STATE OF THE COMMUNITY

The Selectmen are pleased to report that the Capital Improvements Plan is in place and extend appreciation to Larry Blood and his subcommittee for their work.

The closure plans for the Landfill have been received. According to the plans, with careful compacting and recycling the town may extend the life of the landfill for two to five years. The Selectmen have initiated a voluntary recycling program and have elicited community volunteers to assist them in setting up such a program. Requests for matching funds from NH the Beautiful have been approved to supply the town with signs, pole shed and a divided recycle trailer.

The Selectmen have been working to improve benefits and working conditions for town employees. The Town of New Hampton has dedicated office, fire, highway and police departments.

The Selectmen processed 82 building permit applications in 1988, 10 more than in 1987.

New Hampton Town Meeting Minutes

To the inhabitants of the Town of New Hampton in the County of Belknap in the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the New Hampton Town House on Tuesday the eighth day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to cast your ballots for Town Officers and for questions required by law to be on the Ballots. Polls to close not later than 6:00 PM.

The remainder of the Warrant will be acted upon at the New Hampton Town House Saturday, March 12th at 10 AM:

Moderator T.H. Moore opened the meeting at 10:00 AM.

The Moderator read the opening of the warrant and the business of the day began.

We, who have been active in Town affairs for a period of years, feel the nostalgic Old Town feelings of our meeting. We still feel the same awareness that our ancestors felt when they served in our first Town Meetings.

Patricia Torsey and Hope Clement served as Tally sheet counter Officers on the In Tally sheets.

Dana Torsey and Ralph Huckins served on the Out Tally sheets.

We have 952 townspeople on the checklist and we had 219 who voted with 29 who voted Absentee.

My wife Katherine took absentee ballots to anyone who asked for them and we mailed the rest. We had three ballots that came in too late to count. We had many write ins which show the interest of the people in Town affairs.

I always say, if you want a Town Office, Sign up for it. One dollar is not too much to pay for running for a Town Office. The following is the breakdown of how we voted.

After the Moderator read the Totals of the Ballots cast, he recessed the meeting at 8:45 PM till Saturday, March 12, 1988 at 10:00 AM when the remainder of the warrant will be acted upon.

The Ruth Joyce Scholarship for Boys in New Hampton had a table food sale. They sold between \$150 to \$200 worth of food donated by concerned citizens. Claudia Duquette, Sandy Price, Gertrude Morin and Charlie Joyce were in charge of the table. The women tried to keep Charlie from eating the samples. A last but not least part of our unique Town Meeting was a coffee urn over by the corner of the Supervisors of the Checklist table. Barbara Chase has been doing this for years, just to have a drink for dry people. You know how people hung around the food in a beer parlor. Well! Thank you.

Alden Hofling was sworn in as Moderator Protem March 12th just before the meeting was opened.

The Meeting was opened Saturday, March 12, at 10:00 AM.

The Boy Scouts presented the Flag and we saluted it. Rev. Mary Potter gave the invocation.

Arthur Seavey read the totals on the March 8th Town Meeting with one correction on wrong officer. Laurence Blood who is in office and Irma Badgley who was correctly named. We checked the Tally sheets when Katherine Seavey brought them to me. Barbara Chase and June Smith and the Town Clerk corrected it.

Article 1. Moderator Hofling read Article #1 as follows: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$125,000.00 for the purchase of a new Fire Truck, and to authorize the issuance of not more than \$125,000.00 of notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA chapter 33) and to authorize the Town Officials to issue and negotiate such notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon.

Moved by Bill Clement, seconded by Hope Clement.

Bill gave a resume on our older model, and what we receive on the new model. After discussion by many of our townsfolk, from taxes to insurance, the moderator reread Article #1 and paper ballots were given at 10:50 AM, the polls to be opened till 11:50 AM.

109 voted; 75 yes, 34 no; the article was passed.

Article 2. Moderator Hofling read Article #2 as follows: To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

\$277,125.00 was given and article was moved by Linda Morgan. Seconded by Horace Boynton.

An amendment was read as follows: I move that we authorize the Selectmen to engage professional Certified Public Accountants to conduct a complete financial audit of all the departments of the Town of New Hampton, for the year ended December 31, 1987 and that we increase by a sum of \$5,000.00 the appropriation for Town Charges to fund same. Amendment was moved and seconded and passed with an Aye vote.

The Total amount was raised to \$282,125,00. Moderator reread amended article and it was passed with an Aye vote.

Article 3. Moderator read Article #3 as follows: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$17,000.00 for the support of the Fire Department.

Article moved by Bill Clement and seconded by Barbara Chase.

Bill explained article with a discussion. Then Moderator reread article and it was passed with an Aye vote.

Article 4. Moderator read Article #4 as follows: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$198,222.46 for the support of the Highway Department; this figure includes \$48,372.46 Highway Block Grant Aid.

