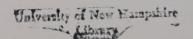

Are you in favor of the adoption of the following Amendments to the existing Town Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board?

Section 5.00 — Use Regulations — Add to "Accessory Uses" the following: —

#13. Construction of driveways - Provided that construction of said driveway be not closer than 5 feet from any abutting property line and that a driveway permit be obtained from Town Road Agent. R-1 "P", R-2 "P", B-1 "P" and C-1 "P".

Amendment No. 2:

Section 2.00 — Definitions — Delete the definition of "Flood line" and substitute therefore the following: —

Flood Plain Areas — The areas of special flood hazard subject to a one percent or greater chance of flooding in any given year. These areas are designated as zones A 6 - 10 on the Flood Insurance Rate Map for the Town of Pembroke prepared by the U.S. Department of Housing & Urban Development, effective April 2, 1979, or as later amended.

Section 5.05 — Flood Plain Areas — Amend this Section by deleting "users and occupants of such building" in line 5 and substitute the following: —

"general public by causing any increase in flood levels during the 100 year flood", and by deleting "a map" in line 6 and substituting "the Flood Insurance Rate Map for the Town of Pembroke".

Robert Plourde moved and Donald Drouin seconded to dismiss Article #2.

After lengthy discussion of the Article by residents present:

Deborah Boudreau moved the question, seconded by Henry Lewis.

In voice vote, the motion to dismiss was overwhelmingly carried by those present and voting.

The motion was made and seconded that the meeting be adjourned. Meeting adjourned at 9:11 PM.

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF PEMBROKE, IN THE COUNTY OF MERRIMACK, IN SAID STATE, QUALIFIED TO VOTE IN TOWN AFFAIRS:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Elementary School Auditorium in said Pembroke, on Tuesday the 11th day of March next, at 7 o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town officers for the year ensuing.
- Are you in favor of the adoption of the following amendment to the existing Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Pembroke Planning Board:

"In Section 5:04 of the Zoning Ordinance entitled Table of Use Regulations, under the Retail and Service heading item #2 change the non-permitted use ("N") to special exception ("S") in the C-1 Zone."

Are you in favor of the adoption of the following amendment to the existing Zoning Ordinance as proposed by petition of the voters for this town:

"In Section 5:04 of the Zoning Ordinance, entitled Table of Use Regulations, change the section under Residential Uses, Multifamily dwellings from a special exception ("S") to a non-permitted use ("N") in the R-1 Zone."

(This Article is disapproved by the Pembroke Planning Board.)

- 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to sell any real estate which the Town may have acquired by deed as a result of non-payment of taxes, and to authorize the Selectmen to give a deed, in the name of the Town, to the purchaser of such land.

6. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of making improvements to land now owned, or hereafter acquired, by the Town for Cemetery purposes to provide additional burial spaces as the need arises: and to transfer to said fund the monies held in the Town's Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of land.

(This Article is approved by the Budget Committee.)

7. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Trust Fund for Perpetual Care of Cemetery Lots, to be held by the Trustees of Trust Funds and administered in the same manner as the other cemetery care Trust Funds; to transfer to said fund the funds presently held by the Cemetery Commission from the sale of lots with perpetual care; and hereafter to have the proceeds of perpetual care lots deposited in this fund as each new lot is sold.

(This Article is approved by the Budget Committee.)

8. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State or Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as setoffs against budgeted appropriation for the following specific purposes and in amounts indicated herewith or take any other action hereon:

Street Lighting	\$13,000
Fire Hydrants	12,000
Concord Dump Fee	12,000
Fire Truck	15,000
	\$52,000

(This Article is approved by the Budget Committee.)

9. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to withdraw the sum of Forty Thousand Dollars (\$40,000.00) from the Town's Capital Reserve Fund for a new fire truck, which was created for this purpose by the 1979 Town Meeting; and further to withdraw the sum of Seventeen Thousand Dollars (\$17,000.00) from the

Town's Capital Reserve Fund for equipment for the purchase of the same fire truck, making a total withdrawal from Capital Reserve Funds of Fifty-seven Thousand Dollars (\$57,000.00) for this purpose.

(This Article is approved by the Budget Committee.)

10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Water Commissioners to construct a new well, with all necessary appurtenances, at its Bear Brook well site and to connect said well to the Bear Brook Pumping Station; to appropriate the sum of One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000.00) for this purpose; and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow said sum of money on the credit of the Town, by the issue of Bonds or Serial Notes as provided by RSA 33 and to determine the time and place of payment, the rate of interest thereon, and to provide for the sale thereof.

(This Article is approved by the Budget Committee.)

11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to negotiate a lease with the Pembroke School District for a period of ninety-nine (99) years for use as a Town library; and to appropriate the sum of One Dollar (1.00) for the purpose of payment to the School District for the period of the lease.

(This Article is approved by the Budget Committee.)

12. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) for the purpose of making renovations, necessary repairs, and furnishing the building leased from the Pembroke School District to provide new library facilities; and to raise said sum of money by withdrawing the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) from the Town's Capital Reserve Fund for a library.

(This Article is approved by the Budget Committee.)

13. To see if the Town will vote to use the unexpended balance of the Sewer Construction Fund to pay the principal of the 1971 sewer bonds as they mature. Annual payments from the unexpended balance of said fund shall be limited to the principal payment of the 1971 sewer bonds less the annual principal payment received from the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission.

(This Article is approved by the Budget Committee.)

