## ANNUAL REPORT 1995



The Highway Department building addition plans first began in the winter of 1994. Prior to the mid 50's, the garage had been located in a shed-like structure behind the Torrent Hose Company (now the lower end library/Penacook Rescue Building). In the 1950's they moved into a barn-like structure on Woodbury Lane. In 1962 a cement block addition was built and in 1974 a two bay addition was added.

Thank you to the townspeople for the approval in March, 1995 of the \$35,000 warrant article to expand and improve this facility. We now have a facility that will enable our equipment to be maintained more efficiently, being ready for use when needed and to be more quickly and efficiently repaired if necessary. Thank you to the town crew and the volunteers for completing a job that is appreciated by the townspeople.

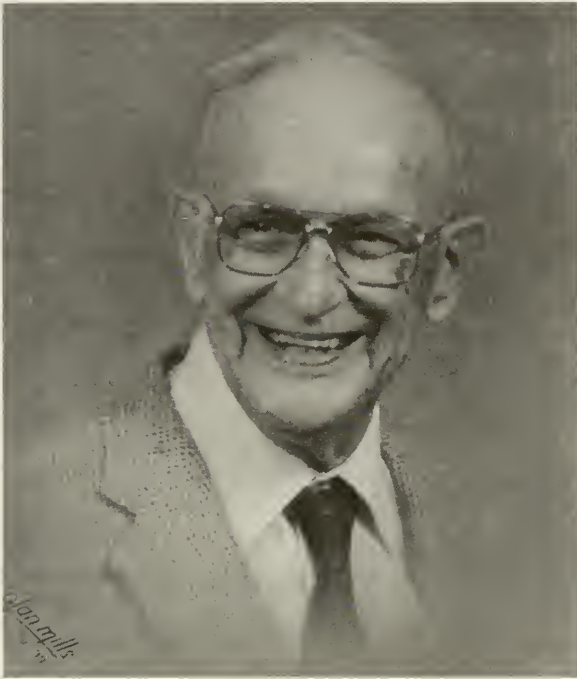

Walter Silver or "Theo", as he was best known to his friends, was born in Boscawen. He was a descendant of Chief Passaconaway, having the Indian name of "Ponbakin". He had two careers, first as an electrical engineer for fifteen years, then as a Biologist for the New Hampshire Fish & Game Department for twenty-five years. Theo became widely known as a historian of this area and other parts of the state. His sense of humor and numerous stories will be missed. He and his wife, Linnea, collaborated on a history of Boscawen and Webster which is due to be published this year.

**THE POLLS WILL BE OPEN FROM 10:00 A.M. TO 7:00 P.M.**

To the Inhabitants of the town of Boscawen in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Boscawen on Tuesday, the Twelfth day of March, next at Ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To see if the Town will vote to change the term of the Town Clerk from one year to three years. (Special ballot)

You are further notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Boscawen the Twelfth day of March, next at 7:30 P.M. to act upon the following subjects:

3. To see if the municipality will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,259,031 which represents the operating budget. Said sum does not include special articles addressed. Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.
4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$21,750 for the purchase of a police cruiser. Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.
5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$61,500 to purchase a Highway Dump Truck and authorize the withdrawal of \$30,000 from the Capital Reserve Fund created for that purpose. The balance of \$31,500 is to come from general taxation. Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required)
6. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of replacing a fire truck and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000 to be placed in this fund. Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required)
7. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of reconstruction of the Town Tennis Courts and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000 to be placed in this fund.

Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required)

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,000 to pave the Fire Station area and to resurface the Town Office parking lot. Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,000 to do restroom area renovations at the Town Hall. Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$19,500 to help support the Penacok Rescue Squad for its emergency medical services and rescue operations for the Town. Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$6,489 for the services of Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association. Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$3,976 for services to low-income residents of Boscawen through the Concord Area Center Community Action Program, Belknap-Merrimack Counties, Inc. Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$3,800 toward the operating expenses of the Penacook Community Center. Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$2,000 for improvements to the Historical Society Building, Selectmen and a majority of the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

15. To see if the Town will vote to accept Depot Street, recently upgraded and reconstructed by the State of N.H., as a Class V Highway to be owned and maintained by the Town of Boscawen. Selectmen recommend this article.

16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize indefinitely, until specific rescission of such authority, the Selectmen to accept, on behalf of the Town, gifts, legacies, and devises made to the Town intrust for any public purposes, as permitted by RSA 31:19.

17. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

## SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The front cover of this year's annual report indicates what a limited amount of dollars, coupled with an unlimited amount of pride, dedication, and skill can be achieved (your new Highway Garage). This facility should serve us well into the future and prove to be a cost effective work place.

You will notice several articles in this year's warrant requesting money to be set aside in capital reserve funds. This method of funding contribute to the relatively level budgets that we have experienced in the last few years, reducing large spikes in the town tax rate.

