# Report of Highway Agent

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*To the Citizens of Rye:*

In reviewing the year's work, let us bear in mind the weather conditions, and their immediate result on road surfaces.

The open winter of 1927-28 made a severe attack, and followed by the rains of the early summer, a pronounced impression was made, especially on the lighter oiled surfaces; this condition was taken care of as best we could, with the aid of our machinery, and the application of oil and tar; but with the repetition of last winter, following the fall rains, it now bids fair to present a hard condition for the spring.

Confronted by this situation it seems advisable, at this time, to suggest that we try and adopt some plan for more permanent construction. The conditions under which we have labored in the past are that it has taken nearly the whole appropriation each year to keep abreast of the depreciation, arriving at the end of the year with no marked degree of improvement.

It seems if our town would appropriate a few thousand dollars more, for a period of years, and have it used to build a section of permanent road each year, that it would be working along more constructive lines; and by so doing, cut down the maintenance costs.

We were able to grade some few places about town throughout the year, concentrating mostly to the Garland road, where some 686 loads of gravel were placed on the road at a cost of \$1.59 per load, including the cost of material. This road was graded, rolled and two applications of tar applied, making a satisfactory job for ordinary traffic; but soon after its completion the fleet of state trucks took over its use; and with their heavy loads illustrated the fact, that for heavy traffic something more substantial than gravel is necessary.

We have been enabled by the Selectmen to make several

much needed improvements about town; the widening of the western end of Grove Road, as well as the curve at Dow Road, which are much appreciated.

The ledge removal on the Wentworth Road is another move along the line of wider and safer highways; this job came under the maintenance of trunk lines, whereby the state pays half the cost. The special appropriations enabled us to build the road-ways through property which should increase quite substantially the town's valuation. Our town was most fortunate in procuring such a fine building in which to store its road equipment. The necessary repairs and alterations have been made, adapting it to our needs, and its size and location make it particularly valuable.

# Report of Library Trustees

RYE, New Hampshire, February 1, 1929.

*To the Citizens of Rye:*

Year by year, the library has been enriched by gifts from various sources. This year, the Locke Family Association has presented a framed copy of *The New Hampshire Gazette*, of January 8, 1800, a document of great historical interest and value. For the cabinet, a picture of the poet, John Locke (1632-1704), has been given by Miss Clara Parsons and Mrs. Eliza Marden. The Every Other Tuesday Club has contributed ten dollars for the purchase of books on the drama and biography.

The library has been named as beneficiary under the will of Miss Susan Goss to the extent of five hundred dollars, the interest of which will be available at a later date.

In November, the library was visited by Miss Frances Hobart, secretary of the State Library Commission.

It is desirable, if possible, to have in the library a complete set of the Town Reports. To this end the Board will be pleased to accept copies of the annual town books from anyone having duplicates. Also, the library is in need of a set of fire irons to complete the furnishings of one fireplace for which Miss Rand provided andirons and a screen.

Aside from necessary minor repairs, and the installation of additional shelves in the upstairs room, little has been expended on the library building, because during the coming year it will be necessary to install a new furnace, to meet heavy insurance, and to re-arrange the planting in front of the building, which will absorb all available funds.

# Report of the School Board

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## *To the Citizens of Rye:*

The sum of money available from all sources for the maintenance of the schools for the school year 1927-1928 was \$18,132.60. Of this amount \$15,150 was voted by the citizens at the last school meeting. The receipts were \$17,382.60 and the expenses amounted to \$17,071.83, leaving a balance of \$310.77 with the school treasurer and \$750 due the school district from the town.

The appearance of the interior of the Wedgewood School Building has been greatly improved by the painting of all the rooms and the bricking in of the three north windows in the Junior High room. In accordance with the vote taken at the school meeting, an electric water system has been installed at the Wedgewood School. The interiors of the South and West Schools should be renovated next year.

Owing to increased expenses the budget for 1929-1930 calls for \$17,831, continuing the present school system.

# Report of the Superintendent

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*To the School Board of Rye:*

Herewith is submitted to you my fourth annual report as superintendent of the public schools of Rye.

Real progress in school affairs can be made only with the support of the citizens of the school district. In September, 1927, as School Board, you placed in operation a system of transportation by which the number of grades in the Elementary Schools was greatly lessened. At the annual school meeting held in March, 1928, after the new system had been established about seven months, the citizens clearly manifested their approval of the change. Hence you continued the plan. In my last report, I enumerated the benefits which would follow from this plan, and my observation has shown these benefits to be more pronounced and more apparent this year than last.

Three changes and one addition were made in the Rye teaching force at the end of the school year.

