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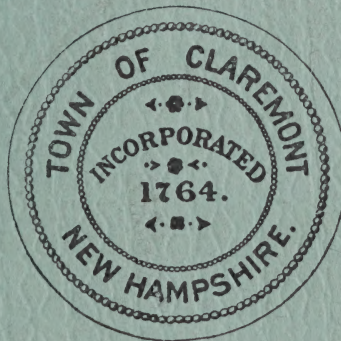

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# TOWN WARRANT.

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STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE



TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF CLAREMONT, IN  
THE COUNTY OF SULLIVAN, IN SAID STATE, QUALIFIED  
TO VOTE IN TOWN AFFAIRS:

YOU are hereby notified to meet at the lower assembly room in the Town Hall, in said town, on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next, at eight o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.
2. To choose a prosecuting officer.
3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay town officers for the fiscal year ending February 15, 1914.
4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay incidental expenses of the town for the fiscal year ending February 15, 1914.
5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair of highways and bridges for the fiscal year ending February 15, 1914, and determine how the same shall be paid.
6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay the debts of the town.
7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the town's poor for the fiscal year ending February 15, 1914.
8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Fire Department for the fiscal year ending February 15, 1914.
9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay for the use of hydrants for the fiscal year ending February 15, 1914.
10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for street lights for the fiscal year ending February 15, 1914.
11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.
12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the benefit of the American Band.
13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate in aid of the Claremont General Hospital.
14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Hundred Dollars (\$15,00.00) for the support of the Fiske Free Library agreeably to the contract with Andrew Carnegie and Samuel F. Fiske.
15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2516.76 to meet payments maturing on or before November 1st, 1913, of principal and interest on notes issued by the School District to pay for new school building.
16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of Stevens High School for the ensuing year.

17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) toward expense of water for sprinkling or flushing Tremont square and the approaches thereto.

18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for painting the West Claremont, Lottery and Connecticut River bridges.

19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to purchase additional land for the town dump.

20. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for oiling the streets of the town.

21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$1375.00, the same to be used to replace the present sectional boilers with a tubular boiler ample to heat the Town Building and make the proper connections and repairs; also to provide a separate steam heating plant for the offices in the Town Building.

22. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$125.00 for the purpose of varnishing and painting the interior of the Town Building.

23. To see if the town will vote to increase the salary of the Tax Collector.

24. To see if the town will vote to build a new Water Works reservoir on the westerly side of Winter Street, about a mile from Claremont village, and increase the size of the Straw reservoir, by raising the present dam about five feet; also to lay an 8 inch pipe from said new reservoir to connect with the present filling pipe near the Straw reservoir, and a 20 inch pipe from said new reservoir to Claremont village, and properly connect the same with the pipes now laid, agreeably to recommendations submitted by E. E. Davis, Civil Engineer. Northampton, Mass.

25. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Water Commissioners to purchase or take by the right of eminent domain, such lands and rights of way over lands belonging to George F. Crandall, Hermon Holt, Eliza A. and Louise M. Dole, James W. Caffrey, Fred M. Brown, Cyprian Bonneau, Solomon Lattimore, Frank C. Kelsey and such others as may be expedient to carry out the recommendations of the previously mentioned E. E. Davis, Civil Engineer.

26. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow on the credit of the town, a sum of money not exceeding 75,000 dollars for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of the two preceding articles, and determine the manner in which the same shall be paid.

27. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen and Road Agent to repair and improve the streets and sidewalks at Fair View, so called, and properly light the same and raise and appropriate money for the same.

28. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen and Road Agent to widen the road bed and make water outlets on the westerly side thereof on the highway leading from Washington Street, northerly to the residence of Oliver Bond, known as Winter Street, and to take any necessary action to ascertain the width and location of said highway as originally laid out and raise and appropriate money therefor.

29. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to lay out and build a new street from the junction of Summit Road and Myrtle Street Extension, easterly along the northerly side of land of Dr. E. M. Fitch, et al's. thence southerly along the easterly side of said Fitch's land, thence westerly along the southerly side of said Fitch's land, et al's, about 600 feet to a point near a clump of maples, thence southerly about 300 feet, thence easterly about 600 feet, thence northerly about 300 feet to a point near the southwesterly corner of land of said Fitch said construction to include one half (1/2) of the expense of a concrete sidewalk and raise and appropriate money therefor; provided Quimby & Rossiter will agree to build at least ten (10) houses on said land as soon as said street is constructed.

30. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to appoint a board of three commissioners who shall have full charge of the Cemeteries in town, also authorize said commissioners to sell burial lots, and use the money received for the sale of lots together with the money now on hand for the improvement of said cemeteries; also authorize said commissioners to employ a superintendent of cemeteries who shall devote his entire time to caring for the same.

