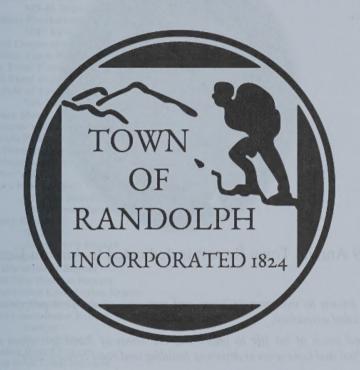

He dedicated much of his life to improving the Town of Randolph, from mowing the Randolph Pool and Lake area to driveway building and road construction.

- 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$10,000 and place in the Fire Equipment and Protection Expendable Trust Fund. (The Selectmen Recommend Passage of This Article.)
- 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$5,000 and place in the Expendable Trust for Town Recreation Facilities. (The Selectmen Recommend Passage of This Article.)
- 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000 for the purpose of supporting the Family Resource Center at Gorham. (Placed on the Warrant by the petition of 15 Randolph residents.) (The Selectmen Recommend the Passage of this Article.)
- 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,500 for the purpose of supporting the Gorham Community Learning Center in Gorham. (Placed on the Warrant by the petition of 10 Randolph residents.) (The Selectmen Recommend the Passage of this Article.)
- 19. To see if the town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 72:61 through RSA 72:72 inclusively, which provide for an optional property tax exemption from the property's assessed value, for property tax purposes, for persons owning real property, which is equipped with solar energy systems intended for use at the immediate site. Such property tax exemption shall be in the amount equal to 100% of the assessed value of qualifying equipment under these statutes. (The Selectmen Recommend Passage of This Article.)
- **20.** To see if the Town will vote to discontinue completely a portion of Durand Road, formerly known as Old US Route 2 per RSA 231:43. The portion to be discontinued completely, currently a part of a Class VI public highway, is described as follows:

Beginning at a point at the centerline of Durand Road, GPS 44.361567 – 71.337258 at the piles of dirt WSW to the end approximately 168.63 ft more or less, GPS 44.361452 – 71.337419, between the properties Map U8 Lot 12 currently owned by Charles Lowe Jr. and Map U8 Lot 5 currently owned by James Batchelder. (The Selectmen Recommend Passage of This Article.)

- 21. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 79-F, Taxation of Farm Structures and Land Under Farm Structures. If adopted, this would allow any land necessary to support or service the qualifying farm structure to be considered for current use tax. (The Selectmen Recommend Passage of This Article.)
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to affirm RSA Chapter 286, which allows the town to regulate public assembly, for the purposes of protecting traffic safety, preventing public disturbances and ensuring public health, safety and welfare. RSA 31:39 and 105:9 also apply to this resolution allowing for reimbursement of expenses if needed. (*The Selectmen Recommend Passage of This Article.*)
- 23. Transact any additional business that may legally come before this meeting.

2019 Selectmen's Report

This year has been marked by many land transactions in the town. Through the efforts of several conservation agencies and many volunteers from Gorham and Randolph, about 200 acres of Gorham Town Forest, located in Randolph, has been purchased and transferred into the Randolph Town Forest. Many thanks go to the Randolph Forest Commission and Conservation Commission for bringing this project to completion. This new tract provides access to the Randolph Town Forest via Jimtown Road in Gorham for recreational as well as forest use. In addition, 32 acres of wetland on the Moose River and 16 acres of adjacent forest land have been added to the Town Forest this year.

After years of effort and negotiation we will no longer be the proud owners of a bridge to nowhere, as the bridge at the far west end of Durand Road will be discontinued along with approximately 160 feet of Durand Road including the bridge and the piles of gravel on either end of it. The discontinuation of the bridge and road section means that we are no longer financially responsible for maintaining it. The status change will need to be approved by our vote on Warrant Article #20 at Town Meeting.

East of the bridge along the western extension of Durand Road, a large concrete culvert was placed in accordance with state requirements for a potential fish spawning stream.

The 5-year revaluation of Randolph properties took place in 2019. Per new state statute solar panels are included at a standard value in the valuation. Since so many town residents are now installing solar panels, the solar exemption is quite out of date. A Warrant Article #19 will be voted on at Town Meeting to offset this new assessment.

