BOARD OF SELECTMEN

As we approach the millennium, let's take a moment to glance back at how we have become who we are today. The town of Atkinson has experienced a tremendous amount of growth since the days in 1767 when the first town meeting was held in a private residence. It was also during that century that Atkinson opened its first school (1774). The 1800's brought about the establishment of the Atkinson Free Library (1894), Supervisors of the Checklist (1878). The early 1900's brought about the establishment of the First Officer of the Trust Funds (1916), Cemetary Trustees (1906), a Road Agent (1922), and a Dog Officer (1917) The Atkinson Volunteer Fire Department was established in 1944 with a nine man department. Atkinson has continued to progress due mostly to the continued work and dedication of our volunteers in all facets of our town functions. We are indeed fortunate to have so many do so much.

Our volunteers come together and worked their vision for the benefit of the community. They spend countless hours at meetings. They work all day at their regular jobs and often meet in the evening, giving up time with their families and friends for the benefit of the community. All too often, there is little or no thank you for their efforts. I applaud you.

The Master Plan Update has been completed and is ready. The committee members made the project look easy but hundreds of man-hours went into this report. Your committee should be commended.

During this past year, we have seen some major accomplishment for the benefit of the town. In some cases, the projects have been enhanced by the generosity of the particular residents.

The Public Works Garage has been completed and is in use. This building became a reality because of the vision of the Building Needs Committee, the approval of the voters, and the efforts of Peter Lewis to give the town the most for our money.

The intersection of Sawyer Avenue and Main Street has been redesigned and the project is now complete. This project was done with the approval of the voters and the expanded parking lot at the Community Center was a result of Phil Busby's commitment to give something back to his community.

1998 was the culmination of a four-year revaluation of the properties in Atkinson. The last town wide assessment was done ten years ago. As a result of this work, everyone should be on a level playing field. This is a major step forward and benefits everyone. Atkinson enjoys one of the lowest tax rates in the area. Our current tax rate is \$16.98 per thousand at 100% valuation.

Our continued stability and steady growth doesn't just happen. It is a direct result of the efforts of our volunteers from Planning & Zoning, Building Needs, Cable Advisory, Code of Ethics, Conservation, Highway Safety, Fire Dept., Recreation, Recycling, Master Plan, and the many Trustees. The extensive efforts of the Municipal Budget Committee in tandem with the dedicated Town Employees, who handle the day to day activities, makes our Town of Atkinson ready for the future.

On a personal note. I would like to thank the Town of Atkinson and all those responsible for creating Brittany's Garden at the Community Center and the Atkinson Academy for the beautiful mural in the library. Brittany was thrilled to finally move to Atkinson so she could ride her pony through the woods and on the trails every day. Brittany loved her school, her teachers and her classmates. She was a very earing child

1999 Town Meeting Warrant

To the inhabitants of the Town of Atkinson, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs –

You are hereby notified to meet at the Dyke Auditorium of Atkinson Academy on Saturday, the thirtieth day of January next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to deliberate upon the articles included in the warrant.

You are also notified to meet on Tuesday the ninth day of March, 1999, at 8:00 o'clock in the morning in the Atkinson Town Hall, to vote by official ballot on the election of town officials and on all warrant articles. By vote of the Selectmen, the polls for the meeting will remain open from 8:00 o'clock in the forenoon until 8:00 o'clock in the evening.

Article 99-1. To choose all necessary officers for the coming year.

Article 99-2. Amendments to Zoning Section 300. <u>Definitions</u> to replace the definition of 'Junk' to update the verbiage to include contemporary examples of articles and to be consistent with other NH towns.

Existing Definition - J1 'Junk' means any old metals, old bottles, cotton or woolen mill waste, unfinished cloth, unfinished cotton or woolen yarns, old paper products, old rubber products, two or more unregistered motor vehicles, and other second hand articles, the accumulation of which is detrimental or injurious to the neighborhood. (1959).

Replace J1 'Junk' with the following new definition:

J1 'Junk': Any scrap, waste, reclaimable material or debris such as: unregistered vehicles, inoperable vehicles, tires, vehicle parts, equipment, paper, metal, glass, building materials, household appliances, machinery, brush, wood, lumber, etc., whether or not stored, for sale or in the process of being dismantled, destroyed, processed, salvaged, stored, baled, disposed or other use or disposition, the accumulation of which is detrimental or injurious to the neighborhood.

