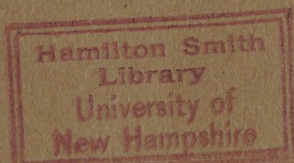

REPORT OF FROST FREE LIBRARY

The annual meeting of the trustees and officers of the Frost Free Library was held in the library Saturday, September 23, 1939. President Rufus S. Frost was in the chair and all members were present. The report of the treasurer, Mr. Fred D. Hemenway, showed receipts of \$669.74, with expenditures of \$397.33, leaving cash on hand, Sept. 23, 1939, \$272.41. Mr. Hemenway also reported that there is an unused balance of \$50.25 in the special fund for beautifying the library lawn. The librarian, Mrs. Elfreda Cheeseman, gave a most interesting and informative report, which showed that 17,160 units of reading matter were circulated the past year and that the library was open 100 times. 123 books were added during the year. A new law requires librarians to meet certain standards, and Mrs. Cheeseman has received her librarian's certification. LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

To the president and trustees of the Frost Free Library, the librarian submits the following report for the year ending Sept. 23, 1939.

The library has been open 100 times with a total circulation of 8,736 books, 5,602 of which were adult fiction, 2,326 juvenile fiction, 564 adult non-fiction and 244 juvenile non-fiction.

The total circulation of magazines was 8,424.

"House Beautiful," a grand magazine for all home lovers and "Jack & Jill" an attractive new younger child's magazine have both proved themselves worthy new members of our large magazine family which now boasts a total subscription list of 47 different magazines. As I have mentioned in previous years, I feel that each year at this time we should renew our thanks to the Frost heirs whose most generous yearly contributions make such a complete magazine collection possible.

In spite of our increased subscription list we are still able to enjoy the luxury of duplicate copies of the following ever popular magazines, the "American," "Cosmopolitan," "Good Housekeeping," "Reader's Digest," and "Woman's Home Companion."

Highest praise is also due our list of "Ever Faithfuls," Mrs. Gertrude Bryant, Miss Elizabeth Bryant, Mr. Harry Bemis, Mr. Ernest Blombach, Mrs. Florence Gibson, Miss Ruth Hemenway, and the W. C. T. U., who have donated magazines monthly for several years.

During the past year Mr. and Mrs. Fred Bemis, Mrs. Ivah Tonseth and Mr. Allen Wilcox have also given magazines and we wish to thank them for their thoughtfulness.

One hundred and twenty-three new books have been added during the past year. Forty-seven were purchased from the library fund, the other 76 were gifts of the following friends of the library. Four, Mrs. Hulda Derby; 8, Eleanor Erikson; 26, Miss Barbara Harrison; 2, Mrs. Bertha Hemenway; 1, Miss Ruth Hemenway; 1, Gordon Mullally; 1, Mrs. Harriet Parker; 2, Dr. Clesson Richardson; 20, Miss Muriel Rollins; 7, Mr. Leonard Rollins; 4, Mrs. Gertrude Zecha. It is most gratifying to know that there are so many friends who take a real and vital interest in the library.

Words seem rather inadequate to fully express our sincere thanks to all who have so generously shared their books and magazines with the library patrons.

In last year's annual report I failed to mention the subject of certification, which has been adopted by the N. H. L. A. Librarians, by meeting certain requirements, are granted a Certificate of Librarianship. The Frost Free Librarian received her certificate in July, 1938.

Mrs. Mabelle Page and I attended the afternoon session of the N. H. L. A. District Meeting which was held in the charming new library in Chesterfield. The afternoon program consisted of the election of officers, a short play, "The Trustees Meet," in which several librarians took part, and a most interesting travel talk by Mrs. Mary Donald Deans, which brought the meeting to a close. It was a delightful meeting and we were sorry that we had been unable to attend the morning session.

We wish to extend a hearty and cordial welcome to Fr. Gilrain, who, by virtue of his office, becomes a trustee of the Frost Free Library, taking Fr. Buckley's place.

Thanks once again to all whose cooperation has made the past year a most pleasant and worthwhile one for the library patrons and the librarian.

During the year we have had the usual clinics, details of which will be found in the District Nurse's report. This year the association made it possible for Miss Robbins to attend the Summer School for Public Health Nurses, a two weeks course held at Keene Teachers College, by extending her vacation leave to one month instead of the usual two weeks, we feel that this course will make a better nursing service for our community. Another item we wish to call to your attention is the purchase of a desk which has been a long felt need and is greatly appreciated by the nurse.