Article moved by Gordon Huckins, seconded by James Eckert.

Gordon Huckins explained article. After plenty of discussion, Moderator reread article and it was passed with an Aye vote.

Article 5. Moderator read Article #5 as follows: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$99,500.00 for the purchase of a New Highway Department Grader, and authorize the issuance of not more than \$79,500.00 of notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA Chapter 33) and to authorize the Town officials to issue and negotiate such notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon; furthermore, to authorize the withdrawal of \$20,000.00 from the Highway Equipment Capital Reserve Fund created for this purpose.

Gordon Huckins moved article and it was seconded by James Eckert.

Gordon explained article and answered questions from Willis Ober, Sam Blake and others.

The moderator reread article and it was passed with an Aye vote. A paper ballot was used. Total ballots cast: 109; 83 yes, 27 no. Article #5 was accepted.

Article 6. Moderator read Article #6 as follows: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50,000.00 for the resurfacing of Town Roads.

Article was moved by Gordon Huckins and seconded by Horace Boynton.

Gordon explained article and after many questions and answers by Dana Torsey, Linda Morgan, Joe Powers Jr., Kenneth Torsey and others, the Moderator reread article and it was passed with an Aye vote.

Article 7. Moderator read Article #7 as follows: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$35,000.00 for its share of the costs for the repair of the Central Street Bridge, with the provision that the Town of Bristol raises the same amount for this purpose at its annual Town Meeting; and furthermore, to vote to change the purpose of Article #11 of the 1987 Town Warrant in the amount of \$23,333.00 plus interest and vote to apply this amount to the Central Street Bridge project.

Article was moved by Horace Boynton and seconded by Linda Morgan.

Horace explained article with questions and answers by Willis Ober, Dana Torsey, June Smith, Kenneth Torsey, Patricia King, Charles Moore and others. After discussion Moderator reread article and it was passed with an Aye vote.

Article 8. Moderator read Article #8 as follows: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for the repair of Main Street; the State to contribute \$10,000.00 for a total of \$15,000.00.

James Eckert moved article and it was seconded by Linda Morgan.

James explained article and after discussion Moderator reread article and it was passed with an Aye vote.

Article 9. Moderator read Article #9 as follows: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$40,000.00 and to place same in the Landfill Closure Capital Reserve Fund.

Article was moved by Linda Morgan, seconded by Horace Boynton.

Linda explained article and after discussion it was reread by Moderator and an Aye vote accepted the article.

Article 10. Moderator read Article #10 as follows: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$95,040.00 for the support of the Police Department.

Merritt Salmon moved article and it was seconded by Linda Morgan.

Merritt explained article and answered questions by Patricia King, Hope Swain, Kenneth Torsey, Willis Ober and others. The Moderator reread article and it was passed with an Aye vote. Article 11. Moderator read article #11 as follows: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$18,200.00 for the purchase of a new Police Cruiser, fully equipped. Chief Salmon asked for an amendment to change the Total to \$15,700.00 which was accepted.

Chief Salmon moved question and it was seconded by Bernard Smith.

After explanation and discussion Moderator reread article as amended and it was accepted with an Aye vote.

Article 12. Moderator read Article #12 as follows: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the purchase of a new Motorola Base Station for the Police Station.

Merritt Salmon moved article and it was seconded by Doug Smith.

After explanation by the Chief and discussion, Moderator reread article and it was passed with an Aye vote.

Article 13. Moderator read Article #13 as follows: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,500.00 for expansion of the existing Town office building.

Article moved by James Eckert seconded by Merritt Salmon.

Chief Salmon said it was to finish upstairs for police use. After discussion Moderator reread article and it was passed with an Aye vote.

Article 14. Moderator read Article #14 as follows: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,962.00 for the support of regional associations: Community Action Program \$3,021.00; Bristol Community Center \$2,166.00; Lakes Region Planning Commission \$1,369.00; Newfound Area Nursing Association \$5,368.00; Newfound Ambulance Service \$4,038.00.

James Eckert moved article and Linda Morgan seconded it.

James reread article for explanation and after discussion the Moderator reread article and it was accepted with an Aye vote.

Article 15. Moderator read Article #15 as follows: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 to be placed in the Property Reappraisal Capital Reserve Fund for the revaluation of the Town by the Appraisal Division of the Department of Revenue Administration.

Horace Boynton moved article and it was seconded by Linda Morgan.

Horace explained article and after discussion the Moderator reread article and it was accepted with an Aye vote. Article 16. Moderator read Article #16 as follows: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the support of Hospitals: Mary Hitchcock Memorial Hospital; Franklin Regional Hospital; Lakes Region General Hospital; and Speare Memorial Hospital.

Horace Boynton moved article and it was seconded by James Eckert.

After explanation by Horace and after short discussion, Moderator reread article and it was accepted with an Aye vote.