The Town of Gorham filed an abatement for the 2018 tax year for their forest holdings in the Town of Randolph. This disagreement on taxable value was finally resolved with a PILT (payment in lieu of taxes) settlement reached by negotiations with both town boards in January, 2020. The new PILT payment from Gorham will be more in line with what the Randolph Town Forest pays for our PILT on our landholdings in Jefferson.

The Board has committed to the long-term planning for rebuilding Durand Road and has met with surveyors and an engineer along with members of the public to develop the best solution. Test borings were performed, the road has been surveyed, and planning is under way. It is hopeful this project will be ready for bidding by the end of 2020 and construction underway in 2021.

A representative from Clean Energy NH addressed the board regarding energy efficiency in town buildings and has assisted us in having an energy audit performed. The result is a newly insulated meeting hall which should greatly reduce fuel consumption in that portion of Town Hall.

In June a tragic traffic accident resulted in the deaths of 7 people and had a major impact on our small community. Route 2 through Randolph is a very dangerous stretch of road with 12 fatalities along it in the last several years. Because of the magnitude of the accident and the many motorists stopping at the site, the Gorham American Legion Post, working closely with the Town of Randolph, is planning a memorial nearby, at a safe location off the highway in the area of the accident.

2019 Library Annual Report

This past year there were many programs at the Library. Programs that were planned by the library and funded through the Friends group, programs in cooperation with and run by residents, and programs which were made available through grants. The year started off with a book discussion series led by Jim Hunt, answering the question "what does it mean to be human?" The What's Up Doc? Documentary Film Series continued through the winter, and a fun February children's series focused on biographies and creativity. In March we were introduced to some Zen





practices and meditation, and in May, the Mildred Horton Book Group had a very thoughtful discussion of The Stranger in the Woods: The Extraordinary Story of the Last True Hermit.

slide presentations Summer programming featured and discussions by Allison Bell and Maida Goodwin, authors of Glorious Mountain Days; Carol R. Foss from the NH Audubon speaking about ongoing migratory bird research; and Rebecca Brown from the Ammonoosuc Conservation Trust regarding stewardship of our lands and surrounding rivers. We wrapped up the summer programming with a return visit by actor Stephen Collins in his performance as Herman

Melville in "Sailing Towards My Father."

The children's summer program revolved around "A Universe of Stories". The highlight being our own library refrigerator box planetarium and life size astronaut port hole for walking on the moon. The Kids, Books and the Arts Grant from the NH State Library enabled us to have an old time *Punch and Judy* performance by the "Modern Times Theater" from East Hardwick, Vermont.

Other Library business included the purchase of a new laptop computer, wireless LCD projector, and a new DVD/Blu Ray player. The new Interlibrary Loan System at the NH State Library went online in November, and as a result, interlibrary loans have doubled.



The Friends of the Randolph Public Library continue to play a large role in supporting the library, such as funding many of the programs and materials needed for the children's programs, purchasing the Movie Site License, fundraising through the annual bake sale, and joining with the Randolph Fire Department to provide a fun Christmas party for Randolph families.

Library visits and material usage were up slightly over last year and program attendance showed a slight decline. Statistics: Circulation of materials - 2,110; electronic materials - 1,131; library visits - 1,634; new patrons - 25; program attendance - 385.

Lastly, none of this would be possible without the committed professional support of the Randolph Library Board of Trustees, the dedicated volunteers, and all of the loyal patrons and visitors who frequent the library. It is truly an honor and pleasure to serve as your librarian and I thank you for the privilege.

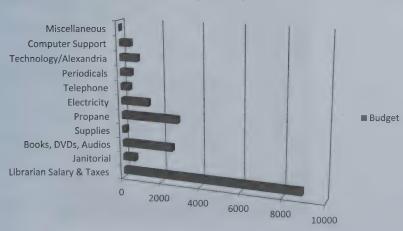

The "Randolph Seven" was our largest response leading to the department having to assist at the scene, with publicity, and memorial events. We continue to be a member of North Pac Mutual Aid System which several fire departments from this group assisted Randolph this year.

