Two Hundred and Sixteenth Meeting March 11, 1947

The meeting was called to order at 10:00 A. M. by Arthur W. Johnson, Moderator, and the Warrant was read by him.

Articles 1 and 2. Town Elections.

Moved by Perley I. Fitts, seconded by John C. Tonkin, that three Auditors be elected, that the one with the highest number of votes serve for a term of three years; that the one with the next highest number of votes serve for a term of two years; that the one with the third highest number of votes serve for a term of one year; and that hereafter one Auditor be elected each year to serve for a term of three years. Carried.

Moved by Perley I. Fitts, seconded by T. Burr Charles, that the voting continue throughout the meeting and that after the counting of the ballots the meeting be adjourned. *Carried*.

- Art. 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four hundred ninety-three dollars and seventy-three cents (\$493.73). (See budget). (State will contribute \$194.93.) *Passed*.
- Art. 4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair and maintenance of Town Highways and Bridges. (See budget). *Passed*.
- Art. 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for current maintenance expenses including County taxes as required by law. (See budget.) \$30,375.00 *Raised*.
- Art. 6. To raise and appropriate for the issuance and distribution of printed matter and otherwise publicizing the resources and natural advantages of the Town in cooperation with other towns coordinated in

the Seacoast Regional Association, the sum of two hundred and thirty dollars (\$230.00). Raised provisionally.

- Art. 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriated the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) to grade and resurface a plot of land abutting Madbury Road and belonging to the University of New Hampshire. Permission has been granted the Town of Durham by the University of New Hampshire to use this land as a public parking area. *Carried*.
- Art. 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,-000.00) to be added to the two thousand dollars (\$2,-000.00) raised under article 7 of the 1946 warrant for the purpose of purchasing a new truck for the Town Highway Department. *Carried*.
- Art. 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for the purpose of installing street lights in the University of New Hampshire Faculty Housing Development. Carried.
- Art. 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for the repair of cement sidewalks in the Town. *Carried*.
- Art. 11. "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed three thousand dollars (\$3,000.00) for the purpose of finishing the town sewer on the University of New Hampshire Faculty Housing Development." *Carried*.
- Art. 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,-

000.00) to defray expense of the disposal of cans, ashes, and other waste material, also care of the town dump. *Carried*.

Art. 13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to deposit moneys in a Savings Bank not needed for immediate use. *Carried*.

Art. 14. "To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$145,000.00 for the purpose of extending the Town's sewer system in cooperation with the University of New Hampshire, including an addition to the present treatment plant." That money to be raised and appropriated in such a manner as may be for the best interest of the Town of Durham. Passed at special meeting.

WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

March 9, 1948

Two Hundred and Seventeenth Meeting

To the inhabitants of the Town of Durham, County of Strafford, and the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at New Hampshire Hall on the University Campus, at Durham, N. H., on Tuesday, the ninth of March, A. D. 1948, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to choose by ballot a delegate to the Constitutional Convention, and to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for a term of three years, one Selectman for a term of two years, a Town Treasurer, a Collector of Taxes, three Auditors, four members of the Budget Committee for a term of three years, one member of the Sewer Commission for a term of three years, and all other Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- 2. To select one Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of three years.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand eight hundred sixty-three dollars (\$2,863.00). (See budget.) (State will contribute \$5,726.00.)
- 4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair and maintenance of Town Highways and Bridges. (See budget.)

- 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for current maintenance expenses including County taxes as required by law. (See budget.)
- 6. To raise and appropriate for the issuance and distribution of printed matter and otherwise publicizing the resources and natural advantages of the Town in cooperation with other towns coordinated in the Seacoast Regional Association, the sum of two hundred and fifty-four dollars, (\$254.00).
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four thousand dollars (\$4,000.00) for the purpose of purchasing a new truck for the Town Highway Department.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) to defray expense of the disposal of cans, ashes, and other waste material, also care of the town dump.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four hundred and fifty dollars (\$450.00) for the purpose of purchasing Highway Equipment.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred and sixty dollars (\$360.00) for the purpose of renting garages and land area.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four thousand five hundred dollars (\$4,500.00) for the purpose of remodeling and furnishing the Town Hall.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for the purpose of purchasing a site for a town garage.