31. To see if the town will vote the Fire Department the free use of the Town Hall one such night as they may desire to hold their annual Firemen's ball when the hall is not previously engaged.

32. To see if the town will vote the American Band the free use of the Town Hall such times as may be selected to the amount of One Hundred Dollars, when the hall is not otherwise engaged.

33. To see if the town will vote to give the free use of the Town Hall at three different times during the year, of the Opera House once during the year when not otherwise in use, to the Ladies' Union Aid Society for the benefit of the Claremont General Hospital.

34. To see if the town will vote to place a street light at the junction of Broad and South streets.

35. To see if the town will vote to place a hydrant at or near the junction of Broad and South streets, and raise and appropriate money therefor.

36. To see if the town will vote to place a light on the corner of Winter street and Green Mountain road.

37. To see if the town will vote to continue the drain pipe on Pleasant street from South street to Charles street.

38. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding \$1100.00 for installing pipe drains on Sullivan, Myrtle, School, east, Hanover and East Pleasant streets to relieve the gutters and prevent overflow in time of heavy rainfall.

39. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding \$2000.00 to pave Broad street with Bituminous bound Macadam from a point near Noyes' Block to the bridge and one hundred feet north of the bridge with suitable catch basins and pipes to take care of the surface water.

40. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1000.00 for maintenance of roads under state aid.

41. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## To the Public.

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In submitting the report of the town business for the year now closing the Selectmen wish to say that the year has been one of more than usual activity in the various departments of the town. A large amount of money has of necessity passed through the treasury, the orders drawn amounting to \$175,349.62. The unavoidable increase in the cost of labor and team work, as well as material, has contributed much to the expense of the construction and repair of highways.

The public improvement of main highways under the direction of the State has been carried on successfully. One thousand and eight hundred feet of new road was built on Chestnut St., and 3400 feet on Hanover street. Seven new culverts of corrugated iron pipe were put in, the grades improved and the surface made of gravel as in years past. The total cost of all the work of this kind was \$4,352.66. A detailed report of the condition of the joint fund from which the cost of the work was paid and an itemized account of the expenditures will be found on page 33.

The Selectmen acting under instructions from the town made extensive repairs upon Pleasant Street between Tremont Square and School St., which had been long needed and which it is hoped will prove both serviceable and satisfactory for the large amount of travel to which the street is subjected. A more complete report of this work will be found upon page 91.

At the adjourned meeting the town authorized extensive improvements upon Mulberry Street between its junction with Myrtle Street and the Concord & Claremont Railroad, which work was undertaken by the Selectmen and Highway Agent and carried to completion as directed. The street was

straightened and widened, the hollow filled and the whole grade of the street improved. A substantial retaining wall was built on the south end and commodious concrete walks of easy grade constructed. The expense of this work was \$4,109.66, and while such expense may appear large, the town has secured a permanent improvement of one of its main thoroughfares, and the officials who had the work in charge, are confident the public will appreciate and approve of this piece of permanent work.

The culvert at Draper's Corner was not completed, owing to the heavy rains which kept the brook unusually full until late in the autumn, and rendered the removal of the old culvert and the installation of the new one unsafe and impracticable.

In the matter of the purchase of a chemical fire engine which was referred to the Selectmen and C. E. Sears and H. L. Brooks, at the adjourned meeting of 1912, we will state that the matter was left for investigation and report to a sub-committee consisting of Messrs. Sears and Brooks, who have made a report thereon to which we respectfully invite the attention of the voters.

A misstatement of the financial condition of the town appears in the report of 1912, and was caused by errors of nearly \$3000 in bookkeeping and tabulation, (See page 162). This tended to give an exaggerated impression as to the results obtainable from the miscellaneous revenues of the town from sources other than taxation, and has increased the difficulty encountered by the Selectmen in their efforts to conduct the various departments of the town and keep the expenses within the resources at their command.

The attention of the public is invited to the detailed report of all the departments.

## Rebuilding of Pleasant Street.

Agreeably to vote of the town passed at the annual meeting in 1912, the Selectmen employed Engineer C. P. Rifford of the state highway department to make plans and specifications for the rebuilding of the street between the Square and School street. The plans and specifications, after being modified, were submitted to Adams & Densmore of Rutland, Vt., and James B. Bartlett of Claremont, and bids invited from them for doing the work. The following bids were received:

### From James B. Bartlett.

New manholes with connections to the main drain were constructed and the manholes covered with heavy iron grates.

The lines of curbing were straightened and completed upon each side of the street.

All the work outside of that covered by the contract with Mr. Bartlett was done by the town.

