"State of the Community"

THIS YEAR THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN ARE ASKING SUPPORT FOR SEVERAL PROJECTS WHICH HAVE BEEN IN THE PLANNING STAGES FOR THE LAST FEW YEARS, MOST IMPORTANT OF WHICH IS THE TOWN LANDFILL AND PLANNED TRANSFER STATION.

AS YOU KNOW, AT A RECENT TOWN MEETING, WE VOTED TO WITHDRAW FROM THE PEMI-BAKER SOLID WASTE DISTRICT. IN THIS YEAR'S WARRANT, THERE IS A "HOUSE CLEANING" ARTICLE WITH THE APPROPRIATE WORDING TO LEGALIZE THIS WITHDRAWAL. IN CONJUNCTION WITH SETTING UP OUR OWN DISTRICT, WE ARE ALSO ASKING YOUR SUPPORT FOR THE APPROPRIATION OF \$90,000, OF WHICH \$40,000 IS IN CAPITAL RESERVE, FOR THE PURCHASE OF A SUITABLE SITE FOR OUR TRANSFER STATION, AS WELL AS \$25,000 FOR PLANNING, DESIGN, AND POSSIBLY SOME CONSTRUCTION FOR THE SAME.

TO COMPLY WITH STATE REGULATIONS, WE ARE ALSO ASKING FOR THE SUM OF \$14,000 FOR QUARTERLY TESTING OF WELLS AT OUR PRESENT LANDFILL AND AGAIN, \$40,000 TO BE PLACED IN CAPITAL RESERVE FOR THE EVENTUAL CLOSING OF OUR LANDFILL.

WE ARE ALSO PLANNING, WITH YOUR SUPPORT, TO CHANGE TO SEMI-ANNUAL TAX BILLINGS. LOOKING AT LAST YEAR'S INTEREST ON TAX ANTICIPATION NOTES (NEARLY \$75,000), YOU CAN SEE HOW IMPORTANT THIS MEASURE HAS BECOME. NOW THAT OUR OFFICE IS COMPUTERIZED, THIS PROCESS WILL BE MUCH SIMPLER THAN IN THE PAST.

THIS YEAR YOU WILL FIND SEVERAL WARRANT ARTICLES THAT WERE INSERTED "BY REQUEST". THESE ARTICLES, ALTHOUGH NOT CONTAINED IN OUR CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM OR PART OF OUR TOWN PLANNING, WERE INCLUDED BECAUSE THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN FELT THEY WERE DESERVING OF YOUR CONSIDERATION.

YOU ARE HEREBY NOTIFIED TO MEET AT THE NEW HAMPTON TOWN HOUSE ON TUESDAY THE 14TH DAY OF MARCH 1989 AT 10:00 O'CLOCK IN THE FORENOON TO CAST YOUR BALLOTS FOR TOWN OFFICERS AND FOR QUESTIONS REQUIRED BY LAW TO BE ON THE BALLOTS. THE POLLS TO CLOSE NOT LATER THAN 7:00 PM.

THE REMAINDER OF THE WARRANT WILL BE ACTED UPON AT NEW HAMPTON TOWN HOUSE, SATURDAY MARCH 18, 1989 AT 10:00 O'CLOCK IN THE FORENOON.

THE POLLS WERE OPENED BY THE MODERATOR T. H. MOORE AT 10:00 AM FOR THE PURPOSE OF BALLOTING FOR TOWN OFFICERS.

THE POLLS WERE CLOSED AT 7:00 PM. THE OFFICERS IN CHARGE OF THE MEETING WERE GIVEN SUPPER BEFORE COUNTING THE BALLOTS.

THE MODERATOR PRESENTED SELECTMAN LINDA MORGAN WHO PRESENTED TOWN CLERK. FLOWERS WERE PRESENTED FOR KATHERINE SEAVEY WHO HAS HELPED ARTHUR IN HIS WORK AS TOWN CLERK.

ARTHUR THANKED THE PEOPLE OF THE TOWN FOR THEIR KINDNESS BUT TOLD THEM THAT THEY COULD HAVE THE TOWN CLERK OFFICE BACK BUT THE MEMORIES OF THE OFFICE WILL ALWAYS REMAIN WITH THE SEAVEYS.

THE MODERATOR EXPLAINED PROCEDURE FOR MEETING.

THE MODERATOR STARTED THE MEETING BY READING ARTICLE #1.

ARTICLE #1. TO RAISE SUCH SUMS OF MONEY AS MAY BE NECESSARY TO DEFRAY TOWN CHARGES FOR THE ENSUING YEAR AND MAKE APPROPRIATIONS OF THE SAME.

LINDA MORGAN MADE THE MOTION TO RAISE \$333,385. SECONDED BY HORACE BOYNTON.

LINDA EXPLAINED THE MOTION AND PRESENTED DETAILED ANSWERS TO QUESTIONS.

AFTER A SHORT DISCUSSION MODERATOR REREAD ARTICLE #1 AND IT WAS ACCEPTED WITH AN UNANIMOUS VOTE.

ARTICLE #2. THE MODERATOR READ ARTICLE #2 AS FOLLOWS:

TO SEE IF THE TOWN WILL VOTE TO RAISE AND APPROPRIATE THE SUM OF \$17,000 FOR THE SUPPORT OF THE FIRE DEPARTMENT.

BILL CLEMENT MADE MOTION AND IT WAS SECONDED BY DOUG SMITH.

BILL EXPLAINED ARTICLE AND AFTER A SHORT DISCUSSION THE MODERATOR REREAD ARTICLE AND IT WAS ACCEPTED BY AN UNANIMOUS VOTE.

ARTICLE #3. THE MODERATOR READ ARTICLE 3# AS FOLLOWS:

TO SEE OF THE TOWN WILL VOTE TO RAISE AND APPROPRIATE THE SUM OF \$3,000 FOR AN ADDITION TO THE NEW HAMPTON FIRE DEPARTMENT BUILDING.

MOVED BY BILL CLEMENT AND SECONDED BY DOUG SMITH. BILL EXPLAINED THE ARTICLE AND AFTER ANSWERING QUESTIONS THE MODERATOR REREAD THE ARTICLE AND IT WAS ACCEPTED UNANIMOUSLY.

ARTICLE #4. THE MODERATOR READ THE ARTICLE AS FOLLOWS:

TO SEE IF THE TOWN WILL VOTE TO RAISE AND APPROPRIATE THE SUM OF \$205,300.93 FOR THE SUPPORT OF THE HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT. THIS FIGURE INCLUDES \$51,550.93 HIGHWAY BLOCK GRANT AID.

MOVED BY GORDON HUCKINS, SECONDED BY BILL CLEMENT.

GORDON EXPLAINED ARTICLE AND AFTER ANSWERING QUESTIONS THE MODERATOR REREAD ARTICLE AND IT WAS ACCEPTED WITH AN UNANIMOUS AYE VOTE.

ARTICLE #5. THE MODERATOR READ ARTICLE AS FOLLOWS:

TO SEE IF THE TOWN WILL VOTE TO RAISE AND APPROPRIATE THE SUM OF \$60,000 FOR THE PURCHASE OF A NEW HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT DUMP TRUCK AND SPREADER.

MOVED BY GORDON HUCKINS, SECONDED BY HORACE BOYNTON.

GORDON EXPLAINED ARTICLE AND REDUCED THE AMOUNT TO \$45,124. COULD GET A BRAND NEW 1988 FORD WHICH WAS LOADED WITH FEATURES FOR LESS MONEY.

AFTER SHORT DISCUSSION MODERATOR REREAD ARTICLE AND IT WAS ACCEPTED BY AN UNANIMOUS AYE VOTE.