- 14. To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to grant permission to the N.H. Housing Commission to operate within the Town, as provided in RSA 204-A:9 for the purpose of funding and operating an elderly housing project at the Webster Mill, so-called, located at 101 Main Street.
- 15. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to amend the list of roads discontinued as open highways and made subject to gates and bars as contained in Article Nine of the 1953 Town Warrant, as follows:

Hardy Road, so-called, from its terminus at Eight Range Road to a point westerly of Eight Range Road, approximately 700 feet. (Meaning to reopen said road to a point 200 feet from the lot lines of lots 937-10 and 937-11 as shown on the Tax Map of the Town.) Further, to authorize the Board of Selectmen to remove the gates and bars only after the petitioner has graveled and improved the roadway to the satisfaction of the Road Agent and the Board of Selectmen.

16. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) for the Green Meadows Child Care-Kindergarten located in Hooksett.

- 17. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations fo the same.

Selectmen's Report

Town of Pembroke

New Hampshire

To The Citizens of the Town of Pembroke:

The Board of Selectmen wishes to apprise the community of the Town's position at the end of 1979, and its outlook in the future.

The Town fared no better than its Citizens with the ever spiralling cost of goods and services. We have endeavored to save or go without wherever possible. We are indeed fortunate that we still have community spirit whereby groups 'volunteer' to provide items and services so that we don't have to increase costs to the taxpayer through purchases or salaries. Each and every department of the Town has contributed to saving in this matter.

But, of more importance, in our estimation, is what will the future bring to Pembroke?

Pembroke is indeed at a critical junction. The Town over the past decade has seen its school system enlarged, new town buildings constructed, new positions created, increased municipal services, a new sewer plant built in conjunction with our neighboring community.

We have seen the Town enact zoning, the elimination of the former Pembroke Street Village District, the adoption of complete state approved regulatory powers to the Planning Board.

We have also seen ever increasing legal considerations as the Town attempts to 'steer' its way through a narrow channel between what we used to have - few controls - to what we are attempting to formulate - clear cut controls - so that this Town may grow the way its Citizenry wants it. But, we must remain fully aware of our responsibilities if we are to control our destiny. We must remain aware of what is legal and what is not. Those of us, whether elected or appointed, that serve the Town is guiding it must be always fully aware of what the community desires on the one hand, and how to accomplish it on the other.

We also see what many other communities are experiencing - a

willingness to agree or disagree, but with the exception of a few, an unwillingness to participate in a completely unbiased manner. To partake in local government today demands that one look at all sides, examine all issues, be aware of all legalities, and then create or start to create the means to accomplish what we all want.

To serve the community is sometimes very frustrating. It certainly takes time. It sometimes pays a token salary. Usually it's without pay. But those of us who did and are serving the community can certainly say we have served. We urge all to make themselves available to the community for its common good as this Town continues to grow and its necessary demands increase.

Pembroke is confronted with tremendous growth pains. The Town has before it proposals for the creation of over 400 housing lots. Why? We are located between Concord and Manchester. We have a complete school system without having to send our school children outside Town. We have a municipal water system. We've built a sewerage treatment plant. We have a full-time police department centrally dispatched. We have a fire department that is part of an insurance industry recognized mutual aid compact system. We have a complete public works department furnishing rubbish pickup for all as well as maintenance of our roads and storm sewer system. We have an active volunteer ambulance service with fully trained personnel. We have a mixture of rural to suburban environment. We have everything that draws people.

The next decade will shape Pembroke forever. With your support and, more importantly, your participation, this community can become what we all want it to be - HOME.

Summary Of Findings And Recommendations

Board of Selectmen Town Office Pembroke, New Hampshire 03275

Members of the Board:

Submitted herewith is the report on examination of the financial statements of the Town of Pembroke for the year ended December 31, 1978, which was made by this Division. Financial statements for funds were included, except for the Water Department, whose statements were examined by Livingston & Haynes, P. C., a firm of Certified Public Accountants. The accounts of the Pembroke Sewer Fund were audited by Smith, Batchelder and Rugg, a firm of Certified Public Accountants pursuant to a Town vote in conjunction with our examination.

Financial Statements

Analysis of Change in Fund Balance (Exhibit A-2)

On a budgetary basis the change in Fund Balance is summarized as follows:

General Comments

Unexpended Balance of Bond Proceeds

As indicated in Exhibit B-1, the unexpended balance of the Sewer Construction Fund at December 31, 1978 amounted to \$1,215,083.

In conformity with state statutes, the Town of Pembroke, by vote of two-thirds of voters present and voting at an annual meeting may authorize the expenditure of this balance for any purpose or purposes for which serial notes or bonds may be issued. In the absence of such vote, the balance shall be used to pay the principal of the 1971 sewer bonds as they mature. However, annual payments from this fund to reduce long-term principal is limited to the principal of the 1971 sewer bonds less the annual principal payments received from the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission as follows:

Utilizing the foregoing amounts of transfers, the unexpended balance of \$1,215,083 would be extinguished in approximately nineteen years.

Interest income generated from the reinvestment of bond proceeds from 1971 to December 31, 1978 amounted to \$979,158; all of which was transfered to the general fund. The whole of any subsequent interest income must be transfered to the general fund annually. The absence of said procedure will, in effect, create a sinking fund for the retirement of the sewer bond issue, which is specifically prohibited by State statutes.