PRE-SCHOOL

Fifty-eight children were given a complete physical examination by Drs. Walter F. Taylor and Phillip Daniels of Keene.

During the afternoon milk and graham crackers were served to the children. These being furnished by the Woman's Club and Parent-Teachers Association.

Transportation was furnished to all who lived at a distance and wished it.

On June 9th a diphtheria toxoid clinic was conducted at the Greenwood Memorial Vestry and sponsored by the same cooperating association.

Twenty-nine children were given the diphtheria toxoid by Dr. L. G. Hildreth.

WELFARE WORK

The welfare work continues to be active. Again this year through the cooperation of the Selectmen and the New Hampshire Surplus Commodities Supplies, a number of quilts, mattresses, and a good deal of clothing has been obtained and distributed as needed. We are grateful to Mr. George Webb for delivering the mattresses.

The ladies of the Federated Church have done a good deal of sewing.

The Red Cross, Parent-Teachers, Grange, American Legion and Auxiliary, Forty and Eight, and friends have contributed generously towards medical, dental and other corrective work.

Friends have given generously of food and clothing to be used as needed.

We are grateful to the telephone staff for transferring calls to the Drug Store and to Mr. and Mrs. Charles Ring for their courtesey in handling emergency calls, and to the many friends for their cooperation.

In closing I wish to express my sincere appreciation and gratitude to the two retiring officers, namely Miss Ruth Hemenway and Miss Mabel A. Holt for their loyal support, many kindnesses and true friendship at all times, and I feel that I will have the same splendid cooperation and support from the coming officers; Mrs. Elizabeth S. Mason as president and Miss Irma Richardson as secretary.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Marlborough:

I herein submit my seventeenth annual report as superintendent of schools.

The American system of public schools is today facing the greatest challenge of a century in the scholastic training of its youth during the formative period of life.

For half a century, to my knowledge, we have heard echoing down the stream of education the slogan "Back to the Fundamentals."

Admitting that this slogan has laid a firm foundation for our educational structure and also that it is highly essential today, yet we note in the rapidly changing conditions of the world, greater emphasis must be placed on the preservation of American institutions.

Indeed, our pupils must drink more deeply and more freely from the fountain heads of Liberty and Freedom, viz. the Bill of Rights and the Magna Charta of English history and from our own Constitution.

It may be true that the pupils under a dictatorship are as well trained in the so-called fundamentals but they do lack the major part of that education which is needed for citizenship under our form of government. Democracy's slogan is onward to the most helpful conditions of living for the masses and of opportunities for participation in a democratic society. The founders of our republic believed education essential to the success of democracy. The experience of a century and a half in representative government confirms that belief so strongly that we may say without fear of contradiction that "Our public schools are our first line of defense"; "Our education is the bulwark of the citadel of Liberty".

When the cataclysm of arms in Europe has spent itself and we approach the world-wide renaissance of modern living, we must have our leaders prepared. They must be endowed with the highest type of citizenry, a type which implies the closest cooperation, supplementation and coordination of three vital elements of society, Viz. the school, the home and the church.

History tells us that in all great emergencies the great bulk of leaders come from rural sections of the country. Let us hope that Marlborough may furnish its quota.

THE ACTIVITY PERIOD

This period coming at the same time in the morning as last year acts as a break in the academic day, and is used for the purpose of developing extra-curricular activities. It is through these activities that health, citizenship, and character are improved.

During the Fall and Spring Terms this period is used two days each week for the boys and two days each week for the girls. The time is devoted to outdoor recreational activities including field events, softball, kickball, dodgeball, touch football and soccer.

In the Winter Terms the activity period on four days a week is used for club work. The clubs include sports, bridge, automobile, handicraft, rifle and music.

In addition to the above, the schedule of the activity period is so arranged that all pupils receive extra instruction in the fundamental processes of spelling, arithmetic, English, grammar, penmanship, and reading. This work supplements the regular classroom instruction, and strengthens the command of the fundamental processes.

The activity period is also used for class meetings and assemblies. The assembly programs have included speakers whose subjects have been travel, current events and nature. Educational moving pictures have also been shown.

ATHLETICS

The 1939 girls' basketball team under the direction of Miss Helen McEgan placed fourth in the Monadnock League. The 1939 boys' basketball team under the direction of Headmaster Elliott W. Keach placed fourth in the Monadnock League. The 1939 boys' basketball team participated in the

Townsend Basketball Tournament, and won the consolation trophy. Each member of the team was presented with a miniature silver basketball.

