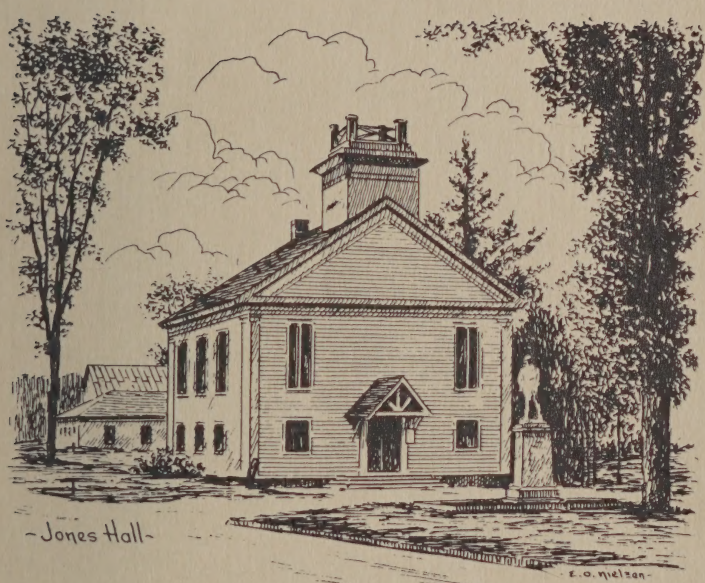

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

1989 proved itself a landmark year in several respects. After years of speculation and debate, Marlow finally took two tremendously positive steps towards coping with its solid waste problems. First we vacated our former dump site on 123 west and relocated our transfer station operation closer to the village center on Route 10 north. More importantly, we initiated mandatory recycling thus dramatically reducing the volume of material disposed of at the Keene landfill. The new site, leased from the state for a twenty year term, affords us far greater freedom of movement and arrangement than we previously enjoyed at the former location. The recycling phase, though limited by disposal market demands, is well organized and convenient. We take this opportunity, on behalf of the entire town, to express our gratitude and appreciation to Kathy Raynes, Joe Baril and the other members of the recycling committee, whose tireless efforts and persistence culminated in bringing this project to reality, and whose continued time and interest keep it running smoothly and efficiently. We are also very proud of our townspeople for their positive acceptance of recycling and the high degree of active cooperation it is receiving. Although the practice of burning brush may be continued at the old transfer site off 123 west, at present its only occupant is the highway department.

As outlined in last year's warrant and explained at the 1989 Town Meeting, the major highway project was, and still remains, the rebuilding of the Sand Pond Road. This project was begun in August, however, unforeseen difficulties precluded much progress. Shortly into the actual work it became obvious that huge amounts of trees and brush along both sides of nearly the entire road must be removed and disposed of properly. Our highway department is neither equipped nor trained to perform as a tree removal service. Consequently its efforts in this initial phase of the project resulted in only a minor portion of the roadside being cleared. Although we still maintain that our crew and equipment are capable of accomplishing much of the work involved in completing the overall project, we are now convinced that the interests of the town would be better served if a professional tree outfit was engaged to do the necessary clearing work. We are presently negotiating this avenue. Beyond the amount spent in the purchase of the required culverts, the balance of the funds appropriated for this project remains unexpended. We propose to roll this balance over towards the 1990 expenditures on the Sand Pond Road project. An article in the warrant addresses this issue.

During the course of this past year we have been seeking qualified firms to undertake the complete reevaluation of the town in 1991 and to redo the town's official tax maps. After extensive presentations by prospective firms and a thorough review of competitive bids, we have selected two N.H. based firms to undertake these projects. As an accurate, up to date tax map is essential in accomplishing a correct, realistic assessment, the tax mapping process is scheduled to commence this spring. Complete, new aerial photos of the entire town will be taken in April. The final product will be presented to the town in March 1991, in time for use in the reevaluation process. A representative of the mapping firm will be present at this year's Town Meeting to explain the project and answer questions. Obviously neither of these projects comes cheaply. They are, however, essential to equitable taxing besides other legal obligations of a municipality. At this year's Town Meeting you will be asked to appropriate the entire sums required for both projects. This is necessary in order to enter into contracts with the respective firms. Some of the funds are already in capital re-

serve accounts; the balances will be raised over the next two years. These are major expenditures and we encourage all interested citizens to attend the meeting.

