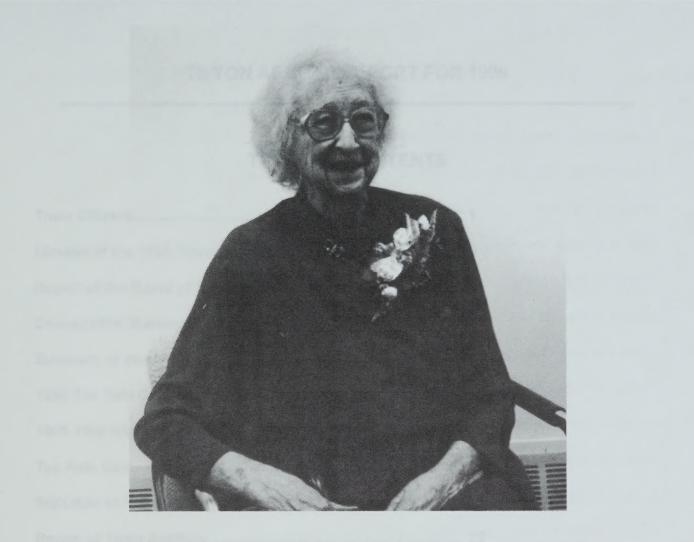

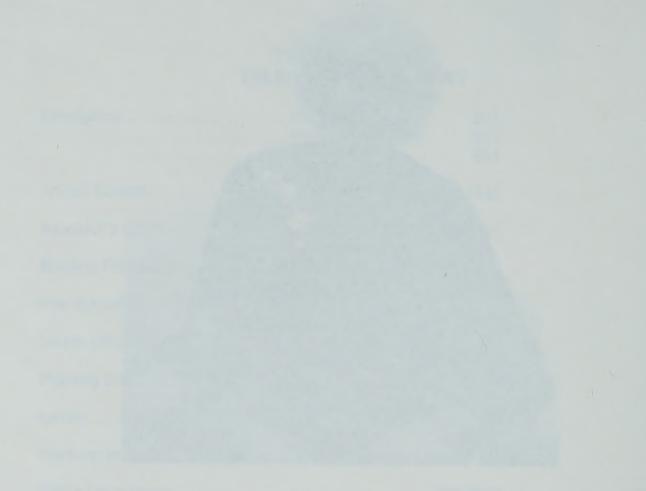

1996 TOWN MEETING BUSINESS SESSION WINNISQUAM REGIONAL HIGH SCHOOL

Article 5 regarding Buffalo Park and the appropriation of \$1. plus authorization for Selectmen to purchase same. Motion by W. Lawrence, second by T. deSousa to accept article as read. Motion by W. Lawrence to amend article to authorize the Selectmen to execute a sales agreement within 90 days, to purchase a parcel of land known as "Moses Buffalo Park" from its owners, Bernard Fillion and Carlton Hamm for the purposes of recreation, conservation, and education, and to accept any moneys such as but not limited to state and/or federal moneys if available and to apply for any financial aid that they may see as funds to assist the costing, thereby reducing the total tax burden of the district from the 1996 fiscal year payment of 100,000. And to further take what ever action is necessary to establish payments of \$33,333. per year to and with said Hamm and Fillion for the commitment in the fiscal years 97, 98, and 99. Motion to amend was defeated. Amend article to send to study committee and report to 1997 town meeting. Motion to amend passed. Motion on amended article passed.

<u>Article 6</u> \$2,000 for the Northfield-Tilton Economic Development Corporation. Motion fails.

Article 7 BUDGET - \$2,155,057 PASSED.

<u>Article 8</u> relative to recommending Selectmen accept offer of outlet mall owners to build a little league ball park and running track on Lot R22-17. Article not passed.

<u>Article 9</u> relative to amending agreement with Social Security regarding election workers. Motion passed with unanimous vote.

<u>Article 10</u> relative to changing Highway Agent position from elected to appointed. Article passed.

<u>Article 11</u> relative to reports of officers and agents. Accept reports as printed. Motion passed.

<u>Article 12</u> relative to choosing officers and agents for year. Moderator to appoint a committee of five persons for the study on Moses Park as approved in article 5. Motion passed.

<u>Article 13</u> relative to other business. Chairman Virgin rose to thank Mr. Harvey Morse for his years of service to the Budget Committee.