- 13. To see if the Town will vote to fix the salaries of Town Officers in accordance with the amount raised under Article 5.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to appoint a Superintendent of Public Works who shall assume such duties and responsibilities as may be assigned to him by the board of selectmen, and to raise and appropriate a sum of money to defray the salary of said appointment. (See budget). Such Superintendent of Public Works shall be subject to the direction and supervision of, and shall hold office at the will of, the selectmen, and shall be a person especially fitted by education, training and experience to perform duties consistent with the supervision of the various departments and agencies of the town.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum not to exceed one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150.00) to help defray expenses of a public picnic to be held sometime in September.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to raise, by bond issue, a sum not to exceed forty-four thousand dollars (\$44,000.00) for construction of hydrant lines as follows:

Resolved: that the Moderator, with the advice and consent of the Board of Selectmen, appoint a committee of five members who will be responsible for studying the existing Zoning Ordinance, for preparing such amendments and modifications of the ordinance as in their opinion seem necessary to make the ordinance consistent with state law and with the growth of the community, for holding a public hearing thereon, and for presenting their proposed amendments in the form of a resolution at the next regular Town meeting, March 8, 1949.

- 18. To see if the Town will vote to furnish surety bonds for the Town Officers as required by law.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow necessary money in anticipation of taxes.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to allow the usual discount of one per cent for prompt payment of taxes if paid on or before August 1, 1948.

- 21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to reorganize future town reports to make them more informative to the citizens of the town.
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) to purchase or make part payment thereon, a lot or parcel of land located reasonably near the business district on which may be built a Community Building containing a room for large meetings, several smaller rooms for organizational meetings and such service rooms as are necessary to accommodate the same.

General health work included: Control of communicable diseases; inspections of restaurants and barber shops; and sanitary analysis of eating utensils, town water, and milk supplies. A continual effort is made to maintain satisfactory sanitary conditions in the town restaurants. There are now nine eating places in the town of Durham.

At the 1947 town meeting, the Town of Durham adopted a Milk Licensing System. Beginning May, 1948, all producers and distributors of milk in Durham must obtain a license to sell milk or cream in the town. The license must be renewed yearly. This system will enable the Health Officer to more effectively safeguard the milk sold in Durham.

REPORT OF THE HAMILTON SMITH LIBRARY

January 31, 1948.

TO THE RESIDENTS OF DURHAM:

Thanks to the co-operation of Miss Charlotte M. Smith, principal of the Durham School, and to the excellent work of Mrs. Philip A. Wilcox, teacher of the seventh and eighth grades, the Charlotte Thompson Room at the Library and its many attractive books for children are being introduced to all the school children of Durham. Mrs. Wilcox's Book Club is preparing exhibits for each grade in turn, at the Library. The classes attend the exhibits in a body, with their teacher, and hear book reviews and instructions in the use of the Library from members of the Book Club. Since the Durham Public Library has no children's librarian, Mrs. Wilcox and her group are performing a real service to both the community and the Library.

During the year 244 Durham Public Library books were added, and 27 discarded. 3,982 books are now in that collection.

The Durham Library Association added 157 volumes, and 115 were discarded. This collection now totals 11,880 volumes.

The combined resources of the Hamilton Smith Library totals 147,811 volumes.

All Durham residents are invited to make use of the Library. Newcomers should register at the main desk.

REPORT OF WATER COMMISSION

In accordance with the plan layed out for water line extension, Williams Brothers completed their contract for Mill Road and the Faculty Development. The six-inch line on Valentine Hill was extended 422 feet as originally planned, and a hydrant installed near Garden Lane.

