a demand on the services of this Department. This does go further than the Police Department, it also affects both the Fire Department and the Town Highway Department. We are all affected by the amount of growth this Town is seeing and that is still in the beginning stages that has not yet been completed. During this past summer an independent traffic survey was done in the area of Smitty's Place Restaurant. During

the one weeks time that the counter was out across Route 104 98,458 motor vehicles passed through. An attempt has been made to be highly visable on Route 104 in hopes of lowering the number of accidents on that road and I was also able to get the 40 mile per hour speed limit extended to beyond the intersection of Sinclair Hill Road and Route 104. This has helped out but the vehicles still come through that area well over the limit.

In 1987 the Police Department covered a total of 90 motor vehicle accidents. Of the 90 accidents 22 of them involved personal injury. The remaining 68 accidents were accidents that were close to or over the \$500.00 limit of property damage. We were also blessed with not one fatal accident. That's the one thing I am happy to report, but this shows an increase over last year. In 1986 we covered only 68 accidents.

In 1987 26 Burglaries were reported. 20 of them were to private residences and the other 6 were to businesses.

# **New Hampton Fire Department 1987 Report**

For 1987 we had a total of 160 calls, 78 for fire related incidents and 82 medical calls. Of the 78 calls, there were 32 fire calls, 21 mutual aid, 8 chimney, 5 dump fires and 12 service calls. From a fire loss point of view it was a good year as there were no major structure fires in town.

Considerable amount of our time has been spent in training and we now have 5 New Hampshire State Certified fire fighters. Much credit goes to these people who did this, as it represents a substantial investment of their time. Those who take this course and those who take the EMT courses are to be congratulated for their commitment to the Community.

As we have indicated in the past, the age of our vehicles is coming to a critical situation in terms of reliability to respond to emergency calls. As we have noted, the number of responses is increasing and with the new developments and potential increase in population we expect our responses to increase more. We plan to present a proposal to the voters to replace our 1961 pumper this year as the second step in upgrading the equipment.

Between July 1986 and June 1987, we experienced fewer fires than normal. The three leading causes of forest fires were again children, fires kindled without written permission of a Forest Fire Warden and debris burning. All causes are preventable, but only with **your** help.

Please help our town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. Contact your Forest Fire Warden for more information.

Enforcement of a state timber harvest regulation is the responsibility of State Forestry officials. Our state has excellent timber harvest regulations; however, your assistance is needed.

If you know of a logging operation and suspect a state timber harvest law may be violated, call your Forest Fire Warden, or Concord Forest Protection Headquarters at (603) 271-2217.

If you own forest land, you became responsible for the timber tax payment starting April 1, 1986. This is a change in the Timber Tax Law that will impact all forest landowners. Contact your Board of Selectmen for timber tax forms.

# Emergency Medical Services

The number of EMT's has dropped this year to two. We are trying to rebuild this number with a few members taking the EMT course at Plymouth. One of the problems in keeping EMT's is the time needed to recertify. Courses are at odd times and over a long period of time. The state organization is looking into this to try and improve the situation.

New Hampton continues to increase the number of medical calls by 7% per year. The increased traffic on I-93 and Rt. 104 have added a substantial number. I foresee this becoming an increasing problem especially with more trucks on the road. We have had several accidents with trucks but fortunately no entrapment or toxic spills. New Hampton residents may have to vote to expand the equipment needed to cope with such problems.

Newfound Ambulance continues to serve the town well and again a reminder that if you need to call for medical help the number is 524-1545.

# Newfound Ambulance Service

## 1987 REPORT

Newfound Ambulance Rescue experienced the busiest year yet on record, in providing service to Bristol and the surrounding Newfound Area including the Towns of Alexandria, Bridgewater, Danbury, Hebron, and New Hampton.

There were a total of 432 calls during 1987, an increase of 67 over the year earlier. This is a very significant upward change, as increases going back two prior years were only 32 and 17 respectively. For the Town of New Hampton, there were 85 calls up from 74 the year before. A breakdown of the number of calls per town is shown below.