Rev. Arthur Clifford, new minister of the Franklin Methodist Church, a resident of Tilton expressed his thanks and appreciation to the Town, the residents, and the Town Hall staff for the kind welcome he and his family have received as new members of the community.

The meeting adjourned at 9:50 a.m.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN 1996

First and foremost, we would like to extend our sincere thank you and appreciation to the members of the Town's standing and ad hoc committees who give so selflessly of their time and talent to insure that the process of democracy is available to all. This year we would like to particular thank the members of the Planning Board who continue to undertake the difficult responsibility of insuring that development is planned for the mutual best interests of both the developer and the town.

Our focus this year has been two pronged. First, we have concentrated on implementing and completing several capital projects: the extension of the sewer line to the Nickerson Business Park, the completion of the extension of the sewer line to the Northern Shores neighborhood, and finally, after much delay and unexpected complications, the reconstruction of Noyes Road.

Secondly, on the administrative front, the Board has updated and significantly revised the welfare guidelines for the town and has taken steps to contain the escalating costs of the human services program has endured in the last few years. By re-structuring the application process and by making better use of outside social service organizations, the cost to the taxpayers of the program has been reduced significantly.

Continued progress has been made in perfecting the cash flow needs of the Town. Again, this year, the town was able to operate a significant portion of the year without borrowing money in anticipation of taxes. The results of the internal controls now in place in the Town's accounting system are evidenced by the notable decrease in the cost of borrowing for short term notes. Another focus of administrative activity has been the sale of property acquired through Tax Collector's deeds. Early this spring, the old Normandy Motel and cottages were auctioned off successfully to the highest responsible bidder.

The property is now undergoing renovations and has been returned to the tax rolls.

Three mobile homes were also sold through the bid process and another undersized lot on Andrews Road was sold to its only abutter.

The sale of all of these properties had the double benefit of providing the town with more than \$200,000 in revenues and of returning these properties to the tax rolls.

The old Pillsbury Mill, frequently referred to as the tannery, is still under the ownership of the Town. In March the property was auctioned off to the highest bidder. Unfortunately, the sale was never consummated because the successful bidder was not able to arrange for the necessary financing.

Following the collapse of that sale, the Board advertised for requests for proposals from interested parties for the future use and development of the old tannery building. Three (3) proposals were submitted. Presently, the Board is waiting for a party to demonstrate financial responsibility for the project, but is hopeful that arrangements for the sale of the tannery will be completed sometime this spring.

As a result of the gasoline contamination discovered at the highway garage in December 1995 and as a result of the laying of the sewer line through town property to the Nickerson Business Park, an old landfill area was discovered near the area presently used for the recycling program.

Since this landfill was never lined, never closed in accordance with Department of Environmental Services Rules and Regulations, and represents a source of potential environmental contamination to both ground water and surface water, the Town now faces the cost of closing the landfill.

The preliminary estimate for completing the initial closure (this excludes the cost of any future monitoring order by DES) and for completing the remediation necessary to clean up the gasoline seepage is \$610,000.

Included on the 1997 Town Meeting Warrant is an article to bond this debt and to begin the process of formally and legally closing the landfill area.

Our failure to seize the initiative on this matter and develop a responsible plan for the closure of the landfill will only mean that the State will dictate to the Town both the necessary steps and the cost of those steps. We are of the opinion that to delay in tackling the problem will only lead to further expense.

To the Board of Selectmen Town of Tilton

Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the general-purpose financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly presented in all material respects in relation to the general-purpose financial statements taken as a whole.

YOU ARE HEREBY NOTIFIED TO MEET AT THE TILTON SCHOOL GYMNASIUM ON TUESDAY, MARCH 11, 1997 AT 8 :00 AM TO ACT ON THE FOLLOWING SUBJECTS:

(Polls will be open from 8 am to 7 pm)

Article 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year as presented on the ballot prepared for the same.

Article 2. To choose the necessary school officials for the Winnisquam Regional School District as presented on the ballot prepared for the same.

Article 3. To see if the town will vote the changes in the standards used to determine eligibility for an elderly exemption.