The fire department continues to have a firehouse pancake breakfast in August. This seems to continue to be a town favorite that residents look forward to. The fire fighters enjoy the activity as well as many residents which is evident by the cooks that come to the station to assist with the activity. One of the favorites at the breakfast is again the homemade blueberry pancakes. As always thank you to all who assist the department at this activity and the residents for their continued support.

The department also continues to hold a Christmas party for the children of Randolph. Once again this was a huge success with 25 children attending and receiving a special gift from Santa. 'Twas the Night before Christmas' was read to a captive audience. For the first time in many years, the children did the performance of a replica of the manger scene. The crowd enjoyed singing Christmas melodies lead by Rachel Fithian and Christa Rousseau. A good time was enjoyed by everyone who attended. A special thanks to the Randolph Public Library again for donating a book for Santa to give each child that attended the party.

As in the past, we are always looking for people to join the Randolph Fire Department. We continue to seek men and women over the age of 18 who are interested in helping in any way.

Report of Forest Fire Warden and State Forest Ranger

This past year we were fortunate enough to have favorable weather conditions in the spring and summer which limited the amount of wildfire activity throughout the state. Your local fire departments and the Division of Forests & Lands worked throughout the year to protect homes and the forests. The statewide system of 16 fire lookout towers continues to operate on high fire danger days. The towers' fire detection efforts are supplemented by the NH Civil Air Patrol when the fire danger is especially high.

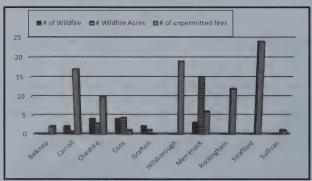
Many homes in New Hampshire are located in the wildland urban interface, which is the area where homes and flammable wildland fuels intermix. Every year New Hampshire sees fires which threaten or destroy structures, a constant reminder that wildfires burn more than just trees. Homeowners should take measures to prevent a wildfire from spreading to their home. Precautions include keeping your roof and gutters clear of leaves and pine needles, and maintaining adequate green space around your home free of flammable materials. Additional information and homeowner recommendations are available at www.firewise.org. Please help Smokey Bear, your local fire department, and the state's Forest Rangers by being fire wise and fire safe!

The Forest Protection Bureau and local fire departments were very busy this year celebrating Smokey Bear's 75th year preventing wildfires. Many events were held at local libraries, in fact, this program was so successful we will be offering it again in 2020. We were fortunate enough to partner with the Northeast Forest Fire Protection Compact and bring the Smokey Hot Air Balloon to Franconia Notch in August. The weather was fantastic and hundreds of people got the chance to ride in the balloon! Smokey's message has always been about personal responsibility – remember his ABC's: Always Be Careful with fire. If you start a fire, put it out when you are done. "Remember, Only You Can Prevent Wildfires!"

As we prepare for the 2020 fire season, please remember to contact your local Forest Fire Warden or Fire Department to determine if a fire permit is required before doing <u>ANY</u> outside burning. Under State law (RSA 227-L:17) a fire permit is required for all outside burning, unless the ground is completely covered with snow. Fire permits are also available online in most towns and may be obtained by visiting <u>www.NHfirepermit.com</u>. The burning of household waste is prohibited by the Air Resources Division of the Department of Environmental Services (DES). You are encouraged to contact the local fire department or DES at 603-271-3503 or <u>www.des.nh.gov</u> for more information. Safe open burning requires your diligence and responsibility. Randolph Conservation Commission 2019 Annual Report

The Randolph Conservation Commission is responsible for the proper utilization and protection of natural resources, including watershed resources of the Town. The commission conducts research, obtains information, and takes appropriate action to ensure the protection and safe utilization of such resources as required by RSA 36-A:2.

During 2019 in addition to matters routinely referred to the Commission as required by law-for example matters concerning land development, protection of wetlands, and water courses-the Commission has been working with the Randolph Community Forrest to purchase 200+ acres of land from Gorham with funds from the Randolph Area Opportunity Fund which is managed by the NH Charitable Foundation. The Randolph Area Opportunity Fund has agreed to pay for the purchase so there will be no cost to taxpayers. The purchase will add to the Town Forest, allowing the Town Forest to own access via Jimtown Road rather than having a right of way. The parcel is being sold by Gorham to allow them to purchase land for their own town forest and to protect their watershed that provides for their drinking water. If not purchased by the Commission the land could have been sold for development limiting access to the Randolph Town Forest.