ARTICLE #6. THE MODERATOR READ THE ARTICLE AS FOLLOWS:

TO SEE IF THE TOWN WILL VOTE TO RAISE AND APPROPRIATE THE SUM OF \$100,000 FOR RESURFACING TOWN ROADS.

GORDON HUCKINS MOVED ARTICLE AND WAS SECONDED BY ROBERT FISCHER.

GORDON EXPLAINED ARTICLE AND AFTER QUESTIONS BY WILL OBER AND OTHERS THE MODERATOR REREAD THE ARTICLE AND IT WAS ACCEPTED WITH AN UNANIMOUS AYE VOTE.

ARTICLE #7. THE MODERATOR READ THE ARTICLE AS FOLLOWS:

TO SEE IF THE TOWN WILL VOTE TO RAISE AND APPROPRIATE THE SUM OF \$5,000 FOR THE REPAIR OF MAIN STREET: THE STATE TO CONTRIBUTE \$10,000 FOR A TOTAL OF \$15,000.

MOTION BY JUNE SMITH AND SECONDED BY BILL CLEMENT.

JUNE SMITH EXPLAINED ARTICLE AND AFTER ANSWERING QUESTIONS BY GORDON HUCKINS, PAT TORSEY, DANA TORSEY AND OTHERS THE MODERATOR REREAD ARTICLE AND IT WAS ACCEPTED WITH AN AYE VOTE.

ARTICLE #8. THE MODERATOR READ THE ARTICLE AS FOLLOWS:

TO SEE IF THE TOWN WILL VOTE TO RAISE AND APPROPRIATE THE SUM OF \$40,000 AND TO PLACE SAME IN THE LANDFILL CLOSURE CAPITAL RESERVE FUND.

LINDA MORGAN MADE MOTION AND IT WAS SECONDED BY ROBERT FISCHER.

LINDA EXPLAINED ARTICLE AND ANSWERED QUESTIONS BY MR. WEBBER AND OTHERS. THE MODERATOR REREAD THE ARTICLE AND IT WAS ACCEPTED BY AYE VOTE.

ARTICLE #9. THE MODERATOR READ THE ARTICLE AS FOLLOWS:

TO SEE IF THE TOWN WILL VOTE TO RAISE AND APPROPRIATE THE SUM OF \$40,000 AND TO PLACE SAME IN THE TRANSFER STATION CAPITAL RESERVE FUND.

MOVED BY LINDA MORGAN AND SECONDED BY DOUG SMITH.

LINDA EXPLAINED ARTICLE AND WHAT THE MONEY WAS FOR.

AFTER DISCUSSION MODERATOR REREAD ARTICLE AND IT WAS ACCEPTED BY AN AYE VOTE.

ARTICLE #10. MODERATOR READ ARTICLE AS FOLLOWS:

TO SEE IF THE TOWN WILL VOTE TO RAISE AND APPROPRIATE THE SUM OF \$102,346 FOR THE SUPPORT OF THE POLICE DEPARTMENT.

MOVED BY CHIEF SALMON AND SECONDED BY BILL CLEMENT.

ARTICLE WAS EXPLAINED BY CHIEF SALMON WITH DOUG SMITH MAKING A MOTION TO ADD A SALARY AMOUNT OF 8%. LARRY BLOOD MADE MOTION TO RAISE THE AMOUNT TO \$112,346. DOUG SMITH SECONDED IT TO ADDITION TO SALARIES AND OTHER BENEFITS FOR POLICE OFFICERS. AMENDMENT WAS ACCEPTED WITH AN AYE VOTE.

ARTICLE #11. MODERATOR READ ARTICLE AS FOLLOWS:

TO SEE IF THE TOWN WILL RAISE AND APPROPRIATE THE SUM OF \$15,500 FOR THE PURCHASE OF A NEW 1989 POLICE CRUISER, FULLY EQUIPPED.

MOVED BY CHIEF SALMON AND SECONDED BY MR. FISCHER.

SALMON SAID HE COULD GET A NEW 1988 FORD FOR \$13,550 WHICH IS CHEAPER AND JUST AS GOOD SO THEY CHANGED AMOUNT FROM \$15,500 TO \$13,550.

AFTER DISCUSSION MODERATOR REREAD ARTICLE AND IT WAS ACCEPTED WITH AN AYE VOTE.

ARTICLE #12. MODERATOR READ ARTICLE AS FOLLOWS:

TO SEE IF THE TOWN WILL VOTE TO RAISE \$9,500 TO HIRE AN ADDITIONAL POLICE OFFICER.

MOVED BY SALMON, SECONDED BY LINDA MORGAN.

SALMON EXPLAINED ARTICLE. MRS. SCHLESINGER AND OTHERS ASKED QUESTIONS AND RECEIVED ANSWERS TO CLARIFY ARTICLE.

MODERATOR REREAD ARTICLE AND IT WAS ACCEPTED WITH AN AYE VOTE.

ARTICLE #13. THE MODERATOR READ THE ARTICLE AS FOLLOWS:

TO SEE IF THE TOWN WILL VOTE TO RAISE THE SUM OF \$21,000 FOR THE PURCHASE OF 2 COMPUTERS FOR THE TOWN OFFICE BUILDING INCLUDING EQUIPMENT AND SOFTWARE.

MOVED BY LINDA MORGAN, SECONDED BY HORACE BOYNTON.

LINDA EXPLAINED ARTICLE FOR WHAT TO BE USED FOR. LARRY BLOOD TOLD WHAT COMPUTER COULD DO. WRITE - BACKUP - TAX SYSTEMS -GENERAL FUNDS - TOWN REPORTS - CLOSE BOOKS - PAYROLL - ACCTS. PAYABLE - CASH RECEIPTS - (TOWN CLERK) AND ALSO POLICE SERVICE.

AFTER DISCUSSION MODERATOR REREAD ARTICLE AND IT WAS ACCEPTED BY AN AYE VOTE.

ARTICLE #14. TO SEE IF THE TOWN WILL VOTE TO RAISE AND APPROPRIATE THE SUM OF \$6,000 TO COMPLETE EXPANSION TO THE EXISTING TOWN OFFICE BUILDING.

CHIEF SALMON MOVED ARTICLE AND SECONDED BY BOB FISCHER.

SALMON EXPLAINED WHAT MONIES WERE TO BE USED FOR AND AFTER DISCUSSION MODERATOR REREAD ARTICLE AND IT WAS ACCEPTED WITH AN AYE VOTE.

ARTICLE #15. MODERATOR READ ARTICLE AS FOLLOWS.

TO SEE IF THE TOWN WILL VOTE TO RAISE AND APPROPRIATE THE SUM OF \$17,254 FOR THE SUPPORT OF THE REGIONAL ASSOCIATIONS:
COMMUNITY ACTION PROGRAM \$3,474; BRISTOL COMMUNITY CENTER \$2,252; LAKES REGION PLANNING COMMISSION \$1,397; NEWFOUND AREA NURSING ASSOCIATION \$5,907; NEWFOUND AREA AMBULANCE SERVICE \$4,224.

ROBERT FISCHER MOVED THE ARTICLE AND IT WAS SECONDED BY MR. SIMPSON.

BOB EXPLAINED ARTICLE AND WITH NO DISCUSSION MODERATOR REREAD ARTICLE AND IT WAS ACCEPTED WITH AN AYE VOTE.

ARTICLE #16. MODERATOR READ ARTICLE AS FOLLOWS:

TO SEE IF THE TOWN WILL VOTE TO RAISE AND APPROPRIATE THE SUM OF \$5,000 TO BE PLACED IN THE PROPERTY REAPPRAISAL CAPITAL RESERVE FUND FOR THE REVALUATION OF THE TOWN BY THE APPRAISAL DIVISION OF THE DEPARTMENT OF REVENUE ADMINISTRATION.