Recommended by Planning Board

Article 99-3. Amendment to Zoning Section 300. <u>Definitions</u> to add a new definition for 'Retail Enterprise' to compliment the listing in Section 510.

Add definition for a 'Retail Enterprise' as follows:

R1 'Retail Enterprise': An establishment engaged in selling goods or merchandise to the general public for personal or household consumption and rendering services incidental to the sale of such goods.

Recommended by Planning Board

Article 99-4. Amendment to Zoning Section 300. <u>Definitions</u> to add a new definition for 'Structure' to compliment the listing in Section 250.

Add definition for 'Structure' with the following:

S5 'Structure': Anything constructed or erected on or in the ground, or in the water, or an attachment to something having a fixed location on the ground, such as buildings, permanent or temporary; signs, carports, porches and other building features, including communications towers and antennas but not including sidewalks, fences, driveways, septic systems, boundary markers and field or garden walls or embankment retaining walls.

Recommended by Planning Board

Article 99-5. An Amendment to the existing Zoning Section 440. General Farming and the Keeping of Animals, 440:1, 440:1b and 440:1d to provide consistency concerning the keeping of large animals and to include 'pigs' in the examples given for 'large animals'.

Existing Sections in 440. General Farming and the Keeping of Animals Section 440.1 With the exception of pig raising (more than four), mink raising, and fox raising, general farming activity and the keeping of animals for other purposes shall be permitted provided the following criteria are met:

Section 440:1b Large animals (horses, cattle, or sheep) shall not be kept on lots of less than one acre. No more than one large animal shall be kept on a one-acre lot; not more than three (3) animals on a two-acre lot; and no more than five (5) animals on a three-acre lot.

Section 400:1d In residential areas, stables or shelters for riding (pleasure) horses shall be located a minimum distance of fifteen feet (15') from any lot line; and corral fences shall be a minimum of five feet (5') from any lot line.

Amend existing sections of 440 by making the following changes:

Section 440:1 delete - 'pig raising (more than four)'

Section 440:1b add 'pigs' after cattle.

Section 440:1d delete riding (pleasure) horses and replace with 'large animals'.

Recommended by Planning Board

Article 99-6. Vehicles to make it more consistent and size specific with the existing Section 450:1 Accessory Uses: Home Occupations.

Existing Section 480:1 Storage of Vehicles.

In residential areas, with the exception of farm vehicles, commercial vehicles parked on the premises must be wholly screened from the view of abutting property either by natural screening or by fencing at least equal in height to that of the vehicle itself. (1984)

Add the following sentence to the existing Section 480:1 Storage of Vehicles. 'Commercial vehicles in excess of 20,000 pounds gross vehicle weight are not permitted to be routinely parked in Residential Districts'.

Recommended by Planning Board

Article 99-7. An Amendment to the existing Zoning Section 510:1g in the <u>Permitted Use Chart</u> by adding the words 'or building' in order to make it consistent with the title of the existing definition 'A1 Accessory building or use'.

Existing Section 510:1g - Accessory use Existing Section definition A1 - Accessory building or use

Make the following change: Section 510:1g - Add words 'or building'.

Recommended by Planning Board

Article 99-8. An Amendment to the existing Zoning Section 800:7, which would clarify the intent that all buildings shall be completed within 2 years from issuance of the foundation permit.

Existing Section 800:7

Exteriors of a building shall be completed within two (2) years from the date of issue of the building permit, regardless of yearly renewal. (1991)

Replace the words 'building permit' with 'foundation permit'.

Recommended by Planning Board

Article 99-9. An Amendment to the 'Zoning Objectives and Guidelines' Section 500 to address the screening of industrial uses from abutting residential uses.

Existing Section 500:5 (CI) Commercial-Industrial Objectives
This district allows for the establishment of small-scale manufacturing opportunities
along with shopping and service opportunity locations. It is an area that must take into
consideration accessibility to truck and rail traffic and the availability of utilities or the
lack thereof. The accommodations of present home occupations outgrowing present
quarters are the purpose of creating and locating this district.

Add to the existing Section 500:5 (CI) Commercial- Industrial Objectives and Guidelines the following:

'Facilities need to be in harmony with abutting districts, which may contain residential uses. To accomplish this harmony, all material or products outside of the building must be suitably screened from streets and residential abutters.'

Recommended by Planning Board

Article 99-10. An Amendment to Zoning Section 510. <u>Chart of Permitted Uses</u> that limits the location of noxious uses and includes an existing footnote #4 which requires Site Plan Development Approval from the Planning Board.

