To the inhabitants of the Town of Langdon, County of Sullivan, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Langdon on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March, at twelve of the clock noon until six p.m.. Regular business meeting will be held at seven p.m.

Article 1. To choose all necessary officers for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To see if the Town will appropriate and authorize the Selectmen to use the income, estimated to be \$101,930 from:

a. Filing Fees and Permits	750
b. Interest on Taxes and Deposits	7,000
c. Motor Vehicle Permits	40,000
d. State of NH Shared Revenue	15,639
e. Land Use Change Tax	2,500

To defray Town Charges estimated to be \$113,950. Town Charges to include, but not limited to:

a. Town Officer's Salaries	4,000

c. Election and Registration	500
d. Police Department	8,750
e. Dog Control	1,000
f. Legal Services	3,800
g. Ambulance	3,100

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100,000.00 for the maintenance of highways and bridges. The State of New Hampshire to furnish approximately \$36,000 in State Aid. The Town will raise the balance. (Approximately \$64,000).

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3500.00 for the Capital Expense of the Fire Department. This article has the approval of the Selectmen.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to change the dollar compensation paid annually to our elected selectmen of \$600 and \$700 for the Chairman, be raised to \$1000 and \$1200 respectively. (By petition)

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$88,600 for the paving of Crane Brook Road (phase II). Funds to be raised by bank notes or municipal bond, and paid over a three year period. This article requires a 2/3 ballot vote for acceptance, and has the approval of the Selectmen.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$45,500 for the surfacing of Crane Brook Road (phase II), using alternate surfacing materials (i.e. pug-mill mix). Funds to be raised by bank notes or municipal bond, and paid over a two year period. This article requires a 2/3 ballot vote for acceptance. This article has the approval of the Selectmen.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of Highway Heavy Equipment, funded from budget surplus (RSA 35:11) up to \$10,000.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to accept Trust Funds for the perpetual care of the Cemetary Lots.

Article 10. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 to be placed in a Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of replacing the picket fence at the Lower Cemetary. This article has the approval of the Selectmen.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to sell Town property.

Article 12. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

- a. twice a year tax billing
- b. ammendment of building code regarding frontage and acreage
- c. the formation of a Solid Wast Committee

Article 13. To allow accounts.

LIST OF APPROPRIATIONS -- TOWN MEETING 1994

The meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Don Malcolm at 7:00 p.m. The Pledge of Allegiance was said and the moderator led the Lord's Prayer. A moment of silence was held in memory of Ben Porter.

Article 1: To choose all necessary officers for the ensuing year. This was completed during the day. The moderator made a motion to dispense with reading the warrant. This was seconded and voted in the affirmative. The moderator introduced town officials.

Before the reading of Article 2 a memo was read from the state re. RSA 31:5 and 31:5A. As no public budget hearing was held before the town meeting, the dates for a budget hearing and special town meeting were chosen by the state. To be in compliance with RSA 31:5, April 4 at 7 PM is the public hearing and April 18 at 7 PM is the special town meeting. Both meetings will be held at the town hall.

Article 2: To see if the Town will appropriate and authorize the Selectmen to use the income, estimated to be \$111,939 from:

a. Filing Fees and Permits	500
b. Interest on Taxes and Deposits	7,000
c. Motor Vehicle Permits	38,500
d. State of NH Shared Revenue	17,789
e. Refunds and Adjustments	3,000
f. Sale of Municipal Property	45,150

To defray Town Charges estimated to be \$118,900. Town Charges to include, but not limited to:

a. Town Officer's Salaries	4,000
b. Town Officer's Expenses	8,500
c. Election and Registration	500
d. Police Department	8,500
e. Dog Control	1,000
f. Legal Services	3,800
g. Ambulance	4,400
h. Fire Department	7,000
i. Insurance	29,000
j. Planning and Zoning	250

f. An explanation was requested regarding the sale of municipal property. This was identified as back tax properties. The town has 4 or 5 that could be sold to help lower the tax burden for the townspeople. It was suggested that a recycling center be built on property on Hemlock Road.

e. There was a question about the increase in Animal Control costs. It was due to the need for a rabies vaccine for the animal control officer, the cost of an animal restraint system and transport expenses.

l. The increase in the cemetery cost was questioned. A trustee responded that the trust fund is not generating enough interest to maintain the cemeteries. The report was not completed in time to be included in the town report.

d. There was a question about the police budget, about the cost of call to the high school and for the second cruiser. The police chief will check into the question of reimbursement for high school calls. The cruiser costs are estimated to be \$1600 per year.
(Article 2 motion/second/vote: YES)

Article 3: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100,000.00 for the maintenance of highways and bridges. The State of New Hampshire to furnish approximately \$38,500 in State Aid. The Town will raise the balance. (Approximately \$61,500) (Article 3 motion/second/vote: YES)

Article 4: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3500 for the Capital Expense of the Fire Department. This article has the approval of the Selectmen. (Article 4 motion/second/vote: YES)