Early in the year attendants were trained and certified in the use of our new Defibrillator (a potential life saving machine for victims of heart attacks). Placed in service early March, the Defibrillator saw two actual uses during the year, one of them resulting in a medically recognized "save". To compliment the Defibrillator, a Lifepak 5 Cardiac Monitor was placed in service early summer enabling us to visualize and record on paper tape a patient's E.C.G. enroute to the hospital.

Efforts are ongoing to improve the level of care we can offer the residents and visitors in our service area. In addition to the examples in the preceding paragraph, progress has been made in replacing and improving equipment. Most important in this regard, however, are the E.M.T. attendants that staff the ambulances, a small but dedicated group that strive to enhance their training and upgrade to advanced levels of certification. They deserve your support.

Newfound Ambulance Rescue is always on the lookout for new attendants. As the activity grows, we need additional help. If you might be interested in becoming an ambulance attendant or know someone who could be, please contact Roger Pedersen at the Bristol Town Offices for more information.

# New Hampton Highway Department Report For 1987

With the continuation of our resurfacing program we saw the completion of Old Bristol Road from the Fiske School House area to the New Hampton-Bristol Bridge. Also several areas around the village, including Shingle Camp Hill were resurfaced. I think anyone would agree this gave the village area a real face lift. Certainly anyone coming into the village for the first time over Shingle Camp Hill, would have a much different impression of our village than before it was resurfaced. I've asked for the financial support so this program can continue this year.

A 1987 Ford F-350, one ton dump truck, plow and sander, replaced the 1981 Chevy one ton. This year the grader is scheduled for replacement. Thanks to Sam's constant care and watchful eye we've kept the old grader operational at a minimum of expense. However, there are many well worn parts just looking for an excuse to cost the town a lot of money and breakdown time. Parts are no longer available for this machine.

After State inspection we had to replace the decks on three bridges in order to make them usable by school buses as well as other service and emergency vehicles. We felt this was an emergency situation.

The middle of November saw the resignation of Joel as Road Agent after many years of service to the town. Upon appointment by the Selectmen as Acting Road Agent, I've tried to carry out programs already set in motion, as well as initiate others which I felt were important to the highway department and the town.

The responsibility as road agent is a great one. However, I cannot praise the highway crew too much. They are dedicated to their work and have the public's safety and interest as their #1 concern. All three are excellent equipment operators. They know their job and do it well. The transition from one road agent to another was made easy because of these three men. Thank you, men!

This year we've added almost 2 miles of additional town road. Next year there will be several more. I urge all of you to visit these roads.

I thank all of you for your continuing support of the highway department.

# Pemi-Baker Solid Waste District Investigates An Alternative In 1987

In 1986 the Pemi-Baker Solid Waste District (PBSWD) developed a proposal to buy out the existing Plymouth Incinerator/Recycling Facility to handle the District's waste. The proposal included an upgrading of the facility by installing a new continuous feed incinerator and an expansion of the recycling activities. To establish this proposal as the best available solution to the waste disposal problem, the Pemi-Baker towns voted in March 1987 to fund a complete analysis of the buy-out proposal.

The District contracted with James Dohrman and Ted Siegler to perform this analysis. Dohrman and Siegler concluded the following:

1. Intensive recycling will have a significant impact on incinerator sizing and ash disposal needs.
2. Both a 50 and 36 TPD incinerator would fit in the existing building, however, due to the significant seasonal fluctuations and relatively small waste stream a 36-TPD unit is the most appropriate.
3. The Plymouth landfill site is limited in long-term capacity; therefore, an alternative site must be developed. Siting a new landfill in Rumney or contracting with an out-of-District landfill will be necessary.
4. Changes in state and federal regulations could have a significant impact (as much as 43% increase) on the total project costs.

Based on conclusion number four, the District contracted with Environmental Research Technologies to assess the air quality impact of an upgraded incinerator at the Beech Hill site in Plymouth. The initial air screening model results have been submitted to the State Air Resources Division for review and a meeting to more clearly define the requirement of air emission control devices has been scheduled.