MOVED BY HORACE BOYNTON, SECONDED BY LINDA MORGAN.

HORACE EXPLAINED ARTICLE AND AFTER DISCUSSION MODERATOR REREAD ARTICLE AND IT WAS ACCEPTED WITH AN AYE VOTE.

ARTICLE #17. MODERATOR READ ARTICLE AS FOLLOWS:

TO SEE IF THE TOWN WILL VOTE TO RAISE AND APPROPRIATE THE SUM OF \$400 FOR THE SUPPORT OF HOSPITALS: MARY HITCHCOCK

MEMORIAL HOSPITAL; FRANKLIN REGIONAL HOSPITAL; LAKES REGION GENERAL HOSPITAL; SPEARE MEMORIAL HOSPITAL.

HORACE BOYNTON MOVED ARTICLE AND IT WAS SECONDED BY CHARLES JOYCE. HORACE EXPLAINED ARTICLE AND AFTER DISCUSSION MODERATOR REREAD ARTICLE AND IT WAS ACCEPTED WITH AN AYE VOTE.

ARTICLE #18. MODERATOR READ ARTICLE AS FOLLOWS:

TO SEE IF THE TOWN WILL VOTE TO RAISE AND APPROPRIATE THE SUM OF \$9,000 FOR THE PURCHASE OF A RECYCLING TRAILER; NEW HAMPSHIRE THE BEAUTIFUL TO CONTRIBUTE \$5,000 FOR A TOTAL OF \$14,000.

MOVED BY LINDA MORGAN, SECONDED BY NANCY CONKLING.

AMENDED TO READ "PURCHASE OF RECYCLING TRAILER OR OTHER RE- CYCLING EQUIPMENT."

LINDA EXPLAINED ARTICLE AS AMENDED. AFTER SOME DISCUSSION BY KEN TORSEY, LARRY BLOOD AND OTHERS, THE MODERATOR REREAD AMENDED ARTICLE AND IT WAS ACCEPTED WITH AN AYE VOTE.

ARTICLE #19. ARTICLE READ BY MODERATOR BUT NOT VOTED UPON, FOR IT WAS TAKEN CARE OF IN ARTICLE #1.

ARTICLE #20. THE MODERATOR READ ARTICLE AS FOLLOWS:

TO SEE IF THE TOWN WILL VOTE TO DEPOSIT A PERCENTAGE OF THE REVENUE COLLECTED PURSUANT TO RSA 79-A (LAND USE TAX) INTO THE CONSERVATION FUND IN ACCORDANCE WITH RSA 36-A:4,III AS AUTHORIZED BY RSA 79-A:25,II.

MOTION BY PAT SCHLESINGER, SECONDED BY HOPE CLEMENT.

AN AMENDMENT TO SET A CEILING OF \$5,000 WAS DEFEATED. AN AMENDMENT TO ALLOT 25% OF CURRENT USE PENALTIES WAS ACCEPTED. MODERATOR REREAD AMENDED ARTICLE AND CALLED FOR A HAND VOTE.
29 AYES 23 NOES ARTICLE ACCEPTED

ARTICLE #21. MODERATOR READ ARTICLE AS FOLLOWS:

TO SEE IF THE TOWN WILL VOTE TO RAISE AND APPROPRIATE THE SUM OF \$5,000 FOR THE PURPOSE OF CONSERVATION EASEMENT/DEVELOPMENT RIGHTS IN OUR TOWN ON A MATCHING FUND BASIS WITH THE STATE AND ESTABLISH A CAPITAL RESERVE FUND FOR THIS PURPOSE.

MOVED BY PAT SCHLESINGER AND SECONDED BY MR. ECKERT.

DOUG SMITH POINTED OUT THAT THE USE OF THIS MONEY WILL REQUIRE APPROVAL OF THE SELECTMEN.

AFTER A LENGTHY DISCUSSION THE MODERATOR REREAD THE ARTICLE AND IT WAS ACCEPTED BY A VERY CLOSE VOTE.

ARTICLE #22. MODERATOR READ THE ARTICLE AS FOLLOWS:

TO SEE IF THE TOWN WILL VOTE TO INSTRUCT THE TOWN'S REPRESENTATIVES TO THE GENERAL COURT TO RESPOND TO THE SOLID WASTE CRISIS BY TAKING ALL NECESSARY MEASURES TO INSURE THAT NEW HAMPSHIRE ADOPT LEGISLATION THAT WILL PERMIT CONSUMERS TO RETURN FOR REFUND OF DEPOSIT WITHIN NEW HAMPSHIRE ALL SODA, BEER, WINE COOLERS AND LIQUOR CONTAINERS AND THAT ALL UNCLAIMED DEPOSIT MONIES SHALL BE COLLECTED BY THE STATE AND NO LESS THAN 80% SHALL BE RETURNED ANNUALLY TO LOCAL COMMUNITIES FOR THE SOLE PURPOSE OF IMPLEMENTING, EXPANDING AND REIMBURSING COMMUNITY RECYCLING PROJECTS. (BY REQUEST)

MOTION BY PAT SCHLESINGER, SECONDED BY ROBERT FISCHER.

Minutes of Special Town Meeting

OCTOBER 21, 1989

MODERATOR T.H. MOORE OPENED THE SPECIAL TOWN MEETING IN THE TOWN HOUSE AT 10:00 A.M. SATURDAY, OCTOBER 21, 1989.

THE MODERATOR READ THE WARRANT AS FOLLOWS:

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF NEW HAMPTON IN THE COUNTY OF BELKNAP IN SAID STATE, QUALIFIED TO VOTE IN TOWN AFFAIRS; YOU ARE HEREBY NOTIFIED TO MEET AT THE TOWN HOUSE IN SAID NEW HAMPTON ON SATURDAY, THE 21ST DAY OF OCTOBER 1989, AT 10:00 O'CLOCK IN THE FORENOON TO ACT UPON THE FOLLOWING SUBJECTS:

ARTICLE #1 - TO SEE IF THE TOWN WILL VOTE TO BECOME A SINGLE-TOWN SOLID WASTE DISTRICT BY WITHDRAWING FROM THE PEMI-BAKER SOLID WASTE DISTRICT.

GIVEN UNDER OUR HANDS AND SEAL, THIS FIFTH DAY OF OCTOBER IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED AND EIGHTY-NINE. ROBERT A FISCHER AND ROBERT W. JEFFERS. SELECTMEN OF THE TOWN OF NEW HAMPTON.

OCTOBER 21, WE HEREBY CERTIFY THAT WE GAVE NOTICE TO THE INHABITANTS WITHIN NAME TO BE AT THE TIME AND PLACE FOR THE PURPOSE OF WITHIN MENTIONED BY POSTING UP THE ATTESTED COPY OF THE WITHIN WARRANT AT THE PLACE OF MEETING WITHIN NAME AND THEY WOULD LIKE TO TESTIFY THAT AT THE FIRE STATION BEING A PUBLIC PLACE IN SAID TOWN ON THE 6TH DAY OF OCTOBER 1989. ROBERT FISCHER AND ROBERT JEFFERS.

THE MODERATOR DECLARED THE MEETING IN SESSION. ARTICLE #1 WAS REREAD BY THE MODERATOR AND WAS MOVED BY LINDA MORGAN AND SECONDED BY CLARE ECKERT.