By adding to the existing Section 510. <u>Chart of Permitted Uses</u> the following new five (5) items and existing footnote #4:

Shall the Town vote to raise and appropriate up to the sum of One Million Two Hundred Seventy-one Thousand Four Hundred Twenty-five Dollars (\$1,271,425.00) for the construction and original equipping of a new Fire Station and associated site work, to improve approximately Seven Hundred (700) feet of Academy Avenue east from Main Street (Route 121) to allow access to the new Fire Station: to authorize the issuance of not more than One Million Twenty-one Thousand Four Hundred Twenty-five Dollars (\$1,021,425.00) of bonds or notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA 33) and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon: furthermore, to authorize the withdrawal of Two Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$250,000.00) from the Fire Department Capital Reserve Fund for such purpose? Article 99-12. Shall the Town vote to change the purpose of the Fire Department Capital Reserve Fund from "updating equipment for the Fire Department" to "construct facilities for the Fire Department"? The intent of this article is to allow for the transfer of existing Fire Department Capital Reserve Funds to help offset the cost of the proposed new Fire Station or facilities. The funds will be used to reduce the amount of the bond. (2/3 vote required)

Article 99-13. Shall the Town vote to change the purpose of the Sawyer Avenue Capital Reserve Fund from "renovating the road at the intersection of NH Route 121 (Main Street) and Sawyer Avenue" to "renovating the intersection at NH Route 121 (Main Street) and Academy Avenue, and to name the Selectmen as agent to expend from this fund"? The intent of this article is to allow for the transfer of existing Sawyer Avenue Capital Reserve Funds to help offset the cost of the proposed project at the NH Route 121 and Academy Avenue intersection. (2/3 vote required).

Should this article be defeated, the operating budget shall be Two Million One Hundred Sixteen Thousand Nine Hundred Forty-seven Dollars (\$2,116,947.00), which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the town or by law, or the governing body may hold one special meeting in accordance with RSA 40:13, X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only.

Article 99-17. Article 99-22. Shall the Town raise and appropriate up to the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00) for the purpose of updating the Police Department's computers and to authorize the Selectmen to sell, bid, or trade the present computers to help offset the cost of the new computers? This article is in addition to Warrant Article No. 99-14, the operating budget article.

Recommended by Board of Sclectmen Recommended by Budget Committee Article 99-23. Shall the Town accept the provision of RSA 33:7 providing that any town at an annual meeting may adopt an article authorizing indefinitely, until specific rescission of such authority, the selectmen to issue tax anticipation notes? (Majority vote required).

Article 99-24. Shall the Town authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen pursuant to RSA 33:7 and 33:7A or otherwise, to hire such sums of money as may be needed in anticipation of taxes?

Shall the Town raise and appropriate up to the sum of Nine Thousand Dollars (\$9,000.00) to renovate, upgrade and remodel the two existing bathrooms at the Community Center. The work will include painting, installation of new fixtures and flooring, upgraded plumbing and electrical work. This article is in addition to Warrant Article 99-14, the operating budget.

The Town will seek grant money that may be available to defray costs of the bins. This article is in addition to Warrant Article 99-14, the operating budget.

Article 99-31. Shall the Town adopt the following amendment to the Atkinson Code of Ethics Ordinance proposed by the Atkinson Code of Ethics Committee? This amendment would provide a broader representation of the voter on the Code of Ethics.

Amend Paragraph A under <u>Election of Code Ethics Committee</u> by adding the following after "Member at large [Three (3) years]: 1998-2001: The Code of Ethics Committee will be increased by two (2) members and will now consist of five (5) members. The two (2) additional members are to be appointed by the Town Moderator within 30 days of approval of this amendment. They may be appointed to serve until the next annual Town Election, at which time they may be elected to terms of one year and two years respectively. Upon completion of the one year and two year terms they may be elected to three year terms."

Article 99-32. Shall the Town adopt the following amendment to the Atkinson Code of Ethics Ordinance proposed by the Atkinson Code of Ethics Committee? This amendment will provide a clearer understanding of the intent of paragraph under <u>Exclusions</u> in the Code of Ethics Ordinance.

Proposed change is as follows:

Change the first sentence of Paragraph D under <u>Exclusions</u> to read "Those actions taken as part of the legislative process of making a law or laws which affect the community in general are exempt from the provisions herein."

Article 99-33. Shall the Town adopt the following amendment to the Atkinson Code of Ethics Ordinance proposed by the Atkinson Code of Ethics Committee?