AND ON THE 15TH DAY OF MARCH, 1997 AT 8:00 IN THE FORENOON AT THE WINNISQUAM REGIONAL HIGH SCHOOL TO ACT ON THE FOLLOWING SUBJECTS:

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of six hundred ten thousand dollars (\$610,000.00) for the purposes of completing the closure of an unlined landfill area located near the present recycling center and to cover the on-going costs of the clean up of the contamination caused by gasoline seepage at the Highway Garage; and further to authorize the Board of Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon. (RSA 33)

(The Selectmen recommend this appropriation) (The Budget Committee recommends this appropriation)

This warrant article requires a ballot vote and must receive a 2/3 vote of approval of those present and voting (RSA 33:8-a).

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000.00) for the purpose of constructing an addition to and improvements of the Hall Memorial Library. The funds appropriated shall be held by the Trustees of the Trust Funds for the Town of Tilton in the Hall Memorial Library Capital Reserve Fund established by the Town of Tilton in 1992; and

further that the Hall Memorial Library Trustees be appointed as agents to expend the funds held in the Library Building Capital Reserve Fund. (By petition of at least 25 registered voters.)

(The Budget Committee recommends this appropriation.) (Majority vote required.)

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the additional sum of fourteen thousand dollars (\$14,000.00) for the Tilton-Northfield Recreation Council to help support the operating budget of the Tilton-Northfield Recreation Council. (By petition of at least 25 registered voters.)

(The Selectmen do not recommend this appropriation.) (The Budget Committee does not recommend this appropriation.) (Majority vote required.)

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Budget submitted by the Budget Committee and posted as part of this warrant, and pass any vote in relation thereto. (Majority vote required.)

Article 8. To see what action the Town will take in regards to the reports of its officers and agents.

Article 9. To choose any other officers and agents for the ensuing year.

Article 10. To enact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

If should be noted that the towns of Belmont and Sanbornton have either raised or have been asked to raise an amount of money for the same purpose. In the event that this appropriation is approved by the District, such money will not be remitted to the Winnisquam Fire Department unless all other towns have raised an equal amount.
- 9. To see if the District will vote to accept the budget as submitted by the Fire Commissioners, and pass any vote in relation thereof.
- 10. To see if the District will vote to authorize the Fire Commissioners to apply for, accept and expend money from the State, Federal, or other Governmental unit or a private source should any become available during the year.
- 11. To see what action the District will take relative to the ultimate disposition of accumulated insurance proceeds. Such proceeds are accumulated as a result of proceeds received from insurance companies as a result of transports by the Districts Rescue Squad.
- 12. To see if the District will vote to authorize the Fire Commissioners to borrow money in Anticipation of Taxes.
- 13. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

In 1996 revenues, including interest and other income were \$190,197 or \$19,624 less than 1995. Rates were reduced in the third quarter to offset higher use of water for lawns and gardens which does not effect sewer flows.

Operating expenses were \$171,827, Construction and Engineering expenses were \$31,459, totaling \$203,286 for a loss of \$13,089. Operating expenses included \$43,000 for 1995 treatment charges, billed in 1996. Construction expenses included funds to complete the Northern Shores project and for Noyes road.

The loss of \$13,089 indicated above, was offset by receiving \$80,080 from the Northern Shores Bond to pay for 1995 and 1996 expenses, thus providing a Net Gain of \$66,991.

We had a gain of 41 users, 33 in Northern Shores and 8 other users who were mostly business users in the area of Exit 20 to the Mall. The total nunber of users is 538.

The Commission completed arrangements for the purchase of the private sewer lines from the main interceptor behind Pikes to Oliver's Restaurant, then east to the Town Garage property. This is being accomplished by a Betterment Assessment for those properties north of Route 3 that will be able to connect to these lines. This summer a sewer line was installed from the end of the line on Route 3 through the Town Garage property, running North, connecting to the Nickerson Industrial Park line. To date Nickerson Assembly is the only user in the park.

In the fall the Commission had preliminary engineering done to serve Mountain View Drive and the eastern end of Clark road. In late November a study was started to provide sewer for Lockmere and north on Route 3 along Lake Winnisquam to Jay's Marina.

The Noyes road project was not completed in 1996. It will be completed in the spring of 1997.

REPORT OF THE POLICE CHIEF

The Tilton Police Department handled 7655 calls for service in 1996 which is a 16% increase over 1995. Undoubtedly this is the result of the growth of traffic and development in Tilton. Continued development and expansion of the business district on Route 3 are planned for 1997, and will definitely impact public safety services, especially for the transient population we deal with.