Currently, the Town has these funds invested in 51/4% savings accounts. We believe that the Town should consider the investment of these funds in other permissable investments which yield higher interest rates.

Anti Recession Funds

The appropriation for these funds in 1978 was disallowed by the Department of Revenue Administration because of lack of a specified amount. However, the Town expended the balance of this fund during the year.

Inventory of Fixed Assets

The Town of Pembroke has not maintained an adequate record of its fixed assets. The value of fixed assets for all municipalities is substantial and usually far greater in value than the current assets; hence, adequate accounting procedures and records for fixed assets are essential to the protective custody of governmental property.

A good system of fixed assets accounting facilitates overall control and custody of a governmental unit's property, permits the assignment of direct responsibility for custody and proper use of specific assets to individual public officials and provides data essential to the proper management of fixed assets. Since the responsibilities of stewardship involved in safeguarding such a large public investment is of the utmost importance to sound financial administration, the town officials should begin establishing fixed asset records, cost or consideration given is the generally accepted method for valuing fixed assets, and should be recorded on all new acquisitions. Where adequate documentation is unavailable for existing fixed assets, an estimate of original cost is an acceptable standard under accounting principals for governmental entities.

Adequate documentation is available for the institution of fixed asset records for the Sewer Department, since construction for said facilities is almost completed.

Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 71-A, Section 21 require that this summary of findings and recommendations shall be published in its entirety in the next annual report of the Town of Pembroke. Publication of the exhibits contained in this audit report is optional at the discretion of the Board of Selectmen.

We extend our thanks to the officials and employees of the Town of Pembroke for their assistance during the course of the audit.

To the Selectmen and Citizens of Pembroke:

Your Fire Department responded to 203 alarms in 1979. I am happy to report that these resulted in minimum fire losses.

Weekly training and monthly drills with our neighboring departments in the Capital Area Mutual Compact assures that coordination necessary for large fires.

The department expects delivery in the Spring of the pumping engine you, the citizens, authorized at last year's Town Meeting. This engine, with greater capacity in pumping, becomes vital as the town grows and expands into what has been our undeveloped areas.

Lt. Norman Martin of this department was selected by the New Hampshire Forest Fire Service to accompany a state crew to the major forest fires in California.

This department's Fire Prevention and Investigation Office, under the direction of Lt. Bruce Kimball, has greatly expanded its inspection efforts. It is in the area of prevention and public information that the large annual fire losses can be reduced. As the energy crisis worsens, more people will return to wood and coal for heat. Whole new generations will have to learn how to utilize these fuels which are more demanding than our present ones. Your fire department is ready any time to answer questions, inspect installations, or provide recommendations as to protection from fire.

As we commence another year, your department, as always, stands ready to protect and guard you and your loved ones — your property and treasures.

For many years we had been dispatched by the Concord Answering Service, a private concern in Concord, which answered our phone calls and offered one-way communication via pagers. They did an excellent job and showed great patience and understanding in every respect.

As Pembroke grew, it had become more apparent that two-way communication was needed.

Hooksett and Allenstown police were being dispatched by the Hooksett Dispatch Center and since we work closely and often with these towns, it seemed logical for us to join this service.

We are now being dispatched by police procedure-oriented personnel at Hooksett and are thus able to give better service to the residents of Pembroke and better protection for our police officers.

We wish to thank our Pembroke selectmen and the selectmen of Hooksett for their work in making this possible.

Perry L. Eaton Chief of Police The Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission has been in existence since 1970 and during this period has continued its involvement in studies of both a regional as well as a local nature. The Commission acts as an advisory body to its member municipalities and as such is often invited to participate in local planning projects. As a part of the ongoing technical assistance provided, the Commission has been pleased to be able to assist the Planning Board in the following areas: review of changes in state laws, master plan development, development of subdivision regulations, research into state laws and model ordinance research.

The Commission, this past year, hosted seminars on capital improvements programming and the fall legal seminar series. Again the Commission was pleased to see representatives from Pembroke present.

The Commission hopes to be able to continue to serve the needs of its member municipalities in the future and appreciates the past support of its activities by the Town of Pembroke.

Pembroke Planning Board

To the Selectmen and Citizens of Pembroke

New and different responsibilities have been undertaken by the Pembroke Planning Board during the past year. Town meeting action of March 1979 voted planning enabling legislation RSA Chapter 36:19 - 36:34. The board was required to formulate and adopt a new Subdivision Regulation for the Town. A close working cooperation with Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission and the use of a model subdivision regulation allowed members to understand the reasons for and the applications of sections of the regulations. On August 27, 1979, following two Public Hearings, the Subdivision Regulations for the Town were adopted by the Planning Board. On August 28, 1979 13 applications for Survey Phase of Subdivision of land were filed with the Planning Board. At the close of 1979 19 applications had been filed, of which 11 subdivision Plat Plans consisting of 36 lots on existing town streets were approved by the Planning Board.

Approval of Plat Plans requires board members to be knowledgable of existing state and local laws and regulations pertaining to the subdivision of land, the board must also forsee future objectives and needs of the Town both in the public and the private sector. A purpose of the Planning Board is to guide each subdivider into planning so that needs can be met. Voter comments and statements at public hearings on each subdivision has given board members an opportunity to hear and evaluate citizen concerns regarding the growth of Pembroke.