Article 17. Moderator read Article #17 as follows: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$3,564.00 for the development costs associated with the Pemi-Baker Solid Waste District purchase of the Plymouth Incinerator/Recycling Facility and Rumney landfill site.

Linda Morgan moved article and it was seconded by Horace Boynton.

After discussion, it was reread by Moderator and accepted by an Aye vote.

Article 18. Moderator read Article #18 as follows: Shall we adopt the Provisions of RSA 80:58-86 for a real estate lien procedure? These statistics provide that tax sales to private individuals for nonpayment of property taxes on real estate are replaced with a real estate tax lien procedure under which only municipalities or county where the property is located or the State may acquire a tax lien against land and buildings for unpaid taxes.

Linda Morgan moved article and Hope Swain seconded it.

Edwin Huckins explained article and procedure, with discussion by Dana Torsey, Peter Gulick, others. After discussion the Moderator reread article and it was passed with a paper ballot vote: 76 Ayes and 2 Nays.

Article 19. Moderator read Article #19 as follows: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept private donations of land, interest in land, or money, to be deposited into the conservation fund in accordance with RSA 36-A5, for the purpose of contributing to the local matching portion required for N.H. Land Conservation Investment Program (RSA 221-A). And furthermore to accept the State matching funds under the NHLCIP for the purpose of acquisition/easements. Said donated/State matching funds to be expended by majority vote of the Conservation Commission. (By Request)

Patricia Schlesinger moved article and it was seconded by Grita Antoni.

Patricia tried to explain the article, but many people were confused by the vague answers. Peter Gulick, Ken Torsey, Bob Cook, Edwin Huckins and others tried to withdraw article but the Moderator let it be voted upon by paper ballots: 30 Aye votes against 24 Nays. It was accepted.

Article 20. The Moderator read Article #20 as follows: To see if the Town will vote to retain the Egan property on the Old Bristol Road in the Town's inventory for Forestry/Conservation purposes at this time. (By Request)

The article was moved by James Eckert and seconded by Robert Donnelly.

James Eckert explained article with a lot of discussion by Hope Swain, Ken Torsey, Gordon Huckins, and others. The Moderator wanted the opinion of the Selectmen.

Linda Morgan (feels it should be for conservation)

Horace Boynton (feels it should be sold)

James Eckert (feels it should be sold)

The Moderator reread article and a mild aye vote over a loud but possibly not as strong nay vote.

The Moderator read an amendment to the article as follows: To see if the Town will vote to retain the Egan Property on the Northerly side of the Old Bristol Road in the Town inventory for Forestry/Conservation/Recreation purposes at this time.

Moved by James Eckert and seconded by Horace Boynton.

Dana and Kenneth Torsey, Bill Clement, and others, discussed it pro and con then the Moderator reread article amendment and it was accepted by an Aye vote.

Article 21. Article #21 was read by Moderator as follows: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,037.40 to participate in a June 11 "Household Hazardous Waste Collection." (By Request)

Article was moved by Linda Morgan, Clare Eckert seconded it.

Linda explained article and after discussion the Moderator reread article and it was accepted with an Aye vote.

Article 22. Moderator read Article #22 as follows: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the support of the New Hampton Community Kindergarten.

Linda Morgan moved article and Clare Eckert seconded it.

A short discussion, Moderator reread article and it was accepted by an Aye vote.

Article 23. Moderator read Article #23 as follows: To see if the Town will vote to change the position of Town Clerk from a one year elected term to a three year elected term.

Linda Morgan moved article and James Eckert seconded it.

The Moderator asked the Town Clerk for his opinion and received a favorable answer, after 25 years of one year elections.

No discussion and the Moderator reread article and it was accepted with an Aye vote.

Article 24. Moderator read Article #24 as follows: To see if the Town will vote to give up that section of Old Route 104 that abuts Vranorsey property (formerly Romano).

Horace Boynton moved article and it was seconded by Linda Morgan.

Hope Clement, Willis Ober, Ms. McCrelis all discussed the article. Moderator reread and it was voted Nay. Article #24 was not passed.

Article 25. Moderator read Article #25 as follows: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept on behalf of the Town any Federal or State funds which may be available during 1988. Further to see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to make application for said funds and then expend the same for the purpose designated with applicable Federal and State regulations.

Article was moved by Horace Boynton and seconded by Linda Morgan.

Horace explained article and it was reread by Moderator and accepted by an Aye vote.

Article 26. Moderator read Article #26 as follows: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Horace Boynton moved article and Linda Morgan seconded it.

After explanation Moderator reread article and it was accepted with an Aye vote.

Article 27. Moderator read article as follows: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Tax Collector to accept prepayment of taxes.

Article moved by Edwin Huckins seconded by Arthur Seavey.

After explanation by Edwin Huckins the Moderator reread article and it was accepted by an Aye vote.