Principal Frank J. Tonis, after completing his second year as head of the Junior High School, resigned to accept a desirable position in Massachusetts.

Miss Horne, one of the assistants, resigned to accept as a well-earned promotion a position to teach in the Portsmouth High School.

Mrs. Smith resigned as teacher of the Parsons School after faithful service for six years.

These vacancies were filled as follows: As principal of the Junior High School was selected Arthur D. Wiggin. Mr. Wiggin has had a long and successful service as teacher and principal, and his conduct of the Junior High School thus far shows him to be a man of ability, tact, and energy.

To succeed Miss Horne, Miss Mildred Trow, of Nashua, was secured. Miss Trow has been well-trained for her work and is showing commendable zeal and ability.

For the Parsons School Miss Thelma Norton, of North Hampton, was selected. Miss Norton is a Normal graduate and had taught for one year. She is meeting with good success in her present position.

In our Junior High School of four grades, the number of different classes was too large for the three teachers to conduct without overwork on the part of the teachers or unwise combination of classes. After much consideration you voted to engage a cadet teacher from the University of New Hampshire.

The cadet arrangement is in brief as follows: From the Senior class in the University are selected three pupils who intend to teach after their graduation. As a part of their University training these pupils are sent out for one-third of the year each, to the school where their services are desired. These pupils receive no salary above the payment of their board and room. Their work is carefully supervised by an instructor from the University and by your superintendent.

The advantages of this system are its low cost, the additional supervision and the opportunity to obtain part-time service when full-time service is not necessary.

The one disadvantage arises from the lack of experience of the cadet teacher.

I would recommend a continuance of the arrangement until a teacher of experience is available for part-time service, or until the need of, and money for, a full-time teacher is at hand.

The presence of an additional teacher in the Junior High School has also rendered more apparent the need of additional accommodations for that school. It has been found necessary for some classes to be held in the manual training room without proper seating accommodations or blackboard space, for the cadet teacher to spend his study period in the unheated store-room, and for a time it was a choice between having space in the assembly room for additional pupils' desks and leaving the piano and principal's desk outside.

The membership of the Junior High School from year to year shows a steady increase. The average membership for the school year 1926-1927 was 59.4; for the first 15 weeks

of 1927-1928, it was 61.3 and for the Fall Term of this year 65.7.

I am confident that the citizens of Rye will decide very soon to provide their children with ample school accommodations by erecting a new building at Rye Centre. I further recommend that this building be built of sufficient size to accommodate all of the pupils of the town from grades one to ten inclusive, or if suitable arrangements can be made with Portsmouth to take our pupils of the tenth grade, to include grades one to nine inclusive.

Some additional equipment has been purchased for the Manual Training and Science departments, and I believe our pupils are deriving more benefit from these courses than ever before.

Running water was installed in the Central building last summer. This improvement is much appreciated.

In the modern method of teaching, the use of reference books and library books is almost indispensable, even for the lowest grades. A beginning has been made in providing such books for our pupils. I would recommend that hereafter each year a sum of not less than \$50 be appropriated to provide additional reference and library books.

Quite a number of our pupils during the year change their residence and as a consequence the schools which they attend. This has been causing from one to four weeks' loss of attendance at school for each removal. I would call the attention of the parents of such children to the loss in school interest and efficiency from this cause. It is in their power to remedy this in large measure.

In conclusion, I desire to express my appreciation of the helpful co-operation of the teachers, of the members of the School Board and of the parents and citizens in general, towards rendering our schools efficient.

## Report of School Nurse

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The school examinations were made in September by the school physician assisted by the school nurse.

The following is a report of the examinations:

The greatest number of defects among school children are teeth. A dental clinic held each year would be of great advantage to the children. The child can get his work done at an inexpensive rate. First aid cots have been placed in the schools by the Red Cross and first aid cabinets are to be bought. At the present time each school has a first aid kit, which contains iodine, boric ointment, unguentine ointment, oil of cloves, bandages, gauze, adhesive tape, and sulphur naphthol furnished by the Red Cross.

Dr. Eastman has very kindly given his services to three children who needed their tonsils and adenoids removed. The hospital also made no charge.

Glasses have been bought by the Red Cross for those children who could not afford to pay.

The school nurse tries to visit each school weekly. Sometimes this is not possible.

The children are inspected for their personal appearance,

health talks given by both the teachers and nurse. Class room weight records are kept and children weighed monthly.

At Red Cross roll call the schools contributed to the roll call, and also to Junior Red Cross.

There have been no contagious diseases this year, and we hope to continue so.

The parents have always co-operated with the school nurse and have received her courteously when making follow up visits in the homes.
