**Executive Committee Meeting**  
**January 24, 1975**

Purpose: Authorization to Borrow in Anticipation of Taxes  
Acceptance of Final Quarter of 1974 Budget

Meeting called to order at 7:25 by Chairman Bouchard. Clerk called roll. Present were: Joos, Osgood, Rowell, Clark, Hebert, Bouchard, Appleby, Ruel, Winkley, Kincaid, O'Connor, Parnagian, and Pray.

There being a quorum present Chairman Bouchard read a request from County Treasurer Leo Cormier to the County Commissioners to borrow \$1,100,000 in anticipation of taxes. A request from the County Commissioners to the Executive Committee for authorization to allow the County Treasurer was read. It was moved by Mr. Pray, seconded by Mr. Parnagian that such authorization be granted. On a roll call all present voted in favor.

The final quarter of the 1974 Budget was then discussed with Commissioner Dumont answering questions wherever they arose. Question was raised as to what was to be done with old furniture from old Court House. It was stated that some was loaned to County affiliated programs and the remainder would be sold by bid or auction. Question was raised as to where the County Revenue Sharing Funds had been used was answered by Mr. Dumont — all had been used for salaries of nurses' aids at the Rest Home as the delegation had voted. It was moved by Mr. Parnagian, seconded by Mr. Pray, that the Fourth Quarter Budget be accepted. On a roll call all present voted in favor.

Commissioner Dumont raised the question of how the County should use the vacant space in the basement of the new Justice and Administration Building. The Probation Department and the County Extension Service would both like to be located in the new building. There is space for both but the rent necessary to justify the expenditure in adapting the space to the Probation Department's use would be \$6,000/year. There was no way of determining until the State Operating Budget was passed sometime in June what funds would be budgeted for rent.

The federal government no longer pays rent for the County Extension Service and \$5,454 would have to be budgeted for rent next year — \$3,600 for the annual rent and the remainder for back rent if the Delegation wished the County Extension Service to survive in its present form. There, of course, would be the additional costs of salaries, expenses, etc. of which the County pays a share.

Commissioner Dumont asked for an opinion poll on how the Executive Committee felt about these matters. Eleven members felt that the Extension Service should be given rent free space and that the decision on the Probation Department should be postponed until the State Budget was determined — two members abstained.

Motion to adjourn made by Mrs. Rowell, seconded by Mr. O'Connor, at 9:10. So voted.

Purpose: Authorization to Borrow in Anticipation of Taxes  
(Meeting of January 24, 1975 invalid because of  
change in law requiring Treasurer to be present.)

Meeting called to order at 7:30 by Chairman Bouchard.  
Clerk called roll. Present were Joos, Osgood, Rowell, Clark,  
Joncas, Maloomian, Hebert, Bouchard, Appleby, Ruel,  
Winkley, Kincaid, O'Connor and Parnagian.

There being a quorum present Treasurer Cormier read  
his request to the County Commissioners to borrow  
\$1,100,000 in anticipation of taxes to meet the demands of  
the County Treasury which there is insufficient funds to  
meet.

Request from the County Commissioners for authoriza-  
tion from the delegation to authorize the Treasurer to  
borrow \$1,100,000 was also read. Commissioners Dumont,  
Courteau, and Flanagan were present.

It was moved by Mr. Parnagian, seconded by Mr.  
O'Connor that: It being anticipated that at least one million,  
one hundred thousand dollars (\$1,100,000) will be needed  
during the fiscal year ending December 31, 1975 to meet the  
demands upon the County Treasury which there is insuffi-  
cient money to meet, the Commissioners are hereby author-  
ized to authorize the Treasurer to borrow not exceeding one  
million, one hundred thousand dollars (\$1,100,000) in anti-  
cipation of taxes as such funds are needed during said year  
upon order of the County Commissioners pursuant to RSA  
29:8. On a roll call vote all present voted in favor.

Mr. O'Connor requested expenses to Washington to  
attend County Legislative meetings in Washington. Cost  
would be \$240 approximately. Chairman Bouchard stated  
that he was not in favor of granting such a request as it would  
set a precedent — everyone would like to go to various  
meetings.

Motion to adjourn by Mr. Parnagian, seconded by Mrs.  
Clark, at 7:50 p.m. So voted.

**Executive Committee Budget Meeting (1)**  
**February 28, 1975, 9:30 a.m.**  
**Strafford County Justice & Administration Building**

Meeting called to order at 9:45 a.m. by Chairman Bouchard. Clerk called roll. Present were: Joos, Osgood, Rowell, Clark, Joncas, Maloomian, Hebert, Bouchard, Appleby, Ruel, Winkley, Kincaid, Parnagian, and Pray.

Mrs. Winkley moved that the budget be sent back to all departments with the instruction that they cut 10% from their budgets where they thought it best could be done. Seconded by Mr. Kincaid. Discussion on motion. Mr. Hebert asked for a roll-call. Yes: Rowell, Winkley, Kincaid. No: Joos, Osgood, Clark, Joncas, Maloomian, Hebert, Bouchard, Appleby, Ruel, Parnagian, and Pray. Motion Lost.

Motion by Mr. Hebert, seconded by Mrs. Winkley, that all expenses except those fixed (Interest & Premium payments, etc.) and wages be cut 10% and budget passed. Commissioner Dumont stated impossibility in refiguring of entire budget by date of public meeting. Mrs. Clark made statement that it was the duty of the executive committee to review every item in the budget as submitted and to take action on each item individually. Mr. Hebert requested a roll-call. Yes: Winkley, Hebert. No: Joos, Osgood, Rowell, Clark, Joncas, Maloomian, Bouchard, Appleby, Ruel, Kincaid, Parnagian, and Pray. Motion lost.

Chairman Bouchard requested that the Riverside Rest Home Budget be heard first as some of the people involved had to be in Concord in the afternoon.

**Budget: Riverside Rest Home**

**Administration — 5100:** Request by Mr. Osgood that increases be explained. Home Administrator, Mr. Frigon, explained that salaries reflected a 5% increase to everyone, a \$4 food allowance, and where pay rates had been below \$2.50 per hour, a general raise had been given to bring these individuals up to \$2.50 per hour. This is also a year in which there are 53 pay periods. Salaries are only variable cost. Salaries are \$27,100. per week, food costs \$27,000. per week. Fixed costs are oil, electricity, etc. Oil account over-

spent \$11,000 year -- asking a \$9,000 increase. Daily per patient cost is \$24.48. Medicare and Medicaid payments are \$12.80 — 20% of which are shared by the state and county. If rest home doesn't meet requirements by September 1975 (i.e., plans for a conforming must be well in the works) county will lose Medicare/ Medicaid payments and an additional \$10 per day per patient will have to be paid for by county. This would amount to \$600 — \$800 depending on how many people were left in old building at that time.