Article 28. Moderator read Article #28 as follows: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of property acquired by tax collectors deeds.

Article was moved by Linda Morgan seconded by Horace Boynton.

Bob Fischer read an amendment to article as follows: Note: As passed in a previous Town Meeting, The Conservation Commission is to be asked for their opinion on such prior to disposal. Amendment: If the Conservation Commission does not recommend disposal, consideration of the disposition of the individual parcel(s) will be brought to the Town Meeting prior to disposal.

Amendment moved by Bob Fischer and explained. Moderator reread article as amended, accepted.

Article 29. Moderator read Article #29 as follows: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell or trade any unusable equipment or material.

Article was moved by Horace Boynton and seconded by Grita Antoni.

Boynton explained article and Moderator reread article and it was accepted with an Aye vote.

Article 30. Moderator read Article #30 as follows: To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Kenneth Torsey wanted the Selectmen to clarify what happened to some property off Straits Road which has been taken off the tax record; would be taken care of by Selectmen.

Arthur Seavey wished to correct a mistake on the Officers ballot. He had Laurence Blood as winner in the Town Auditor office. He was already one of the auditors, Irma Badgley was next as a write in so she was accepted as Auditor for the next 3 years.

The Moderator asked for a motion to have the meeting adjourned, which was given. We adjourned at 6:00 PM.

You are hereby notified to meet at the New Hampton Town House on Tuesday, the 14th day of March next at ten of the clock in the forenoon to cast your ballots for Town Officers and for questions required by law to be on the ballots. Polls to close not later than 7:00 P.M.

The remainder of the Warrant will be acted upon at the New Hampton Town House, Saturday, March 18, 1989 at 10:00 A.M.

1. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$17,000.00 for the support of the Fire Department.

3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for an addition to the New Hampton Fire Department building.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$205,300.93 for the support of the Highway Department; this figure includes \$51,550.93 Highway Block Grant Aid.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$60,000.00 for the purchase of a new Highway Department dump truck and spreader.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100,000.00 for resurfacing of Town roads.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5000.00 for the repair of Main Street; the state to contribute \$10,000.00 for a total of \$15,000.00.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$40,000.00 and to place same in the Landfill Closure Capital Reserve Fund.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$40,000.00 and to place same in the Transfer Station Capital Reserve Fund.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$102,346.00 for the support of the Police Department.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,500.00 for the purchase of a new 1989 Police Cruiser, fully equipped.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$9,500.00 to hire an additional full time police officer.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$21,000.00 for the purchase of two (2) computers for the Town office building; including equipment and software.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,000.00 to complete expansion to the existing Town Office Building.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$17,254.00 for the support of Regional Associations; Community Action Program \$3,474.00; Bristol Community Center \$2,252.00; Lakes Region Planning Commission \$1,397.00; Newfound Area Nursing Association \$5,907.00; Newfound Ambulance Service \$4,224.00.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 to be placed in the Property Reappraisal Capital Reserve Fund for the revaluation of the Town by the Appraisal Division of the Department of Revenue Administration.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the support of the hospitals: Mary Hitchcock Memorial Hospital, Franklin Regional Hospital, Lakes Region General Hospital, Speare Memorial Hospital.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$9,000.00 for the purchase of a recycling trailer; New Hampshire the Beautiful to contribute \$5,000.00 for a total of \$14,000.00.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,110.00 for the support of the Conservation Commission.

20. To see if the Town will vote to deposit a percentage of the revenues collected pursuant to RSA 79-A (the land use change tax) into the Conservation fund in accordance with RSA 36-A:4 III as authorized by RSA 79-A:25 II.

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for the purchase of Conservation easement/development rights in our Town on a matching fund basis with the State and establish a Capital Reserve Fund for this purpose.

22. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the town's representatives to the General Court to respond to our solid waste crisis by taking all necessary measures to insure that New Hampshire adopt legislation that will permit consumers to return for refund of deposit within New Hampshire all soda, beer, wine cooler and liquor containers and that all unclaimed deposit monies shall be collected by the State and no less than 80% shall be returned annually to local municipalities for the sole purpose of implementing, expanding and reimbursing community recycling projects. (BY REQUEST)

23. To see if the Town of New Hampton will accept the provisions of New Hampshire RSA 53-B:1 TO 11 inclusive providing for the establishment of a regional refuse disposal district, together with the towns of Ashland, Campton, Danbury, Dorchester, Ellsworth, Groton, Plymouth, Rumney, Thornton, Warren, Waterville Valley and Wentworth, and the construction, maintenance, and operation of a regional refuse disposal facility by said district in accordance with the provisions of the proposed agreement filed with the Selectmen.

24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$6,777.00 for final design and permits for the upgrade of the Plymouth Incinerator/Recycling Facility and the Rumney Ash Landfill Site to be used by the thirteen town solid waste district. The Pemi-Baker Solid Waste District strongly recommends this appropriation.

