

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Sullivan in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Sullivan on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next, at nine of the elock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

3. To choose a delegate to the constitutional convention.

4. To see what sums of money the town will raise in addition to that required by law for building and repairing highways and bridges, or take any action relating thereto.

5. To see if the town will vote to pay for digging graves and going with the town hearse.

6. To see what sum of money the town will raise in addition to that required by law for the support of the public library.

7. To see if the town will vote to raise money for Memorial Day or take any action thereon.

8. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to borrow money on the credit of the town in anticipation of taxes.

9. To see if the town will vote to help stamp out the white pine blister disease and raise money for the same, or take any action relating thereto.

10. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for removing snow from highways.

11. To see if the town will vote to buy of the First Congregational Society a small strip of land, situated back of the horsesheds, for the purpose of erecting a building to house the town tractor and snow plow, to raise and appropriate money therefor or take any action relating thereto.

12. To see what the town will do with the balance of \$200.00 left from the purchase of the tractor and snow plow.

13. To see if the town will vote to purchase some snow fence and raise money for the same.

14. To see if the town will raise the sum of \$1,000.00 to pay the long term note of the town, or take any action relating thereto.

15. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, or committees • heretofore chosen, or take any action thereon.

16. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Harrisville:

I herein submit my seventh annual report as superintendent of schools.

As we face the rapidly changing conditions of vocational, business and spiritual life, we ask ourselves what is this thing we call education? We might fill this report with definitions which emphasize certain phases of education. A century ago men thought of education as a means of preserving the past. Now, we think of education as a means of improving the future. Our real gain to civilization is found in the improvement of man himself.

Of the many modern viewpoints of education, Dr. John Dewey has hit the trail when he says in his book entitled Democracy and Education: "Education may be defined as a process of the continuous reconstruction of experience, with the purpose of widening and deepening the social content, while at the same time the individual gains control of the methods involved."

New Hampshire is carrying out this interpretation in its philosophy of education; (I) through its fundamental law that every child shall be offered an opportunity to have whatever talents he may possess brought to the fullest possible development, whether he lives in the city or country; (2) the child and his interests become the center of all our efforts, selection of text books, technique of methods, courses of study and selection of teachers. In fact, the child becomes the sun about which the appliances of education revolve, the center about which they are organized.

In the development of our educational scheme, we use certain methods and have certain goals. We must not confuse the

two. A method is but a means to an end. Any method that gets the desired results in an economical unit of time is a good method. Methods come and go. Goals are more lasting. They endure for centuries.

Important goals of our public school system are: (1) the acquisition of facts or universal truths through scientific reasoning, (2) the development of the skills in the elementary schools, (3) the formation of right habits of life, (4) the endowment of right attitudes toward school work, home life, church interests and community affairs.

In short, considered from a psychological view point, we wish our children to possess alert mental abilities, rich feelings and righteous judgments.

Your superintendent, teachers and school board have kept in mind the above mentioned goals in the performance of their respective duties. The degree of success we have atttained, we leave to your judgment.

Hugh Batchelder, Ralph Batchelder, Martha Batchelder, Edna McMahon, Malissa Nims and Maurice Swett.

At the East, No. 1, an interesting graduating exercise was held. The parts were well rendered by the pupils and reflected merit on part of teacher and pupils.

At the beginning of the present year in September, Mrs. Hastings continued her work at the East; Miss Marion Farnum, of Marlboro, a graduate of Keene Normal, class of 1928, replaced Miss Specht at the Center. The Fifield continued under the cadet system.

At Thanksgiving time. Mrs. Hastings resigned her position. Mrs. Hastings has served as teacher of this school several years with general satisfaction. We were sorry to learn that it was necessary for her to give up the school at this time.

Miss Margaret Estes, of Manchester, a graduate of Keene Normal, class 1929, was secured for this position.

At time of writing, the schools are running smoothly, the attendance regular. the attitude and interest of pupils encouraging, the work of teachers and pupils give promise for a successful year.