A contract was awarded to the Ames Construction Company of Somersworth, New Hampshire, for extension of (1) 945 feet on Madbury Road from a point in front of property of Professor Hitchcock to a hydrant in front of Professor Busbee's property; (2) from the corner of Main Street and Dover Road to the end of Bay View Road a distance of 695 feet.

During 1947 pipe line extension and pipe hydrants and fittings, engineering fees, and incidental expenses totaled \$22,250.99. Inventory of material purchased and installed in 1946 and 1947 (see inventory) indicate that according to the engineers \$8,905.92 have been installed and that we have on hand as of January 15, 1948, pipe fittings and hydrants valued at cost \$10,137.73. Due to the purchase of this material at the proper time, many thousands of dollars were saved to the town.

Of the total of \$43,000.00 raised by the bond issue \$10,000.00 was used to pay off the indebtedness on the original water system purchased from the Pettee estate. This left a balance of \$33,000.00 to be used towards hydrant line extensions. Of this amount \$19,043.67 was expended for pipe fittings and hydrants, thus leaving only approximately \$13,956.93 available for hy-

drant line extensions. Plans and specifications for the first 690 feet of Bagdad Road water main extension were prepared and sent out for bids in 1947. No bids were received, consequently this project was postponed.

Plans for 1948

Weston and Sampson's estimate of the cost to complete the extension of water mains as originally planned is as follows, which includes replacing street pavements and an allowance of 15 per cent for engineering and contingencies. The pipe, fittings, gate valves and hydrants are on hand in Durham for all of the extensions except for the last 100 feet of the eight-inch main on Madbury Road beyond Edgewood Road, and the ten-inch main in Edgewood Road from the proposed standpipe connection to Madbury Road. The lengths of eight-inch and six-inch pipe on hand are as follows: Eight-inch, 2,920 feet; six-inch, 2,855 feet.

These estimates include an addition of 1,270 feet of 10-inch pipe to connect the proposed University standpipe on Edgewood Road, to the 8-inch hydrant line on Madbury Road. In addition, there is in the hands of the Town Treasurer a sum of \$3,632.93 raised and appropriated to put in a 6-inch line on Madbury Road, starting 1,000 feet north from Edgewood Road. There is in the hands of the Trustees of Trust Funds \$4,000.00 raised for hydrant line extension. This has earned interest amounting to \$75.46.

We are requesting authorization of an additional Water Bond Issue not to exceed \$44,000.00 to complete the water line extension. These bonds, like those already issued will be retired over a twenty-year period.

Interest and amortization will be taken care of out of Water Department income. This will, of course, mean further increase in water rent to cover the retirement of these new bonds. This plan has the approval of the Budget Committee.

Water Department

Damage to water lines has been extensive, incident to the installation of new sewer lines. During 1947, the Water Department repaired such lines to the amount of \$551.19. This has been charged to the Sewer Department for such water line repairs as were due to sewer line developments.

All residences on Mill Road from Main Street to

College Road, as well as all houses on the Faculty Development have been connected to the new hydrant lines. It is the plan of the department to require all abutting property owners on hydrant lines to connect direct to these mains. Thus as rapidly as possible old and inadequate pipe lines can be abandoned.



SEWER COMMISSION REPORT

TO THE VOTERS OF THE TOWN OF DURHAM:

Since last we met (in a special Town Meeting, July 8, 1947), your Sewer Commission has been very busy striving to "keep peace in the family" and to guard the expenditures of the funds allotted to its care. We



have had a few anxious moments, but for the most part the Town Sewer System project has progressed reasonably well. Durham ledge, clay, and an "old-fashioned" winter have done well to hinder rapid progress. Work will be resumed as soon as possible in the Spring. Expenditures have amounted to about \$40,000 to December 31, 1947. This sum does not include the

payment of \$25,000 to the University of New Hampshire, as such payment is not yet due, but does include the cost of all sewer pipe and manhole covers adjudged needed to complete the job. A substantial sum of money has been saved by this early purchase.

The Survey Fund of \$7,500 has allowed the preparation of plans for the Sewer project and furnished the necessary legal help in matters of easements and contracts. There is a balance of about \$1,000 which might well be kept in reserve for the purpose of surveys and extensions.