The District has also established that a landfill is an essential component of their proposal and plans to identify a site in 1988. Additionally, PBSWD will continue its investigation of other out-of-District options and actively promote recycling in 1988.

# New Hampton Conservation Commission

Recent appointments to the Conservation Commission has brought new blood and many beards (Jim Eckert, Eugene Morgan and Bob Fischer). Clare Eckert was appointed last May. Grita Antoni joins Bob and Gene as alternates. We were sorry to lose Selectman Gordon Huckins from the commission; but look forward to working with him as Road Agent, as we did with Joel. We hope both enjoy their new tasks. Joining us is Jim, whose father served on the commission 15 years ago.

Richard Gallagher served the commission well for nine years and we know we can call on him from time to time. We became dependent on Richard's always being able to solve many day-to-day problems, with equipment, advice, and energies. Thanks for all the time and effort you gave us, Richard.

Cynthia Lathrop is our liaison to the Trust for New Hampshire Lands as we consider funds under the NH Land Conservation Investment Program approved by the Legislature. Call Cynthia about conservation easements or land donations/sales.

Dave Erler and Grita have inventoried over 150 acres of town wetlands. It took 2-4 hours a week, from June thru September! Each wetland is considered for plant indicator species and US Soil Conservation Service soil types. Criteria are: flood control, ecological integrity, wildlife and finfish habitat, nutrient retention and sediment trapping, visual and aesthetic quality; agricultural, forestry and education potential; water-based recreation and groundwater use potential, shoreline anchoring and dissipation of erosive forces, and noteworthiness. Dave estimates another two years to complete the task. The information is useful studying wetland applications, particularly in winter.

During the past year we've had an increase in wetland applications and are concerned with the aesthetic and environmental impact of change. A certain amount of tree cover is very desirable. Air quality is substantially improved when vegetation is present. Townspeople have commented to the commission about the few or no trees left standing when some properties change use. Vegetative buffers should be required along all town roads to preserve some of what makes NH special. We sent Frank Marinace a letter of commendation for his contribution to the appearance of Main Street.

Recycling is discussed frequently and we await direction from the Selectmen. On June 11, we may participate in an area Hazardous Waste Collection. Paint thinners, solvents, pesticides, etc. are some of the targets.

The Army Reserve Unit from Gilford is still with us. They've been be-deviled by bad weather and beaver. The unit camped overnight for weekend training drills. They enjoyed a gift of apples from Rockledge Orchard. Our thanks to Milo Pike for a gift of gravel.

Representative Steve Maviglio arranged a hearing in New Hampton hoping we could secure regulation of horsepower/speed on Pemigewasset Lake as New Hampton had voted at town meeting some years ago. Unfortunately we did not prevail before the Safety Services Division; however, Steve continues to pursue our cause.

Of particular concern this year is the news the selectmen may sell a town property which the Conservation Commission advised they retain. The Egan property on Old Bristol Road is two lots on either side of the road. The one (6 acres), we would not be adverse to their selling; however the other, 45 acres with approximately 1400' on the river, we believe the town should keep for the present. The Selectmen have said they would put conservation easements into a deed prior to selling. Our main concerns are:

1. The property has cost the town nothing. It is 45 acres the likes of which may never again be available. Anything approaching it in quality will, in the future, be prohibitively expensive.

2. The undeveloped property is useful for timber and has potential for a revenue-producing tree farm. Wildlife habitat will be protected and the property still useful for recreation purposes.

Dave has made a confirmed wildlife species list for the river corridor: river otter, mink, beaver, muskrat, deer, moose, raccoon, red and gray foxes, fisher, coyote, bobcat, long and short-tailed weasel, kingfisher, great blue heron, green-backed heron, American bittern, wood and black duck, mallard, mergansers; bank, cliff, barn and tree swallows; bass, brook and rainbow trout, and recently Atlantic salmon. Also Osprey, bald eagle, northern harrier and many shorebirds and waterfowl for migratory purposes.