The Town Meeting of March 1979 further authorized funds to update the 1963 Master Plan for Pembroke. Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission was approved to do this update. Progress to date includes population growth, labor force and employment, household trends, land use trends, and school enrollment trends. A citizen survey was conducted in October, 1979 and our thanks go to the local Scout Troop 270 and the leadership of Eagle Scout Darin Pope for distributing and collecting the survey. 1609 were distributed and 369 were returned which is excellent for this type survey. Town agencies, departments, committees and officials will be asked to identify future goals for the town.

Citizen informational sessions will be held by this board so that all voters may be aware of the use and impact this updated Master Plan will have on the town's future. Specific warrant articles are contemplated for the 1981 Town Meeting to implement recommendations of the master plan.

We take this opportunity to express our sincere thanks to Emma Gamache for her devotion and service over the past years. Emma undertook those responsibilities which were not otherwise covered and saw that they were accomplished. Many thanks from all of us, Emma, for a responsibility well done.

Civil Defense Report

After being the Director of the Salisbury Civil Defense for several years, this past year has been one of learning the special problems that face Pembroke.

Since my appointment to this position in October, 1978, this office has been working on a program of public education about civil preparedness in our community. We've started a merit badge program for the Boy Scouts and have spoken to some of our local

civic groups.

Some of the meetings this office has attended this year include Emergency Communication with Merrimack County Civil Defense Directors, Governor's Council on Energy to set aside gas for emergency vehicles, meeting with Merrimack County Delegates for procedures on applying for federal disaster relief funds, and we will be working on a crisis relocation plan with the State of New Hampshire shortly. A twenty hour course at U.N.H. on Community Preparedness has also been completed.

During the Spring floods of 1979, we handled twelve calls for flooding information and we had direct contact with the State Headquarters during the three day period of concern to our

community.

I would like to publicly thank the Allenstown Civil Defense Director, Roger Letendre, for his late night tour of some of our mutual problem areas along the Suncook River.

This office is constantly looking for any ideas you may have to

improve our services to you as our population increases.

The Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association, Inc., continued to service Pembroke for the eleventh year. They have provided skilled nursing care for anyone sick in the home, especially those needing continuity of care after discharge from the hospital. They are available to give hypodermic injections, change surgical dressings, and do other treatments prescribed by the attending physician. When indicated, family members have been instructed to give care between the nurse's visits.

Special services; such as, physical therapy, speech therapy, occupational therapy, and nutritional guidance have been given the special staff and consultants in order to assist with the rehabilitation of an acute or chronic illness.

When family members are unable to supply all the needed care, a staff of homemaker - health aides are available to give physical care, do light housekeeping, and assist with meal planning and meal preparation.

The nurses are delighted to advise new and expectant mothers in the care of themselves and their babies. They are also glad to work with families and individuals on normal nutrition, sickness, and accident prevention.

Anyone in Pembroke may request these services - doctor, family, pastor, friend, or the patient himself. Patients are also referred by clinics and other agencies. All calls are answered, but continuing care can be provided only under a doctor's orders.

A call to the Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association, Inc., (224-4093) between the hours of 8 a.m. and 10:30 p.m., seven days a week is all that is necessary to start services or make inquiries. Fees may be scaled to those unable to pay the entire amount.

In our opinion, subject to the effects of any adjustments by EPA, the financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial position of the sewer construction fund of the Town of Pembroke as of September 30, 1978, and the results of its operations for the period from inception (March 10, 1970) to September 30, 1978 in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a consistent basis.

Town of Pembroke Sewer Construction Fund Notes To Financial Statements September 30, 1978

1. Significant accounting policies:

The Town's Sewer Commission was established in March 1970. In April 1971 the Town issued \$3,040,000 for 30 year serial bonds to finance the entire cost of constructing a municipal sewage disposal system. The state (40%) and federal (50%) governments were to reimburse the Town for 90% of the eligible costs. The two major projects were to have (1) sewer laterals built in the town and (2) a sewage treatment plant built on a site in Allenstown. The Town agreed in 1974 to share the cost (65%) of the treatment plant with Allenstown.

The project went out for bid in late 1974. Meanwhile, the project cost increased to over \$5 million and the state's share of the eligible cost decreased 20%. In 1975 the Town increased the appropriation from \$3,042,000 to \$5,322,000. The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) agreed to pay 75% of the eligible costs on a direct reimbursement basis. The New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission (NHWSPCC) agreed to pay 20% of the eligible costs in annual installments to the Town over the remaining life of the bond issue.

The laterals and treatment plant were constructed during 1975 and 1976. EPA did an interim audit in 1975. The project was completed and accepted in December 1976. The treatment plan began operating in January 1977.

All revenues and expenses connected with the projects are reflected in the accompanying financial statements on the accural basis of accounting.

2. Federal grants receivable:

The Town received two grants from the EPA to aid in financing the sewer laterals and the Town's share of the sewage treatment plant. The grants were for 75% of the eligible costs of construction. The grants receivable at September 30, 1978, subject to a final EPA audit, were:

In October 1978 the Town received \$104,314 of a \$116,634 payment due from Allenstown for the treatment plant. (See Note 4.)

3. Retainage payable:

This represents the Town's portion of the retainage due the contractor for the construction of the treatment plant. In December 1978 the Town paid the contractor \$22,750. The remaining \$26,373 is in dispute.

4. Contingencies:

The contractor who built the sewage treatment plant has entered a claim against Allenstown for approximately \$200,000. Approximately \$110,000 of the claim is for labor performed and materials furnished and not paid for. To the extent the claim for work not paid for is legitimate, the Town would be liable for not more that 65% of the amount.