Complaint having been made that the town scales were out of order and not weighing correctly, an expert from the E. & T. Fairbanks scale works was called to look them over; after a thorough examination he pronounced them in bad shape, and that they should be sent to the factory for repairs. It might take several weeks to put them in shape and would probably cost \$75.00. As those scales were the only ones available for public use, the Selectmen thought it unwise to be without scales for so long a time. It was finally decided to exchange the old scales for a new set of 10 ton capacity (the old scales were 8 ton) at a difference of \$210.00.

The installing the new scales necessitated material and labor for general repairs upon the scale house.

The receipts from the scales for the year ending Feb. 15, 1913, shows a deficit of \$24.00 for which the repairs made are responsible.

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Your Board of Health respectfully submit the following report:

During the year the usual quarantine has been enforced in all cases demanding such. No epidemics have occurred, and the diseases have been in most instances of short duration and mild cases. The number reported has been as follows: scarlet fever, 8; diphtheria, 9, with 2 deaths; tuberculosis 2, with 2 deaths.

Many cases of measles were reported and quarantined, especially if school children, but in most instances we found the illness so slight that they had recovered before we were notified.

## Fiske Free Library Trustees.

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The use of the Library's several departments continues to be satisfactory. One of the interesting features of the year has been the bringing to the library of groups of High School students for instruction in the use of reference books under the direction of Mr. Cummings, the principal.

The circulation for the past year was 30,108 which was about 2,000 more than the previous year.

Gifts during the year include over fifty books presented by Mr. E. A. Hebard, among them being a handsome set of Dumas' novels; the first forty-seven volumes of the Atlantic bound in half leather presented by Mr. John L. Farwell; two famous books of early days, "Adam's Arithmetic" and "Webster's Spelling Book", a program of the graduating exercises of the first class graduated from the High School which completes the file of programs down to 1894, copies of the "Red & Back" which through the kindness of the editors is complete to date besides "Bird Lore", the "Independent", the "Review of Reviews," the "Ladies Home Journal" and the "Woman's Home Companion" periodicals to be found in the reading room, all of which have been greatly appreciated.

Gifts of the Atlantic covering the years from 1882 to 1896 to complete the set and of the High School graduating programs since 1894 would enhance the usefulness of the library.

## Chief Engineer's Report.

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For the year ending Feb. 15, 1913, there were thirteen bell alarms for fire, as follows:

“ 3:00 p. m., box 38, brush fire, old fair grounds.

Aug. 9, 2:15 a. m., box 17, Mrs. French's house, Pleasant street.

Aug. 15, 2:15 p. m., box 31, power station, Main street.

Oct. 29, 6:40 a. m., box 47, Mrs. Wilson's house, Elm street.

Nov. 24, 6:05 p. m., box 14, Colby house, Lincoln street.

Dec. 9, 8:00 p. m., box 13, Pine Grove Park, brush fire.

Dec. 24, 11:05 a. m., box 36, dwelling.

Jan. 12, 9:20 a. m., box 12, Monadnock Mills.

The department responded to 22 still alarms, the same not including brush or forest fires, which now come under the supervision of the State Forestry Commission. This year the still alarms were as usual a great saving to the town in expenses, not requiring the entire department to be called out.

One new extension 65 foot truss ladder has been added to the equipment, the same being arranged on a hand truck. Two brace towers have been added. These can be used similar to a water tower. Two public hydrants have been located on River street, two private hydrants at the McElwain shoe shop and one private hydrant at Roberts' woolen mill.

The removal of the old hook and ladder house on Main street made it necessary to find new quarters for both the truck and members.

By a vote of the town the unused portion of the top floor of the old library block was finished off for a meeting room for the men. The building in the rear of Sears' livery

stable on Franklin street was remodeled, and both the hook and ladder and hose cart are housed there, making it more convenient to the firemen in getting away to a fire.

### RECOMMENDATIONS.

The recommendations submitted in my last year's report covered the department's wants and suggested improvements in various existing conditions, so that this year I can but extend the same recommendations, except those which were carried out by a vote of the town, or otherwise fulfilled.

In regard to my recommendations of purchasing a chemical, it has become a most difficult problem to the committee appointed as to what kind to buy, the expense of maintaining the same and properly housing it.

I recommend that a separate appropriation be made for brush fires and set aside for that purpose only, so that it will not conflict with the regular expense account of the fire department.

The total expense of the department includes the amount expended fighting brush fires, which should not be included in the account, as the state is liable for a portion of this expense, which should appear to the credit of the department.

### FIRE ALARM SYSTEM.

The fire alarm system is divided into three circuits, viz.: 33 alarm boxes, 19 house tappers, two 12 inch tappers and one tower tapper, motor, generator, switch board, battery of 206 cells, two automatic tape registers. Included in the number of fire alarm boxes are five private boxes.

This brief report covers the essentials of the year's work and equipment, and with it I wish again to express my appreciation of the good work done by the firemen and engineers and also for the general co-operation of the public and their confidence in the department.