Another article in the warrant asks the voters to accept Depot Street as an official town street. During the summer of 1995, the State of New Hampshire awarded contracts for the repair and upgrading of Depot Street. This included the removal of the railroad overpass, lowering the street level, reducing the curve and installing drainage. A new sidewalk was built on the south side from King Street to the Town Park. Many other improvements were included in this project. We were informed recently the entire cost of this effort was in excess of \$200,000!!

Recycling remains a key element in reducing our cost in solid waste. The 1996 tipping fee has been set at \$39.00 per ton, \$1.00 less than last year. This alone is a very meaningful savings. Glass, aluminum and other cans continue to find their way into trash sent to the incinerator. These not only add unnecessary tonnage, they also take up valuable space at the ash fill site in Franklin. Please help us keep the cost down, it is to your benefit to remove these materials from the trash and put them in the recycling areas.

Officer John Murray has resigned to accept a position with the Franklin Police Department. John's experience and expertise will be missed. In an effort to fill this vacancy, the Chief, Selectmen and several members of the community spent many months searching for a qualified replacement. This process began with reviewing resumes followed by oral board interviews, physical fitness testing, background investigations and drug & alcohol testing. The successful candidate must complete a polygraph exam and psychological profile. Auxiliary Officer Scott Leppard has accepted conditional employment and is scheduled to attend the N.H. Police Academy in April.

The Town Clerk has extended the hours on Wednesday to 7:00 p.m. Those unable to do their business during the normal business hours will appreciate the added convenience. Also you now may choose to obtain your state registration sticker through the Town Clerk's Office, saving a trip to Concord.

We would like to commend all the Town employees, their attention to detail and commitment, continue to make Boscawen a desirable place to live.

The volunteer spirit is alive and well in Boscawen. Many tasks would not be accomplished if not for volunteers to maintain our strengths and gains. The numerous board and committees continue to seek replacements. New ideas and differences in opinion are always welcome. Do not hesitate to share them. You can do this by contacting one of the Selectmen, a board or committee member or by coming into the Town office. As always we seek and appreciate your help.

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## BUDGET COMMITTEE REPORT

As a Committee, we feel we worked very well with the Selectmen and Department Heads to review all of the past year's expenses and the proposed expenses for the coming year.

There were some questions regarding the New Hampshire Municipal Association's Pay and Classification Study, so a special meeting was held on this subject. The study included the current salary of town employees and compared them to New Hampshire Communities of comparable size. The study resulted in new salary scales and rating for our town employees. The budget includes salary adjustments as a result of this study.

We strongly support the recycling work that is being done at the town facility to separate glass, cans, and paper. By recycling, these materials do not go to the incinerator, which results in considerable savings each year in tipping fees, as well as revenue from the sale of these recycled items. Please recycle!

The overall town budget for 1996 is down, but with the warrant articles, we could see a small increase if all items are approved.

As always, the Budget Committee is advisory only. Your Committee is in complete support of this year's budget.

The evening meeting was called to order at 8:05 P.M. by Moderator Rick Trombly who gave the results of the balloting.

The Moderator announced the rules for the meeting. He noted that Roberts Rules of Order would be followed. He reported the Town Meeting was subject to reconsideration under RSA 40:10 and explained the provisions of RSA 40:10.

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

*Official Weighers.* Claire Clark moved to re-elect the incumbents as listed in the Annual Report. Ronald Reed seconded. Motion passed.

*Surveyors of Wood and Lumber.* Douglas Supry moved to re-elect the incumbents as listed in the Annual Report. Dorothy Sanborn seconded. Motion passed.

*Fence Viewers.* Theodore Houston moved to re-elect the incumbents as listed in the Annual Report. Denise Pearl seconded. Motion passed.



Before the Meeting progressed, Selectman Houston read into the record the following proclamation honoring Barbara M. Holmes, retiring Town Clerk:

"To all here assembled be it known that

'WHEREAS, Barbara M. Holmes has been active in 4-H, Old Home Day Committee, and getting the Post Office re-opened; and

'WHEREAS, said Barbara M. Holmes has served as Ballot Clerk many years and Tax Collector for 6 years; and

'WHEREAS, said Barbara has judiciously and efficiently served as Town Clerk for 16 years, and

'WHEREAS, said Barbara M. Holmes has decided to close the register, have no permit, be off the record, do little notary, and be unlicensed

'We the undersigned do congratulate her on the occasion of her retirement and do hereby declare Wednesday, March 15, 1995, Barbara M. Holmes Day.

Signed by the Board of Selectman — Douglas R. Supry, Theodore J. Houston, Jr., and Thomas Danko."

Moderator Trombly then read into the record the following proclamation from the New Hampshire House of Representatives:

"State of New Hampshire House of Representatives

'A DECLARATION

'Let it be known that the New Hampshire House of Representatives, on this occasion, publicly does recognize and does grant its hearty and sincere congratulations to Barbara Holmes in Recognition of her retirement as Boscawen Town Clerk after 37 years of devoted and loyal service. And be it further known that the New Hampshire House of Representatives, by virtue of the Speaker's signature inscribed below, also does duly extend its highest accolades and plaudits.