Although it is still expected that all the lines for which a contract has been entered into will be completed, there will be no sizeable amount of money left for any extensions. However, in the future, short extensions could be voted and the money raised therefor at any annual Town Meeting, and the work carried out by a Public Works Department if it existed.

The Hoitt Field project, for which \$11,800 was appropriated, has cost approximately \$10,500, leaving a black balance of \$1,300 which is returnable to the Town.

Thirty-four (34) "units" of house connections have been contracted for as of the year 1947. These units are largely along those sections that have been completed, namely, Edgewood and Bagdad Road. A short section of Woodman Road and a portion of Madbury Road lines have been done but cannot now be completed until better weather arrives from the south.

In compliance with an article in the agreement signed between the Town and University, the Commission hereby informs all parties that have a contract with the University that that contract is for the express purpose of accepting for treatment sewage when delivered to the University of New Hampshire col-

lecting mains. In the event that lateral private sewers are in need of repairs, as determined by the Town of Durham or UNH Sewer Commissions, the property owners must pay the costs.

At the present time the Main Street Sewer extending from the top of the hill near the Community Church to the business district and junction of the Pettee Brook Sewer is considered a private and not a public town sewer. User of this private Main Street Sewer have paid the University of New Hampshire the sum of \$100 each for the privilege of having the sewage from this private sewer disposed of through the Pettee Brook system. The expense of maintaining, operating and repairing this private Main Street Sewer is borne by the users of it and not by the Town or University.

The University of New Hampshire assumed no responsibility or liability to the users of this private Main Street Sewer for its maintenance, repairs or operation, and under the agreement between the Town of Durham and the University, the same situation exists.

It is the recommendation of the Sewer Commission that the Town of Durham, if and when authorized by the voters, take over and assume the ownership, operation, maintenance and repairs of this Main Street Sewer, provided, however, the present owners pay the Town of Durham the same rates for the same privileges that other property owners are now paying or will pay, namely, \$300 payable at the rate of \$15 a year for twenty years, except that credit will be given for the \$100 already paid by the present users to the University of New Hampshire and the balance of \$200 to be paid in annual installments of \$10 each for a period of twenty years. This arrangement would give the

present users of this private Main Street Sewer the same public service and privileges as other property owners in the Town now enjoy.

In order to accomplish this objective and carry out this proposed plan, it is necessary that ALL (not part) of the present owners of this private Main Street Sewer agree to this arrangement and file an application with the Sewer Commission, subject to the above modified and lower rates.

There are a few other private sewers in the Town of Durham that at present are being used under the same plan, namely, in consideration of the payment of \$100 to the University of New Hampshire, the University sewage system is being used to dispose of the sewage emptied into it. It is the recommendation of the Durham Sewer Commission that a plan and arrangement similar to that for the Main Street Sewer be worked out as to these private sewers.

All property owners are now responsible for the maintenance and operation of the sewer system extending from their premises and connecting to the public sewer. If and when a Public Works Department is established, it is suggested and recommended that property owners avail themselves at their own expense of the facilities of this department if occasion arises, for repairs to or work on private sewers.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

TO THE SCHOOL BOARD AND CITIZENS OF DURHAM:

I am pleased to present my first annual report as superintendent of your schools. Having been superintendent in Durham only since September, 1947, the report will deal largely with the present school year with some of the usual statistics for the school year 1946-1947.

Pertinent information is presented in the following areas: Enrollment, Teachers, Physical Facilities, Teaching Aids, Health, Music and Art.

Enrollment

The school opened on September 4, 1947, with a total enrollment of 210 pupils as compared with 213 in September, 1946. A review of enrollment figures for past years and in the various grades at the present time indicates a 17% increase over 1945-46 and an even greater enrollment in the near future if we feel the effects of the war-induced increase in birth rate as has been predicted. There are at the present time four tuition pupils from Madbury and one from Lee attending the Durham Schools.