Item .29 — fees, service charges for payrolls, bank charges, contract fees: Moved by Mr. Hebert, seconded by Mrs. Winkley that 10% cut be made in this item. Mr. Frigon explained that bank wouldn't make up payrolls for resulting amount. Roll call requested by Mr. Hebert. Yes: Hebert, Bouchard, Winkley, Parnagian. No: Joos, Osgood, Rowell, Clark, Joncas, Maloomian, Appleby, Ruel, Kincaid, and Pray. Motion lost.

Item .36 — office supplies. Moved by Hebert, seconded by Appleby, that 10% cut be made in this item. Roll call requested by Hebert. All present voting "yes"; motion carried.

Item .38 — postage. Motion by Hebert, seconded by Winkley, that this item be cut 10%. Roll call requested by Hebert. Yes: Rowell, Joncas, Maloomian, Hebert, Bouchard, Appleby, Winkley. No: Joos, Osgood, Clark, Ruel, Kincaid, Parnagian, and Pray. 7 yes, 7 no, motion lost. Mr. Hebert questioned the Chairman's right to vote when not breaking a tie. Mr. Bouchard withdrew his vote. Motion lost 7 to 6.

Item .67 — advertising, seminars, registrations, and licenses. Moved by Hebert, seconded by Joos, this item be cut 20%. Mr. Frigon explained continuing education needed to keep license. Necessary to keep up with new federal regulations. Hebert requested roll-call vote. Yes: Joos, Osgood, Rowell, Joncas, Maloomian, Hebert, Appleby, Ruel, Kincaid, Parnagian, and Pray. No: Clark and Winkley. Motion carried.

Item .72 — auto travel, including operating costs. Moved by Hebert, seconded by Joos, this item be cut 10%. Motion carried.

Item .73 — Administrators expense account. Moved by Hebert, seconded by Joos, this item be cut 10%. Motion carried.

Item .74 — Other travel. Moved by Rowell, seconded by Hebert, that this item be cut 10%. Motion carried.

Item .98 — Reserach and study for new addition. Moved by Winkley, seconded by Kincaid, this item be deleted. Roll call requested by Hebert. Yes: Joos, Osgood, Rowell, Joncas, Maloomian, Winkley, Kincaid, Parnagian, and Pray. No: Clark, Hebert, Appleby, Ruel.

Item .39 — supplies and advertising. Moved by Pray, seconded by Osgood, that this item be cut 10%. Motion carried.

Motion by Joos, seconded by Kincaid, that committee go back to items .01, .02, .03, and .10 (salaries) and refigure on an across-the-board raise based on total salary for all county employees. Motion lost.

Motion by Ruel, seconded by Hebert, that the Administration budget (5100) be accepted as amended — new total \$84,345.00. Motion carried.

#### **Plant Operation — 5150:**

Item .01 — salaries. Explained by Mr. Frigon that there were four maintenance involved. Five per cent increase, plus \$4 meal allowance.

Item .29 — inspection fees for elevators and boilers, etc. Moved by Hebert, seconded by Rowell, that this item be cut 10%. Yes: Joos, Rowell, Joncas, Maloomian, Hebert, Appleby, Ruel, Winkley, and Parnagian. No: Osgood, Clark, Kincaid, and Pray. Motion carried.

Item .39 — supplies. Moved by Hebert, seconded by Joos, that 10% be cut from this item. Motion carried.

Item .63 - fuel. Moved by Winkley, seconded by Rowell, that this item be cut \$5,000. Motion carried.

Item .80 — building repairs. Moved by Hebert, seconded by Winkley, that this item be cut by 10%. Motion carried.

Item .81 — repairs to boiler. Moved by Joos, seconded by Hebert, that this item be cut by 10%. Yes: 10. No: 3.

Moved by Winkley, seconded by Joncas, that the Plant Operation Budget (5150) be accepted as amended . . . new total \$146,293. Motion carried.

### **Dietary — 5130:**

Item .01 — salaries. Explained by Mr. Frigon that it had been necessary to hire one more aide in dietary kitchen; that one resident worker had had to be replaced; ICF regulations required more hours by a dietary consultant; there had been a pickup on one manpower trainee; increase of 1 part-time worker (from 7 to 8).

Item .50 — food purchases. Motion by Hebert, seconded by Winkley, that this item be cut by 10%. Commissioner Courteau pointed out that county was no longer receiving Surplus Food. Yes: 9 No: 4 Motion carried.

Moved by Joncas, seconded by Appleby, that the Dietary budget (5130) be accepted as amended — new total \$289,760.00. Motion carried

### **Physicians and Pharmacy — 5180:**

Item .01 — salaries of physicians. Discussion on amount. Moved by Kincaid, seconded by Rowell, that this item be accepted. Motion carried. Osgood opposed.

Item .02 — salary of pharmacist. Discussion. Pharmacist there 2 days per week and on call. All medication for home and jail provided. State can be billed for wholesale price of drugs, plus 30%. Buy direct from factory at less than wholesale price.

Items .10 & .14 — social security and workmen's compensation. Commissioners will look into putting .01 and .02 employees on contract to eliminate S.S. and comp. payments.

Item .39 — supplies. Moved by Hebert, seconded by Joos, that this item be cut by 10%. Motion carried.

Item .50 — drugs purchased to be dispensed by pharmacy. Motion by Hebert, seconded by Joos, that 10% be cut from this item. Discussion. Pointed out that this was a wash item. County received money back from state plus 30%. This cut would not reduce appropriation as revenue would be reduced by a like amount plus 30%. Roll call requested by Hebert. Yes: Joos, Rowell, Joncas, Maloomian, Hebert, Appleby, Winkley. No: Osgood, Clark, Kincaid, Parnagian, Pray. Motion carried.

**March 3, 1975 — Nursing — 5140 — continued**

Item .04 — salaries. ICF rules and regulations require more time. More time required to be spent on prisoners. Motion by Osgood, seconded by Kincaid, that this item be reduced to \$100,000. Motion carried.

Item .05 — salaries. Motion by Joos, seconded by Hebert, that \$10,000 be cut from this item. Pointed out that no increase in help although work load continues to increase due to age increase. Motion carried.

Motion by Kincaid, seconded by Joos, that the Nursing budget (5140) be accepted as amended — new total \$642,296.00. Motion carried.