LINDA MORGAN - GAVE A BRIEF HISTORY OF WHY WE SHOULD VOTE TO WITHDRAW FROM THE PEMI-BAKER SOLID WASTE DISTRICT. IN 1983 NEW HAMPTON ASKED THE TOWN TO BECOME A MEMBER OF PEMI-BAKER SOLID WASTE PLANNING DISTRICT. SINCE THEN WE HAVE BEEN PAYING OUR DUES AND PAYING FOR OUR STUDIES, ENGINEERING, ETC... OF WHAT 14 TOWNS WILL BE DOING WITH THEIR WASTE AND WHERE WE CAN TAKE IT, WHAT WE CAN DO WITH OUR SOLID WASTE. FOR THOSE YEARS, A TOTAL OF SIX (6) YEARS, WE HAVE BEEN GOING AROUND IN CIRCLES COMING UP WITH MANY PLANS. THE BASIC PLAN WAS TO BUILD A BETTER INCINERATOR. NOW THE PEMI-BAKER IS THINKING ABOUT GOING TO HAUL THEIR WASTE TO A BIG LANDFILL UP IN BETHLEHEM, NH CALLED SANCO AND THAT COMES RIGHT AROUND TO A FULL CIRCLE TO WHAT WE STARTED IN 1983. I (LINDA) TRIED TO PUSH THE PEOPLE INVOLVED WITH PEMI-BAKER TO COME FORWARD WITH SOME KIND OF DECISION. ONE DECISION THAT I AM TERRIFIED OF,

FOR OUR TOWN, IS TO BECOME INVOLVED WITH THE PLYMOUTH FACILITY BECAUSE IT IS GOING TO BE MILLIONS OF DOLLARS TO BUILD THIS FACILITY AND OUR PORTION IS GOING TO BE A LOT OF MONEY AND SHE BELIEVES THAT WE (PEOPLE) CAN DO THIS IN OUR TOWN IN A MORE APPROPRIATE FASHION. IN FEBRUARY OF 1989 THE LEGISLATURE PROPOSED THAT SINGLE TOWNS COULD BECOME THEIR OWN DISTRICT. THEY DO NOT HAVE TO GET INTO A GROUP OF TOWNS. IN THE SUMMER OF 1989 IT BECAME A LAW. SINCE THEN WE HAVE SET UP A SOLID WASTE COMMITTEE HERE IN OUR TOWN AND WE HAVE SOME VERY FINE PEOPLE WORKING ON OUR COMMITTEE THAT ARE VERY KNOWLEDGEABLE AND WHO ARE WILLING TO WORK FOR US IN OUR TOWN TO SET UP OUR OWN DISTRICT.

MODERATOR ASKED SECOND TO SPEAK AND MRS. ECKERT HANDED OVER TO CHANGE PARKER.

CHANGE PARKER - WHAT WE MEAN BY SOLID WASTE. THIS IS WHAT THE DEPARTMENT OF ENVIRONMENTAL SERVICES REQUIRES US TO LOOK AT WHEN WE TALK ABOUT THIS. MUNICIPAL SOLID WASTE THAT HAS TO GO TO A LANDFILL AND HAS TO GO TO A INCINERATOR. NOW IF YOU TAKE WHAT WE NORMALLY CALL OUR GARBAGE\SOLID WASTE AND START LOOKING AT IT THERE ARE A LOT OF THINGS IN THERE WE CAN TAKE OUT AND RECYCLE. NOW, WHAT WE HAVE TO DO, WHAT WE ARE PROPOSING TO DO AND WHETHER WE WILL BE IN PEMI-BAKER OR IN OUR OWN SINGLE SOLID WASTE DISTRICT WE WILL STILL HAVE TO SUBMIT IN A REPORT TO CONCORD ENVIRONMENTAL SERVICES IN JANUARY OF THIS NEXT YEAR WHICH IS GOING TO INCLUDE BASICALLY THE FOLLOWING:

WHAT IS AN OVERVIEW OF OUR TOWN. RELATIONSHIPS WE HAVE WITH OTHER PEOPLE, ITS GEOGRAPHY, ROADS, ETC... WHAT EQUALITIES OF EACH OF THESE DIFFERENT KINDS OF THINGS WE GENERATE IN THIS TOWN AND OUR PROJECTION FOR THE NEXT 15 YEARS AND HOW WE WILL INCREASE. THE NUMBER OF PEOPLE THAT COME INTO THIS TOWN, BUSINESSES THAT GROW, ETC. WE NEED TO LOOK AT WHAT WE PRESENTLY HAVE WHICH IS THE LANDFILL AND HOW WE ARE MANAGING IT AND WHAT OUR PROJECTIONS ARE FOR THAT LANDFILL. OUR PROJECTIONS ARE MAYBE WE HAVE 2 YEARS LIFE IN THE LANDFILL. WE NEED TO COME UP WITH A RECYCLING PLAN. HOW WE PLAN TO TAKE OUT OF THE MUNICIPAL SOLID WASTE. THOSE THINGS THAT WOULD BE SOLD TO OTHER PEOPLE, THINGS THAT DON'T HAVE TO GO INTO A LANDFILL.

THAT'S WHERE THERE ARE A LOT OF CHOICES TO BE MADE BY THE PEOPLE IN THIS TOWN ABOUT HOW THEY WANT TO SEPARATE THOSE PARTICULAR THINGS IN THEIR HOUSES. HOW THEY WANT TO PAY FOR THAT TO HAPPEN. ONE NEED TO LOOK AT, IDENTIFY THE ALTERNATIVES THAT ARE NOT ONLY FOR RECYCLING BUT FOR SENDING OUR SOLID WASTE TO SOMEPLACE ELSE. IF WE DON'T GO ALONG WITH PEMI-BAKER WHICH IS PRESENTLY THINKING ABOUT GOING TO AN INCINERATOR OR TO A LANDFILL, WE ARE NOT GOING TO HAVE AN OPTION IF WE HAVE A SINGLE TOWN DISTRICT. WE WILL NEED TO SEND IT TO A LANDFILL AND THERE ARE 2 LANDFILLS WE COULD POSSIBLY SEND IT TO. WE NEED TO SELECT AN OPTION AND PRESENT

IT TO THE SELECTMEN AND THEY MAKE A CHOICE AND THEN THIS PLAN IS SENT TO THE STATE AND THEY REVIEW IT, THEY SEND BACK ANY OBJECTIONS OR CORRECTIONS AND WE PUT IN HOW WE PLAN TO DO THIS PLAN. WE HAVE ABOUT 6 MONTHS TO START IMPLEMENTING THIS PLAN.

