The theme of this 1957 Town Report is Town Meeting, which is typified by the picture on the cover of the lady voter while she is in the act of speaking during our last Annual meeting in March 1957. Americans are proud of their heritage of Freedom of Speech and there is no better example of that precious right than its exercise in our New England town meetings.

"Town meeting is a collection of individualists. When a man arises and cries, 'Mr. Moderator!' and is properly recognized, no man living is big enough to make him sit down. So long as he speaks on the subject, uses proper words, and obeys parliamentary procedure he can say what he pleases. And every listening citizen in the hall knows that the same privilege will be extended in turn. So long as anyone wishes to speak, the matter at hand is held open for discussion. Knowing this, the Yankee carries the Town Meeting privileges over into his private life, and likewise into his state and national politics. Town Meeting may have developed the Yankee frame of mind, or the Yankee may have developed Town Meeting, but they go together like pork and beans and one explains the other. Each voter brings his utter independence into the hall, and from the congregation results a majority decision in which unity is attained without anyone's losing the least bit of his own separate self.

"In a world where Democracy perishes, and in a country where self-government occupies every thinking mind, it is startling and refreshing to find New England Town Meeting alive and able and in the hands of a tight-fisted people who keep their heritage well."\*

Sutton is fortunate to have preserved the records of all of its town meetings from the first one up to the present, and a search of the old books provides fascinating reading. Items of interest have been selected from the recorded proceedings of the meetings and are printed in this Annual Report wherever the composition of the pages permits; pictures of the 1957 town meeting appear on two pages in this report.


### REPORT FROM THE "ROUND ROOM"

We are glad to report a year of progress and development for our town in its one hundred and seventy-third year of incorporation, and to present this summary of Town Officers' activities for 1957.

### Valuations and Tax Rate

Taxes and tax bills are generally not received with any degree of enthusiasm, but as a subject of discussion they would attain a high rating on a popularity poll. A changed policy in regard to assessments this year undoubtedly provoked a great deal of discussion and all of the pros and cons of high values, low rate v. low values and high rate were argued and re-argued. Let us make it clear that the tax bills would have been higher in 1957 whether valuations were increased and the rate lowered, or valuations had remained the same and the rate had gone higher, because the amount of money voted at the town and school meetings was greater this year than last. The accompanying graph shows the gradual increase in the tax rate, the amount to be raised by taxes, and the net valuation on which the rate is figured, and then clearly points up the sharp increase in valuation this year accompanied by the sudden drop in the tax rate.

Thus it may appear that raising valuations was only arithmetical juggling, and this may be true to a point, but there is more to the story than that. First, the statutes of this state require: "The selectmen shall appraise all taxable property at its full and true value in money as they would appraise the same in payment of a just debt due from a solvent debtor, and shall receive and consider all evidence that may be submitted to them relative to the value of property the value of which cannot be determined by personal examination". RSA 75:1 The phrase "full and true value" has been consistently construed to give "value" the meaning of sale value or market value. Everyone is aware that sale values have increased sharply since before World War II due in large part to the de-valuation of the Dollar, or inflation as it is called. Therefore, it is obvious that tax values had to be raised to be nearer today's sale values in order to comply with the above quoted law.

There was another compelling factor that urged us to raise values nearer to sale prices. In the Bienniel Surveys of the State Tax Commission to equalize the valuation of property among the towns and cities throughout the State they have found that Sutton has been evaluating real estate at fifty per cent of full value, this is called a "proportionality factor". And the New Hampshire Supreme Court ruled in the case of Bemis Bag Co. v. City of Claremont that all other kinds of taxable property must be assessed on the same proportional basis as real estate. In other words, that the proportionality factor, in our case fifty per cent of full value, should be applied to all classes of taxable property, stock in trade, electric utilities, live stock, stacked lumber, or whatever; prior to 1957 this proportionality factor of fifty per cent was diligently applied in Sutton to all types of taxable property except in the case of a large utility company, and at their suggestion their valuation was being reduced in comparatively small amounts year by year to eventually reach the fifty perscent level. We are grateful that they agreed to this gradual reduction because a sudden slash in their valuation would have increased the burden of all other tax-payers. But by our decision to raise all other property valuations, the assessment on this public utility has been kept at a high level and they and the rest of us are valued on the same proportionate basis, namely nearly one hundred per cent of full and true value.

