To the Inhabitants of the Town of Tuftonboro in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs: You are hereby notified to meet at the Tuftonboro Town House in said Tuftonboro on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March next, at 10:00 o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLES 1 AND 2 WILL BE VOTED ON BY BALLOT ON MARCH 12TH

You are hereby notified to meet at the Tuftonboro Central School on Wednesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at 7:30 P.M. in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. Shall the Town adopt the provisions of RSA 40:13 to allow official ballot voting on all issues before the Tuftonboro Town Meeting? This Article Submitted By Petition. YES () NO ()
- 3. To see if the Town wishes to amend the existing agreement under Section 218 of the Social Security Act by excluding the services performed by election workers for a calendar year in which the remuneration paid for such service is less than One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00).
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) to be added to the current scholarship funds awarded to the Tuftonboro students who wish to pursue their education beyond high school. This article submitted by Petition. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee do not recommend this Article.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty-seven Thousand Eight Hundred Eight Dollars (\$57,808.00) for the Special for Tar Account. The sum of Fifty-five Thousand Dollars (\$55,000.00) to be raised by the current year's taxes and to authorize the use of last year's December 31 Fund Balance in the amount of Two Thousand Eight Hundred Eight Dollars (\$2,808.00) for this purpose. This is a special or non-lapsing account per RSA 32:3 VI and will not lapse for five years or until the completion of the resurfacing of Town Roads, whichever is less. The Selectmen recommend and the Budget Committee approves this appropriation.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ninety-one Thousand Sixty-eight Dollars (\$91,068.00) for the continued reconstruction work on Brown Road. The sum of Seventy-eight Thousand Dollars (\$78,000.00) to be raised by the current year's taxes and to authorize the use of last year's December 31 Fund Balance in the amount of Thirteen Thousand Sixty-eight Dollars (\$13,068.00) for this purpose. This will be a special or nonlapsing account per RSA 32:3 VI and will not lapse for three years or until the

completion of the reconstruction of Brown Road, whichever is less. The Selectmen recommend and the Budget Committee approves this appropriation.

- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand Three Hundred Dollars (\$15,300.00) for reconstruction work on County Road. This is a special or non-lapsing account per RSA 32:3 VI and will not lapse for three years or until completion of the reconstruction work on County Road, whichever is less. The Selectmen recommend and the Budget Committee approves this appropriation.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand One Hundred Dollars (\$5,100.00) for reconstruction work on Curtis Road. The Selectmen recommend and the Budget Committee approves this appropriation.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Thirty-two Thousand Eight Hundred Twenty-five Dollars (\$232,825.00) for the site work and the basic building for the Transfer Station/Recycling Center. The sum of One Hundred Thirty-five Thousand Dollars (\$135,000.00) to be raised by the current year's taxes and to authorize the use of last year's December 31 Fund Balance in the amount of Ninety-seven Thousand Eight Hundred Twentyfive Dollars (\$97,825.00) for this purpose. This will be a special or non-lapsing account per RSA 32:3 VI and will not lapse for five years or until completion of the transfer/recycling center, whichever is less. The Selectmen recommend and the Budget Committee approves this appropriation.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty-two Thousand Three Hundred Twenty-eight Dollars (\$32,328.00) to construct a three bay addition to the Tractor Shed on Sodom Road. The sum of Twentyseven Thousand Dollars (\$27,000.00) to be raised by the current year's taxes and to authorize the use of last year's December 31 fund Balance in the amount of Five Thousand Three Hundred Twenty-eight Dollars (\$5,328.00) for this purpose. This will be a special or non-lapsing account per RSA 32:3 VI and will not lapse for two years or until completion of the proposed addition to the Tractor Shed, whichever is less. The Selectmen recommend and the Budget Committee approves this appropriation.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$7,500.00) for the Melvin River Dredge Project and to authorize the use of last year's December 31 Fund Balance in the amount of Seven Thousand Five Hundred Dollars for this purpose. This is a capital or non-lapsing account per RSA 32:3 VI and will not lapse for two years or until completion of the project, whichever is less. The Selectmen recommend and the Budget Committee approves this appropriation.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) for the Cemetery Booklet and authorize the use of last year's December 31 fund Balance in the amount of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) for this purpose. This is a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:3 VI and

will not lapse for two years or until the completion of this project, whichever is less. The Selectmen recommend and the Budget Committee approves this appropriation.

- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$315,000.00) for the addition and the renovation of Piper House and to authorize the withdrawal of One Hundred Forty-eight Thousand Two Hundred Thirty Dollars (\$148,230.00) plus all accrued interest from the Piper House Capital Reserve Fund created for that purpose. The balance of One Hundred Sixty-six Thousand Seven Hundred Seventy Dollars (\$166,770.00) to come from general taxation the current year. This will be a special or non-lapsing account per RSA 32:3 VI and will not lapse for three years or until the completion of the addition and renovation of the Piper House, whichever is less. The Selectmen recommend and the Budget Committee approves this appropriation.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same; the sum of Eight Hundred Thirty-three Thousand Fifty-four Dollars (\$833,054.00) as recommended by the Selectmen and approved by the Budget Committee and such sums as may be required to cover the costs of any additional items voted at the meeting and in accordance with RSA 32:8.
- 15. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Board of Selectmen

Town of Tuftonboro, New Hampshire

We have audited the accompanying general-purpose financial statements of the Town of Tuftonboro as of and for the year ended December 31, 1994, as listed in the table of contents. These general-purpose financial statements are the responsibility of the Town of Tuftonboro's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these general-purpose financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the general-purpose financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the general-purpose financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall general-purpose financial statement presentation. The general-purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the General Fixed Assets Account Group, which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. The amounts that should be recorded in the General Fixes Assets Account Group are not known.

In our opinion, except for the effect on the general-purpose financial statements of the omission described in the preceding paragraph, the general-purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Town of Tuftonboro as of December 31, 1994, and the results of its operations and cash flows of its nonexpendable trust funds for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

Our audit was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the generalpurpose financial statements taken as a whole. The individual and combining fund financial statements and schedules listed in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the general-purpose financial statements of the Town of Tuftonboro. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the general-purpose financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly presented in all material respects in relation the general-purpose financial statements taken as a whole.

The second portion of the 1995 Annual Meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Roger H. Wingate, at 7:30 P.M. Meeting was opened with a Salute to the Flag, followed by prayer offered by Rev. Russell Petrie. The Moderator announced the results of the voting under Article 1 and declared the following elected to office:

Supervisor of the Check List for One Year: Elizabeth A. Clements.

Selectman for Three Years: William R. Rollins.

Budget Committee for Three Years: Kenneth Craigue and Irving F. Joseph Jr.

Library Trustee for Three Years: Carol M. Bush.

Trustee of the Trust Funds for Three Years: David G. Haeger.

Cemetery Trustee for One Year: Nathaniel Crane.

Cemetery Trustee for Two Years: Barbara L. McClure.

Cemetery Trustee for Three Years: David G. Haeger.

All elected officers were present and were administered the oath of office by the Town Clerk, Mary B. Craigue.

Article 2. Zoning Amendment 1.

Article was declared passed by Moderator.

Article 3. Floodplain Ordinance.

Article was declared passed by the Moderator.

The Moderator announced that there were Bicentennial items for sale at the table in the back of the hall. He also stated that guides would be available after the meeting for a tour of the new school addition. Pupils will be moving into the classrooms on Friday.

Article 4. Shall the Town of Tuftonboro vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 508: 12-b. Liability Limited; Fire Department Emergency Service; and Rescue Squad members.

Motion was made by William Antonucci and seconded by Donald Wright to adopt article as read by the Moderator. Bill Wood questioned whether this would cover the liability of civilians helping, and the answer was yes. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative, and article was declared passed by the Moderator.