During 2019 the Commission accepted the donation of a 16-acre parcel of land located at the end of Randolph Hill Road from the Randolph Foundation. The Randolph Foundation had purchased the parcel from Sarah Parker. This land is now part of the Town Forest.

In other areas, the Commission has been working with the Planning Board, which is in the process of updating the land use regulations, by helping to develop updated protections of wetlands, streams and riparian areas.

During 2020 the Commission will continue carrying out its mission responsibly and effectively doing its part to protect the land, water resources, and the residents of Randolph.

I will leave you with these thoughts- One basic weakness in a conservation system based wholly on economic motives is that most members of the land community have no economic value.... a system of conservation based solely on economic self-interest is hopelessly lopsided. It tends to ignore, and thus eventually to eliminate, many elements in the land community that lack commercial value, but that are (as far as we know) essential to its healthy functioning. It assumes, falsely, I think, that the economic parts of the biotic clock will function without the uneconomic parts. It tends to relegate to government many functions eventually too large, too complex, or too widely dispersed to be performed by government.

An ethical obligation on the part of the private owner is the only visible remedy for these situations" Aldo Leopold from A Sand County Almanac-The Land Ethic

2019 Forest Commission Report

Once again as the annual Forest Commission Report is being written, there is much activity that has occurred on the Randolph Community Forest during the past year.

We are currently harvesting wood in the Pond of Safety Valley, with variable winter conditions being the operative theme. So far this winter season, we have not had the normal several weeks of below zero temperatures which really help to freeze the ground allowing for unfettered travel of logging equipment into defined harvest areas. That being the case, our forestry team monitoring constantly operating conditions and adjusting our activities to ensure the ground is adequately frozen for logging equipment to operate



safely and always in consideration of the well-being of the forest.

As part of this winter's timber harvest, we are conducting a salvage cut in about 500 acres of higher elevation hardwood stands which were negatively impacted by the forest tent caterpillar outbreak of 2016-2018. The forest tent caterpillar is a forest pest that is native to New Hampshire and commonly feeds on the foliage of ash, birch, poplar, oak and sugar maple. In NH, sugar maple is the most common host tree during outbreaks of the caterpillar. Outbreaks can be dramatic and generally last 2 to 3 years. On the RCF, in some of our stands dominated by sugar maple, defoliation of between 75% to 90% was not uncommon in the affected areas. Following defoliation in the spring, trees respond by putting out a second set of leaves later in the summer. This causes stress on the tree as it tries to counter the damaging effects of losing its original set of leaves which have been eaten by the caterpillar. Normally the trees can survive a couple of years of this pest cycle with a minimum of die back or tree mortality. However, creating additional stress in the areas affected on the RCF were some very droughty weather conditions in the fall of 2016 and the fact that most of the trees affected were at higher elevations where soils are thinner and thus more vulnerable to dry conditions. That being the case, the mortality rate for the trees attacked by the forest tent caterpillar was significantly greater than average in the affected stands.

After reviewing the situation with our forestry team, the recommendation to conduct a salvage cut in the areas negatively impacted was approved by the Forest Commission. The good news is that by responding quickly to salvage harvest these trees, the quality of the wood has not significantly degraded as might have occurred if another year had passed. This wood will be marketed at its highest value providing income for the forest. As the forest regenerates it will provide wildlife habitat in the near term and timber products once again in the future. Thus, the miracle of the life cycle of the forest starts once again.

As for last winter's harvest activity, we cut approx. 2,000 cords of wood, with approximately 76% being hardwood pulp headed for regional paper mills, 15% hard wood pallet logs and the remaining 9% being primarily made up of hardwood saw logs.

