he Hanover School District comprises Grades Kindergarten through 5 at the Bernice A. Ray School and Grade 6 at the Richmond School. The District is governed by the seven-member Hanover School Board, which meets regularly on the first Wednesday of each month at the Ray School.

The Dresden School District, the first interstate school district in the country (1963), serves students in Grades 7 through 12. They are housed in two buildings: Frances C. Richmond School, which also houses Hanover's Grade 6, and Hanover High School. The Dresden District is governed by an eleven-member Board: all seven members of the Hanover School Board, three members of the Norwich School Board, and one who is elected at-large. The Dresden School Board meets on the fourth Tuesday of each month, usually at the Richmond School Library.