A marked increase in traffic related calls such as auto accidents and traffic enforcement will be the inevitable result of the increased flow of traffic we are experiencing. During 1996 we had 395 auto accidents which is a 25% increase over just one year ago. Much of our time is being devoted now to traffic control and enforcement. Presently we have two officers especially trained in traffic technical accident investigation and reconstruction. This will result in better investigations and disposal of the accident case load.

Almost all of our uniform crime reporting (ucr) categories showed increases, the most disturbing being domestic disputes which almost doubled over the previous year at 77. D.W.I.'s were down slightly which is good news and appears this is the national trend, and has been for a couple of years.

Our foot and bike patrols have proven to be effective in the downtown areas and outlet mall, and hopefully will be expanded this coming summer.

The prevention programs we host and bring to area schools such as DARE and Officer Phil are in many cases sponsored by area businesses, so we are grateful to those contributors as these projects are extremely worthwhile.

As always it is very important to become pro-active in the reporting of crime and suspicious activity. Any police department will be ineffective without the help of its citizens calling with information regarding a crime or public safety issue. Thank you all from the members of the Tilton Police Department for your continued support.

REPORT OF THE ROAD AGENT

1996 has been a year of frustration. Beginning with large amounts of snow and ending with plenty of rain in December. In between we had breakdowns, illnesses and numerous delays of various types.

Perhaps this is a good time to remind home owners that they should not throw, plow or otherwise dispose of snow in the roadways or sidewalks. If someone else plows snow from their driveway into the road, not only is it against the law, the home owner is still responsible if an accident should occur.

Spring clean-up was heavy as usual but was expedited somewhat by having "free" days at the transfer station. Drainage work and reconstruction of Circle Drive was finally completed after about five years of promises.

Two inches of base asphalt was paved on Northern Shores after much discussion about drainage and responsibilities for costs and underground piping.

The sidewalk along Laconia Road in Lochmere was widened and paved. The sidewalk along Silver Lake Road was also paved with one inch of finish asphalt as far as the Post Office. We plan to do another section in 1997.

Other projects for 1997:

- Culvert replacement on Vista Heights, Ridge Road and Jacob Road.
- Drainage work on Birch Drive.
- Work with NH DOT to re-build Autumn Drive.
- Pave the finish coat to Northern Shores.
- Re-deck and paint the Island bridge.
- Repair the box culverts on Pine, High, and Chestnut Streets.

REPORT OF THE TILTON-NORTHFIELD FIRE DISTRICT CHIEF

On behalf of the members, officers, commissioners and myself, I would like to thank you, the members of the community, for your continued support throughout the year.

As was expected, our numbers were up in 1996, and with the continued development off exit 20, those numbers should continue to rise steadily.

With the increase in call volume it is vitally important that you place your house number where it is easily visible from the road. For those who live well off the road, this means placing your number curbside. I cannot stress enough how much precious time this can save in a life or death situation.

I would like to express my special thanks to Tilton Ford for the donation of painting our forestry truck and to the First Deposit National Bank for the funding to purchase our new ladder truck. Without the support of local businesses like these, we would not be able to do our job quite so efficiently. Thank you.

In 1996, 42 dedicated members and officers participated in 1384 hours of training which included an high intensity course on responses to Hazardous Materials incidents. We now have 18 Level I firefighters and 11 Career Level firefighters. All of our Emergency Medical Technicians are defibrillator certified and 5 are IV certified with two currently enrolled in the course.

In 1997 we will be moving our business office to the station on Park St. This office will be handicap accessible and will allow our new full-time secretary, who is a firefighter/EMT, easy access to the ambulance. With the addition of our full time secretary it will be easier to obtain permits, code information and schedule inspections with the Chief.

I look forward to serving you again in 1997.

The department consists of 30 active members (no compensation). Eighteen of the members are state certified to fire fighter Level I and 5 are Career Level. We also have 12 active EMT's, 3 certified Intermediate Level with IV certification and 2 with End. Trach. Intubation and Drug Intervention. Two more are presently in Intermediate class.