At the annual town meeting last March, voters approved the addition of 205 acres to be added to the RCF. This parcel of land is located at the east entrance to the RCF and includes the logging road access which starts at the end of Jimtown Road in Gorham. The land is being purchased through a grant from the Randolph Area Conservation Opportunity Fund, at no cost to the taxpayers and is an important addition to the RCF. This transaction also provided important funding to support the town of Gorham's efforts to add approximately 2000 acres to their town forest and to place development restrictions on all of the land of the Gorham town forest, of which approx. 2700 acres is located in Randolph as a part of the Ice Gulch watershed. Once both transactions are complete, the abutting town forests will encompass almost 17,000 acres of town owned land which will be permanently protected from development and available for timber harvesting, watershed protection, wildlife habitat and public access.



April, the Community Forest, with the Coos Conservation District and the University of New Hampshire sponsored a training for forestry professionals in the use of a computer program titled Dirt to Trees to Wildlife (DTW). DTW is an online tool can be utilized to opportunities to enhance wildlife habitats on specific tracts of land. DTW simply requires a user to pinpoint a piece of land by drawing it on a map. Then, behind the scenes, DTW identifies the soils on that land, the

vegetation naturally supported by that soil, and wildlife habitats supported by each vegetation type. This information is compiled in a handy report to allow landowners and forestry professionals to make informed management decisions. DTW is based on decades-long work reflecting collaboration by soil scientists, foresters, researchers and wildlife biologists. It is largely funded by the U.S. Forest Service and through a significant grant from the Randolph Community Forest

In May, the RCF participated in a learning tour for members from the Washington and Montana State Chapters of the Nature Conservancy. Participants were eager to learn how our experiences in managing community forests could be utilized back home in their respective communities in the west. Part of the program was a discussion and tour of the maple tapping project on the Randolph Community Forest and how managing the woodland for timber revenue includes many opportunities for diversification beyond just cutting trees.

In August at our annual forest tour, approx. 40 attendees learned about the recent timber harvests on the forest and the correlation between good timber management and improving wildlife habitat. Our guest speaker, NH Fish and Game Biologist Jill Kilburn, gave a wonderful presentation on

the life and comeback to the region of the sometimes-elusive pine martin. After the presentation at town hall, many participants headed out to the Pond of Safety Road with our forester to look at some current timber management activities and to discuss the wildlife habitat objectives of this work.

In other projects on the forest, we are excited to be starting the surveying and design work to upgrade water crossings which need improvement on the Pond of Safety Road. Through a collaboration between the Natural Resources Conservation Service, an agency of the United States Department of Agriculture, and the Randolph Foundation we have identified four large culverts which, because of the way they were installed many decades ago, are prohibiting the natural passage of native brook trout, amphibians and wildlife from utilizing these structures to cross

safely under the road. All of these culverts are large, i.e. 5 or 6 feet across and located on perennial streams. Replacing these culverts with short bridges or new bottomless culverts will reestablish these important fish, amphibian and wildlife passageways that have been blocked for well over 100 years.

The Forest Commission meets the first Wednesday of each month at 7pm at the town hall and the public is invited to attend. And don't forget the Annual Forest Tour which is held the first Saturday in August of each year.

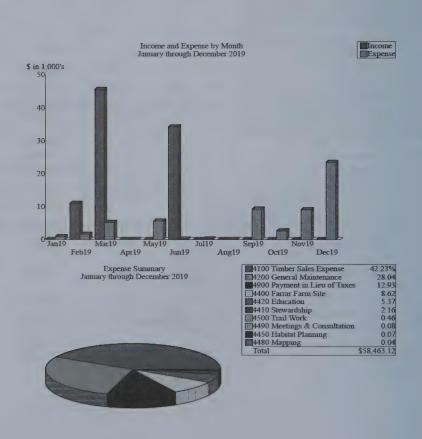

2019 Planning Board Report

In a continuation of last years work, the Planning Board made the final adjustments and edits to the update of the town's Master Plan. With that effort complete, the Board then focused its energies on revisions to the towns Land Use Ordinance.

In carrying out the spirit and goals of comments received by town residents during the updating of the town's Master Plan, the Board is proposing the following 7 amendments to the Land Use Ordinance, to be voted on by ballot at this year's annual town meeting.