Article 5. To see of the Town will vote to rescind the actions of the January 18, 1960 Special Town Meeting establishing fire wards and a fire chief, and act pursuant to the revised RSA 154:1, Organization of Fire Departments.

Motion was made by Norman Vittum and seconded by William Rollins to adopt Article 5 as read. Selectman Antonucci spoke on the article. The article is from State Statutes. Town Council advised its adoption; this article will oversee the day to day control as specified by the State RSAs. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and the article was declared passed by the Moderator.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twentyfive Thousand Dollars for the Piper House Renovation Capital Reserve Fund, previously established. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

Motion was made by William Rollins and seconded by Ken Craigue to adopt Article 6 as read. Selectman Rollins explained that the Town is very fortunate; two experienced architects, Orvil and Camilla White, have volunteered their services, this through the efforts of the Tuftonboro Association. The Town is fortunate to have this dedicated Association involved with town projects. He explained the various parts of the model and that costs will be finalized this year and the building costs will be brought before the voters next year, with construction to start in 1996. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and the article was declared

passed by the Moderator.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eighteen Thousand Six Hundred Eighty-three Dollars for the purchase of a new police cruiser. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

Motion was made by William Rollins and seconded by Gordon Hunt to adopt Article 7 as read. Chief Berry was called upon to explain the reason for the purchase of a new cruiser. He explained that it is better to replace a cruiser before the trade-in cruiser has 100,000 miles on it; cruisers with high mileage have no value—the town can expect to receive around \$3,500 from the sale this year. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and the article was declared passed by the Moderator.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Sixty-six Thousand Two Hundred Eighty-nine Dollars for the reconstruction of New Road. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

Motion was made by William Rollins and seconded by William Antonucci to adopt Article 8 as read. Potter Campbell questioned whether the State contributed to the cost; "No, they do not," replied William Rollins. He further stated that this appropriation would complete the work on this section of road. New Road runs from County Road to Sodom Road. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and the article was declared passed by the Moderator.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty-four Thousand Dollars for the continued reconstruction of Brown Road. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation

Motion was made by William Rollins and seconded by Kenneth Craigue to adopt the article as read. Selectman Rollins explained that this would complete the grading and hot top from the start at Federal Corner Road up to the top of the hill on Brown Road by the Callendar residence. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and the article was declared passed.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fiftyfour Thousand Six Hundred Eighty-six Dollars for the construction of a building at Tuftonboro Town Lot on Sodom Road for the storage of winter sand. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

Motion was made by William Rollins and seconded by Kenneth Craigue to adopt the article as read. Selectman Rollins and Road Agent Colby explained the need for the building. Covering the sandpile with a tarp is not very successful. Enough salt is mixed with the sand to keep it from freezing; a building covering the sand would be more satisfactory. The state does not regulate, but highly suggests, that sandpiles be covered to contain the mixture so that there is no runoff. Building will be constructed comparable to the State Shed on Route 109A. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and the article was declared passed by the Moderator.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Thousand Five Hundred Dollars for the Special for Tar Account. The Selectmen

and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

Motion was made by William Rollins and seconded by William Antonucci to adopt the article as read. Selectman Rollins explained that the money will be spent this year to apply a second layer to Ledge Hill. This needs to be done to protect work that was done a few years ago. The raised culverts and cracks will be taken care of before the project is done. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and the article was declared passed by the Moderator.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars for work to be done at the Town Beach Area at 19 Mile Bay and to authorize the withdrawal of Fifty Thousand Dollars from the 19 Mile Bay Construction Capital Reserve Fund created for the purpose. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required.)

