

#### To His Honor The Mayor and The Board of Aldermen:

City of Nashua, New Hampshire

Gentlemen:

In accordance with your request an audit and examination of the accounts and records of the City of Nashua for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1950, has been made by this Division. Submitted herewith is the report of this audit, including Exhibits as listed in the Index.

#### SCOPE OF AUDIT

The audit consisted of a complete verification of assets and liabilities as recorded in the balance sheets of Revenue Accounts, Non-Revenue Accounts, General Indebtedness and the Trust and Investment Funds. We examined supporting checks, vouchers, payrolls and department records to an extent deemed adequate in conformity with accepted audit procedure.

#### Surplus — \$83,849.37:

As indicated by the Balance Sheet — Revenue Accounts — Exhibit A-1, the Surplus as of December 31, 1950, amounted to \$83,849.37 which represented a net increase in Surplus during the year of \$8,952.62. An analysis of the Surplus Account — Prior Years — showing the factors which affected the change in this account is contained in Exhibit B-2.

#### Treasurer's Balance:

Revenue Cash -- \$107,254.84

Non-Revenue Cash - \$6,002.71

The Treasurer's balances of Revenue and Non-Revenue Cash were reconciled with the balance on deposit in the Nashua Trust Company as per statement dated December 29,1950. (Exhibit F-3)

#### Uncollected Taxes - \$144,891.34:

Total uncollected taxes as of December 31, 1950, amounted to \$144,891.34, compared to \$155,337.82 at the close of the previous fiscal year, as shown herewith:

It is noted that the uncollected taxes on the 1950 warrant as of December 31, 1950, amounting to \$131,761.43, represented only 6% of the total warrant of \$2,213,907.91. This indicates a collection of 94% of current year's taxes during the year.

#### Notes Payable - \$50,000.00:

Outstanding temporary loans in anticipation of taxes as of December 31, 1950, amounted to \$50,000.00. A like amount was outstanding at the close of the previous fiscal year.

#### Unexpended Balances - \$49,846.48:

This amount is comprised of various unexpended balances of appropriations and revenues to be carried forward to 1951.

#### Overlays:

Following established practice the City accumulates as a reserve the balance of overlay of the current year's tax levy and the levies of the four preceding years. As of December 31, 1950, the uncollected taxes of the fifth preceding year (1945), were charged off against the overlay of that year and the balance of 1945 overlay, amounting to 89,602,38, was transferred to Surplus — Current (Exhibit B-1).

Exhibit C presents an analysis of the Overlay account showing the activity therein during 1950.

#### Bonded Indebtedness — \$770,000.00:

The bonded indebtedness was reduced during the year from \$891,000.00 to \$770,000.00. A detailed statement of bonded indebtedness as of December 31, 1950, showing annual maturities of principal and annual interest requirements, is included in Exhibit V.

# Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures — Estimated and Actual Revenues:

(Exhibits D & E)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues, are presented in Exhibits D and E. As indicated therein unexpended appropriation balances amounted to \$19,365.48 and net revenue surplus \$10,871.33.

#### GENERAL COMMENTS

#### Accounting for Added Taxes:

Taxes which are added during the year, subsequent to the commitment of the warrant to the Collector, should be recorded in the general ledger through journal entries — debiting the year of levy of the added tax and crediting current revenue.

#### Conclusion:

It is our observation that the volume of work in the office of the City Treasurer and Tax Collector has materially increased in the past few years although there has been no addition to the office staff. We suggest that this matter be given your consideration.

The appreciation and thanks of the members of this Division is hereby expressed to the officials of the City of Nashua and their office staffs for the assistance rendered during the course of the audit.

REGULATING THE INSTALLATION OF POWER OIL BURNERS AND OIL BURNER EQUIPMENT AND OIL STORAGE

BE IT ORDAINED, By the Board of Aldermen of the City of Nashua Amend Chapter 12 entitled "Fire Department" of the Revised Ordinances of the City of Nashua, 1950, by adding thereto the following new sections under the heading or short-title "Oil Burners and Storage": OIL BURNERS AND STORAGE

30. Oil Burner Defined. For the purpose of this Ordinance, the term "Oil Burner" shall mean any device designed to burn Fuel Oil having a flash point of one hundred ten (110) degrees Fahrenheit or higher and having a fuel tank or a container with a capacity of more than ten (10)

gallons connected thereto.