- 1. Reorganizing and updating the Land Use Ordinance to conform with current state law and adding clarifying language when and where appropriate.
 - 2. Creating a Wetlands Conservation Overlay District
 - 3. Creating a Shoreland Protection Overlay District
 - 4. Creating a Steep Slope Overlay District
 - 5. Allowing for the use of a camper or recreational vehicle as a short-term dwelling unit.
 - 6. Allowing for Accessory Dwelling Units and defining their use.
 - 7. Strengthening the requirements on outdoor lighting to discourage light spillage on abutting neighbors.

Copies of the actual language of each proposed amendment is included in this year's town report at the end of the town warrant starting on page 9. Printed copies are also available for review at the town office during regular business hours. The Planning Board recommends passage of each of the proposed amendments to the Land Use Ordinance.

In other work during the year, in March the Board hosted the annual Municipal Law Lecture which consisted of a review of new laws passed by the legislature and an explanation and discussion of how they may affect current subdivision and land use regulations in the town. The Board also reviewed and approved three proposed lot line adjustments between adjacent landowners.

As part of its oversite responsibilities of the Community Forest, the Board reviewed and approved an updated 5-year cooperative road agreement with the USFS, the annual Forest Commission Budget and an amendment to the 10-year Forest Stewardship Plan and current timber harvest contract. The Board also hosted a public hearing to gather public comment for a proposed memorial to be located on town forest land and to approve an activity manager to be responsible for the construction and future upkeep of the memorial site.

Before closing this year's report, the members of the Planning Board would like to thank Arlene Eisenburg for her 33 years of service as a valued member of the Board. During that time, Arlene attended somewhere in the vicinity of 400 planning board meetings and training sessions, always offering her wise council and guidance to the many issues coming before the Board. With her retirement this past spring, we would like to thank Arlene for her over three decades of dedicated service to her community and to wish Arlene and Benson the best wishes and health in their future endeavors.

Planning board meetings are held the first Thursday of each month at 7pm and the public is welcome and encouraged to attend.

ANDROSCOGGIN VALLEY REGIONAL REFUSE DISPOSAL DISTRICT 2019 ANNUAL REPORT OF DISTRICT ACTIVITIES

Our Materials Recycling Facility processed a total of 1,197.77 tons of recyclables, for the period January 1, 2019 through December 31, 2019, representing \$115,750.73 of marketing income to the District.

For calendar year 2019, our Transfer Station received 2,610 deliveries from District residents for a total of 565.25 tons of bulky waste and construction and demolition debris. In addition, our 456 commercial accounts delivered 646.31 tons of bulky waste and construction and demolition debris and 331.68 tons of wood. Recycling at the Transfer Station consisted of 1,376.36 tons of wood that was processed through a grinder, 148.74 tons of scrap metal; 222.32 tons of leaf and yard waste and 712.17 tons of brush which was chipped. In addition, 617 refrigerators/air conditioners; 181 propane tanks; 4,882 tires; 20,467 feet of fluorescent bulbs; 1,331 fluorescent U tubes and HID lamps; 1,119 ballasts and 52.60 tons of electronics were recycled. We also received 1,962 gallons of waste oil from our residents which was used in our waste oil furnace to heat the recycling center. Transfer Station recycling income totaled \$32,936.25. The District owns and operates the Recycling Center and Transfer Station.

District Officers are: Chair Linda Cushman of Jefferson; Vice Chair Paul Grenier for the Coos County Unincorporated Places and Secretary-Treasurer Michael Rozek of Berlin. Other District Representatives: Yves Zornio of Gorham, Paul Jadis of Randolph, Larry Enman of Errol, Randy Fortin of Milan, Alan Rossetto of Northumberland, Colin Wentworth and as of October 2019, Rodney Monahan of Stark and Christopher Holt of Dummer.

In June, the District conducted its twenty-eighth annual Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day. The collection was held at the District Transfer Station with 238 households participating. The project was funded through the AVRRDD Budget with no assessments to the member communities. In addition, a grant from the State of New Hampshire reimbursed the District \$3,249. The next Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day will be held **Saturday**, **June 20, 2020** at the District Transfer Station.