It is our hope that with the change in the funding formula, funds for a much needed new truck will be appropriated by all three towns this year. We are happy to report that the members of the WFD have reached their goal of raising \$25,000 towards the new truck. This money has come from many car washes, suppers, selling refreshments at community events, Halloween Haunted House and other activities. We also received grants from First Deposit National Bank of Tilton and Laconia Savings Bank, plus many donations from people in the area, and people we have assisted.

We have completed the installation of an automatic fire alarm system and emergency lighting in our building.

All of the members of the department would like to thank the people in the community we serve for their continued support of our work during the 55 years since we were organized.

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REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

To aid your Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department and State Forest Ranger, contact your local Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required before doing any open burning. Violations of RSA 227-L:17, the fire permit law and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$2,000 and / or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

There are ten Forest Rangers who work for the NH Division of Forests and Lands, Forest Protection Bureau. State Forest Rangers are available to assist communities with forest fire suppression, prevention and training programs as well as the enforcement of forest fire and timber harvest laws. If you have any questions regarding forest fire or timber harvest laws please call our office at 271-2217.

The State of New Hampshire operates 15 fire towers, 2 mobile patrols and 3 contract aircraft patrols. This early detection and reports from citizens aid in the quick response from local fire departments.

PLANNING BOARD REPORT

The Tilton Planning Board has had a very busy year in the area of Site Plan Reviews. The Board reviewed seventeen (17) Site Plans and held 10 Conceptual Reviews of Site Plans. These Site Plan Reviews resulted in the creation of many new and or expanded businesses. Some of the new businesses established were Tilton Exit Development (Dunkin Donuts et. al.), Northeast Cycle, SCI Inc., Inventive Cooked Foods Corp., John Bernard Used Car Sales, Boats "R" Us, Improved Technologies of NH, Country Lake Estates, Lakes Region All Weather Storage Shelters, VIP Auto Discount Center, Baxter Auto Parts Sales, the expansion of Quality Controls, Inc. and the complete renovation of Irving Oil. The Board also reviewed and approved two lot consolidations.

The Planning Board has held 12 Public Work Sessions on proposed changes in the Zoning Ordinances that would bring current Zoning Ordinances into harmony with the Town of Tilton's Master Plan. A major proposal for sweeping Zoning changes went down to defeat in March of 1995. The Board therefore resolved to review and modify these proposed changes as well as expansion of the Zones within the Town of Tilton, through a regular series of Public Hearings in which it would receive input from interested citizens and hopefully put itself in a position where it could come before the voters of the Town of Tilton in March of 1997 with a revamped and comprehensive proposal. We as a Board devoted one meeting per month to this task throughout 1996. During this period of time we received significant input from the public and feel that we have made significant strides towards arriving at a final proposal. However, because of time constraints we were not able to meet all State imposed deadlines which would allow us to bring this proposal before the taxpayers this year. We have therefore resolved to continue to move forward and posture ourselves to bring our revised and enhanced proposal for Zoning changes as well as the Boards plan for expansion of Districts to the taxpayers of the Town of Tilton in March of 1998.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all permanent and alternate Board members for their dedication, input and contributions during 1996. I look forward to a very challenging as well as rewarding and growth filled planning year for 1997.

REPORT OF THE TILTON RECYCLING PROGRAM

Many changes have taken place in recycling during 1996. The value of paper and cardboard has had dramatic price changes. Interest in recycling seems to have dropped off this year. Our tonnage of mixed containers (glass, aluminum and steel cans, #1 and #2 plastics) was 17.4 (was 19.03 in '95) and old newsprint was 14.39 (was 22.67 in '95). Waste Mgmt. carried away 11.59 tons of flattened corrugated cardboard for no charge/no cost.

Be aware that our Public Works department is able to take old car batteries, old latex and oil paints, and securely contained small quantities of used motor oils. Items like these should never go out with your routine trash collected. State agencies will gladly assist you with any inquiry about disposing of hazardous materials.

We are happy to report to all member communities that 1996 marked the seventh complete year of successful operations. Some items which may be of interest follow:

The 1997 budget reflects a level tipping fee of \$39 per ton. This is the third consecutive year the Cooperative has been able to either lower or maintain the tipping fee for members of the Cooperative.

The waste delivered to the Wheelabrator facility this year was 119,214 tons. That represents an increase of 3,920 tons over 1995, or a 3.4% increase. The amount of trash delivered continues to rise as predicted.

