

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

[L. S.]

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Newton, in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall, in said Newton, on Tuesday, the 12th day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To hear reports of the Town Officers and to pass any vote relating thereto.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to be expended for tarvia for Town roads.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

- 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell property acquired by Tax Collectors Deed or through Old Age Assistance.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$225.00 to receive \$899.98 for State Aid Construction on Town Aid Roads.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for gravel for Wilder's Grove Road.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 to paint and repair Town Hall.
- 11. On petition of Fred M. Knowlton and twenty-seven others, to see if the Town will vote to expend the Class V Appropriation on Railroad Avenue.
- 12. On petition of Fred M. Knowlton and twenty-seven others, to see if the Town will vote to install street lights on Railroad Avenue and make appropriations for same.

William K. Davis, James A. Marden, Kenneth F. Briggs, George L. Cheney, Kent Walker, Everett O. Kelly, Timoth J. Hanley were qualified by the Moderator. Augustus E. Locke and Pearl R. Davis were qualified on March 17, 1945 by William K. Davis, Justice of the Peace.

On motion of Asbra Harmon it was voted that Selectmen appoint all officers not elected.

- Article 2. On motion of Wilbur R. Sargent it was voted we add the sum of \$30.00 to the budget for the purpose of binding old town reports, and raise and appropriate the amount asked for in the budget with this addition.
- Article 3. On motion of Alice C. Foley it was voted to accept the reports of the Town Officers with corrections to be made.
- Article 4. On motion of Thomas W. Locke it was voted that the Selectmen be authorized to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
- Article 5. On motion of Asbra Harmon it was voted to raise and appropriate \$500.00 for tarvia to be used on Town roads.
- Article 6. On motion of Asbra Harmon it was voted to install a street light in front of the residence of Walter B. Kershaw on Highland Street.
- Article 7. On motion of Karl W. Richardson it was voted to pass over the article in regard to audit by State Tax Commission.
 - Article 8. On motion of Edward Parker it was voted

to authorize the Selectmen to sell property acquired by Collectors' deeds or through Old Age Assistance.

Article 9. By a vote of 25 - 16 the town did not favor United States membership in a general system of International cooperation, such as that proposed at the Dunbarton Oaks Conference, having police power to maintain the peace of the world.

Article 10. On motion of William Foley it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$202.97 to receive \$811.87 for State Aid Construction on Town Aid Roads, to be used on Railroad Avenue, if possible, if not to be used on some other road.

Article 11. On motion of Robert S. Prescott it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to remove trees and widen the road in Wilders' Grove.

Article 12. On motion of William K. Davis it was voted that we raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to purchase a lot of land from Charles H. Hoyt with a frontage of 50 feet and 400 feet deep, adjacent to Highland Cemetery.

Article 13. On motion of Hayden E. Cheney it was voted that the Selectmen be authorized to make emergency repairs on Town Hall.

Meeting adjourned without date at 9.30 P. M.

There were reported in 1945: Mumps 10, Measles 43, Pneumonia 4, Septic Throat 1, Dog Bite 1, Nuisances 3. The town dump has had to be levelled and gravel applied twice during the year due to careless or willful misuse. Animal, vegetable and other offensive material have been deposited causing a health menace. Rubbish has been thrown in piles near or in the highway. Residents of Newton are warned not to deposit carcasses of animals, fowls, or any portions thereof, or any vegetables, or fruit, or any offal, manure or any matter liable to become offensive upon decay.

Chapter 140, Sec. 13. Public Laws of N. H., Offensive Matter:—If a person shall place, leave, or cause to be placed or left, in or near a highway, street, alley, public place or wharf, or shall allow to be exposed unburied, any animal or other substance liable to become putrid or offensive, or injurious to the public health, he shall be fined not more than twenty dollars; and the health officers shall remove the same.

Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the School Board and Citizens of Newton:

It is with pleasure that I submit my annual report as Superintendent of Schools. This report deals with the Newton Schools for the school year July 1, 1944 to June 30, 1945. It is accompanied by reports by Mrs. Soule and Mrs. Thompson.

As in the past I am presenting information about our schools in statistical form. Many interesting facts can best be shown in this manner. I commend these tables as well as the reports just mentioned, to your attention.

There has been one change in our teaching staff since my last report. Mrs. Loleta M. Palmer, after twelve years of very fine service resigned her position. Mrs. Edna Boyd was appointed to the vacancy in grades five and six.

The enrollment last year was 97 as compared with 100 the year before. The school attendance averaged 92.6 percent of the membership. Eleven boys and girls completed the work of grade eight. All of these have entered a high school. The Good Citizenship medal was awarded to Walter Perkins.

For three years now only the most urgent repairs have been made on school buildings and equipment for the reason that war conditions have greatly restricted supplies of material and labor. Both buildings are in need of paint. The village building has not been painted for many years.

For a number of years the five towns that make up our Supervisory Union have owned and used a silent motion picture machine. The motion pictures have been very helpful, especially in the teaching of History, Geography, and Health. At present the majority of recent educational films

are made for sound machines. I hope it will be possible soon to exchange our projector for a sound machine. The rapid rate of learning in the army is attributed, to a considerable extent, to the use of motion picture machines.

