RECORD OF TOWN MEETING March 9, 1999

The Annual Town Meeting of the Town of Madbury, County of Strafford, and the State of New Hampshire, was called to order at 11:00 AM by Moderator Donald W. Melvin. The Polls were declared open and the following Ballot Clerks were sworn in by the Moderator.

Moderator Melvin called the evening session of the Meeting to order at 7:00 PM. The assembled citizens (approximately one hundred) stood for a moment of silence for those Madbury residents who died during 1998. They included:

Everyone joined the Town Clerk in reciting the Pledge of Allegiance.

Moderator Melvin announced that the polls which opened at 11:00 AM for the purpose of voting by ballot on Article 1 of the Town Meeting Warrant as well as voting on all Articles on the Oyster River Cooperative School District Ballot would close at 8:00 PM unless extended by vote of the Town Meeting.

- ARTICLE 1. The following Town Officers were elected by ballot:

Cemetery Trustee for the ensuing three years ... Carleton M. Wentworth (Sample ballot on file)

- ARTICLE 2. Joseph Moriarty moved and Thomas Perley seconded a motion to authorize the Selectmen to choose all other Town Officials. PASSED
- ARTICLE 3. Joseph Moriarty moved and Barbara Houston seconded a motion to raise and appropriate the sum of Sixty Thousand Dollars (\$60,000.00) for the existing Capital Reserve Fund created in Article 8 at the 1998 Town Meeting for the purpose of the construction of a Safety Complex and

further to authorize the Selectmen to act as agents to withdraw and expend from this Capital Reserve Fund. This appropriation is recommended by the Board of Selectmen and is included in the proposed budget. Selectman Moriarty explained that this would be a very good year to add these monies to the existing Safety Complex Capital Reserve Fund. Although such construction may not be actually considered for another five years, the Town is currently debt free which puts us in a good position to save now for this future major project. David Ayer of Cherry Lane suggested using local contractors when the project actually begins. Selectman Moriarty explained usually the Board of Selectmen gives work to local contractors as much as possible but this cannot always happen if the scope of the project is beyond their capabilities. There being no further questions or discussion a vote was taken. PASSED

ARTICLE 4. Tom Perley moved and Jim Davis seconded a motion to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000.00) for the existing Capital Reserve Fund created in Article 8 at the 1994 Town Meeting for the purchase of a Fire Truck and further to authorize the Selectmen to act as agents to withdraw and expend from this Capital Reserve Fund. This appropriation is recommended by the Board of Selectmen and is included in the posted budget.

Selectman Moriarty said that we now have approximately \$70,000.00 in this fund. If we can add another \$30,000.00 this year will give us at least \$100,000.00. Probably we will need in excess of \$150,000.00 when the Town is ready to buy a new fire truck. There was no discussion. A vote was taken PASSED

ARTICLE 5. Bruce Hodsdon moved and Eileen Corrow seconded a motion to pass the proposed budget of \$664,761.00 for the current year.

Gray Cornwell of Nute Road commended the Board of Selectmen on keeping the Town budget as low as possible. A short discussion on planned road work/repairs for the upcoming year ensued. With very few questions a vote was taken. PASSED

ARTICLE 6. Craig Seaver moved and Barbara Houston seconded a motion to retain the unexpended portion of the 1999 Conservation Commission appropriation, said monies to be placed in the Madbury Conservation Fund.

Seaver pointed out that this Article appears every year on the warrant and urged voters to continue to support it. Gray Cornwell spoke to preserving open space more actively in our Town of Madbury. There was no further discussion. A vote was taken. PASSED

ARTICLE 7. Moderator Donald Melvin presented a plan for the introduction and discussion of Article 7, "To see what action the Town will take on the proposed development of the Wagon Track Bike Trail". His plan included the following: (a) Selectman Bruce Hodsdon would make an introduction to the topic of the Article, (b) Selectwoman Joan Sundberg would give the historical background of the trail project, and (c) Abutting landowner Lorraine Morong would give her presentation, including her own map, stressing her objections to the federal requirements and obligations attached to the project.

John Nachilly moved that the Town support development of the Wagon Track Bike Trail located in Durham and Madbury. The proposed trail is 2.7 miles in length and links US Route 4 and NH Route 108. This trail will provide a safe alternative to travel on these roads by non-motorized forms of transportation and provide the Town with a unique recreation facility. Bill Janelle seconded the motion as read and it was given to the Town Clerk for the records.