25. To see if the Town will vote to relase any and all proprietary interest it has or may have in equipment or other property owned by the Newfound Area Ambulance Association or Newfound Ambulance Rescue Squad, Inc.

26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,018.00 to participate in Household Hazardous Waste Collection. (BY REQUEST)

27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the support of the New Hampton Community Kindergarten.

28. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a five member Solid Waste Committee.

29. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept on behalf of the Town any Federal or State Funds which may be made available during 1989. Further, to see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to make application for said funds and then expend the same for the purpose designated with applicable Federal and State regulations.

30. To request the townspeople of New Hampton to approve the designation of Beech Hill Road, from its beginning at Straits Road to the access road up to Winona Heights, as a Scenic Road under the provisions of RSA 231:157. (BY PETITION)

31. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

32. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of property acquired by Tax Collector's deeds.

33. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to trade or sell any unusable equipment or materials.

34. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

New Hampton Police Department

This has been by far the most trying year for me so far. I have been faced with problem after problem. The problems have ranged from manpower shortages to vehicle problems to an overall increase in activity. We have had a very busy year. Most every other year there has been a slow period (breather) every now and again. The only breather we had this year was in the number of motor vehicle accidents we have had to cover.

I have a new patrolman, his name is Bradley S. Rushton. He comes to us with 7 years of full-time experience and 2 years of part-time experience. All of which he served with Meredith Police Department. Brad has been doing a good job and has shown much interest in the Department and the Town.

I have asked for the replacement of the 1986 Police Cruiser. At the time of this report it has 95,000 with the exception of the engine. In December, I was faced with a major decision that led to the usage of the engine from the 1985 cruiser for which a bid was never received. This was the most cost efficient way to get to Town Meeting time. There were several options which were discussed and looked into but this one came out the most cost efficient.

I have gotten the frame work and insulation work done upstairs in the Town Office Building and have materials to get most of the carpentry done. I have to find an electrician and a plumber to do the necessary work. I feel that the amount I'm asking for will be all that is needed to get the job done and we would be able to move in. When the job is done and we are settled in, I will have an open house so that Townspeople can come down and look over the new department.

I have asked for the hiring of a new patrolman as of June 1st, 1989. We have received 4,314 calls for this past year of 1988. In 1987 we received 3,955 calls at the dispatch center. That is an average of 329 calls per month. We are experiencing more and more thefts and a lot of traffic. There used to be little if any traffic around 9:00 p.m. weekdays and 10-11:00 p.m. weekends. Today the hours have run up until midnight on weekdays and as late as 3:00 a.m. on the weekends. I'm not saying it is a rush hour out there but there is quite a bit of traffic. I can recall when you could just about tell time by cars that went by on our road, but now I don't recognize most of the cars and there is almost a constant pattern to the traffic and it runs late into the night. This is just my road. I'm sure the others are the same and some even heavier with traffic. There was a traffic survey done on some of our back roads and if you are interested, I have a copy. There are sections that would shock you as to the amount of traffic.

Presently, my position is demanding me to be in too many places at one time and it has come down to the fact I can not spend 8 hours a day five days a week out on patrol. It has gotten to the point that I am spending almost $\frac{1}{2}$ of my work week in the office and the rest of the week is spent in court, investigations and patrol. During the week I am the only duty officer on during the day with the exception of Thursdays, because Thursdays are our court days and I can not just leave court to answer a call. If I did it would take at least 15-25 minutes to get to the call.

I thank you for your continued support and cooperation.

New Hampton Fire Department 1988 Report

1988 was not a good year in terms of serious fires. We had a total of 151 calls, down slightly from the previous year, but considerably higher in the number of structure fires. We had five major fires of which two, we believe, were set, and three were of accidental causes. The balance of the calls were 34 fire calls, 18 chimney fires and 17 Mutual Aid runs. We also responded to 68 medical and accident calls. All of which, although less in numbers, created a very busy year.

The Town at its meeting voted to purchase a new fire pumper/tanker which has been ordered. We expect delivery of this vehicle in February, 1989. It will be a very necessary and welcome addition to our fire fighting capability. Upon its arrival we will take out of service the 1961 International pumper, which will be turned over to the Selectmen for sale after we remove the useable equipment.

In surveying our equipment over the last few years, one area that was not looked at strongly was the fire station itself. There have been informal discussions within the department as to what direction we feel we should be looking. We have room to store our vehicles and some room around them for repairs. What we do not have is adequate hose drying and storage capability, nor storage area for our other equipment, in a convenient and retrievable manner.

We propose to do ourselves, over the next few years, addition of a 20 foot extension to the back of the station with a door facing Fire House Lane. This will house a hose drying tower, space for the emergency generator, air compressor, work benches and room for 1 vehicle.