There is one class of taxpayers to whom this higher level of assessment made a greater difference than to any other group, namely the veterans. In some cases the increase in valuation eliminated the veteran's exemption entirely because it pushed his assessment over the \$5,000 mark, while for others, although they retained the exemption, the increase in their tax bill was greater than other taxpayers. This new policy of assessment was not aimed at increasing the tax burden for veterans, or at taking the exemption away from them. The veterans exemption law was written to accompany the full and true value statute quoted above and any under-valuation of property makes the veterans' exemption disproportionately large. We are fully aware that this change would not be welcomed in every case (it was applauded by some veterans); and we submit that the valuations of veterans were treated in exactly the same way as all others, and that the laws of the state have been applied as they were written and intended; and we believe that this is fair to all taxpayers throughout the town.

Town Report

We would like to mention here that the Town of Sutton won first place in a contest for the best town report award which is conducted annually by the University of New Hampshire. This is a state-wide contest which, in 1957, included ninety-four percent of all towns and cities of the state. A letter of October 21, addressed to the Town Clerk, informed us of this award. This award also makes the town eligible for participation in the New England Municipal Report Competition. It is the intention of the Selectmen of your town to give you a detailed report covering all departments of our government. We also strive to make this report not only informative but attractive to all who read it.

Wadleigh Park Road

At the 1957 session of our State Legislature, Representative Chadwick introduced a bill to make it the responsibility of the State of New Hampshire to maintain the highway leading to Wadleigh State Park at North Sutton. House bill number 318 describes the above highway as starting at State Route 114 in North Sutton village to and through Wadleigh State Park to the western boundary of said Park on the lake front highway. The Department of Public Works and Highways shall assume full control of reconstruction and maintenance. This bill was enacted into law and as the town no longer has this highway to maintain it should mean a substantial savings to our highway department.

### Cemeteries

Included in expenditures on cemeteries is the cost of repairing and painting the fence at East Sutton. Several cemetery stones were down and broken. These were righted and repaired and a broken monument at the Old South Cemetery has been repaired and reset at considerable cost.

As nearly all available burial lots at the North Sutton Cemetery are now taken we think it advisable at this time to look forward to the purchase of more land for enlargement of this cemetery. Fortunately there is adjoining land available and in an ideal location. The cost and area of this land will be known before Town Meeting and we recommend that some action be taken in regard to its purchase at that time.

### World War II Memorial

A group of public spirited towns-people known as The Sutton Service Committee have over the past years and by their own efforts raised a sufficient sum of money to purchase a bronze tablet with the inscribed names of all men from Sutton who served during World War II, and have erected a split block granite monument with this bronze tablet incorporated. This memorial has been erected at the Smiley Grove at North Sutton on land now owned by the North Sutton Improvement Society. The Service Committee expects to become inactive and requests the town to take some action for the monument's future preservation.

Town Hall

Complying with a vote taken at our last Town Meeting your Selectmen appointed a committee composed of William R. Bradford, William B. Connor and Harold D. Hurd, with the selectmen, to make a study of needed changes at Pillsbury Memorial Hall. This committee has met several times and has consulted others from out of town for advice and ideas. This committee expects to have several recommendations to present at Town Meeting.

Highways

It is gratifying to the Road Agent and the Selectmen that there is balance in the Town Maintenance funds this year; the last note on the four wheel drive truck has been paid and there remains only one note in the amount of \$2,250.00 to be paid on the new Ford truck. Therefore the financial picture in this department is a bright one.