2019 was the seventeenth year of operations for the AVRRDD Mt. Carberry Landfill. Since purchasing the landfill in December 2002, no assessments have been made to the District municipalities for Mt. Carberry Landfill operations, with income raised through landfill tipping fees covering operating expenses. The landfill is operated, under contract with the District, by Cianbro Corp.

No assessments will be made to the member municipalities for the 2020 AVRRDD Budget.

North Country Council Regional Planning Commission & Economic Development District

North Country Council Regional Planning Commission and Economic Development District is one of nine regional planning commissions in New Hampshire established by RSA 36:46. The Commission's region consists of serving 50 communities and 25 unincorporated places in the northern third

of New Hampshire. The Commission serves in an advisory role to local governments in order to promote coordinated planning, orderly growth, efficient land use, transportation access, and environmental protection. The Council's professional staff provides transportation, land use, economic development, community and environmental planning services; geographic information services (GIS); data collection and analysis; grant writing; grant administration; facilitation; and project management.

To date in 2019, North Country Council undertook the following activities:

- Completed assessments of over 200 stream culverts in the Baker River watershed to better understand flood vulnerability and aquatic habitat barriers.
- Facilitated three meetings of the North Country Council Transportation Advisory Committee (TAC) discuss regional transportation issues and identify priority projects for funding opportunities, including the Ten Year Plan.
- Supported the work of two Regional Coordinating Councils (Carroll County and Grafton-Coos) to promote
 coordination of transportation services for the region's residents, including facilitating seven RCC
 meetings and assisting with federal grant applications to support transportation services for senior and
 limited-mobility residents. Secured a Federal Transit Administration grant to begin work on updating the
 Coordinated Public Transit and Human Services Transportation Plan for the region, which supports the
 ability of providers to access critical federal funds for transportation services.
- Represent the transportation needs of the region in the Ten Year Plan process, including participation in public hearings and promoting public input opportunities to the region's communities.
- Supported the work of the North Country Scenic Byways Council (NCSBC) to steward and promote the
 region's many scenic and cultural byways, including facilitating three NCSBC meetings and working to
 develop a website to provide information on scenic touring along the byways.
- Represented the region as an at-large member to the NH Complete Streets Advisory Committee, including
 providing a regional perspective on the development of the NH Pedestrian and Bicycle Transportation
 Plan.
- Continued the effort to develop an updated Regional Transportation Plan, which will identify the
 transportation-related needs, issues, and opportunities of the region in order to support the development
 of transportation projects and provide a helpful reference for communities.
- Completed regional over 100 traffic counts to meet federal requirements and provide up-to-date information on traffic volumes.
- Promoted the NH CommuteSmart Challenge to regional businesses to encourage carpooling.
- Supported and participated in the White Mountain National Forest Alternative Transportation Working
 Group to address issues of overflow parking and promote safe transportation access to National Forest
 destinations.
- Undertook a pilot study to develop an accurate and efficient method of counting OHRVs on roadways.
- Provided mapping and GIS services to communities throughout the region in support of project development and funding opportunities.
- Responded to multiple request for reviews of Development of Regional Impact, prepared comments corresponded with state and local officials.

- Continued to assist Northern Border Regional Commission (NBRC) in providing assistance to potential and awarded grantees. In 2019 the Council provided pre-project development coaching to over 25 potential NBRC grantees.
- Convened four full Commission meetings and facilitated discussions on Communities Becoming Age
 Friendly, Council Highlights, Energy and update on Scenic By-ways.
- Hosted the October 24, 2019 Annual Meeting held at the Town and Country Resort in Shelburne NH. The
 focus of the evening was encouraging a "smart, safe, clean and cool" North Country through building
 investable projects.
- Collaborated with other Regional Planning Commission's through the NH Association of Regional Planning Commissions and Director meetings in Concord, NH.
- Supported efforts and attended the NH Planners Conference, NH Municipal Association Conference and
 Office of Strategic Initiative Conference.
- Bulk ordered and distributed New Hampshire Planning and Land Use Regulation books to local land use boards (estimated savings of \$70.00 per book).
- Re-Established the North County Council Brownfield Program through funding from the United States
 Environmental protection Agency (EPA).
- Updated the North Country Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS) for the Economic Development District. Hosting five open house input sessions, convened and facilitated five committee meetings with four guest speakers.
- Staff attended over ten workshops, info sessions to increase Council capacity to better serve
 communities.
- Responded to various requests from communities for technical assistance and data research.
- Hosted four workshops invasive species, flood plain management 101, planning and zoning board training. Published and distributed quarterly newsletter.