THE PEOPLE THAT HAVE BEEN IN THE SOLID WASTE THROUGH THE CYCLES HAVE COMPLETED ABOUT ONE-HALF OR ONE-THIRD OF THIS NOW. THIS IS A SUBJECT WE CAN DO. IT DOES NOT TAKE EXPERTS TO DO THIS. WE ARE A SMALL TOWN. A LOT OF TOWNS TELL DISTRICTS THAT INVOLVE OTHER TOWNS, THAT BECAUSE THEY ARE A BIG TOWN THAT THEY KNOW EACH OTHER AND GENERATE A LOT OF WASTE PEOPLE DON'T REALIZE THAT IT IS GOING TO BE SO COSTLY TO GET RID OF THE WASTE AND THAT THEY NEED TO SHARE THE COST WITH OTHER TOWNS. WHEN WE LOOK AT THIS TOWN, WE DON'T GENERATE THAT MUCH WASTE, ABOUT 1200 TONS A YEAR. RIGHT NOW, TO GET RID OF THAT WASTE WOULD NOT BE THAT COSTLY AND WHETHER WE WOULD PULL FROM PEMI-BAKER IT IS NOT GOING TO BE (FOR US TO DO IT BY OURSELVES) AS COSTLY, I DON'T THINK, AS BEING PART OF A COOPERATIVE DISTRICT. IF WE WENT WITH PEMI-BAKER AND IT LOOKS AS THOUGH AN INCINERATOR IS IN THE FUTURE FOR THAT, THERE IS GOING TO BE AN ESCALATING COST TO BE PART OF THAT INCINERATOR. IF YOU SIGN A CONTRACT WITH A LANDFILL YOU WILL KNOW EXACTLY WHAT YOUR COST IS GOING TO BE. BASICALLY WHAT WE ARE LOOKING AT NOW IS LESS THAN THE INCINERATOR COST. THE FUTURE YOU CAN'T BE COMPLETELY SURE OF THESE COSTS. BUT MY GUESS IS IT WILL BE LESS. WE CAN DO THIS SINCE WE ARE ALL GOING TO HAVE TO RECYCLE IN THE FUTURE. THE REASON I AM SAYING ALL OF THIS IS BECAUSE IF WE DIDN'T DO IT (RECYCLE) EVERYTHING WE WOULD GENERATE WOULD HAVE TO GO TO A LANDFILL AND YOU WILL BE PAYING BY THE TON TO SEND THINGS TO THE LANDFILL. YOU WANT TO REDUCE THE AMOUNT OF WASTE AND THE AMOUNT OF COST THAT IT IS GOING TAKE TO SEND TO THE LANDFILL. SO WE WILL ALL HAVE TO SUFFER. DOING THIS OURSELVES LEAVES US ALL BEING ABLE TO TALK ABOUT IT AND TO CHOOSE AMONG OURSELVES IS THE BEST WAY FOR ALL OF US. IF WE WERE PART OF PEMI-BAKER YOU WON'T HAVE AS MANY PEOPLE BEING INVOLVED IN THIS AND YOU WON'T HAVE AS MUCH CHOICE. IF WE WERE PART OF PEMI-BAKER WE WOULD HAVE TO HAVE A TRANSFER STATION. IN OTHER WORDS THE KIND OF PLAN THAT PEMI-BAKER IS PUTTING FORTH, IF THEY HAVE AN INCINERATOR WE WOULD STILL NEED TO BUILD SOME FACILITY HERE IN NEW HAMPTON AND IT WOULD BE TRUCKED TO WHERE THE INCINERATOR IS. IF WE HAVE A SINGLE TOWN DISTRICT WE STILL HAVE TO HAVE A TRANSFER STATION. SO WHETHER WE ARE PART OF THE DISTRICT OR OUR OWN TOWN DISTRICT WE STILL HAVE TO HAVE A TRANSFER STATION. THE COST IS EXACTLY THE SAME FOR THAT. IF WE HAVE A TRANSFER STATION WE WILL BRING OUR GARBAGE TO IT AND OUR SOLID WASTE TO IT AND IT WOULD BE TRUCKED OUT INTO MARKETS OR TO A LANDFILL.

MODERATOR ASKED IF THERE WAS ANYONE TO SPEAK AGAINST MOTION. THERE WAS NONE.

MODERATOR ASKED FOR A DISCUSSION.

PAT TORSEY - IF WE GO WITH ANOTHER TOWN TO A LANDFILL ARE WE LIABLE FOR THAT LANDFILL OR WHOEVER WE ARE PAYING ARE THEY LIABLE?

LINDA MORGAN ANSWERED. ACCORDING TO THE GENTLEMEN THAT ARE LEGALLY RESPONSIBLE THE OWNERS OF SANCO AND WASTE MANAGEMENT IN ROCHESTER ONCE OUR REFUSE IS WEIGHED IN THE BIG TRUCK ON THEIR SCALE IT IS THEIR RESPONSIBILITY.

CHANGE PARKER - NO TO LINDA'S ANSWER. EVERYBODY IS ALWAYS RESPONSIBLE FOR THEIR GARBAGE NO MATTER WHERE IT GOES. BUT IF IT WENT TO AN INCINERATOR IT TURNS TO ASH AND THE ASH GOES TO A ASH LANDFILL. WE ARE RESPONSIBLE FOR THE COST OF THE ASH LANDFILL. WHETHER THE LANDFILL THAT YOU ARE THINKING OF SENDING IT TO IS A WELL SIGHTED LANDFILL, IS ENVIRONMENTALLY GOOD SO THAT THERE IS NOT GOING TO BE ANY BREAKDOWNS WHICH YOU DO NOT WANT TO BE RESPONSIBLE. IF GARBAGE OR WASTE GOES TO THE INCINERATOR IT WILL END UP AS ASH. I THINK MOST OF YOU ARE AWARE ABOUT THE POSSIBLE HAZARDS THAT ARE INVOLVED WITH ASH FROM AN INCINERATOR. THE MAIN THING ABOUT A LANDFILL IS THE COST OF CLOSING ONE IS LITERALLY ANOTHER THING ABOUT \$200,000 or \$300,000. IF WE WENT WITH PEMI-BAKER WE HAVE A FUTURE TO ASH LANDFILLS. IF WE WENT WITH THE LANDFILL IN SANCO OR ROCHESTER IT IS SUFFICIENT TO GO FOR THE NEXT 15 TO 20 YEARS AND THEY ARE BOTH VERY GOOD.

MODERATOR ASKED FOR ANY OTHER DISCUSSIONS.

DANA TORSEY - CAN WE USE THE PRESENT DUMP FOR A TRANSFER STATION?

RED BOYNTON - YES AND NO. THE TOWN HAS THE OPTION TO PURCHASE THAT PIECE OF PROPERTY AND WE CAN USE THE FIELD ON THE RIGHT HAND SIDE FOR A TRANSFER STATION. THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN DOES NOT FEEL IT IS A GOOD IDEA BECAUSE WE HAVE PROBLEMS WITH THE DUMP LEASE AS IT IS. WE CANNOT HAVE A TRANSFER STATION OVER THE PRESENT LANDFILL. ONCE THE DUMP IS CLOSED THE LAND CANNOT BE USED FOR ANYTHING.

MODERATOR SAID WE ARE TO HAVE A BALLOT VOTE AND REREAD THE QUESTION.

BALLOTS CAST - 65 YES - 63 NO - 2

MODERATOR DECLARED THE MOTION ACCEPTED. ADJOURNED 10:45 AM

NEW HAMPTON POLICE DEPARTMENT

AT THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING IN MARCH 1989, THE TOWNSPEOPLE PASSED ARTICLE #12 WHICH WOULD GIVE THE DEPARTMENT ITS FOURTH FULL-TIME MEMBER. ON JULY 1ST 1989, JAMES M. BRUNT WAS SWORN IN. HE WENT TO THE FALL ACADEMY CLASS AND GRADUATED WITH THE 88TH CLASS ON NOVEMBER 17, 1989.

ON JULY 9, 1989 OFFICER KENNETH W. HAMEL RESIGNED FROM THE DEPARTMENT AND WENT ON TO THE MOULTONBOROUGH POLICE DEPARTMENT. THIS LEFT THE DEPARTMENT AN OFFICER SHORT FOR THE REST OF THE SUMMER. HOWEVER, I WAS ABLE TO HIRE SCOTT SANDERSON AS A SPECIAL OFFICER. HE HAD BEEN WITH THE MEREDITH POLICE DEPARTMENT SINCE 1983. IN MID-AUGUST SCOTT RESIGNED TO GO INTO THE NEW HAMPSHIRE STATE POLICE. I WAS THEN ABLE TO HIRE ROBERT GRAY AS A SPECIAL OFFICER WHO HAS SEVERAL YEARS OF FULL-TIME EXPERIENCE WITH THE BRISTOL POLICE DEPARTMENT.