Another major accomplishment during 1989 was the signing of a franchise agreement with Cable One to install and provide cable T.V. to a large portion of the town. Our previous efforts to obtain this service always ended in broken promises and disappointment. This time, however, we feel confident that within the current year the necessary lines and equipment will be in place and the service will be available to those who wish to purchase it. We sincerely hope that all who subscribe will derive a great deal of pleasure through the improved reception and broad spectrum of viewing that cable T.V. affords, and that this utility will prove to be yet another positive aspect of life in Marlow. We also wish to acquaint you with the fact that cable T.V. represents an additional source of revenue to the town as a set percentage of the annual gross subscriptions collected is paid to town annually by the provider in lieu of property taxes.

As many of you are no doubt aware, a copy machine is located in the library for the convenience of the public at a nominal cost. Now, as a result of your affirmative vote at last year's Town Meeting, a similar machine was purchased by the town and copying service is available at the town office during normal business hours at a cost of ten cents a sheet.

As you may have noticed, a major landscape renovation of our war memorial green in front of the Jones Hall was accomplished during the summer of 1989. This project was underwritten by PC Connection as a contribution towards improving the general appearance of the town. Highway equipment and personnel were also utilized. The work included placing perimeter stones around the green, building up the interior area around the statue and flagpole with loam and covering the entire surface with new turf. Labor and turf were donated by Delisle Management of Keene. Two park benches which were donated by Horace and Marilyn Howland were installed and the plaque honoring our WW II soldiers was cleaned. We wish to thank all those volunteers for their interest and generosity in this worthwhile civic endeavor.

To our profound regret, our colleague, D. Ross Potter, resigned his position on the board of selectmen for reasons of personal health and returned to private life. We, who worked with him for the past three years, are grateful for the time and effort he afforded the town. We are also grateful for the humor, friendship and understanding he brought into the performance of an oftentimes thankless office. We wish him a well deserved peace as he regains his health.

In the process of seeking a replacement to fill Mr. Potter's position until the March 1990 election, the remaining members of the board invited applications, held private interviews with prospective applicants and spent considerably time in deliberation and review of the interested individuals' backgrounds and merits. Although all applicants possessed positive qualifications, only one could be chosen. Our choice was Mr. Gail F. Pratt, a long-time resident of Marlow. He will return run for election to Mr. Potter's remaining two year term. We are confident that Mr. Pratt will prove himself an able and efficient selectman through the years to come.

Finally we wish to acquaint you with a matter that has been brought to our attention. Recent testing of water samples taken in the vicinity of the Sand Pond

boat landing have revealed high levels of phosphorus and bacteria. As you may be aware, most of the cabins along the shores draw their water from the pond itself. Many of us enjoy a cool dip in Sand Pond on warm summer afternoons. We are asking all who do so to please refrain from using any soaps or shampoos while in the water. Please remember, preserving the water quality of the pond is in everyone's best interest. Your cooperation is greatly appreciated.

We wish to express our profound gratitude to our secretaries, Ellen Jackson and Frances Strickland and our typist, Celia Frost for helping us to accomplish our task. Thank you for giving us all this opportunity to serve you.

Motion was made and seconded to increased the Planning & Zoning budget by \$300.00. Amendment defeated by voice vote. Hand vote requested by Moderator. Amendment defeated. YES 27 NO 36

Motion was made and seconded to decrease the General Government Building Equipment account by \$300.00 because of donation of \$500.00 by Audio Accessories for the purpose of purchasing furniture for the Library. Amendment passed.

Motion was made and seconded to add \$100.00 to the Library budget. Money to be used for Librarian wages. Amendment passed.

Motion was made and seconded to decrease the Solid Waste budget by \$1600.00. \$975.00 to be removed from metal dumpster category and \$625.00 from salaries.

Motion was made and seconded to vote on the amendment to the Solid Waste budget. Passed. Amendment passed by standing vote. YES 60 NO 9

Motion was made and seconded that the Highway Budget Labor account be reduced by \$8,500.00. Amendment defeated. YES 19 NO 54

Motion made and seconded to end discussion on budget. Passed.

Amended budget of \$232,991.00 passed by voice vote, unanimous.