A lengthy discussion followed this motion. Many questions and concerns were about the "strings" attached to the project since it will be partially funded with federal funds. Durham Town Planner Duane Hyde told Madbury voters that the only strings to developing the trail with federal money are that it has to be maintained by the towns, it must be handicap accessible, the bidding process for construction must be consistent with N.H.'s practices, and the plans would have to be reviewed before final approval is granted. The discussion continued for approximately 45 minutes.

Moderator Melvin announced and read a petition he had received from five voters to use a secret ballot to determine the results of Warrant Article 7, providing the legislative body so desired. A hand vote on the petition was a definite NO. A regular hand vote on Article 7 followed. YES - 41, NO - 41. The tie vote was broken by Moderator Melvin who voted in favor of the Article. He explained that he backed the proposal because of the Selectmen's vote. They had favored the project 2-1. Melvin said, "I believe in the Selectmen of this Town. I believe they would not do anything to put us in jeopardy". Thus the final vote was: YES - 42 NO - 41. PASSED

- ARTICLE 8. Betsy Renshaw announced that the next meeting of the Madbury Civic District Planning Committee would be held at the Town Hall on Saturday, March 27, 1999
- ARTICLE 9. Brian MacLean of Moharimet Drive moved to change the Town's previ-

ous guidance on the use of deicing materials to increase their use, along with other Best Management Practices, with a goal to achieve bare pavement 24 hours after the end of a storm. Gray Cornwell seconded the motion. The petitioned article was given to the Town Clerk for the records.

The Selectmen were asked to comment on the petitioned article. Selectman Moriarty totally agreed that the Town can always do a better job, but it was unreasonable to clear all roads in 24 hours. He said more money and more effort can be put into more salt and sand and an overall better job. For the record he said, "As of February 25, 1999, Madbury has spent \$6,000.00 more on sand and salt than any other year." After only a short discussion a vote was taken. NOT PASSED

Doug Hoff of Hayes Road publicly thanked the Selectmen and all Town Employees for doing a great job for the residents of Madbury.

Representative Janet Wall thanked all the people who have called her concerning the Claremont Issue and encouraged them to continue to do so.

This portion of the meeting concluded at 9:08 PM. Moderator Melvin adjourned the meeting at 9:10 PM to count the ballots cast on Article 1. The meeting was officially adjourned at 9:40 PM.



A Trustee of the Trust Funds for the ensuing three years

A Cemetery Trustee for the ensuing three years

ARTICLE 2: Special Exception: To remove Article V, Section 1-J, in its entirety. (Recommended by the Planning Board-Majority Vote required)

MADBURY PLANNING BOARD REPORT

This year the Planning Board received 10 applications for subdivisions, two of which were ultimately withdrawn. Approvals were granted for a total of 10 new lots; pending applications include a 4-lot residential subdivision and a 16-lot cluster subdivision with the potential for adding an additional 19 lots.

The Board also received 4 applications for Non-Residential Site Plan Review. Approvals were granted to LandCare and to Harvest Broadcast, both located in the commercial zone, and to Garrison Motors, located in the Residential Agricultural Zone. Conditional approval was given to Piscataqua Cellular's proposal for a telecommunications facility pending final agreement on the Town's use of the lower tier. A controversial application for developing 20 acres on Route 155 with proposals for two commercial/industrial sites was withdrawn.

As a result of concerns arising in some of these proposals, the Board recommends changing several regulations governing septic systems and wetland setbacks, and also recommends removing special exceptions in the Residential and Agricultural Zone for recreational enterprises, commercial enterprises, churches, and schools. As part of the Master Plan revision in the coming year, these important areas can be studied by the Planning Board and public and given the time and attention they deserve.

For several years the Planning Board has been building a foundation for carrying out the big job of updating our Master Plan in order to bring forward an integrated policy for managing growth that will protect our natural resources and community character to the best of our abilities. This ongoing program has been made possible by professional assistance from the Strafford Regional Planning Commission and financial assistance through grants from the Coastal Program. We anticipate another \$2,000 in matching funds to be awarded this year to support implementation of the Master Plan policy recommendations. Contributing to this effort, the dedicated Civic District Committee will present the Board with recommendations related to a future Town Center. Also completed this year was a "build-out" study projecting the potential for residential growth under our current zoning.