This amendment would allow a review and evaluation of inquires and alleged violation to determine if they are within the committee's jurisdiction or are without merit.

Proposed change is as follows:

Change the first sentence of paragraph C under <u>Procedures for Inquiries and Alleged Violations</u> to read "After review, evaluation, and appropriate investigation the Code of Ethics Committee shall, within thirty (30) days of the petition having been taken up by the Committee, make a finding on the inquiry or alleged violation."

Recommended by Board of Selectmen

Article 99-34. Shall the Town adopt the following amendment to the Atkinson Code of Ethics Ordinance proposed by the Atkinson Code of Ethics Committee?

This amendment would provide improved compliance with RSA 31:39a and Paragraphs E, F, and G under <u>Procedures for Inquires and Alleged Violations</u> in the Code of Ethics Ordinance.

Proposed change is as follows:

Change Paragraph D under Procedures for Inquiries and Alleged Violations to read "Pursuant to RSA 31:39a, violating this code shall be grounds for recommending disciplinary action to be taken by the Board of Selectmen if found by the majority vote of the Code of Ethics Committee".

Recommended by Board of Selectmen

Article 99-35. Shall the Town adopt the following amendment to the Atkinson Code of Ethics Ordinance proposed by the Atkinson Code of Ethics Committee?

This amendment would provide relief to the Town of being held responsible for actions and charges of alleged violations of the Code of Ethics made by an individual.

Proposed change is as follows:

Change Paragraph I, under Procedures for Inquiries and Alleged Violations by deleting "If a member who retains legal representation is found not in violation, the "Town shall be responsible."

Article 99-36. By petition of Jane E. Cole, etal: "Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) to provide Dental Insurance for the town's eligible employees?" This article is in addition to Warrant Article 99-14, the operating budget.

Recommended by Board of Selectmen Not Recommended by Budget Committee

Article 99-37. By petition of Peter A. Lewis, etal: To see if the voters will vote to reduce from One Hundred Percent (100%) to Fifty Percent (50%) placement of the revenue of all future payments collected under NH RSA 79-A:7 in a Conservation Fund in accordance with NH RSA 36-A:5, III, to be deposited in the Conservation Fund at the time of Collection.

Article 99-38. By petition of Joseph DeRosa, etal: To see if the Town will vote to establish the position of Town Administrator with a salary range of \$40,000 to \$48,000 and raise and appropriate up to Forty Eight Thousand Dollars (\$48,000) for same. - 3. A complete set of plans is needed for all new homes/additions/decks/garages before a permit is issued.
- 4. Permits must be displayed on the job site.

BUILDING NEEDS COMMITTEE

This year the Building Needs Committee is pleased to report Atkinson's new Public Works Garage Facility has been completed on time and within our budget.

The remainder of this year, we have concentrated very hard on the warrant article proposal for the new Fire Station Facility. We believe we have devised a suitable plan to not only meet today's needs but to meet the needs for many years into the future. We have received input for the planning and designing of the building from the Fire Chief, EMT's, Board of Engineers, and Fire Department personnel.

Our Committee used the firm of Samyn-Delia Architects, P.A. for the design. The proposed building has approximately six thousand square feet of apparatus storage for up to ten vehicles and the administration area has a footprint of twenty-six hundred square feet on the same level. A finished below-level and an unfinished second floor has been designed.

Keeping in mind the financial needs of today's taxpayers, we reached the conclusion that bonding over a fifteen-year period would cause the least tax burden. Each new homeowner in the years of the life of the bond would be paying their fair share of the cost.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone who worked so hard to provide us with much needed information.

Also, I would like to thank everyone who attended the Public Works Facility Open House.

All of the Building Needs Committee meetings are open to the public. We encourage interested persons to attend.

CABLE TV ADVISORY BOARD

During 1998, the Atkinson Cable Advisory Board, assisted by expert counsel, completed the investigations and preparations leading to our currently ongoing negotiations of a new franchise agreement with Harron Communications Corp. The original franchise agreement expired in May of 1998 and is being extended, as necessary, until the new agreement is in place.

Significant activities already completed included:

- * Identification of Atkinson's future cable related needs and interests.
- * Review of Harron's past performance against provisions of the old agreement.
- * Study of current "state of the art" CATV technology and rapidly evolving industry trends.
- * Review of other areas CATV operators service offerings and system upgrade plans.
- * Comparison of the provisions of other recently negotiated franchise agreements in the surrounding area.