Article 4: Motion made and seconded to authorize the Tax Collector to give a two percent (2%) cash discount on all Property Taxes for the payment of such taxes within ten (10) days after date of tax bill.

Passed by voice vote. Unanimous

Article 5: Motion was made and seconded to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes when necessary under terms and interest rates that they deem to be in the best interest of the Town.

Article 5 passed by voice vote. Unanimous.

Article 6: Motion was made and seconded to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand (\$3000.00) Dollars for the implementation of a recycling program to take place at the Solid Waste Transfer Station and to authorize the Selectmen to adopt any ordinance necessary to regulate such program.

Article 6 passed by voice vote. Unanimous.

Article 7: Motion was made and seconded to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Thousand Seven Hundred (\$7,700.00) Dollars to set up the Solid Waste Transfer Station property on Route 10 leased from the State of NH for that purpose.

Article 7 passed, standing vote. YES 48 NO 8

Article 8: 2/3 vote required. Motion was made and seconded to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Five Thousand Two Hundred Twenty-Five (\$35,225.00) Dollars to purchase a Ford 655A Backhoe/Loader and to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a Lease/Purchase Agreement with Ford Motor Credit Corporation payable at a monthly rate of \$701.44 for a sixty (60) month period for a total of Forty-Two Thousand Eighty-Seven Dollars and Forty Cents (\$42,087.40).

Motion was made and seconded to amend Article 8 to read that the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Forty Six Thousand One Hundred Sixteen Dollars (\$46,116.00) to purchase a Ford 655A Backhoe/Loader, less a trade in value of Ten Thousand Eight Hundred Ninety-One (\$10,891.00) Dollars for the Town's old backhoe (1974 Ford 4500 TLB) and to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a lease/purchase agreement with Ford Motor Credit Corporation for a Fifty-Eight (58) month period at \$701.44 per month. Amendment passed.

Article 8 passed by written ballot. YES 60 NO 4 64 Ballots cast.

Article 9: Motion was made and seconded to table Article 9. Passed.

Article 10: Motion was made and seconded to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Six Hundred Thirty-Nine (\$2,639.00) Dollars to purchase a photocopiers and cover supplies for the first year and to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a Lease/Purchase Agreement payable at a monthly rate of \$73.07 for a thirty-six (36) month period for a total of Two Thousand Nine Hundred (\$2,900.00) Dollars.

Motion was made and seconded to amend Article 10 to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Six Hundred Thirty-Nine (\$2,639.00) Dollars to purchase a photocopier and cover supplies for the first year and to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a Lease/Purchase Agreement payable at a monthly rate of \$73.07 for a thirty six (36) month period.

Amendment passed.

Article 10 passed by written ballot. 54 ballots cast. YES 49 NO 5

Article 11: Motion was made and seconded to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars to replace culverts where needed, ditching and drainage and cold patch shimming on Sand Pond Road. Work shall start at Lempster Town Line and continue towards Route 10 and shall continue until funds expire.

Article 11 passed, unanimously.

Article 12: Motion was made and seconded to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Four Hundred (\$2,400.00) Dollars to purchase mobile radios for the Highway Department Trucks.

Article 12 passed.

Article 13: Motion was made and seconded to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand (\$20,000.00) Dollars to purchase a used dump truck with a plow and hydraulic wing, a 5-8 yard body on a 33,000 to 35,000 lb. chassis and to authorize the withdrawal of Twenty Thousand (\$20,000.00) Dollars from the Capital Reserve Fund created for that purpose.

Article 13 passed, unanimously.

Article 14: Motion was made and seconded to pass over Article 14. Motion to pass over Article 14 defeated.

Motion was made and seconded to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars to be added to the Highway Road Equipment Capital Reserve Fund previously established.

Article 14 passed.

Article 15: Motion was made and seconded to authorize the establishment of a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of updating and redrawing the Town's Tax Maps and to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Thousand (\$8,000.00) Dollars towards this purpose, and appoint the Selectmen as agents to administer the project.

Motion was made and seconded to reduce Article 15 to \$5,000.00. Amendment passed. YES 38, NO 1

Amended Article passed.

Article 16: Motion was made and seconded to authorize the establishment of a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the future revaluation of the Town and to raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Thousand (\$9,000.00) Dollars towards this purpose, and appoint the Selectmen as agents to administer the project.