Again, as in the past, we thank the community for their support, and ask each family to support their fire department by having at least one smoke detector in the living area of their houses. It will save your life.

Report Of Town Forest Fire Warden And State Forest Ranger

Between July 1987 and June 1988, we experienced more fires than normal. The three leading causes of forest fires were again children, fires kindled without written permission of a Forest Fire Warden and debris burning. All causes are preventable, but only with your help.

Please help our town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. Contact your Forest Fire Warden for more information.

Enforcement of a state timber harvest regulation is the responsibility of State Forestry officials. Our state has excellent timber harvest regulations; however, your assistance is needed.

If you know of a logging operation and suspect a state timber harvest law may be violated, call your Forest Fire Warden, Concord Forest Protection Headquarters at (603) 271-2217, or local Forest Ranger.

On January 1, 1989, the Deceptive Forestry Business Practices Law (RSA 224:54) goes into effect. This law, in summary, states that a person is guilty of a misdemeanor if, in the course of buying or selling a forest product, uses a false weight or measure for falsely determining any quality or quantity of a forest product. Our next piece of equipment to be purchased should be a boat and trailer. With the river and other small ponds in the area we need these in case of a rescue.

Three members of the department have enrolled in the EMT program and upon their completion this should bring to five the number of certified EMT's in New Hampton.

Newfound Ambulance Rescue

1988 REPORT

Newfound Ambulance Rescue experienced another busy year in 1988 with increased call activity in providing service to New Hampton and the surrounding Newfound Area, including the Towns of Alexandria, Bridgewater, Bristol, Danbury, and Hebron.

There were a total of 456 calls during 1988, an increase of 24 over the previous year. This continues the trend in recent years of steadily increasing call activity. For example in 1984, there were 316 calls. For the Town of New Hampton there were 72 calls, down from 85 the year before. A breakdown of the number of calls per town is shown below.

Efforts are ongoing to ensure continuing compliance with basic State requirements and to improve on the level of care we can offer the residents and visitors in our service area. Most important in this regard are the E.M.T. attendants that staff the ambulances, a small dedicated group that strive to enhance their individual training and upgrade to advanced levels of certification. They deserve your support.

Newfound Ambulance Rescue is always on the lookout for new attendants. As activity grows we need additional help. If you might be interested in becoming an ambulance attendant, or know someone who could be, please contact Roger Pedersen at the Bristol Town Offices for more information.

In the year ahead we look forward to replacing the 1981 ambulance with a new unit. Also significant is an anticipated change in dispatch service, to the Lakes Region Fire Dispatch Center, approximately July 1. This will result in a single number to call for emergency ambulance and rescue needs, the same number you now call for your Fire Department. This change will be possible as a result of the integration of Newfound Ambulance Rescue as a department of the Town of Bristol.

New Hampton Highway Department Report For 1988

1988 was a productive year for the Highway Department. The most exciting and beneficial project was the rebuilding and paving of Old Bristol Road from the village to the intersection of Old Bristol Road and Blake Hill Road, and the rebuilding of Blake Hill Road to the bridge at the foot of Blake Hill. We intend to put a finish course of pavement over the entire length this summer. I hope after reaping the benefits of a good road you will again support our road rebuilding program.

Thanks to your support the department purchased a new Caterpillar 130 grader, plow and wing. The new grader's dependability has been a real asset to our program.

We initiated a program of cleaning back roadsides of overgrown limbs and brush. Several miles were done in 1988 and several more will be done in 1989. This not only helps visibility for public safety but also lets the sun be of more benefit to us during winter maintenance.

Several culverts were replaced this year. Several more have been marked for replacement this next year.

The bridge at Jackson Pond was rebuilt this fall giving us a 6 ton rating for load limit. In order to increase it further a new bridge would have to be erected.

A welcome addition to our team this summer was Doug Smith. His enthusiasm and conscientious effort is much appreciated. I also wish to thank Sam and Stan for all they contributed to making it a successful year for us.

We purchased a new plow for Stan's truck out of the operating budget for this year. The price was \$3,100. His old plow was purchased with the Hough loader many years ago. It was so bent and worn, after many winters, that our welding and bracing only served as a temporary fix-it before it broke again. We were able to purchase a last year's left-over and saved the price increase we would have paid if we waited and purchased it with the new truck this year.

We are asking you to consider the replacement of the 1981 Chevy Kodiac dump truck and spreader. We have only used this truck this year for plowing and sanding and short trips. Besides having been rolled on its side at least twice, the truck is worn beyond the point of safe operation. I have tried to get a new steering box for it since I became Road Agent, but cannot. When going down the road it goes wherever it likes. Also the engine needs work. This is the year it was scheduled for replacement. The spreader we discontinued use of in December as the chain bed broke several times and needed replacing. The metal work is rusted so bad the last time the chain broke it took the tail gate out also. This is the second truck for the spreader as it was purchased in 1976.