Motion was made by William Antonucci and seconded by William Rollins to adopt the article as read. Selectman Rollins explained that \$50,000 is the figure being asked. DRA advised that articles withdrawing money from capital reserve funds be written in this manner. He further explained the status of the road. The town did not receive the road R-O-W from the State until February, and earlier problems were with the State. However, a line of communication has been opened with Mr. Poirier, and he is confident that any problems will be straightened out. He explained that the plan is to remove the asphalt and replace it with gravel, make a small park with picnic tables, add sand and a fence along property lines. This portion of the road will become a class six road; the old Route 109 past the Laase residence will become a class five road. Work will proceed as planned, as it will be done on property owned by the Town. Selectman Vittum explained that an agreement was signed with the State that the Town would never discontinue the road; that it will continue to be access to Lake Winnipesaukee for all persons to enjoy. The Town would have to agree to discontinue the road before any claim could be made on its ownership. There was a lot of discussion on this article; displeasure that the area is not going to be a nice sandy beach. It was stated that the first and main reason for the changing of the route was for safety. Ken Craigue stressed that this had been accomplished, and that persons will not be next to a busy highway. Donald Sleeper moved that the article be laid on the table and upon explanation of the ramifications of "laying on the table," he withdrew his motion. Mr. Ewing made motion to move the question, seconded by Betsy Thornton, and voted in the affirmative by a show of hands and declared passed by the Moderator. A vote by show of hands in the affirmative and the article was declared passed by the Moderator.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ninetyseven Thousand Eight Hundred Twenty-five Dollars as requested by the Tuftonboro Solid Waste Committee for Phase 1, 1995; Preparatory Work for the Transfer Station/Recycling Center and Construction of a Recycling Building. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. Motion was made by William Antonucci and seconded by William Rollins to adopt the article as read. The Co-chairmen of the Landfill Committee, Ann Hackl and Mike Phelps, were asked to come forward and explain the request. The money to be spent this year will be for preliminary construction and a bare building. It is necessary that the station (building) be operating before the landfill can be closed. There will be limited recycling in 1995. Selectman Rollins recognized the committee and praised them for their efforts expended. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and the article was declared passed by the Moderator.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer Tax Liens, to sell and convey by Quitclaim Deed following notice of sale by advertisement, any and all properties acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's Deed by Public Auction (or advertised sealed bid) or in such manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require. The law allows this authority to extend indefinitely until rescinded by a vote of Town Meeting. This article recommended by the Selectmen.

Motion was made by William Antonucci and seconded by William Rollins to adopt the article as read. Selectman Rollins explained that the Town is not interested in selling any property acquired by Tax Collector Deed except the lots at Hidden Valley; and only those when a request is made. There was discussion that this article was too vague; and an amendment was made to add "After 1994." Vote by show of hands in the negative and the amendment was declared not passed by the Moderator. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and the article was declared passed by the Moderator.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Conservation Commission to retain the unexpended portion of its 1995 appropriation. Such funds to be placed in a Special Conservation Fund in accordance with RSA 35 A-5.

Motion was made by William Rollins and seconded by William Antonucci to adopt the article as read. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and the article was declared passed by the Moderator.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars to be used to publish a book on all cemeteries and old graveyards in Tuftonboro. The Town will be reimbursed with the proceeds from the sale of this book. This article was submitted by Petition; has the approval of the Selectmen and is recommended by the Budget Committee.

Motion was made by William Rollins and seconded by William Antonucci to adopt the article as read. Veronica Liepert spoke on this article, explaining that this is a project of the Tuftonboro Association. The book will list all town cemeteries and persons buried. This book is being put out in conjunction with the Bicentennial. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and the article was declared passed by the Moderator.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of

money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same, the sum of Seven Hundred Eighty-five Thousand Eight Hundred Seventy-nine Dollars as recommended by the Selectmen and approved by the Budget Committee and such sums as may be required to cover the cost of any additional items voted at the meeting and in accordance with RSA 32:8.

