REPORT

SUPERINTENDING SCHOOL COMMITTEE,

For the year ending March, 1873.

If I were to give a report according to the degree of interest manifested in the condition of Schools by parents and citizens of the town, nothing would be given but a bare table of statistics in connection with the names of the teachers and prudential committees.

In districts Nos. 2, 4 and 5, teachers were employed who have taught in the town before; and whose abilities for their calling are well enough known without further mention. The two remaining districts employed new teachers. The school in No. 1 was brought to a close with the desired result. No. 3, for the Summer term, secured the services of an efficient teacher, who kept an orderly, well appearing and profitable school. For a young person to begin her first experience at teaching in one of our large and crowded schools, is quite a hazardous experiment; yet the winter term, as taught by its present teacher and now near its close, has been conducted in a manner justifying the experiment and satisfying your committee that the time has been profitably spent.

While thinking of the subjects of importance concerning schools that ought to be brought before public attention, I have thought best to leave them for once unnoticed.

The wants of our schools, with such faults as might be overcome, have been mentioned and dwelt upon every succeeding year by myself and others, with no apparent result except to be looked upon as the necessary and only way of rounding off a report. It must have been observed that the moral character of the school in District No. 3, has been improving within a few years. It is equally observable that the contrary is true of District No. 2. The causes ought to be made known to those, if there are any, who do not know them.

The building up of an active church in the midst of the former, where no church before had been, has begun and continued an influence for good that slowly but surely has extended itself until the school has been embraced within its widening circle.

The increase in number and boldness, of sources of the most debasing and destructive social evil mankind ever endured, in the midst of the latter, has become by far the most predominating influence to which the school is subject. The two cases are mentioned to show the contrast. While the evil above named is so extensive in one community, its effects are steadily working themselves through the whole; and as the lesser evils among our schools are passed by unheeded. I have thought it proper as well as desirable, to urge this subject upon the attention of all, hoping that some, realizing the vital necessity of a reform, may be induced to set themselves against that which is demoralizing children and youth, and bringing poverty, increased taxation and lasting disgrace to the town.