Signed by Harold W. Burns, Speaker of the House."

Ms. Holmes accepted the proclamations and thanked everyone for all the kind words.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the municipality will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,322,135 which represents the operating budget. Said sum does not include special articles addressed.

Douglas Supry moved to raise and appropriate \$1,322, 135 to defray town charges for the ensuing year. Thomas Danko seconded.

Mr. Danko moved to amend the sum to \$1,303,275. Theodore Houston seconded. Mr. Danko explained that the issue of hiring a new police chief was settled after this year's budget committee meetings. It was felt that the town had run well with only four officers in the police department and the Town could continue to operate with four officers. That decision reduced the police department budget by \$23,860. He also explained that \$5,000 had been added to the executive department budget. The amendment passed.

William Heinz asked where in the police budget the \$23,860 came from and Mr. Danko explained.

The motion as amended passed.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$24,000 for the purchase of a four wheel drive pick up truck with a plow for the Highway Department.

Ray Fisher moved to accept Article 4 as read. Mr. Danko seconded.

Mr. DeStefano asked what kind of truck the Town would get for just \$24,000. Mr. Houston explained the advantage of State bids would allow for the type of truck the highway department would like. There being no further discussion, the Article was adopted.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 to be added to the Highway Dump Truck Capital Reserve Fund previously established.

Ronald Reed moved to accept Article 5 as read. Douglas Supry seconded. There being no discussion, the Article was adopted.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$35,000 for a 38' x 40' addition to the Highway Garage. This addition replaces a 38' x 30' area to be removed.

Donald Welcome moved to accept Article 6 as read. Thomas Danko seconded. Mr. Welcome felt the building should be constructed at the town dump site since there would be room for expansion there that is not available now. There being no further discussion, the Article was adopted.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$9,500 for the development and production of new computerized (digital) tax maps, to include a Town-wide parcel composite map with insert map for the Town center area, a Town-wide tax map index, and individual tax maps equivalent in scale to existing tax maps. Targeted Block Grant for \$2,500 to be applied for.

Michele Tremblay moved to accept Article 7 as read. Robert Knowlton seconded. Charles Niebling asked who the grant would be from and was told it was a State grant through the Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission. There being no further discussion, the Article was adopted.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$5,000 for improvements to the Historical Society building.

Douglas Supry moved to accept Article 8 as read. Donald Welcome seconded.

Charles Niebling asked what improvements were proposed and Mr. Houston explained the need for work on the roof as well as waterproofing the building in order to keep the Town's history alive. There being no further discussion, the Article was adopted.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote on the following question: "Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:1-c which authorizes any town or city to elect not to assess, levy and collect a resident tax?"

Thomas Danko moved to accept Article 9 as read. Theodore Houston seconded.

Dorothy Sanborn felt it was crazy to throw away \$16,000 and reported she was against the article.

Phyllis Hewey, Tax Collector, reported that she had a petition with signatures from 160 residents who wanted to get rid of resident taxes. Boscawen was the only town in Merrimack County that still had a resident tax. She reported that on a \$100,000 assessment, this would cost \$15 on the property tax bill.

Michelle Tremblay felt this was the last fair tax. It would really penalize homeowners.

Sherlene Fisher mentioned that two people in one house would be paying \$20 a year in resident tax. She felt the resident tax should be abolished because it was a nuisance.

Ms. Hewey reported transients usually did not pay this tax. Keeping the lists up to date took hours.

James Colby thought the resident tax had to be paid before registering a car. Ms. Hewey answered this was often difficult to track down.

Ms. Tremblay felt it was a matter of enforcement.

Ronald Reed wondered if the new town clerk would be willing to enforce payment of the resident tax.

There being no further discussion, the Article was adopted.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$19,500 to help support the Penacook Rescue Squad for its emergency medical services and rescue operations for the Town.

Theodore Houston moved to accept Article 10 as read. Claire Clark seconded.

Mr. Houston mentioned this was the same sum as the last year or two and well worth the money. There being no further discussion, the Article was adopted.

ARTICLE 1. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$6,489 for the services of Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association.

Donald Welcome moved to accept Article 11 as read. Sandra Hardy seconded.

Ms. Hardy asked why the Town gave them money when everybody had to pay for services. Mr. Houston explained some services were not covered by insurance. There being no further discussion, the Article was adopted.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$3,976 for services to low-income residents of Boscawen through the Concord Area Center Community Action Program, Belknap-Merrimack Counties, Inc.

Ronald Reed moved to accept Article 12 as read. Sherlene Fisher seconded. There being no discussion, the Article was adopted.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$3,000 toward the operating expenses of the Penacook Community Center.