Article 16 passed.

Article 17: Motion was made and seconded to raise and appropriate the sum of Eleven Hundred (\$1,100.00) Dollars to purchase a new radio to replace existing unit, which is a 1952 model, currently used in the Town fire truck M-1.
Article 17 passed.

Article 18. Motion was made and seconded to raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Hundred (\$900.00) Dollars for the restoration of Old Town Records. Said project to be under the control of the Town Clerk.
Article 18 passed.

Article 19: Motion was made and seconded to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Hundred Four (\$704.00) Dollars to match a grant received from the State of New Hampshire for the purpose of reconditioning the Town's Forest Fire Truck. Total cost of improvements not to exceed Fourteen Hundred Eight (\$1,408.00) Dollars and work will be supervised by the Town Fire Department.
Article 19 passed.

Article 20: Motion was made and seconded to instruct the Town's Representative to the General Court to respond to our solid waste crisis by taking all necessary measures to insure that New Hampshire adopt legislation that will permit consumers to return for refund of deposit within New Hampshire all soda, beer, wine cooler and liquor containers and that all unclaimed deposit monies shall be collected by that State and no less than 80% shall be returned annually to local municipalities for the sole purpose of implementing, expanding and reimbursing community recycling projects.
Article 20 passed.

Article 21: Motion was made and seconded to conduct such business as may come before the municipal body.
Motion was made and seconded that the town instruct the town's Representative to the General Court to restore the NH Sweepstakes money to be used for educational purposes as originally intended. Passed.
Meeting adjourned at 4:20 p.m.

ALL MARLOW PROPERTY OWNERS

ATTENTION ALL DOG OWNERS

New Hampshire Statutes require all dogs to be licensed with the Town Clerk every April. Proof of rabies inoculation must be presented in order to obtain a license. Failure to license your dog(s) on time will result in a \$1.00 penalty per animal per month after April 30th. In addition, court summonses will be issued in June to all owners of unlicensed dogs. This will involve an appearance before a judge and possible fine.

TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Marlow in the County of Cheshire, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Jones Hall in said Marlow on Tuesday, the 13th day of March 1990, at Two o'clock in the afternoon (2:00 P.M.) to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Marlow to include and delete the following sections as indicated below:

1. To amend Section 202 of the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Marlow by inserting alphabetically in the Term Definition for commercial use:
"COMMERCIAL USE" The conducting of business involving the sale of one or more products, the provision of one or more services, or any combination thereof."
2. To delete subparagraph 2 of Section 408.4 of the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Marlow, said paragraph containing the following:
"In the event an application for approval is not granted by the Marlow Planning Board for a proposed commercial use, commercial use change or additional commercial use in either Zone I or II, the applicant may appeal to the Zoning Board of Adjustment as outlined in Article VI, Section 605, 606 and 607 of this Ordinance."

These amendments were developed by the Marlow Planning Board and have the concurrence of Town Counsel. Copies are available at the Town Clerk's office, the Library and the Polling Place and may be viewed during regular business hours.

Article 3. Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:28, V and VI for an optional veterans' exemption and an expanded qualifying war service for veterans seeking the exemption? The optional veterans' exemption is \$100, rather than \$50.

Article 4. Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:35, IV for an optional property tax exemption on residential property for a service-connected total disability? The optional disability exemption is \$1,400, rather than \$700.

Article 5. Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:37 for the exemption for the blind from property tax? This statute provides that every inhabitant who is legally blind shall be exempt each year from the property tax on a residence to the value of \$15,000.

After the votes are counted and the results announced, the meeting will recess until Saturday, March 17, 1990 when it will reconvene at 10:00 A.M. in Jones Hall to act upon the following subjects:

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town expenses for the year ensuing, and make appropriations of the same, as set forth in the following budget:

Article 7. To see if the Town will authorize the Tax Collector to give a two percent (2%) cash discount on all property taxes which are paid within ten (10) days after the date of the tax bill.

Article 8: To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes when necessary under terms and interest rates which they deem to be in the best interest of the Town.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to apply for, receive and expend federal and state grants which may become available during the course of the year, in accordance with RSA 31:95-B and also to accept and expend money from any other governmental unit or private source to be used for purposes for which the town may legally appropriate money.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to sell or dispose of any town equipment which they deem to be outdated, outmoded and/or of no further use or value to the town. The manner of such disposal shall be determined by the selectmen.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to sell or convey any real estate which the town has acquired, or may acquire, through tax collector's deeds. Such sale shall be through auction or sealed bids or otherwise as justice may require, in accordance with RSA 80:80.

- Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to update the official names of all class V highways within the boundaries of Marlow and, after sufficient public review, affix appropriate signs at relevant intersections utilizing available funds
- Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise an appropriate the sum of Nine Hundred Dollars (900.00) for the restoration of old Town records. Said project to be under the control of the Town Clerk.
- Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to abolish the Cemetery Committee. All powers and duties of the Cemetery Committee to be assumed by the Trustees of the Trust Funds. The funds normally budgeted annually by the town for the maintenance of the cemeteries to be controlled and administered by the Trustees of the Trust Funds (RSA 31:19, 31:22, 289:7).
(By Cemetery Committee and Trustees of the Trust Funds.)
- Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirteen Hundred Dollars (\$1300.00) to purchase an advanced type of firefighting foam and related equipment for use on the Town's M2 fire department vehicle.
(By Selectmen and Fire Chief.)
- Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Thousand Dollars (\$7,000.00) to renovate or replace as appropriate the pump and water tank on the 1962 GMC American LaFrance fire truck known as M3.
(By Selectmen and Fire Chief.)
- Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to accept the donation of a 1989 Ford Ambulance, serial number IFDJE34M9KHB91468 from the Marlow Fire Department Ambulance and Rescue Squad at no cost to the Town. Said vehicle is currently being used to provide emergency transportation and medical services to the towns of Marlow, Stoddard, Gilsum, East Alstead and parts of Washington.
- Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) to be added to the Highway Road Equipment Capital Reserve Fund previously established.
- Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to approve applying the trade-in value of the Town's previous Ford Backhoe-Loader towards the lease/purchase of the new Ford 655A Backhoe-Loader currently in service. Amount allowed was Ten Thousand, Eight Hundred Ninety-One Dollars (\$10,891.00) and the Lease/Purchase Agreement was approved at the 1989 Town Meeting.

- Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Eight Hundred Thirty Nine Dollars (\$5,839.00) for the purchase and installation of a plow frame, hydraulic pump and wing tower and authorize the withdrawal of Five Thousand Eight Hundred Thirty Nine Dollars (\$5,839.00) from the Highway Road Equipment Capital Reserve Fund for that purpose. (This balance represents the unexpended amount of the 1989 appropriation for the Sand Pond Road.) The balance of Fourteen Thousand Six Hundred Twenty Five Dollars (\$14,625.00) to be raised from general taxation.
- Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the unmaintained portion of Reed Road, so called, passing over land of Hopkins and Welch and Gorges, which was bypassed as a result of highway reconstruction on New Hampshire Roue 10 in 1964.
- Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the unmaintained portion of road leading to the former George E. Reed farm in Stoddard, passing over land of Hopkins and Welch, beginning at the bend or corner in Reed Road as presently maintained and continuing to the Stoddard Town Line.
- Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to correct the wording of the Capital Reserve Fund set up for the purpose of updating and redrawing the town's tax maps to the acquisition of new town tax maps.

Article 27. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Four Thousand Eight Hundred Seventy Three Dollars (\$24,873.00) for the acquisition of new town tax maps to be prepared by Cartographics Associates, Inc., and to authorize the issuance of not more than Nine Thousand Eight Hundred Seventy Three Dollars (\$9,873.00) of notes in accordance with the provision of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA Chapter 33) and to authorize the town officials to issue and negotiate such notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon; furthermore, to authorize the withdrawal of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) from the Town Tax Maps Capital Reserve Fund created for this purpose; with the balance of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) to be raised by General Taxation. (2/3 ballot vote required.)

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to enter into contract on behalf of the town with AVITAR Associates of New England, Inc., a private appraisal firm that has been approved by the Department of Revenue Administration, for a complete revaluation of the town, and to see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Eight Thousand Dollars (\$38,000.00) for that purpose and to authorize the issuance of not more than Fifteen Thousand Two Hundred Dollars (\$15,200.00) of notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA Chapter 33) and to authorize the town officials to issue and negotiate such notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon; furthermore, to authorize the withdrawal of Nine Thousand Dollars (\$9,000.00) from the town Revaluation Capital Reserve Fund created this purpose; with the balance of Thirteen Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars (\$13,800.00) to be raised by general taxation. Article 30. To see if the Town of Marlow will vote to direct its representative to the Southwest Solid Waste Management District that the highest priority shall be placed on real waste reduction and recycling and that refuse disposal facilities shall be sized to meet the needs of district communities without bringing in any outside trash.
(By petition.)