In accordance with the vote of last Town Meeting a mowing machine and a chain saw with a brush cutting attachment were purchased. Both of these implements were put into service and their use showed good results in fighting the ever-present problem of road-side brush.

Some of the "Duncan" money was used to grade, drain and black-top two sections of road, one, eleven hundred feet on the Chalk Pond Road near the Center village and two hundred feet on the Baker Hill road near the residence of William Connor. In both these locations it is expected that the hard surface will eliminate the problem of washouts on those steep grades. Another project using this fund was the replacement of three small wooden bridges with metal culverts, these are near the residences of George Wells, Clarence Robinson and Fred L. Davis.


The Pressy bridge was completely rebuilt when it was found that the abutments had to be re-constructed in order to permit the installation of new stringers. At least four other bridges will have to undergo similar major repairs within a few years, and this matter is being discussed with the budget committee.

The T.R.A. money was expended on the Nelson Hill Road thus completing the entire project from King Bridge in the Center village to the Newbury line. The preliminary work of 1956 on the section from a point west of the junction with the Brown Road to the Town Line was covered with gravel to a depth of twelve inches and then a three inch asphalt mix was applied eighteen feet wide and two miles in length.

In 1958 it is expected that the T.R.A. funds will be used to start work on the Roby Road. We are advised by the Department of Public Works that the town's share is to be \$1,265.00 and the State will contribute \$8,433.30, or an increase of \$1,737.23 available for construction. The money allotted for the maintenance of Class V highways (Duncan) for 1958 is to be \$2,928.86 or \$373.57 less than the previous year.

The accompanying map is helpful in explaining a problem about the road leading from Keyser Street by the Huntoon House to the cottages of Anderson and Sundell and the road branching westerly from that road to the cottage of Martin and Beattie. As the map shows there are two short town roads sepa-

rated from Keyser Street by a section of road used as a public way but which has not been accepted as a town highway. Since two of these cottages are in use a part or all of the winter these narrow roads are inadequate for snow plowing operations; and since in the summer the nearness of the road to the hotel is an annoyance, we suggest that a short piece of road be constructed west of the driveway at the Huntoon House; and that the rest of the present public way be accepted to connect the two town roads to Keyser Street. The proposed new construction is indicated on the map.



### **FINIS**

In 1957 as in all past years the Selectmen have received both criticism and favorable comment as to the judgement they have used in the management of town affairs. We wish to assure you that the welfare of our town is of great concern to us and we strive to do our job in a sound, business-like manner. We will appreciate any comments you may have to offer; and we extend our sincere thanks to all Town Officers, and to all who have assisted with their cooperation.

### TOWN WARRANT

### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Sutton in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Pillsbury Memorial Hall in said Sutton, the eleventh day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing. The polls to be open for this purpose from ten of the clock in the forenoon and to be closed no earlier than six-thirty of the clock in the afternoon.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation for the same.
- 3. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the payment of aid to persons on public welfare.
- 4. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair of highways and bridges.

- 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$1,265.00 for Town Road Aid; and the State to contribute \$8,433.30.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,675.00 for street lighting.
- 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for a Capital Reserve Fund for the construction of bridges.
- 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for a Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of highway equipment.
- 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$75.00 for the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region.
- 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$350.00 for the maintenance of the Sutton Free Library.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the observance of Memorial Day.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the New London Hospital.
- 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.
- 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,405.00 for the expenses and insurance for the fire department.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for forest fire fighting.
- 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for the purchase of land for an addition to the North Sutton Cemetery.