31. Rules and Regulations of the New Hampshire Board of Fire Control Covering the Installation of Power Oil Burners and Oil Burner Equipment—Adopted. The rules and regulations of the New Hampshire Board of Fire Control covering the installation of power oil burners and oil burner equipment, as approved and adopted in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 251, New Hampshire Laws of 1947, as amended, entitled "An Act Relative to the Establishment of a State Board of Fire Control," with the definitions contained therein, are hereby adopted by reference, by virtue of powers conferred upon the cities and towns under the provisions of subsection 1 of Section 12 of said Chapter 251 of the New Hampshire Laws of 1947, insofar as the said rules and regulations shall not conflict with this ordinance or any other local ordinances. Whenever there exists a conflict in said rules and regulations, the local ordinance shall prevail.

said rules and regulations, the local ordinance shall prevail.

32. Application of Ordinance. This ordinance and all rules and regulations incorporated by reference herein shall not affect installations of power burners and oil storage existing at the time of passage of this ordinance.

nance, but it shall apply whenever the said existing installations are changed or substantially altered. Ordinary repairs and replacement of power unit shall not constitute a change within the meaning of this Ordinance.

Storage of Light Fuel or Range Oil.

Light fuel oil or kerosene oil for use in kitchen ranges and similar heating appliances shall be stored in tight metal containers of not exceeding 125 gallon capacity for each family, and having non-leakable faucets. If kept in the building in which said oil is to be used, they shall be located in the basement or ground floor thereof, and not nearer than five feet from wooden partitions or other inflammable material, unless such partitions and inflammable material is first protected by a substantial covering of fire resisting material.

(2) In mercantile or apartment buildings where no basement is available for use of tenants of upper floors, such containers shall be limited to ten gallon capacity per family if stored or kept above the first or ground

floor thereof.

(3) A storage tank which is supplied by an outside fill pipe shall have an open vent pipe arranged to discharge to the open air and to pitch toward the storage tank. The vent opening and vent pipe shall be of ample size to prevent abnormal pressure in the tank during filling, but not smaller than one and one quarter inch (1½") iron pipe size for light fuel oil and not less than two inch (2") iron pipe size for heavy fuel oil.

(4) In no case shall the vent pipe opening be below the fill

pipe opening, nor more than twelve (12) feet above said opening; and it shall be equipped with an approved weather hood. In the case of heavy fuel oil, the vent pipe opening shall be in full view of the fill pipe opening. Where more than one tank is installed, they may be vented through a common vent

pipe.

(5) A storage tank of more than one hundred twenty-five (125) gallons capacity, located within a building shall be filled only through a fill pipe which terminates outside of the building. A fill terminal shall be closed tight when not in use, by a metal cover designed to prevent tampering; and shall be properly identified as a fuel oil fill terminal by an approved metal plate or tag or some other permanent device. Whoever desires to install any container for the storage of oil in excess of one hundred twenty-five (125) gallons capacity shall first make application to the Chief of the Fire Department and obtain a permit therefor in the same manner as provided in Rule 5 of section 2 of the Rules and Regulations of the New Hampshire Board of Fire Control relating to the installation of Power Oil Burners and Oil Burner equipment.

34. Enforcement and Penalty. The Chief of the Fire Department, or such persons as he may designate, are hereby authorized to require the compliance with this Ordinance, and failure to comply with the written order of such official shall be punishable by a fine of not exceeding ten dollars (\$10.00), for every day during which the user of such light fuel or range

oil shall fail to comply with said order.

Any person, firm or corporation, who shall violate any provision of this Ordinance shall, upon conviction, be fined not to exceed ten dollars (\$10.00) for each day such violation shall continue.

It shall be unlawful to operate a taxicab for hire or permit the same to be operated, nor shall any license be issued hereunder, until and unless the applicant for license deposits with the City Clerk a policy or certificate of liability insurance for each taxicab for which a license is sought, said policy or certificate of liability insurance to be acceptable and approved by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen and issued by a company authorized to do business in the State of New Hampshire, indemnifying the applicant in the sum of at least ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.) for injury to one person or thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000.) for injury to more than one person, and five thousand dollars (\$5,000.) property damage in any one accident, through the operation of the taxicab of the applicant; or deposits in lieu thereof the bond of a surety company authorized to do business in the State of New Hampshire, running to the City of Nashua and indemnifying persons who may be injured, or whose property may be damaged by the operation of such taxicab in the same amount and conditioned that action may be brought thereon by any person so damaged against said surety company for the amount of such damage up to the amount named therein, such bond to be approved by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen. ## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF FIRE COMMISSIONERS FOR THE FINANCIAL YEAR OF

## CITY OF NASHUA NEW HAMPSHIRE

TO THE HONORABLE MAYOR AND BOARD OF ALDERMEN: Gentlemen:

The Board of Fire Commissioners herewith submits its Annual Report for the Year 1950.