On Behalf of Tri County Community Action Program Inc., I would like to respectfully request funding in the amount of \$100.00 to support the services provided by Tri County Transit be included in the upcoming Town of Randolph Budget. Last year Tri County Transit provided 21 trips for 2 unduplicated residents of Randolph for a value of \$1,475.

Tri County Transit provides transportation services to residents in Carroll, Coos and Grafton Counties. Passengers are provided rides to medical appointments, hairdressers, grocery shopping, social events, senior meals, and employment. Residents utilizing this service are afforded an opportunity to be mobile and independent thus increasing their self-worth, value and wellness which in turn contributes to the community as a whole.

Many of the trips we provide are for the elderly, disabled and low income residents who are unable to provide their own means of transportation. Rides are provided with our wheelchair accessible vehicles or by our volunteer driver program. For safety purposes all of our drivers and volunteers have random drug and alcohol testing as well as motor vehicle record checks and national criminal background checks.

The funding received from the town is used to match federal funding we receive to cover our operating and administrative costs. Our federal funding match requirement is 20% for administration and capital, and operations require a 50% match. If we are unable to meet our match requirements those funds are allocated to providers in other counties.

Your support of this community based program will be greatly appreciated and we welcome your questions pertaining to this request.

2019 Year End Report from Councilor Michael Cryans

On January 3, 2019, I passed my one-year anniversary serving on the Executive Council for District One.

This District is made up of over 100 towns and four cities (Berlin, Claremont, Laconia and Lebanon). It covers up to ½ of the land area from Tilton to Pittsburg.

The Council, which has 5 members, each represent approximately 275,000 constituents. The Council meets approximately every 2 weeks and most of the meetings are held in Concord, except for the 6 meetings during the summer. These summer meetings are held in the five Council Districts along with one hosted by the Governor. I chose Littleton and will be looking for a community to host the meeting next summer.

The Executive Council votes on all contracts with the state over \$10,000 as well as appointments to Boards and Commissions. Fifty-four persons from District One were confirmed to various positions on State Boards and Commissions this year. The Council also votes on Commissioners and Deputy Commissioners of State Agencies as well as confirms the appointment of judges to serve in New Hampshire District, Supreme and Superior Courts.

I have traveled to all the towns and cities as well as the seven counties in this District. The function that I enjoy the most is constituent service. I like to assist, if I can, with the issues that arise from individual concerns to general issues in towns and cities in the District. You can always reach out to me with issues of concern.

This year I hosted the Department of Transportation GACIT Meetings in Lebanon, Claremont, Berlin and North Conway. GACIT stands for The Governor's Advisory Commission on Intermodal Transportation. This Commission is required to propose a plan for improvements to our state transportation system every two years, ultimately creating what is known as the Ten Year Highway Plan.

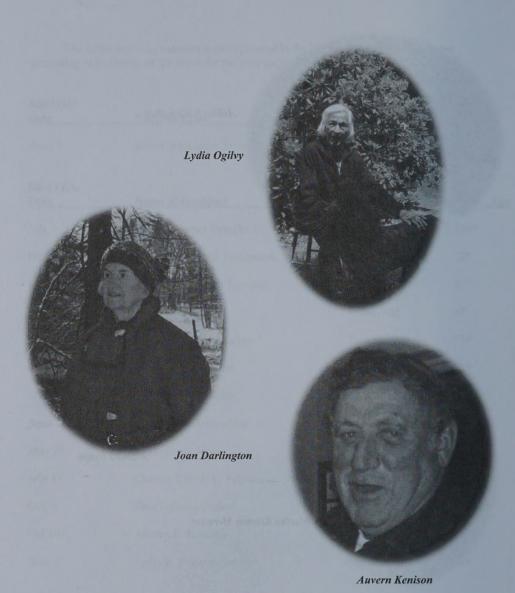