As the Board has noted in previous communications, Federal law governs both contract negotiation procedures as well as what aspects of cable service local authority may regulate. Cable TV rates, channel offerings, and the content of various tiers of service are among the items not subject to local control.

In light of the above, the board has identified the following as among key provisions which we wish to see included in the new agreement:

- * Increased system bandwidth capable of supporting additional channel capacity as well as the latest interactive digital services such as high speed Internet access.
- * Provision for increased support for Public, Educational and Government (PEG) access.
- * Periodic review of system capability during the life of the contract to assure that the technology provided by Harron remains on a par with systems in other local communities.

To date, several draft franchise agreement proposals have been exchanged and reviewed by both Harron and the Board. There has been one significant face-to-face meeting between Harron management and the Board, which included our respective counsels. Progress towards a final agreement continues. We all look forward to a successful conclusion of our negotiations with a franchise agreement that will meet both the current and future needs of all the residents of Atkinson.

The Board wishes to thank all of those residents who have responded to our request for input and to encourage all of you to continue to do so.

KIMBALL PUBLIC LIBRARY

If "change" were the key word for 1997, then only "warp speed" can describe the pace of change that has taken place in the past fifteen months. After the departure of Joe Rodio in October of 1997, Greg Sauer became the new Director. But eight months later, Greg moved on and a search was launched for a new Director to lead the Kimball Library into the next century. At the end of November, the Trustees hired Mitchell L. Perlow as the new Director. Mitchell will face continuing technological challenges and the even greater challenge of expanding and rehabilitating the inadequate facility in which the Library is now housed.

Over the past year, the Library has dramatically increased its materials collection to meet the Town's needs with special emphasis on new fiction, CD's and videos. In addition, the Library is now offering Internet access to our patrons. For our patrons with special needs, the Library continues to purchase large print books. Through the continued graciousness of our "Friends" and The Ruth Campbell Trust, we continue to make passes available for all of our residents to visit various museums and attractions in the New England area. In addition, funding from the "Friends" has allowed us to sponsor numerous programs and special events for the benefit of the adults and children.

Without question, the single greatest issue facing the Library is the lack of adequate space for even the smallest improvements, and the overall condition of the building which is preventing any innovative improvements to our electronic databases - the heart of any library of the future. We are underwired and overwhelmed in a facility that was never intended to support the new technologies. Problems of handicapped access, static electricity (a fatal disease for our computers) and a building that is far smaller than is necessary to support the expanding functions of the Library has caused us, and our past two Directors, to have increasingly limited options. This is our Library and in the near future it will take your help, ideas and support to allow us to provide you with the tools that you and your families will need to meet your informational needs and to compete in the global economy of the next century.

We wish to thank our staff and volunteers for their efforts, under often adverse conditions, to provide the very best service to the residents of Atkinson. Finally, we want to thank all of you, who in the past, have supported the Library and who we are counting on in the future to continue to support us so we can do the job that is necessary to insure that you receive the services to which you are entitled.

ATKINSON CONSERVATION COMMISSION 1998 ANNUAL REPORT

The year 1998 was a very busy and interesting one for the Atkinson Conservation Commission. In addition to our usual responsibilities with wetland project permitting and acting as an advisory panel to the Planning and Zoning Boards, the Commission was kept busy with a variety of land conservation and community education projects.

Perhaps the biggest conservation event of the year was the passage at the 1998 Town Meeting of a petitioned warrant article which increased the percentage of the Current Use Change Tax allocated to our Conservation Fund from 10% to 100%. Thus, the large amount of continuing development in Atkinson became a mixed blessing: While the continued loss of open space and forested land is disturbing, the significantly larger contributions to the Conservation Fund are making us more optimistic that we will be able to save some of the more valuable scenic and open areas.

In the area of land conservation, the Commission purchased one parcel of 12 acres on the east side of Town, to be known as the Forest J. and Hazel M. Hanson Town Forest. An additional 1.7 acre parcel of land was donated to the Town by the First Essex Bank. We also obtained agreements to purchase an additional two parcels of land near the historic Sawmill Swamp wetlands complex, and hope to complete that purchase early in 1999. The Commission is continuing to investigate the possibility of acquiring or protecting (through conservation easement) land parcels in Town which are significant from an ecological and/or scenic perspective. We are always interested in talking with landowners about the variety of financial arrangements and land use practices which can be mutually beneficial to both the owner/seller and to the Town.