Nearly every classroom has one or more children with some hearing impairment. The average for the country is three such children per classroom. Hearing impairment can be measured by a special scientific device called an audiometer. These tests are to be given to all children during this school year by Mrs. Soule. An audiometer has been loaned us by our State Board of Education. It has been found that 60% of the hard of hearing can be given the aurological care he needs. Those children that the doctors can not help become educational problems. Instruction in lip reading becomes necessary in extreme cases. Speech defects are often caused by inability to hear certain sounds.

We hope it will be possible to hold a dental clinic soon.

Last Spring the New Hampshire Legislature passed a revised Teacher Retirement System which gives our teachers worthwhile retirement privileges. Women may retire at sixty years of age and men at sixty-five, providing their term of service meets the requirements. The retirement fund is built up by contributions, both by the teacher and the school district in which she is employed. A majority of the teachers of our state have joined the retirement system. Teacher Retirement Systems help to build better schools by maintaining efficiency and economy in the use of school funds; by raising the morale of the school personnel; by holding good teachers in public school service.

The school nurse, Mrs. Jessie Soule, R. N., is continuing her good work in the schools. She has made many home calls as well as the regular school visits in the interest of children's health. She has been generous in furnishing transportation to children at clinics and other remedial work.

"War Stamp Day" became a weekly institution during the war. It helped children learn to save, by making it easy

for them to save. It taught arithmetic, attitudes of responsibility, and an appreciation of the citizen's part in government. Schools that wish to continue in peace time the educational advantages of "Stamp Day," will be able to get United States Savings Stamps as formerly. Study units and teaching aids in the field of personal money management will be available. It is hoped that at least some of our schools will continue this valuable project.

Teaching of the basic skills is the essential task of the schools and it has been our plan to see that the job is thoroughly done by means of the best accepted methods. In order for pupils to succeed in school work, it is necessary that they possess a good foundation in reading habits and abilities. For this reason a substantial part of book expenditures has been to continue to equip elementary grades with a good reading system supplemented by work book exercises for reading growth, with correct language habits in writing and speaking.

The progress made by each pupil in grades one to eight will be checked by an achievement test during the year and as early as possible after the middle of the year. These tests help us understand the educational needs of the child and the class.

For the Teachers, the School Board, and myself, I express the common desire that a larger number of parents and friends visit the schools. If parents will come to school to see their children at work, what they are doing, what they are given to do with, and how their work is directed, it will give them first hand information concerning our schools.

In conclusion I wish to express my appreciation of the fine spirit of cooperation on the part of the School Board, Teachers, Local Organizations, and the Community.

Report of Supervisor of Music

To Mr. William J. Nelson, Superintendent of Schools:

I hereby submit my annual report as supervisor of music in the schools of Newton:

The music program in our schools provides an integrated experience which develops an understanding of and a love for music. The first step is to let the child listen to the singing of simple songs with a good tone quality. His next step is his own acquirement of a beautiful tone. Along with the development of tone quality, consideration is given to expression and diction. As the children develop in singing, listening, and music reading, they learn to sing in parts, always an interesting experience. The adult male voice becomes interesting as a conscious singing and listening experience as the boy's voice changes. It is usually at this time that such classifications as soprano, alto, tenor, and bass take on a definite meaning.

Listening is the basis of all music learning. In music study, from the first song taught by imitation listening remains of great importance through the succeeding years. Through listening children become acquainted with the music of the master composers.



PREVENT FOREST FIRES— IT PAYS

An average of 7,300 acres of woodland are burned over by forest fires in New Hampshire each year destroying many thousand dollars worth of property of all description. It costs many additional thousands of dollars and requires valuable man hours, taken from other essential work, to extinguish them. These losses affect the personal fortunes of the owners, and town and state economies. Everyone loses because of them.

Analysis of fire causes reveals the fact that more than 98 percent of all forest fires are, consistently, the result of human carelessness and are preventable!

We have been extremely fortunate during the past few years. Favorable fire weather and war time restrictions on travel which kept people off the highways and out of the woods have aided materially in reducing fire risks, keeping fires fewer and fire losses low.

We now face changed conditions. People can travel freely. Their love for travel and the freedom of the woods will bring them out in ever increasing numbers. This will step up the fire risk materially. The accelerated cutting of the war years has resulted in additional thousands of slash acres. These factors, combined with a possible dry season and human carelessness could easily produce a catastrophe. everyone must consequently, be on his guard. He should

- 1. Be careful with fire or when smoking in or near woodlands.
- 2. Cooperate with the local forest fire warden and his deputies by
- a. Abiding cheerfully with whatever restrictions it may be necessary to impose. They are intended only to be helpful.
- b. Securing permits to burn debris when the ground is not covered with snow.
- c. Seeing that others comply with the requirements.
- d. Promptly coming to the warden's assistance when needed.

If these few fundamental practices are followed it will be possible to PREVENT a large proportion of FOREST FIRES from starting—that PAYS!