IN LATE AUGUST I ADVERTISED FOR A FULL-TIME OFFICER. I RECEIVED 17 APPLICATIONS. A WRITTEN TEST WAS GIVEN ON SEPTEMBER 27TH AND AN ORAL BOARD WAS HELD ON OCTOBER 18, 1989. THE RESULTS OF THAT HIRING PROCESS WAS THE HIRING OF STEPHEN K. PRUZICK. STEPHEN COMES FROM RUMSON, NEW JERSEY. HE IS A GRADUATE OF THE NEW HAMPTON SCHOOL. HE IS SCHEDULED TO ATTEND THE POLICE ACADEMY IN APRIL OF 1990.

ON NOVEMBER 18, 1989 SPECIAL SGT. JAMES PIPER WAS VERY SERIOUSLY BURNED IN A GARAGE FIRE AT HIS RESIDENCE. HE HAS RETURNED HOME. HE SPENT TWO MONTHS IN BOSTON AT THE BRIGHAM & WOMEN'S HOSPITAL IN THE BURN UNIT. WE HAVE ALL MISSED JIM AND ARE VERY ANXIOUSLY AWAITING HIS RETURN TO DUTY. I SPOKE TO JIM JUST BEFORE HIS FIRST CHECK-UP AND HE HOPES TO BE BACK FOR THIS YEAR'S MOTORCYCLE WEEKEND. I CERTAINLY HOPE HE WILL BE HERE, IF NOT, THERE IS ALWAYS A PLACE FOR HIM WHENEVER HE IS READY TO COME BACK TO DUTY.

THE 1988 PLYMOUTH IS RUNNING WELL AND HAS 33,000 MILES ON IT AS OF JANUARY 1990. THE FORD CROWN VICTORIA HAS 45,500 ON IT AS OF JANUARY 1990 AND IS ALSO RUNNING WELL.

TO BE ABLE TO DO THIS, THE TOWN WILL NEED 6 FULL-TIME PEOPLE. THE ARTICLE READS: TO HIRE A PERSON AS OF JULY 1, 1990. I FEEL THAT THIS SHOULD BE DONE THIS YEAR SINCE THERE IS TALK OF A SHOPPING CENTER AND MOTEL/HOTEL BEING PROPOSED NEAR I-93. IF THIS HAPPENS WE WILL NEED THE 5TH PERSON. EVEN IF IT DOES NOT HAPPEN THIS YEAR, IT WILL BE A MATTER OF TIME.

THERE ARE STILL A COUPLE OF EMPTY SECTIONS AT THE EXIT 23 PLAZA WHICH MAY BECOME OCCUPIED AND THE TWO APARTMENT BUILDINGS OFF SINCLAIR HILL ROAD SHOULD BE OCCUPIED SOON. THERE HAS BEEN TALK OF SOME TYPE OF DEVELOPMENT ON THE GOLF COURSE ON RTE 132 S, ALSO A NEW BUILDING HAS BEEN ADDED TO THE FISH HATCHERY ACROSS FROM THE NEW HAMPTON COMMUNITY SCHOOL. NEW HAMPTON FIRE DEPARTMENT

1989 REPORT

1989 WAS A BUSY YEAR WITH A SUBSTANTIAL INCREASE IN THE NUMBER OF CALLS UP FROM 151 TO 179. THE MAJOR INCREASE WAS IN THE MEDICAL/ACCIDENT CATEGORY FROM 68 TO 107. WE EXPERIENCED ONLY ONE MAJOR FIRE IN TOWN WITH 9 MINOR FIRES, 6 CHIMNEY FIRES, 8 CAR FIRES, 22 MUTUAL AID RUNS, 19 BRUSH OR FORESTRY CALLS AND 7 SERVICE OF INVESTIGATION.

AS MOST EVERYONE HAS NOTICED THE NEW TRUCK ARRIVED AND WAS IMMEDIATELY PUT INTO SERVICE. IT HAS PERFORMED AS WE EXPECTED AND IS NOW OUR INITIAL ATTACK TRUCK. THE 1974 INTERNATIONAL 17M2 IS THE NEXT FIRE FIGHTING UNIT TO BE REPLACED, WHICH IS SCHEDULED FOR 1994.

ONE OF OUR GOALS FOR THIS YEAR WAS TO START THE ADDITION TO THE STATION, BUT BECAUSE OF TIME CONSTRAINTS AND THE INABILITY TO FIND THE BOUNDS, WHICH NECESSITATED A SURVEY OF THE PROPERTY, WE POSTPONED WORK UNTIL THE COMING YEAR.

THE DEPARTMENT WILL BE PROPOSING TO THE TOWN THAT WE PURCHASE A USED AMBULANCE TO REPLACE OUR CURRENT VAN. THIS WILL NOT BE A TRANSPORTER, BUT A HEAVIER DUTY RESCUE UNIT. WE FEEL THAT WE MUST INCREASE OUR CAPABILITY IF WE ARE TO CONTINUE TO OFFER THE CITIZENS EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICE.

WE THANK THE COMMUNITY FOR THEIR CONTINUED SUPPORT AND ASK EACH OF YOU TO TAKE A MINUTE TO CHECK THE BATTERIES IN YOUR SMOKE DETECTORS AND INSTALL A DETECTOR IF YOU DON'T HAVE ONE. THE LIFE YOU SAVE COULD BE YOURS.

AND STATE FOREST RANGER

DURING CALENDAR YEAR 1989, THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE EXPERIENCED AN AVERAGE NUMBER OF WILDFIRES. THE THREE LEADING CAUSES OF THESE WILDFIRES WERE FIRES KINDLED WITHOUT WRITTEN PERMISSION OF A FOREST FIRE WARDEN, CHILDREN AND DEBRIS BURNING FIRES THAT ESCAPED CONTROL. ALL OF THESE CAUSES ARE PREVENTABLE, BUT ONLY WITH YOUR HELP.

PLEASE HELP OUR TOWN AND STATE FOREST FIRE OFFICIALS WITH FOREST FIRE PREVENTION. BY HEW HAMPSHIRE STATE LAW (RSA 224:27). NO PERSON, FIRM OR CORPORATION SHALL KINDLE OR CAUSE TO BE KINDLED ANY FIRE, EXCEPT WHEN THE GROUND IS COVERED WITH SNOW, WITHOUT FIRST OBTAINING A WRITTEN PERMIT FROM THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN OF THE TOWN WHERE THE BURNING IS TO BE DONE.

IN ORDER TO ELIMINATE FALSE ALARMS, IT IS ADVISABLE TO NOTIFY YOUR LOCAL FIRE DEPARTMENT WHENEVER YOU INTEND TO DO ANY OUTDOOR BURNING.

VIOLATIONS OF RSA 224:27 ARE A MISDEMEANOR AND YOU ARE ALSO LIABLE FOR PAYING ALL FIRE SUPPRESSION COSTS (RSA 224:28 AND RSA 224:36)

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE, DIVISION OF FOREST AND LANDS, ASSISTED MANY TOWNS IN WILDLAND FIRE SUPPRESSION DURING 1989 INCLUDING SEVERAL LARGE FIRES IN THE CONCORD AND CHESTERFIELD AREAS, AS WELL AS THE 100 ACRE FIRE ON MT. BELKNAP IN GILFORD, NEW HAMPSHIRE.

Newfound Ambulance Rescue

1989 REPORT

NEWFOUND AMBULANCE RESCUE EXPERIENCED ANOTHER BUSY YEAR IN 1989 WITH A SLIGHT DROP IN CALL ACTIVITY IN PROVIDING SERVICE TO NEW HAMPTON AND THE SURROUNDING NEWFOUND AREA, INCLUDING THE TOWNS OF ALEXANDRIA, BRIDGEWATER, BRISTOL, DANBURY AND HEBRON.