The Conservation Commission conducted several projects in community outreach and education in 1998. We sponsored a classroom program at the Atkinson Academy during Enrichment Day in the spring. The theme of the day being "Earth Day", we presented a program on the benefits of wetland protection. It featured a classroom video presentation followed by a "field trip" to the pond in front of Town Hall, where we explored the variety of wildlife living there. Continuing our community outreach efforts to Arbor Day, the Commission handed out 200 spruce and fir tree seedlings to Townspeople for beautification of their own backyards.

In 1998, the Conservation Commission made significant progress in getting our Town Forest Management Program back on track. Our forestry consultant spent considerable time walking our forest lands and updating the management plan in preparation for some long overdue thinning and harvesting operations. As the year ended, we were preparing the first of these operations on the Chambers-Fila Town Forest in the Northeast corner of Town. As part of this operation, the Commission sponsored a series of open-to-the-public woods walks to observe the before, during, and after effects of the forestry work, and the careful planning and execution which goes into these operations.

And finally, we would like to remember a dedicated conservationist and friend to all, Mrs. Jane Jones, who passed away in January, 1998. She will be missed by all who shared her love and appreciation of our natural environment.

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PLANNING BOARD

1998'has proven to be a busy year for the Planning Board and Sub-Committees. Monthly review of plans, both residential and commercial, has increased and we are finally seeing activity and building in the Commercial Zone.

A special "thank you" to a dedicated Sub-Committee, chaired by Susan Killam, and served by many residents. Because of their many hours of work, our Master Plan has been updated, completed, reviewed and adopted. Our many thanks to all the residents who returned their Master Plan Update Questionnaire; your input was most valuable. This newly adopted Master Plan is now in a loose-leaf format, which will allow the Town to update specific sections which will be more efficient.

A School Impact Fee was voted in by the Townspeople and the Planning Board adopted an update to the Educational Section of the Atkinson CIP which incorporated the adoption of the Timberlane Regional School District, District Wide Capital Improvements Plan The "Driving Force", dated January, 1998, prepared by the H.L. Tumer Group, Inc.

During 1998, the Planning Board made the following changes to Subdivision, Site Plan and Building Code Regulations:

New definitions for Continuous Sound; Daytime; Decibel-A weighted; Impulsive Sound; Nighttime and Periodic Sound. They also revised Section 685, <u>Performance Standards</u>, added new Section 380:3, amended Road Specifications; adopted the latest revisions of previously approved NFPA Codes; Inserted new Section 605, Operational Considerations; new Subsection 810:1q; new Section 690, Minimum Landscaping Requirements; reworded Section 810:1(h); new Section 540:2c.

In 1999, the Planning Board will designate a committee to begin work on an updated Capital Improvement Plan, which will become part of the new 1998 Master Plan.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

Dear Residents:

1998 was a very productive year for your Highway Department. With your support of the budgets and warrant articles, I was able to repave Sawmill Road, Summit Drive Extension, Upper Maple Ave., Woodlawn Ave., Birch Drive and a portion of Lower Maple Ave. Repaving is the most visible portion of your Highway budget. By applying a shim course, I am able to level the existing surface, then add a consistent one inch overlay. This not only makes the road ride better, but also adds structural strength. I'd like to explain that repaving is an effective maintenance procedure for roads that have only moderate defects, such as minor rutting and cracking. This is recommended for roads between 10 and 15 years old.

Roads that have defects on most of their surfaces and minor geographic problems are handled by a more extensive procedure called reclamation. This is where our warrant articles come in. In 1998, the warrant article for Sawyer Avenue survived the budgetary process. I am very proud of this whole project. First and foremost, this project corrected a serious safety problem at the intersection of 121 (Main Street) and Sawyer Avenue. The project made a 70-degree intersection into a 90-degree intersection, which significantly improved the driver's ability to see southbound traffic on Rte 121. The project also lifted the roadbed nearly 17 feet, making the intersection meet Atkinson Safety Standards for grades and slopes. The remaining scope of the project, 3,900 feet up to the Meditation Lane intersection, consisted of a simple reclamation and pave. All went smoothly, and make Sawyer Avenue a much safer and more enjoyable road to travel.

A secondary benefit of the Sawyer Avenue Project was the creation of a large parking lot at our Community Center. Through negotiation between myself, the Selectmen and the contractor (Busby Construction), we were able to lower the cost of the Sawyer Avenue project by \$7,000.00 by moving the Town's own materials from the Community Center to Sawyer Avenue. The contractor removed the remaining over burden, graded, compacted and graveled the new parking area at no cost to the Town. Everyone benefited by these negotiations; there were no losers.