Claire Clark moved to accept Article 13 as read. Donald Welcome seconded. There being no discussion, the Article was adopted.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept, on behalf of the Town, gifts, legacies, and devises made to the Town in trust for any public purpose, as permitted by RSA 31:19.

Sandra Hardy moved to accept Article 14 as read. Francis Rostron seconded. There being no discussion, the Article was adopted.

ARTICLE 15. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

Douglas Supry mentioned that on March 5, 1995 an Open House was held at the Fire Station to let everyone see the work that volunteers had put into the addition to the building. The Selectmen were very proud of the work of the community. He reported that on March 5th the Selectmen had accepted the building from the citizens who did the work and it was now part of the town building complex.

Theodore Houston also publicly thanked members of the fire department and the auxiliary for the gift to the Town.

Thomas Danko mentioned the Upper Merrimack River Committee was still in business and Boscawen members were needed. If no one from Boscawen volunteered, the Selectmen would appoint a person from Concord who had expressed an interest in serving on the Town's behalf.

Mr. Danko also mentioned that if there was to be an Old Home Day this year, the Committee would need help.

Rick Trombly introduced Stephen DeStephano, one of Boscawen's Representatives to the General Court.

Cynthia Houston felt the town should extend its thanks to Kathy Reed for all the hard work she had put in to bring the trust funds up to date.

Barbara Holmes introduced Anne Hardy, the newly elected town Clerk.

Dorothy Sanborn moved to adjourn the meetings. Donald Welcome seconded. The meeting was adjourned at 8:40 P.M., Tuesday, March 14, 1995.

## INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT OF FINANCIAL PRESENTATION

To the Members of the Board of Selectmen  
Town of Boscawen  
Boscawen, New Hampshire

We have audited the accompanying general purpose financial statements of the Town of Boscawen as of and for the year ended December 31, 1994, as listed in the table of contents. These general purpose financial statements are the responsibility of the Town's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these general purpose financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the general purpose financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the general purpose financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall general purpose financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinions.

As described in Note 1B, the general purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the General Fixed Assets Account Group, which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. The amount that should be recorded in the General Fixed Assets Account Group is not known.

In our opinion, except for the effect on the financial statements of the omission described in the preceding paragraph, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Town of Boscawen as of December 31, 1994, and the results of its operations and cash flows of its nonexpendable trust funds for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

Our audit was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole. The combining and individual fund financial statements listed in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Boscawen. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the general purpose financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly presented in all material respects in relation to the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole.

I started off 1995 in an attempt to reduce the number of burglaries we were experiencing within the Town of Boscawen, which totaled (29) for the year 1994. As well as attempting to reduce the amount of reportable motor vehicle accidents which totaled (73) in the year 1994.

In an attempt to do this, I instructed my officers to start a highly visual patrol and asked them to become more aggressive in the enforcement of motor vehicle laws, going on the theory that if you are seen by the criminals it serves as a deterrent for them not to commit crimes and to drive at a reasonable and prudent fashion based on the conditions, thus reducing the burglary rate and the amount of reportable motor vehicle accidents, keeping our homes and highways safe for all of us.

I am happy to inform you that we were successful in our endeavors and reduce the burglary rate from (29) to 1994 to (12) in 1995, and reduce reportable motor vehicle accidents from (73) in 1994 to (53) in 1995. We did, however, see an increase of 712 calls for service in the year 1995.

The Police Department continues to be actively involved in our community through its community policing programs which include, the D.A.R.E. 1995 marked our sixth complete year of successful operations. Some items which may be of interest below:

The tonnage delivered to the plant by the Cooperative this year was 115,935. This was a decrease of 575 tons over 1994, or a .05% decrease. 1995 marked the third straight year the the Cooperative went over GAT. Our GAT for 1995 was 112,869 tons and 115,935 tons were actually delivered. A total of 65,299 tons of ash were delivered to the landfill for disposal. The landfill continues to operate well.

The 1996 budget reflects a decrease in the tipping fee of \$1.00 per ton. This is the second time that the Co-op has been able to reduce the tipping fee for the communities.

The ash paving demonstration project in Laconia continues to be monitored by UNH. The final report and permitting are to be completed easily this spring. All is going well with the project.

Phase III-A of the ash landfill was completed in December of 1995. Phase III-B construction will begin in the early spring of 1996. The completion of Phase III construction will provide approximately 9 years of disposal capacity.

## BOSCAWEN FIRE DEPARTMENT

The Boscawen Fire Department responded to 142 calls, a 4% increase from 1994. The average response time was 4.1 minutes.

Training programs are sponsored at Fitzwilliams, Lakes Region, Capital Area, NH Fire Academy and the fire station for the firefighters. Several men satisfactorily completed Firefighter One Course.