Not everything was rosy this year. I walked into the highway building one Friday morning in July to find the shop had been broken into and \$7,000 worth of tools, tires and supplies gone. Thanks to insurance we were able to recover most of the loss. Since then we have taken some protective measures trying to avoid this happening again.

I welcome your suggestions as to what we should or should not be doing. This department works for you the taxpayers, trying to give you as safe and dependable passage way as possible. Any time you see a problem that should be corrected don't hesitate to call us. Again, I appreciate your support over this past year.

I also wish to thank the Board of Selectmen and the Police Department for their help and support during 1988.

Pemi-Baker Solid Waste District 1988 Activities

The Pemi-Baker Solid Waste District is a group of communities that have worked together for the last five years to solve the solid waste (garbage) disposal problem. In 1988 the town of Ashland joined the 11 municipalities and the District moved forward with its 1987 decision to upgrade the Plymouth Incinerator/Recycling Facility and to investigate the possibility of developing a landfill site at the Rumney Transfer Station.

The District, coordinated by the North Country Council, hired an air quality assessment firm to evaluate the effect of the upgraded Plymouth facility on the area's air quality. Based on the worst possible scenario at the expanded incinerator, air emission controls were determined unnecessary. However, the District voted to move forward with the best available technologies to improve the existing air quality.

Additionally, the District hired an engineering firm to evaluate the potential landfill site at the Rumney Transfer Station. The study is still underway and preliminary assessments were presented in late January.

Numerous District meetings were held throughout the year with much of the group's energy focused on how to work together as a group. A District Agreement was drafted and reviewed by the District's attorney and individual towns' attorneys. A question to accept the agreement is on the warrant.

In addition to organizing the 12 communities, assessing the Rumney site and the air quality issues, the group has worked to promote a better understanding of the solid waste disposal situation in the Valley. Public informational meetings were held in the fall and mid-winter. Recycling efforts were encouraged and expanded throughout the region.

Final design work and permits for the landfill and the incinerator are on the work docket for 1989. The District has a tough responsibility to provide economical and environmentally sound solutions for the disposal of solid waste. Those of you interested in the efforts are welcome to attend our regular meetings. Your involvement is encouraged!

In his spare time, Dave designs nature programs for high schools throughout NH and US (Project WILD and NH Environmental Educators), teaches NHF&G hunter safety in Plymouth, is preparing our wetlands inventory, and still finds time to guide several nature walks. This fall, he prepared and taught a four-meeting course, "Water and Wetlands" for Dodie Greenwood's fourth graders. We sponsored their bus trip to the Conservation Area.

Future generations will particularly appreciate Clare Eckert's efforts in the Lakes Region Hazardous Waste Drive; Eugene Morgan, Clare and Grita assisted at the Bristol collection point. Thanks to all the townspeople who participated. A general collection is scheduled again for June. And we salute New Hampton's recycling planning. Something we ought to do, something we have to do.

All of us attended meetings and workshops: High Intensity Soil Survey and Geographic Information Services workshops (soil types, population projections, water needs layered on the computer will give the instant New Hampton picture); NH Assoc. of Conservation Commission (Ken Kettenring and I presented workshops); NH Rivers Campaign (legislative testimony for NH's first river protection law, Pemi one of six named for special consideration); State House Town Meeting, "Preserving Community Character"; Squam Lakes Watershed Assoc. (preparing protection plan which includes Jackson and Sky Ponds), NH Municipal Assoc., NH Resource Recovery Assoc., and the Pemi-Baker Solid Waste District.

Protection of open space is a prime objective now and conservation easements for property owners are available. While the property remains the owner's or heir's and on tax rolls, the owner sells/donates future development rights. Questions? Please contact the commission; meetings on the second Tuesday.

The Pemi Lake beachfront has had visitors and though the 368th Engineer Bn has more work to do, it's beginning to look a lot like progress. Unfortunately, sick vandalism continues and Bill Huckins' fine gate has been cut up. We appreciate assistance of the Belknap County Conservation District and Soil Conservation Service with two wetlands applications. Another wishes to put a 450' bridge, formerly over the Connecticut, across a wetland backwater of the Pemi. He has been referred to the Town Road Agent, Zoning Board of Appeals, the NH Wetlands Board and DOT.

I was gratified to receive the Lakes Region Planning Commission's Kim Ayers award for efforts of the Pemigewasset River Council. Lincoln's leaking wastewater treatment plant, the proposed dam for Livermore Falls and Loon expansion Joint Review Comm. have taken considerable effort. Lillian McCrelis serves as treasurer of commission and PRC.

1988 Planning Board Report

The past year has been one of stabilizing the growth of the community as the economy in the region slows its growth. The interim growth ordinance gave the Board the time needed to develop a Capital Improvements Plan. A special Thank You is given to Laurence A. Blood who chaired the subcommittee and was the driving force that completed this project.