1999 has had a bright start. The budgetary process went smoothly. The Highway budget was supported and approved by the Board of Selectmen and the Budget Committee. Although a few cuts were made in the winter budget, a very workable budget remains. The two warrant articles for 1999 are for Providence Hill Road and West Side Drive. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee approve both projects, and with your support at the upcoming elections we will finally have the last two collector roads driveable and maintainable. I truly believe that 1999 is going to be the year!

In closing, I would like to thank the Building Needs Committee for a functional and beautiful new facility, and the Board of Selectmen, Budget Committee and the Town's People for working together to make our Highway system safe, affordable, and much nicer to drive on!

RECYCLING COMMITTEE

The Recycling Center, now in its' seventh year of operation, has recently undergone changes. This program is no longer run by Volunteers, and is now under the responsibility of the Highway Department

As discussed at last year's Town Meeting, curbside recycling would complete the circle for the Town Recycle Program. The town is looking to go to curbside recycling when the present contract expires in June 1999

There are several very important factors that make this an immediate issue. First, the Trash Company that has serviced our town has changed hands twice during the past year. The Trash Company was also responsible for the removal of our recycled materials. Secondly, and most important, the aluminum can redemption center that we have been using has moved out of state, and the town is in the process of finding a replacement.

In order for the curbside program to become a reality, it is necessary that Warrant Article 99-30, which is on the ballot this year, pass. The recycling process would be much easier for everyone by just placing recycled items in proper containers at curbside.

I have retired as the Recycling Coordinator and at this time would like to take the opportunity to thank my Board of Directors for all their help and guidance through the years. Thank you to the Superintendent of Schools and the Timberlane School Board for the use of the land which belongs to the school district. This report would not be complete if the help, guidance and support of the Selectmen both past and present were left out. Thanks go to all the people in the Selectmen's office who have always been so supportive and helpful no matter what the issues were. Lastly I want to thank the town for allowing me to serve as a Volunteer. It has been a rewarding experience for me and I urge anyone who wants to serve and help the town to give it serious thought and do so.

POLICE DEPARTMENT'S 1998 TOWN REPORT

During 1998, we experienced a relatively quiet year. We only had one "house break" up to the middle of December. At that time, we had approximately six(6) out-side sheds or garages broken into. The thieves were looking for tools and were very selective in what they took. In 1998, we applied for, and received, a federal police grant in the amount of thirty-five thousand (\$35,000.00) to fund a neighborhood police officer. This officer will be staying strictly in the neighborhoods keeping a close surveillance on the residential areas. This grant will be in place for three(3) years and, hopefully, will provide the additional patrol coverage that has, in the past, proven to be very beneficial in reducing house breaks and other daytime neighborhood problems. The following is a comparison of the criminal activity for 1996, 1997 and 1998.

During 1998, I celebrated my thirtieth year as a police officer for the Town of Atkinson. I have seen a lot of changes over the years. One of the greatest changes was the hiring of our first Captain. Captain Patrick Yatsevich was a seventeen-year veteran of the Claremont Police Department and is providing our department with some fresh ideas and he is helping me with running the day-to-day operations of the department. I am very pleased with his performance and have great expectations that he will grow with knowledge of our community and continue to play a very important role in the operation of our agency. It has been rather hard to hire and maintain good full-time officers. This is due to the fact that once they realize that Atkinson has the lowest crime rate in the area, and that the chances of promotion within the full-time ranks is extremely limited, they find that this is almost a dead-end job. For these reasons, they are constantly looking for larger agencies that will provide them with more of a challenge and the possibility of promotions. In 1998, our department received a total of 16,974 calls. This year's case load pertaining to domestic violence has dropped from last year. This, generally is the case, when the economy is in good shape and money problems are not high on our daily concerns.

The Police Department has expanded its senior citizen programs to now include the handling of consumer problems. Community Service Officer, William Anderson, has been able to provide this type of assistance. He has been in the building trades for over thirty(30) years. Since he has been employed by the agency, we have had quite a few seniors take advantage of his expertise in this field. We are still offering rides to the doctors, picking up groceries and prescriptions at our local pharmacies. Our agency can provide almost any type of service that our seniors could ask for, all they have to do is give us a call. We are constantly updating our "Reliable Contractors" list. This list will provide contractors that will afford our seniors with a ten (10) percent discount when they mention that they obtained their name from this list.