Article 7: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2500.00 for the installation of a new incinerating toilet at the Town Hall. This article has the approval of the Selectmen. A question was raised about where the money appropriated last year for the toilet was used. The Selectmen believed it went into the General Fund. Concern about the legality was expressed with reference to RSA 32:10. The Selectmen planned to investigate that RSA. The toilet was not put in last year because the installer did not have available time. A question about handicapped accessibility led to a discussion about whether or not to go ahead if changes would have to be made later. An amendment was made and seconded that a toilet not be installed if it is not handicap accessible in that it would be a possible waste of money. The amendment did not pass. The Selectmen will investigate the requirements for the toilet. (Article 5 motion/second/vote: YES)

Article 6: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500 for the Capital Expense of the Police Department. This article has the approval of the Selectmen. It was asked where the money would be spent. It is for three bullet proff vests. (Article 6 motion/seconded/vote: YES)

Article 7: To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$60,000 for the reconstruction of Crane Brook Road (phase 1). Funds to be raised by bank notes or municipal bond, and paid over a three year period. This special article has the unanimous approval of the Selectmen, and requires a 2/3 vote for acceptance. It was asked what comprised Phase I. The project is in two phases over two years. The road bed from the covered bridge to the town of Acworth (1.1 miles) would be torn up, the gravel would be replaced, several curves would be taken out and width would be added in the first year. It would sit for the winter to determine where there might be problems in the bed. The second phase would be asphaltting. Discussion centered on how it would affect the tax rate, the fact that no costs are included in the warrant for phase 2 which is expected to cost \$100,000. Three contractors said phase 1 would cost less than \$60,000. A committee was formed to oversee the reconstruction. (Article 7 motion/seconded/ Ballot vote: 74 votes cast, 14 no, 60, yes.)

Article 8: To see if the Town will vote to accept the following; \$150 per cemetery lot for a resident and or a former resident, each lot to consist of a 4' x 12' plot. Nonresidents not to be accepted for burial. At present there are no rules about plots in Langdon and as other towns are getting more expensive, nonresidents are coming to Langdon for an inexpensive plot. In a discussion of who is a former resident it was decided that this did not include relatives of people who used to live here and that we would have to remember who was a resident. An amendment was proposed to substitute "single person" for "4x12" in order to make it clear that it would cost \$150 per person for a plot. Amendment moved, seconded and passed. (Article 8 motion made on amended article/seconded/vote: YES)

Article 9: To see if the Town will vote to accept Trust Funds for the perpetual care of the Cemetery Lots. (Article 9 motion/seconded/vote: YES)

Article 10: To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 to be placed in a Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of replacing the picket fence at the Lower Cemetery. This article has the approval of the Selectmen. (Article 10 motion/seconded/ vote: YES)

Article 11: To see if the Town will appropriate \$1,000 to be used for the upkeep of the Cemetery. This article has the approval of the Selectmen. Discussion was centered on the fact that this was a redundant expense, there was already extra money allocated in the general budget for the upkeep of the cemetery. (Article 11 motion/seconded/vote: NO)

Article 12: To see if the Town will vote to indefinitely authorize the Selectmen, until specific rescission of such authority, to issue tax anticipation notes. Apparently it was suggested by the state that the word "indefinitely" be added to expedite the process. (Article 12 motion/seconded/vote: YES)

Article 13: To see if the Town will vote to indefinitely authorize the Selectmen, until specific rescission of such authority, to convey any real estate acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's Deed; any such conveyance shall be by deed following a public auction or the property may be sold by advertised sealed bids or may be otherwise disposed of as justice may require as determined by the Board of Selectmen pursuant to RSA 80:80. Questions about possibly using the property for other purposes were asked, about bids being advertised in newspapers, there was reference to a requirement to sell property obtained in this manner and that no requirements can be placed by the Selectmen on the use of the property before the sale. (Article 13 motion/seconded/vote: YES)

Article 14: To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to sell Town property. (Article 14 motion/seconded/vote: YES)

Article 15: To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting. The representative to the VT/NH Solid Waste Project spoke about the current situation with Wheelabrator and their incinerator.

The Animal Control Officer said the problem of loose dogs is getting worse and reminded people that there is a state-mandated leash law. It was noted that fewer people seem to be licensing their dogs.

The Selectmen would like to change ambulance services based on a lower available cost and a response time of 8-10 minutes rather than 20-30 minutes. It was voted to change ambulance services.

The second cruiser was discussed. It will only be used for backup. The needs for the second cruiser: fire scenes need more than one cruiser for traffic control, calls where two officers should respond, to reduce personal expenses for use of own cars. It was voted that cruiser should be kept on the road.

Moderator asked for applause for the Selectmen, Bruce Cheeney and Lucien Beam who were leaving the Board and they were thanked for their work over the years.

Article 17: To allow accounts. (Article 17 motion/seconded/vote: YES)

The quilt raffle was won by Caroline Cross.

Motion was made to adjourn/seconded/vote: YES. Meeting adjourned at 9:45 PM.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN
AND
STATE FOREST RANGER

AGAIN - No brush fires in 1994 - Thanks to all of you.

On May 5th the Fire Department had a drill of a "live fire" in the area of Great Brook. We gained experience in location, safe access and suppression.

Your cooperation with the written fire permit and calling me when no written permit is required is very much appreciated.

In calendar year 1994, our three leading causes of fires were: no permit, children, and rekindles of fires where the fire was not properly extinguished.

Violations of RSA 224:27 II, the fire permit law, and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

To aid your Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department and State Forest Fire Officials, contact your local Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required. This also helps to prevent unnecessary response to a controlled burn.
