REPORT  
OF THE  
SUPERINTENDING SCHOOL COMMITTEE  
OF THE  
TOWN OF SEABROOK, N. H.

For the year ending March 1, 1876.

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In presenting my annual report, I find the condition of our schools quite satisfactory and shall therefore be brief in my comments. The Prudential Committee have been judicious and fortunate in the selection of competent teachers. Nearly all the pupils have rendered a cheerful and willing obedience to wholesome regulations, but a few have been *compelled* to submit to needed discipline. The schools in all the districts, with the exception of No. 2, were taught by the same teachers throughout the year. Notwithstanding a prevailing sickness during the summer term, I find by examining the school registers in most of the Districts a greater average of attendance than last year; a fact worthy of notice.

In three of the districts, within the past two years nearly \$5,000 have been expended on school houses and their surroundings. In Dists. Nos. 4 and 6, two elegant school houses have been built, and another one thoroughly repaired with improved seats and desks in No. 3. This, together with the fact of the increased amount of school

money appropriated by the town, is conclusive evidence that our citizens are more deeply interested in the cause of education. Some introductions of new books have been made during the year, which I believe will prove highly beneficial. In Dists. Nos. 1, 2 and 6, Franklin Series of Readers have been introduced. The old readers have been so long in use, they have long since ceased to be interesting to the pupils. In Dist. No. 6, Cornell's geography has been replaced by Warren's, which I regard as a very excellent and systematic work. A set of outline maps should be furnished in every district. In no way can geography be so rapidly learned and the knowledge so well retained as by the study of these maps. In all the schools, with one exception, there has been more or less declamation. Scholars will seldom be better employed than when treasuring up in the mind the language and thoughts of our best writers, or cultivating the art of addressing an audience with due self possession and propriety.

In some districts, many of the parents and friends of the scholars have attended the annual examinations; and your Committee would have been glad to report the same as true of every district in Town, as it can have but a salutary effect.

#### DISTRICT NO. 1.

The Summer and Fall terms were taught by Miss Ellen F. Maxfield, of Casco, Maine. Miss Maxfield is one of our best teachers. Her management of the school was entirely satisfactory. The closing examination was witnessed by nearly all the parents in the district. One remarkable circumstance was connected with the Summer term: of the whole number attending, not one was absent or tardy.

## DISTRICT NO. 2

The Summer term was taught by Miss Sarah A. Goss of Rye, and the Winter term by Miss Almena R. Collins of Seabrook, both experienced teachers and successful in their efforts.

## DISTRICT NO. 3.

This school throughout the year has been under the care of Miss Miss Flora E. Taylor of Hampton. Good order and attention to study have been observed, and commendable progress has been made. The schoolhouse is very convenient, and its surroundings are well worthy of notice.

## DISTRICT NO. 4.

The Winter term has been under the management of Mr. Frederick Pickering of Newington. This term commenced its sessions in the new school house, and we are happy to say that this school room is convenient, pleasant and comfortable, and an ornament to the district. Mr. Pickering is an experienced teacher and gave good satisfaction to the district.

## DISTRICT NO. 5.

During the year past the school in this district has been divided, and one was established in the vestry of the Congregational church. Mrs. P. A. Childs of Andover, Mass. was employed as teacher for the year. Mrs. Childs is an old, experienced teacher. Her method of instruction was thoroughly practical. Owing to the inconvenience of the room and not at all times being sufficiently warmed, it was difficult to preserve good order. Notwithstanding, the scholars made great progress. At the closing examination declamation and singing were rendered in a manner that reflected much credit on both teacher and scholars.

The summer term at the school house was taught by Miss Edith E. Mighill of Andover, Mass. This was her first attempt at the *delightful* task, and though she was a fine scholar and came well recommended, yet it was evident she was not "calculated for this latitude," and had not all the qualifications of a good teacher.

The winter term was under the care of Miss Fannie E. Sanborn, of Standish, Maine. During my visits to her school I saw evidence of good discipline and improvement. Declamation and singing were a pleasing feature.

In consequence of prevailing sickness during the summer, the average attendance was much less. Enough has been said in previous reports to make it apparent that the school house is not large enough to accommodate all the scholars, and I trust the next annual Report will record the fact that a new school house has been erected in this district.

DISTRICT NO. 6.

The summer and winter terms were taught by the author of this report, a fact that precludes further comment.