We celebrate with the Pemigewasset River Council that six towns adopted the Overlay Plan at their last town meeting. Nine river towns, including New Hampton, await Congressional action on a request for a National Park Service study of the Pemi. Representing the Conservation Commission, I presented a paper at a NE Center conference, "Planning for the Changing Rural Landscape of New England," telling the story of the Council.

# 1987 Planning Board Report

The Planning Board has completed one of the busiest years with many new and tough challenges since its inception in May, 1971. We approved 19 subdivisions involving 713.5 acres, creating 86 lots. Several of these subdivisions were large developments which required economic, environmental and traffic impact studies. The 1987 Town Meeting authorized the Planning Board to prepare a capital improvements plan.

As we approached midyear, we found ourselves meeting two and three times a month to keep up with the workload and there seemed to be no end in sight. At this point, the Planning Board felt the best course of action was to propose an interim growth ordinance limiting the number of lots that could be subdivided from a parcel of property. This ordinance was presented to the voters at a special town meeting on November 5, 1987 and was adopted. It will remain in effect for a period of one year. As a result of this action, we have appointed a subcommittee to work with the Lakes Region Planning Commission to draft a capital improvements plan which when complete will allow us to propose growth management ordinances along with site plan review regulations.

The Planning Board had a number of turnovers in membership during the year and has been successful in filling these vacancies with highly qualified individuals. As chairman, I feel competent that we can achieve the goals set forth in this upcoming year. On behalf of the Planning Board, I thank all the citizens of this community who support our endeavors.

Our regular meeting is held on the third Tuesday of the month at 7:30 PM in the Town Office Building and is open to the public.

# Lakes Region Planning Commission

## 1987

Last year the Lakes Region Planning Commission increased the amount of zoning, subdivision facilities and other local planning services provided to member communities and broadened its scope of regional projects in transportation, historic preservation, land use planning, environmental protection, ground water and shared services. These increases were possible due to efforts initiated two years ago to enhance the agency's position to deliver consistent, quality professional services at reasonable cost. These same efforts, concerns and commitments still exist. Thirty of the eligible thirty-two municipalities in the region are now members of the Commission.

Rapid local and regional growth issues continued to dominate and challenge town officials who must sort out the complex ramifications of development. As a result, more time and effort was spent by the LRPC in providing draft and sample texts, data, guidance, maps and other vital information relative to growth management to town officials than any other activity. The Commission, for instance, has worked with several communities on capital improvement programs, helping Gilford, Laconia, Freedom and Gilmanton with collecting and compiling necessary data, and consulting with Wolfeboro, Alton and Moultonborough on capital improvement program procedures. It has also completed a master plan for Freedom, a land use watershed capability analysis for Franklin and comments to Sanbornton on an innovative transfer of development rights idea to protect agricultural lands. High on the agenda of many communities are the updating of master plans, the preparation of capital improvement programs and the revision of subdivision regulations and zoning ordinances.

LRPC's inventory of municipal inquiries for assistance reflects a lively concern with these matters as well as with ground and surface water resources, drainage, road standards, non-residential development, interpretations of the state statutes on planning, and a broad range of other queries relating to wetlands protection, socioeconomic impact statements, preservation of historic structures and planning board procedures.

The potential traps in the planning process are many, and communities are becoming increasingly aware of their vulnerability to (a) the consequences of unmanaged growth, and (b) the legal complications arising from uninformed actions and procedures. For these and other reasons, the Commission continued to sponsor in the region the annual Municipal Law Lecture Series organized by the N.H. Municipal Association.

# New Hampton Community Kindergarten 1987

The New Hampton Community Kindergarten continues to provide educational services for the children of New Hampton thanks to the financial support of Town of New Hampton and the assistance of parents and friends.

The Kindergarten is fortunate to have the services of Teacher Maureen Zock and Assistant Susan Harris for the eighteen students enrolled in the program this year.

Through the continued generosity of the New Hampton Community Church, the Town of New Hampton, and several fund raising events sponsored by the parents, the Kindergarten has remained financially stable.