The Planning Board is also involved in the development of a Traffic Impact Plan along with the New Hampton Highway Department and the Lakes Region Planning Commission. When this project is completed we will study the need for a Growth Management Ordinance.

The Planning Board approved 14 subdivisions involving 526.36 acres, creating 49 lots in 1988.

One of the main projects on the Planning Board's agendum for 1989 is to draft and adopt Site Plan Review Regulations.

On behalf of the Planning Board, I thank you for your continued support and I take this opportunity to remind you to obtain a copy of the New Hampton Capital Improvements Plan before you go to Town meeting to act upon the upcoming budget.

Our regular meeting is held on the third Tuesday of the month at 7:30 P.M. in the town office building and is open to the public. Notices of our agendum will be published in the Evening Citizen which is a daily newspaper of general circulation within the community.

Over the course of the past fiscal year, the Lakes Region Planning Commission provided support and assistance to the Town of New Hampton at both the regional and local levels. The following list represents a sample of some of the ways in which the LRPC has assisted the community.

- * Met with town officials to discuss LRPC service and assistance, and submitted a proposal to prepare a capital improvements program.
- * Responded to a question regarding the Trust for New Hampshire Lands.
- * Provided town official with an overhead projection slide for the Pemi River Conservation Association.
- * Provided information on the Household Hazardous Waste Collection Procedures.
- * Compiled background data for the New Hampton Capital Improvements Program in accordance with a special contract.
- * Provided information to the town regarding the treatment of special exceptions.
- * Completed a map of the New Hampton Village Precinct for the Precinct Planning Board.
- * Coordinated a household hazardous waste collection which included the receipt of grant funds from the N.H. Dept. of Environmental Services.
- * Participated on the Loon Mountain E.I.S. Joint Review Committee.
- * Researched and analyzed changes in local housing characteristics since the 1980 census as part of a Regional Housing Characteristics Study.
- * Reviewed changes in local land use regulations to update a report on development regulations in the Lakes Region.
- * Co-Hosted the annual Municipal Law Lecture Series, where practicing attorneys provided a legal perspective on local planning, zoning and procedural issues.
- * Developed a guidebook for developing Cluster Development Regulations.
- * Presented three public workshops for local land use boards on how to prepare fiscal, traffic and environmental impact studies.

The New Hampton Community Kindergarten

The New Hampton Community Kindergarten continues to provide a sound educational experience for the town's children. We have an enrollment of 20 children and enrich our curriculum with library visits and a full schedule of field trips.

As well as providing a quality pre-school education for all students, teacher Margaret Jeffers and assistant Deborah Michael work closely with the school district to provide for special needs children.

Because of the town's financial support and the continued generosity of the New Hampton Community Church, we have been able to maintain a financially stable kindergarten and to establish a scholarship fund for needy children. Our newly expanded building, complete with new heating system, is efficient and economical. Thanks in part to the generosity of area businesses and individuals, the addition is completely paid for.

Unfortunately, other operating costs, such as supplies and telephone, are escalating. The governor-elect has announced his intent to cut all spending for services by 3%. Federal programs, such as Medicare, are also in danger of being reduced. Since reimbursement for home health services is cost based, cuts mean reimbursement below the cost of providing the service.

To help insure that NANA will be able to continue to provide its services, the Board of Directors has established an endowment fund for all general contributions received. The purpose of this endowment will be to conserve principal and use interest income to subsidize services.

Our dedicated staff continues to provide needed services to residents in the home. The monthly hypertension screening, well-child immunications, and foot care clinics are available to all at no charge. Durable medical equipment, such as electric beds and wheel chairs, are loaned to area residents at no cost.

The continued support of our towns is appreciated and is essential to meeting the health needs of area residents.

State Representative's Report

Education, growth, and environmental issues dominated the 1988 session of the New Hampshire legislature, with more than 1,100 bills filed on these and other subjects.

On the environmental front, the legislature approved funding for a number of water pollution control projects in the Lakes Region. A bill mandating the inspection of waterfront septic systems upon sale of property or addition of living space also was approved, and should also help to improve water quality. The legislature also approved \$30 million in funding for the Trust for New Hampshire Lands to purchase outstanding land parcels and conservation easements.

The legislature also voted to create an Office of Community Assistance in the Office of State Planning to help small communities like ours plan for managed growth. OSP also worked with area residents to conduct the Squam Watershed program which will serve as a model for watershed protection throughout the state.

The squeeze for education funding continues. Legislation has been introduced to increase the state's share of school building aid. In addition, efforts to provide a minimum share of sweepstakes revenue to every community (ours currently receives no monies from sweepstakes) also are progressing in Concord.

During 1988, more than 350 letters and phone calls were received on various matters. Office hours are held on a monthly basis during the legislative session for anyone interested in finding out more about a bill, wanting a problem with a state agency solved, or to share information on legislation.