The Fire Prevention Programs are conducted at the local schools, as well as senior citizens organization in Town by the Fire Prevention Officer, Lt. Tim Kenney.

The addition to the fire department was completed this year. At the open house, it was turned over to the Town Selectmen. At this time I would publicly like to "THANK" Deputy Ray Fisher, Building Chairman; officers, firefighters, private citizens and the Ladies Auxiliary, for an excellent job well done. We have something to be very proud of.

Remember if you have any fire related problems, do not hesitate to contact the fire department. Be fire safe everyday, practice fire prevention 365 days a year. Install and maintain smoke detectors; they could save your life, as well as a loved one.

## TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER REPORT

In calendar year 1995, our three (3) leading causes of fires were Children, Non-Permit fires not properly extinguished and Smoking Materials.

Violations of RSA 224:27 II, the fire permit law and other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire, are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

To aid your Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department and State Forest Fire Officials, contact your local Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required. This also helps to prevent unnecessary response to a controlled burn.

### 1995 HEALTH OFFICER REPORT

In 1995 there were 35 calls. I would like to thank everyone who has cooperated in keeping Boscawen safe and clean. It is the duty of the Health Officer to inquire into concerns of health issues.

In responding to concerns regarding the legality of the local Health Officer trespassing on private property; in order to conduct an investigation of sanitary conditions and in fulfilling the duties of said officer, the Health Officer may enter upon private property, even if there is a "No Trespassing" sign. This includes the inspection of questionable private septic systems. The authority to enter upon private property for sanitary investigation purposes does not include the right to enter homes. If an inspection of a home is necessary, an Administrative inspection Warrant may be obtained under RSA 595-13.

I am also the Animal Control Officer in charge of Rabies. So far, no reports have been made to me, in the Town of Boscawen.

## BOSCAWEN PUBLIC LIBRARIES

The Library Trustees had asked for, and received, a significant increase in our 1995 maintenance budget. In addition we received a grant from the Governor's Office of Energy and Community Services which paid for an energy audit of both the Main and Branch libraries. That audit helped us to prioritize our energy improvement needs. A combination of those town funds and some matching money from that grant have helped us as we try to cut the operating costs on these two buildings. We were also able to make several needed repairs to both buildings. Energy efficient programmable thermostats were installed in both buildings. All exterior doors and windows have been adjusted and weatherstripped. The Branch library was insulated this year. The Main Library had its south wall repointed by a mason, the rotted rear entryway to the cellar was replaced, and the exterior woodwork on that building was replaced. That building was rewired in 1995. At the Branch, the rotted chimney base was rebuilt and the old battered door to the hose tower was replaced with an insulated door. With the improvements that have been made, and those planned for 1996, we believe that we can cut our heating bills by one third and at the same time make the buildings more comfortable for our patrons. We have reduced our budget for 1996 by more than 10% from last year and hope to reduce it again while making some needed improvements.

We would like to encourage all Boscawen residents to visit the Libraries.

## HUMAN SERVICE OFFICER'S REPORT

January 1 to December 31, 1995

The following figures show how we spent our Town of Boscawen welfare money during the year of 1995. We were able to stay within our budget of \$24,400.

Last year we reported 141 applications with a total spent of \$18,476.54. This year we had almost as many applications, but spent over \$4,500 more. This was due mostly to the increase in rent assistance. Boscawen badly needs more homes for low-income families. We spent almost as much in rent assistance as the total we spent last year.

We were fortunate again this year to receive grant money — this time from N.H. State Grant-in-Aid — and received the \$5,000 we applied for. Since we started applying for these grants in 1989, we have received \$22,750 — a tremendous help to our town and our welfare budget. Some of our clients are trying hard to repay the Town for the assistance given them when they needed our help so badly — this year the amount totaled \$2,890.57.

The Community Action Program (CAP) located on 44 Warren Street in Concord provides outreach to homebound people and many services to low-income families, handicapped and elderly people. The following figures show the amount of assistance CAP has given to Boscawen families in 1995:

If you are interested in any of these programs, you may call their office at 225-6880 to make an appointment to talk with someone there. The Town of Boscawen has an Article in the Town Warrant each year "To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$3,615 for services to low-income residents of Boscawen. . . " through the Community Action Program — and each year the Article is accepted as read. The amount may change each year, but this is the amount approved last year.

There are many State and Federal Programs available to needy families, and this information may be obtained at the Selectmen's office. We also have a listing of Food Pantries where anyone may obtain free food. The Capital Region Food Program is another Program which benefits our people all year long. We think of this Program mostly at Christmas time when so many of our people received food for their Christmas dinners. This Program also gives canned food for our pantry at the Selectmen's Office. At the United Church of Penacook delicious free suppers are served to needy families on Monday, Wednesday and Friday evenings from 4:30 to 5:30. Some of our people donate their time and food for these suppers. Several churches and groups in our area delivered food baskets at Thanksgiving time. For several years now the Windmill Restaurant in Concord has been open all day on Thanksgiving day to give free dinners to the needy.