**Laboratory — 5182:**

Item .29 — fees paid to outside help, pathologists, laboratory technicians, etc. Motion by Hebert, seconded by Winkley, that \$250 be deleted from this account — new total \$250. Yes: 8 No: 4 Motion passed.

**X-Ray — 5184:**

Item .29 — X-Ray services. Motion by Winkley, seconded by Hebert, that \$200 be deleted from this item — new total \$50. Motion carried.

Motion made by Clark, seconded by Winkley, to recess until 9:30 a.m., Saturday, March 1, 1975. Question as to whether committee would be entitled to another day's pay if motion were to recess, by Rowell. Winkley withdrew second. Clark withdrew motion. Motion by Winkley, seconded by Rowell, that meeting adjourn until 9:30 a.m., Saturday, March 1, 1975. Carried. Meeting adjourned at 7:00.

**Physical Therapy — 5191:**

Item 01 — Salary: No physical therapist for three months last year and new one had to be hired at a higher salary was reason for apparent cost above 5% increase.

Item 02 — Salary, Aides: Three federal dollars for every county dollar available. Motion by Clark, seconded by Ruel to accept item. Motion carried.

Item 39 — Exercisers, Looms, Walkers, other aids and Appliances: Moved by Appleby, seconded by Rowell that \$500. be deleted from this item. Motion carried. Clark voted against.

Motion by Winkley, seconded by Rowell that the Physical Therapy budget (5191) be accepted as amended — new total \$21,683.00. Motion carried.

**Social Services & Recreation — 5195:**

Item 01 — Salary of Director: \$2,760. out of federal funds — program necessary to receive medicare/medicaid funds.

Items 02 & 03 — Salaries: Discussion. Decided program does much good for its cost.

Item 79 — Seed Money: Will bring \$22,500. in federal funds for program.

Motion by Winkley, seconded by Rowell that the Social Services and Recreation budget (5195) be accepted as submitted. Motion carried.

**Other Special Services — 5196:**

Item 01 — Salary of Barber: No equivalent service for women. Must pay for own services.

Item 29 — Purchased Services: Motion by Joos, seconded by Winkley that this item be cut by 10%. Motion carried.

Item 35: Motion pictures twice a week.

Item 49: Personal items for County supported patients.

Motion by Winkley, seconded by Rowell, that the budget for Other Special Services be accepted as amended. New total \$8,545.00. Motion carried.

**Ministerial Services — 5194:**

Motion by Ruel, seconded by Joos, that this item be accepted as presented. Motion carried.

**Groundkeeping and Landscaping — 5198:** Misnomer, actually not only keeps grounds but services and repairs equipment, including generators, maintenance of trucks, tractors, cars, sheriff's cars.

Item 01 — Salary: 5% increase plus \$4. meal allowance.

Item 61 — Electricity: Shop in separate building, welding equipment, etc.

Item 97 — New Equipment: One large gasoline storage tank. Buy gasoline at bulk rate. All County vehicles, including sheriff's cars use. Tax free. Motion by Kincaid, seconded by Winkley, that the budget for Groundkeeping and Landscaping (5198) be accepted as submitted. Motion carried.

**Jail Expenses — 6100:**

Item 02 — Salaries of Guards: There are 14 guards, either 4 or 5 on duty at one time. There are 37 inmates about equally divided between jail and house of correction. Two guards now paid under Title VI funds — amount of \$10,000 (See revenue — jail).

Item 23 — Guidance Counselor: Misnomer, actually moving pictures — carryover from former program.

Item 25 — Physicians and Medical Services: Explained that as long as prisoners are in jail, the County is responsible for medical care, glasses, tooth repair, etc. Motion by Rowell, seconded by Joos, that this item be cut by \$1,000. Motion carried.

Item 29 — Outside Board and Care: Women boarded out. Cost gone from \$15. to \$20. per day.

Item 39 — Supplies: Cigarettes, shaving cream, and other personal supplies. Sold to prisoners. Shows up on revenue for jail. Motion by Winkley, seconded by Rowell, that this item be cut by \$1,000. Yes: 6. No: 5. Motion carried.

Item 52 — Clothing, Inmates: Clothing to be worn in jail.

Item 57 — Clothing, Guards: Discussion on whether County should buy guards' uniforms when nurses were obliged to buy own. Pointed out that sheriff's uniforms were also furnished by County. Motion by Winkley, seconded by Joncas, to delete this item. Motion amended by Joncas, seconded by Appleby, to read that the initial uniform should be bought by County, subsequent uniforms to be bought by individual. Amendment lost. Main motion lost.

Item 80 — Building Repairs: Motion by Rowell, seconded by Winkley, that this item be cut by 10%. Yes: 3. No: 9. Motion lost.

Item 81 — Equipment Repairs: Repairs included under this item to be found out by Commissioner Courteau.

This section not completed March 1, 1975

## **March 2, 1975**

Item 81 will be new wiring and repairs on top tier. Motion by Rowell, seconded by Joos, that the Jail budget be accepted as amended — New Total \$186,249,000. Motion carried.

### **County Attorney — 121 & 122:**

Motion by Rowell, seconded by Winkley, that a sub-committee on salaries be set up to determine who is eligible

and who is not eligible to receive \$200/year and to report to the delegation their decision. Yes: 10. No: 3. Motion carried. Sub-committee members Rowell, Joos and Osgood.

Moved by Hebert, seconded by Osgood that motion be amended to make sum \$50,000. Roll call requested by Clark. Yes: Osgood, Joncas, Maloomian, Hebert, Kincaid, Parnagian. WHEREAS, there is a need to survey and assess the needs and services available to the elderly in Strafford County and,

WHEREAS, the elderly have experienced the effects of inflation and recession worse than any other group of people and,

WHEREAS, federal regulations currently being implemented mandate sweeping changes in the delivery systems for the elderly;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Executive Committee of the Strafford County delegation to the New Hampshire General Court that:

There is hereby established a committee to be known as the Citizens Committee to Study the Needs of the Elderly.

Said Committee is directed to study the needs and available resources and to make specific recommendations in the areas of nutrition, housing, health care, transportation and recreation services for the elderly,

Said committee shall be composed of nineteen members consisting of one member of the Board of County Commissioners appointed by the Chairman of the Board, two members of the county delegation appointed by the Chairman of the Delegation, three persons who are members of a city council or town board of selectmen in Strafford County, the Director of Adult Services of the Dover District office of the State Division of Welfare, or her designee, the Executive Director of the Strafford County Homemaker/Home Health Aide program or his designee, the administrator of the Riverside Rest Home, the administrator of one private nursing home located in Strafford County, one member who is employed by a hospital located in Strafford County, one member who is a board member or employee of the Visiting Nurses Association, one person who is a resident of Strafford County employed at the New England Gerontology Center, and six members of the public at large, three of whom shall be fifty-five years of age or older. Unless otherwise designated by this resolution the members of the committee shall be appointed by the Chairman of the Legislative Delegation after consultation with the Chairman of the Board of Commissioners, from nominations or requests to serve submitted by any citizen of Strafford County.