THERE WERE A TOTAL OF 443 CALLS DURING 1989, A DECREASE OF 13 FROM THE PREVIOUS YEAR. THIS WAS THE SECOND YEAR IN SUCCESSION WITH MORE THAN 400 CALLS IN A YEAR. FOR COMPARISON, IN 1984 THERE WERE 316 CALLS. FOR THE TOWN OF NEW HAMPTON THERE WERE 102 CALLS, UP FROM 72 THE YEAR BEFORE. A BREAKDOWN OF THE NUMBER OF CALLS PER TOWN IS SHOWN BELOW.

AS WAS PLANNED, DURING THE PAST YEAR WE REPLACED THE 1981 MODEL AMBULANCE THAT HAD SERVED WELL OVER 8 PLUS YEARS, WITH A NEW 1989 AMBULANCE OF SIMILAR DESIGN. THIS NEW UNIT HAS A DIESEL ENGINE IN LINE WITH AN INDUSTRY-WIDE SWITCH FROM GASOLINE TO DIESEL FUEL FOR AMBULANCES. THE FUNDS NEEDED TO PURCHASE THE NEW \$40,000.00 PLUS UNIT CAME FROM MONIES EARNED BY THE SERVICE AND WE ARE PLEASED TO SAY REQUIRED NO EXTRA APPROPRIATIONS FROM ANY OF THE TOWNS.

EQUIPMENT FOR THE NEW UNIT WAS FOR THE MOST PART TRANSFERRED FROM THE 1981 UNIT THAT WAS TRADED IN. DURING 1990 WE PLAN TO ADD ANOTHER DEFIBILLATOR/MONITOR SO BOTH AMBULANCES WILL BE SO EQUIPPED.

THE YEAR PAST AS WELL AS THE YEAR AHEAD ARE SOMEWHAT OF A TRANSITIONAL PERIOD AS THE SERVICE MAKES A CHANGE FROM A MULTI-JURISDICTIONAL MUNICIPAL SERVICE TO A MUNICIPAL SERVICE OPERATED BY THE TOWN OF BRISTOL AND SERVING THE SAME AREA TOWNS. THIS CHANGE WAS APPROVED AT LAST YEAR'S TOWN MEETINGS AS A STEP TO CONTINUE THE MINIMAL COST TO THE TOWNS, ESPECIALLY IN THE AREAS OF DISPATCH, INSURANCE AND FUTURE STAFFING.

THE 2.5 MILES WE REBUILT ON OLD BRISTOL AND BLAKE HILL ROADS IN 1988 RECEIVED AN ADDITIONAL ONE INCH OF TOP MIX. THESE SMOOTH ROADS ARE MUCH EASIER TO KEEP CLEAR DURING WINTER WEATHER, REQUIRING MUCH LESS PLOWING, SALTING AND SANDING. ALSO THINK ABOUT HOW MUCH EASIER IT IS ON OUR AUTOS!

AGAIN THIS YEAR, I AM ASKING FOR THE SAME SUPPORT, SO AS TO REBUILD ANOTHER SECTION OF ROAD ON THE OTHER SIDE OF DANA HILL. AN ADDITIONAL ONE INCH OF TOP MIX WILL BE ADDED TO THE ROADS RESURFACED IN 1989. IMPROVING OUR ROADS IS AN INVESTMENT WE ALL BENEFIT FROM.

WE RECEIVED OUR NEW INTERNATIONAL DUMP TRUCK IN MAY OF LAST YEAR. IT CERTAINLY HAS BEEN OF GREAT HELP TO US THIS WINTER. THIS YEAR WE ARE ASKING FOR A NEW ONE TON TRUCK TO REPLACE THE 1985. THIS IS ACCORDING TO OUR EQUIPMENT REPLACEMENT SCHEDULE OF SEVERAL YEARS BACK. I WISH TO KEEP THE 1985 AS A SPARE TRUCK. DURING THE WINTER MONTHS IT IS IMPORTANT TO KEEP GOING DURING STORMS WITHOUT TAKING TIME FOR REPAIRS. IF A TRUCK IS BROKEN DOWN THEN IT LEAVES ONE MAN WITHOUT A PLOW.

A WELCOME ADDITION TO OUR CREW LAST SPRING WAS WILLIAM CHASE. HE WORKS HALF THE TIME FOR THE HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT AND THE OTHER HALF AT THE LANDFILL. BILL IS A GOOD FIX-IT MAN AND HAS MADE A REAL CONTRIBUTION TO OUR DEPARTMENT.

I ALSO WISH TO THANK SAM, STAN AND DOUG FOR THEIR SINCERE CONCERN AND EFFORT GIVEN TO THIS DEPARTMENT.

I WISH TO THANK THE POLICE DEPARTMENT AND THE SELECTMEN FOR THEIR SUPPORT.

MANY OF YOU HAVE BEEN VERY CRITICAL OF OUR SERVICE DURING THE ICE STORMS. THERE IS REALLY NOTHING WE CAN DO DURING AN ICE STORM EXCEPT TRY TO KEEP THE MAIN ROUTES OPEN. TEN MINUTES AFTER WE SAND IT IS ALL ICE AGAIN. AT LEAST IF THE MAIN ROUTES ARE PASSABLE WE CAN ASSIST AN EMERGENCY VEHICLE WHEN NEEDED. WE ARE JUST RISKING OUR LIVES ALONG WITH TOWN EQUIPMENT TRYING TO SERVICE EVERYONE AND IT REALLY WOULD NOT HELP UNLESS YOU FOLLOWED BEHIND THE SAND TRUCK. WHEN PEOPLE HAVE CALLED, WE HAVE TRIED TO SET UP A TIME WHERE THE PERSON COULD FOLLOW THE SAND TRUCK. WE WILL TRY TO HELP YOU IF YOU WILL LET US KNOW AND TRY TO SET UP A TIME WHERE THE PERSON COULD FOLLOW THE SAND TRUCK. WE WILL TRY TO HELP YOU IF YOU WILL LET US KNOW AND TRY TO BE A LITTLE UNDERSTANDING. WE CAN NOT HELP YOU IF YOU DON'T LET US KNOW!

ALSO, MANY OF YOU HAVE EXPRESSED APPRECIATION TO THIS DEPARTMENT OR TO INDIVIDUAL EMPLOYEES. THIS HELPS US TO FEEL THE 78 HOUR WEEK WAS WORTH IT. BUT WHEN YOU CALL THE SELECTMEN AND ASK IF NEW HAMPTON STILL HAS A HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT, AFTER WE HAVE GIVEN IT OUR MOST, WE ALL FEEL LIKE THROWING IN THE TOWEL. WE ARE YOUR EMPLOYEES! TRY TO WORK WITH US INSTEAD OF AGAINST US! YOU MIGHT FIND WE ARE NOT SO BAD AFTER ALL!

SOLID WASTE COMMITTEE

1989 REPORT

THE NEW HAMPTON SOLID WASTE COMMITTEE HAS COMPLETED ITS FIRST YEAR. BEGINNING WITH THE FIRST MEETING OF THE RECYCLING COMMITTEE IN FEBRUARY, MEMBERS BEGAN GATHERING INFORMATION AND HEARING PRESENTATIONS FROM COMPANIES AND INDIVIDUALS INVOLVED IN RECYCLING.