I have in the past, and will continue in the future, to make myself available to any Atkinson resident. I can be reached through the Police Department at 362-4001 or at my home at 362-5627. All members of the Police Department are dedicated to providing the residents of Atkinson with the most efficient and professional police services possible. Please drive defensively, love and respect they neighbor, and, make 1999 a safe, memorable, and enjoyable year.

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements of the Town of Atkinson, New Hampshire, for the year ended December 31, 1997, we considered the Town's internal control structure to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the financial statements and not to provide assurance on the internal control structure.

However, during our audit, we became aware of a matter that is an opportunity for strengthening internal controls and operating efficiency. A summary of our comments and suggestions regarding these matters follow. The information in this summary does not affect our report dated April 14, 1998 on the financial statements of the Town of Atkinson, New Hampshire.

We will review the status of these comments during our next audit engagement. We have already discussed these comments and suggestions with various Town personnel, and we will be pleased to discuss them in further detail at your convenience, to perform any additional study of these matters, or to assist you in implementing the recommendations.

CURRENT YEAR'S FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS/TRUSTEE OF TRUST FUNDS

<u>FINDING</u>: In reviewing the Trustee's reports, we noted that the U.S. Securities (Capital Reserves) were being reported at market value and not at cost.

<u>RECOMMENDATION</u>: The U.S. Securities should be reported at cost. Once the securities are sold, the Trustee would then realize the gain or loss.

<u>BENEFIT</u>: This will give a more accurate value at year end of the Town's Capital Reserve Funds.

MANAGEMENT'S COMMENTS: The 1997 MS-9 will be corrected, and in the future, <u>all</u> U.S. Securities will be recorded at cost. The zero-coupon bonds (U.S. Securities) were reported at market value for two reasons: (1) to reconcile the Town's reports with the Dean Witter statement; and (2) to provide the Townspeople and the Budget Committee with a more accurate and better defined value, because the bonds are purchased at a discounted rate, with the original issued discount (OID) being reportable to the IRS. The auditor stated that a notation would be made noting the actual market value of the capital reserve account in their financial statements for the year end. Such a note would not appear in the Annual Town Report. To this end, the Trustees will include a notation on their summary report for the Town. We are in the process of working with the auditor to correct the capital reserve account and apologize for any inconvenience this may have caused.

SOUTHEASTERN NEW HAMPSHIRE HAZARDOUS MATERIALS MUTUAL AID DISTRICT

The Southeastern New Hampshire Hazardous Materials Mutual Aid District is organized as a regional solution to the hazardous materials response problem. The purpose of the District is to prepare our communities, regionally, for responses to hazardous materials incidents, both with training and equipment. The 14 communities that comprise the District are: Auburn, Atkinson, Chester, Danville, Derry, East Derry, Hampstead, Hooksett, Litchfield, Londonderry, Pelham, Plaistow, Salem, and Windham.

The District is managed by an Operations Committee, consisting of a Chief Officer from each member community, who carry out the day-to-day business of the organization; and a Board of Directors, consisting of an elected or appointed member of municipal government in each member community, who provide oversight and fiscal management.

District resources include two response trailers, equipped with generators, oil spill and decontamination equipment, chemical reference material, protective suits, and communications equipment. The District also owns a response truck, equipped in the same manner as the trailers. The District trailers and truck are strategically located to respond to any community requesting them. An EMS Mass Casualty trailer located in Londonderry, is available for response to medical incidents with a large number of patients.

The District's Level "B" Hazmat Team, comprised of fire personnel from member communities, has responded to many incidents and has received praise from regulatory agencies on the professionalism of its operation. The Team trains monthly, and is "on call" to respond to member communities to conduct research, advise the incident commander on control activities and safety, and fill incident command system staff positions. They also assist member communities with planning, since the District has been recognized as a Regional Local Emergency Planning Committee, to comply with SARA Title III of the federal regulations governing hazardous materials. This allows the District to be eligible for Emergency Management Assistance funding.

This year the District membership fee has increased from \$3,500 to \$5,000 per community as a result of analyzing the first full year of the Level "B" Team's operation. The District is also pursuing "Partnering With Industry" as a method of obtaining equipment to keep our costs reasonable. Our Board of Directors has also authorized us to conclude mutual agreements with other regional Hazmat response organizations.

The District continues to make progress in providing the most cost effective manner of responding to a hazardous materials incident.