Allenstown withheld \$12,320 of a \$116,634 EPA payment to the Town claiming it was due from the Town for 1977 plant expenses. Allenstown is holding the money in escrow until the dispute is resolved.

5. Residual equity transfer:

Since the bond issue in April 1971 there were several transfers back and forth between the sewer construction fund and the Town's general fund. The net result, effectively, was a transfer of \$1,264,062, for the purpose of making bond principal and interest payments, for the sewer construction fund to the Town's general fund as follows:

The bond and interest savings account is under the Town's selectmen's control and is not considered a sewer construction fund asset. The balance of this account at September 30, 1978 was \$269,144.

To the Special Sewer System Study

Committee of the Town of Pembroke

We have examined the financial statements of the Sewer Construction Fund of the Town of Pembroke for the period from inception (March 10, 1970) to September 30, 1978. Our report thereon is dated November 21, 1978. As part of our examination we reviewed accounting procedures and accounting and physical controls used to accurately and suitably record and summarize authorized financial transactions and to safeguard assets against defalcations or other similar irregularities.

The audit covered a period of over eight years, beginning with the establishment of the Sewer Commission in March 1970. The bonds were issued in 1971 operating in January 1977. During that period there were several changes in Town personnel such as sewer commissioners and selectmen.

General Business Practice

We observed several significant practices which we think warrant your attention. Since the project is non-recurring, the recommendations are intended as a guide of the Town undertakes another capital project. There is no merit in attempting to change the past. The recommendations are listed below and provided in detail in the appendix.

1. Maintain adequate accounting records

- 2. Maintain adequate source documents to support accounting records
- 3. Use a capital projects fund
- 4. Determine alternative sources of project financing before issuing bonds
- 5. Avoid possible conflicts of interest
- 6. Coordinate the management of fund assets

Contract Compliance

We observed that the two construction projects were put out for bid and that several bids were obtained for each. We were unable to locate four of the fifteen bids received for the laterals and five of the six bids received for the treatment plant. We did satisfy ourselves, however, through the engineer's, Morgenroth Associates, Inc. (Morgenroth), bid summary that Joseph A. Polito & Sons Co., Inc. (Polito) and S. G. Phillips Corporation (Phillips) submitted the lowest bids respectively. Both Polito and Phillips, as successful bidders, furnished 100% performance and labor and material payment bonds.

We audited the requests for payment submitted by Polito and Phillips. We observed that Morgenroth approved each payment and all significant change orders. We determined that the Town paid its 65% share of the Phillips contract for the treatment plant and that the allocation was determined and approved by Morgenroth.

Outstanding Grants Receivable

The EPA financed 75% of the eligible costs of the sewer construction project under two separate grants. Through July 1979 the Town had received \$1,443,800 for the construction of laterals and \$1,529,614 for the construction of the treatment plant. But the last payments were received in August 1978 and November 1977 respectively. There are still \$76,000 and \$292,000 receivable on the two grants respectively. We recommend that someone follow up with EPA to get the final audit performed as soon as possible so that the Town can collect the receivables. The longer these receivables go uncollected, the more the Town is losing by not being able to invest the money. At an investment return of 10%, this is costing the Town approximately \$37,000 a year in unearned interest income.

Suggestions for Improvement Of Operating Procedures And Accounting System

- 1. Maintain adequate accounting records
- 2. Maintain adequate source documents to support accounting
- 3. Use a capital projects fund

- 5. Avoid possible conflicts of interest
- 6. Coordinate the management of fund assets
- 1. Maintain Adequate Accounting Records

Observed Practice

The accounting records for the sewer construction funds were not adequate. Moreover, when the audit started the sewer commissioners did not have a complete set of the accounting records that were maintained. Some of the reasons for the inadequacies are:

- 1. There was no overall integrated accounting for the project from inception through the audit date.
 - 2. There were no cash receipts or cash disbursements journals.
- 3. There was no general journal or detailed explanation of adjusting entries.
- 4. The general ledgers were updated periodically (usually monthly) for current transactions. There was no printout of all transactions affecting a particular account.

- 5. The chart of accounts was changed during the project without documentation to support the change.
- 6. General ledger account balances were reclassified after the interim EPA audit but there was no supporting documentation for the reclassification.

Recommendation

Maintain a complete record of all accounting transactions in chronological order. The records should include a general ledger, a general journal in which to record non-cash entries such as adjustments and reclassifications, a cash disbursements journal and a cash receipts journal. Describe each transaction as fully as possible and use a reference source. Use one chart of accounts for the project. If the volume of transactions for an accounting period will not be large, consider using a manual system.

An adequate set of accounting records will provide better administrative and accounting control over projects. It will also make it easier to produce financial statements.

An adequate record system will permit the town to comply with the Office of Management and Budget circular #A-102 relating to requirements for grants in aid to states and local governments which states among other things that grantee financial management systems shall provide for:

- 1. Accurate, current and complete disclosure of the financial results of each grant program;
- 2. Records that identify adequately the source and application of funds for a grant supported activities;

- 3. Effective control over and accountability for all funds, property and other assets.
- 2. Maintain Adequate Source Documents to Support Accounting Records

Observe Practice

We were not always able to locate the source documents to support an accounting transaction. Yet in some instances there were five or six copies of the same source document on file. Source documents included such items as vendor invoices, contract progress billings, contract bids and change orders and cash receipt advices.