- 17. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to lay out and construct as town highways certain roads leading from Keyser Street to Keyser Lake in the vicinity of the Huntoon House.
- 18. To see if the town will vote to accept from the North Sutton Improvement Society a plot of land on which the World War II Memorial stands.
- 19. To hear the report of the Committee appointed in accordance with the vote taken at the March 1957 meeting pertaining to the alterations and improvements at Pillsbury Memorial Hall.
- 20. To see if the town will vote to approve the alterations and improvements recommended by the Committee, expenditures to be covered by the use of the Capital Reserve Fund, together with the balance of the unencumbered surplus and any further expenditures, not to exceed \$2,500.00, to be drawn from the F. E. Nelson Town of Sutton Fund.
- 21. To see if the town will vote to accept any trust funds received during the preceeding year for the care of cemetery lots.
- 22. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 23. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

# SUTTON VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

# **Annual Report**

In 1955, when the Town first voted to establish a Town Fire Department, there was in North Sutton a 1922 La France, which had been donated to the North Sutton Fire Department and a 1941 Dodge which had been equipped by the Town. Sutton Mills had no equipment except a non-operative, hand powered soda-acid tank. South Sutton had a 1932 Model B Ford which had been in use at North Sutton and a Dodge Powerwagon which had just been donated to the department and had not yet been equipped as a firetruck. There was no equipment to cover the Blaisdell Lake section of town.

Aside from the firehouse in North Sutton, there were no buildings to house any of the existing equipment.

In 1955 the town voted to raise and appropriate money to purchase more hose, to equip the Powerwagon and to build a firehouse in South Sutton.

In 1956 more hose was purchased for the trucks in the North Sutton firehouse, a portable pump and a booster hose were purchased to be stationed in Sutton Mills, the Powerwagon was housed in the new firehouse in South Sutton and the Model B was loaned to the Blaisdell Lake Property Owners' Association, to be equipped and housed at Blaisdell Lake.

In 1957, the voters of the town agreed to raise enough money on short term notes to fully equip all the trucks with hose so that adequate protection might be provided immediately. The members of the Fire Department modified the body of the Powerwagon to eliminate the bugs which a year's use had turned up and finished the firehouse in South Sutton. Enough new hose was purchased and installed on the trucks so that water can be laid on to almost every house in town.

In addition, the La France was sold and the sum so realized with that raised by selling the Dodge chassis, was enough to purchase a 1949 long-wheel-base Chevrolet chassis to replace the Dodge which was always too short for the load it was called on to carry. The members of the fire department transferred the body from the Dodge chassis to the Chevrolet at this time.

At the present time, in the North Sutton firehouse there is a 1949 Chevrolet truck, equipped with 1300' of  $2\frac{1}{2}$ " hose and 750' of  $1\frac{1}{2}$ " hose; in Sutton Mills there are two portable pumps with 200' of booster hose and 300' of  $1\frac{1}{2}$ " hose; in the South Sutton firehouse there is a Dodge powerwagon with 500' of  $2\frac{1}{2}$ " hose, 700' of  $1\frac{1}{2}$ " hose and 200' of booster hose; at Blaisdell Lake, in the newly completed firehouse, there is the Model B Ford equipped with 300' of  $1\frac{1}{2}$ " hose and 250' of booster hose. The Town may well compliment itself on the improvement in fire protection which the foresight and cooperation of the voters has made possible.

The Department intends to ask only for the absolute minimum funds required for maintenance, insurance and the operation of the Red Network Alarm System for the coming year.

# Tuesday March 21, 1815

Motion being made voted that two persons be appointed to take the care and keep the Keys of the meeting houses and to dig all the graves and fill them and they are to have the privilege of pasturing the grave yards with creatures that will not injure said yards — Joseph Peaslee was chosen to take charge of the south meeting house and graveyard and to be allowed four dollars for his services for one year and Philip S. Harvey was chosen to take charge of the North meeting house and Graveyard and to have four dollars for his services for one year.

Motion being made voted that no person being the owner of any cattle horses sheep or swine shall suffer any of them to run at large within one mile of either of the meeting houses.

# March 10, 1818

On motion voted that each non commissioned officer and soldier in town be furnished at the next General Muster on the field of parade with one pound and a quarter of good boiled beef one pound of good wheat bread one gill of rum each and two barrells of cider for the whole. Each company shall be furnished with one basket and one pail and one bottle for their several uses on said day to be safely returned when the companies are dismissed. Joseph Greely contracted to furnish the above articles as above stated for the sum of \$20.00.