Said committee shall solicit the aid of any agency, public or private in the completion of its task. It shall choose a chairman, vice-chairman and clerk from among its own membership at its organizational meeting and shall be responsible for its own internal operating structure and rules.

The committee shall make a final report to the Chairman of the Delegation by June 15, 1975.

**Committee to Study the Expansion of the  
Riverside Rest Home  
September 15, 1975**

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Thornton Tripp at 7:12 p.m. on Monday, September 15, 1975 in the second floor Conference Room of the Strafford County Justice and Administration Building in Dover, New Hampshire. Present, in addition to Chairman Tripp, were representatives: Bernard, Thompson, Donnelly, Hebert, O'Connor, Rowell, and Bouchard. Also present were: Commissioners Dumont and Flanagan, Administrator Frigon and Jane Lane, reporter for Foster's Daily Democrat.

Moved by Donnelly, seconded by Rowell, that the minutes of the July 1, 1975 meeting be accepted as read. Unanimously adopted.

Rep. Tripp asked Commissioner Dumont to brief the committee on what had happened since the last meeting and what would be happening in the next few months. Commissioner Dumont stated that the Public Hearing in the 1122 review process had been set by the Office of Comprehensive Health Planning for Thursday, September 25th at 10:00 a.m. In the morning the review team will be questioning the Commissioners, Riverside officials and members of the delegation. According to Charles Ferguson, Director of the Bureau of Hospital Services for the New Hampshire Department of Public Health, unless Strafford County proceeds to build an addition, we will lose our Medicaid reimbursement for welfare patients. The delegation must decide whether to build or not. Currently there are 73 non-conforming beds at \$21.62 a day or over \$600,000. in revenue involved. Commissioner Dumont stated that clear direction from the delegation was needed and that was the purpose of the meeting on Thursday, September 18th.

Rep. Thompson observed that the county would have been better off if the delegation committee's report had been followed last year.

In response to a question by Rep. O'Connor, Commissioner Dumont noted that the state was now reimbursing

95% of allowable cost as opposed to approximately 65% before last July 1st. For the County this has meant an increase from \$16.00 to \$21.62 per patient per day. Private nursing homes had expected to receive \$23. - \$24. per day but most aren't receiving over \$17.00 per day. The result is that pressure has increased on the counties to take state welfare patients. Commissioner Dumont stated that an addition would cost between \$2,500,000. and \$3,000,000. to construct for 160 beds if that is the decision. The Office of Comprehensive Health Planning will not have a decision for the County until November.

Moved by O'Connor, seconded by Hebert:

The Committee to Study the Expansion of the Riverside Rest Home, in view of the threatened loss of medicaid reimbursement funds because of the failure of the "old building" to meet the standards of the Life Safety Code, recommends to the Strafford County Convention that the Convention act affirmatively in declaring the intent of the County to construct an addition to the Riverside Rest Home.

Unanimously adopted.

Moved by Ruel, seconded by Parnagian, that a sum not to exceed four thousand dollars (\$4,000.00) be appropriated from the Contingency Fund (Acct. 9900) for the purchase of an automobile for the Criminal Investigator in the Sheriff's Department. The motion was adopted on a 7 - 1 vote.

Rep. Appleby asked what services might be housed in the old section. Rep. O'Connor said such things as Home-maker Services, Visiting Nurses Association, Meals-On-Wheels, etc.

Rep. Joos asked what might be the cost to individual towns since the Federal government seems to be backing off on programs. Rep. O'Connor stated that the Federal government has made a commitment for this purpose. Reimbursement should be at least 95% rate — more likely at 100%. Cost to taxpayers should amount to only four or five cents per thousand.

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The Committee offers this report to the Convention as its proposed amendment to the 1122 Application to the N. H. Office of Comprehensive Health Planning. We also offer the report as a basis of discussion as to the County's role as a provider of services to its elderly population.

We recognize that the County plays a pre-eminent role in the delivery of services to the elderly. It maintains the largest nursing home in the County, it funds the non-federal share of the Homemaker/Home Health Aide Program and it funds part of the non-federal share of the Old Age Assistance program.

In addition, many of the concepts and approaches to elderly service delivery are in transition. Non-institutional programs attempt to delay the placement of elderly citizens in nursing homes. Within nursing homes, cost-containment, proper utilization, and the quality of care are important issues and new methods are being devised to reach these goals.

We recommend the construction of a 120 bed addition to the Riverside Rest Home. We feel that 120 beds will serve the needs of Strafford County until the early 1980's.

We respectfully request that the Delegation consider this report and ask you to act upon it. The report is divided into sections for your consideration of the issues.

### **The Federal Role**

The role of the U. S. Government in the field of health care began with the passage of the Hill-Burton Act in 1946. Hill-Burton funded construction projects for health facilities. In the 1960's Congress passed the Medicaid (Title XIX) and Medicare (Title XVIII) program as amendments to the Social Security Acts to insure adequate health care to low-income people and to senior citizens.

By 1972 with the quality of care, appropriate utilization and cost containment emerging as issues in the health care field, Section 1122 (hence the name of the process) of the Social Security Act was passed by Congress as a part of Public Law 92-603. The act mandated approval of any proposed construction where federal funds were involved by a state Designated Planning Agency (DPA). In New Hampshire the DPA is the Office of Comprehensive Health Planning (OCHP). The review is necessary if the proposed capital construction is:

- (1) in excess of \$100,000.
- (2) means a major change in service.
- (3) means a change in bed capacity.

There are four criteria in the review. They are:

- (a) Is the proposed project needed or projected as necessary to meet the needs in the community in terms of health services required?
- (b) Can the proposed project be adequately staffed and operated when completed?
- (c) Is the proposed capital expenditure economically feasible?
- (d) Can the project foster cost containment through improved efficiency?

### **Riverside Rest Home 1971 - 1975**

A new 82 bed additon was opened in 1971. The actual increase in available beds was closer to fifty since approximately thirty beds were moved out of the old building. At the same time the old building was remodeled to bring it up to the then prevailing standards of the Life-Safety Code.