Article 31. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of the Municipal Budget Law. RSA 32.
(By petition.)

Article 32. To see whether the Town wishes to have the members at large of the budget committee appointed by the moderator or elected by the Town Meeting.
(By petition.)

Article 33. To see if the Town wishes to have the budget committee consist of 3, 6, 9 or 12 members at large.
(By petition.)

Article 34. To see if the Town will vote to impose a spending limit on the 1990 town budget. Any increase in the total town budget to be limited to a sum not to exceed 3% above that amount budgeted and approved for the year 1989. Said vote to be by written ballot.
(By petition.)

Article 35. To act upon any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Any person that does not obtain a fire permit, when one is required, is violating our fire permit law. Such persons are subject to a court appearance and could be fined up to \$1000.00 and receive a jail sentence of up to one year. Such person is also liable for any damages caused and all fire suppression costs.

REPORT OF TOWN AUDITOR

The books and records of the Selectmen's office, Tax Collector, Town Clerk and Town Treasurer were audited through September 30, 1988. Cash book entries were verified to source documents, primarily invoices, vouchers and copies of receipts issued in the process of collecting property, motor vehicle and other tax and fee source funds. Monthly reports of the Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Selectmen's office and Town Treasurer were audited and verified to their respective source journals through September 30, 1988. Journals were footed, cross-footed and reviewed for accuracy for the same period. All errors and discrepancies discovered in the course of the audit thus far have been or are in the process of being corrected at the writing of this report (November 21, 1988.)

The final year end quarter, October through December, as well as the year ending reports will be completed after my return to Marlow on or about April 1, 1989. At that time the records of the Library and the Trustees of the Trust Funds will also be audited.

The computerization of the Town Selectmen's financial records, which commenced in 1987, is working well and is providing town officials with current data, enabling them to better control town funds and operations. These records are reconciled with the Town Treasurer's records and reports on a monthly basis by the Town Auditor.

The records of the Tax Collector for the current year are being computerized for the first time. The hard took records (Tax Collector's records as kept in the past) are also being kept for 1988 to help insure the accuracy of the Tax Collector's records for the time being.

The financial records of the Selectmen's office, the Town Clerk, Tax Collector and Town Treasurer, January through September, will be considered substantially accurate after corrective action as mentioned in paragraph one above is completed. This examination is being conducted in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and procedures and in conformance with State RSA Regulations.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION ANNUAL REPORT

Our purpose, as defined in the State statute RSA 36-A:2, is to provide "for the proper utilization and protection of the natural resources and for the protection of watershed resources of said city or town." We are an advisory body, rather than a judicial board, and as such, our job is to advise and make recommendations to other town bodies on conservation matters, rather than actually making or taking any decisive actions.

1989 proved to be an active year for the Marlow Conservation Commission. Through much of this year's business, we literally got our feet wet, educating and familiarizing ourselves as to the many rules and regulations specific to a Conservation Commission's authority — dredge and fill procedures, septic system specifications, sand and gravel excavation regulations, etc. Our primary concerns seemed to focus on the preservation of wetlands in our community, an issue that has recently become important in Marlow, as well as in many other small town communities, with the rapid pace of growth we are all experiencing. We work in conjunction with the town judicial boards and Selectpersons, as well as with State and County organizations, to address the present condition and the future of all of our natural resources.

In the coming year we hope to be able to attend workshops and seminars in order that we may better equip ourselves as "stewards" of these resources. We welcome any and all community members to attend our meetings, held usually on the second Monday of each month, at 7:30 PM at the Town Library.

POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT

During 1989 the Marlow Police Department responded to 240 calls compared to 124 in 1988 — an increase of 116 calls. We put in 571 hours and drove 6,063 miles.

One thing that kept us busy last year were dogs. We had 26 complaints about dogs and out of the 26 we took 7 dogs to the Monadnock Region Humane Society. Out of the 7, only one was reclaimed.