The only changes in the personnel during the past summer were the selection of Mrs. Hildegarde Ingalls of Plymouth Teachers' College—1942, who had been teaching at Tilton, N. H., to replace Mrs. Barbara Kendrigan Beede who resigned as teacher of the first grade, and Mrs. Janice Wholey of Hampton, who returned after an absence of one year as teacher of art.

The Durham teachers have continued their 100% membership in the New Hampshire State Teachers' Association.

As is commonly known, Durham is fortunate in having a comparatively new school building. ever, if enrollment figures increase it may be outgrown in a comparatively short time so that an addition or a new building as is already being considered, may be necessitated. Although the University of New Hampshire has cooperated with the local school district for several years by providing for manual training instruction in the university shop for the boys in grades 7 and 8, it is felt by university officials that this service should not be continued after this year. Several logical reasons have been suggested among which is the over-taxing of their facilities and instructors with increased university enrollment. It now becomes a problem for the school district to raise additional funds with which to equip and operate a manual training room for these grades.

The most extensive improvement made to the building during the past summer was the installation of a coal stoker which provides for much more evenness of heat and therefore more comfort and better health.

Several classrooms were painted during the past summer and toilet facilities which were damaged during the "freeze-up" of 1947 have been repaired and the building is now in good general condition. Leveling and grading of the playground area would make for a great improvement in outdoor facilities. During the past fall, movable posts for volleyball were provided as were nets, volleyballs, footballs and playground balls. A much appreciated donation of \$10 from Arthur Stewart was used toward payment for these articles.

Teaching Aids and Testing

New textbooks have been provided to allow the Durham children to have access to as good and modern materials as are available anywhere. The 16mm moving picture projector purchased during the last school year makes possible the use of audio-visual aids for instructional and amusement purposes. A recent meeting of the teachers with Mr. Olney of the Visual Department of the University and Dr. Marshall of the Education Department developed suggestions for even greater use of visual aids in our instructional procedure. It is hoped that our Durham School may develop the use of Audio-visual aids to the extent of becoming a demonstration school in that field.

It appears that our teachers are exerting a great amount of effort to maintain and improve the high standards of our school. The pupils are happy and generally up to the grade level to which they are assigned; programs of studies as recommended by the State Department of Education are being followed. Plans are now under way to give mental ability tests and to continue with the achievement testing program as carried on last year.

Health

The school lunch program was extended this past fall to allow all pupils to enjoy and profit by what is commonly known as a government aided Type A Program under the direction of Mrs. Eleanor Fogg who is an excellent cook as well as an efficient manager. The Type A Lunch includes at least two ounces of a protein food, a half pint of milk as well as bread, fruit, etc., to make for a complete meal; from 80-90 pupils are taking advantage of this program daily.

In addition to the usual examinations and super-

vision of the school nurse, whose report will follow, each child has a complete examination by a medical doctor three times during the eight years that he attends the school; children in grades 1, 5 and 8 are examined each year. All weaknesses are reported to the parents and follow-up work is carried on by the school Seventh and eighth grade pupils receive physical education training as a part of their regular school work three times per week. Calestenics and outdoor supercised-play during the fall and spring and basketball during the winter months provide for active pupil participation. The Junior High games between Durham and a few nearby schools provide for some interscholastic play. We are very fortunate to receive assistance from students at the university in offering instruction to those pupils who are interested in skiing and in giving physical education training to all children in the first six grades during one period per week for each group during the spring months.

Music and Art

Mrs. Esther Coombs continues with the music instruction program of former years by working at the school a day and a half each week. In addition to the usual vocal music in the classrooms, Mrs. Coombs teaches instrumental music to those individuals who desire it. Last year a very successful operetta was given by the Junior High pupils. The texts are mostly folk material from all over the world, giving opportunity for correlation with geography, history and literature. A suggestion has been made by Mrs. Coombs that material be provided for more music appreciation. Mrs. Janice Wholey teaches art to each group one period per week.