However, in 1972 the Life Safety Code was made more stringent thus ruling out the old building as a potential Intermediate Care Facility (ICF) eligible for Medicaid reimbursement.

In April 1974, a six person committee was appointed by the Convention Chairman to begin the process of replacing the non-conforming beds and decide if further expansion was necessary. The Committee recommended to the Convention in December, 1974, that a consultant should be hired to do an in-depth assessment of the needs of the Elderly population in Strafford County and the necessary expansion of Riverside Rest Home, but the Convention rejected this approach.

In 1975 a new committee of ten members was appointed. In the budget for 1975, the sum of \$5,000 was included for architects fees. Page Associates of Rochester was hired as a consultant to aid in the preparation of the 1122 Application to O.C.H.P. The County submitted the Application for a 160 bed addition in late summer and the Ad-Hoc Review Committee met on September 25th to review the proposal. The proposal was denied and the County was asked to return with more information.

The 1970 Census showed a county population of 70,431. The 1980 population is projected at 80,610.

The population age 65 and over stood at 6,555 in 1970. Between 1970 and 1974, according to the State Council on

Aging, that figure increased by 800 persons to over 7,300; a growth of 12.3% since 1970. Those age 65 and over represent 9.3% of the total population in Strafford County. In 1980, the population 65 and over is projected at 8,115. The 1970 census further showed that 49% of those 65 and over had incomes of under \$3,000. and hence were classified as low-income.

Further increases in the elderly population can be expected: Statewide, between 1960 and 1970 the number of persons age 50-54 increased by 18.3% and those age 55-59 increased by 18.1%. As these people reach age 65 in the next few years, their impact on our health delivery system will require increased services.

Gafney and Wentworth, there are 478 nursing home beds in Strafford County. Rochester Manor has filed an 1122 Application with OCHP for 50 beds. Academy Nursing Home has filed a letter of intent with OCHP to replace their 31 non-conforming beds with a 50 bed facility.

The gain of 69 beds may be offset by the loss of 36 beds from Rochester Convalescent Home and Woods Nursing Home leaving a possible net gain of 33 beds assuming all proposed construction is approved and completed.

Currently, however, there are 333 conforming beds. The 1975 State Plan projects a need for 541 long-term care beds in Strafford County by 1980. If Rochester Manor builds its proposed 50 beds and Academy constructs its 50 beds, then Strafford County should undertake a program to construct 120 beds, 80 replacement and 40 new. This would mean a total bed capacity in 1980 of 553 or a projected over capacity of 12 beds.

The Committee recommends the construction of a 120 bed unit at Riverside Rest Home. The County will continue to assume a role of providing for those most in need of ICF care. 120 beds should eliminate the waiting list which fluctuates between 35 and 45. All of the ICF facilities in Strafford County have had occupancy rates between 90-100% since 1973.

In October, 1975, there were 73 people statewide in skilled nursing beds awaiting placement in ICF beds. Of those 73, 21 were in Strafford County. The Committee feels that although another 40 bed addition could be justified for a total of a 160 bed addition, the result would be to place the County in competition rather than complimentary position in regard to private nursing homes. It may be necessary to construct another 40 bed addition in the early 1980's; however, we cannot fully justify such a project at this time.

### **Non-Institutional Services**

The Committee recognizes the need for expansion of non-institutional services. The County is the present funding source for the Homemaker/Home Health Aid Program. We recommend a study, to be completed in 1976, to determine the needs of the elderly population in the County. A proposal for such a study will be presented to the Delegation early next year.

Present non-institutional services are at maximum capacity since there are no federal funds for expansion. The consequence of the inability to expand may be greater strain upon institutional services. A major goal for the county should be to prevent institutionalization wherever possible. To achieve that goal, the county should act as a coordinator of services to avoid duplication.

The present services available to the elderly are:

### **Visiting Nurses Associations**

There are four Visiting Nurses Associations (VNA) in the Strafford County. They depend upon Medicare, Medicaid, state and local funding and agents as well as private contributions.

VNA's are the last step in the health care process before institutionalization. The strengthening of their services should be a high priority.

The Rochester Visiting Nurses Association is serving 125 patients a month, 85% of whom are over 65. The Rural District Health Council is based in Farmington and services northern Strafford County. They presently are serving 100 patients, a majority of whom are over 65.

The Tri-Area Visiting Nurses Association serves Durham, Lee and Madbury. They are carrying a patient load of 156 with 53 over the age of 65 and are Medicare eligible. Over half of their home visits are for those 65 years of age and over. Their caseload has doubled in the past two years.

The Dover Visiting Nurses Association has doubled its caseload the past three years with 47% over the age of 65.

### **Nutrition Programs**

The Nutrition Programs for Strafford County are under the direction of the Somersworth Housing Authority. They operate programs at several sites in the county.

Meals on Wheels, funded under Title XX of the Social Security Act, serves 100 persons in Strafford County, Monday through Friday, with noon meals. Due to great limitations, this program cannot expand.

The Strafford County Nutrition Program, funded under Title VII of the Older Americans Act, serves 35 noon meals, Monday through Friday.

Homemaker/Home Health Aide Program is completing its first full year of operation under a Title XX grant; 62% of its patient load is over retirement age and the program has had to maintain a waiting list and place a limitation on the hours of service. The program carries a client load of approximately 45.

### **Conclusion**

The goals of these services are to: (1) improve health care by preventing more serious medical problems; (2) lower health costs by keeping patients in their home rather than in hospitals.

Since utilization of health care facilities has not declined, it appears that the rapid growth of the elderly population and their need for services has simply prevented any meaningful reduction in utilization rates.

The Committee was told by the Social Service directors for both area hospitals that many patients are placed in their facilities because of the lack of long term care beds. Both people felt at least an addition of 120 beds was necessary and perhaps more.

We can only conclude that non-institutional services remain an important element in the health care process. They need expansion and proper direction for expansion. As stated before, we recommend a study of the services available to the elderly in Strafford County.

### **Financial Aspects**

The County is able to undertake the construction. If the total effect of the bond were upon the county tax rate, the resulting increase per thousand each year would be about \$ .35. However, since "cost-related reimbursement" is mandated by federal law beginning July 1, 1976, the county can expect reimbursement on its capital costs in the Medicaid rate.

Currently, Moody Investors Service lists the Strafford County credit rating at A. Their ratings range from AAA to C. The single A is five from the top with eight other ratings following behind.

Attached is a listing of the county's current funded indebtedness.



## Cost Containment

One of the most difficult criteria in the 1122 review process is cost containment. The September 25th review noted that replacement does not meet cost containment criteria. However, as pointed out by Administrator Frigon, the old building is not conducive to good service delivery and hence is more costly to operate than a new facility.