The State of New Hampshire requires that every part-time officer have at least 8 hours of new training each year. Last year, we each had 47 hours of new training and 12 hours of repeat training, totaling 59 hours of training for each of us. It's very important nowadays to keep training updated.

We also had 15 accidents in town. Out of the 15, only one was of a serious nature. I would like to thank the Marlow Fire Department and Ambulance Crew for all their help at the accident scenes. It's good to see all the local Departments working together in an emergency.

Thank you for your support and cooperation in 1989.

PLANNING BOARD DEPARTMENT FOR 1989

1989 was a challenging and productive year for the Marlow Planning Board. A newly-elected chairperson and full complement of members and required alternate members labored over the many items that came before the Board.

Several use changes were allowed which has brought new businesses to the community. Marlow Woodlands subdivision on Gustin Pond Road was approved as were several other much smaller land parcel subdivisions. The Board feels that to the best of its ability everyone who had business before the Board was treated respectfully, fairly and expeditiously.

In an effort to define procedures for running an efficient planning board, Rules of Procedure for our monthly meetings as well as a complete set of Rules of Organization were adopted to help us better serve the Town of Marlow now and in the future. Each and every board member represents the community and the community's sentiments regarding items which affect Marlow's future and her growth.

The town and its land use boards have been under the umbrella of the 1986 Zoning Ordinance for over three years and the Planning Board has found it to be an invaluable vehicle for dealing with the ever increasing demands for the development of the community. Southwestern New Hampshire has been experiencing much growth and as more businesses and people move into Cheshire County, our town is directly affected. Due to the many different changes that occur around us, it will be necessary to not only update our zoning ordinances as needs dictate but, even more importantly, the Comprehensive Master Plan must be looked at in depth and amended and changed as needed in order that Marlow be adequately prepared for the 1990's and beyond.

Industry and how the taxpayers perceive it must be addressed by the community and the Planning Board intends to establish guidelines and requirements on this issue as the community informs us of the directions it wants to take.

The members of the Planning Board are proud to serve their community and would encourage as much input at the regularly scheduled meetings and public hearings as Marlow's residents would like to provide.

MARLOW RECYCLING COMMITTEE REPORT - 1989

At last year's town meeting, Marlow residents voted to begin a recycling program and to locate the facility on a site along Route 10. Since that time, the Recycling Committee has been working to help set up our new facility and to help residents adjust to this new way of dealing with our trash.

During this past summer, work was begun on this project. Site preparation was done by Donald Landroche, the fence was constructed by Marlow Lumber, and the landscaping (designed by Maple Hill Nursery) was accomplished through the volunteer efforts of various townspeople.

Arrangements were made with W.L. Bourassa Company to provide the containers for our rubbish, scrap metal and demolition debris, and also to provide for the removal of these materials. It was also decided that W.L. Bourassa Co. would handle the recyclable materials.

At the present time, the town does not receive any money for our recyclables, as W.L. Bourassa Co. handles most aspects of the recycling (hauling, storage and marketing).

Our only responsibility is to collect these materials in proper condition and to sort them into various categories. When we began our recycling program, this arrangement was the most efficient way to get going, as we were not in a position to handle the other responsibilities, especially the marketing. However, we see this arrangement as a temporary one and we are actively pursuing options that will give us more control and cut costs.

Since the recycling center opened on October 28, 1989, the cooperation of Marlow residents has been a major factor in the successful beginning of our recycling program. As a result of recycling, we have reduced the number of dumpsters needed each week from 7 down to 4, and we anticipate removing another one in the future. This reduction means less waste — less waste of our natural resources, less space wasted in the landfill, and less money spent. Although this year's budget for solid waste disposal is higher than last year's, this is due to increased tipping fees at the Keene landfill. If we were not recycling, this budget would be several thousand dollars higher.

Congratulations and thanks to Marlow residents for helping us operate an attractive and efficient recycling center of which we can all be proud. I would like to thank all the committee members and numerous other people who have volunteered their time and energy to get this project underway.

We welcome your input and we encourage anyone who is interested to attend meetings of the Recycling Committee. Notice of these meetings is always posted in advance at the Post Office, Town Offices and Marlow Village Store. We look forward to working with you to cut costs even further and to make our operation work even better.