A total of 67,679 tons of ash were disposed of at the Franklin ash monofll. Things continue to operate well at the ashfill. Construction of Phase III was completed in 1996. This most recent expansion will provide disposal capacity for the next nine years.

REPORT OF THE YOUTH ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

The Youth Assistance Program is a Court Diversion and Prevention Program. Its goal is to help youths to be accountable for their actions. The staff offers help to parents and youths in times of crisis and ongoing support through some of the hazardous journeys young people and their families often experience. Of our court diversion cases in 1996, 37.9% were from Northfield, 17.3% were from Sanbornton and 44.8% were from Tilton.

This program is primarily funded by taxes from Northfield, Sanbornton and Tilton. However, we have sought financial help from other sources. For seven years costs to the towns have been defrayed by allotments from Merrimack and Belknap Counties. Since 1991, the Governor's Drug Free Schools and Community Grant has funded the Challenge Training -- a drug and alcohol related program. Each year we reapply for these funds. Our program has been well received and funds have been made available even when money is tight. We are aware that shifts do occur and there is always the threat that these sources of revenue may decline.

The Youth Assistance Program is based on the premise that communities serve themselves best. Program costs are lower than they would be if outside authority were in control. Services are closer to home, neighbors are helping neighbors. We appreciate our townspeople being aware of the important role of the Youth Assistance Program and of their continued support through their tax dollars.

This was the first court diversion program in the state in 1975. Judges, police, town authorities and community members saw the need of such a plan. Many programs based on ours have sprung up across the state. There is now a network of over thirty court diversion programs. Meetings are held once a month to resolve problems and plan trainings.

REPORT OF NEW BEGINNINGS

On behalf of New Beginnings, I would like to thank the Town of Tilton for its continued support. Your \$1,000.00 allocation for 95-96 assisted us in providing emergency services, advocacy and support to victims of domestic and sexual violence.

Publicity surrounding the issue of domestic and sexual violence and its devastating effects on families and children has resulted in a significant increase in requests for our services. Our records indicate that we had 17 contacts with Tilton residents in 1993, 68 contacts in 1994, and 77 contacts in 1995. In addition, 372 other contacts for services were not identified by Town. Our agency documented over 1,721 requests for service for 1995. The first six months of 1996 shows that we had 47 contacts from Tilton residents.

As you know, New Beginnings staffs a 24-hour crisis line solely with volunteers; operates a full-time shelter for women and children and safe homes for male victims; provides support and advocacy at court, the hospital, police stations and social service agencies; offers peer support groups for victims of domestic violence and sexual assault; assists with needs assessment, case management and housing options; and does community outreach and education programs for teens and adults. All our services are provided free of charge.

We are members of the statewide NH Coalition Against Domestic and Sexual Violence, promoting statewide networking and resource sharing among domestic violence and sexual assault programs. The Coalition is the evaluating body and administrator of state and federal contracts that provide subsidiary funding for member programs and advocates for legislative change that affects victims of domestic and sexual assault.

We greatly appreciate the solid support of the Tilton Community. We are dedicated to human service, social responsibility and fiscal accountability. New Beginnings represents a very finite portion of the Tilton budget but the returns are immeasurable. We welcome your participation in our efforts to insure a world of safety for ourselves and our children. Volunteers are always needed and the opportunity to serve is fulfilling and satisfying.

REPORT OF THE VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION

During the year 1996 we experienced the managed care health system with great concern due to HMO's emphasis on cost rather than the "quality of care". We continue to be our patient's advocate and have become very skilled at negotiating.

During 1997 we will need to put even more emphasis on patient / client advocacy and on the fine tuning of negotiation skills; there are certain <u>standards</u> related to home health care upon which we must be firm.

We are also seeing the Medicaid dollar shrinking. Consequently, fewer Medicaid funded beds will be available in NH. Does this mean an increase in the need for home care? Yes, it is estimated that 10 - 15% of residents in nursing homes could manage in a "less restrictive setting", primarily their own home with some assistance.

Along with Medicare cuts, Medicaid and Managed Care, we are also called upon to give home health care to the uninsured.

We look forward to another year of service and shared success and would like to thank the residents of Tilton, our committed staff, volunteers and Board of Directors for their continued and steadfast support.

We will work together with all the community services to meet the needs of the people in Tilton, providing LEADERSHIP as we move into the 21st century delivering <u>QUALITY</u> home health services.