Please continue to let us know of any needy people or families in our Town — especially the older people — who are reluctant to ask for help for themselves. We don't want anyone to go without shelter, heat, food, or medical care.

The "Toys for Tots" Program sponsored by the Boscawen Police Auxiliary and "The Giving Tree" sponsored by the Concord Hospital Auxiliary were again most successful. Both of these programs provided lovely gifts, toys, and clothing at Christmas time to needy children who probably wouldn't have received many gifts this Christmas. The Salvation Army helps families all year long not only at Christmas. Our Congregational Church and many groups selected whole families to remember at Christmas with gifts, food and clothing.

Our sincere thanks to the following who did so much too show the Spirit of Christmas all around us and to make the Holiday Season a brighter one for so many Boscawen people: Boscawen Congregational Church and Ladies Aid, the Boscawen Police Department and Women's Auxiliary, the Immaculate

Conception Church, the United Church of Penacook the Boscawen Woman's Club, the Ezekiel Webster Grange, the Boy Scouts and Cub Scouts, the Tri-Amity Guild, Merrimack County Ox Bows, the 4-H Club, the Town Line Trail Dusters, Steenbeke & Sons, the Visiting Nurse Association, Elektrisola, Concord Electric — and our Selectmen and Office Staff.

The Central New Hampshire Regional Planning commission (CNHRPC) is a voluntary association of 20 towns and the City of Concord in Merrimack and Hillsborough Counties. The Town of Boscawen is a member in good standing of the Commission.

Our mission is to improve, through education, training, and planning assistance, the abilities of the municipalities of the region to prepare and implement municipal plans; to prepare a plan for effective and appropriate development and utilization of the resources of the region; and to assist municipalities in carrying out the regional plan.

Member communities receive a variety of planning services, including telephone consultations on planning issues; planning research; sample ordinances, regulations, and planning documents; models; data and access to data sources; review and comment on planning documents; development review, and educational programs. Membership also entitles a community to below market cost planning services such as master planning assistance, GIS mapping, and grant preparation. During 1995, our services in Boscawen included: consulting on the zoning requirements for converting a nursing home into apartments, drafting amendments to the zoning ordinance for consideration by the Planning Board, and providing sample warrant articles to change the ordinance to allow more than 12 residential units in a single structure; consulting on proposed changes in non-conforming use; providing copies of Town subdivision regulations, site plan review regulations and zoning ordinances on disk; providing zoning interpretations to help determine if proposed uses are allowed; helping interpret prior planning board decisions regarding conditions of approval; consulting on the legal notice requirements for planning board hearings; helping to clarify who has the authority to sign applications for special exceptions; consulting on the requirements to operate a kindergarten in an existing church; consulting on whether growing and selling shrubs constitutes agriculture for purposes of zoning; consulting on whether an auto repair business could operate as a home shop; consulting on the setback requirements for replacing manufactured homes with "site built" homes; interpreting the zoning ordinance in regards to the use of a lot which is non-conforming due to the lack of frontage; providing information on how to process requests for the voluntary merger of adjacent parcels; and providing an interpretation on a change of use for a greenhouse.

The regional planning activities also directly benefit every community in the region. During 1995 our accomplishments included:

- adopting the Affordable Housing Assessment
- adopting the Regional Transportation Improvement Program, the capital improvement plan for transportation in the region.
- preparing a regional planning commission Representative Handbook
- helping communities in the Central Region access special federal transportation funds
- supporting the efforts of community representatives engaged in planning for the Contoocook, Merrimack, and Soucook Rivers
- presenting educational programs at our quarterly Commission meetings [topics: radon, Canterbury Shaker Village, and innovative septic systems]
- preparing and distributing a comparative analysis of zoning ordinances in the region and preparing an exclusionary zoning summary for each community
- creating a zoning amendment calendar to assist Towns with the amendment process

The Trustees have spent considerable time on continued care and improvements this year.

The cemetery regulations are being reprinted this year with several changes. Articles 4, 5, and 15 are being clarified in meaning.

Article 4 to read: "On January 1, 1996 the price of a single cemetery lot shall be \$200.00 per grave unit. \$150.00 of this amount shall be for perpetual care."

Article 5: "A concrete vault or liner is required for all burials, including a suitable container for cremation. Lots shall be for human remains only."

Article 15: "Lots shall be available subject to the decision of the superintendent and/or trustees."

Accomplishments the past year are:

Painting Beaver Dam fence.

Map of Pine Grove Cemetery by Ernest Veinnotte marking space for available lots. Pine Grove and Beaver Dam are the only approved cemeteries for burials in town.

Restoration of stones at Maplewood completed.

Walked Elliot, Plains and Beaver Dam Cemeteries.