Motion was made by William Antonucci and seconded by William Rollins to adopt the article as read. The Moderator explained that all articles relating to money had passed as presented and that this year's total budget is \$1,207,862.00 if this article passes. Discussion proceeded on various aspects of the budget. Christie Sarles explained the Library appropriation—requesting more time and health insurance for the Librarian. Police Department will have two full-time officers and one part-time officer as needed. Marilyn Black questioned the content of the recreation figure; and what went to Wolfeboro and whether the swim program had received any cutback. Due to the school construction the recreation appropriation has been down for the last two years. Bob Ramsbotham made the motion to move the question, seconded by William Antonucci. Vote on moving the question was by a show of hands in the affirmative and declared passed by the Moderator. Vote on article by show of hands in the affirmative and the article was declared passed by the Moderator.

Article 18. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Under Article 18 Selectman Rollins requested permission to read a proclamation. The proclamation was an announcement of the Celebration of a Bicentennial by the Town. The Town of Tuftonboro was incorporated December 17, 1795, and the first Town Meeting was held March 14, 1796. Upon completion of the reading of the proclamation, Selectman Rollins moved that it become a part of the official records of this Town Meeting. Seconded and voted.

Ellen Laase requested that a committee consisting of the Selectmen, Conservation, and Recreation Committee, be formed to draw up a plan for the 19 Mile Beach. The Moderator advised her that this motion would not carry.

Motion was made by John Widmer and seconded by Helen Whall to adjourn the meeting. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and the article was declared passed by the Moderator.

Meeting adjourned at 9:45 with approximately 150 persons in attendance.

After the closure of the meeting, Chairman Ken Cookson came forward and explained the various events planned for the Bicentennial.

TOWN OF TUFTONBORO HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT 1995 REPORT

The Highway Department was busy this year making significant improvements on Tuftonboro roads.

750' of underdrain, 2 cross pipes and catch basins were put in on New Road. The old pavement there was reclaimed, 6" of crushed gravel was added, and then New Road was paved.

On Sodom Road, 340' of underdrain, 2 catch basins, and 2 15" cross pipes were put in. 3000' of old pavement was reclaimed, 5" of crushed gravel was added, and then it was paved.

Brown Road had 3 catch basins, 2 cross pipes, and 800' of underdrain installed. Approximately 1800' of the old pavement there was reclaimed, 6" of crushed gravel was added, then it, too, was paved.

A new sand storage building was created at the Highway Department location on Sodom Road.

Bushes were mowed as usual, and the dirt roads were graded and raked. A section of the hill on Phineas Graves Road was widened and graveled.

The road cracks on Ledge Hill Road were sealed, the area was shimmed and repaved up to Schoolhouse Road. A section of County Road was ditched and shimmed.

Winter sanding and plowing was done as usual. After heavy rains in late October, the cold season seemed to arrive early.

Without the help of so many excellent co-workers, my job would be a difficult one. As I've said so many times in the past, I feel as if I have one of the BEST working crews around. Many thanks to Ronnie, Walter, and Bill for the many long hours—also to Colin, Dwight, Angela, Jim, and Ron for being there when the phone rang.

Eric was a certified full-time officer in Massachusetts prior to becoming certified as a full-time officer in New Hampshire. He worked three years for the Wolfeboro Police Department where he developed the Bike Patrol which is still in existence during the summer months.

Eric has attended numerous schools and brings a vast knowledge of law enforcement to the Department. He is looking forward to developing programs in the school which will establish a communications with our young children and the Police Department.

Shawn Casey is the Special Officer and holds a full-time certification plus instructor certifications in various fields. He brings experience and knowledge to the Department and is available to us on short notice.

Break-ins were down from 1994. Domestic violence incidents covered by the Police Department increased. We covered four domestic situations where deadly weapons were involved. REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

In calendar year 1995, our three leading causes of fires were Children, Non-Permit fires not properly extinguished, and Smoking Materials.

Violation of RSA 224:27 II, the fire permit law and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire, are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

To aid your Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department and State Forest Fire Officials, contact your local Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required. This also helps to prevent unnecessary response to a controlled burn.