However, we must recognize that cost containment will become a larger issue in the next five years. Accordingly, we recommend to the Delegation that a management consultant be employed in 1977 to design a system to contain costs. Even recognizing the fact that the county usually serves the most severe I.C.F. cases, we can bring our costs within better range of the private facilities and we must make an effort in this direction. A management consultant with expertise in the health care field is the best route to accomplish cost containment.

In addition, with the new facility with expanded occupational and physical therapy units, we can treat clients on an out patient basis, thus forestalling the need for institutionalization and providing lower costs.

As to design cost containment, the Committee feels that an efficient design will mean more efficient delivery of services. The Committee intends to have the addition reflect some of the energy saving technology currently available. The construction site lends itself to an addition, according to architect Donald Sumner of Hersey Associates, as to make extensive site work unnecessary.

Even with the change in the reimbursement rate, we expect the county role in nursing home care to continue and grow because of the need for greater care of some patients. As Lester Billings, former Director of the Bureau of Hospital Services, pointed out in a January 13, 1975 memo:

"The County Homes provide a substantially higher level of patient care than do the average proprietary home. They are also in a position to absorb inflation variations in census and below cost reimbursement rates."

Indeed, the Billings memo makes clear that county nursing homes will remain an important link in the health care chain for years to come.

### **Use of Old Building**

As stated earlier, we believe the County should be the focal point in service delivery to the elderly. The old building should be the prime facility for that coordination.

The old building kitchen and dining facilities could be converted to a nutrition and Meals on Wheels site with little work. The county could thus greatly expand these vitally needed programs with no capital investment.

Part of the old building could be used pretty much "as is" for a shelter care facility for the elderly. The county could take those who do not need ICF services but may be unable to fully take care of themselves.

Administrative offices for the various agencies working with the elderly could be housed in the building. This would provide for better communication between agencies and prevent overlap and duplication.

Additionally, the Committee feels the possibility exists to use part of the old building as an alcohol rehabilitation facility. Alcoholism is our number one drug problem in New Hampshire and little is being done about it in Strafford County.

The committee we propose to study the needs of the elderly should examine these proposals, and perhaps others, to find the best use for the old building but we believe it can best be used as a service center for the elderly.

### **Conclusion**

Before we accept or reject any or all of these proposals we need a good planning process. The resources are available for effective and intelligent planning. What is required is the initiative to undertake that planning. We believe that Strafford County is the best instrument to take the initiative in planning for the elderly.

We urge our colleagues on the Delegation, as we urge the participants in the 1122 review process, to examine carefully these proposals.

In summary we are proposing:

1. A 120 bed addition to the Riverside Rest Home with the possible need of another 40 beds in the early 1980's.

2. That the County undertake, in 1976, a systematic review of the needs, institutional and non-institutional, of the elderly in Strafford County. Such a review would be in conjunction with the various agencies, public and private, now serving the elderly. Such a review should also examine the possible role of the county as a coordinator of these services.
3. That the County employ a management consultant in 1977 in an attempt to design a system to contain costs effectively at Riverside Rest Home.
4. That the old building be considered as a shelter care facility, alcoholic rehabilitation facility and administrative agency for programs serving the elderly.

These proposals, we believe, are an effective solution to the problems, short and long range that confront us. We ask the Delegation to join with us in endorsing this program.

Based on a bond of \$2,300,000 at an interest rate of 7½% for 20 years the principal payment per year would be \$115,000, the interest payment for the first year would be \$172,500. Total interest for the bond over a period of 20 years would be \$1,811,250.

Based on Strafford County's 1974 assessed valuation of \$386,585,413 the ceiling for bonds would be \$7,730,000. Strafford County's current bonded debt is \$2,950,000.

There was brief discussion about the advisability of having the County fiscal year adjusted so as tax anticipation borrowing could be eliminated. No conclusion was reached.

## **Strafford County Commissioners Report for the Year 1975**

In accordance with the Public Laws of the State of New Hampshire, the County Commissioners of Strafford County herewith submit this annual report of various County officials for the year ending December 1975.

As promised, beginning in January of 1975 the Board of County Commissioners began holding formal weekly meetings on Tuesdays at 10:00 a.m. in the Commissioners' Conference Room at the Justice and Administration Building in compliance with the Right-to-Know Law. An agenda is posted each Friday on the Commissioners' entrance at the Justice and Administration Building and also at the Riverside Rest Home. Minutes of each meeting are available for public inspection in the Commissioners' office. We welcome any citizen to be present at these meetings when an issue may be of interest to them.

Already one year has passed since moving into our new facilities and each department has adjusted well to their new environment. To most citizens of Strafford County, we don't have to explain the many services offered at the Justice and Administration Building as we are certain that they were viewed by each of you when you were present at the Dedication Ceremonies and Open House that was held on Sunday, June 8, 1975. We are proud to state that more than 1,000 persons were in attendance for these ceremonies.

We are pleased to see that the Justice and Administration Building is able to meet the needs of many other public service organizations not necessarily associated with County government. As the year went on we found that we were being contacted by numerous organizations such as the New Hampshire Police Academy, Strafford Regional Planning, Strafford Guidance Center, the Boy Scouts of America, and the New Hampshire Superior Court Secretariat to use the facilities for various meetings and functions and we were more than happy to accommodate them. It is estimated that in the future there will be thousands of area citizens coming here on a yearly basis for various meetings and seminars.



The Strafford County Cooperative Extension Service was always a part of Federal, State and County government and over the years it has received more County monies than either the Federal or State put together. Therefore, we felt it would be beneficial to County residents to move the Extension Service closer to County government and thus in July of 1975 they moved into the Justice and Administration Building. The program is constantly expanding and working toward the involvement of as many county residents as possible. Since they have moved in, they have had various group meetings with many residents of Strafford County. We are proud to have them with us.

Upon the recommendation of the consulting Certified Public Accountant, Martin Hegarty, the County instituted a double-entry bookkeeping system to maintain a sound accounting and reporting system. We have been very pleased with the results.

We have been very involved in the Manpower program which has helped not only the unemployed to obtain gainful employment but has also relieved our cities and towns by keeping many citizens off the welfare rolls.

After having placed a great deal of time, effort, and thought into the proposal, the Strafford County Convention dutifully approved the 120-bed addition at the Riverside Rest Home because Federal regulations pertaining to the Life Safety Code forced us to abandon 80 beds in the old section of the Riverside Rest Home.