# March 13, 1849

A resolution was introduced, Resolved that the Selectmen be requested not to licence the Sale of Spirituous liquors for the ensuing political year, for any consideration or purpose whatsoever — said Resolution was accepted by a vote of the town.

# March 13, 1860

Voted that the town purchase a Hearse and build a house to keep the same.

# Tuesday March 21, 1815

On motion voted that the town poor be put up at Vendue to be maintained by the person or persons who will perform the same for the least sum, to be boarded nursed fed and lodged and made comfortable and to be furnished with every necessary calculated to make them quiet and content both in health and sickness the Doctors bills their wearing apparel and bedding to be furnished by the town to be kept one year from this day. And the person or persons who engage to perform as before stated shall procure good and sufficient bondsmen for the faithful performance of the before mentioned services if required by the Selectmen, and they shall at all times have the charge and direction of the town poor to take them away and put them to other places whenever in their opinion they are illy used and whenever their comfort and convenience require it. The person or persons taking charge of any or all of the poor of the town to be entitled to all the reasonable labor and services of the same and the person contracting to maintain any or all of said poor is to receive them where they have last lived.

John Adams Jr. contracted as above specified to support Mr. Thomas Walker and his wife the ensuing year for the sum of one dollar seventeen cents per week.

# March 9, 1836

Voted that arrangements be made to build a Poor house upon the Davis farm in 1837.

# March 15, 1837

Voted that the Selectmen contract for the support of the Poor until the first day of April, and then they be removed to the Poor House.

Voted that the Selectmen be instructed to hire an Agent to carry on and manage the affairs of the Poor Farm and to purchase stock and farming tools.

Voted that the Poor House be a house of correction.



# THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Sutton qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 8th day of March 1958 at 8:00 o'clock in the evening, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
- 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and the Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriations of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriations, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- 9. To see if the school district will adopt as its school check-list the town check-list, as provided in RSA 197:12a, as inserted by laws of 1957, chapter 57; this provision to be effective for the 1959 and subsequent annual district meetings.
- 10. To transact any other business that may regularly come before said meeting.

For the first time in quite a while we have had the same teachers in the Sutton School for more than one year. Mrs. Lorraine Cadoo is the Principal and teacher of the middle grades. Mrs. Della Miller is the teacher in the primary grades and Mrs. Gladys Murray is the teacher of the upper grades.

The supply of teachers is not increasing while the demand, due to increased enrollments, is rapidly increasing. For example eight years ago Hopkinton had twelve teachers. This year they have twenty teachers and next year they will have to add two or three more teachers. This is so typical of many communities that teachers continue to be scarce and one of the reasons why salaries of teachers continue to increase.

Miss Blanche Bailey has been our music teacher for the past twelve years, serving the towns of Bradford, Hopkinton, Newbury, Sutton, Warner and Webster. While she had a busy schedule her first year, increasing demands have been made on her time. The music programs in Simonds High School have been expanded as well as those in Hopkinton High School. With the new Minimum Standards for High Schools further expansion is needed. To further aggravate the problem Hopkinton will have six additional elementary classrooms next year.

We have reached and passed the breaking point as far as our Music Programs are concerned and something must be done to relieve the situation. We must have additional help in music or reduce the amount of time Miss Bailey spends in each town. Whatever the decision you may be sure that School Boards in the district will arrive at a joint decision which will be most beneficial to all the children of the various communities.

Things seem to be going well at school. We have made some adjustments and will continue to make them to better fit the needs of the children. The one thing I think that would help us improve the school would be to insist on a still higher quality of work from our better pupils. I think we have made a good start on this problem, but think we should continue to encourage our children to work on just as high a level as they are capable of doing.

I enjoy my work in Sutton and enjoy the friendly atmosphere in the school and community. Our schools have come a long way in the past four years, and we should make every effort to continue to improve our school systems.