The 1939 baseball team placed third in the Monadnock League.

The girls' softball team under the direction of Miss Frances Demers played two games with Dublin, winning both games.

In the current basketball season, the girls are in second place, and the boys are tied for fourth place in the Monadnock League. In addition to the regular basketball schedule, the Junior High School squads have been practicing under the direction of Miss Helen McEgan and Headmaster Elliott W. Keach. Several games are planned for this group at the close of the regular basketball season.

SENIOR CLASS TRIP

During the Spring vacation in April, 1939, the Senior Class, chaperoned by Headmaster Elliott W. Keach and Mrs. Keach, enjoyed the annual trip to Washington. In Washington, the class stayed at the Burlington Hotel, and visited Mt. Vernon, Arlington National Cemetery, the Lincoln Memorial, the Washington Monument, Smithsonian and Natural Museums, Congressional Library, Franciscan Monastery, Bureau of Printing and Engraving, the White House, the F. B. I., the U. S. Capitol, and Annapolis. In New York the class stayed at the Hotel Taft, and visited the N. B. C. Studios, Radio City, Church of Saint John the Divine, and the Aquarium.

MUSIC

My dear Mr. Johnson:

Does music prove an aid in all branches of learning?

A statement of amazing character comes from Oxford University. All the musical work at Oxford is done at Magdalen College which gives a vast number of prizes and scholarships to its pupils.

Only ten per cent of its students elect to take up music, but those ten per cent capture practically all the honors in prizes and scholarships. There are 1,000 students and about 100 elect music. There are about 200 honors and 180 of these, in every department, not only music, but literature, mathematics, history, and science, are distributed among the 100. The other 20 are divided among the 900. This condition was not for one year but the consistent record of thirty years in succession.

A statement from this college says that the influence of music upon the mental condition of the students gives them alertness, a keenness, an imaginative flair, which reacts upon everything they have to do. It arouses the thinking apparatus to new powers. Certainly nothing gives free rein to dreams and visionary planning like music.

The Vocal Music in the High School is being taught in classes and only those students whose program would not permit them to have music and a few others incapable of doing the work have been excused from music study. There are two classes for Seniors and Juniors, one for Sophomores, and one for Freshmen. These classes meet once a week in regularly scheduled periods. Some very good vocal talent is being discovered and extra time is being given to these students.

The essentials of vocal production is being taught which will not only improve the voice in singing but will also improve the speech.

Music of a high standard and character is selected for the students so that advancement may be made and an appreciation of the better music may be developed.

The aim of school music is democratic. It is to foster musical culture for every boy and girl, to develop a desire for music and a knowledge of music. Through this appreciation we hope to lead the children to love good music and to appreciate the many qualities of beauty in this beautiful art. This appreciation should bring them more joy in living and fill some of their leisure moments with happiness.

They should be taught to read music fluently, to sing beautifully, so that music may become to them a common, a familiar, and an intimate language for self-expression.

Music will foster and develop the emotional nature of children and train them to be keenly sensitive to the varying shades and higher aspirations of emotions expressed in music and become a power for better living.

The school orchestra meets once a week. This group is doing well and has made several public appearances during the past year.

A recommendation is made that the town appropriate a certain sum for a fund to purchase musical instruments. Some of the larger instruments (string bass, tuba, trombone, etc.)

should be provided by the town. This recommendation was also made in my report of last year.

Supervision of music in the grades has been carried on through weekly visits to the several grades. The grade music is improving.

The students of the high school are preparing an operetta to be given in the Town Hall some time this Spring. The training of the students for this production requires considerable extra time and expense.

This project deserves the cooperation and support of the townspeople.

May I express my appreciation to the teachers, Principal Elliott W. Keach, Superintendent Frederick T. Johnson, and the School Board Members for their continued interest and cooperation.

The school work has continued to be an interesting and active phase of the Public Health Program. Frequent visits have been made to the school.

Pupils have been weighed and measured three times during the year.

At the present time forty pupils are receiving free milk and cod liver oil and many others are buying or bringing milk each day. We feel that this mid-morning lunch is very beneficial to the pupils. The serving of both the milk and cod liver oil is carried on through the generous cooperation of the teachers and high school pupils.

The annual physical examinations of all pupils were done in October by Dr. L. G. Hildreth, assisted by Della A. Robbins, R. N.