1996 Service Statistics

In 1996, 6,868 services were delivered to the people residing in Tilton and 34,424 to our entire catchment area. Our Hospice Program continues to expand and we brought Community Health Education Programs to all the towns we serve.

LAKES REGION FAMILY SERVICE ASSOCIATION, INC. ANNUAL REPORT

Lakes Region Family Service Association is a private, non-profit social service agency which offers supportive services to individuals and families from Tilton. The Agency has been in existence for over 25 years in the Lakes Region. The mission of the agency is to strengthen and support families by offering programs that promote healthy relationships among adults, parents and their children. We are committed to offering accessible and affordable services to individuals throughout the Lakes Region.

The Agency has five core programs. These include the Counseling Program, the Mediation Program, the Parent Aide Program, the Child Advocacy Program and the Family Life Institute. We offer a wide variety of parenting groups, workshops and therapy groups for children, adolescents and adults.

Our Counseling Program offers services on a sliding scale basis and also accepts Medicaid and many insurance's. There is no waiting list for services. Evening and Saturday hours are available. Parent-child and family mediations are offered free of charge, as are our child advocacy services (for children under age 18 who have been sexually abused and their families). Divorce mediation is available at reasonable rates.

Over the last two years, we have been increasing our educational offerings to families at very affordable rates. We are conducting these throughout the region at locations which make attending more accessible. These services are now offered through the Family Life Institute.

REPORT OF LAKES REGION PLANNING COMMISSION

The Lakes Region Planning Commission is a voluntary, non-profit association of local governments formed for the purpose of bringing area municipalities together. By associating and pooling resources, local governments have access to a highly trained professional staff for a wide variety of services. The LRPC works to benefit the member communities and the region overall. The LRPC has expertise in land use and transportation planning, master planning, environmental planning, capital improvement programming, economic and community development, housing, fiscal and environmental impact analysis, geographic information systems, household hazardous waste collections, engineering and site plan review. Circuit rider planning and public facilitation services are also available from the Commission.

Your support helps the LRPC maintain a regional presence working on behalf of all local governments in the Lakes Region. Over the past year the LRPC :

- Provided consultation and technical assistance to thirty-one member communities.
- Co-hosted three public Municipal Law Lectures where practicing attorneys provide a legal perspective on local planning, zoning and other municipal issues.
- Presented a public workshop for local land use and select boards on home occupations where attorneys and planners participated in a panel discussion on this rapidly growing economic and land use activity.
- Convened a public workshop on the basics of planning for planning board members and others who needed an introduction or refresher seminar on the dynamics and responsibilities of the local planning process.
- Convened four public meetings to receive public comment as part of the update to the Lakes Region Transportation Plan. The Transportation Plan is the policy document which supports additions to the regional and state transportation improvement programs.

Represented the Region on the N.H. Heritage Trail Advisory Committee.

• Continued to update the regional land use map using geographic information system technology. Land use for Franklin, Laconia, Gilford, Tilton, Meredith and Hill was completed last year; more communities will be added in the next year.

- Continued to support area economic development policy as a board member of the Belknap County Economic Development Council and Newfound Economic Development Corporation Mitigation Fund Advisory Committee. Applied for regional funding to support economic development from the NH Community Development Finance Authority.
- Produced and distributed newsletters focusing on planning topics and issues relevant to the Lakes Region.
- Represented the region in discussions leading to the construction of an access road to Governor's State Park along Lake Winnisquam as a member of the Governor's State Park Advisory Committee.
- Served as the Lakes Region's data clearinghouse for U.S. Census, demographic and statistical data. These data are available to community officials and the public.
- Retained regional interest in locating a state sponsored conference facility in the Lakes Region.
- Developed public information materials, e.g., brochure, display, draft map guide and slide show, as part of a major effort to educate the public about nonpoint source pollution in the Lake Winnipesaukee watershed.
- Provided support to the U. S. Americorps staff who focused on working with local land owners on issues related to water quality and land management.
- As part of the NH Rivers Management and Protection Program, the LRPC contacted study area towns to establish the Pemigewasset River Advisory Committee.
- Performed substantial work on a report that compares single-day household hazardous waste (HHW) collections with permanent HHW collection facilities.
- Established subareas of the Lakes Region as forums to discuss regional planning issues.