As of December 31, 1995 all Cemetery Funds were deposited into the New Hampshire Municipal Deposit Account. By New Hampshire law it is now the responsibility of the towns to maintain cemeteries. Interest earned from cemetery trust funds is turned over to the town to pay for grounds maintenance.

TUFTONBORO SOLID WASTE/RECYCLING COMMITTEE 1995 REPORT

The past year was a major learning experience for the committee. Dealing with numerous engineering firms, general contractors, and information obtained by visiting over a dozen other towns' transfer stations and recycling facilities, the committee has narrowed the information down to a preliminary draft of Tuftonboro's facilities at the landfill site.

Ongoing negotiations with contractors to prepare the site for traffic flow and a building developed a stall when it was apparent that the concrete retaining walls and extensive drainage work should be completed before the building is erected. Last year's budget did not appropriate the allocation for this, so delaying the project to this year we felt was for the town's best interest.

The silt supply that was available locally was not state approved for landfill closure cap. Alternatives the committee is looking into include biomass and byproducts from the papermill industry.

As before, the committee meets the second Monday of the month at 7:30 p.m. at the Town Offices, and we welcome interest and input.

REPORT OF THE E911 COMMITTEE

In 1995 the final steps were taken toward getting E911 on line by July 7th so that all Tuftonboro telephone exchanges could use 911. WE DID IT!

Many hours were spent working with NYNEX and Contoocook Valley Telephone exchanges, making sure each phone number had the correct street name and house number.

The real detective work was when people have their phone as a business, and we had no idea who or where that business was. Rentals were also a challenge.

Tuftonboro has four telephone exchanges: 539, 544, 569, and 253; and six zip codes: 03816, 03894, 03864, 03853, 03850, and 03854. We had to work with the Post Offices trying to get everyone identified for correct mailing address.

No new number is given by the telephone companies without a street name and number given by the property owner; then the telephone company calls the town office to confirm.

Road signs that are vandalized or removed will be ordered and replaced only once a year.

Reminder: May 30, 1996 is the deadline for having your house numbers displayed.

TUFTONBORO BICENTENNIAL COMMITTEE 1995 REPORT

The Tuftonboro Bicentennial Celebration officially began on March 14, 1995 with the reading of a proclamation by Selectman Bill Rollins declaring the Bicentennial Year to be from March 14, 1995 to March 13, 1996.

The year was filled with a variety of bicentennial theme events which were all well attended by visitors and citizens of the town. A calendar of these events was published as the centerfold of a Commemorative Booklet featuring local businesses and an assortment of historical pictures. Newspapers and other media were used to provide publicity for individual events as they occurred. Pictures and news items featuring these events will be preserved in the Historical Society archives.

Pewter Medallions, sweatshirts, and other bicentennial memorabilia were on sale in local shops and at the Town House throughout the year and provided the primary source of funding for the program. Later in the year a tabloid style chronicle was published that was filled with historic facts, stories, and pictures as well as some selected pictures from the Bicentennial.

A committee comprised of selectmen, veterans, and Bicentennial Committee members is completing work for an update of the Town Veterans Monument. This project is expected to be completed in time for Memorial Day.

In January, six young women of the Tuftonboro Home School Group presented an oral history of Tuftonboro based on the lives of eight long-time residents whom they interviewed.

We will close the Bicentennial Celebration in conjunction with the annual Town Meeting on March 13, 1996. At that time the Tuftonboro Central School will present a History Fair and we will commemorate the first town meeting, seal up a time capsule for the Tricentennial, and acknowledge some of the many people who helped make this year's program a success.

All bills have been paid, and money has been set aside to pay for the update of the Veterans Monument and repay the Town's advanced funding. A small surplus is expected which will be put to a use to be determined by the Bicentennial Committee.

Our sincere thanks to all the people who contributed time and talent to our town's Bicentennial Celebration. Thanks also to those who attended the events and made it fun.