Part of our small Town character comes from the volunteer boards that generate a sense of community and local responsibility in decision-making. In recent years the diversity and complexity of applications has imposed unprecedented demands on our board. Being able to tap into technical, legal, and professional resources will be critical in preserving our ability to be an informed and effective volunteer board, and will ensure that our members have time to spend on long range planning. We look forward to devoting more of our time to planning issues in the coming year.

MADBURY CONSERVATION COMMISSION ANNUAL REPORT 1999

The theme of 1999 for the MCC was land acquisition opportunities which remain just that - opportunities. The current real estate market is raising the ante for landowners who might be considering development, so the pressure to protect land is also intensifying. The commission would like to make moves on various parcels in Town, but has to strike a balance among frugality, fairness to all parties, conservation values and the main chance. While the Conservation Fund is at an all time high, it would not go far in the prevailing climate. The commission would seek to stretch its buying power by preferring development rights purchase over outright ownership, by soliciting bargain sales, and by leveraging other monies with some of the Town's.

The warrant article supporting a state-wide program to fund the purchase of land and culturally significant places is another way of addressing the need to stretch the land-acquisition dollar to its utmost. The program would match local funds committed to purchase of conservation land, as well as culturally and historically important properties.

In 1999 the MCC received five applications for dredge and fill activities in wetlands, and visited four of the sites, in all cases responding to the NHDES Wetlands Bureau with commentary on the projects. Two were approved, two elicited requests for further information from the applicant and were abandoned, and one is still pending.

The commission welcomed Dorie Sterndale as a new member replacing Susan Warner Smith. Sue's many years of service are greatly appreciated.

Finally, since this is the last report I will write, I must take the chance to thank the townspeople for the trust they have placed in me over my time on the commission. Citizens of Madbury have always given serious consideration to conservation proposals, and in all the cases I can remember ended up supporting them, after due discussion. Madbury is different from most places, primarily for the better, careful attention to its undeveloped places will help to keep it that way.

MADBURY VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

On behalf of the members of the Madbury Fire Department and FAST Squad, I wish to thank the members of the Community for their continued support through the past year. Over the past year we have continued to support and assist in the delivery of the NFPA's "Learn Not To Burn" program in the Moharimet Elementary School to help the children of this community to be Fire Safe. In accord with this program, we also were able to bring a Fire Safety Education Trailer, loaned to us courtesy of the Rochester Fire Department, to the school this fall where we were able to demonstrate to over 500 students the importance of home smoke detectors, and how to escape from a smoke filled environment.

In July we were saddened by the loss of Junior Member Tom Nazzaro, who fell to his death on a glacier in Alaska. Tom, a student at the Oyster River High School had been a Junior Member of the department for just over a year at that time. With funds donated in his memory, we have recently purchased two Ice Rescue Suits, and are currently training in their use. These suits will allow us to reach people who have fallen through ice, or into cold water while protecting the wearer from the cold temperature.

The members of the Madbury Fire Department remind you to test your smoke detector regularly. We are always seeking additional members to help us deliver our services to the citizens of Madbury.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

To aid your Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department and State Forest Ranger, contact your local Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required before doing ANY outside burning. Fire permits are required for any open burning unless the ground is completely covered with snow where the burning will be done. Violations of RSA 227-L:17, the fire permit law and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

There are eleven Forest Rangers who work for the New Hampshire Division of Forest and Lands, Forest Protection Bureau. During then 1999 season Forest Rangers were busy assisting communities with suppression of difficult and remote multi-day fires. Forest Rangers have also investigated numerous complaints regarding violations of the timber harvest and forest fire laws, and taken enforcement action to ensure complaince. If you have any questions regarding forest fire or timber harvest laws, please call our Office at 271-2217.