The Board met on January 1st 1950 and organized by selecting V. Cote, Chairman; E. A. Whitney, Clerk; R. F. Girouard, Purchasing Agent.

#### OPERATING PERSONNEL

The operating Personnel on the two platoon system of the Fire Department was as follows: Chief, Senior Deputy, Junior Deputy, 2nd Junior Deputy, Supt. of Fire Alarm, Master Mechanic, 7 Captains, 5 Lieutenants, 45 Privates and 26

Call Men.

#### FIRE APPARATUS

The useful Fire Apparatus operating out of the Central, Amherst Street, Lake Street and Arlington Street Stations were as follows: Chief's car, Oldsmobile 1950; Deputy's car, 1948 Plymouth, Fire Alarm Truck, 1948 Dodge; Engine No. 1 1922 Ahrens-Fox; Hose No. 1 1949 Mack; Ladder No. 1 1925 Ahrens-Fox; Engine No. 2 1925 Ahrens-Fox; Hose No. 3 1925 Ahrens-Fox; Hose No. 3 1925 Ahrens-Fox, Engine No. 3 1925 Ahrens-Fox; Hose No. 4 1947 Mack; Hose No. 4 1947 Mack; Engine No. 5 1942 Chevrolet; Engine No. 6 1937 Chevrolet; Aerial Ladder No. 1 1946 85' American Lafrance.

### FIRE ALARM SYSTEM

A new Public Alarm System was completely installed by Fire Department personnel, which included the removal of six old tanks from cellar and the installation of two new tanks and air compressor in cellar also one tank at top of tower, completely repiped with 1½" copper tubing. A new Electro-Pneumatic Control valve to operate the twin horns was also installed at the top of the tower.

A new Master Box No. 713 was added to No. 8 circuit covering the Bagshaw Company which is connected to their sprinkler system.

All Fire Alarm Boxes in the City are inspected and tested every month of the year also after each electrical storm. All these boxes and the Central Office equipment are in very good condition.

The underground cable is in very poor condition and we can expect

serious trouble at any time.

#### TRAINING PROGRAM

The Permanent Members have been drilled on the average of 2 to 4 hours a week, manually when personnel and weather conditions allowed.

The handling of lines, the use of ropes, tying of the different knots, actual use of the many different kinds of nozzles, the raising and climbing of ladders have been the subjects for many of the drills.

The different fire trucks have been used in the line of drilling, the location of tools and the many appliances, the proper use of same has been explained.

The training and the use of the different types of gas masks has been a big factor in the location of many a smoky fire.

A training tower has been erected which will allow the Fire Company as a unit to train on the handling of ladders, the use of wet lines due to a hydrant hook-up, the actual use of the nozzles that are used on the many types of fires.

A Manual of evolutions and drills has been adopted with the approval of Chief Molloy.

Callmen are drilled four nights a month on the outside drills during the Summer months and one night a month during the winter.

#### FIRE PREVENTION BUREAU

For the year 1950 the Fire Prevention Bureau is pleased to report that a total of 5175 Inspections of Dwelling, Mercantile and Manufacturing establishments, Schools, Churches. There were approximately 250 defects noted and at the present time 90 percent have been corrected.

In conjunction with the Fire Marshal A. G. Robinson and Inspector A. J. Cloutier the Public and Parochial Schools, Theatres and Municipal Buildings were inspected. Mr. Flanders of the Labor Board and Deputy Cantara inspected the manufacturing plants. Mr. Theodore W. Gunn from the N. H. Board of Fire Underwriters and Deputy Cantara made several inspections of Electrical installations. Fire Marshal Robinson and Deputy Cantara inspected the convalescent Homes and both Hospitals.

One building at 39 East Pearl Street was razed and the grounds were cleared up with the cooperation of the owners. Another building at No. 1 Ledge Street was cleaned up.

We believe that these Inspections have been a great help in keeping our fires and fire losses at a low figure.

Manufacturing plant Officials, Merchants, Owners and Occupants of dwellings were very cooperative in carrying out our recommendations.

We wish to thank the Nashua Telegraph and Radio Station W.O.T.W. for their assistance in calling our messages of Fire Prevention to the Public.