A FIVE MEMBER SOLID WASTE COMMITTEE, APPOINTED BY THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN, BEGAN MEETING DURING THE SUMMER WITH THE RECYCLING COMMITTEE BECOMING A SUB-COMMITTEE. THE SCOPE OF MEETINGS WAS EXPANDED TO INCLUDE SUCH ISSUES AS TRANSFER STATIONS, LANDFILLS, INCINERATION, HAULING OF WASTES AND THE TOWN MEMBERSHIP IN THE PEMI-BAKER SOLID WASTE DISTRICT. DURING THESE DISCUSSIONS IT BECAME APPARENT TO THE MEMBERS THAT THE TOWN MIGHT BE CAPABLE OF DEALING WITH SOLID WASTE ON ITS OWN. IN ADDITION, LEGISLATION WAS PASSED DURING THE YEAR ALLOWING SINGLE-TOWN SOLID WASTE DISTRICTS. AT THE SPECIAL TOWN MEETING IN OCTOBER, THE TOWN AGREED TO BEGIN THE PROCESS OF WITHDRAWAL FROM PEMI-BAKER FOR THAT PURPOSE.

ONCE THE WITHDRAWAL PROCESS WAS STARTED IT WAS NECESSARY TO DEVELOP A SOLID WASTE PLAN, TO BE SENT TO THE NH DEPARTMENT OF ENVIRONMENTAL SERVICES BY JANUARY 1. MANY HOURS WERE REQUIRED TO GATHER INFORMATION, EVALUATE AND DEVELOP THE PLAN BUT IT WAS COMPLETED ON TIME.

MANY THANKS TO ALL COMMITTEE MEMBERS FOR THEIR OUTSTANDING EFFORTS THIS YEAR.

REVIEWS OF INDIVIDUAL PROPERTY SUBDIVISIONS

THE NEW HAMPTON PLANNING BOARD HAS CONDUCTED A REVIEW PROCESS FOR 13 SUBDIVISIONS INVOLVING 235 ACRES FOR A TOTAL ADDITION OF 57 LOTS. FEES COLLECTED FOR 1989 TOTALED \$2,648.00. THERE ARE IN EXCESS OF 175 VACANT LOTS ON THE MARKET IN NEW HAMPTON, NH CURRENTLY.

PLANNING POLICY CONCERNS

State Representative's Report

TAXES, ENVIRONMENTAL ISSUES, AND FUNDING FOR EDUCATION ARE AMONG THE KEY ISSUES THAT THE NEW HAMPSHIRE LEGISLATURE IS TACKLING DURING THE 1990 SESSION.

MORE THAN 600 BILLS WILL BE CONSIDERED BY LAWMAKERS DURING THE 1990 SESSION, WHICH WILL ADJOURN IN LATE APRIL. THE MOST CONTROVERSIAL PROPOSALS INVOLVE TAXES. AT LEAST FOUR PROPOSALS FOR BROAD-BASED TAXES, INCLUDING ONE THAT CALLS FOR A TWO PERCENT GENERAL SALES TAX WITH FUNDS DEDICATED TO EDUCATION AND ANOTHER PROPOSING A LIMITED INCOME TAX, WILL BE CONSIDERED. SO WILL LEGISLATION TO INCREASE FROM FOUR PERCENT TO TEN PERCENT THE COUNTY 'S SHARE OF THE STATE'S REAL ESTATE TRANSFER TAX. MANY OF THESE BILLS ARE DESIGNED TO RELIEVE INCREASINGLY BURDENSOME PROPERTY TAXES AND TO BOLSTER STATE AID TO TOWNS AND SCHOOL DISTRICTS.

WITH THE STATE FACING A POTENTIAL BUDGET SHORTFALL OF \$70 MILLION, THE GREGG ADMINISTRATION IS PROPOSING ANOTHER SHARP HIKE IN FEES FOR A VARIETY OF STATE SERVICES. OF NOTE TO NEW HAMPTON RESIDENTS IS THE GOVERNOR'S "DOCK TAX" PROPOSAL, THAT WOULD REQUIRE EVERY DOCK, FLOAT AND RAFT TO BE REGISTERED WITH THE STATE AT AN ANNUAL FEE OF \$25 (PASSAGE IS PENDING). THE GOVERNOR ALSO IS PROPOSING TO END ALL OF THE STATE'S FOUNDATION AID FUNDING TO SCHOOL DISTRICTS, LEAVING ONLY LOTTERY MONEY AND LIMITED BUILDING AID AS THE STATE'S CONTRIBUTION TO FUND OUR SCHOOLS. THESE PROPOSALS ARE BEING HOTLY DEBATED, AS THEY WILL LIKELY INCREASE PROPERTY TAXES SUBSTANTIALLY. ONE POSITIVE NOTE: A BILL REIMBURSING NEW HAMPTON FOR FLOOD CONTROL REIMBURSEMENT FUNDS CURRENTLY IS PROGRESSING THROUGH THE HOUSE.

ON THE ENVIRONMENTAL FRONT, A BILL THAT ALLOWS THE LOON MTN. CORP AND THE TOWN OF LINCOLN TO WITHDRAW MILLIONS OF GALLONS OF WATER FROM THE PEMIGEWASSET RIVER HAS BEEN INTRODUCED. ANOTHER BILL, THE NEW HAMPSHIRE RIVERS PROTECTION ACT, WHICH I HAVE SPONSORED, PROPOSES TO PROTECT THE STATE'S KEY SCENIC RIVERS FROM ADDITIONAL DEVELOPMENT (INCLUDING THE PEMI). A BILL THAT WOULD CALL FOR GREATER SEPTIC AND BUILDING SETBACKS ALONG THE STATE'S RIVERS AND LAKES ALSO WAS PROPOSED, WHICH THE LEGISLATURE VOTED FOR FURTHER STUDY. LOOSER RESTRICTIONS ON JET SKIS, IMPACT FEES FOR DEVELOPERS, LIMITS ON CONSTRUCTION NEAR LAKE AND RIVER FRONT PROPERTIES, AND A TAX ON DISPOSABLE DIAPERS ALSO ARE ON THE AGENDA.

SOCIAL CONCERNS ALSO FACE THE LEGISLATURE. DRUG DEALERS WOULD BE LEVIED ADDITIONAL PENALTIES IF THEY ARE CAUGHT PEDDLING WITHIN 1,000 FEET OF SCHOOLS UNDER ONE BILL, AND PENALTIES FOR DWI ALSO WOULD INCREASE UNDER ANOTHER. THE MOST ATTENTION ON SOCIAL ISSUES HAS BEEN GIVEN TO THE

GOVERNOR'S REQUESTS TO SLASH STATE AID TO SOCIAL SERVICE AGENCIES AND PROGRAMS, INCLUDING THE MENTALLY ILL AT THE LACONIA STATE SCHOOL.

COUNTY SPENDING PROPOSALS ALSO ARE ON THE RISE, WITH THE COMMISSIONERS PROPOSING A 19 PERCENT INCREASE IN SPENDING. THE BULK OF THE INCREASE IS IN HEALTH INSURANCE COSTS FOR COUNTY EMPLOYEES, WHICH ARE EXPECTED TO SOAR BY 36 PERCENT. THE COUNTY DELEGATION, ON WHICH NEW HAMPTON'S TWO STATE REPRESENTATIVES SERVE, CURRENTLY IS WORKING TO MINIMIZE THE INCREASE.

NEW HAMPTON RESIDENTS ARE URGED TO CONTACT ME (TAYLOR ROAD, RFD 1, BOX 1898, LACONIA 03246, 286-3449) TO SHARE THEIR VIEWS ON ANY ISSUE BEFORE THE LEGISLATURE OR TO REMEDY ANY PROBLEMS WITH STATE AGENCIES. I APPRECIATE THE OPPORTUNITY TO REPRESENT OUR TOWN IN CONCORD, AND WELCOME YOUR INVOLVEMENT IN THE LEGISLATIVE PROCESS.