REPORT TO THE CITIZENS OF COUNCIL DISTRICT ONE

It is an honor to report to you as a member of the New Hampshire Executive Council. The Executive Council is five in number and serves much like a Board of Directors at the top of your Executive Branch of State Government in Concord. We vote on most contracts over \$2,500 to outside agencies, individuals and municipalities, also major permits to use State waters, 267 unclassified positions as Commissioners and Directors within the Executive Branch of State Government, and the entire Judicial Branch of NH State Government is voted in by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Executive Council. We also vote on gubernatorial nominations of hundreds of citizens to various boards and commissions as prescribed by NH Law.

Anyone desiring further information should write or call our State House Office (listed below).

Citizens in this region should be attentive to several projects:

1. The statewide Health Care Council's 18 month planning project will be coming to conclusion in December of 1997. There are three very active Councils in this District. Information can be obtained by calling Commissioner Terry Morton, Department of Health and Human Services at 1-800-852-3345.

2. The ten year highway planning process will be underway this coming summer and fall. I will be conducting at least three hearings in this district to ascertain regional needs. Information on this project can be obtained by calling Commissioner Leon Kenison, Department of Transportation at 271-3735.

3. The NH Joint Tourist Promotional Program will, I expect, be funded at least with \$500,000 to be matched by local Chamber of Commerce and tourists groups to promote your region. Information on this program is available from Commissioner Robb Thomson, Department of Resources and Economic Development at 271-2411.

4. There is approximately \$172,000 waiting to be matched by local economic development promotion dollars from local groups. Information can be obtained on this program from Director Norman Storrs, Economic Development at 271-2341.

5. There is about 10 million dollars waiting for applications from local governments for Community Development Block Grants to improve your local town and area. Information on how to apply can be obtained by calling Director Jeff Taylor, Office of State Planning at 271-2155.

6. Local towns, cities, counties and eligible organizations should be aware of the large Federal and State Surplus Distribution Programs (the state surplus distribution center is open to the public at White Farm on Clinton Street in Concord, NH on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays). Further information can be obtained by calling Supervisor Art Haeussles, Surplus Distribution at 271-2602.

7. Citizens and groups concerned about disabilities should be aware of the large number of services available from the Developmental Disabilities Council by calling Director Alan Robichaud at 271-3236.

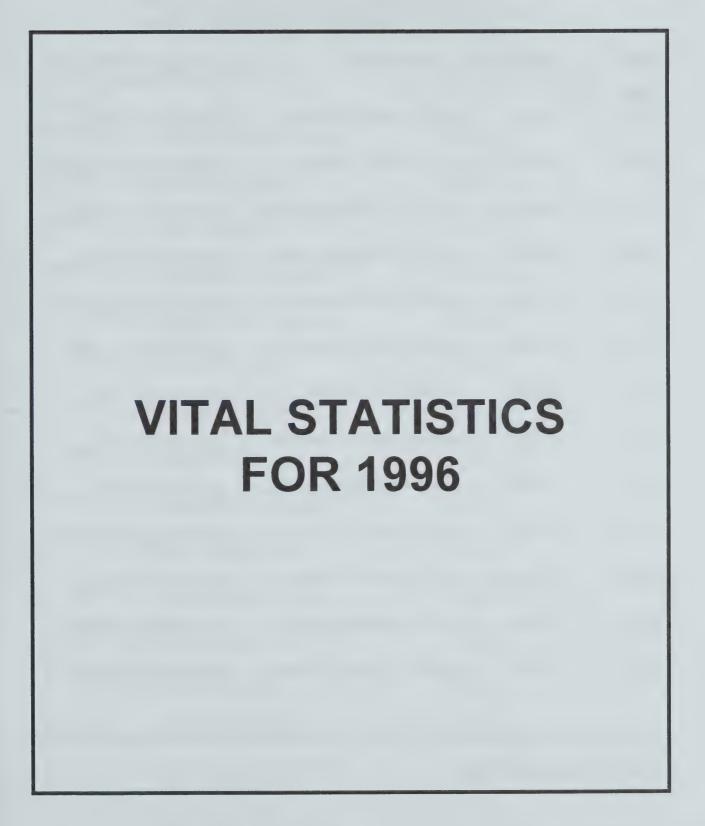