Gentlemen:

The Police Commission of the City of Nashua herewith submits its report for the year 1950.

In order to meet the expenses of the Department of Police during the year 1950, \$171,219.43 was appropriated by the Nashua Board of Aldermen. Expenditures for the year amounted to \$168,515.35 so the Department returned an unexpended balance of \$2,704.08. Along with this, \$42,544.31 in revenue was turned over to the City Treasurer. Of this amount, \$4,923.65 was realized from the sale of licenses, out-of-town ambulance calls, Road Toll Refunds, and miscellaneous sources and our parking meters yielded \$33,586.66 in collections, \$4,017. in fines, and \$17 in damages, a total of \$37,620.66.

On February 23, 1950, this Department received a Certificate from the American Automobile Association, Washington, D. C., commending us for having recognized the importance of our pedestrian traffic problems and for our decision in undertaking a progressive program to provide greater safety and convenience for those afoot.

During the year, a new Life-Saving Boat and Trailer were purchased. Also acquired during the year were a 1950 Ford combination Patrol Wagon and Ambulance Car, and two new four door Chevrolet sedans to replace a 1948 Pontiac and a 1949 Ford.

On April 18, Arthur H. Higgins resigned as Police Chief and Fabian Mayo resigned as Deputy Chief. Their resignations were accepted as of May 3, 1950, and Captain Benjamin Murray was appointed Acting Chief until such time as a new Police Chief could be appointed. Both were retired on a pension.

Two special officers resigned from the Police Force and two dismissals were effected during the year. Also, Stanley Mayo, appointed March 10, 1949, passed away on July 29, 1950. One Special Officer was raised to the rank of Patrolman and two new men were appointed Special Officers.

On June 1, 1950, Joseph L. Regan, former Police Chief in Keene, New Hampshire, took over his duties as the new Chief of the Nashua Police Department.

Some of the various activities of the Department during the year 1950 were as follows: A member of the Federal Bureau of Investigation conducted training classes here for one week. All personnel of the Department attended these classes.

Department instructions were given in Police Work by Patrolman Raymond F. Lee, in Target Work by Patrolman Irving N. Cross, and in Photographic Work by Sergeant Charles D. Hurley.

Our Traffic Bureau investigated 496 motor vehicle accidents, of which we are proud to report there were no fatalities. The Bureau operated on a strict enforcement policy which showed a total of 1748 violations. Of this number, 517 were arrests for violations of motor vehicle laws and traffic ordinances. This number does not include parking meter violations or road checks which were carried out periodically.

Safety films were shown at schools throughout the City by the Traffic Bureau personnel. Said personnel also spoke at meetings of the City's various service clubs. A great deal of time was devoted to reports and inspections for the City-Wide Traffic Committee.

The year 1950 marked a change in our radio frequency from one-way to two-way communication. This enables us to communicate from car to car thereby increasing the efficiency and range of our station transmitter.

Prior to this date, the usual procedure in sending Teletype messages was to have all messages relayed through the State Police in Concord. Now, with a new, proper hook-up, the messages go directly to the departments in question.

The Nashua Police Auxiliary Unit of Civil Defense was organized in August with Sergeant Lucien Vigneault in charge. The Unit comprises 65 men. They met once a week in an eleven week training period. They will also take a ten-hour First Aid Course conducted by Red Cross Instructors. They are also being trained in handling traffic and other phases of Police Work.

These men were uniformed with Army Coveralls, Overseas Hats, Leggings (Navy type), and Web belts. The average cost per man was about eight dollars.

A complete reorganization of the Police Department was effected on October 1, 1950. Each of the eight-hour shifts were placed in charge of a Captain necessitating the appointment of two additional Captains. The reorganization plan is as shown on Schedule "A".

A roster of the men affiliated with this Department on December 31, 1950, is included on Schedule "B".

On November 6, 1950, the Commission was approached by members of the Department requesting a five-day week—forty hours per week at no reduction of pay, at which time they were referred to the Attorney-General for an opinion.

In contrast with the simple task of law enforcement a few years ago, the police today are confronted with exceedingly complex and difficult problems. Success in preventing accidents, apprehending criminals, locating stolen property, and accomplishing the hundred and one other tasks of a modern police department depends upon carefully planned strategy and vigorous follow through. To be effective, departments have to evaluate procedures continuously, improving techniques at one point, discarding unproductive methods at another. The facts necessary to the analysis of problems and the formulation of strategic moves are made available by an adequate records system.