The attendance figures for the Center School for

last year indicate that schools were actually in session 346 half days with an average membership of 207. The per cent attendance was 92.5 for grades 1-6 and 94.83 for grades 7-8.

High School pupils from Durham are attending the following schools during the current year: Dover High, 51 pupils; Spaulding High in Rochester, 3 pupils, and Newmarket High, 8 pupils.

In regard to many comments which I have heard in Durham lately pertaining to kindergarten training in the public school I wish to quote the following article which appeared in a recent issue* of the Nations Schools Magazine:

"Years Before Six"

"Children grow before they are 6, perhaps even faster than they do after 6, according to the Educational Policies Commission of the National Education Association, which has completed a policy statement on 'Extending School Services Downward.' The war has shown, more than peace-time experience has ever demonstrated, that children profit from pre-kindergarten education. The foundations for health, emotional and social development are laid during these early years.

"Some children have home advantages which give them a fair start in life. Others do not. It is the responsibility of the nursery school and the kindergarten, supported as public schools for all the children of all the people, to minister to the needs of this latter group."

In conclusion, I wish to thank the members of the

School Board and all others connected with the work of the schools for their cooperation during the past five months. We hope to continue and improve the good work of the Durham Center School in the future.

BUILDING COMMITTEE

At meetings of the Durham Building Committee, the last ones of which were held at the Durham Center School the latter part of August, October 6, 1947 and on January 6, 1948, discussions centered around the excellent comprehensive report made during the summer of 1947 by former Superintendent McCaffrey. That report suggested two alternatives as to future housing of the Durham school children: (1) the construction of a \$140,000 high school building for grades 7-12 on the assumption of increased number of high school pupils in Durham and tuition pupils from surrounding towns (it now appears that the cost would be greater than above stated figure of \$140,000). (2) the enlargement of the present elementary building to provide more classrooms.

The Building Committee in considering the problem, was generally agreed, (1) that present lack of building materials and high costs would necessarily delay construction for at least a year and (2), that during the coming months it would be well to get an opinion from the citizens of Durham and those in surrounding towns such as Madbury, Lee and Nottingham, as to the possibility of establishing a Cooperative High School District and to cooperatively build a six year high school in Durham as suggested in the School District Warrant.

Children of the first, fifth and eighth grades were examined by Dr. Anna Rudd and Dr. George Mc-Gregor. The tuberculin patch test was given 36 children. All tests were negative.

Posture of many pupils very poor. Four cases needed immediate attention.

The audiometer was used to give the hearing test to 128 children. Eleven were found to have defective hearing. Two had their tonsils removed. Six were given lip-reading. This class was taught, once a week from Feb. 11, 1947, to the close of school by Miss Joan Malley of Somersworth.

One child was taken to the clinic in Rochester for a psychopathic examination by Dr. Anna Philbrook.

I wish to thank the American Red Cross for financing one of the tonsillectomies which could not have been done without help.

In closing I also wish to thank the Superintendent of Schools, the School Board, Doctors, Teachers, and Parents for their helpful cooperation during the school year.

REPORT ON THE LIP-READING CLASSES IN THE SCHOOLS OF THE TOWN OF DURHAM, N. H.

Lip-reading classes for six hard-of-hearing were started in the Durham Center School, Durham, N. H., in February, 1947. These children were recommended for this special instruction as a result of the hearing tests which were conducted in the fall of 1946. One hundred and twenty-eight children were tested and eleven were found to have a hearing loss of 10% or more in one or both ears. If the child failed to pass the first hearing test, he was required to take two more tests before a notice was sent to his parents.

These children were tested again at the opening of the fall term in 1947. This year only four children are receiving lip-reading instruction. One child was dropped from the classes because her hearing had sufficiently improved to enable her to keep up with her class, and the other child graduated from school.

These pupils receive their lip-reading lessons once a week during their regular school hours and their teachers have commented on their improved work habits in the classroom. Any parents or board members who might be interested in observing these lessons are welcome to come and watch them on Tuesday mornings.