We are appreciative of the families who have established trust funds. Some have come considerable distances to care for stones and to become acquainted with family lots. It is most encouraging for them to have shown this interest.

## BOSCAWEN ACADEMY TRUSTEES REPORT

The Trustees of the Boscawen Academy held their 1995 annual meeting on February 7th at the home of Roger Sanborn.

The incumbent officers were elected for the coming year. As well, the Trustees voted to appoint the current President of the Boscawen Historical Society or their appointed officer as an additional Academy Trustee. The Society's President, Cynthia Houston, accepted the appointment.

The four thousand dollar (\$4,000) trust fund was invested in a certificate of deposit. This year the steeple and weathervane will be appraised for repair and rehabilitation. Continued repair and repainting will be ongoing in the interior of the building.

Your Historical Society has been and continues to maintain information and artifacts relating to your town. Stop in and see what is here.



## CONCORD REGIONAL VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION

The Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association continues to offer three major health services to the residents of Boscawen: Home Care, Hospice and Primary Care.

*Home Care Services* respond to the health care needs of those patients with acute or chronic illnesses that require skilled professional and para-professional care so they may return to or remain in their homes. Emphasis is on promoting independence and maximum functioning of the patient within the least restrictive setting.

*Hospice Services* provide professional and para-professional services to the terminally ill patient with a limited life expectancy. The goal is to enhance the quality of the patient's remaining life by helping he/she remain at home in comfort and dignity. Emphasis is on pain and symptom management and skilled intervention to meet the patient's special physical, emotional and spiritual needs.

In April of 1994 Hospice expanded its service to provide residential care with the opening of New Hampshire's first Hospice House. To date, this house has provided a home to approximately 101 terminally ill residents.

*Primary Care and Preventive Services* expanded from a health promotion and prevention focus to Family Health Center focus. The focus provides healthcare in a whole-life approach that means treating the individual from birth to senior adulthood. The Family Health Center services include family-centered medical care, preventive care, adult and senior health, child health, Baby's First Homecoming, immunizations for all ages, school linked clinics, parent education and support, Family Planning and women's Health, obstetrical care, health education, nutritional counseling, HIV/AIDS counseling and testing, Mental Health Services and Sexually Transmitted Disease testing and treatment.

The Family Health Center offers 24 hours/day, 7 days/week service including physician care, hospital admitting privileges, and other care generally offered through a medical office setting. It is a joint initiative between Concord Hospital and Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association and it is an educational site for the NH/Dartmouth Family Practice Residency Program. Primary care physicians (from Concord Hospital's new Family Practice Residency Program), graduate education medical students (residents), registered nurse practitioners, registered nurses, social workers and other staff provided primary care to more than 7,800 clients in FY 95.

*Health Promotion Services* focus on the low and marginal income families and individuals to prevent illness by professional assessment and screening for health risks and needs, by early intervention to prevent, eliminate, or minimize the impact of illness and/or disability, and by anticipatory guidance and health teaching. Emphasis is on promoting healthy children, families and individuals through early intervention and health teaching. Services rendered in the clinic setting are: child health, prenatal, family planning, sexually transmitted disease, adult screening, immunizations, and HIV (AIDS) testing and counseling. Home

visits are made in crisis situations or when needed health care cannot be given in the clinic. Senior health services are provided at congregate housing sites.

Professional and para-professional hourly home services are provided on a private fee-for-service basis. Health education and instruction are part of each home visit or clinic visit.

Anyone in Boscawen may request service; patient, doctor, health facility, pastor, friend or neighbor. All requests are answered, but continuing home care will only be provided with a physician's order.

A call to Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association (224-4093) is all that is necessary to start services or make inquiries. The CRVNA office is open Monday through Friday from 7:30am to 5:00pm. A nurse is on call for hospice and home care patients; (224-4093) 4:30pm-7:30am daily.

Federal regulations specify a charge is applicable to all visits. Fees are scaled for the individual without health insurance and/or who is unable to pay the full charge. However, to fee scale, federal regulations require a financial statement be completed by the patient or responsible person. Town monies subsidize those visits that are scaled or that no fee is collectable.

This agency is certified as a Medicare/Medicaid Provider, licensed by the State of New Hampshire, accredited by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations (JCAHO) and is a member agency of the United Way of Merrimack County.

## BOSCAWEN CONSERVATION COMMISSION 1995

The hard work and dedication of Boscawen Conservation Commission (BCC) members was recognized this year by UNH Cooperative Extension and the NH Fish & Game Department. The BCC received a Wildlife Stewardship Award for their work in the Boscawen Town Forest. On November 18, Karen Bennett, county forester and Ellen Snyder, Educator in Wildlife both of UNH Extension Office, presented the award to the commission. Also on hand were members of the board of selectmen, John Conde, forester and Charlie Bridges and John Lanier of NH Fish & Game. After a brief presentation ceremony and refreshments, a walking tour of the Boscawen Town Forest was conducted. Highlighted were recent management activities including a 1994 timber harvest, trail work and soil-retention plantings. The BCC would like to recognize former member Rene Bollengier for his tireless work on the Boscawen Town Forest. His initiative on the cooperative agreement between the Commission and NH Fish & Game as well as the Boscawen Town Forest Management Plan, is responsible for the vision and focus of our Town Forest.