The allocation of expenses between EPA eligible and ineligible costs was not documented on some items. The allocation of expenses between Allenstown and Pembroke on the contractors and engineers invoices was documented and approved by the engineers. But the allocation of expenses was not always documented on some of the other invoices.

Transfers between funds were only traceable by direct comparison of the funds.

Recommendation

Maintain a file of source documents properly coded and approved to support the accounting transactions. Do not retain duplicate copies of source documents unless absolutley necessary.

For expenses the files should contain a vendor invoice which contains an indication of the account to be charged, who varified, the invoice, who approved the invoice and whether any allocations on the invoice, when applicable, comply with grant provisions or contractual agreements.

Revenues should be supported by some kind of document showing the source of revenues and the account to be credited. If no supporting advice is received with the check, for example, a copy of the check can be created to serve as the source document and the appropriate information can be noted on this copy.

Having the source documents will provide support and authorization for each accounting transaction. Retaining only one copy of a source document should reduce the need for filing space. Having the documentation will also help to meet the requirements of Office of Management and Budget Circular #A-102 which requires that accounting records be supported by source documentation.

3. Use of Capital Projects Fund

Observed Practice

Two different funds (debt service and capital project) were used to account for the project. This involved two general ledgers. In addition, the use of more than one fund created the need for several transfers and the source and nature of several transfers were not always documented.

Recommendation

Use a capital projects fund to record all of the activity for a project including the bond issue revenue and interest earned on temporary investments.

This will simplify the accounting records and eliminate the need for inter-fund transfers and inter-fund accounts and promote more consistent handling in recording transactions. It will also make it easier to provide a financial statement for the project.

4. Determine Alternative Sources of Project Financing Before Issuing Bonds

Observed Practice

The Town appropriated \$3,042,000 for the sewer construction project in 1970 and issued bonds in April 1971 to cover the entire (federal - 50%; state - 40%; local - 10%) project cost. The project did not go out for bid until late 1974, almost four years later. Meanwhile, the project cost increased by over \$2 million and a state law change caused the state's share to drop from 40% to 20% of eligible costs. The Town raised the project appropriation in 1975 to \$5,322,000. The federal government's share of the project increased to 75% of eligible costs and the money was received from the federal government as the project progressed. By issuing bonds for the full amount of the project, the Town overfunded the project since only the state and local share needed to be financed on a long-term basis. The Town has been paying interest at 5.1% on the bonds since April 1971 and will retire the bonds over a thirty year period ending 2001. The state is reimbursing its share of the eligible costs in annual payments of the remaining life of the bonds.

Recommendation

Explore all possible sources of project financing before issuing bonds. Consider issuing bonds to finance a capital project only if other sources are totally inadequate. If bonds must be issued, issue them only for the state and local portion of a project. Use short-term notes for the federal portion of a project because the federal portion will be reimbursed as the project proceeds. Time the bond issue as close to the project start date as possible.

Using other funding sources could save the Town several thousand dollars in interest expense. Timing a bond issue near the construction period should avoid the possibility of the Internal Revenue Service classifying the bonds as arbitrage bonds and denying the Town tax exempt interest status.

5. Avoid Possible Conflicts of Interest

Observed Practice

The sewer commmissioners hired a local public accountant to maintain the accounting records for the sewer construction fund. The accountant also served in the same capacity for the town of Allenstown. He also served as the coordinator of the project for the two towns' sewer commissioners. In addition to maintaining the accounting records, the accountant also determined how each EPA payment to Allenstown for the treatment plant construction was to be allocated between Allenstown and Pembroke.

Besides the accountant serving in several capacities for the same project, the accountant's brother served as Pembroke's sewer commission chairman.

Recommendation

Avoid possible conflicts of interest by separating the responsibility for executing and recording transactions in connection with a project. The person responsible for authorizing and approving transactions should be different from the person recording transactions. In addition, although it is difficult to avoid a complete conflict of interest in a town, the person doing the accounting for a project should probably not be directly related to the person having a significant influence upon the executive decisions for the project.

Minimizing possible conflicts of interest will give the project more integrity and minimize the possibility of potential lawsuits.

6. Coordinate the Management of Fund Assets

Observation

The sewer commissioners account for the sewer construction fund. At September 30, 1978 the net assets of the fund were \$1,041,254 of which \$560,509 was cash and \$480,745 was accounts receivable. The selectmen account for the bond and interest account. At September 30, 1978 the assets of this fund, all cash, were \$269,144. Most of the cash in both of the funds was invested in low yielding (5%-6%) savings accounts. Under state law (RSA 41:29) the Town treasurer should have custody of the monies and determine, with the approval of the sewer commissioners and selectmen respectively, how the assets should be managed.

Recommendation

Both of these funds will be used to help repay the thirty year serial bonds for the sewer construction project. The Town treasurer should, with the approval of the sewer commissioners and the selectmen, see that the assets of these funds are invested in as high yielding investments as possible.

Shifting the assets of these funds from investments with an annual return of 5%-6% to investments yielding 10%-12%, for example, would double the investment income and could save the Town's taxpayers several thousand dollars a year.

Submitted herewith is the report of the examination of the Pembroke School District for the years ended June 30, 1979 and 1978, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the District.

One of the enclosed audits must be given to the District Clerk for retention as part of the District's permanent records.