In early 1975 the County Commissioners adopted a personnel policy for all employees at the Riverside Rest Home and the Strafford County Jail. The employees, upon hiring, know what is expected of them on the County level and what they can expect from the County.

In August of this year the County Jail experienced a bad fire which resulted in heavy smoke damage to the entire interior of the jail and the evacuation of 23 prisoners from the jail for 34 days. At this time, on behalf of Strafford County, we would like to thank the people in Rockingham County for all the assistance extended to us during our time of crisis. Since that time the jail has been completely renovated with the exception of the shower room which we are

now in the process of doing. Plans are being formulated at the present time to install security T.V. cameras and an intercom system throughout the jail. Also plans for an electronic security locking system, which would lock 64 doors, is being devised. Hopefully, this will be paid for through 95% Crime Commission funds and 5% County funds.

Revised rules and regulations for inmates at the Strafford County Jail were implemented in October 1975 because the old rules hadn't been revised for so many years and thus had become obsolete.

Again this year, the Prisoner Work Release Program proved very beneficial to cities and towns of Strafford County. We hope that this program will continue in the future, not only for the free labor it provides but also because it has proven to be good therapy for the prisoners for the personal satisfaction gained through a "job well done".

## ANNUAL REPORT

1975

### COUNTY ATTORNEY

The County Attorney's office main functions in 1975 were to prosecute felonies and misdemeanors at the Superior Court level. As the Strafford County Superior Court had three terms, our criminal trial caseload was approximately eight hundred (800) cases. Fortunately, the backlog of cases has been largely eliminated. Our other duties included prosecuting cases at the District Court level for several of the smaller communities, legal advice to the County Commissioners, instituting civil actions on behalf of the County, criminal investigations, coordinating the activities of the local and state police departments, and Uniform Reciprocal Support hearings and petitions.

My staff includes an Assistant Prosecutor, two secretaries, and a Criminal Investigator.

Our thanks to the Offices of the Clerk of Court, Sheriff, and County Commissioners for their cooperation this past year.

## 1975 SHERIFF'S REPORT

1975 marked the beginning of my fourth term as Sheriff and certainly brought about more changes in the Strafford County Sheriff's Department than any of my previous six years in office.

Three terms (September, January and April) of Superior Court were initiated several years ago but this was our first experience at running two courts simultaneously. As a result, my bailiffs and I were extremely busy with court duties this year.

Also, it seemed that the first six months we lived and breathed nothing but budget, budget, budget! When it was finally accepted, the delegation had voted to buy three new cruisers and to put our three civil deputies on salary as of July 1, 1975, with all civil fees to then go to the county.

In accordance with RSA 104:30A, from January 1 through June 30, 1,178 writs were logged and the civil deputies earned a total of \$9,056.41 in fees and travel. From July 1 through December 31, 1,111 writs were logged with \$10,978.17 in fees and travel being collected. Of this sum, \$614.50 went to the Register of Deeds in payment for Real Estate Attachments, \$10,350.00 to the Commissioners (\$350.00 over our forecast) and we have a balance of \$13.67 in the account.

This change-over in billing necessitated a whole new bookkeeping system and a lot of extra responsibility for our clerk and at this time, we respectfully request an audit of our books by an auditor of the Commissioners' and/or the delegations' choice.

Other income of \$12,321.00 was realized from the seven towns we dispatch for and \$390.65 from attorneys for using the van on jury views. Whenever a view was requested by the State, there was no charge to the county by our department.

In other areas, one of our deputies attended an N.R.A. Police Firearms Instructors' School, sponsored by the State Police, and is now a registered instructor and our criminal investigator, who is enrolled in a Masters' Program in Criminal Justice Administration, (and whom we share with the County Attorney) participated in roughly 175 investigations and had extraditions from Florida, Massachusetts and Maine. In addition, he collected \$46,971.50 for the Superior Court and the New Hampshire Probation Department on mitts, capias and Superior Court bail money.

In 1975, we transported 1,347 subjects (down 20 from last year) between the courts, jails and/or hospitals. Through a Crime Commission grant and the "seed" money made available to us through the generosity of the delegation in the budget (Item No. 4140.79), we were able to purchase I.D. Photographic and Fingerprint equipment at only a small cost to the county.

We now have an automatic counter on the console in the Dispatch Center and our transmissions for the year totaled 248,921, an average of 681 per day in our 24 hour coverage.

As usual, my staff has done an outstanding job for the department and I am proud and grateful for their loyalty and cooperation in getting a tough job done for both me and the county.

## INTRODUCTION

The Cooperative Extension Service is an informal educational system that today operates in every county and territory throughout the United States. It is commonly referred to as the "off-campus" educational arm of the land grant university; and, as the name implies, is a unique cooperative arrangement between the United States Department of Agriculture, the university and the Cooperative Extension Service Council.

The Council is the governing board for the Extension Service. It has thirteen members, three from each line of work — agriculture, forestry, home economics, and 4-H — and the last member is an appointed representative of the County Legislative Delegation. Meetings are held at least four times a year, with the finance committee members meeting each month for the disbursement of funds.

Extension agents, as teachers, staff the many county offices throughout the United States. Each is a qualified, experienced college graduate, further supported by a battery of specialists in many fields, who are stationed at the state university.

Using a philosophy of helping people help themselves, Extension agents have earned recognition as a dedicated, useful, and needed segment of the educational process.

Following are resumes of the agents' annual reports. These reports are available for examination at the Extension Service Office, Strafford County Justice and Administration Building, Dover, New Hampshire.

## REPORT OF THE AGRICULTURE AND COMMUNITY RESOURCE DEVELOPMENT AGENT

For the Strafford County Extension Service, 1975 was a year of change. In June the County Office was moved from the Federal Office Building, Rochester, to new facilities in the County Administration and Justice Building, Dover. This move will, hopefully, facilitate a closer working relationship with the other county organizations and departments, as well as provide the County Extension Service Staff with a more efficient office layout.

In July the county staff completed work on a specially funded educational grant from the United States Department of Agriculture, Washington. This program gave the Strafford County Office the ability to produce and deliver educational video-tapes. Many tapes were produced in a wide variety of subject areas; and these tapes are available to the citizens of Strafford County. The office has retained this capability and, hopefully, it will be expanded in the future.

There is an on-going community development program in the town of Farmington; and much progress is being made in the areas of dog care, a town forest, adult education, and land use planning. A storefront office has been opened at Farmington; and presently is staffed by one community development agent, Lynda Brushett, and an administrative assistant, Diane Cardinal. All county residents are invited to stop at the office and get acquainted.