In other Town Forest activities, a trailhead kiosk was completed with a trail map and historical photographs of the Weir Farm, now a focal point of the forest. In October the BCC worked with Kathleen Jaworski, Clover Bud Organization Leader and over a dozen 4-H Earnest Workers to plant wildlife packages and seed skid roads, steep pitches and other open areas. With the assistance of Bob Quinn of Canterbury, a list of bird species in the Town Forest was compiled and will be updated yearly. The Commission has an aggressive workplan for 1996 including updating the Integrated Natural Resource Management Plan. Volunteers are always needed to help with trail work and other activities. We encourage everyone to visit the Boscawen Town Forest which is maintained and managed for all Boscawen citizens. Trail maps are stocked at the trailhead for easy exploration. Again, thanks this year to Lorenzo Pouliot for maintaining the trailhead and keeping the area clean.

Other BCC projects this year included research on a King Street Planting project and monitoring conservation easements for the Cummings (formerly Sahlin), Jones (formerly Emery) and Cabot properties. The BCC continues its monthly "Conservation Corner" column in the *Boscawen Newsvine* with each member writing a feature highlighting different activities of the BCC and other conservation issues.

Finally, Charles Niebling has retired as chairperson of the BCC. Charlie's leadership and forestry expertise has been key in the development of the Boscawen Town Forest as we know it today. The BCC is fortunate that Charlie will be continuing his active role as a member of the Commission.

The Boscawen Conservation Commission meets the 4th Thursday of each month at 7:00 P.M. in the Planning & Zoning building behind the church. The meetings are open to the public and all are welcome to attend. For more information please call Michele Tremblay, at 796-2615.

## UPPER MERRIMACK RIVER LOCAL ADVISORY COMMITTEE

The Upper Merrimack River Local Advisory Committee (UMRLAC) began 1995 with an aggressive workplan consisting of key actions from its *Management and Implementation Plan*.

The UMRLAC, a state established local advisory committee, had identified as one of its key actions in the plan, a water quality monitoring program for the upper Merrimack River. With the enthusiasm of the committee and the experience of committee member and NH DES aquatic biologist Steve Landry, members decided to go forward with the project. The UMRLAC, like other local advisory committees, had no means of supporting a project beyond the work of its volunteers. Recognizing this, the UMRLAC, in cooperation with the Merrimack River Watershed Council (MRWC) and the NH Department of Environmental Services (NH DES,) entered into a unique cooperative agreement to monitor water quality on the upper Merrimack River.

Both agencies have been assisting volunteer water quality monitoring projects by providing training and loaning equipment. The cooperative agreement between the three parties, the first of its kind, was drafted and signed and the Upper Merrimack Monitoring Project (UMMP) was born.

Initially the project includes sites from the Pemigewasset and Winnepesaukee Rivers in Franklin to the confluence of the Contoocook and Merrimack Rivers in Boscawen. The ultimate goal is to extend the project through Concord to Bow. In July of 1995, a shoreline survey was completed and seven sites chosen. From the late summer into the late fall, water samples were collected at these sites by volunteers every other week for ten weeks. The samples were processed at no charge by the Franklin Waste Water Treatment Plant. Rock baskets were also placed at each site for six to eight weeks. These wire baskets contain artificial substrate (uniformly sized and shaped rocks). During that time, macroinvertebrates (aquatic insects) colonize the rocks. The baskets are retrieved and the insects are collected and preserved. Upon identification, their quantity, health and diversity provides an accurate picture of the river's health. Identification sessions are currently being held throughout the winter at Franklin High School. Training is provided at no charge and all are welcome to attend.

In July, the UMRLAC sponsored a canoe outing and picnic. Other committee activities included participation on the Concord Study Committee for river related planning by the city, and review of instream flow rules being developed by the NH DES as well as permit applications and other proposals affecting the river.

Plans for 1996 include continuation and expansion of the Upper Merrimack Monitoring Project. At this writing the committee has applied for a grant to purchase supplies and equipment to assure the project's future. The UMRLAC is working with the Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission to develop a model for river communities to recognize and adopt key actions of the

*Management and Implementation Plan* in their master plans and town and city ordinances. An Adopt-a-Stream Project and nonpoint source education workshops are also slated. A river clean-up day is currently being organized and is planned for the summer.

The UMLAC meetings are held on a rotating basis in the six represented communities. The committee meets the second Monday of each month at 7:30 PM. For more information contact Michele Tremblay, chairperson, at 796-2615 or your local representatives listed below.