General Comments

Treasurer:

As noted in our prior audit reports, the Treasurer of the School District does not perform her statutory duties in a manner consistent with sound business procedures. Entries are not made in the Treasurer's records for several months at a time with activity for the current accounting period not entered from July 1, 1979 to the time of the audit. This practice effectively negates any effort District officials may make to control their financial activity.

It is again recommended that the entries to the Treasurer's records be made on at least a monthly basis and that the accounting records of the Treasurer and the District be reconciled at a minimum of once a month.

Violation of RSA 197:23a:

R.S.A. 197:23a Treasurer's Duties, states in part, "The treasurer shall have custody of all monies belonging to the district and shall pay out same only upon orders of the school board..."

At the present time, the School Lunch Director receives and disburses all funds connected with the School Lunch Program. At no time does the Treasurer have custody of these funds, nor does the School Board approve transactions as required.

We believe this not only to be a violation of State statutes, but also to be a serious weekness in internal control. Therefore, we strongly recommend that these funds be handled by the Treasurer to strengthen internal control and comply with State law.

We have been informed that this violation has been rectified during the 1979-80 year.

Student Activity Funds:

The funds for the High Street School and the Hill School are not maintained in a manner as to be properly audited. We recommend that these funds be maintained in a comprehensive manner.

Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 71-A, Section 21, require that the auditor's summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the School District. Publication of the Exhibits contained in this audit report is optional at the discretion of the School Board. This letter, however, must be published in its entirety.

We extend our thanks to the officials and employees of the Pembroke School District for their assistance during the course of the audit.

In July of 1979, Pembroke Academy received word from the New England Association of Schools and Colleges that its accreditation had been extended for a period of five years. The renewal of the Academy's accreditation came in response to my five-year report indicating our progress in dealing with recommendations from the initial accreditation report granted in 1974.

Receiving an extension of our accreditation indicates the school's satisfactory progress towards improving its educational programs. However, maintaining accreditation is an on-going process and one that we must continue to stress.

It is my observation that we have vastly improved our services to the learning disabled student over the past several years. As a faculty we have had to develop new skills and attitudes in recognizing, assessing, and prescribing educational programs for handicapped students. At the present, we are providing special educational services for approximately 135 of these students.

Pembroke Academy, along with other schools in Supervisory Union #53, has developed an educational accountability plan. Simply stated, the plan provides a means of assessing how well we are helping students develop skills in reading, writing, and arithmetic. The plan also provides a means of including affective education in the curriculum. Affective education is that part of the educational program that affords students the opportunity to develop their personal well-being, stability, and ability to relate to other people.

For the past two years, Academy faculty has been involved in a curriculum development study which, when completed, will provide sequential programs of studies in social studies, English, science, and mathematics and will coordinate programs between the sending A.R.E.A. elementary schools and Pembroke Academy. This is a monumental task and one that takes dedication and much cooperation among the schools involved.

Beginning in September, Pembroke Academy initiated a new attendance policy which was designed to reduce a serious student absenteeism problem. Admittedly strict, the new policy reduced the amount of students absenteeism in the first ten weeks of the current school year by over 50%. Dismissals from school were reduced by 57% and school tardies were reduced by 40%. The basic assumption was simple; keeping students in school on a more regular basis would provide greater opportunities for students to achieve desirable educational goals. During the first ranking period of this year, 168 fewer academic warnings were issued to students. Although it is early to measure the long term effects of the stricter policy, early results appear to be encouraging. Modifictions will be recommended to the Pembroke School Board as they appear desirable in order that the policy be enforceable, fair, and effective.

I remain very concerned about the number of students at the Academy whose educational needs and interests are not adequately served by the school's curriculum. This concern will be lessened, in part, by the opening of the new vocational program at Concord High School beginning in September of 1980. Pembroke Academy will be able to assign as many as 79 students to this program during its opening year. Students attending the vocational program will take their academic and elective subjects at the Academy. There is much interest shown in this program on the part of our students. It is urged that parents become familiar with the offerings available in this program and encourage their student to participate if need and interest warrant.

One of the most persistent questions asked me by parents deals with the incidence of drug use by students at the Academy. Drugs and drug use will remain a problem for some students at the Academy and other schools as long as it remains a problem in the communities that send students to high schools. The Pembroke School District lacks a comprehensive health educational program and the development and implementation of one should

be a top priority during the next several years. Drug use is a community problem and one that must be recognized and dealt with by the various social and political organizations within the community. It is virtually impossible to determine the number of students who are chronic users of drugs. We need to stress the importance of working together to bringing about programs designed to educate everyone as to the dangers of drug abuse.

It is my strong conviction that the Academy is a good secondary institution. By working together we can keep it that way.

My personal thanks to Dr. Croteau for his continuing support, interest, and encouragement. Thanks also to Mr. Baron for his capable assistance in matters relating to the budget. The faculty continues to deal effectively and professionally with the many challenges facing them each day and their diligence and dedication should be a source of pride in the community. Again, my personal thanks and gratitude to the students and parents for their cooperation, understanding, and interest.

We began the school year with an enrollment figure pretty close to last year. Our projections for the future show a slight decline. The classes of 100, as we presently have in grades 6 and 7, appear to be overwith. Class sizes of over 30 hopefully will be eliminated.

The school continues to move into more positive lines. Our students have the benefit of special needs teacher, Title I and pshychological services. Many of the Pembroke students have found academic success because of the time spent evaluating individual needs. Our new special needs teachers, Mrs. Paula Rys and Ms. Marina Guilfoyle, have continued the programs where Ms. Leck and Ms. Dubuque left off.