During 1950 a start was made toward modernizing the records system of the Nashua Police Department by centralizing them. Prior to this step, police records were kept in four different offices within the Department, namely the Chief's Office, the Clerk's Office, the Main Office and the Inspector's Office. By centralizing these records, with the exception of personnel records maintained in the Chief's Office, it eliminated a lot of duplication and therefore a saving of employee time. It enables us to render faster and more efficient service to those requesting this information. The Standard Crime Classification system of filing complaints and the installation of Key-Sort Method for use in police files is an entirely new adaption. A Master Alphabetical index is also maintained. All names of persons having contact with the Department whether as a criminal or complainant are indexed and filed under the Soundex System. When the older records of the Department are incorporated we believe we will have the most modern police filing system in the State.

The total number of arrests in this Department during 1950 was 1497. A complete breakdown appears on Schedule "C".

We are extremely well pleased with the reorganization and believe that the Department, as presently constituted, is a credit to you and to the citizens of Nashua.

The Nashua Police Department wishes to acknowledge the continued cooperation of the State Police, the Motor Vehicle Department, the Municipal Court and the City Solicitor's Office as well as the Mayor and City Government.



July, August and September. Four examinations to pass upon the fitness of the seven applicants for plumbing license were held. Four candidates were successful in passing examinations for plumbing license.

# REPORT OF PARK-RECREATION COMMISSION

To the Mayor and Board of Aldermen:

The Park-Recreation Commission submits the report of it's superintendent for your approval.

### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the Park-Recreation Commission.

Gentlemen:

The first activities of the year 1950 were of course the operation of our skating rinks. Due to extremely mild weather, skating was poor and intermittent. However, we operated rinks at Holman Stadium, South Common, Marshall St., Ledge St., Atherton Ave., and East Dunstable Road. In order to operate this number of rinks some temporary help had to be hired. However, no provision was made in the budget for paying these men. Since the skating season had ended before the budget was passed, and the men had been paid for their work, we experienced considerable difficulty in balancing our budget. Some provision should be made for paying this additional help in 1951, or else fewer rinks will have to be operated.

Other work performed during the winter months included repairing and painting all of our park and playground equipment. Also considerable work was done in the wooded sections of Greeley Park, trimming and thinning out of trees and cutting underbrush.

With the coming of Spring all the parks and playgrounds had to be cleaned up and put into usable condition.

In addition to Holman Stadium, ten soft and baseball fields were in almost constant use, and more could have been used.

Although the Dodgers did not return to Nashua, Mr. M. J. Vagge organized a semi pro team which furnished excellent baseball at the Stadium, twice a week. However, attendance was disappointingly poor.

Something of an innovation was provided by the N. H. Softball Association which put on a softball tournament at Holman Stadium, extending over three week ends in August. Both men's and women's teams from various New England communities participated in the tournament, playing some fine ball, but attendance was poor.

The Stadium was also used for baseball by the High and Junior High Schools, the St. Aloysius school, American Legion Juniors and the Ward league teams. Football was provided by the High and Junior High schools, and a semi pro team, known as the Nashua Tigers, which carried out an extensive schedule with an undefeated record.

With Recreation Director William Sweeney in charge of activities, playgrounds were operated at North Common, South Common, Sullivan Park, Atherton Ave., Textile Field and Palm St. school yard; also the swimming pool at Field's Grove. Attendance was excellent at all of these centers, averaging 1550 daily on the playgrounds, and at the swimming pool about 50,000 for the season. The Kiwanis club furnished an instructor to teach swimming and life saving. Mr. Sweeney also completed a very successful season with his Ward league baseball teams. Through the generosity of several clubs and organizations, these boys were given a trip to Boston and were guests of the Red Sox baseball club at Fenway park on August 19. Also on December 13, a banquet was provided for the players, coaches and invited guests, through the courtesy of several civic minded groups.

In spite of the extreme drought during the Summer months, our lawns, trees, shrubs and flower beds were kept in very good condition.

The elm trees on our parks and city streets were sprayed twice for the control of the elm leaf beetle and the elm bark beetle. The latter is believed to be largely responsible for the spread of the Dutch Elm disease, and therefore must be rigidly controlled to save our beautiful elms.

The new mist sprayer purchased in 1949 did a good job but gave us some trouble and has now been returned to the factory for changes and adjustments. During the warm months all of our service buildings were given a coat of paint. The stands and Knights of Columbus bleachers at the Stadium were also painted.