The area of home food production expanded greatly this past year. Gardening courses were offered at the Rochester and Dover libraries and more than one hundred people were in attendance. Home livestock production also increased this year with the major emphasis on chickens, hogs and goats. Production was an area of concern, as was processing and storage.



All in all, 1975 was a good year for the commercial growers in the county. The growing conditions were exceptional, based on the past five years. Silage corn production was up in quality and in quantity, as evidenced by the piles of silage stored in the fields. Dairy is the major commercial agricultural enterprise in the county, and economic conditions are favorable for dairy this year. Hopefully, this will help offset a very discouraging year last year.

A survey was conducted last year on the economic value of the produce in home gardens. The results of this survey indicated that the value of this product for just Strafford County was \$2,425,500.00, which is a substantial contribution to the economic production within the county. It is expected that this production will be even greater next year.

All in all, the Extension Service Program in Strafford County is expanding and working toward the involvement of as many county residents as possible. These programs are supported and maintained for and by all the citizens of Strafford County. If anyone has questions or suggestions regarding the programs, they are invited to contact us at our new office in the Administration and Justice Building.

## REPORT OF THE 4-H YOUTH DEVELOPMENT AGENTS

"4-H is the youth program of the Cooperative Extension Service, which is part of the University of New Hampshire and the United States Department of Agriculture. Your 4-H youth development agents are two members of a team of workers in the County Extension Service Office, supported by county, state, and federal funds." (4-H Cir. 1)

A nation's children are its greatest resource and the goals of 4-H are the same as those you have for your children -- to help them grow into useful, mature, citizens.

Through the 4-H program, boys and girls in all areas are offered the opportunity to set goals, learn new subject matter, work and play with others, increase skills and dexterity, and gain confidence in themselves and develop an appreciation of others.

The guidance 4-H members receive comes from volunteers within a community. These dedicated people are called leaders. They are community conscious men and women, interested in the development of the local youth. The problem is that in many areas of Strafford County there are many young people seeking 4-H membership, but they are denied the opportunity because of the lack of volunteer leadership.

If YOU are concerned about our youth and would like to become a 4-H leader -- or start your own 4-H club -- please call the 4-H Office at the County Administration and Justice Building, County Farm Road, Dover. The number is 749-4445.

In the fiscal year 1974-75, more than seven thousand youngsters took part in the Extension Service youth programs. Of this number, only 252 lived on farms; the others were from our towns and cities. Although most families did not have farm backgrounds, there has developed a strong interest in many forms of agriculture, especially with new members of the community who have come from urban areas. The desire to have a piece of land on which to raise flowers and vegetables or keep a few animals has been the reason why many have come to live in Strafford County.

Children of many of these families have joined 4-H for its expertise offered in the agricultural projects. Although these projects make up only part of 4-H, an increased enrollment in this area is evidenced. However, there are many other useful and interesting subjects that are attracting young people in all parts of the county. A few of these are arts and crafts, foods, clothing, woodworking, conservation, photography, rocketry, child care, and electricity. In connection with clothing 4-H participated in the Strafford County SEW-A-RAMA, held at the County Administration and Justice Building in October, which was attended by more than 1300 people.

Assistance to schools, police departments, and youth groups continued this year, as in the past. Utilized heavily this year were our 4-H egg incubators. More than twenty-five science teachers used the incubators, fertile eggs, and accompanying instructional manuals in a 4-H embryology project.

Bicycle safety is still a top priority program being offered by 4-H in conjunction with the schools and police departments. The increased interest in bicycling has necessitated additional time be taken in an educational effort to teach the rules and regulations of the road, as well as good old common sense, while wheeling.

4-H will continue to serve the varied interests of all youth, regardless of race, national origin, religion, or economic background; and all interested young people are encouraged to investigate our program so that they may LEARN BY DOING.

# REPORT OF THE STRAFFORD COUNTY FORESTRY PROGRAM

1975

Donald C. Black, County Forester

The County Forestry Program is a cooperative program financed by county, state, and federal funds; and is administered by the Cooperation Extension Service through agreements with the State Division of Resources Development and the United States Forest Service. It is an adult educational program, aimed at helping private and municipal woodland owners in Strafford County with Forest land-use problems. In addition, it offers assistance to wood-using industries in locating, processing, and marketing forest products. Beside helping people realize monetary returns from their woodlands and its products, the forestry program is charged with protecting our forest resources for future generations. It is entirely voluntary on the part of the woodland owners and timber operators.

General

The most significant factors to affect the county forestry program this year were the drop in demand for sawlogs, the late availability of cost-share funds, a doubling of tree-seedling sales, and use of new media services to promote forestry programs.

Tree Sales

Over the last five years, tree-seedling sales have been rising steadily from 60,000 seedlings in 1970 to 72,000 seedlings in 1974. In 1975, we distributed 143,000 tree seedlings in Strafford County, which are planted for Christmas trees and wildlife habitat improvement.

Television Media

Through a special grant to the Strafford County Extension Office, we were able to investigate new methods of stimulating interest in self-improvement programs. One successful idea was preparing a video-tape presentation, showing how the forestry practices are applied to the land and how the county forester works with landowners and government cost-share programs to help landowners improve their woodlots. So far we have had two public seminars, with more than 100 people attending each. The tape has also been used at other public demonstrations, as well as being used for individual showings. The response has been excellent. Bridging the terminology gap of forestry lingo, the tape gives the forester and landowner a headstart on forest land improvement.

Cost-Share Programs

Although cost-share funds for forestry and soil conservation practices came much later this year, we were still able to utilize all the funds — nearly \$42,000 worth.

### Timber Sales

Demand for sawlogs nearly came to a halt at times, but continued to increase as the year progressed. Generally, high-grade stumpage was the only type to be sold. The market is somewhat better now than last spring.

### Tree Farms

There were four newly certified tree farmers in the county this year. The Tree Farm Program is sponsored by the forest industries and recognizes people who do outstanding work in managing their forests.

### Town Forests

A self-guiding nature trail was established in the Strafford Town Forest, and interest in the Rollinsford and Farmington town forests continues to grow.

### Sugaring

With the economic crunch and the growing interest in “doing it for yourself,” many more people have been inquiring about making maple syrup. At a demonstration in early March, 44 people attended. Also a sugar bush was marked out for a local farmer.

### Big Trees

The Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests sponsors a continuing champion or largest tree contest. Through local interest, Strafford County now can claim one-half of all the champion trees.

### Univeristy Students

As in the three previous years, the forestry program is continuing to work with the forest management class at the University, to provide a realistic and educational experience for the students in working with towns and private land-owners.