Mrs. Karen Robbins has been a fine addition to the fourth grade. She is replacing Mrs. Kay Anderson who is on a leave of absence.

Ms. Elizabeth Hunter is our Junior High English/French teacher. She replaces Mrs. Patricia Theriault who left New Hampshire for Maine, her husband's hometown.

Ms. Kendra West is our chorus and general music teacher. She replaces Mr. Stephen Fabri who has left education to work in the private sector.

All of these new staff members have adjusted well to the school. Their presence has benefited the students in many aspects, both socially and academically.

Students today are faced with many personal problems, not directly connected with the three R's. Home situations have changed over the years. Unfortunately some students have found

drugs - liquor more comforting than the family. For these students life is very confusing. They reach for unrealistic goals and the future remains a big question mark. We as adults can sympathize with the confusion many of the youngsters are going through. The present economy remains unstable, the turmoil in the Middle East and elsewhere is unpredictable, and the energy crisis is very real.

Youngsters feel pressures as much as adults. Stress is very evident when things don't go well at home or here at school. School work is definitely hampered, grades are affected and learning becomes secondary.

We as teachers, parents and adults must realize the importance of a good education. We must be concerned with the future and that our present students are the leaders of tomorrow. We must lend all the support we can to help these youngsters. No matter how difficult situations are in our society, at home or at school, we cannot and must not neglect our students.

The Pembroke Elementary staff has been very much aware of today's problems. We have attempted to work around the many concerns and for the most part, I believe we have made progress.

As principal, I've felt that the community has always been very supportive and understanding of the needs of students. Pembroke Hill School Annual Report 1979 - 1980

The 1979-80 school year has been a productive one for both students and staff. Thanks to a solid core of veteran teachers, our programs have shown consistent positive growth over the years. This quality instruction, paired with the broad base of community support which the school enjoys, pays handsome dividends for our youngsters.

There are several new faces at the Hill School this year. Mrs. Marilyn Mifsud has taken a Team B position. She is formerly of Wantagh, Long Island, and holds a Masters Degree in Education from the University of Connecticut.

Mrs. Susan McCormick is our speech and language aide, a new position created as a result of increased case load in that area. Mrs. McCormick, a resident of Woodlawn Ridge Road, has directed our school volunteer program for the past two years. She also has elementary teaching experience.

Mrs. Judith Todd has replaced Mrs. Karen King, who is on maternity leave, as a Team A teacher. Mrs. Todd resides in Epsom. She has done much substitute teaching at the Hill School, and has her teaching degree from Notre Dame College.

Miss Kendra West is the new vocal music teacher for the district, working in all three schools. Miss West is a graduate of the University of Connecticut.

Although not a new face, Mrs. Erika Flewelling has assumed a new position as Title I math tutor. Mrs. Flewelling was formerly our Team A instructional aide, a position that has been eliminated.

Our enrollment seems to have stabilized at approximately 230 students. However, due to their changing needs, we have made several program changes.

This year's incoming group of six year olds, in general, was

much younger developmentally than those groups of previous years. We, therefore, have added a third readiness class rather than either slow the pace of our first grade program or overplace a significant number of children. We were able to have just two first grade classes, instead of our usual three, so that there was no net staff increase.

The needs of the children in our special services programs constantly change. We have seen a marked decrease in the number of children in our Learning Abilities Program. Therefore, we have reduced that position to five mornings a week to provide the consistency of program that learning disabled children require and also provide for cost efficiency.

Although the number of students in our Learning Abilities Program has decreased, the number in our Speech and Language Program has markedly increased. In fact, we have had to hire an aide to help with the program.

The whole area of special services appears to be our challenge for the immediate future. The impact of the new federal legislation upon our programs is still being felt. Although Pembroke was in a much better position to deal with the special needs of children than were many other communities, due to the quality of our existing programs, nevertheless, there is a dire need for creative planning in this area if we are to provide appropriate programs at a reasonable cost.

In closing, thanks to the efforts of an expert staff and the support of our community, the 1979-80 school year is a successful one. We will continue to help children to build the foundations for productive educational experiences.

Annual Report of the Pembroke Water Works

The Board of Commissioners of the Pembroke Water Works are pleased to present the following summary for the year ending December 31, 1979.

At the regular meeting held April 14, 1979 the Board of Commissioners elected Mr. Michael Bobblis as Chairman of the Board and Mr. Armand Nolin Jr. as Clerk of the Board. Congratulations were in order for Mr. Maurice Lavoie who was re-elected to a 5 year term.

In 1979 a total of 231 feet of new 6" water main was installed in Pembroke and also a total of approximately 400 feet of 2" main was replaced by a 6" water main in Allenstown. One (1) new hydrant was installed in Allenstown. Nine (9) new services were added to the system, eight (8) were in Pembroke and one (1) in Allenstown. There were also nine (9) other services relayed, and a total of one hundred eighty-five (185) other services were repaired. Nineteen (19) new meters were installed and ninety-eight (98) others were repaired and eight (8) others were found frozen. Two (2) new gates were added to our system and three (3) other gates were replaced. A total of twenty-one (21) leaks were discovered and all repaired.

At Bear Brook an 8" test well was completed by Layne New England to determine the possibility of a new well in that area. Also this year the Department bought a new 1979 Chevrolet Van to replace the 1971 Van.
