## WARRANT.

---

### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

*To the inhabitants of the Town of Plymouth in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs.*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing and one library trustee for three years.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.
3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for repairing highways.
4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate to pay firemen.
5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate to be used in decorating soldiers graves.
6. To see if the town will vote to extend the lights to the corner of Avery and Pleasant streets.
7. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Road Agent to purchase a snow roller for the use of the town.
8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate for school purposes, including free text books and supplies.
9. To see if the town will vote to establish a public library and accept the provisions of Chapter 8 of the Pub-

lic Statutes with subsequent amendments thereto, in such manner as to be entitled to one hundred dollars worth of books from the state.

10. To see if the town will vote to authorize the library trustees to accept the proposition of the directors of the Young Ladies' Library Association of Plymouth to open and maintain their library for the free use of the inhabitants of said town, in its present form, or as amended to meet the approval of the library trustees.

11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the public library in addition to the amount required by the terms of the law.

12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of buying books to be owned by the town and marked as its property and kept by the Young Ladies' Library Association of Plymouth during the pleasure of the town for the use of all the inhabitants of the town.

13. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money to pay the debts of the town and give therefor notes of the town countersigned by the Town Treasurer.

## ***ROAD AGENT'S REPORT.***

---

The highways in the town are in as good condition as could be expected owing to the heavy fall of snow this winter and only the ordinary repairs will be necessary in the spring and summer.

The sewer near town hall which broke out last summer was repaired by this department at a cost of about \$50, which should have been charged to sewer account.

We have worked in outside districts in the town to the amount of \$252, which was charged up to the village district.

The heavy washout in July cost this department over \$300 to repair our highways.

Repairing bank wall on lower Main street and concrete laid at a cost of about \$700, which was paid for by this department.

We have purchased a new main shaft for crusher which has not been used but is on hand at tool house at a cost of \$30.

## REPORT OF BOARD OF HEALTH.

---

The Board of Health have attended to their duties to the best of their ability during the past year and there is nothing unusual or important to report. Occasions calling for action on our part have not been numerous but some of them have been important.

No epidemic of contagious or infectious disease has visited us. There has not been a single case of diphteria or scarlet fever reported. There has been reported five cases of typhoid fever. Of these four were of a very grave type and one was fatal. In the care of these cases the usual means and we think unusual efforts were used to destroy the infectious germs and prevent propagation and spread of the disease. In view of the tendency of this disease to stay in a locality where it has once appeared as it has here and to make its appearance on successive seasons, the Board take the liberty of making a few practical suggestions through their report, although this method is unusual and the suggestions may be thought by some uncalled for. During or before the first week in May all privys and vaults should be thoroughly cleaned out and disinfected. Cellars should be attended to, all decaying vegetables and decaying wood as well should be removed, the place made literally *clean* and arrangements made for a free circulation of air through the cellar and under the buildings generally. Neither should the grounds outside be forgotten. The banking, the front yard, the back yard, and more particularly the back-door rubbish heap, where such a thing exists, should all receive attention as early as the condition of the ground will permit. All rubbish, superfluous soil, chips, etc., everything which is subject to decay and cannot be utilized should be removed and in its place encouraged to growth of vegetation as of grass, grain, flowers or the weeds which grow spontaneously.

Much might be said in regard to our sewerage system which is far from perfect but as it would be of no practical value in such a report as this we commend the subject to our successors and the level headed men who direct town affairs.