# Stevens High School.

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## Commtee Report.

In June, 1912, a class of twenty was graduated. In September a class of sixty entered making a total enrollment of 149. Between that time and February 22, four more entered and nine withdrew, making a net loss of five. The withdrawals were mainly due to removal from town, ill health, good business openings, or financial stress at home, which made it necessary for the student to become a bread winner. One, or possibly two, withdrawals, were due to lack of interest and falling behind in the work.

The eighth grade numbers about ninety, and while a few of these will not enter the high school, that loss will be partially offset by new out-of-town students. With twenty-five graduating and eighty or ninety coming in, the school may be expected to number at least 175 next year.

## TEACHERS.

In June Principal Belding after three years of service resigned to go into business, and Mr. Allen C. Cummings, who had been principal for eight years of the Orange, Mass., High School, was chosen to succeed him. Miss Ora B. Craig, who had been teaching in Lebanon High School, became instructor of French and German in place of Miss Bliss. The restoration of the town appropriation to the former amount enabled the committee to restore the subjects of music, drawing, advanced mathematics, German and English history, which had been dropped out, and to employ the same number of teachers that were in service before the appropriation was reduced. Mr. Daniel D. Ladd, supervisor of music in the grades, and Miss Kathryn Brown, supervisor of drawing in the grades, were employed to take charge of the same departments in the high school. Miss Louise Anderson, a recent graduate of Boston University, but with previous experience in the grades in Massachusetts, was employed as teacher of history and elementary English.

## S. H. S. AND THE COLLEGES.

Out of last year's class of twenty, eight entered college in September, and one returned for a post-graduate course with the expectation of entering college next fall. Including one post graduate of last year, and one member of the present class of 1913 who entered college in September on three years of high school work, Stevens' contribution to the colleges last fall was ten students. Seven students of the present class are fitting for college. Stevens High School is on the approved list of the New England College Entrance Certificate Board, and can certify to New England colleges that receive certificates from any school. It should be remembered, however, that the certificate rank is higher than the diploma rank, and the student who wishes a certificate must come up to this scholarship standard. While it is not the main purpose of a high school to fit for college, it is gratifying and desirable that Claremont boys and girls be not obliged to go away from home for their preparation.

## HEATING APPARATUS.

During the summer the heating apparatus was thoroughly overhauled, and new piping put in, and it is believed that the heating equipment is now adequate for all ordinary conditions.

## MANUAL TRAINING.

Years ago the book work of the school was supplemented by a fine all-around training in doing things which the boy got from his daily work on the farm. Under modern conditions of village life the boy does not get that training of the hand and eye in constructive work that he needs, and courses in manual training are effective ways of restoring this balance. Manual training has been taught for several years in the upper grammar grades in Claremont, and its value has been demonstrated there. It seems desirable that that work should be continued in the high school. After a careful investigation of methods and expenses, it was decided to install manual training, and regular instruction was begun February 19. The north-east corner of the basement, heretofore used as a dressing room by the athletic teams, has been fitted up for wood-working. This room is nearly thirty feet square, and has good light, and a concrete floor. The present equipment consists of six benches with the necessary tools. There

is room for more benches if the number of students taking it increases. Fifty-nine students, including nineteen girls, are enrolled, all taking it as an extra study. The work is in charge of Mr. Walter A. Pierce, who was for some years instructor in manual training in the city schools of Bath, Me. At present, Mr. Pierce gives two days a week to the high school. While many of the students will make articles for themselves, it is planned to construct pieces of apparatus for the laboratory, and equipment for the other rooms of the school. The articles made will be of practical use in school and the home. While this work costs more for equipment and maintenance than the straight book work, we believe this step will meet the approval of the public.

#### DOMESTIC SCIENCE RECOMMENDED.

Another desirable forward step, when our means permit, would be the introduction of domestic science, especially of sewing, cooking, and household management. Sewing is already taught in the upper grammar grades. When we are educating our girls, we should not neglect the things which they need to know when they are mistresses of homes. We already have a room in the south-east corner of the basement, corresponding to the manual training room, which can be easily fitted up for domestic science. It should be mentioned that already some work in household sanitation and food testing has been done by the science department, and that lectures on household decoration have been given by the supervisor of drawing.

#### OTHER MATTERS.

While the new rooms of the building have slate blackboards, and two of the old rooms have a few sections of slate, the class work in several rooms will be hampered until we have better blackboards.

The laboratory equipment has been increased, but more apparatus is needed, particularly in biology. The school also needs more reference books, charts and maps.

Since the manual training has taken the dressing-room of the athletic teams, the north-west corner of the boys' basement has been partitioned off by a brick wall from the part occupied by the furnaces, and steel lockers for clothes have been provided.

We recommend that the sum of thirty-five hundred dollars be raised for the support of the school during the coming year.