There are 2400 Forest Fire Wardens and Deputy Forest Fire Wardens throughout the State. Each Town has a Forest Fire Warden and several Deputy Wardens who assist the Forest Rangers with forest fire suppression, prevention and law enforcement. The 1999 fire season was a challenging but safe year for wild-land firefighters in New Hampshire. The severe drought conditions throughout the spring and summer months combined with residual effects of 1998 Ice Storm, resulted in a dramatic increase in wild-land fires. In addition to burning in excess of 452 acres, 35 structures were also impacted by wildfire. Wild-land fires in the urban interface are a serious concern for both landowners and firefighters. Homeowners can help protect their structures by maintaining adequate green space around them and making sure that houses are properly identified with street numbers.

The State of New Hampshire operates 15 fire towers, 2 mobile patrols and 3 contract aircraft patrols. This early detection and reports from citizens aid in the quick response from local fire departments. This is a critical factor in controlling the size of wild-land fires and keeping the loss of property and suppression costs as low as possible.

Please contact your local fire department before doing ANY outside burning.

ANNUAL SUMMARY OF MADBURY WATER BOARD ACTIVITIES 1999

A proposal for a grant submitted by the Madbury Water Board (MWB) to New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services (DES) requesting funds for a follow up study to look for causes of volatile organic chemicals (VOC's) contamination was approved in April 1999 for \$13,370. Under the project, the MWB will conduct a second round of VOC's sampling beginning in spring, 2000. New wells and previously sampled wells will be tested in order to determine possible sources of contamination. The study will be completed by the end of July 2000.

The project goal is also to enhance the watershed-wide information and public awareness of organic contamination.

Specifically, the following will be accomplished:

- 1. Collect Samples from 75 wells throughout the Town. Wells will be sampled randomly by grid layout.
- Analyze the data. The data will be plotted on a map and studied for wide spread contamination. Inform the interview homeowners whose well samples were determined to be contaminated.
- 3. Create a final report for public consumption. Include summary of report to the Town of Madbury Annual Report.

Other matters, upon which the board deliberated and commented, included gravel pits and effect of subdivision when they are projected. Homeowners's guide to septic system maintenance was distributed.

DURHAM AMBULANCE CORPS TOWN REPORT 1999

The Durham Ambulance Corps (DAC) provides 24-hour emergency ambulance service to Durham, Lee, Madbury and the University of New Hampshire in memory of Dr. George G. McGregor. The Corps is a private, non-profit, volunteer service funded by patient billing, appropriations from the communities, and donations.

In 1999 Durham Ambulance Corps responded to 964 calls, down just two calls from our 1998 total of 966 calls. 331 calls (34.34%) were located in Durham, 222 calls (23.03%) in Lee, 63 calls (6.54%) in Madbury, 280 calls (29.05%) on the UNH campus, and 68 calls (7.05%) were mutual aid to other Towns.

DAC volunteers are local residents, UNH students, faculty, and staff. We welcome those interested in the Corps to ride with us and learn more about our service. Scholarship funding for EMT training is offered to qualified permanent area residents.

ACHIEVEMENTS IN 1999

Public education and Corps member training programs were expanded by increasing paid personnel time dedicated to educational tasks.

A new ambulance has been ordered, with delivery expected in late Winter or Spring of 2000.

The biennial fund drive to raise money for the McGregor Memorial and Building Funds has begun. Members of the community continue to be generous in their financial support of DAC.

The Quality Improvement process has been revised and formalized so that patient satisfaction survey results may be used to numerically track patient satisfaction.

The Corps, along with community leaders, explored service delivery options and concluded that DAC is meeting the needs of the communities.

GOALS FOR 2000

Renovate the DAC kitchen to make it more space efficient, and allow appropriate storage for rehabilitation supplies.

Continue to work with community leaders to plan for the future, including plans for future Corps housing, planning to meet increased call volume, etc.

Explore investment options for Corps funds, including the McGregor Memorial

Fund and the Building Fund, so that maximum safety, liquidity, and return are achieved.

Accept delivery of 2000 ambulance, train members to operate vehicle, and place vehicle in service.

We owe a great deal of thanks to the communities and citizens of Durham, Lee, Madbury and UNH for their continued support, and especially for their generous response to our fund raising efforts. We would also like to thank the Durham, Lee and Madbury Fire Departments the Durham-UNH Communications Center and the Durham, UNH, Lee, and Madbury Police Departments for their support. Most of all, we would like to thank all the DAC volunteers for their many hours of dedicated service that have enabled us to provide state of the art emergency medical care to the communities for over 30 years. We look forward to serving our communities for many more years.
